

Dear Mr. dela Cruss

The Commanding General has directed that you be informed that the 5th Provisional Regiment, Tarlac Rest Sector, ECLGA, purporting to be a guerrilla organization under your nominal control, is not favorably considered for recognition as an element of the Philippine Army.

A set of general requirements for guerrilla recognition, established by General MacArthur during the liberation of the Philippines, has been used as a guide in considering the record of this unit. After careful investigation and full consideration of all substantiating records and testimony of witnesses having pertinent knowledge, recognition of this guerrilla unit is not deemed to be warranted because of reasons mentioned below:

- a. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence.
- b. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy.
- c. Activities of the unit did not contribute materially to the eventual defeat of the enemy.
 - d. A definite organization was not established.
- Adequate records were not maintained (names, ranks, dates of enlistment or joining, dates of promotions, and necessary related information).
- f. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization.
- g. Members of the unit did not devote their entire effort to military activities in the field to the exclusion of normal civilian eccupation.
 - Many members apparently lived at home, supporting their

families by means of farming or other civilian purcuits, and assisted the guarrilla unit on a part time basis only.

i. Some personnel listed as members of the unit assisted it by contributing money and supplies but did not serve in a capacity considered to justify such membership.

This decision on the proposed unit roster does not preclude submission for individual easualty recognition by those individuals who are qualified and feel justified in entering such claims. Upon request by interested individuals, appropriate forms will be forwarded.

It is requested that you comply with the provisions of Executive Order No. 68, by the President of the Philippines, dated 26 September 1945, copy attached.

- 2. This unit does not fulfill the requirements of the five basic points. See attached Team Leader's Report.
- 3. No useful purpose will be accomplished by further investigation of this unit. This is an initial investigation of an initial roster.

4. There are no members worthy of recognition and the unit suffered no easualties.

Report on "5th Provisional Regiment, Tarlac West Sector, ECLGA"

- 1. Second Lieutenant James R. Benton proceeded to Camiling, Tarlac, on 12 February 1947, to investigate the 5th Provisional Regiment, Tarlac West Sector, ECIGA.
 - 2. ALLEGED HISTORY: (See attached unit file)

3. FINDINGS:

a. The following persons were interviewed and their statements are reflected in the findings:

- b. Record of service was not substantiated by sufficient acceptable evidence. This organization, under the command of Capt Juan Q. Reyes, remained absolutely passive during the occupation. It was not in any sense a wellorganized guerrilla unit, due partly to the lack of arms and to the fact that the majority of the members were attached to other guerrilla units. There is no supporting evidence presented to substantiate their claims to have actively engaged in intelligence work, propaganda, or sabotage. Incl #1,i.e., "Authority to organize the Fifth Provisional Regiment from Captains A. Hendrickson and Ray C. Hunt Jr. does not necessarily prove that the unit existed or was ever organized; it is merely the authority for organization. When Lt Macario dela Cruz, the unit's highest officer present during the investigation, was asked to present the originals of Incls #1, #2, #3, and #4 and any other supporting papers that the unit might possess, he stated that the unit was unable to do so. When requested to present the old original roster of the unit, he divulged the fact that the unit had none, fearing the Japanese might capture it. It is clearly indicated, therefore, that the unit was not maintained as an organization and had not opposed the Japanese during the occupation.
- c. The unit was not maintained satisfactorily in the field in opposition to the enemy because the unit's commanding officer, Captain Juan Q. Reyes, was attached to the Allied Intelligence Bureau, Tarlac West Sector, at that time under the command of Captain Bon Cruz, during the period for which the unit claims activation. (See Incls #2 and #4). Rollowing statements of leading guer-rilla leaders in this province, who are already recognized, indicate that the unit did not exist as an active guerrilla unit during the occupation.
- d. A definite organization was not established by this unit because the officers and enlisted men during the occupation were either attached to other guerrilla units or lived with their families and pursued normal civilian occupations. None of the members interviewed could indicate their area of operation during the occupation.

- e. Performance of the unit did not indicate adequate control by its commanding officer because officers and enlisted men of this unit were attached to other guerrilla units, and the commanding officer himself was attached to the Allied Intelligence Bureau, Tarlac, West Sector, during the time for which the unit claims to have been active.
- f. Unit did not show satisfactory continuity of activity and organization, because none of the members interviewed could show any outstanding achievement accomplished during the occupation nor show any supporting evidence which would substantiate their claims.
- g. It must be noted that one week prior to the investigation of the subject unit the investigating officer personally made an appointment to investigate the unit. On 11 February 1947, the day before the appointed time of the investigation, the investigating officer spoke to Lt Macario dela Cruz, one of the unit's officers, who was responsible for getting the unit together and preparing them for the investigation. He reminded dela Cruz of the interview and investigation scheduled for the following day and asked if the details for the investigation were prepared. Dela Cruz stated that they were. However, on the following day, at the appointed time for the investigation, only three members showed up for the investigation, Lt Macario dela Cruz, S/Sgt Crispino Pascual, and Pfc Vesbiterio Bautista. Upon being asked why no more members of the unit were present, Lt Macario dela Cruz, in a very uninterested manner, stated that the remaining members were either in the Philippine Army, living in distant localities, or were not available for interviewing.
- h. When interviewed, Pfc Vesbiterio Bautista, listed on the roster as a member of "B" Company, Anoling Detachment, of the subject unit, stated that he had never heard of the Fifth Provisional Regiment. He knew of Lt Macario dela Cruz, Captain Bon Cruz and Captain Juan Q. Reyes only as being attached to the Allied Intelligence Bureau, Tarlac West Sector, and he himself claimed to have been a member of the same organization.
- i. Mention of the fact must be made that Captain Juan Q. Reyes, the unit's commanding officer, was never contacted as he is in the Philippine Army and stationed in Ilocos Norte. However, the investigating officer is satisfied with the investigation as conducted and deems the evidence obtained sufficient to substantiate the recommendation that the unit be not favorably considered for recognition.
- j. No useful purpose will be accomplished by further investigation of the unit. There are no members worthy of recognition and the unit suffered no casualties.

4. POLITICAL ASPECTS:

This unit does not appear to have any political affiliations or aspirations.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the Fifth Provisional Regiment, Tarlac West



SUBJECT: Recognition of Guerrilla Unit

TO : AFWESPAC, Manila (Thru Guerrilla Affairs, PA)

- 1. Request that our unit, formerly attached to the GHQ Philippine Section, Tarlac West Sector (AIB) under Capt Luis Quindiagan alias Bon Cruz, be recognized.
- 2. Following is the historical background of our out-

Under a written authority dated 24 February 1943 by Capt Albert Hendrickson, Division Commander and Capt Ray C. Hunt Jr., Deputy Area Commander, Central Luzon Guerrilla Armed Forces, USAFFE, the Fifth Provisional Regiment was organized on 3 March 1943. Due to lack of personnel then because of hard pressure by the Japanese authorities, this regiment was started with only a few men. Capt Juan Q. Reyes, regular USAFFE Officer was designated as the Commanding Officer.

A company was designated to stay in one place so that "A" Company was organized at Malacampa, Camiling, Tarlac; "B" Company at Anoling of the same town and province; and "C" Company at Mayantoc, Tarlac. The Headquarters was set up on the hills of Mayantoc. The designated officers were as follows:

"A" Company

1st Lt Teofilo S. Lapitan Commanding 2d Lt Andres S. Lapitan Executive Off

"B" Company

2d Lt Macario dela Cruz Commanding 2d Lt Estanislao Rafael Executive Off

"C" Company

1st Lt Dominador Santos Commanding 2d Lt Fortunato Corpuz Executive Off

With everything starting from a scratch, the job turned out to be tough at first. Japanese soldiers and Filipino spies used to patrol at these places, but with courage and utmost care, things ran out silently and smoothly.

Under the able leadership of Capt Juan Q. Reyes, this skeleton regiment turned out to be a good one. In the meantime, released prisoners from the Concentration Camp at Capas, Tarlac, after enough recuperation from the illness they contacted, with courage of a Filipino soldier still running in their veins, the savagery of the present administration and the incessant sufferings of the people still fresh from their minds prompted them to report for duty. Their hearts were shouting for revenge to those maltreatments the "iron hand clothe in velvet glove" was giving. This was a cornerstone to the expansion and success of the regiment.

With things fixed up temporarily, the Commanding Officer began training those courageous few volunteers under camouflage by the tall and spreading coconut palms. The purpose of this was to inculcate discipline into their minds as soldiers ought to be and to prepare the men of the great task that waiting before them. They were not only learning but at the same time they were helping much to prosecute the successful eradication of the enemy by sabotage and counter espionage.

Although sometimes tortured by the Japanese soldiers, the civilians of this places played a great part in the procurement of subsistence of the soldiers. They even sacrificed their lives for the protection of this outfit to help free their country in its hour of destruction and oppression. With mouth shut and firm determination, they concealed what was really happening under their noses before the scorching eyes of the invader.

By the first week of September 1944, the Japanese soldier and Filipino spies were always busy pricking their ears for any bit of information they could gather. Suspicion began to arouse in their heads. Every day, the Japanese authorities send one or two spies, clothe as swine dealers (as was known later) to set their eyes upon what was really going on in these places without the knowledge of the civilians and the members of the regiment.

By the middle of the same month, the spies gathered enough information from unknown sources building up their suspicion into a solid one. Frequent raids by the Japanese soldiers in the house and in the hideout of Capt juan Q. Reyes followed and even resulted in the torture of the Company Commander of "A" Company at Malacampa, lst Lt Teofilo S. Lapitan. But as a loyal soldier to his outfit and much more to his country, he kept his mouth shut in spite of the "water treatment" given him. The Japanese threatened to burn his house. The company com-


mander, then sensing danger, not only to himself but to the members of the whole outfit and to his family as well, he burned all important papers of the company and left to unknown destination, who, until now is still missing. The unknown whereabouts of the company commander of "A" Company and because the members of the two companies were hard to contact during those crucial days, "A" company was forced to break under such circumstances.

On 1 October 1944, Capt Luis Quindiagan, alias
Bon Cruz, Allied Intelligence Bureau representative,
have learned of the activities and courage of the members
of the regiment. On the same date, he wrote a Memorandum to 2d Lt Andres Lapitan, the Executive Officer of "A"
Company to assume command and continue the activities
of the same company. Under the same Memorandum, the regiment, while under the command of Capt Juan Q. Reyes,
was further attached to the GHQ Philippine Section Tarlac West Sector, A.I.B. Unit, under the command of
Capt Luis Quindiagan. With the determination to avenge
his brother, Lt Andres Lapitan called all the members
of the company and told them of the memoranda which he
had received. With cheers in their hearts, the men formed
again a still better outfit than the first one.

A revamp of the company followed with Lt Andres S.
Lapitan as Detachment Commander; 2d Lt Federico D. Licud,
Executive Officer; and 2d Lt Fabian Quesada, Intelligence
Officer under the authority of Capt Juan Q. Reyes, while
the two other companies remained under the same officers.

The sacrifices of the members of the regiment were unequaled but without regrets in their hearts and with eyes looking forward into the bright days when the islands will be liberated from the savage invaders, they continued their counter espionage activities not a bit hampered by lack of arms and ammunitions.

A few days after the landings of the American Troops at Lingayen, Pangasinan, the regiment obtained sufficient arms from the retreating Japs whom the members had killed and captured. Acting under direct orders from Capt Luis Quindiagan, bridges made by the enemy were demolished to hamper their fast retreat. Before the American Troops arrived at their places, Japanese soldiers were already cleared of the town. In this town (Camiling) members of the outfit were assigned to met retreating Japs from the north. Not only the members fought but with men of whom their hearts were filled with hatred and anger to the enemy, killed all Japs passing thru the town, with only crude arms and bolos.

Under the Proclamation of the President of the Philippine Commonwealth ordering all ex-USAFFE men to report to the nearest replacement depots, the members of the outfit, mostly ex-USAFFE Men, were forced to report to their respective units. The members were officially released from the GHQ Philippine Section - Tarlac West Secor (AIB Unit) on 18 February 1945 by the commanding Officer, Capt Luis Quindiagan alias Bon Cruz.

The return of Capt Luis Quindiagan to the United States and our reporting to the nearest replacement depot had resulted in the neglect of requesting for the recognition of our Guerrilla Unit.
