The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the San Juan Erritumo Unit, Bunters ROTG, purporting to be a guerrilla organisation under your nominal control, has not been Zavorahly considered for recognition.

It is felt that the number of man recognised in the Higuel Ver Regiment, Bunters RCC, a composite unit of the overall command, under Col Masuterio Adevoco, constitutes a just and adequate admowledgement of the military services performed by the Hunter's RCCC unit.

This decision does not preclude individual requests for casualty recognition by injured personnel who desire to enter such claims. Upon request from interested individuals, appropriate casualty forms will be formarised.

SUBJECT: History of the Organization and Account of Activities of the 44th Regiment, 44 numbers Division, Runters R.O.T.C. Guerrillas, San Juan Ermitaño Unit, from the time of its organization on 8 rebruary 1944 up to the present.

TO : The COMMANDING OFFICER, Hunters needquarters.

As commending officer of the San Juan Ermiteño Unit, I have the honor to submit to this neadquerters a history of the organization and an account of the activities of the said unit from the time of its organization on 8 rebruary 1944 up to the present.

Being the organizer and ultimately the commanding officer of the Sen Juan Ermitaño Unit, I feel it is but just and proper that I submit first my own personal history and activities before that of the unit.

Frior to the outbreek of the war on 8 December 1941, my family and 1 were residing in Marikina, Rizel. I was engaged in the business of supplying gravel and sand to various construction works. In 1940, when the Michols Field and the Cavite Mayy fard were under construction, I was under contract with the U.S. Army and mayy to supply the construction work with gravel and sand. Even after the Japanese heavy eir attacks on annila, I kept on making deliveries of the much needed sand for sandbage to the marsman building at rort Area which was later used as the Admiral's Office. But after 15 December 1941, when conditions become worst and activities of all sort came to a stend still, I settled down regretfully with my family in our howe town.

It was while in Marikins, Rizal, that I was appointed Police Patrol and Volunteer Guard of the Civilian Emergency Administration (CEA) in accordance with Execumergency Administration (USA) in accordance with insecu-tive Order No. 335. (Flesse refer to Exhibit "A" attach-ed hereto.) Before the Imperial Japanese Forces finally succeeded in occupying the area, the Civilian Emergency Administration and all its units were disbended. The no-tual occupation of Marikina took place on 22 Japanery 1942. Faced with no other alternative I, together with my family, within a reasonable time before actual occupation by enemy forces, fled to the Antipolo mountein and stayed there in comparative safety up to June of that year. During our hiding in the Antipolo mountain I succeeded, after exerting some effort in contacting the disbanded American soldiers from Infanta, Tayabas, and from the sicol regions, who were then making their way under the most hazardous circumstances to Batasa via the Sierra Madre mountains. Knowing the predicament of these straggling American soldiers, I took it upon myself the duty and privilege to give them all possible aid and assistance within the limit of my resources. In certain cases I went further and looked around and tried to get from other willing sources the much needed food and other items of personal necessity which these American soldiers could not without much difficulty secure in that very much scaluded place.

As these Americans did not know the intricacies of mountain trails, I saw to it that they were provided with reliable guides thereby enabling them to know the shortest way possible to their place of destination, and save time and effort.

When I fied to the mountain I took with me the truck which I was using in supplying send and gravel as I have already atated. For sometime I thought this truck was sage and secure in its place of hidding. Possession of this valuable family asset was, however, wrested from me when a considerable number of "Makkapilis", members of an organization of Filipino traitors, came along and threatened my life if I did not consent to have the truck taken to town and be offered to the Japanese Garrison, so that it might be used for fecilitating movement of the enemies and their supplies. Under the circumstance I had no other recourse, nor anybody else in my place, than to give up hope of retaining the truck. With the truck my family and I were taken to town by the Makapilis' who presented the truck to the commander of the Marikina Japanese Garrison through their interpreter named Takahasi.

This act of utter disregard of proprietary rights of Filipino citizens which is amply secured by the fundamental law, the almost daily occurence of inhuman treatment of Filipinos by the Japanese soldiers and the "Makapilis", and my unquestioned loyalty and allegiance both to the Commonwealth government that sought refuge in Washington and to the government of the United States of America, were the compelling force that drove me to immediate action. I wasted no time in finding ways and means of making contact with leaders of the underground movement.

It was not long after, when in November 1942, I heard that a guerrilla unit was being organized in San Juan, Rizal, by a certain Ernesto Tupas. From Marikina I immediately proceeded to San Juan and succeeded in having a first meeting with the guerrilla leader. I was readily admitted a member of the organization on 1 December 1942. The first work assigned to me was to campaign for membership and counteract Japanese propaganda. We were convinced of the success of our drive by the remarkable increase in the registration of members. Unfortunately for us and for the cause we promise to uphold, our leader, Mr. Ernesto Tupas, was arrested four times for alleged guerrilla activities. Although lucky to escape confinement in the first three instances, he did not have the same luck in the fourth of time that he was arrested for then he was sentenced to/mprisoned and was, as a matter of fact, confined at Munting-luce Billbid Prisons.

The fate that has befallen our leader had its adverse effect on the morale of the organization. The growing conscient of the we were being closely observed and shadowed by the "Mekapilis" and the Japanese Military Police and other agents forced us to temporarily disband ourselves as a matter of precaution.

In the meantime, urged by strong desire to do my bit in siding the allied **63466**, I kept on looking around for other underground units to which I could possibly attach myself. In July 1945, it was my good fortune to meet one

Amado "Baggie" Lakointo, then a first sergeant in the Hunters or R.O.T.O. generilla. I immediately enlisted in his unit as a private. I was assigned to stay in the town of Marikine to gather food supplies and other provisions for the guerrillas of the unit. These supplies were generously contributed by the sympathetic townpeople.

Although our unit has already moved to infanta, Tayyabas, following instructions, I stayed in Marikina. In January 1944, our unit returned to Antipolo mountain after some sort of reorganization of the unit resulting in the promotion of former sergent Amado "Baggie" Lakcinto to the rank of Major. In recognition of past services refered, I was on 4 January 1944 promoted to first sergeent, Intelligence Unit. (Please refer to attached Embidt "B") I continued with my assignment in Marikina and as a member of the Intelligence Unit, my job in addition to the procurement of food supplies and other provisions, was to report all atrocities and other forms of Amaltreatment committed by the Japanese and "Makapilis" in that town. Leter, a supply unit was organized in Santo Mine, Marikina, and I was designated to take charge of said unit. (Please refer to Exh. "C" attached herewith.)

On 1 April 1944, I received "Brecial Order" of the following tenor: "Effective this date, the following promotion are hereby made in the Rizal District Headquarters of the Field Commander, "THE HUMBERS" to be third lieutenant PERNE CARRIEL" By virtue of the same Special Order, I was designated Commanding Officer of the Supply Unit in Santo Niño, Marikina, Rizal. (Please refer to attached Eth. "D".)

During the time I was Supply Officer, I have fed and given shelter in my own housefall the guerrilles coming from Melabon, Menile, Parañaque, and Mendeluyong, bound for our headquarters in the Antipolo mountain. My attachment to the guerrillas and my activities as a member thereof came to a point when concealment was never possible. Constent contect and association with almost countless people to find out things we wanted to know and to get things we then needed necessarily exposed me to the hazard to which a guerrilla's life was subject. It was hard then to ascertain who of the many people I have contacted were with us in the cause and who were not. Those who were not with us must have played the trick. And so the inevitable came. A wanted man I became and a wanted man I remained in San Juan, Rizal, the place I sought as reguge.

mefore I left Marikina, for San Juan, Rizal, I reported to our Headquarters at Antipolo mountain. There I was informed of my promotion to Second Lieutenant and at the same time designated as Organizer Officer of "LIMBAS SECTOR" in San Juan, Rizal. (Please refer to attached Exh. "E").

ORGANIZATION OF THE SAN JUAN ENGLIAND UNIT, LINEAS SECTIOR. - As Organizer Officer and in compliance with the instructions accompanying my designation, I immediately organized the Cuber, Kamuning, Tetalon, and Salapang Units. Even before my designation as Organizer Officer, I had already, though tentatively, formed these units as early as February 1944, together with the San Juan Ermitsho Unit.

BARTICULAR ACTIVITIES OF THE SAN JUAN ERRITARO UNIT. On 20 September 1944, I was, by 44th MUNITERS) Division
Special Order No. 45-b, assigned to the 44th Division,
4th MD, and instructed to be on duty as commander of SAN
JUAN SUPPLY UNIT, 44th Division. (Please refer to Exh. "Y")

Following such instruction, I assumed command of my unit. I ordered my men to gather whatever firearms and ammunitions were available so that they could be delivered to our headquarters in antipolo for the immediate use of our men. These firearms and ammunitions totaling 15 rifles, 5 pistols of 45 calibre, and about 4,000 rounds of emmunitions of different calibers, were taken from members and non-members of the organization who were able to conceal them. In addition to these firearms and ammunitions, my men also succeeded in securing about 500 sacks of rice during the period from 20 September 1944 up to the day of liberation. The following sum of money in Japanese Military notes were given to and received by Major Ernesto Tupas (who was rescued from the Muntinglupa Bilbid Prisons by co-guerrillas) in the amount of PlO,000.00 and Major Dado Montes in the amount of PlO,000.00.

In October 1934, our unit, Sam Juan Ermitaño Unit, took charge of evacuating an entire company of the General Service Troops (8.5.T.) of the Philippine Constabulary of the puppet government, with all their arms and equipments, These constabulary soldiers deserted their post and joined our guerrilla unit in the Antipolo mountains. While in transit from their post to the Antipolo mountains, the Sam Juan Ermitaño Unit under my command provided them with the necessary supply of rice, dried fish, and money 2

In November 1944, our first set back designed perhaps to test the mettle of our men, the firmness of their resolve, and the courage of their heart, came. As was always possible. the Japanese Kempeis, through the instrumentality of some "Makepilis" rounded up our unit resulting in the arrest of twenty meven of our men, who inevitably found their way to Fort Santiago. Of this number all were tortured and finalexecuted except four who, through Divine help and will, esp caped the gallows. In spite of this morale-destroying casualties, the remaining members of our unit did not falter in their firm resolve to carry on. This state of things may be attributed first, to the ever increasing hatred to the Japanese and second, to the unswerving loyalty and devotion to a cause that is more than worth anybody's life. At this time, as in times past, we were in possession of the know-ledge of the tremendous advance made by the Allies in this theater of operation. It was this knowledge that encouraged every man in the unit to work harder than ever before especially in the vital and very indispensable task of securing and making available for the use of the fifferent units food supplies and other provisions. I said vital and indispensable because in those dark days of 1944, such items of necessity were as scarse and as hard to secure as never before in the history of the country. There were very very few even among the well-to-do who could, without detriment to their/Selves part with what would now be considered a very trifling amount. And so, considering this circumstance, our men have to double their efforts to get by whatever means and at whatever easte these items of necessity.

The Rizelde Trigger Unit of the R.O.T.C. made contact with us and requested supplies. We were able to give them Japanese notes amounting to P40.000.00.

During the months of December 1944 and January 1945, our line of communication with our Headquarters at Antipolo was cut due to the fact that all way leading to it from our scotor became heavily guarded by Japanese sentries. Nevertheless, we continued with our intelligence work taking note as always of movements of enemy troops in anticipation of a possible chance to relay the information to our Headquarters so that it may in turn transmit it to the command concerned.

When, on 3 February 1645, the forces of liberation started entering Manila and the Japanese remaining garriaons in the City commenced, presumably under orders from their respective commanders, to the wips out the civilian population and destroy civilian properties before retreating, we armed outselves, and as an organized body sullied forth in defense of themehelpless civilians. Our scivilians them were confined in San Juan, Himal, where retreating Japanese soldiers begun the messacre or civilians irrespective of age or sex and wherever found. Not being able to suffer seeing and witnessing such men's inhumanity to men, we in our unit, after occupying a vantage position on 7 February 1945, opened fire at a company of Japanese soldiers at the San Juan new reservoir. In this encounter ten of the men in our unit gallantly died in action. They were: Jesus Reges, Eustaquio Cruz, Zacerias Esmedicto, Transisco Dison, Ireneo Reyes, Francisco Libita, Antonio Libita, Toriano Mangahas, Santos Mangahas, and one whose name I no longer remember. This list of casualties has already been duly recorded and reported to our Headquartegs and forwarded to the AFWESFAC.

On 8 February 1945, our unit met the American First Catalry Division at Broadway street, New Manila, and guided them to the unmined roads leading to San Juan, Rizal. We joined the American troops in the mopping up operation in the town. From San Juan we led the American soldiers to Mandaluyong and it was there that they instructed us to return to San Juan. Upon recoling San Juan, we met the Bomb Disposal Unit of the American First Cavalry and aided them in their job of locating and disposing off bombs and other explosives by pointing and indicating to them the mines planted by the Japanese from N. Domingo street to Fines-lebanen street and the White Cross building, From them on we continued reporting to our Headquarters which was transferred to Tagaytay, Cavite, and there we resumed receiving orders from time to time until the question of recognition of unit came up. Since then we held series of conferences where ways and means of having our unit recognized were discussed. Hence, the present proceedings for recognition.
