Dear Mr. Castillo:

The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the Lupi Sipocot Sector, FAIT, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.
- b. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.
- c. A definite organization was not established.
- d. Adequate records were not maintained (dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions and necessary related information).
- e. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.
- f. Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their families by means of farming or other civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrilla unit on a part time basis only.

This decision on the proposed unit roster does not preclude submission for casualty recognition by those individuals who are qualified and feel justified in entering such claims. Upon request by interested individuals, appropriate forms will be forwarded.

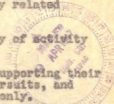

Report on "Lupi Sipocot Sector, FAIT"

1. Capt E. R. Curtis and 1st Lt Charles L Homewood on 26 March 1947 examined the unit file on Lupi Sipocot Sector, FAIT, under the command of Major Paulino Castillo.

2. ALLEGED HISTORY: (See attached unit file)

3. FINDINGS:

a. No field investigation was deemed necessary after careful examination of the unit file.

b. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence. There are no records other than an undated roster, AND UNIT HISTORY

c. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy. The Commanding Officer states, in the unit history, that he had gone to Manila in the middle of 1942 to form another unit, and therefore could not have commanded this unit in the field in opposition to the enemy.

d. A definite organization was not established. There are no records to show that a definite organization existed.

e. Adequate records of dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions and necessary related information were not maintained.

f. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization. There are no records to show that this unit ever had any activity or organization.

g. Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their families by means of farming or other civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrilla unit on a part time basis only.

h. The Commanding officer of this unit left the Bicol Area in the middle of 1942 and came to Manila where he was a member of another unit, (S-2 Intelligence Groups, Propaganda Unit, Manila North Section) and did not return to the Bicol Area until after the Liberation. Therefore he could not have commanded this unit in activities against the Japanese.

i. No useful purpose will be accomplished by further investigation of this unit. There are no members worthy of recognition and a separate Casualty Roster has been submitted.

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4. POLITICAL ASPECTS:

This unit does not appear to have any political affiliations or aspirations.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the Lupi, Sipocot Sector, FAIT be not favorably considered for recognition.

HISTORY OF THE ORGANIZATION OF LUPI-SIPOCOT SECTOR

1. DATE OF THE ORGANIZATION

War was unexpectedly declared on December 8, 1941 and four days later the Japanese landed at Legaspi. Before the enemy occupied Sipocot on Dec. 18, it came to my mind to organize ways of resistance against the invaders. I started to hide the petroleum, oil and gasoline of the Sinukuan Sawmill therein I was the General Superintendent so that said fuel would not fall in the hands of the enemy. On December 18, 1941, the late Governor Mariano Villafuerte my personal enemy became the Puppet Provincial Governor of Camarines Sur under the new Japanese Regime. I found myself in most terrible danger with no other alternative but to get away within the reach of my personal enemy and his new masters. By this reason, I hastily gathered my personal belongings that I could carry and with my nearest of kins and their families who were likewise affected in the enmity with the new Governor. We first hide in the forest of Barrio Bagagnan, Lupi Camarines Sur without sufficient arms except my personal revolver and shotgun. I bought a hundred sacks of palay from some friends and had these palay hauled to our hideout, to assure sufficient food supply for my few symphatizers who were willing to join with me in the forest. Such were the nucleus of my organization in the early part of 1942.

2. HOW ADHERANTS GROW IN NUMBER:

As soon as the Japanese arrived in this region the first thing they did was to abuse and rape our women. Next, they attacked our houses without the permission from the owners and appropriate themselves whatever they like, such as clothing, jewelries, money foodstuffs, chickens, pigs and etc. which we could not termed in any other language but day light robbery. Time passed their daily deeds unmasked themselves what they really were. Such people are cruel, brutal and barbarous as may be observed they deal with those who would not bow before them or those who ran away with their bad whims and caprices. All these actions of the new comers provoked our sentiments such that many people left their homes in the towns to live in the forest to get away from the Japanese and seek protections from those who had kind hearts to protect them, or to join others who were willing to bear up arms against the cruel invaders. The organization increased its adherants until a few months later, every one from the oldest to the youngest in the locality were willing to do in some way to join to help the organization.

3. INDUCTION OF OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN.

The first adherants to this organization were my immediate of kins. As time passed friends and symphatizers increased until by the early part of April, 1942, nearly every body in the region and adjoining sitios and barrios or Sipocot and Lupi were supporting the organization. After contacting with the symphatizers it was decided to put up capable officers who would take charge in each group in every locality thus formed the nucleus of the several companies under the organization such that by the later part of April, 1942 four (4) companies were organized completely with officers and enlisted men.

4. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION:

The very first purpose of the members of the organization was to get away within reach of the Japanese soldiers for fear of being abused and punished. As time advances

the Japanese committed abuses and severe cruelties, so that our fear developed into bitter hate and then determined for final revenge. This revenge necessitated our taking up arms thus finally bringing to light our major objectives resisting to drive away and to over throw the cruel invaders.

5. HOW ARMS WERE SECURED BY THE ORGANIZATION:

Our first arms were my personal revolver and shot gun which I took with me to the forest at the approach of the Japanese invaders. Others of my few companions had long sharp bolos, daggers, hunting spears and bows and arrows. The inventive genius of some of us had produced home made shot guns and revolvers and a little later coconut bomb shells were also made. Our arms increased as fast as arms could be wrestled or snatched away from our Japanese adversaries.

6. WHY AND HOW I LEFT THIS UNIT TO ORGANIZED A NEW ONE IN MANILA.

Soon after the fall of Bataan and Corrigidor the bulk of the Japanese soldiers engaged in taking these places were distributed in the provinces to exterminate the Guerillas. That was the beginning of our plight sometimes in the middle part of June 1942. When the Japanese came in big numbers in hot pursuit of ourselves the situation became unbearable for us such that we had to move our camp almost every day to prevent us for being surprised by the enemy. By the middle of August 1942, the Japanese were not leaving grounds for me, especially when Governor Vinzon of the Vinxon's guerilla was caught and killed, Captain Miranda of the Miranda Unit ran for cover in Catanduanes, and Lt. Hernandez unit escaped to Caramoan Pininsula. I decided then and there for the safety of my men and their families, to escape to some other place of safety. After too much hardships, I was able to reach Manila where I was not known by the Japanese as a Guerilla Organizer. About the later part of August 1942 I immediately contacted Lt. Col G. S. Mirafior, and Captain Aurellano for the purpose of joining my organization with the Fil-Americans Irrigator Troops under Col. Hugh Straughn, U. S. A. I was then assigned on a secret mission under the S-2 Intelligence Group also, in the Propaganda Unit of the Manila North Section. It was here in Manila where I stayed until the liberation of the Philippines as head of another guerilla unit. However after leaving my organization in Sipocot, and Lupi I resumed my contact with this organization as soon as train connections was resumed between Manila and the Bicol Region. I always sent instructions to my Officers in this organizations to continue the fight to the bitter end urging them also to cooperate with other unit operating in the region.

7. ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE ORGANIZATION:

It was hard to valuate in words the accomplishments of the organization, the individual exploits of some, the unbearable punishments suffered by others and the cruel deaths met by a few at the hands of the brutal enemy. Resistance both passive and armed were resorted to the first then the organization had no sufficient arms to meet the enemy and the second when arms were already secured as was the case during the later part of the occupation.

Our resistance was made not only by the members of the organization but likewise in cooperation with the members of other organizations. During the later part of the occupation, sabotage and active armed resistance were resorted to, bridges were blown up to disrupt transportation and communication thus crippling the movements of troops and materials. Enemies were ambushed on the way resulting in the destructions of trucks and the deaths of many Japanese soldiers.

All movements of the enemy were keenly watched out and the necessary information transmitted to the proper heads of the organization or to other similar organizations so that proper actions could be attended to. Booby traps were placed along the road beds blowing to pieces several enemy trucks. The information furnished by Captain Sebando of this organization to Major Barrows resulted in the total destruction of the enemy's store of fuel and ammunitions hidden among the lumber piled up along the Sipocot Railroad Station when this place was mercilessly bombed by the American Planes sometimes in March, 1945. A similar information to Major Barrows by Lieut. S. M. de Luna of this organization resulted in the wiping out of the enemy's fortifications in Bahi Bridge also, the complete destructions of their fuel and ammunition stored in the place involving considerable deaths of many Japanese Soldiers when the place was successfully bombed by the American Planes in the middle part of March of 1945.

Also another case in our activity when Three (3) Japanese Strugglers pretending to be a chinese civilian suddenly appeared in the barrio of Villazer, about fifteen kilometers from the town of Sipocot, when they started to open fire with their piece, scaring the civilians, wounding a barrio lieutenant on the left leg, then they rushed and fled to the mountain thick forest but Lt. S. M. de Luna chased them with his borrowed Carbine killing two of them and capturing one with a breast wound, after almost four hours of hot chasing in the thick woods, on the later part of September, 1945. He recovered the map of the Biocol Regions, two hand grenades and a pistol Cal. 38. The prisoner, the grenades and the map were all turn over to Major Miranda of the PC. Commandant, Naga, Camarines Sur, while the Pistol Cal. 38 was turned over to the Mayor of Sipocot for safe keeping. These were only a few of our accomplishments.

The members of this organization have done their duties at the sacrifice of the lives of some of them as may be seen in the attached list of casualties. They have done their share of the fight to drive away the enemy without the least anticipating to be rewarded for their sacrifices. Their sacrifices did not end until to the present watching Japanese strugglers still roaming in the nearby forest.
