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## UNIT HISTORY

### I

January 7, 1942 - Marikina occupied by Jap'sarrison; and those of Ganaps or Sabdalistas began their collaboration with the Nips. House to house in search of U.S. Military equipments began not forgetting rapes, and taking of personal belongings of civilians. The people in Marikina disliked the administration of Nips, respectively members of the community enlisted as so-called GUERRILLAS. In the approach of the year 1943, Capt. Amado (Bargio) Lakinto, and Lt. Burgie Lin began recruiting civilians to guerrillas, and spreading Anti-Japs propaganda due to the belief that the United States will have to liberate the Philippines. Day by day more and more recruits enlisted in HUNTERS or ROTC GUERRILLAS, for really they disliked the Japs administration. The same time the underground works of Ganaps existed. The recruits have sworn "NEVER TO SURRENDER". In staying in their camps in Tala and Usiw Mountains in Marikina, Rizal, they have encountered Japs and spies. They fought up to the last without retreating, and no casualty. Steadiness of the organization, until the town of Marikina became a Guerrilla Town, fighting against collaborators and Japs policies. The Japs in their effort to subdue the guerrilla activities in the town, think of the most possible way to make them surrender. As a means they have applied the so-called "zonification system". Weekly by weeks the town was zonified by the Japs military police. Those suspected ones, were tied, watered until to the last of their breath. Baseball bat as another means of making them shout to whether they are guerrillas are being used in whipping, but even the hard blows strike in the most delicate parts of their body they never squealed nor surrender.

Perchance this unit organized by the HUNTERS or ROTC GUERRILLAS in Marikina is to be one of those remarkable and not to be inseparable to the organization. They took risked in everything and every undertakings and followed up orders of immediate cause for the welfare of the GUERRILLAS. During the Japanese regime they were all on the alert, always on the call, and always on the way to fight, and to go an underground works against Jap's policies.

All of them are all "Old Timers" as a member of the organization and always have in mind and soul the phrase "Those who are not afraid to die are only fit to live in Freedom." The real factor of their activities are designated to be "Supply-Intelligence-Combat Group". The main CP stayed in the heart of the town, but a movable CP in which Japs and Spies couldn't locate them. They were always waiting for orders from their GC, and even though the job was hard to tackle they do it by hook or by crook. Sometimes platoons by platoons they went on different directions hauling the supplies and traveling cross-country way where the Japs will not be able to locate.

During those days they brought everything that they were unnecessary and illegal to be brought, and those suspicious things that was leading to any unknown place by the Japs in which, only the poor Guerrillas knew. Sometimes they were appearing as a farmer, a laundryman, and all those things and undertakings that ought not to be suspected. These poor and humble Guerrillas who were heading almost reached the hills of Gupang, Marikina, Gupahan, Barangbayan and Boca-boca. To them, two or three days travel by cross-country was not a hard job, still they have smile on their lips for the freedom they will get after all the hardships, was their great belief, and to what they swore.

All of them have encountered Japs and spies, so what's happening they have also movable CP in the hills and their last semi-permanent CP was in Gupahan, Gupang in Antipolo, Rizal. Every member of the Guerrilla Outfit really suffered from a common "malaria", and for them it's more better to stay in hills than to stay in town, even they were short of everything. When the American Forces arrived they have done a great help to them for they acted as guide and cheerlead to show out those hidden and to fight against them but because they were all in sick condition, they didn't took a long way with US Forces and so they quit and rest. All of them now are those unfortunate and somewhat forgotten GUERRILLAS of the Philippines, that was not being able to be recognized.

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HISTORY OF THE TOWN UNIT ORGANIZATION OF MARIKINA

On the middle of Feb., 1942 the Japanese Garrison stationed in Marikina with the help of the Filipino traitors began confiscating private properties of the civilians and those who refused were punished severely. Civilians, young and old who failed to salute were required to stay under the sun for hours. People suspected of concealing weapons were beaten and tortured. In some cases women were raped and violated. These and many others were the causes which lead to the formation of a outfit in this town under the leaderships of Pio F. Santos and Fakito Lopez. The aim of the organization were to harass the enemy and the Filipino spies and collaborators. The movement was started by contacting the Marikina's Guerilla stationed in the mountains of Antipolo. The organization was patterned after the regular U.S. army, comprising the G-1, G-2, G-3, and G-4.

During the Japanese occupation in the Islands it was not the policy of the outfit to encounter the enemy within the town fearing that once an actual fight is made, the civilian population would suffer more from the maltreatment of the enemy. Nevertheless, guerilla members were always ready to encounter the enemy, if in case they would be cornered. There was one instance when such an encounter was made within the town. It was in the early part of Sept., 1943, when about thirty Japs. soldiers raided a Guerilla headquarter in the Barrio of San Roque. The Guerillas cornered in the house had no other alternative, lent to fight for their escape, thus killing a Jap. Sgt. and wounding a soldier. There was no casualties sustained by the unit in that incident. The main objective of the outfit was to eliminate pro-Japanese Filipinos. There were about two hundred (200) pro-Japs. eliminated. In those raids against the pro-Japs. there was no casualties sustained by the outfit because they were done secretly. The expansion of the unit depended upon the prevailing circumstances during those time. The Japanese brutality towards the civilians created hatred and prejudice. Civilians went to the extent of revolting if it were not only due to the lack of arms. Due to the same brutality, male civilians were more inclined to be guerilleros and upon the arrival of newspaper like the Free Philippines and other GI Stuffs and modern weapons which were then as propaganda to the public. By these civilians were convinced to join the outfit. Arms and ammunitions were acquired by hook or by crook. Most of the arms were taken from secret places-places were the Ex-USAFV soldiers hid the arms and ammunitions. Others were taken from Filipino Collaborators who were killed by fellow-guerilleros and others were taken from those persons who own said arms before the war. The whole organization was able to acquire at least 105 rifles and pistols and around 6,000 rounds of ammunitions of different caliber. Sabotage work were done often and any means, like the cutting of communication wires during raid of the Trigger squad, putting holes on gasoline tanks of Jap. trucks. Many sabotage work were done smartly and secretly so that it was successful. Propagandas were spread thru printed matters and convincing prominent people in the town. The town unit organization was always in contact with the Battalion and Division Headquarters, particularly, with the first Battalion to which the Town Unit belongs, under Capt. Ben Liwanag. We, members of the town unit of Marikina gave available information about enemy positions, movements, and planned attack against our stationed men in their C.P.s thru our intelligence officer. Enemy defense positions, like the Airfield, at Farang, Antiaircraft emplacement, pillboxes and camps were revealed thru sealed maps, and handed to higher-up headquarters. The SWPA thru the higher headquarters required the unit to commence work more directly, particularly, on sabotage work. We responded immediately, and the boys began cutting every communication line from their C.P. located at Domingo Bautista's house to their respective surrounding garrisons. Lt. San Diego and his subordinates cut off the line connecting Quezon City and Marikina Garrison, while Lt. Demetrio Santos and his men cut off the line connecting Antipolo and Marikina Garrison. The enemy Airfield and Headquarters was reported by Lt. Ledigario Marcelino to the Provost Marshal's general Hdq. The boys working with Lt. San Diego in intelligence activities were also utilized as a combat team. They make use of enemy rifles and ammunitions in pursuing Japs. left in the community. The outfit's G.H.Q. however did not compelled us to work on intelligence along, supporting combats in their C.P.s in all their necessities. Civilians gave food and medicines thru the supply officers and distributed them to the different C.P.s. The unit assigned haulers who have to work night and day, during the transferring of foods from the town to the mountain troops. Carriers have also to do their job day and night to facilitate communications from town to the headquarters. The prominent sympathizers of the outfit in this locality are Angel Gomez, who gave 150 cavans of pala, and money. Dominador Nepomaceno gave more than 170 cavans of pala, and Japanese money, amounting to more than 390,00 pesos. Jose Santos the owner of the Rice Mill in Sto. Ninio gave us a ration of five gantas of rice every week and Emilio Cruz who own a plantation of Camoteng kaho, in Mazonso, Marikina supported us with camoteng kaho, if we lack rice.

The damage inflicted the unit was totalling to five four persons. The Makapilis (Ganap party) were used by the Japs in the apprehension of this people. The remaining personnels proceeded the movements and there was no change of command. The town people did not change their morale, they gave their support inspite of the shortage of foodstuffs but secretly than before due to the zonification. Inspite of the zonification done we did not lose contact with the higher headquarters for our men could sneak down town. Inspite of the Japanese propaganda our organization did not lose faith but continue their movement. In order not to destroy the morale of some of the members and civilians we launseed counter propaganda that the American libertos are near and that their hardships will be lessen. we continued on our combat and intelligence work and transacted it with Major Liberty, Major Tupas and Lt. Col. San Juan. when the American Liberators were heard to be in Manila, Japanese civilians and soldiers. There were 17 trucks convo, destroyed due to the lack of communications because the wires connecting their hdqs. were cut by some of the members of the organizations

When the Americans landed most of the members who don't have arms engaged in helping the civilians in evacuating the town for it was in eminent danger of bombardment and artiller, barrage. During the said evacuation members of this unit posted themselves in strategic places so as to act as guide and traffic for the civilians who were evacuating the town so as to prevent them from land mines and other bobby, traps left behind by the retreating Japs. Guards were also posted on places at the outskirts of the town to give signals or what may be necessary, in case Japs patrol may be seen. This Unit made first contact with the advancing American troops at Balara and Calungang. The troops stationed at Balara was the 1st Cavalry under Capt. Spencer and the troops stationed at Calungang was the 7<sup>th</sup> Cavalry under Capt. Taylor. Many of the boys were attached official, to the American troops. Members of this unit went with the road block posted by the 7<sup>th</sup> Cavalry troops at the Barric of Calungang. This road block was responsible for the destruction of 17 trucks convo, of the Japanese. Members of the unit also gave information and acted as guides to show Japanese concentrations. When the Civil Affairs section ~~of the~~ arrived in Marikina members of this unit gave all the necessary help to speed labor necessary for front line work, such as hauling supplies, ammunitions and evacuation of the wounded. Due to the shattered situation of the Municipal Government peace and order was strictly enforced by the M.P. of this Unit. The control of foodstuffs and prices was also under the supervision of this Unit.

At present the majority of the members are working in Militar. projects now under construction. Some are making shoes which is the principal industry in our town. Even they are not in actual duty, still there is a contact with the officers and other members of the Organization. However the organization does not function as a whole, but most of them are working for the benefit of the public and majority are working in Militar. construction. Some are attached to the M.P. command of the outfit stationed thereat. Some are intending to be in the Army while others prepare to have a civilian life.
