2. Special press release from the Public Relations Officer, AFWESTPAC, dated 1 February 1946, stated that no applications for recognition of Guerrilla Units will be accepted by this headquarters after 15 March 1946. This press release received wide circulation through newspapers and was broadcast over local radio stations.

3. Your request for recognition of Aparri-Buguey Force was received at this headquarters 14 May 1946, and does not meet deadline referred to above.

4. It is considered generally that all concerned had ample opportunity to prepare applications for recognition prior to 15 March 1946. For these reasons the request submitted by you will receive no further consideration by this Headquarters and is returned herewith.

1. Request that the undersigned be informed whether the members of the organization whose history is herein attached be credited for the services they have rendered during the enemy occupation of the Philippines.

2. The undersigned was confronted to make this communication because the families and relatives of those who were killed by the enemy while they were hiding and aiding the American Pilots, and in other encounters with the enemy, have been asking information regarding their status.

3. It is therefore prayed that the personnel of the members of the Aparri-Baguey Force be credited for the services they have rendered from the date of their joining until they joined other recognized units or up to any other date the office the Commanding General sees just. Could there be a greater show of self-abnegation and heroic devotion to duty than the facts stated in the attached history and the daring and awe-inspiring rescue of the two pilots, who if still alive will certainly not fail to appreciate the services of the boys who laboured and suffered with them?

HISTORY OF THE APARRI-BUGUEY FORCE

(By Capt. LUIS D. VILLON)

The Aparri-Buguey Force was organized after years of untold sacrifices by a peace-loving people and having been forced to raise a voice of protest against the atrocities committed against them by an enemy who indulges in wanton vandalism, they have come to stake all for the sake of democratic way of life for which they have been used for so long. I was a paroled prisoner of war from Bongabong, Nueva Ecija in 1944. I noticed that the people were ready to organize themselves if only they could get a leader, and having been won to their side, and a means to avoid further reporting to the Japanese garrison at Aparri, I fled to the mountains on April 2, 1944 and henceforth recruiting for the Aparri-Buguey Force was started with Sgts. Tariga, assigned on April 2, 1944 with temporary rank of 2nd Lieut., as Commanding Officer of the Buguey sector embracing the Pattao-Naguilian defenses; Malana, assigned on April 2, 1944 with temporary rank of 2nd Lieut., as Commanding Officer of the Gonzaga sector embracing the Gonzaga-Bulos sector; Gomer, assigned on April 2, 1944 with temporary rank of 2nd Lieut., as Commanding Officer of the Aparri-Calemanigan sector; Coloma, assigned on May 11, 1944 with temporary rank of 2nd Lieut., embracing the Lallo-Palo sector. Each sector commanders have 25 under Colonel Adduru and some Bataan Defenders.

I could not cling to any authority for having organized this company save the fact that I was formerly ordered by Col. Adduru to recruit all ex-service men ex-trainees and ROTC along the coastal towns of Cagayan and also the order from Col. Moses that I was to furnish him names of all ex-USARFFs for the regiment he was authorized to organize and induct as per order from Hq., SWPA in February 1943. Knowing that Col. Adduru was still in the hand of the enemy at the time, and that I knew definitely that Col. Moses was captured, I then went on the organization in as much as there was no one who was willing to do it in that section of the country where there were thousands of enemies scattered. Sometime in late 1944, thru a certain S-2 Agent of the 11th Inf. I sent our roster of troops to the Hq. of the 11th Inf., but it was sent back to me with the information that it could not be done or be given recognition in view of the fact that it was organized and bivouac in enemy occupied territory.

In a few weeks our company was having a strength of 90 EM and 6 officers. The respective platoon leaders or sector commanders were authorized to recruit more deserving men for their units and in addition as primary mission of their unit they were required to gather information about the enemy positions, and make sketches for their gun emplacements, and that in October 1944 these reports were later on sent to the S-2 Agent of the 11th Inf. In the early part of 1945, I was again requested to furnish a certain S-2 Agent ZIP (coded name) and later Miss Vilora, S-2 Agent of the 11th Inf., was also furnished sketches of the defense position in Naguilian, Palo and Pattao, locally known as the Yamashita line commanded by Col. Orisano. My men also had occasions to burn a Bodega filled with food stuffs in Naguilina and they also cut telephone lines to work in enemy defense projects and who have escaped after they have done this nice job.

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When the bombing of the coastal towns became intense, I decided to move out of the place. Before we left our job in the early part of January 1945 was to be on the alert and be ready to lend a helping hand to any American pilot that may be forced down in our sector. In January 1945, my men have found themselves faced with a real test to the honesty of their pledge and a trial to their diligence and dauntless guts, when Lt. Paul Foster and another flyer in the same month were forced down amidst enemy defense lines. To the faint-hearted and doubting Thomases, the situation was hopeless, but to men whose lives and services were wholly dedicated to humanitarian work, and who could derive joy from supreme sacrifices and glory of martyrdom, Lt. Foster was saved and hence forth became a greater hero and a seasoned fighter for the glory of the world. If Lt. Foster was still alive, US AIR Corp he could bear witness of these facts and I am sure that he will not fail to appreciate the good work of the boys who labored and suffered with him. Lt. Foster was sent to the Hq. US Army Luzon Area Command sometime in March 1945. I personally met him with some of my boys who were all the time with him, but whose patriotism seemed questionable to some people because they did not recognized their services while they were still in the enemy occupied territory yet they benefitted out of the informations given them by the men in the enemy occupied territory. The presence of these organizations in the midst of the enemy fortified lines was a revival of the Adduru spirit soaring on high inspite of discouraging circumstances, because they were fed with glory of success. These men were the ones who labored hard with then Governor Adduru of Cagayan in the jungles of North Luzon, a men who did not even for a moment admit the conquest of his country-men because he knew that they were having full faith and confidence in the eventual victory of the United States of America in the greatest human struggle the world has ever known. Hence the organization of the Apariti-Buguey Force was just a continuation of the protest of the then Governor of Cagayan who preferred indignities done to a prisoner than to be the Governor of his people under the control of the enemy.

To show these men that we were as patriotic as any body, we crossed enemy lines and went to join some units that were already organized by the 11th Inf. at Tuso, Cagayan. We were assigned to different unit, all my men no matter whether they were former Bataman defenders or Adduru followers were all made privates although they were none commissioned officers. Hence forth we were with those who doubted us and fought as valiantly if not even better than some of them.

But before we crossed the river, we have managed to salvages some flat-bottom boats and these were used in evacuating some 5 to 7 thousand men, women and children. This was a very real risk both from the enemy and our own air force that were ordered to fire at anything moving in the Cagayan River and Highway No. 5 in Cagayan. Having been taught by experience and our great leader, Col. Adduru, to have faith in the mercy of the great Divine, we went on... come what may as our watch-word.

The men composing the above mentioned units have been the same men that have been with USA officers and men such as Cols. Moses, Nobles, Majors Praeger, Jones, Cpts. Nidham, Minton, Lts. Harris, Ellette, Camp and many others whose names I could no longer recall.

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This is the real History of the Aparri-Buguey Force, a revival of the Cagayan-Apayao-Guerrilla Force under the supreme command of Col. Adduru. Its places of operation at the time of organization was right in the heart of enemy defense lines and that many of its members were ordered to volunteer to work in the enemy projects and this accounts for the fact that there were no hardships for Intelligence Officers gathering informations because they went right in the spot they were sent to.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. Rescued: 2 American Pilots
 - a. 1st Lieut. John W. Henry
 - b. 2nd Lieut. Paul Foster, both Air Corps US
39th Fighter's Squadron, 35th Fighters' Group.
2. Stolen two radio sets of the enemy killing all six Japs guards thereat, which for a time adversely affected radio communications of the enemy in August 1944.
3. Burned 8 Bodegas or warehouses filled with Japs food-stuffs at Pattao, Buguey; Naguilian, Lallo; Macucane, Buguey, Cagayan in 1944.
4. Buguey centre Garrison was burned in August 1944 resulting in the loss of thousands of rounds of ammos and the deaths of several Japs soldiers. This garrison was having a strength of 250 Japs.
5. Ambushed a Jap patrol of 50 killing, 24 of them and captured 1 Jap machine gun, 1 Jap Tommy, 8 Enfields rifles, 12 Japs rifles with hundreds of ammos. These arms were later confiscated by the Pangasinan Regiment that went with the Americans in Buguey in 1945. Our men were armed with grenades, 11 enfields fiffles, six shot-guns, a Jap machine gun and one BAR. Our patrol was composed of 22 officer and men. Loss 2 in this encounter.
6. Help evacuate 5 to 7 thousand civilians from Aparri and Buguey across the Cagayan River in February 1945.

It is fervently prayed that these units operating under the principles of the former Adduru-Fraeger Force be recognized and that the personnel be credited for the services they have rendered from the date of their joining.
