Dear Mr. Santiago:

The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the Anilao Battalion, 2nd Army Corps, WPAF, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.
- b. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.
- c. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
- d. A definite organization was not established.
- e. Adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions and necessary related information).
- f. Rank of members was considered to be too high for the actual size of the command maintained in the field.
- g. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its leaders, because of desertion of personnel to join other units.

h. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.

i. Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their families by means of farming or other civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrilla unit on a part time basis only.

Report on the "Anilao Bn, 2nd Army Corps, Marking's
Fil-American Troops (MFAT)

1. On 10 March 1947, Lt Wilmore K. Brown, proceeded to investigate the records and activities of the Anilao Bn, 2nd Army Corps, MFAT.

2. ALLEGED HISTORY: (See attached unit file)

3. FINDINGS:

a. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.

b. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy. The unit history admits that this organization was strictly passive in nature. This unit is made up of poultry farmers. The unit history states that the main accomplishment of this organization was in the fight to keep the poultry products of the unit members on the commercial market.

c. A definite organization was not established by this unit. (See attached unit history)

d. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its commanding officer, because of the desertion of personnel to join other units. (See attached unit history)

e. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.

f. Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their families by means of farming or other civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrilla unit on a part time basis only.

g. If all the claims put forth by this organization in the attached unit history were proven to be true, this unit would still not have a legitimate claim for recognition.

4. POLITICAL ASPECTS:

This unit does not appear to have any political affiliations or aspirations.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the Anilao Battalion, 2nd Army Corps, MFAT, be not favorably considered for recognition.



I am introducing to you through this letter, Capt ISMAEL P. SEVILLA, the Officer in-charge of the Anilao Battalion(Bulacan), Marking's Fil-Americans.

As previously agreed upon, the Anilao Battalion will be one of those that will be taken into consideration as an independent unit from the Cadre System.

This letter carries with it my personal recommendation for their ultimate recognition.

It is one of the units of the Marking's Fil-Americans that had done much for the Resistance Movement.

During the Japanese occupation according to reports, it had carried out extensive intelligence work, counter-propaganda, and sabotage work against the enemy. As a result of their activities, the Anilao Battalion is one among the first active units of the Marking's Fil-Americans to be listed in the Guerrilla Green Book prepared by Gen.Sutherland about the Resistance Movements in the Philippines.

During the liberation, when I called all units, it was reported to me that this unit was attached to the ECLGA in compliance with the order from the Hq of Gen McArthur and due to loss of contact with our Headquarters, which attachment was later on approved by me. Subsequent reports stated that some 80 Officers and men of this unit were attached to the different U. S. Army units, and helped in the mopping-up operations in Bulacan, Rizal, and Laguna.

"This is our world, and we fought for the freedom to fashion it with our own hands."

I am reiterating once more my recommendation for this unit for their activities during the occupation and the liberation in the resistance movements.

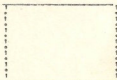

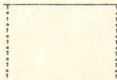

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE "ANILAO BATTALION"
(By Captain Ismael P. Sevilla)

I. ORGANIZATION

During the early days of the Japanese occupation, Mr. Ismael P. Sevilla felt the need of organizing a resistance against the Japanese. So he invited Atty. Juan G. Santiago, Judge Prudencio Perez, Atty. Rogaciano M. Mercado, Dr. Jose G. Santiago and Dr. Artemio B. Serapio to lead in the organization of a guerrilla band. Due to the lack of arms, it was a sort of "passive resistance". So, they were called by the collaborators as "fence-sitters", because they refused to cooperate with the government.

For the purpose of securing arms, they sought for genuine connection with any recognized guerrilla organization. The first connection was with a certain Joaquin J. Tolentino, ECLGA of Manila through Mr. Juan de los Santos, a nephew of the Parish Priest of Sta. Maria. But soon, Atty. Santiago and all other organizers lost confidence in the connection. The next connection was with Lt. Fausto Alberto (Ex-Usaffe), whom Mr. Sevilla and Dr. Santiago met in the barrio of Pulongubat, Guiguinto, Bulacan. Arrangement was made whereby Lt. Alberto would send a contact man to Sta. Maria to help in the organization. But that contact man never came to Sta. Maria.

During the middle part of 1942, Judge Perez learned that his brother, Mr. Cirilo Perez, was connected with a guerrilla organization. So, in September, 1942, Mr. Sevilla and Judge Perez interviewed said Mr. Perez in Manila. He was a ranking and responsible officer in the Marking's Guerrilla under the command of Mr. Marcos Villa Agustin whose territory included Rizal, Cavite, Laguna, Batangas, Tayabas and the City of Manila. Mr. Cirilo Perez took along with him two other contact men, Col Bernardo, Inspector-General and Lt Col Primo Dalton to induct Maj Juan Santiago, Captain Ismael Sevilla, Captain Prudencio Perez, Captain Rogaciano M. Mercado and Captain Artemio Serapio. As tactical adviser, Capt Modesto B. Perez, CE (Ex-Usaffe) was inducted as major.

The Anilao Battalion was, then, formally organized on October 1, 1942 upon the induction of the original organizers.

Recruiting of other officers and enlisted men was immediately started. In order to avoid being detected by the Japanese authorities the 'Key Man' system was

used with 'prudence' as the watchword of everyone. Through this system, everyone would recruit only his confidantials, and these confidantials would, likewise, recruit their confidantials. Each member should not reveal the identity of the other members he knew even to his confidantials. He was supposed to know only the ones he recruited and the one who recruited him. Thus, if one member happened to be under suspicion, it was extremely difficult to trace the others. Then, no induction paper was issued to any member except to officers to prevent any prima-facie evidence from falling into enemy's hands. Even the roster of the unit was not submitted. These were arranged with the contact men of Marking's as a matter of precaution.

II. Activities in 1942

1. Recruiting other officers and enlisted men for the Anilao Battalion- a force of about 500 were recruited.
2. Counter-propaganda through maintaining and getting news from radios with short waves, led by Major Juan Santiago, Capt Sevilla, Capt Serapio, Capt P. Perez, Lt Cirilo Sta. Rosa and Sgt Jaime P Panado. The news were disseminated through confidential friends.
3. Indirectly fighting the Foodstuff Control Association in order that the poultry raisers would not give their eggs for the Japs led by Capt Sevilla, Maj Santiago, Capt Mercado and Capt Serapio.

III. Activities in 1943.

Continuation of the indirect fight against the FCA. The Pasapada, a corporation of poultry-raisers, was organized to go against the FCA in December, 1943. This corporation became also a means to camouflage the meetings of the Staff officers and CO's of the organization.

Continuation of the counter-propaganda through maintaining short-wave radios and disseminating news about actual war situations. News were even typewritten, and copies sent to friends.

Organization of the Balagtas Battalion in Bigaa, and a company in Turo, Bocaue, Bulacan, through the efforts of Capt Sevilla. In December, 1943, the Anilao Bn was made into Anilao Regiment, under the Marking's Guerrilla.

Sometime in December, 1943, Capt Alejo Santos (Ex-Ussaffe) and now Commander of the BMA) went to Captain

Sevilla twice to request for the Anilao Battalion to be attached to the BMA which was then under process of organization. But the request was not approved by the organizers, because it ought to be sanctioned by the highest command of Marking's Guerrilla. The approval was never received because two of the contact men, (Major Cirilo Perez and Lt Col Dalton) were nabbed by the Japs, and since then the Anilao Unit lost contact with the Marking's General Headquarters.

Through various propganda of the BMA people against the Marking's Guerrilla and other organizations in Bulacan, the Balagtas Battalion of Bigas, the one company in Turo, Bocaue, and many of the officers and enlisted men of the Anilao Battalion transferred without authority to the BMA in 1944. Hence, the present force of the Anilao Battalion is less than 300, recognized and waregognized.

IV. Activities in 1944

In October, 1943, the Philippine National Assembly of the Puppet Republic passed an act creating the Food Administration Officer with the Foodstuff Control Association merely under it. With the operation of the FA Office, Capt Sevilla got a chance to come out more openly in fighting the FCA without being suspected by the Japs.

The Philippine Poultry Products and Poultry Supplies Procurement and Distribution Agency, Inc.(PASPADA) was registered in December, 1943. (The idea was hinted by Capt Manuel Galvez, Ex-Usaaffe).

Operation started on January 31, 1944, and continued until the later part of the year. The corporation was not able to carry out all its objectives because of so many unfavorable circumstances. However, inspite of working against so many odds, inspite of the various propganda of the Japanese puppet officials in the FCA Office in Sta. Maria, The PASPADA succeeded in one thing -the FCA never got control of all the poultry products in Sta. Maria and in Manila. All what they were able to control were around 2,000 eggs weekly which were exchanged with poultry feeds. All the rest of the more than 50,000 eggs produced weekly in Sta. Maria. All the rest of the more than 50,000 eggs produced weekly in Santa Maria were allowed to be marketed freely in Manila. Hence, the confiscation of eggs by the FCA agents in Manila and Sta. Maria was definitely stopped. This was due to the operation of the PASPADA which applied for the control

off egg business in Manila. The FCA also applied for that control. But the FA Office decided that neither of the two should get the control.

The manager who shouldered the greater part of the task, as well as the other officers of the corporation did not receive any compensation. Instead, they either spent or reimbursed their own money for the operation of the corporation.

Continuation of the counter-propaganda through maintaining radios with short wave bands.

Intelligence work- observation of the enemy positions and movements, and ammunition dumps and storage of supplies.

Sabotage- Planting of nails on the roads to blow-out the tires of the Japanese trucks.

Removal of Jap replacement machine gun barrel.

Hiding of one American aviator by Elino Eugenio (Pfc). Later on that day, this aviator was grabbed by the BMA men with arms.

These activities were directed by the tactical adviser, Major Modesto B. Perez, now a Lt Col.

Sometime in the later part of the year, an order was received from Gen MacArthur through the short wave radio broadcast that all guerrillas should report to the nearest commanding officer appointed by him in the place. In view of this, Maj Perez and Capt Serapio interviewed Major Edwin P. Ramsey, the commanding officer of the ECLGA, the nearest recognized guerrilla unit. On November 28, 1944, the Anilao Bn was, therefore attached to and made a part of the ECLGA under the Mt Corps Regiment. On December 23, 1944, the Anilao Bn was transferred and attached to the Bulacan Military District, East Central Luzon Guerrilla Area (ECLGA), and temporarily.

V. Activities in 1945

1. Continuation of the counter-propaganda- Maj Santiago has been maintaining the only radio with short wave in the locality, because there was no more electric current.
2. Intelligence work was continued.
3. Sabotage work was continued.
4. Attachment with the 112th Cavalry, U.S. Army through the 3rd Bn., Mt. Corps in San Jose del Monte on March 10, 1945. At present some 80 or more officers and enlisted men of the Anilao Bn have attached themselves to different U.S. Army units and helped in the mopping-up operation in the mountains of Bulacan, Rizal and Laguna.

VI- Handicaps of the Anilao Battalion

1. Lack of Arms

Since the start of the organization of the Anilao Bn, the organizers were not able to get any arm, inspite of their earnest desire and effort to secure any. Neither the Commander of the Marking's Guerrilla or of the East Central Luzon Guerrilla Area (ECLGA) was able to furnish arms to the Anilao Battalion. Even spies could not be nabbed by the trigger squad of the Battalion.

2. Two of the three contact men with Marking's were nabbed by the Japs in January, 1944- Maj Cirilo Perez and Lt Col Primo Dalton. Since then, the Anilao Battalion had lost contact with the General Headquarters of the Marking's Guerrilla. However, Col Bernardo sent words that he was coming up to put up his Division Intelligence Headquarters in Sta. Maria, but he never came also. All means were resorted to contact Marking's but all of no avail. Finally, upon receipt of the order from General McArthur, attachment with the ECLGA was resorted to.

3. Majority of the organizers- Major Santiago, Captain Sevilla, Captain Mercado and Major Modesto Perez were wanted by the Japanese and the Yoins (UN's). The first ones who were wanted early in 1944 were Major Juan Santiago, Capt Sevilla and Captain Mercado, two of them were taken to the garrisons, Major Santiago three times to the Angat Garrison and Captain Mercado to the Hq, Central Luzon Intelligence Corps at San Ildefonso and Tabacalera, San Fernando, Pampanga. Later on, in the year and up to the arrival of the American Liberation Forces, Captain Serapio, Maj Perez, Lt Ireneo Clemente, and Lt Cirilo Sta. Rosa were wanted by the Yoins (UN's).

Fortunately, the Japanese and the UN's were not able to get any clear evidence against these group. The system of organization worked out very effectively. Utmost prudence was exercised by everyone in the organization.

The ANILAO BATTALION can boast of a clean record during the less than three(3) years of its operation. It has not got even a single centavo or a single grain of rice from anybody else. No confiscation of anything else, particularly food supplies, from any Filipino has been undertaken by any member of the Battalion. All expenses and supplies which everyone in the operative and the field used were borne by the one concerned. In other words, the members bore all the sacrifices to the extent of what they could, and under the limited circumstances within the disposition.
