Feb 2 - Bet Lt. Morrison that we would not be prisoners in the P.I. on Jan 1, 1944. It moved out of P.I. Oct 87  
13 off.

Feb 13 - Shaved with razor made from a bayonet.

Feb 18 - Awoke this morning at 4AM with confusion to Chamber pressure problem.

March 18 - Received package from Marie on March 15. May God bless you and all those who assisted in making your gift possible.

March 28 - Received 2 letters from Marie - First since Dec 1941.

April 6 - Letter read, understood, and read. Wt nearly most over, but have return in defecations. Eyes, small mouth, sores, skin not in condition.

April 30 - Happy Birthday, Marie - Next year - Fish oil supplement was improved eyes - Here comes lameness in right leg. Had a horse at cat this morning. Tastes of chicken and rabbit.

May 16 (See Feb 2) Received Bet w/ Lt. Morrison - (See John 15:16)  
10,000,000; 14,500,000 worth of seeds \$200 dep McNeil and Madore - Wisc Ave - Milwaukee, Wis.

May 31 - I just finished "The Citadel" - In its aspect, it gave no sign of being comon. - In the end, it remained in my hands telling you "A woman can make or break a man". His greatness was within him, but she nearly let him get away when other women nearly broke him.

We have had many experiences, some pleasures, misadventures. Right leg lame - rear hocks help, but walks down thru cat - thumb joints bingle - These symptoms disappear when I eat eggs. - Lower left rib-frontal area - frequently gets sore over night - Pain & lesions during morning.

June 15 - Lt. Morrison and I have increased our bet to \$2500 - Extra \$120 for heat (See Feb 2-May 16)

July 16 - Morning bet increased to \$500 - See June 15.

July 25 - Blister last 4 yrs - Started to work this morning. It would sting - called back at gate 1/1/41. Have patches "scabs" on right side, Serramonte, a few "water" sores on leg. Weight (approx) 167 lbs. Right leg lame at times.

Aug 2 - Our August here again. Hoping to be with you next year. Third birthday any in this hole holes.

Aug 10 - Morrison and I increase bet to \$5000  
\$1500 Silver \$500 Gloves - See July 16.

Aug 22 - Called to store office last evening and informed that I would be "Cook-Master".

Aug 28 - Third birthday in this hell-hole - Cook-Master since Aug 21 (6PM) - Good job.

He has been tied up in front, with little food and water. The first night they beat just to which he was tied, every hour. - Mrs. Norton brought about ten Volumes of bound books too, which make good reading, altho I cannot read much because of bad eyes and no glasses. Yesterday I was beat with topo, because men were gambling, and thought I had been sleeping. - Mrs. Norton also brought sticks, etc. the men had them ready, they have not been given out. - Men with broken wrists made to work all day.

May 1 - Hackley taken away today.  
 May 4 - A sealed coffin, reported to contain Hinchley, was buried at Bilibid today.

May 6 - Maj Bress beat up by Wolf this evening.

May 7 - May 15 - First moderate rain of the season. Second movie - News reel 153 and a lot of it. June 2 - Propaganda - Got sleep across - with knife. by Vojtěch track.

June 3 - Chery would not let man with pneumonia be put in hospital.

June 4 - David Sanchez shot to death in field.

June 7 - One search light on obs. tower and three or four AK guns are now in place at the Field.

June 8 - Detach. of three hundred men arrived from Cebu.

June 9 - Sick house man in gallbladder yesterday this morning four were sent to work in Top. Garden. Have been having first moderately heavy rains the past three days. #1 signal probably up.

June 12 - Joe L. Coca died today. He arrived in Pasay on June 8th. Went to work on 10th. Sick (possibly malaria) exhausted the dinner until 3PM) and beat up by "Wolf" on 11th. Died today.

June 13 - Called for 25 men (as ordered by Vojtěch) to help move table in tool shed. At 10 AM came. #44 R.R. Walker, PSC USMC refused a direct order.

June 14 - Vojtěch and a gun sentry beat up on the women in "the three Brothers". June 21 - We are working long hours these days.

Waking at 6:45 AM - Dismissed 7:30 PM

June 22 - Maj Bress and Capt. Barnes beat up by Wolf

on June 28 - Wolf summarily beaten by Vojtěch yesterday.

We are getting home a little earlier (6:55 PM)

July 1 - Whipping post erected.

Feb Month 28 Dr. Bress recommended the following:  
To Capt. Usui - hats for hot season: more salt, issue enough good hats so everyone have good hat full rest at noon (11:50 - 1:30), that his (noj Bress) sick list be followed.

March 28 Duck soup noon today - 1 Sack rice, 10 lbs toppings.  
April 12 Lt Col Pitts whipped for helping sick men on way to work. Approx 20 men were whipped at field for starting to lunch shack without permission. Had some light rains April 9 & 10. - "Wolf" had man in state shock with injured leg. Poked around him, and told him that he (the injured man) was in Batoon and probably killed many Japanese. Donist came today.

April 14 Initiated to the Oriental Order of the Purple Acacia (Three men picked beans off tree).

April 19 Three of the Lts and couple orderly got drunk last night - on motor fuel.

April 20 Accident at field yesterday. Nowmen 18110d, Loret's back injured. O tools slightly bruised. Was on burial detail, felt like being free on truck ride home, gloriously so. Many smiles and "Waves" from families on way. First time I was away from the regular routine since arrival. 50 man detail arrived 160 day.

April 24 Someone posted a clipping from Tribune dated Dec 8th 1942 under General Sec 6 that a list of war prisoners in Philippines had been received. Yesterday a man was whipped for telling a story that

This evening we had the first "public" whipping at by the committee for theft.

April 25 Happy Birthday Marie - Hope to be with you in May. Strange you thinking that I would leave you, yet it was you who left me to this.

Medics who had been on chew detail just came in and reported that a man had broken his wrist when the working party arrived at field this morning. They thought that Maj. Bress had sent him out that way, and would not let Capt. Hinckley treat him. Hinckley tried to run away at field April 27. Mental dispondency due to diarrhea and stores due to heat. Will have caught him. Beaten a few times with pick handle. When asked if he knew the penalty, he replied death and stated that he would rather die than stay here.

one getting is 0.11 lbs corn beef and 95 centavo meat and vegetables etc with evening rice - 45 lbs corned beef and 6.7 lbs meat and veg per day - 900 men now in camp. Estimate enough on hand to last until Feb 20. - Pay day yesterday, bars P28.65 and \$54.40. Feb 11 - Rest day. Canadian Red Cross boxes distributed today. - Approx 1 to 2 men - Officers received 1 box each.

Feb 14 - St. Valentine's Day - Greetings from 411. Saw Army Transport "check up" yesterday.

Feb 16 - Capt. Chambers + Maj. Bress had case to coat 2.400 men. Stated that it was very poor.

Up early out ranger that there are no medicines in Cabulos

Feb 16 - New guards and foremen came in yesterday.

Feb 21 - Went paper had item that Ermita district was not being evacuated, only undesirables were being removed. Yesterday's paper had an item that Mano Ching Kilbeck talked before a joint session of Congress.

Feb 26 - Dr cut open Whitmore carbuncle today. Still improving from pulmonary edema. "Where there is life there is hope". Played first game of chess on 2/21. Rice ration & has been cut. Additions being built on showers and latrine. - We were informed today that our cards had the wrong ~~address~~ return address - should have been HQ instead of name and word confiscated.

March 2 - 4 men went to Bilibid - before leaving 2 started fighting - Both were skinning 96 "Chows" - A Capt. Med. Officer (1st Lt Army) Dr. from Bilibid inspired camp.

Rumors from Bilibid - U.S. holds Burma, now Guiné, Cabulos - Bombing Borneo and Palawan

Feb 26 March 6 - Japs started moving tanks.

March 9 - Second and last shot for typhoid, dysentery and cholera. Feel a little "sluggish" these days, gear has been eating to much.

March 11 - Had movies last night. First since war started. - Daikoku movie yesterday.

Sugar has not been available on orders - Some sugar was up. 400-500 kilos.

March 12 - Okada - Dutch - Swatch - Ishikawa - Hosimola and Tanaka were at field this morning. Japs lined up for farewell. - Three

(Refer letter in Jan. 23, 1943 Tribune) Dental gold sold for P2.50 per gram in Oct 1942 - P3.20 per gram in Jan 1943.

Feb 1 - Moon blotted this morning. Had been clear in my vision before in morning. Lt. Holdridge same comment. - No more socks - Biennah much less in camp. Sickness much less, apparently due to Roy Cross food.

Japanese refunded P227.80 due on orders placed Aug, 1942. - Four men received letters today.

from US. - CCC boxes distributed last night - At 3:40AM on Jan 27<sup>th</sup>, we were called to line up. My thoughts were to a change in war - Evacuation, or something - Bango showed two men missing - later found to be Mistra brothers, Pts. F.L. & J.P. Dowling. One was in the office, one was brought in later. Capt Usui beat both with sword in scabbie. However allowed to go to bed about 4:30AM - so violent escapados to way Imoto would carry on. The brothers were tied to pillars on front porch when we went to work. One was too weak to stand, and had to be strapped to a chair. Sign at store window provided to except "CHT ALL IMPLST, AFRAID AND IN DANGER".

Feb 4 - Nips gave 1 bottle of Scott's Emulsion, with instructions to give one teaspoonful per day - Men should have 6 tablespoons per day to be its value. - Camp would need 1 bottle every other day to be adequate for the four men with bad eyes. (last night)

Feb 5 - Completed refund of food order money to rooms, except money (change) claimed to have been refunded to me by Capt. Schutte several months ago. Capt. Schutte stated last night that he would refund balance due "rooms" in a few days.

Feb 10 - Japanese told us on the day the <sup>600</sup> escaped that they had been shot. - We have learned through a burial detail that they are at Bibabid waiting trial. - About Jan 27 Isamita told us that they had received a book on International law governing prisoners according to Entente, and mentioned they they may therefore be very strict, just a laugh. - Army and Navy Transports are being held. - Dietrich and Edeng on increase again, only American chow men

Jenkins made of blanket material worth \$40 received for about 80% of the men. - Christmas eve some liquor came into camp, and there was a moderate amount of Christmas spirit.

Dec 31 - Rest day today. - Investigated the theft of meat (carabao and fish) from galley ice box - Received food parcels from Canadian Red Cross. Men very happy - Some trading going on.

Jan 1 - Prisoner thinks today - Detailed to work digging on road at the field. - Rumors that we will soon stop work at the field and go to Japan.

Jan 2 - Whithen detailed in blacksmith shop on day 5. San San Red Cross (Canadian) Prisoner fed berries on trail when we were marching home.

Jan 3 - Rest & day - men issued shoes. Going back on "GI" food is a little tough. Medical Dept man at field used to

carry dynamite. Canned butter at market is about \$8.00 per pound. Lt. Holdridge and I visited grave of Cpt. Miller - Grave located on East side road passing magazine - Opposite 100 ft from road and to right of line passing through Concourse Water tower and Cavite tower.

Jan 12 - Two ladies brought something to offer today for prisoners - Mrs. Horton also brought something - Both ~~poorly~~ parties were not allowed to leave their gifts.

Jan 13 - Capt. Lee over yesterday. - Dr. TAKADA who has been a great friend of the camp has left for the front - No appreciate his efforts very much and will feel his loss.

Investigated theft of property last evening. Found empty pants in tree this morning.

Thought the other day of the time when we would all four sit down together at the same table.

Jan 14 - Mr. Salm whipped today by the W.M.C. Noticed

tonight that I could not focus on book.

Jan 15 - Chalked my eye on moon night before last to & clear. - Scrubbed my teeth yesterday morning, after that found dead lizard in bottle. - Yesterday a man faint in column of way home, after being revived, the W.M.C. made him hurry to get back to his place in ranks.

98 Dec 8 - Holiday today - Mr. Fuzikawa boxed my jaws yesterday because Maj. Brocc went out the back gate. Paid P1.40 for one can of Condensed milk. - Rec'd one can of Tomato juice on Father's birth.

Dec 9 - Rogrot giving data on Father's birth.

Dec 13 - We were required to deposit all but P20<sup>00</sup> of our pay. - Men with dysentery only were given only 1/2 canteen cup of soup this morn and evening.

Dec 16 - Reduced diet of men continued after quantity increased. Lt. Kepke told me that Capt. Pay was one of the few good officers on the front. Pay was out in laboring - Men were bitching about PM last order - Switched to officers. Anti-best Officers were those promoted from Sgt. I went out, and stopped at urinal - "Schmid is no officer" - Horrified officer before surrender - "He is a god damn civilian. He is a German". #1227 - 166K

Dec 17 - Garlic came in on order P3.75 per pound (P75.00 per 2 kilo) Japanese doctors are very much interested in cases of malnutrition. One man told that he could have anything he wanted to eat, all he could think of was pork and beans and French potatoes.

Dec 20 - Slapped today by "Pistol Pete" - Japanese wanted 13 cases in AM - 7PM - I wanted men to get it in AM - 9AM, but they wanted them now. We had our first meal tonight of Red Cross food. Enjoyed much by everyone. Maj. Brocc went out to talk today. Told Japanese that men needed good food and shoes. The Wolf made some remark about dumb Americans leaving shoes in ground field - True, but shoes not so very much worn out. A few mornings ago "they" told they major that men here who are getting sick - They do not realize that it takes more than a doctor to make the man well. - The men need shiny food, and stomach badly.

Dec 29 - Had lunch today with only Red Cross food. First meal without rice in a long time (May be 6 months) - Our Christmas was enjoyed very much by everyone. We came "home" early (left field at 3 PM) - Were "tested" for dysentery - Then Red Cross food boxes were issued. Hats and

Oct. 23 - Onions 80¢ each - Garlic 15¢ each  
Man came in office - Saw sign about hours 6:00 to 2000 PM closed, but didn't

know whether "I was that way."

Oct 28 - Imoto left today for Singapore. We waved hats as plane went by.

Oct 29 - Mrs. Bette Norton 519 Bakato St., sent some clothes, meg, and cards to the prison

Nov 3 - Holiday - First Emperor's birthday -

The Japanese put up Black-out boards a few days ago. Spectral formation in evening - Orders given to obey

Song Ju's orders during Black-outs. They also stated that Japan was under black-out.

Manile paper had account of bombing of Hong Kong. Seatty stated that Cebu had been bombed.

Roosevelts speech reported as containing "Starving, beaten, and even murdering" - "bridey of reconni

has arrived".

Nov 28 - Dr. here today - 140 men on sick list.

(Total in camp - 441). Said Dr. said American prisoners are being taken to formosa. - We read in newspaper that Gen. Wright was there. He also stated that we might be paid next pay day. - We signed receipts on Nov. 10<sup>th</sup> that we had received pay for two months of Aug., Sept., and October - One totaled P367.50 - the other P187.50.

Thanksgiving Dinner - Sardines and rice fried.

Dec 3 - Yesterday two receipts for pay were returned by Hippocrate to "Medico's". They had been torn in pieces and were pasted together. Sgt. Teller had one-half of Capt. Schutte's receipt pasted to his signature, and Sgt. Richardson's had 1/2 of Sgt. Teller's. The Hippocrate gave us 6 blank receipts to sign. The Sgts signed, but the officers have not.

Dec 4 - The officers sign blank receipts this AM.

Dec 6 - Pay day - Yesterday - P250<sup>00</sup> for 4 months. P122.50 per month less P60<sup>00</sup> per month for rent and subsistence.

We must deposit (as yet unknown sum) with the Hip Court.

100 men and officers exchanged today.
