The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the Federal Service Philippine Guerrilla, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. - g. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations.

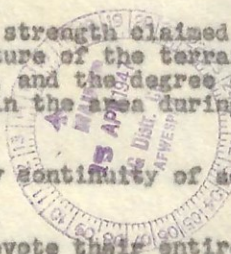
c. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.

d. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its leaders.

e. Sphere of operations and unit strength claimed by the unit were not commensurate with the nature of the terrain, limitation of communication facilities, and the degree of anti-resistance activities of the Japanese in the area during the period concerned.

f. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.

g. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations.





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h. Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their families by means of farming or other civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrilla unit on a part time basis only.

It is considered that the previous recognition of approximately 120 officers and men from the Federal Service Philippine Guerrilla who were recognized by the Commanding General, Sixth Army for their aid during the liberation of the Philippines constitutes adequate and just acknowledgment of military service.

Your attention is invited to Presidential Executive Order No. 68, Commonwealth of the Philippines, copy of which is attached, for any necessary action in connection therewith.

Report on the Federal Service of the Philippines

1. 1st Lt Eliseo Sta. Romana on 21 March 1947 proceeded to Plaza Guipit, Sampaloc, Manila to investigate the Federal Service of the Philippines.

2. ALLEGED HISTORY: (See attached unit file)

3. FINDINGS:

a. The following named persons were interviewed and their statements were reflected in the findings.

Rev. | b. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence. A careful examination of the record of service presented by this unit during the investigation, indicates non-guerrilla activity and no evidence that the Federal Service Philippines Guerrilla ever existed as a guerrilla unit. The CO of this unit, Lt Col. Rizalino Palomares, was recognized as 1st Lt with Barrion's Manila Division. He (Palomares) had approximately 120 men with him as members of the Federal Service Philippines Guerrilla. The CO presented a letter of attachment from 158th Inf. US Army, which indicates that Mr. Jose Zapata had rendered services as a civilian employee. The Medical unit claimed to have rendered services to approximately 4,000 wounded civilians and guerrillas during the liberation. During the investigation the members of the Medical Section stated that they were paid under the control of the PCAU (Philippine Civil Affairs Unit).

✓ c. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy. This unit claimed to have operated in Cebu, Negros, Northern Luzon, Manila and in Marikina. One of the members from this unit claimed to have operated in Cebu and Negros and presented a collection of radio messages from the Hqtrs of Abcede's unit. These messages did not concern the Federal Service, Philippine Guerrilla. Another member claimed to have operated in Northern Luzon with USFIP NL but he was recognized with the 121st Inf USFIP NL. Those who claimed operations in Manila were laborers of a Japanese controlled agency and did not engage in guerrilla



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activities. These members claimed sabotage and intelligence operations which could not be proven. The combat echelon of this unit was loosely organized, the members residing in various places in the Islands. Communication between elements of the combat echelon was impossible. It is concluded that not all the activities claimed by this unit were planned by the Commanding Officer. Only the Medical Section of this unit appears to have been organized during the liberation and was controlled and paid by PCAU.

d. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy. This unit had a strength of 902 men. They claimed to have centered their operations in Manila while squads of 6 to 10 men operated in different parts of the Islands. During the contact of this unit none of the Enlisted men appeared for interview. Only the Battalion Staff and 3 of the enlisted men, who were members of the Medical Section appeared for interview. The Commanding Officer of this unit could not account for the male members of his Battalion during the liberation. He claimed the Medical Section was in Plaza Guipit. One company was in Tayabas with the 1st Cavalry and was recognized with the Barrions Division. The whereabouts of the balance of the members were unknown. This unit claimed to have been under the Command of the Bato-Balani Division and further claimed that the casualties of this unit were submitted to Bato-Balani Division.

e. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its leaders, because activities of this unit during the occupation were not planned and controlled by the Commanding Officer. The CO of this unit had operated in Tayabas under Barrions Division and not with this unit for which he is requesting recognition.

f. Sphere of operations and unit strength claimed by the unit were not commensurate with the nature of the terrain, limitation of communication facilities, and the degree of anti-resistance activities of the Japanese in the area during the period concerned. This unit had its Headquarters in the City of Manila and claimed operations in Cebu, Negros, Tayabas, Rizal, and Northern Luzon. The CO could not present any evidence that the men who operated in such places were ever communicated with, ~~nor could we establish proof of their activities that they engaged in intelligence work,~~

g. The unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization. During the occupation this unit claimed sabotage, intelligence operations, propaganda and ambushes of Japs patrols. The CO could not submit any evidence to substantiate the unit's claimed activities.

h. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of

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normal civilian occupation and family obligations. The members apparently lived at their homes supporting their families, by means of civilian pursuits, and assisted the guerrillas on a part time basis only. The officers of the Medical Section of this unit, stated that they had remained in their homes during the occupation. None of the officers from this unit had been wanted by the Japanese MP. The investigating officer interviewed some of the residents who during the occupation and at present, reside in Plaza Guipit. They disclosed that they had never heard of The Federal Service Philippine Guerrilla.

1. No useful purpose will be accomplished by further investigation of this unit. All worthy members have been recognized. A casualty roster for this unit has been submitted by the CO of Bato-Balani Division.

4. POLITICAL ASPECTS: This unit does not appear to have any political affiliations or aspirations.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS: It is recommended that the Federal Service Philippine Guerrilla be not favorably considered for recognition.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

FEDERAL SERVICE, PHILIPPINES, came into existence as a guerrilla organization out of the heat, chaos, and confusion of the moment caused by the arbitrary implantation of the Japanese NEW ORDER in East Asia resulting not in order but rather in the NEW DISORDER and in the greatest calamity the world has ever seen. When the Japanese soldiers set foot on the Philippines with the law of force and collective responsibility based on presumed efficiency was forced upon a people who for the last thirty years have truly embraced all democratic tenets in government in their loyal and close paternal ties with their American mentors and other liberty and free loving peoples of the globe. Naturally, when the already tottering and bankrupt Japanese Empire came to introduce a system highly alien and repugnant to our way of life, we had to live under enemy occupation with a FIGHTING and REVOLTING conscience.

Our sense of dignity and honor as a people was challenged. We hated very bitterly and in the marrow of our bones to be governed by a people who in the words of our greatest leader and statesman, President Manuel L. Quezon, look more askance than we do.

Therefore, this unique and peculiar body of volunteer soldiers of democracy sprang spontaneously from the desire of all brave men, living and dead, to see their country again happy and free. The blood of noble heroes is the seed of the church and this seed will continue to grow and bear fruit for the support of the common trunk.

NAME AND PURPOSE

We call ourselves FEDERAL SERVICE, PHILIPPINES because we have bonded together in order to firmly uphold the Constitution and Laws of the Commonwealth of the Philippines and without any string attached or condition have decided to pledge our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor under the service of the Federal Government so that we and our countrymen should remain steadfastly loyal to the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

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When in January, 1942, the Imperial Japanese Forces entered and occupied the City of Manila we at once read in public centers the military proclamation of the invading army and by its tenor the Japanese people professed to be redeemers and champions of Oriental nations when in truth and in fact Japan sent to occupy and ravage the Philippines, soldiers noted for the hateful habit of slapping and kicking the Filipino like dogs and killing them after they have been subjected to all kinds of tortures and human indignities.

The Japanese domination was a reign of terror and slavery without any precedent in history, and upon knowing that Japan's announced and sugar-coated policy could not be reconciled with the capricious and highly arbitrary conduct of Japanese officers and men, we immediately protested and did not approve of the acts of our temporary conquerors and masters. The long period of Japanese occupation might have conquered the Filipinos physically but never morally and spiritually. The spirit of resistance kept on burning in our hearts from day to day which finally made one German missionary whom the historian of this unit had the rare privilege of meeting, said: "THE JAPANESE HAVE NEVER CONQUERED THE FILIPINOS BECAUSE THEY HAVE NOT CONQUERED THEIR WILL" This is the correct picture of the situation for the entire nation has not in a single instance submitted voluntarily to Japanese tutelage and domination.

The founders and leaders of this unit who have given it its life and its blood started a whispering campaign against Japanese vandalism and atrocities in order to restore hope and confidence in the ultimate American victory. The movement was first inspired when your historian sometime in 1942 in Pinalayan, Mindoro, while listening to the VOICE OF FREEDOM broadcasting from Corregidore heard the speech of Brigadier General Carlos P. Romulo who assured Filipino mothers, fathers, husbands, wives, sons, daughters, and loved ones that America was returning and returning sooner than we all expected. It was in this inspiring address where Romulo depicted the ordinary Japanese soldier fighting without his knowing why he is fighting in this war. He was fighting without any lofty purpose and without any worthy prize for offering his life and blood to the battle fronts of the world.



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After the sad fall of Singapore and Manila, allied bulwarks in the East, Japan began capitalizing on her conquests of these two important military strongholds. Her propaganda machine began to grind and fed up the Filipino mind with false news stories about the Pacific war playing up in bold headlines the Japanese victories everywhere under the divine inspiration of Hirohito as against American reverses and the hollowness of America's promise to return. No, the Japanese said, America cannot redeem her greatest military disaster in the East.

While every attempt to discredit the allied cause did not gain national acquiescence, nevertheless it misguided a few Filipino nationalists who during the darkest days thrived well at the expense of the lives and blood of their own countrymen. A militant organization was then needed to counteract Japanese lies. Treacherous activities threatening the lives of the innocent must be killed. With this as a driving force, the more patriotic elements of our people rallied behind this organization and were inducted with utmost secrecy and careful safeguards.

To free themselves and their oppressed comrades from the shackles of bondage and wanton barbarity and to restore the most priceless treasure of liberty to the land that gave us birth is the ultimate and great purpose of this organization.

#### FOUNDING OF THE ORGANIZATION

This organization was founded on February 1, 1942 by men who had the courage and the vision and who did not fail to see that light was coming again. Sampaloc district was the scene of organization and the Manila area was the seat of its early guerrilla activities. After the release of Filipino prisoners of war from the Concentration Camp at Camp O'Donnell at Capas, Tarlac, this body was strongly reinforced by the more valiant officers of the Bataan fame whose passion for justice and liberty was strengthened by their unbearable experiences in the Japanese rejuvenation camps. Many important names with great citations for their battle or combat experiences could have adorned the pages of this history of activities and organization but for the sake of modesty their names will never be revealed before this organization, therefore, of this lone unit will remain who is who in the guerrilla world.

#### FINANCING AND SUPPLY

Unlike many similar organizations who usually resort to voluntary or imposed taxation of members to carry on its varied projects in connection with liberation FEDERAL SERVICE, PHILIPPINES, never molested its members as it was deemed wise

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and proper that a person who voluntarily serve for the noble cause without any definite compensation should not be further taxed. This would be adding insult to injury. Thus the expenses necessarily incurred for the proper functioning of this organization were borne out of personal funds of the more fortunate members who number not more than three in the group. Because of the generosity of these guerrilla leaders finance and supply was a solved problem at the very start of the organization. As a respect to his personal instruction, your historian cannot mention the names of the financial backers of this unit. All that maybe mentioned is that one besides supporting and working for the recognition of this group has maintained and supported many officers and men under the Manila Barrion's Division and these officers and men have already been processed and paid. On the contrary recognition, processing and compensation would mean nothing to him without giving everyone under this command an opportunity to be processed in compliance with guerrilla recognition,

#### GUERRILLA ACTIVITIES

During the early days of our existence our guerrilla work was confined mainly to the propagation and dissemination of important military information. To rise in arms against the Japanese soldiers who were then overwhelmingly superior in number and equipment was to ignore sound military strategy, and therefore, not wise. We all then stayed low as we wanted to impress the Japanese that we were faithful followers of Japanese philosophy which is ASIA FOR THE ASIANS. But without sacrificing truth for expression, we all maintain that responsible men in the organization took up the task of disseminating our information. Like the twelve apostle of Jesus they preached the gospel of liberation wherever they were found.

a. Intelligence Work - G - 2

Worthy of mention here is the intelligence activities of Capt. Rodriguez T. Rodriguez. An officer of long experience in the Philippine Scout, Capt. Rodriguez saw service in Bataan as Commander of Battery "B", 301 Anti-Tank Battalion who was later designated by Col. Albert R. Ives (PB) Philippine Division, USA as Brigade Radio and Communication Officer. After his release from the prison camp he took to the hills and contacted some guerrilla forces under the command of Col. John Edward Hoover, 45th Infantry, 44th Division (USPIF), in the field.

Working as an under cover man among guerrillas at large, he devised a pass word: hakiñg zapatos, was used to refer to the Japanese when talking about their military reverses in practically all fronts. Zapatos was a term used for the Americans as we all know that the American soldiers are well clothed and fed and wear shoes anywhere.

Presenting himself as a laborer and later getting a job as a member of the hotel or sailboat crew he visited such important places as Manila, Marinduque, Romblon, Mindoro, Occidental Negros, Iloilo, and Masbate. These places were then heavily guarded by Japanese garrisons and to detect enemy movements here was something of vital military importance. It was here then where Capt. Rodriguez risked his own life just to detect enemy movements, position and number of troops, communication dumps, air bases and fuel deposits. The results of his findings were reported to several guerrilla headquarters in the mountains which were then sent by cryptographic messages through a double transposition system, a knowledge which he acquired in his studies at the Signal Intelligence School at Ft. William McKinley under Capt. George B. Hart, Signal Corps and Col. Skerr.

b. Planting of Men in the Puppet Government

To acquire knowledge of inside activities both for military and civilian purposes was the great object in authorizing officials unmolested under the puppet governments. There are some ranking men in this organization who have been planted in the enemy controlled agencies to serve the guerrilla interests better and these men have shown their true color after liberation. Some have been processed under other guerrilla units. Other are still waiting for the recognition of this outfit.

*add* → The planting of these men were made on the advice and with the consent of the late General Vicente Lim, leader General Lim was picked up and killed so that he cannot throw further light on the cases of these men who can be identified with the guerrilla movement were he alive to-day.

c. Propaganda Corps

During enemy occupation the war of propaganda was intensified by the invaders. The Japanese Military Administration utilized every avenue of propaganda just to lure the downhearted Filipinos in order that they may embrace the philosophy of the so-called East Asia Co-PROSPERITY SPHERE. Officials and writers were used as instruments or puppets and were sent out to preach the Japanese ideals in government.

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To counteract enemy propaganda, Federal Service, Philippines, selected a group of intelligent men who are mostly graduates of American and Philippine colleges and universities to handle the most delicate propaganda work. Space is not available for a complete recital of activities of these men and only typical examples of our work are mentioned here with the names and qualifications of entrusted with a high and delicate military mission. They are.

ATTY. D.P. VILLAFLORES, B.S.E., LL.B.

Sometime in 1943 he visited the house of a neighbor, now a recognized and processed guerrillero under Manila Barrion's Division and read from him a copy of a very long letter of Gov. Tomas Confessor of Panay to Gov. Fermin Caram of Iloilo of the puppet government. Confessor wrote the letter as a reaction or reply to a letter sent to him by Gov. Caram on the advice of a Japanese General asking Confessor to surrender with immunity from harm or punishment including members of his family.

The reply was brave refusal to surrender. Instead, it blamed Gov. Caram for serving the Japanese as well as Col. Quimbo for wearing the rising sun when before very proud to have the stars and stripes.

Atty. Villaflores secretly passed the contents of this letter to all neighbors and friends including Don Benito Legarda, Major, Inf. (PA) and Col. Guevara who was then staying with Maj. Legarda.

DOMINGO C. SERION, B.S.E., M.A.

He was engaged sometime in 1943 in the typing of sort-wave news and had them distributed to friends in and outside the organization. Also, he reported the presence of a poultry farm of the Japanese in Cubao, Quezon City resulting in the poisoning of all chickens and pigs in the farm.

MARIANO FALGUI, A.B. (U.S.A.)

He had a PHILCO receiving set which he never reported to the Japanese authorities in Manila for reconditioning. It was hidden somewhere in his house. This set was used in the afternoon to get San Francisco, California every now and then and six in the afternoon. Many times Atty. Villaflores went to the house of Mr. Falgui to hear U.S. broadcast and what were gathered were summarized and typed for distribution to the people to keep up high their morale.

ANDRES DE VERA, A.B., M.A. (Chicago)

Sometime in 1943 he was engaged many times in the risky and dangerous job of listening to foreign broadcasts. What he gathered from several receiving sets in the provinces as well as in Manila were consolidated and typed for distribution to the people sympathizing with the allied cause.



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ESTEBAN M. CARIOS, P. N. S.

He kept on getting into close personal contacts with travelers from the provinces and those short-wave news listeners for war information. With good news at hand, he would often see Atty. Villaflores and informed him that liberation was coming sooner or later.

E. F. VILLAFLORES, P. N. S.

Defying every danger of discovery, since the beginning of the occupation she has been devoting her time to keep up the morale of the people especially go to the palatial mansion of Don Francisco T. Lopez and would inform the members that the Japanese had no chance to win.

COMBAT PERFORMANCES

The history of Philippine guerrillas in an endless river of tears and blood and FEDERAL SERVICE, PHILIPPINES is one of its branches. That history can never be completely written without mentioning the heroic performances of our officers and men in their actual encounters with the enemy. Not to flatter them and far from exaggerating, the combat records of our men who offered their lives for the defense of the motherland cannot but stagger one's imagination. Following are brief accounts of these important battles, to wit:

a. In Minglanilla, Cebu

Lt. Napoleon R. Oria was then detailed as our, our G-2 in the Visayas but in Cebu he went to the mountains and attached himself to our comrades-in-arms. On Oct. 10, 1943, he showed an exceptional valor and splendid act of heroism. With fifteen men under his command, he was sent from the General Guerrilla Headquarters from that island with instructions to harass Japanese trucks passing Minglanilla to the Cebu Portland Cement at Naga. Armed with rifles and machine guns, Lt. Oria and his men who, (to borrow the Japanese propaganda) took death as light as the feather and duty as heavy as the mountain charged the passing Japanese in their trucks. The fight started and two o'clock in the afternoon and ended at six resulting the death of 107 Japanese and the destruction of three trucks thrown into the ditch. On Lt. Oria's side only one was slightly wounded.

Lt. Oria has transferred to the 5th Ibarra Regiment, Blue Eagle Command under Col. Alabastro.

b. In Lubao, La Union

Capt. Andres B. de Veyra also had his baptism of blood and fire. While he was working under the 121st Infantry with Capt. Nemesio Rillera, deceased, with contacts with and under the supreme command of Col. C. M. Barnet, he participated in active resistance work. On Feb. 25, 1943 he and some other companions destroyed and cut the telephone communication lines of the Japanese between in Aringay, La Union. On the same day, he and Capt. Rillera took to the hills and there they were surrounded by three companies of Japanese soldiers. To save their men, they managed to make a strategic retreat.

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When Capt. Rillera died of typhoid he was taken as a successor and the Japanese since then kept on spotting him. As a result he moved from place to place and contracted an illness of which he is still suffering even until now.

c. At Banguin, Ilocos Sur

1st Lt. Mariano Falgui sold his house at 1378 C. Tuason as he was always watched by the Japanese MP during the month of Feb. 1943. The sale of the house was the greatest sacrifice of his family. For the interest of the movement he went to Ilocos Sur after the sale to keep on the great fight for liberation.

In Ilocos Sur, he reported to Co. "L" 121 Infantry under Capt. Emilio Narcise stationed at Banguin. This, too, was under the recognized and supreme command of Co. G. M. Barnett, and American guerrilla chieftain.

In Sta. Lucia, he first organized the bolo battalion which help him in the procurement of food and supplies supplying the headquarter of the unit to which he was temporarily attached. At Banguin 80 Japanese raid their headquarters. Fifty men fought relentlessly against 80 Japanese. At the termination of the battle 25 Japanese were killed without a single casualty on the guerrilla side. The Japanese started burning the entire villa ge and so they fled to another headquarters.

Many cases of valor and heroism could be cited here but for the sake of brevity they are dispensed with. All that should be well remembered is that this organization has been duly organized with a view to complete the intire component of an army organization.

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THE CALL TO ARMS, RESPONSE

On February 3, 1945 a general order was issued to all unit commanders to report for duty. We were then assembled for reorganization and assignments at the General Headquarters of Federal Service, Philippines which was then occupying the entire building of the Quipit Elisentary School. This was an emergency call for the Americans came and we all had to rally behind the cause at the dawn of our liberation. The American Forces of Liberation have come at last to strike the final blow to the already tottering Japanese Empire and wipe forever the last remnants of the Imperial Japanese Forces then divided in disorganized and desperate groups and offering only their last and hopeless resistance to the superior American forces.

The response to the call was spontaneous. Men and women under the flag came at first opportunity and without any further ceremonies Federal Service, Philippines was immediately reorganized with the following units:

a. Medical And First Aid

Under heaving shelling between two fires hundreds were dying everyday and thousands suffered wounds as a result of firing both from the American and Japanese sides. The roar of cannons and the whizzing of bullets caused considerable casualties among soldiers as well as civilians in the battle area. The medical service was, therefore, immediately needed to meet the demands of the occasion.

With a battery of welltrained doctors and nurses emergency hospitals were set up. Four buildings in all; three near the headquarters and one in Quiapo were secured to house hundreds of patients applying everyday for accommodation. With the timely and quick assistance of the FG&U authorities medical supplies were secured and food for patients and personnel were secured for their maintenance. This service continued until the work was taken over by proper authorities.

Reports on the commendable achievements of the medical unit may be verified in the office of the CIC. *what unit*

b. Relief Work

War usually brings havoc and untold miseries among its victims. To alleviate the sufferings of the masses the relief unit was then organized. Officers and men or women experienced in social welfare work were assigned to this unit. FG&U 21 with Headquarters at the National University Building under Maj. MacKinsey sent relief supplies such as rice, corn, and canned goods to the Federal Service, Philippines Headquarters for equitable distribution to the needy and hungry populace.

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c. Anti-Profiteering Squad

Profiteers must go. This was the important decision of the Chief Commander and the organization set its hand in curbing out profiteering and dealing properly with the profiteers who were fleecing out the life and blood of the victims. Under the close supervision of the Provost Marshal one battalion was assigned to this important phase of activities.

c. Summary Court

Most of the officers in this unit held the ranks of 1st Lieutenants and Captains. They were and are experienced practicing lawyers who belong to this organization long before liberation days.

This Summary Court was very instrumental in the investigation of treasonable acts and violations against internal military organization of the entire command. Those who were then arrested on alleged collaboration with the enemy were carefully investigated by this court and their respective cases were forwarded to the CIC for action as this court strictly speaking had no jurisdiction to mete out punishments to these offenders. Records of the CIC will show several cases of arrests and investigations and this Summary Court had in a hand in the investigation of these cases.

d. The Fighting Unit

This unit was composed of selected men for military service at the front lines. Many of the boys were veterans of Bataan and had combat experiences. They were all itching for a fight and welcomed any assignment or attachment to the American forces in various sectors of the war.

Capt. Elino T. Rodriguez on the morning of February 3, 1945 went to General Hugh Hoffman, Co of the 1st Cal. Division, 2nd Cavalry Brigade at his Headquarters which was then temporarily located at the Legarda Elementary School as he was the first American general to touch Sampaloc area in the liberation of Manila. He presented to him the services of our loyal and fighting guerrilleros. Believing in the sincerity and enthusiasm of our boys he authorized them to have uniform, rifles, and food and they were first utilized to great military advantage in guiding the Americans where the Japanese snipers, Makapilis, etc. were hiding. The attachment of these boys to the Americans immediately wiped out the fatal threats of Japanese snipers.

This group was a combination of men from Manila Barrion's Division and the Federal Service, Philippines; many followed the Americans to the provinces and returned with honor and distinction. Others died a glorious death. A great number from the Manila Barrion's division have been processed but this belonging to this command are still waiting for their recognition.

Certainly, Capt. Elino T. Rodriguez injected real military life and discipline into this group of fighting men. Before he left for processing to his old USAFFE units at Calsiao, Pangasinan, he prepared these men for battle service and when he was released other commanders brought these boys to the battle fronts in Luzon.



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e. U. S. Army Attachment

When the men and officers of this unit enlisted under this banner they simply joined the guerrilla movement without any mercenary motive. Those who are loyal to the dollars, let them stay behind but those who are loyal to the flag let them march on. This was the philosophy behind the whole set up which kept the spirit of service and loyalty ever burning. Certainly, it was the best incentive and the most noteworthy motivation in bringing together men to fight under one flag.

One important and signal fact that they have ever known was the pronouncement of President Truman in one of his addresses in which he was championing a very lofty principle and ideal. The boys did not and could not forget it is and when President Truman said that the Americans and the entire humanity are still fighting for justice as the loftiest and highest principle of human rights they have taken such a pronouncement to heart. So, with or without attachment papers they fought side by side with the Americans knowing fully well that in the final analysis they will understand their problems and will solve them to their greatest satisfaction.

However, we are not entirely devoid of any attachment papers. We are submitting some of them herewith. If given the assurance of recognition, we will try to dig our moth eaten files for these required attachment papers.

But allow us to say here that with the non-recognition of guerrillas for failure to produce attachment papers will establish a very dangerous precedent for that would result in the processing and payment of the 1945 guerrillas that sprang like mushrooms while on the other hand it will overlook the important cases of men who fought and died long before General MacArthur came to pave the way for liberation.

Let, therefore, our dead comrades rise from their humble graves and tell the American Army that we, the living are not wanting in courage and heroism.

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OUR ARGUMENTS FOR RECOGNITION & PROCESSING

Accompanying the history of organization and activities of this guerrilla league is a complete roster of officers and men revised and submitted in accordance with the T. O. sanctioned and approved by the AFWESPAC as to form. In this roster are men known for their courage and integrity who are championing the cause of the forgotten guerrilleros worthy of the name. They are now knocking and will continue to knock at the door of the AFWESPAC authorities for their recognition in the name of justice and equality before the law.

Members of this organization should be given due recognition and processed as all others for the following reasons:

1. They have actually rendered services and have risked the best years of their lives in the name of freedom and democracy. These services must be paid. Since payment was given to one it must be given to all.
2. Their comrades have been processed and paid and as a matter of equity and justice they must also enjoy the same rights and privileges.
3. Discontent and restlessness will be minimized by the prompt and proper acknowledgement of their contribution to the liberation of the Philippines. Failure to reward them would be an act of a serious omission which may make the seed of discontent grow into national dissension and universal turmoil.
4. To abandon them to their fate would be repugnant and contrary to the time-honored policy of the U. S. Government to give due protection and consideration to all men fighting under her flags.
5. Payment of other guerrilleros like them has set up a precedent and following such a precedent, the only honorable and honest thing for the AFWESPAC authorities to do for the good of the American people is to recognize every member of this unit.
6. The recognition of this unit will give rise to a beautiful remembrance which posterity can never forget. That remembrance will be the acknowledgment of a duty well done coming from the hearts of a grateful people.
7. The recognition of this unit will do great justice to the widows and orphans of those who died in battles for they cannot get the benefits under the law if their husbands and fathers died as forgotten guerrilleros; to the USAFWE men in this organization for they will not get their arrears in pay and quarter allowances without their having been officially known as guerrilleros; and to thousands who have been rendered homeless and destitute as a result of their affiliation with this organization.

AN APPEAL TO REASON AND JUSTICE

In requesting for the recognition of this guerilla command, I have been urged and motivated solely and purely by the best of intentions and by the honest desire of my comrades to serve our country and people whose temper and psychology are better known to us than to someone else. I never had the slightest idea at first to join hands with fellow officers and men and write down for many sleepless nights the history of this organization so that we may all get a chance of our own recognition. For with or without any recognition we can live undisturbed in the happy pursuit of our respective professions.

But social justice demands of each and everyone of us that we should work for the recognition of our men. It is the cause of the unknown soldier that we are now fighting for. We all know and you all probably know too well that in the great and gigantic task of liberation the greatest burden of the sacrifice usually falls on the shoulders of the unknown soldier. In times of emergency or any national crisis he is the one who can immediately offer his life for the sake of his country's freedom. Freedom is at hand and this same man who fought valiantly for it now demands his reward for the noble and great sacrifices he made in tears and blood.

As a member of this unit upon whose lot fell the task of writing the history of this organization, I can see clearly the handwriting on the wall giving a timely warning: "Liberty or death."

Yes, we all believe in the American sense of justice and fair play. But there can be no justice for those who still remain unrecognized. The gravity of the situation is serious. The only practical solution to the case at bar is recognition. For this guerrilla unit, therefore, we appeal for processing and recognition.


