A field investigation was deemed necessary after a careful study of the unit file.

Dear Mr. Dela Rosa:

The records of this unit show that they were used as a guerrilla unit. The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your control, previously not favorably considered for recognition, has been reconsidered at your request.

A thorough review of the supporting papers of this organization, and a detailed examination of the additional evidence submitted with your request for reconsideration, together with a careful analysis of all other available information of the activities of your unit from its inception, scrutinized in relation to the overall resistance movement, has again failed to reveal sufficient material to satisfy the requirements for recognition of your unit as an element of the Philippine Army in the service of the Armed Forces of the United States. The Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit is therefore not favorably reconsidered for modification of the original decision of non-recognition.

It is the policy of this headquarters to entertain for investigation only casualty rosters submitted by recognized guerrilla units. Consequently, the casualty report of your unit has not been accepted for consideration as a roster. However, this does not preclude submission of requests for individual casualty recognition by those who are qualified and feel justified in entering such claims. Upon request by interested individuals, application forms will be forwarded.

This letter constitutes the final determination of and action upon the claim for recognition of the Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit.

Report on "Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit"

1. Capt E. R. Curtis and 1st Lt Charles L. Homewood on 27 May 1947, examined the unit file on Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit under the command of Mr. Crispulo P. de la Rosa.

2. FINDINGS:

a. No field investigation was deemed necessary after a careful study of the unit file.

b. The records of this unit show that they were used as laborers. Lt Com George Rowe submitted a certificate showing that the unit was a Bolo or Volunteer unit acting as laborers, food producers etc. (see Tab A).

c. In the check sheet written by Lt Flory he states that this unit was used by Lt Com George Rowe but they were paid by him and the records are now present at HAP. (see Tab B).

d. The Unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy. In Tab C item 1 the Commanding Officer states that the unit was not maintained in the field in opposition to the enemy, due to lack of arms and ammunition, cooperation, sacrifices, and services are no more than required by any other patriotic citizen in time of war.

e. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian occupation and family obligations. In Tab C, item 2, the Commanding Officer states that one half the members of the unit were used in the utilization of food production.

f. Letter granting reconsideration attached as Tab D.

3. POLITICAL ASPECTS:

a. This unit does not appear to have any political affiliations or aspirations.

4. RECOMMENDATIONS:

a. It is recommended that the Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit be not favorably considered for any recognition in accordance with the original decision of this headquarters, dated 8 July 1946.

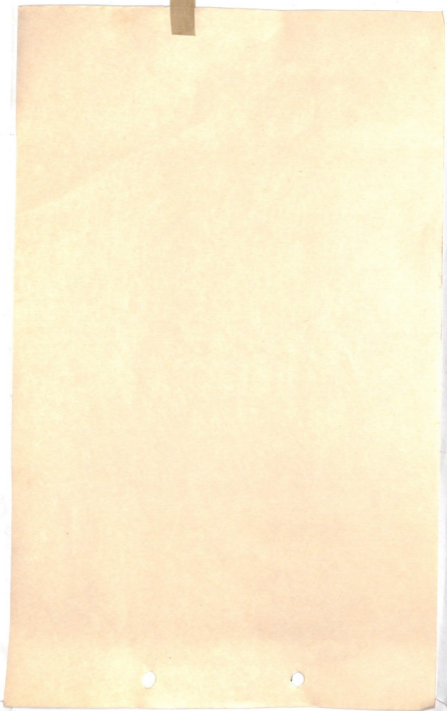

The "Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit", purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. TO AUTHORITIES CONCERNED;

We are presenting herewith the ROSTER OF TROOPS and the BRIEF HISTORY OF THE TAMARAW GUERRILLA UNIT. This organization was founded in the municipality of Abra de Ilog, Province of Mindoro, in 1942 (just after the occupation of Calapan, the capital of the province, by the Japanese Imperial Forces) in order to collaborate with other guerrilla units and friendly forces in behalf of the Commonwealth Government of the Philippines and of the United States of America.

Inasmuch as the organization had done its due part to help in the success of the other guerrilla units and of the advance parties of the SWPA in Mindoro, we feel, therefore, justified in kindly requesting your favorable consideration so that the services rendered by the organization may be accorded due credit and recognition by the Government.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE TAMARAW GUERRILLA UNIT IN ABRA DE  
ILOG, MINDORO  
-----OO-----

We are presenting below the chronological record of activities undertaken by the TGU (Tamaraw Guerrilla Unit) ever since its formation way back in 1942 until the latter part of 1945. It will be noted from such record that the work accomplished by the organization has been confined mostly to (1) rendering protective service to disbanded ex-USAFFE men who sought refuge in this municipality; (2) contacting with and relaying intelligence to other guerrilla units from Eastern Mindoro and those from Luzon in order to get first-hand information regarding situations of the Japanese in various parts of the province of Mindoro and of Luzon and elsewhere and (3) giving moral support to and active cooperation with advance parties of the SWPA in Mindoro toward the successful prosecution of their advance missions.

The success of the TGU has been due in a large measure to the combined cooperation of the local officials and the civilians without whom the organization would not be able to live. For the unselfish cooperation given to this organization, we are all very grateful.

CHRONOLOGICAL RECORD

December 8, 1941 - When the state of war existed between the United States and Japan beginning this date, according to information received in this municipality, the Mayor alerted the Volunteer Guards for active service day and night, following a more or less permanent schedule. The civilians were given the necessary precautions to take against air raids and to observe blackout at certain signals from air wardens. The functions of the Vgs (Vounteer Guards) were directed toward the prevention of hysteria and panic among the civilians.

December 15, 1941 - The head officers of the different units of the Volunteer Guards contacted Capt. Welles of the Intelligence Section from Corregidor, who arrived at this municipality, and directed him to the Municipal Mayor for conference regarding his mission. The VGs were given sound advices and helpful suggestions for increasing efficiency in the service. After the conference, Capt. Welles then proceeded to the municipality of Mamburao.

January 2, 1942 - We received the news that Manila was occupied by the Japanese Imperial Forces. In spite of this sad news, we kept on discharging our duties as VGs to the best of our ability.

February 25, 1942 - News circulated that Calapan, the capital of Mindoro, after a slight resistance by the Philippine Army, was also occupied. Some of the disbanded PA under the USAFFE who were from Western Mindoro came to this town and so we contacted them. We verified the news as true. In view of the fall of Calapan, we decided to change our organization into what is known at present as the TAMARAW GUERRILLA UNIT for the following purposes:

1. To make a survey of the proportion of civilian residents who may speak directly or indirectly for and in behalf of the Japanese and things Japanese;





2. To give timely warnings to civilians to watch out for the appearance of bandits and other undesirable elements and to report them to the TAMARAW GUERRILLA UNIT so that immediate and drastic action could be taken for the suppression of such lawless people;

3. To confiscate all Japanese propagandas which might be found in the possession of civilian residents and to give them due warnings about these papers;

4. To place unknown evacuees and other doubtful people under close observation, to investigate those suspected ones, and to mete proper punishment to anybody found guilty of espionage or collaboration with the Japanese administration;

5. To inculcate in the minds of the civilians the fact that the Filipinos will never be happy and contented under the Japanese regime, in view of the many abuses and unjust practices these people are accustomed to in their quest for glory and honor;

6. To help the civilians keep up their faith in the ability of the United States of America to achieve complete and ultimate victory in this War;

7. To give proper instructions to the civilians so that the existence of the TAMARAW GUERRILLA UNIT in this municipality might be kept secret only among the members of the organization and the civilians for whom the organization has been founded;

8. To effect timely contact with other guerrilla units and other friendly forces in order to help advance the national cause-- that of liberating the Philippines and the Filipinos from the hands of the ruthless invaders; and,

9. To encourage the civilians in cooperating with the organization for the accomplishment of the foregoing purposes.

March 8, 1942 - A detachment of Japanese infantry landed in Abra de Ilog and occupied the town. Unfortunately, a partial conflagration occurred, resulting in the loss of properties of civilians who were thus rendered homeless and without food for some time. The organization did its part to help stop the fire. Our identity as guerrillas was kept secret during the brief sojourn of the Japanese armed force. From the time of the arrival, during the stay, and until the departure of the enemy occupation troop, everything went on smoothly in town.

April 8, 1942 - We heard news that Bataan fell. Our gallant soldiers of the USAFFE, after their heroic stand, at last surrendered in view of the ever increasing pressure of Japanese forces bent on conquering Bataan. Some of the Ex-USAFFE men who escaped from Bataan and Atimonan sought their refuge in this town where we gave them accommodation.

May 9, 1942 - Corregidor collapsed for almost the same reasons as Bataan did. A few of ex-USAFFE men who served in Corregidor found their way to Abra de Ilog, after having successfully escaped from the hold of Japanese invaders. Our proper unit officers contacted these men and the organization as a whole extended all possible assistance to these persons.

June to September, 1942 - During this period the TGU, thru its officers, worked cooperatively toward the apprehension of malcontented people and other undesirable elements in all the

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territories under the jurisdiction of the municipality and the suppression of activities of such lawless people, so that complete peace and order may be secured and preserved. Instructions were given to civilians to cooperate with the organization in this regard. Japanese propagandas found in the hands of the civilians were confiscated and due warning were given to persons in whose possession such papers were found.

October, 1942 - A band of fully armed highway robbers who assumed themselves as ex-USAFFE soldiers committed act of banditry in town. Since we could not do anything the suppress such lawlessness, for we were all without firearms to resist them, by God's mercy nobody was hurt, and our only recourse was to submit and swallow the bitter pill.

November, 1942 - More disbanded ex-USAFFE men of the Philippine Army in Eastern Mindoro, where penetration was then in progress, found their way to this municipality to seek safety. During their short stay our TGU officers contacted them to know their mission. The organization gave them the necessary accommodation in the form of subsistence and sleeping quarters. We informed this disbanded soldiers of the abuses and unjust practices committed by the band of armed robbers in this municipality during October, 1942. Our ex-USAFFE refugees gave us assurances that they would do their best to help us suppress such lawlessness now and in the future. In fact, thru the cooperation of these disbanded men, no more bandits ever ventured to try their luck in town during this month.

December, 1942 - During the month public peace and order reigned over the municipality. Harmonious cooperation existed between the civilians and the TGU. Platoon leaders and their men were sent out on different missions which accomplished successfully.

January, 1943 - Intelligence work was intensified during the month. Our Intelligence and Communication men were sent out to different sectors of the municipality and findings gathered by these men were recorded. Meanwhile, the safety of ex-USAFFE was looked after in the different hideouts which were within contact in the municipality.

February, 1943 - A battalion of Japanese Infantry lead by Colonel Habi arrived in this municipality. Thru a public meeting held during their stay, the civilians and this organization were able to learn the mission of the Nippon force. We were informed of the good intentions of the Japanese government in suppressing communist banditry and other forms of lawlessness. The existence of the TGU and some disbanded Pa in the municipality was kept secret. Japanese military officers thru their interpreter announced their policy in the Philippines and asked the whole-hearted cooperation of the civilians in the proper enforcement of this policy. The armed force then proceeded thru the municipality of Mamburao and their organized a military garrison.

March, 1942 - During this month we sent confidential missions to Mamburao to garner information regarding actual doings of the Japanese soldiers and the reaction of the civilians toward the garrison authorities. Records of findings of such missions were carefully kept and our ex-USAFFE refugees apprised of latest developments of the enemy.

April, 1943 - A public meeting was held in which Japanese garrison commander Okumura advocated cooperation with the Japanese administration and asked full support from civilians toward the success of the Japanese government.



The detachment headed by Captain Okumura returned to Mamburao the following day.

May, 1943 - From time to time Intelligence work was undertaken to keep the organization informed of the activities of the Japanese garrison in Mamburao.

June, 1943 - A platoon of Nippon soldiers came to the town for patrol. The patrol force stayed only for a day then return to Mamburao, confident that the locality was already cleared of bandits and other evil elements that were a menace to public peace and order.

July, and August, 1943 - Ex-USAFFE soldiers who had been staying here under the protection of the TGU returned to join other guerilla unit in eastern Mindoro and elsewhere.

September, 1943 - Major E. P. Beloncio and his party of armed men arrived from eastern Mindoro where according to him he had organized several companies of guerillas. Our TGU officers contacted him and after learning their mission gave the new comers the necessary accommodation. Major Beloncio and party left this municipality and proceeded to Mamburao and Paluan.

October, 1943 - During the month Captains Enel Beloncio and Alfonso Usali with their respective companies of guerillas arrived from eastern Mindoro and requested our cooperation in the procurement of food supplies for their subsistence during their stay. The civilians thru the efforts of the TGU gave the necessary and sleeping accommodations of the eastern Mindoro guerillas under these two officers who are under Major Beloncio. The principles of these EM guerillas are the same as those for which the TGU has been founded and so harmony and cooperation existed between these two units.

November, 1943 - Sometime during this month information reached our company Headquarters that Major Phillips and party of Australian boys arrived at Paluan by submarine on advance Intelligence mission.

December, 1943 - More guerillas from eastern Mindoro passed thru this town in order to contact Major Phillips somewhere in Paluan. These guerillas were under Major Ruffy. During the period stay in this municipalities of such guerillas we gave them the customary cooperation thru the cooperation of the civilians. Our main work during the month was Intelligence and Communication with other units of guerillas of western Mindoro.

January, 1944 - Our Intelligence and Communication platoon were busier than before and all our efforts were directed toward the apprehension of espionage so that the presence and whereabouts of Major Phillips and party might be kept from spreading to other places.

February and March, 1944 - The most rigid penetration started in Paluan where Major Phillips and party were already operating their mission and extended as far as Mamburao and Abra de Ilog. On February 25, and Japanese patrol detachment under Captain Ogasawara arrived in this municipality via Cape Calavite by motor launch and did patrol work with the aid of the detachment of the puppet Philippine Constabulary which arrived here two or three days later.

During the heaviest penetration, the civilians seemed to cooperate with the Japanese forces, outwardly, but within their hearts and minds the welfare and safety of the members of the TGU were kept secret. Thru the whole-hearted cooperation of the civilians coupled with the utmost tact and diplomacy exercised by the local officials nobody from the town was divulged as supporting or giving assistance in any form to communist bandits or to any group of elements working against the Japanese government. Except for very insignificant cases, a few men were punished by the Japanese force for having been conniving with the guerillas but these men were at last declared innocent of the charges heaped against them by civilians from other towns. Although Japanese patrols under Capt. Itchi were searching every nook and corner of the municipality for the whereabouts of Major Philipps and party whom they suspected to have sought refuge in this municipality, our Intelligence and Communication Platoon immediately went out under cover to verify that suspicion and if ever it were true, steps were to be taken to insure the safety of the Major and his party. Notwithstanding the most rigid penetration undertaken by the combined Japanese and PC soldiers in every conceivable direction, our INC Platoon braved all odds and difficulties to contact Major Philipps and party. Unluckily, however, that American Officer was found and shot unaware by the lucky band led by Capt. Itchi according to other Japanese themselves. After giving the proper military honor to the deceased Officer, interment took place in the municipal cemetery. The joint Japanese and PC patrol forces, confident that the town was already cleared of bandits and other lawless people, left the municipality on or about 10 April.

April, 1944 - Sometime during this month our INC Platoon contacted Major Ramsey and party which arrived at sitio Matabang of this municipality. Our Commanding Officer thru the information of the INC Platoon also contacted the new comers in order to ascertain their mission. Immediately information was relayed that Major Ramsey came to investigate about the death of Major Philipps and to verify his mortal remains. During the short stay of this Party, the Civilians thru our initiative, gave the necessary accommodation. Some of our TGU personnel assisted in excavating the graveyard of Major Philipps and presented to him thru Lieut. Peralta of that Party, a gold tooth from the lower jaw for identification by Major Ramsey.

May & June, 1944 - An INC Platoon of the organized Guerilla Unit under Capt. William Dodson was performing operation in order to give reliable information about situation of the Japanese forces not only in Mindoro but also in Luzon. The TGU unit altho a separate and independent organization, was working coordinately with that under Capt. Dodson. The customary hospitality was accorded to this organized Unit by the civilians thru the efforts of the S-4 of the TGU. Everything went on smoothly between these two units on the one hand and the Civilians on the other.

July, 1944 - About the middle of the month Capt. Dodson and a few EM left unnoticed to contact Lieut. Commander Nicholson, USNR, special Party, SWPA, which according to information landed somewhere in Sablayan a week before the departure of Capt. Dodson. During the absence of Capt. Dodson in this place the remaining portion of his INC Platoon temporarily operating under Lieut. Rigor and the TGU Unit were working side by side so that the news of the landing might be kept secret among the Civilians and so that this news might not leak out to places where Japanese Forces were detailed not only in this province but also in Luzon.

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August and September, 1944 - During this months organized guerilla unit under Major Ruffy passed thru this town to contact Commander Nicholson and party at Sablayan. A group of Panay Guerilla 's also came this way. The only help we gave to these organized units was to furnish them with subsistence and sleeping accommodations. Our Company Officers gave information about the Nicholson party. During the latter part of September Capt. Gerry Berg, attached to the Special Party, SWPA, came to this town and contacted Filipino Guerillas. Then he made several trips to Luzon for searching confidential mission and returned safely to Sablayan. Next came Capt. Allan Hernandez, Adjutant to Commander Nicholson, accompanied by some Filipino Guerilla Officers and E.M. During the short stay of this new comers, our organization rendered the usual cooperation by furnishing the necessary subsistence and lodging. Capt. Hernandez made advanced Intelligence trips to Luzon and returned successful with his mission.

October, 1944 - On October 1st. the Special Party and Filipino Guerilla Units attached to it evacuated to this town under the leadership of Commander Nicholson because according to information they were raided by the Japanese in Sablayan. The whole Party began to establish camps in the sitio of Matabnag. They began their operation. A joint military and naval reservation known as Camp Nemitz was organized under the initiative of Commander Nicholson with the help and cooperation of the Civilians and the TGU of this municipality. Our local officials led the Civilians and the TGU in giving the necessary moral support and active cooperation toward the proper administration of the camp. Under the leadership of the Mayor assisted by the S-4 of the TG U, the procurement of food supplies for the subsistence of the whole party and the different materials for the building of shelters in the camp were made available. Organized guerilla unit under Major Ruffy was attached to the Special Party.

November, 1944 - From time to time guerrilla officers from Luzon contacted Commander Nicholson and Major Ruffy and make known their missions to these two officers. While the radio outfit of the Special Party was busy day and night in the Camp relaying and receiving latest information regarding events in the Pacific and in Europe, combat platoons as well as Intelligence and Communication troops attached to the Party were sent to the different localities of the province and to Luzon for military missions. A Japanese landing barge which seemed to seek safety somewhere in the seacoast village of Bagolayag of this municipality was sunk by a unit of armed guerrillas. Most of the crew were killed, leaving only about two Jap survivors who were then taken prisoners in the Camp. A week later a Japanese submarine chaser met the same fate in the hands of the guerrillas. From this vessel our guerrillas saved certain essential food supplies and clothing for their own use. Some survivors of the crew were also captured and taken as prisoners in the camp.

December, 1944 - Ever since the announced landing of the U. S. Armed Forces in Leyte in October, 1944 and a similar landing in San Jose, Mindoro, 15 December, 1944, rules and regulations in administering Camp Nimitz became more rigid than before. During this month, the TGU assisted the Special Party and the Guerrillas attached to it in the following ways:

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- a. Apprehending pro-Japs and reporting them to Major Ruffy and Commander Nicholson for immediate action;
- b. Sending separate intelligence missions to the different parts of the province and also to Luzon in order to gather first-hand information regarding actual situations of the enemy in the light of the announced landings in October and December, 1944;
- c. Furnishing the authorities concerned with all the findings gathered by the missions;
- d. Giving all possible assistance to American soldiers who arrived from time to time at the Camp direct from San Jose and elsewhere.

January & February, 1945 - The guerillas under Major Ruffy began to move somewhere in Eastern Mindoro most probably for reorganization and induction into the Philippine Army. Toward the end of February the Nicholson Party abandoned Camp Nimitz and moved somewhere in Luzon. Our organization, however, had been left behind.

March to May, 1945 - Two signal platoons of the U. S. Army occupied the Camp for RADAR operations. During the months the TGU rendered the usual cooperation to the RADAR forces by giving them necessary information about the doings of the Japs especially during their penetration days in Abra de Ilog and in other parts of the province and of the many abuses and inhumane practices committed in other portions of the Philippines.

June to December, 1945 - From the time the RADAR Platoons abandoned Camp Nimitz on or about 25 May, until the present time, the TGU personnel (officers and enlisted men alike) all returned to their respective normal pursuits of livelihood. We all looked hopefully forward to the time when all our unselfish and unprejudiced sacrificial services for the welfare of the civilians, the other guerrilla forces, and the armed forces of the United States of America in Mindoro, shall have been duly compensated.

#### Remarks

The Battalion Commanding Officer has been the choice of the great majority of the members of the organization.

With the aid of the Company Commanding Officers, the Battalion Commanding Officer has initiated and organized this troop, the roster of which appears under separate paper.

#### Miscellaneous

It is worthwhile mentioning the fact that our Mangyan brothers had been utilized to cooperate with the organization in the prosecution of the different activities undertaken and accomplished in accordance with the purposes of the guerrilla organization.

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

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
