Dear Mr. Lucente:

The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the Dambang Unit, Marking's Fil-Americans, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.
- b. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.
- c. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
- d. Adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions, and necessary related information.)
- e. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its Commanding Officer.
- f. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.
- g. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations.

Report on "Bambang Unit, Marking Fil-Americans"

1. Lt Richard R Roth proceeded to Bambang, Tagig, Rizal, on 8 January 1947, to investigate the Bambang Unit, MFA.

2. ALLEGED HISTORY: (See attached unit file)

3. FINDINGS:

a. The following persons were interviewed and their statements are reflected in the findings:

b. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence. The activities of the unit, during the occupation, were passive in nature, and the only engagement with the enemy occurred at Dayap, Laguna when members of this unit were intercepted while carrying supplies to the MFA GHQ. The unit was admittedly poorly armed, and there is no evidence proving their claim to have secured arms abandoned by retreating Philippine Army troops. They claim to have turned these arms in to the 38th Division M. P., but they can not produce any records or receipts to indicate that such a transaction ever took place.

c. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy, because the Miguel Ver Regiment, Hunters-ROTC, a recognized guerrilla organization operating in this area under Lt Col Pedro D Cruz, had dominated the guerrilla activity in this area.

d. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its commanding officer. The commanding officer had under his direct control approximately one platoon of men who were in the hills near the MFA GHQ, in Laguna. The remainder of the members of the unit were left in Bambang, Tagig, Rizal, commanded by Jose Fili, the second in command. The only liaison maintained was by means of runners and this fact confirms the belief of the Investigating Team, that the units right hand did not know what its left hand was doing, because of the distance separating elements of the subject unit.

e. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and service. The unit has no records or other evidence to show any accomplishments during the occupation, or any actions that would indicate any useful purpose of the organization.

f. There is some indication that there may be a very small number of deserving men in this unit. There is, however, no factual evidence to bear out this supposition, and therefore, there is no basis upon which the undersigned could make any recommendations favorable to the unit.

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
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g. No useful purpose will be accomplished by further investigation of this unit. There are no members proven worthy of recognition, and the unit has made no casualty claims.

h. Col Marking Agustin did not make any definite statements concerning this unit or its commander. When questioned as to his knowledge of the unit, his answers were very evasive, thereby indicating that this unit was probably attached to the MFA after the liberation in order to insure and expedite recognition.

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HISTORY OF THE ACTIVITIES
OF THIS UNIT
(Bambang Unit)

In the early days of the year of 1942, in the barrio of Bambang, Taguig, Rizal, not far from the Japanese Army garrison of Fort William McKinley, a group of loyal, sturdy and courageous men in the persons of Gaudencio Luente, Jose Pili, Luciano M. Pili, Francisco P. Sarmiento, and Luciano Manalo had planned underground movements against the Japanese.

These men true to their oath of allegiance to the United States of America and the Commonwealth of the Philippines in spite of the strict vigilance of the Japanese Military Police and spies managed to have secret meetings and discussed plan of recruiting more men for secret army. It took six months to recruit men who were also loyal and faithful to the United States of America and Commonwealth of the Philippines.

79
News were received about forming underground activities by brave men of other places and finally it was decided to establish connections with other secret organizations. At last we succeeded and fused with Marking's Guerillas, under Col. Hugh Straugh, South Central Luzon, Philippines, headed by Marcos V. Agustin thru Major Francisco Adriano (killed in line of duty) of the same organization.

With the fussion, February 7, 1943, Gaudencio Luente was appointed, Technical Sergeant and from that time on he assumed and performed his duties. Every day secret movements and underground activities against the enemy were intensified. Firearms were confiscated from civilians such as pistols and shotguns to avoid danger of falling to the hands of the Japanese or to its spies.

Foods and clothings were procured and furnished to guerillas who were hiding in the mountains. Meanwhile, the beginning of the final offensive of the Allied forces from Austrdia, with powerful armaments and man-power were cabled to us by other fellow guerillas. Every seconds of every minute and every minute of every hour beginning that date decisive victories were scored by the Allied. The time has come and Gen. Doughlas MacArthur is on his way to thePhilippines to fulfill his promise at Bataan "I WILL COME BACK". We were all inspired, inspite of the obstacles we used to encounter on our daily routinary work.

On July 1st 1943, by order of Teofilo Z. Salvador, Chief of Staff, Gen. Hq., T/Sgt. Gaudencio Lucente was promoted as Captain. With continous flow of news about American victories, order was receivedfrom superior officer to form the men in Army formation for training, Captain Lucente, being an ex-scout in the U.S. Army carried the order without delay. By order of Teofilo Z. Salvador, Chief of Staff, Gen. Hq. and approved by Marcos V. Agustin, Commanding Officer, the following ~~affix~~ appointments of commissioned and non-commissioned officers were ~~made~~ made:

These men are the organizers and have done the pioneering activities. With the news about the landing of the American forces in Leyte, intelligence activities and underground movements were intensified and coordination with other guerilla organizations were done for a successful operation against the common enemy. Japanese spies were apprehended and firearms of Constabulary men of the Philippines Puppet Government were taken and given to the guerillas.

On February 17, 1945, in the rice fields not far from the Barrion of Bambang was sighted the advance patrol of the 11th Airborne Division and were met by our men to inform the Americans of the different Japanese garrison in Taguig, Rizal, which resulted in shooting to death one Japanese woman and a Captain of the Japanese Army.

On the afternoon of the same date, the main force of the 11th Airborne Division passed thru Bambang in their drive to Patag or (Mabato Point) the Japanese stronghold. The entire men of our organization joined the Americans and fought side by side with until the Japanese were subdued which lasted for two weeks.

Mopping operations was carried on with the cooperation of other organizations until the whole town was completely liberated from the cruel hands of the Japanese.

That I have a personal knowledge of the existence of a resistance organization otherwise known as the BAMBANG UNIT of the MARKING'S GUERRILLAS in Bambang, Tagig, Rizal under the personal command of Captain Gaudioso Lucente during the Japanese Occupation and also during the Battle for Liberation of the Philippines. That said unit played an important role in protecting the civilians of this locality and in liquidating the Japanese spies and informers which threatened the lives and security of the townpeople during the dark days of the Occupation and during the liberation several of its men had acted as guides to the 11th Airborne Division in their drive to the Mabato Point in this municipality where a strong Japanese force was entrenched.

That I have known of this existence because on one occasion during the occupation the Commanding Officer of this Unit had showed me his credentials of his affiliation with the Marking's Guerrillas when the said officer had commandeered my military pamphlets which I had used in my study while I was a ROTC cadet in the University of the Philippines. That on several occasions during the occupation, I had given them some aids in the form of money and foodstuff.

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

I further sertify that the Bambang Unit, Marking's Guerrillas, side by side with our Unit, took active participations in the battle at Mabato Point with the American Forces to the final subjugation of the Japanese positions and in the Mopping Operations until the Town of Taguig, was completely liberated.

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
