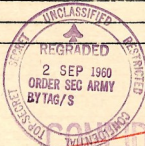

Dear Mr. de Raya,

The "Magallanes Volunteers", purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all available substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.
- b. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
- c. A definite organization was not established.
- d. Adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions, and necessary related information).
- e. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.
- f. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations.
- g. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.

It is requested that you comply with the provisions of Executive Order No. 68, by the President of the Philippines, dated 26 September 1945, copy attached.

Lt. Col. H. L. Shaftoe:

1. The "Magallanes Volunteers" consisting of 360 officers and enlisted men under the command of Mariano de Raya, has not been favorably considered for recognition. Approximately twenty (20) men have already been recognized.

2. Basis for non-recognition:

a. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.

b. The roster presented is actually a collection of smaller units, which combined since the liberation to create a more advantageous T.O.

c. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations.

d. Command of the unit changed hands, men of the unit have been recognized in other units and it appears that only the home guards are now asking for recognition.

e. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.

3. Col. Marcos Agustin, CO, MFA, recommends that this unit be thoroughly screened.

REPORT ON "MAGALLANES VOLUNTEERS"

In accordance with verbal instructions from Chief of Section, Guerrilla Affairs, G-3, AFWESPAC, Lieutenants Rollie Allen and George Bond proceeded to Magallanes to contact the "Magallanes Volunteers" in order to determine whether or not this organization should be recognized by the United States Army. The following report is a summary of the investigation and basis for the recommendation.

H I S T O R Y

The Magallanes Volunteers was organized on 1 January 1943, by Basilio Hernandez, in the town of Magallanes under his own control. When first organized there were 150 men which grew to 360 men in 1945. Shortly after their organization, they were incorporated with the Erne Cavite Guerrilla, now the 4th Army Corps, Marking's Fil-Americans.

This organization originally consisted of two infantry companies. But roster submitted by members of the 4th Army Corps Staff shows them to be service companies. Both of the company commanders deny ever being service companies. The two companies are Co. A, under Mariano de Raya, and Co. B, under Maximo Linantud. Basilio Hernandez, originally the founder, did not live around Magallanes so de Raya took over shortly after the founding, and now claims to be the commanding officer. The commander of the 4th Corps now recognizes de Raya as the commanding officer of the unit. He now serves as one of the company commanders as well as the unit commander.

The primary activity of this organization was gathering intelligence from the immediate section of Magallanes. Transportation being almost impossible and no communication lines existing, very few reports were ever sent to a higher headquarters. Several were sent by runner, however, to 4th Corps Headquarters in Tanza where they were relayed to Major Vanderpool for transmission. The activities of this organization, other than intelligence were, patrolling, guarding, sabotage, and minor engagements.

Upon investigating the "Magallanes Volunteers" it was found that the leaders of the organization did not have adequate control over its members, or the various units under their command. For instance the founder and original commander lived thirty miles away and had such poor contact with the unit that he was finally disregarded as the unit commander. De Raya stepped into his vacancy and took control of the whole unit. Under de Raya, there was no headquarters staff or chain of command. De Raya stated that most of the men worked on their own initiative so no chain of command was needed.

Careful scrutiny of the rosters revealed that seven men on the roster had already been recognized with Folsom's Unit and that another seven joined Junter's Unit. Further questioning about the roster led de Raya to state that over a third of the men on the present roster had never been in his unit nor had never been in Magallanes. An explanation made to clarify this statement was that Col. Joya, chief of staff of 4th Army Corps, had told de Raya to submit all the names of his men to him and that he would give them their rank and organization according to Army T/O. It is evident that many other men were entered on this same roster to be recognized that had never participated with such a unit. This shuffling of rosters is a good indication that the unit was very loosely organized and the leadership was at a minimum.

A check was made of all the intelligence reports turned in by various units of the 4th Corps and none were found pertaining to the Magallanes Volunteers. It was admitted that transportation and communication being so bad, the unit sometimes went for months without contact with their general headquarters.

A list of activities during the Japanese occupation showed that most of their efforts were devoted to guarding the town from bandits and spying in the few Japanese movements in that area. After the Americans landed, a hundred men from this unit were assigned to watch for Jap stragglers. None of the unit was ever attached to the 11th Airborne, nor were any of the men given attachment papers.

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The commander stated that since they had poor contact with 4th Corps Headquarters, there were not written orders or documents to be used as supporting papers. It was not believed important by the company commanders for them to keep records since they knew all their men personally. As a result, this organization has no papers on file to substantiate their claims.

Upon questioning the staff and active members of this organization it was stated that a rotation system was used, in which the members spent only part time on active duty, and none were used on a full time status. The rotation system was used because the organization was short on sustenance and also that many members were the sole support of their families. A group of men were taken from this rotation system to equal the number of arms in the unit. It is concluded that the members of this organization did not have full time status as a guerrilla, and combat activities against the enemy were practically non-existent. It is believed that the members of the unit worthy of recognition have been recognized with the above mentioned units.

Col. Marcos Agustin, CO Marking's Fil-Americans, recommends that the unit be carefully investigated and thoroughly screened.

POLITICAL ASPECTS

This unit does not appear to have any political affiliations or aspirations.

RECOMMENDATIONS

After careful consideration of the statements made by the present members and an analysis of the documents presented, it is recommended that with the exception of those member previously recognized, the "Magallanes Volunteers" be not favorably considered for recognition.



ACTIVITIES COND

Saw 100 Japs at Malungio looking for places to hide from the coming Americans. Did not attack them but retreated. The unit did not operate outside Magallanes until after the Americans had landed.

Feb. 1945- sent 35 men to Ternate to fight against the Japs under Major Shoomer. They were at Ternate for 21/2 days. Claimed about 500 guerrillas from all the units were there.

Feb. 1945- 100 men were sent to join the 11th. A/B and were placed under the command of Major Moreno, another guerrilla. Were attached to the 11th. A/B for two weeks. They were in the vicinity of Mt. Sungai, Mt. Makulot, and Mt. Santore. All are within 10 miles of their homes. Their duty was to stay at the foot of the mountain and capture any Jap stragglers that happened by. None of their men placed in government hospitals. Nor were any of the men ever recognized.

When asked about activities during the Japanese occupation, it was stated that;

a. the 40 men with arms stayed around camp while the others were at home raising food for their families and giving the surplus food to the guerrillas.

b. A few men were dispatched to spy on the Japs but never had any communication lines to send messages to other higher ups.

c. The 40 men who had the guns were living at home as their camp was a point that they could all reach upon a moments notice.

Of the Company 190 went to the campaign at Ternate, of which two were wounded and none killed, they killed two Japanese, they were stationed to pick up the Japanese stragglers who fled from Ternate. They then returned home and thence to Batangas, approximately 190. They were unofficially attached to the 187th Paraglider Regiment, from feb-apr, but have no supporting papers to prove this, eight were wounded in May they were ordered verbally by Col. Joya to proceed back to Magallanes, to protect the people from the Japanese

stragglers that might slip through the American lines, during the month of May they killed five Jap stragglers and captured two, about May the twentieth, when they were sure that there were no Japs left, they gave all their arms to the ROTC and PQOG, who were still fighting the Japs and disbanded their organization. Prior to the American landing this unit had no encounters with the Japanese. It was stated by the Company commander of the Able Company Mariano de Raya that

the Company Headquarter of the Service Company had never been at part of the Magallanes Volunteers and that the Regimental HQ Platoon of the Service Company had never been part of the Magallanes Volunteers.

This is the company of brave men who, in open defiance to the orders of surrender from the Japanese Imperial Forces and their Filipino puppets, organized themselves in the town of Magallanes, Cavite, the farthest town of Cavite. This is part and parcel of Cavite Guerrillas Erni. It was organized on or about 1 January 1943; and later it was incorporated with Cavite Guerrillas Erni, founded on or about 22 February 1942. It is otherwise known as "MAGALLANES VOLUNTEERS".

This Company was active in espionage work, as they are near the town of Nasugbu, Batangas, where the Japanese had a strong force. They were responsible for the destruction of Japanese line of communications, connecting Cavite and Batangas, and other military installations in the City of Tagaytay where the Japanese Imperial Forces had maintained a strong force.

In November, 1944, the then Major Jay D Vanderpool established a route from Cavite up to Sitio Cutad, Barrio of Looc, Municipality of Nasugbu, Batangas, where the said officer established his general headquarters. The route passed the town of Magallanes, as it was the safest way for intelligence agents to carry on their missions. Likewise, it was the surest route for the courier service established by Major Vanderpool, thru which confidential reports regarding enemy installations and movements could be safely handled. It was this Magallanes Volunteers that blazed the trail for the said route. They likewise were given the task of protecting and maintaining the famous route otherwise known as "Vanderpool Route". Major Vanderpool while traveling on the said route was always escorted by picked men of this Magallanes Volunteers. When the six American aviators picked up by the Off-Shore Patrol of our Unit, had been ordered to proceed to the General Headquarters of Major Vanderpool at Cutad, this Magallanes Volunteers together with

the Indang MP under Major Jose I. Ilagan, provided the necessary protection from the Camp of Colonel L F Joya in Barrio of Quintana, Tanza, Cavite, to Sitio Cutad, Barrio Loco, Nasugbu, Batangas, on or about 15 December 1944. Likewise, this route as protected by the Magallanes Volunteers, was used by the Hunters or ROTC units that made their GHQ at Cutad.


When the Japanese retreated to their fortifications at Paniman, Ternate, Cavite, in November, 1944, the Magallanes Volunteers were assigned to block the retreat, as the town of Magallanes is situated at the foot of the said mountains.

During the mopping operations of the remnants of the Japanese Imperial Forces that had retreated to the mountains of Marigondon, Cavite, the Magallanes Volunteers played an important role, in that they were the ones who captured and annihilated the Japanese stragglers in the regions around Paniman. In the liberation campaigns of the town of Ternate, the Magallanes Volunteers acted as the spearheads, and they were the first that encountered the Japanese in the hills of Ternate. In the mopping operations against the Japanese stragglers in Tagaytay Ridge and in the regions around the boundary line of Cavite and Batangas, the Magallanes Volunteers, in close collaboration with other units then attached with the 187th Paraglide Infantry commanded by Colonel Hilary B Hildebrand, USA, mopped up several Japanese stragglers that came down from Mt. Pico de Loro in the mountains of Marigondon. In the liberation campaigns against the Japs in Batangas, particularly in Mt. Sungay, Mt. Santore, and Mt. Makulot, the Magallanes Volunteers, together with the Moreno Units of our Organization, also participated.

Shortly after the liberation campaigns, they were disbanded, and went home to their isolated town Magallanes, Cavite.
