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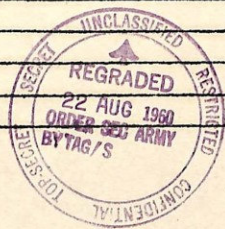

Dear Mr. Rischermoso:

The Commanding General directs that you be informed that final consideration has been given to the claim for guerrilla recognition of your organization, Secret Medical, an element of the overall command of Marking's Fil-American Troops (MFAT).

Subsequent to a protracted study of the records of this overall command, it was determined that any favorable consideration, either in full or in part, of claims for recognition of units under the direct control of the MFAT would be accorded in the form of a composite roster.

On 2 October 1947, Mr. Marking V. Agustin, the overall commander of MFAT, submitted a composite roster to this headquarters for approval. With the exception of fifty-five (55) necessary deletions by this headquarters plus the correction by the I Corps Commander of one hundred one (101) officer grades improperly listed on the II Corps and GHO quota, the roster as submitted by Mr. Agustin has been approved in its entirety. Your unit, as a subordinate element of MFAT under its direct control, was given just and adequate consideration during the preparation of this composite roster. The degree of favorable consideration taken by this headquarters on the request for recognition of your unit may be determined by the number of names of personnel from your unit appearing on this composite roster. Unfavorable consideration of your unit request for recognition will be evidenced by the exclusion of your personnel from this composite roster.

The approval by this headquarters of this composite roster, representing all units under the direct control of MFAT, constitutes the final and conclusive action upon the claim for recognition of all units considered for the purpose of study of this composite roster. All queries relative to the above action and/or incidents to guerrilla recognition matters concerning your unit should be referred to your overall commanding officer, Mr. Marking V. Agustin. Recognition of the recognition status of the unit as determined by the section Mr. Tinoteo Rischermoso Commanding Officer, Secret Medical, Philippines. 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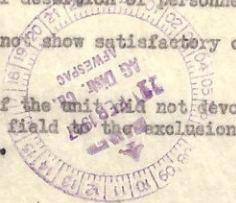

Dear Mr. Ricohermoso:

The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the "Marking's Fil-American Secret Medical Organization," purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.
- b. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
- c. A definite organization was not established.
- d. Adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions, and necessary related information).
- e. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its leaders, because of desertion of personnel to join other units.
- f. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.
- g. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations.

Report on "The Marking Fil-American Secret
Medical Organization

1. Lt Richard R. Roth proceeded to Angono, Rizal, on 23 December 1946, to contact the Marking Fil-American Secret Medical Organization.

2. ALLEGED HISTORY: (See attached unit file)

3. FINDINGS:

a. The following persons were interviewed and their statements are reflected in the findings:

b. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence. The unit was not organized or maintained in a military manner. There are no original rosters or other organizational records to substantiate their claims to have engaged in intelligence work or to have rendered medical aid to active guerrilla units.

c. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its commanding Officer. At one time the unit consisted of over three hundred (300) members. The various branches of the unit were widespread which caused many members to lose contact with the commanding officer and consequently join to other guerrilla forces. It was also learned, upon investigation, that forty three (43) members listed on the roster have previously been recognized in a Medical and Service Co. of the 1st Yag

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Regiment, Marking's Fil-American.

d. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations. Many of the members are physicians and trained nurses who maintained their offices and continued their private practice as well as rendering service to the guerrillas.

e. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization, because neither the unit commanding officer nor any of the members can produce any conclusive proof of accomplishments during the occupation.

f. Col Marking Agustin has given this unit a very favorable recommendation. It is well to note, however, that the commanding officer of this unit is at present a member of congress of the Republic of The Philippines.

g. It is difficult to determine if the forty three (43) members previously recognized constitutes all of the deserving members of this organization. However, since there are no papers ^{nor} documents supporting any further claim, there is no basis upon which to recommend favorable consideration of any additional members.

4. POLITICAL ASPECTS: This unit, with the exception of the commanding officer, does not appear to have any political affiliations or aspirations.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS: It is recommended that, with the exception of those members previously recognized, The Marking Fil-American Secret Medical Organization be not favorably considered for recognition.

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H I S T O R Y

The Marking's Secret Medical Detachment saw the first life of day, on 1st October 1942. It was organized by the undersigned then hidden under the fictitious name Colonel Avocado, who acted upon a special order of the Commanding Officer of the Marking's Guerrillas. The Marking's Secret Medical Detachment was an outright protest against the invasion of the Islands by the Japanese and a manifestation of the loyalty of this detachment to the United States of America and to the Commonwealth of the Philippines.

After receiving the special order, the undersigned tried to contact his Commanding Officer, General MARKING, in the barrio of Tayuman where the later and his Staff were studying the feasibility of organizing a Medical Corps for the Marking's Guerrillas, the purpose of which was to take care of the sick Markings Guerrilleros contacting different kinds of diseases in their mountain hide-outs, ranging from skin diseases to malaria. Hardest hit by said jungle disease was the barrio of Talbac, Antipolo, Rizal where the First Cry of General Marking was held.

"Charity begins at home", so runs an old but never hackneyed adage. Faithful to this proverb, the undersigned before trying to sell to outsider, the advantage of joining the Marking Secret Medical Detachment, first sold it to his immediate household by enlisting lady Avocado, Mistress of the undersigned, as Chief Nurse, and his children Alfonso 14 years, as file clerk, Glicerio, 12 years as G-2, Lourdes 15 years, as First Aider, and his brother Dr. Domingo Ricohermoso, as Dental Surgeon and Medical Supply Officer, while his nephews Alfredo Ricohermoso, 15 years and Manuel Roldan, 9 years as G-2 and Runner respectively, of the Marking's Secret Medical Detachment. After giving these first members of the organization full instructions regarding their respective duties, the undersigned administered to them the Oath of Allegiance to the United States of America, and enjoined obedience to the Laws of the Commonwealth of the Philippines.

Next to join this patriotic, the perilous movement, were Doctors Atilano Salvo, and Juanito Palomares, resident physicians of St. Clement Emergency Hospital, owned and operated by Col. Avocado (Dr. Timoteo P. Ricohermoso) both of whom unhesitatingly took their Oath of Allegiance before the undersigned after learning the aims of the Markings Secret Medical Detachment.

Then followed the delicate task of propagating, far and wide, the principle that give birth to the M.S.M.D., principles which taken together, spelled the mastering of all efforts and resources to enable us to administer the death blow to Japanese Imperialism and the preservation of our faith to America and its democratic tenets. With utmost care and secrecy, the undersigned trekked to the neighboring towns. First to be touched was Taytay, where the undersigned met Dr. Rogel Rufino and Messrs. Pablo Esguerra and M. Crisostomo Jr. both Medical students, who accepted the duties of ministering to and care of sick Markings Guerrilleros in their own locality. Then Cainta, where Capt. Crispolo Fernandez and Miss Illuminada Cruz, an Ex-USAFBE nurse, made responsible campaign in the town as well as in the neighboring barrios. In the town of Pasig, capital of Rizal, the undersigned contacted his intimate friend, in the person of At-

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torney Benidicto Espiritu and Dr. Romualdo Del Rosario an Ex USAFFE medical officer, who after having been appraised of the aims of M.S.M.D., pledged support and defense of the patriotic movement. Mr. Ben Espiritu was inducted Judge Advocate of this secret Medical Organization and from then on become a trusted and faithful helper of the undersigned in the recruiting of members and supporters of the Secret Organization. Mr. Ben Espiritu and Dr. Romualdo del Rosario took charge of the activities in their own localities. In Antipolo the undersigned and his brother, Dr. Domingo Ricohermoso, recruited Dr. Abelardo Liwanag as Medical Officer Organizer in said place. Then we invaded the City of Manila and here, Dr. Rizal P. Sotto, Ex USAFFE medical officer, was made incharge of the District of Paco, Miss Bienvenida Salvo headed the Philippine General Hospital, and Drs. Jose Suba and Romeo Montes took care of Sta. Cruz and Quiapo Districts. The fate of the M.S.M.D. in the districts of Intramuros and Ermita where intrusted to the able hand of Dr. Atilano Salvo while in Malabon, not to be outshipped, was lead Dr. Conrado Gutierrez. In Mandaluyong District, where Dr. Jose Cosca, Jr. Bernardo Rivera and Dr. Manuel V. Olympia Jr., Ex-USAFFE Medical Officer equally expert in their own lines was made responsible for the supervision of this Secret Medical Organization and took charge of the Medical and Food supplies for all Guerrilleros in the whole City of Manila. With the financial as well as moral backing of Lt. Col. Ricardo Nepumoceno, then Commissioner of Securities and exchange and Judge Advocate at-large of the whole Marking's Outfit, Secret Medical Detachment achieved success. The activities of this Detachment was not confined to mere treatment of the sick and wounded. Although strictly speaking, it was assigned to the Medical care of the Markings Guerrilleros, yet in all possible ways, it tried to be useful to the Markings Outfit. An instance of all the embracing activities of this detachment, may be cited when it took part in the transfer of firearms and ammunitions by the Pasig Constabulary was cooperating with the Marking's Guerrillas in 1943. It took place in Angono, during the Japanese administration, in order to conceal the fact that the Pasig Constabulary was cooperating with the Marking's Guerrillas. The Secret Medical Detachment thru the direction of Lt. Col. Ricardo Nepumoceno, conceived of a ruse. As agreed upon, between Commander L. Javalera of the Rizal Constabulary and the Secret Medical Detachment thru the suggestion of Lt. Col. Ricardo Nepumoceno the Constabulary men who were supposed to be on patrol at Angono, Rizal, would be attacked. The constabulary soldiers would supposedly offered resistance but would be over-powered and disarmed after having been hog-tied.

Consequently, one dark evening shootings were heard in the hills of Angono. Later on, two scared intelligence members (1st Lt. Lucas M. Lalo Ex Usaffe) and Glicerio Ricohermoso arrived at Tayuman, a nearby Japanese Garrison, and reported that guerillas raided Angono and killed the Constabulary patrol. When the Japanese investigated the cause of the affray, they found a constabulary soldier tied and ammunitions were carried by the Guerrilleros. After the necessary investigation by the Japs, the constabulary soldiers escaped punishment and the Marking's Guerrillas added war booty of additional arms and ammunition which were turned over to Major Constantino Absalon and 1st Lt. Maximo Santos both killed by Japs in the same year. Several times, the M.S.M.D. was on the verge of discovery by the Japanese. One day the bodyguard of said Lt. Maximo Santos dared to pass near the hills of Angono. He was spied by the Japs and was shot and killed. The victim was found to be wearing the trouser and jacket bearing the name of the undersigned, and carrying a cigarette case with the latter's initial. When the foregoing articles were given to the victim he was supposedly told to removed the name of the undersigned. Apparently the deceased did not exercise the necessary care and as such imperiled the life of his benefactor. The undersigned escaped suspicion of the Japs in connection with the preceding incident when he, with the help of

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the Commander Javalera and Governor Milina of Rizal reported to the Japanese Military Police that three days before the foregoing incidents, his house was robbed by unknown person, and among the loot where the trouser, jacket, cigarette case and some cash belonging to the undersigned.

The house of Lt. Col. Nepumoceno situated in a concealed place behind the house of the undersigned at Angono, Rizal, was made the hospital for Marking's Guerrillas by the Secret Medical Detachment in May, 1944. In June this hospital was filled with sick Guerrilleros from the mountains of Antipolo and Taytay, one day however we rushed the evacuation from this hospital because of a tip from the Intelligence operative of this organization that the hospital would be raided by the Japs. The rumored raid was done the following day, but to the extreme dismay of the enemies, they found an empty house. Insulted by the incident, perhaps, the Japanese soldiers burned the isolated house and thus was the residence of staunch guerrilla reduced to ashes.

On June 2nd 1944, Col. Yay of the Marking's Guerrillas called on all high ranking Officers of the Secret Medical Detachment to attend the celebration of her birthday and at the same time to treat two Japanese prisoners of war, who were sick with malaria at Lagunda, Mt. Morong, Rizal. Not long after this event, Lagunda was attacked, the Japs killing many Guerrilleros. During the commotion caused by the attack, the Japanese POW escaped. Henceforth, the Secret Medical Detachment and everyone present in the birthday party, were placed on the wanted list of the enemies. This led to zonification of Morong, Rizal.

While Morong was being zonified, Gen. Marking called the undersigned to treat Col. Yay, who was then seriously ill with malaria and concomitant heart failure. Col. Avocado, (Dr. Ricohermoso) and Lt. Col. Sugar, (Dr. Alfonso) answered the call ignoring imminent capture by the Japs. Luckily, however, they escaped the imminent danger of zonification.

Then Gen. Marking received medicine, medical supplies, and instruments from an American submarine at Infanta, Tayabas, the M.S.M.D. was summoned to the Hq. at Macatog, Tanay, Rizal. At this juncture Gen. Marking gave the undersigned secret orders to keep his staff and assistant on the alert about the imminence of the forthcoming raids by the Liberation Forces, enjoining us for the rescue of American Pilot from molest by the Japs. After identifying and receiving some medicines, medical supplies and instruments, plus some Mc-Arthur cigarettes in which the statements, "I SHALL RETURN" were printed, we returned to the town of Tanay after a long hiking in the mountains without food. On their way back they were captured by Saccalistas (Filipino Pro-Japs). Because they were dressed like laborers and carried mountain orchids hanging on long bamboo poles on their shoulders, we evaded suspicion. The undersigned told them that they gathered the orchids to be sold or traded. The medicines, medical supplies and Mc-Arthur's cigarettes and leaflets were carefully concealed in the bamboo poles. Then the S.M.D. opened the Marking's Hospital for Guerrillas at Mt. Buhangin, Teresa, Rizal by order of Col. YAY. At this hospital the family of Brigadier-Gen. Carlos Romulo was intended to be housed preparatory to their transferred to their province, Laguna. Gen. Marking and Col. Yay entrusted the undersigned and his Mistress, and daughter to be the only selected custodian of said Brigadier-Gen. Carlos Romulo's family. By this time however, killing of civilian in Laguna by the Japs, was rampant and the proposed transfer was not carried out. Meanwhile the secret Medical Detachment received a report from Lt. Alfredo Ricohermoso and Major Olympia, Jr. Ex USAFFE Intelligence Operative then working in Manila, that this hospital at Buhangin was with the YAMASHITA line. Hence, the undersigned moved the hospital outside the line.

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On February 16, 1945, the undersigned and his Staff moved to Pinagbuhatan, Pasig, Rizal, preparatory to the occupation of Pasig by the Markings Fil-American Troops. By this time, the Americans were on the hills of Pineda, in Bagong Ilog, on the otherside of the Pasig and Marikina rivers. The undersigned contacted Major Espiritu and Major Romaldo del Rosario Ex-Usaffe Medical Officer, ordering them to attend a secret meeting to discuss the necessary plans for the occupation of the said capital. The Americans on the opposite bank of the river were duly informed by our Intelligence operatives of the exact position of the enemies. Continues shelling of the enemies position were done with heavy losses on the part of the Japs until finally they left Pasig on the night of 18 February 1945, for the hills of Antipolo and its immediate environs. On the morning of 19 February 1945, the undersigned and his family entered Pasig, Capt. Julian de Guzman of the Markings Fil-American Troops and his men, received the order from the undersigned to hoist the American Flag, on the tower of the house of Don Fortunato Concepcion at the Plaza Rizal, indicating to the American Forces in the otherside of the rivers, the entrance and occupation of the Marking's Fil-American Troops, in said capital. The undersigned immediately received the order from his Commanding Officer Gen. Marking thru Col. Jose Oliveros, designating the undersigned as Military Governor of Rizal Province. After a survey of the town Major Espiritu and the undersigned found out that many inhabitants suffering from different ailments specially malnutrition, (WAR FAMINE) was rampant among the masses. The undersigned ordered Major Romaldo del Rosario and Capt. Juanita Z. Ricohermoso Chief Nurse, to look for a suitable place for a hospital.

On 24 February 1945, the gates of the Marking's Central Hospital at the house of Lt. Francisco Bulinao Pasig, Rizal was opened to the belligerents wounded soldiers of Marking's Fil-American Troops, including the R.O.T.C., in the encounters with the Japs in Antipolo as well as civilians casualties from stray shells of the enemies were admitted in our hospital. Those serious cases necessitating Major operations were sent to the Psychopathic Emergency Hospital under the care of Major Manuel V. Olympia Jr., our Medical Supply Officer working in the hospital.

As the encounters with the Japs increased its tempo, casualties mounted and we found it necessary to open branches of our hospital in Taytay and Angono then in Binangonan, Cardona, and Morong following the movement of the Markings Guerrilla Troops with the Liberation Forces. On Feb. 26 the undersigned force to contact Maj. Johnson U.S. Medical Commander of the 118th Medics situated at the old Rizal Provincial Hospital, just to inform him the humanitarian endeavours performed by the Marking Secret Medical Organization and at the same time to request from him thru channel the feasibility of securing medicines and instruments as well as food supplies.

Unhesitatingly said Medical Commander willingly offered his services by recommending the undersigned to Lt. Col. Park and Major Johnson of the Quartermaster of the 43rd Division USA, where the undersigned received sufficient supplies for the whole organization. We, ~~maintain~~ ^{move} those hospital up to the middle of April, 1945 when we move to the Guerrilla Camp at Antipolo, Rizal with the 43rd Division US Army. Our patients were turned over to the 118th evacuation hospital of the 43rd Division. All persons of the Marking Fil-American hospitals including the women moved to Antipolo, but in view of the standing rule in the US Army, the women aiders were sent to their respective homes except the registered nurses. Following are the roster personnel of the whole secret Medical Organization.


