This will acknowledge receipt of your letter, dated 25 May 1948, requesting further consideration of Johnson's Guerrillas, Olongapo Sector, Zambales Military District, with regard to the revision of its recognition dates and forwarding papers in support of your request.

It is desired to inform you that pursuant to the policy of this headquarters to review the records of all recognized guerrilla units for possible revision of recognition dates, the records of the Zambales Military District were restudied. As a result of this protracted review, the Zambales Military District (ZMD), of which Johnson's Guerrillas, Olongapo Sector was a subordinate element, was favorably considered for revision of recognition dates by this headquarters on 27 February 1948. It is considered that the revision of dates accorded the Olongapo Sector constitutes just and adequate acknowledgment of the military service rendered. The inclusion of the names of deserving personnel on the revision roster was the responsibility of the commanding officer of the ZMD, Mr. Ramon Magsaysay. It is considered that decisions and selections thus made were the result of sound consideration and unbiased judgment, fully worthy of the trust and resultant credence which this headquarters places in rosters thus presented for recognition.

Inasmuch as the approval by this headquarters on 27 February 1948 of the revision roster of the Zambales Military District constitutes the final determination of and action upon the official periods of recognition of all recognized elements of the ZMD, this headquarters cannot favorably consider any requests for further consideration for revision of recognition dates of any of the recognized subordinate elements of the ZMD.

S I R :

I have been reliably informed that your Command has already made adjudication on the claims of the MAGAYSAY GUERRILLA FORCES for arrears in pay corresponding to three months, thereby indicating that the facts and circumstances obtaining of record are insufficient to justify a different action. The Olongapo Guerrilla Sector which I had the privilege of organizing and of which was the over-all commander, being a part and parcel of the MAGAYSAY GUERRILLA FORCES and therefore has to suffer the same fate as others, I beg leave to take advantage of this opportunity in addressing you this letter and to request that from the facts herein stated a different form of action be taken by your Command on the particular case of my organization (Olongapo Guerrilla Sector).

Before I proceed, allow me to state that in submitting this letter for your consideration, I was guided by the best of intention to bring out to the limelight facts and circumstances that perchance had not been brought to your official attention, or had escaped your scrutiny undoubtedly, the evidence herewith submitted will open a new avenue to truth and perchance in the interest of justice lead your good office to re-examine the adjudication aforementioned insofar as it concerns my organization.

With a view to giving your good office a clear perspective of the circumstances under which the Olongapo Guerrilla Sector was conceived and organized, I beg leave to submit to you herewith a comprehensive history of said Sector supported in material points by documentary proofs which I am willing to produce upon request and at such time as you may deem proper. And to further strengthened my stand on the matter brought up by this letter, allow me also to submit herewith the letter of Sgt. J. P. Boone which clearly shows that my organization was already active way back in 1942.

I, for one, have absolute faith and confidence in your good sense of justice and fair dealings with all alike irrespective of race, color and creed, as you and I and the rest of us have been united by that spirit of oneness both in time of war and in time of peace. I hope that your good office will not fail to see its way clear by administering justice to whom justice is due.

In the light of all the foregoing, I respectfully request for a re-examination of the case of my organization by considering the documentary evidence herewith submitted. Before closing, however, I beg leave also to request that I be granted an audience at such time as you may deem convenient so that I may present such further proofs as you may require and elucidate matters on which you may like to ask.

1. In view of the following facts, reconsideration of the "back-pay" decision for Johnson's guerrillas, Olcngapo, Zambales is hereby requested:

The undersigned is the former Commanding Officer of Bataan M.D. and because of the geographical location of Bataan and Zambales, was very closely associated with Johnson's guerrillas from middle 1942 until the liberation of the area.

I knew of the association between Capt E.S. Johnson and Capt. McGuire, Sgt. Higgins, Sgt. Gateley and other American guerrilla operators. I knew of the beginning of the Johnson guerrillas in May 1942 when they organized under the command of Capt. McGuire. The organization served continuously thru the years of the occupation and their guerrilla work was always outstanding. They kept up a continuous harassing action against the enemy on the highways and in the remote areas of southern Zambales. Their work in procuring weapons, ammo, and supplies from the surrender area in Bataan was outstanding from May 1942 thru 1943. Much of this equipment eventually found its way to my organization. The organization also continuously aided straggler Americans in Zambales province until liberation and no doubt, were responsible for saving American lives.

In December 1942, Lt. Col. E.P. Ramsey, the eventual Commanding Officer of ECLGA and who was living in my guerrilla Hqrs. at the time, visited and inspected "Johnson's guerrillas". Upon his return to Bataan he reported a very efficient organization and was interested in including it in his overall command. He repeated his inspection the following month.


Capt. Johnson and myself continuously corresponded with each other during the occupation. We exchanged intelligence reports and in various other ways coordinated our guerrilla affairs at all times until liberation.

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The undersigned believes "Johnson's guerrillas" have never been credited or paid for their services because the organization was never able to be properly coordinated under any one properly authorized organization. Many American Commanders, at various times, attempted to assume command of Olongapo including the undersigned. After the death of Capt. McGuire, the original overall commander of Johnson's guerrillas, Col. Giles Merrill assumed command at the same time as Lt. Col. Ramsey. A little later Lt. Col. Anderson directed Capt. Johnson to take orders from him. But in face of the misunderstanding on the part of the American guerrillas, Johnson's Guerrillas still continued to serve with credit to the cause, until liberation when they were attached to various US Army units. After that attachment, I am sure their record speaks for itself.

In view of the above facts and as just due to one of the outstanding, active guerrilla organizations of Central Luzon, it is respectfully requested the decision of payment of back pay to Johnson's Guerrillas be reconsidered.

I have arranged to hold a conference at this Headquarters with you, Sis, and Hosing present, regarding the final set up of this Organization. I have sent a message to Hosing to come here with you and I therefore request that you wait for him at Castillejo so that you can duly be notified on the exact date of the trip.

You are also requested to submit a daily report to this Headquarters of the number of Japanese soldiers and sailors present in or near Olongapo. This daily report must be as accurate as possible and should distinguish between Japanese Military personnel and Japanese Civilians. This information is important in order that careful plan may be made for the use of our forces and it is especially important at a place like Olongapo where the number of enemy troops fluctuates frequently.

Chow has informed us of your plan to move your men to a new place. This plan is approved and should be put into execution at once. Our supply officer, Canonizado, will furnish the necessary guides.

HISTORY
OF
JOHNSON'S GUERRILLAS AND
THE PRESENT ORGANIZATION

*Capt. Ralph McGuire
6-53776*

Way back in 1942, before the downfall of Bataan and Corregidor, aggression and tyranny developed heroic leaders, whose ideals were love of country, justice and freedom. Among these loyal American Officers sent out from the fields of battle was Captain Ralph McGuire of the United States Army to organize Guerrilla Movements in the Island of Luzon. This energetic Officer went purposely in the dense jungles of Zambales mountains to establish his Guerrilla Headquarters. He selected from each town of Zambales the most capable men to lead and organized the Resistance movement. Among the selected few in the Province who were chosen to shoulder the responsibilities of massing together the scattered elements into a solid block to resist the enemy was Capt. EDWARD S. JOHNSON, a young energetic man who is matured in experience.

Capt. Ralph McGuire sent a written request to E.S. Johnson to meet him at Pamerit, (outskirt of Olongapo) on 12 May 1942, but due to circumstances prevailing at that time, the two were not able to contact each other. However, after the lapse of few days, 25 May 1942, Johnson received another message from Lt. Elmer Ogle and Sgt. Arthur Higgins, USA, Staff members of Capt. McGuire. The contents of the message read as follows: "AKO - Upon receipt of this communication, you are hereby ordered to organize a Resistance Movement against the Japanese. Induct fifty (50), men whose loyalty are unquestionable into the Organization. Exert the necessary pressure against the enemy especially in the Zig-zag Pass, but necessary precaution and secrecy must be strictly adhered to. Periodical reports of accomplishments must be sent to this GHQ. COW". Although E.S. Johnson was not officially inducted into the WESTERN LUZON GUERRILLA FORCES, he complied with the order. Men were screened and selected that will form the organization of the resistance movement, and while this processing was in progress, in 25 May 1942, Johnson received an order to proceed to Te Villiar, the General Headquarters of the WESTERN LUZON GUERRILLA FORCES. On 27 May 1942, Jehn-

sen with R. Lazara, E. Caroline, E. Cerun and ~~n r v k x~~ made the journey notwithstanding the fact that they have to pass the unexplored high terrains of Zambales mountain. It took the party three days and a half (3 1/2) to reach the place. A lengthy conference took place, wherein important Military topics were discussed, topics that had a direct bearing on the Organization of the Resistance Movement. It was in this eventful gathering that E.S. JOHNSON was inducted and commissioned as Captain in the WESTERN LUZON GUERRILLA FORCES, USAFFE on 6 June 1942 and designated as Sector Commander of Olongapo. Full authority ~~authority~~ was vested to him to commission and recruit men into the Organization, and to secure firearms and ammunitions, to equipped the men who will form the nucleus of the Resistance Movement.

8 June 1942, the party left the GHq, at Villiar for Olongapo, to continue the organizing of the movement. Upon the arrival of the party, Capt. E.S. Johnson immediately took the preparatory steps to form the Sector, thus designating men who were commissioned to be his Staff members, Company CO's, platoon leaders and others to other assignments. Men and women answered the call to join the movement by the hundreds. Capt. E.S. Johnson and his staff members, slipped through the nights from village to village organizing centers of resistance.

20 June 1942 - While things are getting organized and put to shape, Capt. E.S. Johnson was again summoned by Capt. Ralph McGuire, CO, of the WLGFF for another conference at Villiar. Among the Guerrilla Leaders present at the Conference were Capts. R. Magayay, A. Francisco, A. Decane, F. Melina, Capt. E.S. Johnson, R. Lazara, Lts. E. Caroline, Blance and a host of others. The theme of the lengthy discussions which ensued were the Military informations given by the respective Sector Commanders. The most noteworthy phase of the Conference was the power and authority delegated to Capt. E.S. Johnson to have some of his trustworthy men to be employed in the various Japanese firms established at Olongapo, Zambales, for the sole purpose of gathering Military secrets which are of great value to the Organization.

III

1 July 1942 - Due to lack of arms and ammunitions, Capt. E.S. Johnson send a company under the command of Capt. Fermin Garcia to Bagao; another company under Capt. Gerardo Johnson to Sayayin Point and another company under Capt. R Lazara and P. Ramirez to Mariveles to look for the much wanted materials with which to carry on the operation against the enemy. The party went on foot and some on big bancas. The trip was quite hazardous, but the spirit of the boys were high, even if food supplies was quite hard to obtain. After staying in their respective place for two weeks (2), the mission was a success, for they were able to bring home many rifles, ammunitions and handgrenades. In due time the Unit had accumulated sufficient arms and ammunitions to carry on the mission against the enemy. Many of the rifles taken were lacking in parts, but through the able management of the Ordnance Officers and men, all of them were put in good conditions. Thus, upon careful planning and training of the boys, Guerrilla warfare then began at Olongape and its suburbs. Among the accomplishments made were on 22 July 1942 ³ Japanese supply trucks was ambushed in the Zig-zag pass, killing all the personnel and supplies were taken by our boys, while the trucks were pushed down the ravine; 25 July 1942 a company under Capt. E.S. Johnson has engaged a Japanese mountain patrol, killing four (4) japs ^{with} no casualty on our side, and on 27 July 1942 the Japanese guard houses were set on fire by a platoon of saboteurs under Lt. Guenoa. ~~After this few engagements, with the cooperation of Capt. Ralph McGuire~~

After this few engagements with the enemy, with the permission of Capt. Ralph McGuire, Capt. E.S. Johnson with a company of men and some member of his staff, went to Moron, Bataan to organize the Guerrilla movement in that town, on 28 July 1942. Mayor Angeles was inducted and commissioned as Sector Commander. When the Sector had been organized and necessary instructions were given to the Unit, the party went back to Olongape. On their way back, it was in Maibaye, a barrie of Moron, that an encounter with the enemy patrol occurred. After a heavy fight the entire Japs patrol of twenty three, (23) was totally wiped out, whereas on the side of Johnson's Guerrillas, seven (7) men were slightly wounded. The party arrived at night in Olongape on 3 August 1942.

4 August 1942 - Many volunteers from all walks of life came to be enlisted in the resistance movement, but precaution ~~of~~ was always adhered to, as to the loyalty of every individual. The medical care extended to the sick soldiers and the American boys was of great interest. The the Corps women under Lt. Delores L. Johnson ^{were} ~~was~~ not well ^{at} trained, they were able to administer to the need of the sick ~~of~~ boys, through the direction of the Medical officer, Capt. D.M. Bustamante. The Corpswomen never ~~and~~ ^{at} complain of the hardships they were encountering, going to the nearby mountain where the sick were being taken care of. 9 September 1942 - Under the personal command of Capt. E.S. Johnson, two companies went to the Zig-sag Pass to ambush Japanese trucks ~~which had to pass the road~~. Later in the afternoon, four (4) trucks were sighted loaded with supplies and soldiers. When the trucks were going up hill, and they were near the place where the boys were positioned, the signal was given by Capt. Johnson to commence firing. All boys stationed on both side of the embankment started firing killing many of the Japanese, ~~while~~ ^{as} the drivers were not killed, they were able to continue driving their trucks fast. The whole group later went ^{to} their hideout in Panique, to wait for report of the S-2 Operatives. The following day, a runner arrived with the report that the Japs sent a big force to fight the Guerrillas that ambushed them, but they were not able to find the group, for they moved out to another safe place.

25 September 1942 - Another Company led by the CO, went again on a special Mission to procure for more firearms and ammunitions ~~from~~ ^{from} Bagao. After staying there for eight (8) days, the mission was a success for the party was able to get thirty, (30) rifles of Infante and M-2s with almost five hundred (500) rounds of ammunitions. Conditions of the rifles were rusty and spare parts were also missing on some of them. However ^{after} cleaning ^{them} ~~to~~ hard and taking some of the parts on some that were really old, the rifles were put in good condition. As many boys were being recruited and trained, it is necessary to procure for more arms and ammunitions.

16 October 1942 - All the force of the intelligence service were sent out to make a complete report on the strength of the enemy and spy on the military installations around Subic Bay. After five days, reports were received which were of great value to the plans of carrying the mission. This reports were also sent to higher headquarters.

21 October 1942 - The whole Unit was again led by Capt. E.S. Johnson and went to the Zig-sag pass at Half Moon beach, (Ilingin), which is an ideal place to wait to ambush enemy trucks. The following day, early in the morning two (2) trucks were seen coming, and as the men were in their position, they waited eagerly, and waited for the signal to fire. Again, when the trucks were going up hill,

VI

The signal was given, and all the boys concentrated their fire on the drivers and the soldiers on the trucks. The trucks were stopped for ~~all~~ the drivers were killed, ^{including} ~~and~~ ^{all} the soldiers, ^{many killed} numbering ~~at~~ twelve (12). The boys then took all the rice and supplies, ~~they carried~~, pushed the trucks ^{to} the cliff with the dead bodies of the soldiers in them. The whole outfit then moved to Buton, to await reports of ^{the} ~~our~~ S-2 operatives. The following day, a report was received that the Japs were going to kill and shot any male person seen along the Zig-zag pass, however the civilian population were already warned by the guerrillas that they should stay away from the mountains.

11 November 1942 - Groups were sent to the ^{nearby} villages to ask for more supplies from friends, and at the same time giving lectures to build the morale of the people. Still many boys were being recruited and inducted in the organization. Medicines, bandages, clothings were being procured ~~from~~ ~~our~~ ~~S-2~~ ~~operatives~~ ~~from~~ ~~Manila~~ ~~and~~ ~~other~~ ~~towns~~. News of vital importance were being brought by them also, which ~~was~~ ~~heard~~ ~~by~~ ~~short~~ ~~wave~~ ~~in~~ ~~Manila~~ ~~and~~ ~~in~~ ~~the~~ ~~mountains~~. ^{from}

16 November 1942 - A group was sent to Subic, Zambales, under Capt. Fermin Garcia to contact the Unit there under the command of Capt. N. Flores. The purpose of this mission was to have a coordination of activities and command. The mission was a success as the said Unit was willing to cooperate with all the mission to be undertaken. Military reports were being exchange to the great advantage of both Units in carrying out their mission.

22 December 1942 - Lieutenant Erwin Ramsey of the 26th Cavalry, USA, then the Executive Officer of Capt. Joe Barker, Commanding Officer of the East Central Luzon Guerrilla Forces, paid a visit to the Camp of Capt. E S Johnson at Panique. He first arrived at Pamerit, and got in contact with Lt. E. Casaja, ^{and} asking to be ^{given} ~~sent~~ to Capt. E S Johnson. so he was given the necessary escort and guards to make the trip to Panique. In this Conference, arrangement were made whereby possible cooperation be established between Johnson and Ramseys outfit. The year 1942 closed with all the advantages on the Resistance Movement.

VII

As the year of 1943 ushered in, strange developments were growing up to the detriment of the secret Organization. Circles of spies were organized by the Japs who started their heinous crimes against their compatriots - selling their souls and betraying their country for their own personal safety and preservation - overlooking the fact that Philippine blood flows in their veins. They forget their responsibilities as Filipinos and the duty they owe to their Mother country. These spies were ^{the} active moles of the Japanese in detecting the existence of the secret Organization. They reported one by one, suspects which in turn, the Japanese prosecuted them without mercy. Innocent souls had been the victims of this atrocities. Homes were deprived of their fatherly love as men were killed on the mere suspicion that they were Guerrillas. Every day groups of Filipinos were brought to the scaffold to answer for crimes they never committed.

2 January 1943 - A platoon under the command of Lt. Henry Johnson was sent to Batnan to procure for more arms and ammunitions. After staying there looking for the much needed materials to equip our new members, on 12 Jan. 1943 the party arrived, their mission was a success for they were able to get twenty (20) rifles of the Infields model 1903 and 1917, and almost three hundred (300) rounds of ammunitions. Some of the rifles were lacking in parts also, and very rusty, but through the able management of the Ordnance Officer and his helpers many were put in good working condition.

17 January 1943 - Lt. E. Ramsey paid a second visit to the Camp of Capt. E.S. Johnson. Both discussed strategical arrangements concerning the defense of the Zig-zag Pass in case of any emergency that may arise. He was much impressed with the spirit of the boys under Capt. Johnson and especially their discipline was marvelous. He made the remark that all it needed ^{that was} _{was} is a uniform to call his men a regular army. After their conference was finished, Lt. Ramsey went back to his HQ at Bannan, Bataan.

25 February 1943 - Just then an incident occurred - an incident that paved the way to the series of apprehensions

of Capt. E. S. Johnson and his men. He received a report that there were four (4) Americans at Moron, Bataan that were sick. He then dispatched a platoon under Capt. P. Ramirez and Lt. Gloria to fetch the said Americans. Four days later, the men returned with the four (4) Americans. They were Lt. Richard O'Conner of the Air Corps Communication Section (USA,; Lt. Alfred Alvedres, a test pilot of the Air Corps, USA,; Pvt. Morgan of the 26th Material Squadron, USA; and Cpl. Cole of the 91st Pursuit Squadron, USA. Lt. O'Conner and Lt. Alvedres who were sick with malaria then stayed in Lasen for two (2) weeks, while Pvt. Morgan and Cpl. Cole proceeded to Panique where they were taken care of by the Corps women and the boys. They were provided with clothes, shoes, cigarettes, and medicines for the skin disease that they had. Later, the Lts., were transferred to Banican where they were treated by the Corps women, guerrillas and by the barrio folks, who did not hesitate to help them at the risk of their own lives. When they were a little bit stronger, ^{they were entertained with parties for the purpose of letting them} ~~parties were given to them, so that they will forget~~ their worries. After a month stay in the said barrie, Lt. Ramsey requested that this two (2) ^(Lt O'conner + Lt. Alvedres) officers be conducted to his camp at Bamban, Bataan. Upon receipt of the letter, Capt. Johnson dispatched men to take this Officers from the place where they were; ^{this} ~~to the~~ place where they were supposed to be brought, required secrecy and courage as the two places are separated by a wide span of water, which was well guarded by the Japs. Japanese patrols in boats kept complete vigilance of the whole bay. But the Guerrillas defied death to help this Americans. These Officers were clothed ^{as} in civilians, rugged and dirty so as to avoid any suspicion in case somebody will ~~be to~~ see them. ~~It was~~ 12:00 o'clock, midnight when the daring trip was made. There ^{were} bancas sent ahead of the party for scouting purposes. After two hours of hazardous trip, the party safely reached Panique. It was ~~not till~~ four o'clock in the morning that the said officers were able to make that strenuous hike towards Lt. Ramsey's camp, which ^{is} ~~has a~~ distance of forty (40) kilometers, ^{away} the way passing thru wilderness seldom explored and passed by human beings. It was a daring adventure, but with the determination

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forget

TO REACH ^{the} its goal. Finally this party reach Pinelet, the first barrie in Bataan. The men were so tired that they rested for a while, whereupon Lt. Alvedres complained of sorefeet and that he ^{could} not go any further. The party proceeded leaving Lt. Alvedres, with the assurance that a means of transportation will be provided to bring him to the camp. Upon arriving at Lt. Ramsays camp, there was an order for the arrest of Lt. Alvedres. Upon learning that Lt. Alvedres was left behind, the suicide squad was sent by Lt. Ramsey to take him, but Alvedres was gone when they reach ^{ed} the place. Upon the report of the squad leader that Alvedres was no where to be found, Lt. Ramsey immediately sent operatives to hunt for the much wanted man, but the traitor had taken refuge with the enemy. Thereby Lt. Ramsey sent a letter to Capt. Johnson informing him of the incident with the instruction to be on the alert, for Alvedres might proceed to Olengape and squeal on his secret organisation. Capt. Johnson and most of his staff members, namely Capt. R. Lazara, F. Candoleta, L. Ramirez, C.M. Bustamante, F. Garcia and Lt. S. Gloria went to Banicao in to seek refuge, and stayed there for a month, with his Hq., being transferred there.

While the Hq., was in Banicao, activities of the Unit were as follows; 16 April 1943 - A platoon was sent by Capt. Johnson on special mission to Bataan to procure for more fire arms and ammunitions. The mission was a success for they were able to get forty (40) rifles and almost on thousand (1000) rounds of ammunitions.; 27 April 1943 - Groups were sent out in all villages giving lectures in building their morale, and to have more faith in the Govt. of the United States and also of the Commonwealth of the Philippines; new members were being recruited and trained as they went from village to village.

After being away for almost a month, 15 May 1943, through the uncanny tricks of the then Mayer Rufine L. Vindua of Olengape, they were persuaded to return to Olengape. In so doing, four (4) officers, Capt. Johnson, Ramirez, F. Garcia and Lt. S. Gloria were apprehended by the Japanese Kempai Tai, (Military Police). They were investigated, maltreated beyond endurance. Evidently, they were released and were placed

under strict surveillance. Two weeks later, 29 May 1943, ~~after~~ Capt. Johnson sent a platoon under the command Of Lt. B. Valdes on a reconnaissance patrol in the vicinity of Tabuyey mountains, with Capt. Ramirez, after he was again apprehended, ~~and~~ seven (7) dead Japanese were found ~~and~~ by the Japs patrol in the said vicinity after two days.

Both were taken at the Japs garrison in Subic where they were tortured beyond human endurance, ~~going~~ without water and food for several days. But in no time three (3) men with arms from the neighboring province, Panganga, had been apprehended by the ~~Kempis~~ at the outskirts of Olongapo, which once again gave the release of Capt. Johnson and Ramirez.

8 June 1943 - Capt. Johnson with ~~high~~ Staff officers and a company went to Celis, Hermosa, Bataan to secure one machine gun of 30 caliber and other fire arms and ammunitions. In that instant more than one hundred (100) men and women volunteered for service and a Unit was formed under the Olongapo Sector. On the way back to Zambales, 12 June 1943, --- they had encountered more than thirty - three (33) Japs patrol at the outskirts of Celis, Bataan. Only two, (2) Japs survived and were able to escape.

15 June 1943 - Capt. Johnson was again apprehended and several times in the following months, by the Kempis, for the many incidents that were happening in the outskirts of Olongapo, such as the cutting of enemy communication lines, railroad ties were burned and the reported disappearance of Japs that went to the barriers. However, he was released for a tricky reason, *which was* that they want to catch *him* Capt. Johnson and the rest of his boys. The Japs gave all kinds of tortures, forcing him to reveal names of his co-patriots and the secret organization, but all these, he was able to withstand and the Japs learnt *nothing* from him. *nothing was learned*

17 June 1943 - A platoon under Capt. Gerardo Johnson was sent on special mission to sabotage the logs that were ~~and~~ tied along the shores of Subic bay, *these logs were* being used by the Japs in building wooden ships. Mission was accomplished, the logs being *let loose* out from their mooring *and* ^{to} let them drift, *contracted*

23 June 1943 - Many of the boys were ~~getting sick of~~

malaria, dysentery and skin disease, due to malnutrition, and exposure to mosquitos and the cold. So S-2 operatives and the Cepra women were sent to ask for voluntary help from sympathisers, and friends. After many days of soliciting help, the unit was provided for the much needed medicines, thro the leadership of Capt. F. Malicosi and Lt. D.L. Johnson.

21 July 1943 - The whole Unit under the personal command of Capt. E.S. Johnson went again to Kelis, Hermosa, Bataan on special mission, to trained the boys recruited and induct new members if there ^{were} are any. After ~~the mission was accomplished,~~ ^{the mission was accomplished,} ~~the party~~ ^{came} was able to bring home ^{with} some supplies given freely by the Kelis folks.

The months of Aug. and Sept. 1943 was spent ~~of~~ ^{single platoons to} ~~platoons~~ being sent on different parts of the outskirts of Olongapo, on reconnaissance patrol; S-2 operatives ^{were} being sent to spy on military establishments of the enemy; checking on the infiltration ^{of} ~~of~~ ^{of} spies sent to Olongapo; suicide squads led by Capt. R. Lazara and Capt. P. Ramirez roamed at night to kill any Japs seen, wandering in the barrios; by this tactic, they were able to kill six (6) Japs; ^{were} ~~Operatives~~ ^{in order to} authorized to work as drivers, mechanics at Japs firms, destroy parts of ~~the~~ trucks, machineries in the shops and clerks made important reports on enemy supplies, shipment and many vital things which are of great value to the execution of plans made by the Staff.

15 October 1943 - A report was received at Olongapo Headquarters about the tricky apprehension of Capt. Ralph McGuire ^{the} ~~by~~ ^{by many}. Capt. McGuire was brought to Iba where he was beheaded. The organization of the whole Zambales Province became stalled and paralyzed, but the Olongapo Sector still continue ^{at} the Resistance against the enemy. ~~The~~ ^{inspite} ~~spirit~~ ^{that} and morale of the boys were high notwithstanding the fact ^{the} ~~the~~ ^{the} CG of the Province was beheaded.

11 October 1943 - A platoon under Lt. D. Cuenca was ordered to check on the presence of Japs at Tiliin, and to ^{prove} ~~see~~ the reported wholesale cutting of logs that were shipped to Manila.

12 October 1943 - Capt. Fermin Garcia with a company

was ordered to Lazang where Japs were concentrated. They harassed and ambushed the Japs and Taiwans at that place, causing casualties ^{on} ~~against~~ the enemies.

15 October 1943 - Capt. R. Lazara with another platoon was ordered to go to Maibaye where they harassed and ambushed the Japs that were stationed there. This guerrilla warfare caused panic on the enemy, as they ~~do~~ ^{did} not venture to go out of their camp anymore. Many Japs were killed and wounded, as many were ~~being~~ exhumed and brought to the hospital in Olongapo.

20 October 1943 - to 31 December 1943 - The rest of the Unit that were not sick were assigned to attack the Japs trucks in the Zig-sag pass, of which this continued unabated. Lumber and logs were burnt and sometimes let drifted to the sea; railroad ties were destroyed, ~~as which this railroad was not even used by the company to haul logs -~~ ^{disabled} bridges were burned that were used by the enemy in transporting logs; communication lines were cut in the Zig-sag pass; ~~fuel from trucks were stolen to be used for disinfecting wounds of the boys;~~ ^{stolen} oil from engine tanks were drained to be used for cleaning ^{fire} the arms of the Unit; and all in all the year 1943 brought to a close of sharp perils but successful operation against the enemy.

1 January 1944 - Capt. E.S. Johnson received a communication from Major Bernard Andersen, Commander Of USAFFE LUZON GUERRILLA FORCES who was at that time staying ⁱⁿ ~~at~~ Tayabas Province. He was requested to contact Major Andersen in an outskirts of Manila. But circumstances failed the two to meet each other, so a Liaison Officer of Major Andersen was sent ^{to} ~~to~~ Capt. Johnson in a designated place in Manila. It was there that he, (Johnson), received his commission as Captain and the power to ~~re-organize~~ ^{the resistance movement in} ~~re-organize~~ ^{When he came} Zamboales. ~~He then went back to the province, and~~ ^{he} sent a Liaison officer headed by Capt. P. Baga to contact all active units to further on the movements.

18 January 1944 - Capt. Johnson, P. Ramirez and F. Malicci ^{went} ~~went~~ ^{by} ~~by~~ to Manila where Capt. Johnson was to be contacted, ~~but~~ guerrilla leaders of Manila and its suburbs. Capt. Johnson was able to contact leaders who were active in the movement, supplying us with news from Australia and America,

giving
 the much wanted medicines and clothes for the boys in the mts. They were American missionaries who were not yet interned in the concentration camp in Sto. Tomas, (Dr. H. Darby, Miss Helen Wilks and Mrs. Mary Stagg); ^{Months} *we received* from our S-2 operative ~~later~~ a report that they were apprehended by the Japs and brought to Fort Santiago where

Various important encounters with the enemy ensued at places such as the encounter at ~~San~~ ^{TASIC MORON TRAIL} on 12 March 1944, led by Capt. Johnson and Javaluyas where more than thirty-five (35) Japs were surprisedly attacked and annihilated. The encounter at Tanawan mountain on 27 March, 1944, led by Capt. P. Ramirez, Lts. L. Solis, A.M. Bustamante and E. Casaja, eleven (11) Japs were killed. The encounter at Big Out, zig-zag pass led by Capt. G. M. Bustamante, J. del Rosario, Lts. P. Guiang, E. Caroline and N. Bantican where seventeen Japs (17) were killed. The encounter at Ilalim on 23 April 1944, led by Capt. D. dela-Ra, G. Fortunato, G. Costales, Lts. A. Ramos, B. Tapispisan, D. Calixtre, H. Gregorio and H. Andice where thirty two (32) Japs were killed. The encounter at Pamerit on 14 May 1944, led by Capt. R. Lazara, Lts. G. Redondo, G. Gaspar and T. Sagala where six (6) Japs were killed. *18 May - Capt. Johnson was again caught & BROUGHT TO IGA.; 19 May - Capt. R. Lazara - DASH.*
 5 June 1944 - The Japs were getting tough and mean to the civilian population as the guerrillas continue their ^{innocent} warfare against them. Many ^{innocent} men were being apprehended and executed due to mere suspicion that they were members and sympathizers of the resistance movement. As food and medicines were getting scarce, the boys experienced to go without a meal ¹ *meals* as a day, and ^{of} *Mostly* the Unit survived by gathering ^{+ cooking} the young beje shoots to be eaten; nevertheless supplies comes once in while from friends in the form of corn, dried fish and mongoes. ^{With} Through all this hardships that everybody was undergoing, the whole Unit ^{was} personnel was determined to carry ^{sure} on the resistance against the enemy; their loyalty to the cause never dis. ~~overlooked the gratitude he owed to Capt.~~

26 July 1944, - Capt. E.S. Johnson was appointed Mayor of Olongapo. This appointment was recommended secretly by ~~661~~ Colonel Gyles Merrill to the acting Governor of the Province, Jose V. Corryns. The acceptance of Capt. Johnson of the position was not for himself but to comply with the order of a high American Officer and also to serve a cover and shield to further the

Resistance Movement without any suspicion. It was a means to evade suspicion on the part of the Japanese and a good pretension that Capt. Johnson is cooperating with the Japanese in Co-Prosperity Sphere. All the personnel of the Municipality were changed and Guerrillas were placed as clerks, treasurers and policemen. During the incumbency of Capt. Johnson as Mayor of Olongapo, many important buildings were burnt inside the Navy Yard. Construction of railways were delayed and some machineries were put out of order. The idiocy of the Japanese Kaigun even referred the matter over to Capt. Johnson which in return, he explained that such happenings as that of the burning of buildings were due to carelessness of guards and workers - the delay of the railways was due to lack of materials for constructions and the running out of condition of machineries were due to old parts used. The Japanese without suspicion readily believed such explanations. This sabotage of enemy properties were due ~~to the carelessness of guards and workers~~ ~~to the lack of materials for constructions~~ ~~to the running out of condition of machineries~~ ~~to the use of old parts~~ to the operatives planted to work for them under the leadership of Lt. L. Selis, Lt. B. Labimpune with four (4) squads of men trained to destroy enemy properties.

All went well until a Filipino spy sold his body and soul to the Japanese, who was blinded by the propaganda of the Yellow race and by the sparkle of Japanese war netes - turned traitor to his country. This man, Juanite Vindua was supposed to be executed by Guerrillas on 25 December 1943, but through the intervention of Capt. Johnson, being also Xmas, he saved his life. He vouched for him and even inducted him into the organization. Vindua then behaved well and helped much in clerical work. He even participated in a few encounters with the enemy. But, in the long run, this man showed his real diabolical self. He overlooked the gratitude he owed to Capt. Johnson and his men.

He was while engaged in moving supplies
 27 September 1944 - At midnight on this memorable date, Vindua led a squad of Japanese soldiers to the house of Capt. Johnson where he was arrested together with his son, Lt. Henry Johnson, and his son-in-law, Capt. F. Javaluya. Later, the Japs led by Vindua went to the house of Capt. Johnsons

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brother, Capt. Gerarde Johnson, and he was also arrested. After wards, another platoon of Japanese soldiers were led by Vindua to Nag-kababa where thirty ~~33~~ ^{seven} (35) officers and enlisted men of the organisation were arrested. These men were tied together and brought to the garrison. They were all tortured beyond human endurance. They were knocked with brass knuckles, beaten with 2"x4", and were half drowned by sticking a water hose into their mouths. Evidences were shown ~~such as~~ such as the seventy (70) rifles and the thousand rounds of ammunitions revealed by Vindua. Vindua proudly and firmly testified against the guerrillas. Death was the final sentence given them, but the ^{delayed} arrival of the Japanese Kampei Tai from Tarlac was the only one that ^{delayed} hindered the execution. On the eve of the execution, (the colonel Kampei from Tarlac had already arrived), Capts. Johnson, R. Lazara, F. Javal~~ff~~ luyas, Lt. G. Redondo, Sgt. F. de Guia, Pfc. A. Villanueva and Pvt. I. de Guia, miraculously escaped from the cell by the aid of a pocket knife, ~~that~~ Lt. G. Redondo was able to hide in his watch pocket. The boys took turns in cutting little by little the window railings of 2"x4" for two days and nights. They made their escape on 2 October 1944.

3 October 1944 - Capt. Johnson and his men established their camp at Mt. Tanawan but moved later to Hulong Kalapakuan as spies were busy detecting as to his whereabouts. The wife of Capt. Johnson with her youngest child was taken in custody by the Japanese Kampei Tai in his stead. After a day and a half in the garrison, she was released with the promise that she will induce her husband to return to the garrison. This was done ~~to~~ ^{as a decoy} to catch Capt. Johnson and his men. At midnight on 4 October 1944, Mrs. Johnson and his children were secretly transferred to Kalapakuan to join her husband, leaving behind her eldest son, brother and brother-in-law in prison. (Reliable information was received that the guerrillas left in prison were brought to Fort Wint, Grande Island on 4 October 1944, where they were executed.)

due to the confiscation of the seventy (70) rifles,

by the Japanese, Capt. Johnson with his Staff Officers and his Service Company, went to Meron, Bataan on 6 November 1944, on a special mission to secure for more arms and ammunitions. They were able to secure few, as the Meron outfit were also ~~in~~ badly in need of firearms as hundreds were confiscated by the Japanese. The Meron Outfit decided during that time to be released ~~as a~~ ^{from} part of the Olongapo Sector as they wanted to be under Capt. Boone of the Bataan District. The presence of Capt. Johnson at Meron was detected by the Japanese and at Ilingin, in the outskirt of Meron, the Outfit was intercepted by a strong Japanese troop, which ensued almost six hours (6) fight. A good thing that experience scouts had seen first the Japs, otherwise all of the Guerrillas ~~could have been~~ ~~should have been~~ wiped out. One Officer, Capt. Fermin Garcia, and six (6) enlistedmen were killed, and one officer (Capt. P. Ramirez) was wounded. On the enemy's side, nineteen (19) were killed. Capt. Johnson and his men were forced to retreat as the enemy were three (3) times in number and well equipped. (10 October 1944)

15 October 1944 - The outfit arrived at Kalapakuan by big bancas borrowed from the barrie fells of Banicoain. They rested for quite a ~~long~~ ^{three (3)} time as they were exhausted, weary and ~~fat~~ tired. After ~~three~~ weeks rest, Capt. Johnson with his staff officers and a platoon of men, went to Aglae mountain to comply with the invitation he received from Col. Gyles Merrill to have a Conference. Capt. Johnson was requested to ~~be placed~~ ^{transfer} under Col. Merrill's command but Cpt. Johnson could not decide right away as he was under the command of Major Anderson.

15 November 1944 - Col. Gyles Merrill again sent an invitation for a conference, and Capt. Johnson complied with the request. Upon reaching the place, Col. Merrill told Capt. Johnson that he (Col. Merrill) ^{was sent} already sent a message to Major Anderson to ~~the effect of his transfer of his command~~ ^{under (Merrill's) order} of his command. Capt. Johnson then ^{ceded to the order} ~~ceded to the order~~. Capt. Johnson didnt mind the changing of command, what matter ^{ed} most was his love and loyalty ^{to} his country, and the service that his fellowmen need ^{ed} from him ^{his} was the prevailing interest ~~in himself~~. His unbroken spirit and the love to fight the enemy was his great desire.

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2 21 November 1944 - Capt. Johnson then went back to his camp. A few days later, some of his operatives reported that ~~a~~ strong Japanese troops were preparing to raid his camp. The outfit then moved their camp to the outskirts of Castillejos. A place was selected near a river, where the boys have access to drinking facilities, for cooking and for taking a bath. Life in the camp was such a thrilling adventure and unforgettable experiences. The boys ~~tasted to eat~~ ^{many times ate} wild roots, half cooked bananas, various leaves and skin of carabaos. Groups were sent ^{from place to place} to ask for alms from sympathisers ~~from place to place~~. The boys suffered malaria, dysentery, and all forms of skin disease. When the medical Officer ~~was~~ short of medicines, he substituted ⁺ derita bark for quinine, guava leaves infusion for dysentery and different kind of barks and leaves for the skin disease. The camp never passed a Sunday without a mass being officiated by Capt. Fehner Tugade. Three (3) companies of the Unit ^{under Capt. R. Lazara} remained in Olongape to carry on the resistance movement against the enemy in that vicinity. Although the place is a hot place for the guerrillas, precaution ^o was ~~always~~ ^{practise} and a vigil surveillance was practised ^{to} insure the safety of the organization.

13 December 1944 - Early part of the day, ^{American} dive bombers were attacking Japanese ships outside Subic Bay. The Unit stationed in Olongape were on the alert to be in action if any development occurred, as landing ^{of} americans ^{troops was} were the main topic. A platoon was sent to Banicaian under Lt. I. Patarata; a platoon under Lt. Savaria was stationed at Tibawa; a company at Buten under Capt. Gestales and the rest were stationed in strategic ^{points} ~~was later~~ for any immediate emergency. The ships ^{convoy} put into Olongape, where Japanese civilians and soldiers disembarked.

15 December 1944 - American dive bombers again attacked the ships, and the military installation in Olongape. The Navy yard was being strafed and bombed the whole morning. A big transport ~~(whose name was)~~ (later identified as the Oraku Maru), was burning, as smoke poured from the holds. ~~The ship was burning~~ and settling slowly. Many american prisoners were seen jumping from all sides of the ships. The platoon stationed at Banicaian, and Buten tried to ride on bancas to saved them but machine guns

where being fired at the banca, so all they could do was to wait for any survivors to be ^{swim} swimming away from the ship. Later two survivors were picked ^{up} by Lts. H. Andico, G. Redondo, I. Patarata, Sgts., G. Andico and Fortunato Millado. They were Ensign USA George Karl Petrits, Inshore Patrol, 16th Naval District (C.O. U.S.S. FISHERIES II) and Darnell Kadelph, Pfc. USA of the 59th GAO band. The two were taken immediately to the woods of Banicain for safety precaution and where food and clothes were provided by the guerrillas and the Corps women. The same night, the two were transferred by banca to Tibawa, where they recuperated and rested.

22 December 1944 - Again Capt. Johnson was called for a Conference by Col Gyles Merrill of which he complied. It was on this memorable date that he was designated as the Commanding Officer of Squadron "D", which composed of the towns of Olongapo, Subic, Castillejos and San Marceline. The district Command was given to Major Jose V. Corpus, and Major Ramon Maganysay who was then a Capt., the executive Officer. This order was effective 23 December 1944.

23 December 1944 - An order was received from Capt. E S. Johnson, to send some Officers of the Olongapo Sector, for a Conference at his camp in Castillejos. Capt. R. Lazara, being sick with malaria, delegated Capt. M. dela Cruz, Capt. F. Malicosi, M. Reyes, J del Rosario with three (3) squads of enlisted men to go to Castillejos. In the conference, Capt. Johnson issued Special Order No. 5-A, dated 22 December 1944 that effective 23 December 1944, The following Officers will assume command of the Olongapo Sector, Squadron "D", Zambales Military District; Capt. R. Lazara - Commanding Officer; Capt. M. dela Cruz - Executive Officer; Capt. F. Malicosi - Adjutant; Capt. M. R. Reyes - Supply Officer. He further give power to this group to form the Staff and companies, designating officers to their respective position. He further stressed the necessity to practise the necessary precaution since Olongapo is a hot place during these days. The following day, at 2:00 P.M., the party went back to Olongapo. Upon arriving the Executive and Adjutant reported to the CO, all that took place in the Conference. An order was issued the same night to have all members to report at the fishpond on 27 December 1944.

27 December 1944 - Early in the morning guerrillas of the Olengape Sector were assembled. This date the headquarters staff was formed, companies were divided into platoons under able and experienced officers. Every platoon leaders, company commanders and staff members were instructed as to what to do in case of an emergency. S-2 operatives were sent out to spy on enemy strength and movements, As the Japs were being constantly strafed and bombed by American planes, they were evacuating to the nearby hills.

29 December 1944 - A conference was held among Officers of Olengape Sector to discuss matters pertaining the safety of the civilian population in case the Americans will make a landing in Subic Bay area. Group of suicide saboteurs under Lts. I. Patarata, F. Regulacion and S. Savaris were sent to Fort Wint, Grande Is. Mission was accomplished on 30th Dec. 1944, midnight, when they sneak into the island and destroy enemy gun emplacements and search lights in the island.

2 January 1945 - A platoon under the command of Lt. C. Redonde and H. Bantion was ordered to destroy one Jap sailboat hidden by the enemy. The mission was a success, for they were able to blast the Jap boat by throwing handgrenade and home-made dynamite to the boat and thus killing 2 Japs guarding the boat.

5 January 1945 - Thru the order of Capt. E.S. Johnson, Ensign Petrits was transferred to Squadron "D" camp at midnight, arriving there on the night of the 6th. The journey was a dangerous one, as Japs were busy guarding the bay and the shores. However the boys defied this danger and was able to transfer him safely. Kadelph ^{referred to} remained in Tibawa by his preference.

6 January 1945 - An order came from Hq's Squadron "D" by Capt. E.S. Johnson that the hidden ammunitions at the mt. of Panique be delivered to his place the following night. Transporting this ammunitions from Olengape to Castillejos was very risky and dangerous, for Japs sentries are guarding the road, and the bay was being patrolled day and night by japs motor boats. This mission was accomplished thru the bravery and uncanny tactics of the boys through the leadership of Lts. Patarata, Redonde and regulacion.

12 January 1945 - As the American bombers continue pounding on military bases of the Japs, they evacuated Fort Wint, Grande Is.

A Platoon under Lt. I. Patarata, hoisted an American flag at the middle of the field at Tibua. American pilots upon seeing this flag fly low and dropped leaflets, the contents of which is that the American liberators have arrived already.

15 January 1945 - A special order was received from Squadron "D" headquarters, directing the Executive Officer of the Olongapo Sector to blast the Kalaklan bridge at 12:00 Mid-night, 16 January 1945. To take all necessary precautions to avoid any suspicion that the perpetrators ^{were} from Olongapo, Operatives were sent right away as to make the necessary plans to execute the order. The operatives reported back that the bridge was well guarded by the Japs. Due to the impossibility of carrying out the order, a runner was sent with the report and plans showing the defense of the bridge. The following day, 16 January 1945, a wash order was received, ordering the Unit to postpone the blasting of the bridge, but ordered to be always on the alert for any mission to be assigned.

18 January 1945 - A Memo for all Sector's commanders was received from Hqs. Squadron "D", to be prepared to hoist the American flag and the Philippine flag in the municipal building upon receipt of order from the headquarter. In this ^{at} same date, a platoon (Commanded by Sqdn. "D") led by Capt. C. Fortunado encountered a Japanese troop of one hundred fifty (150) men with machine guns and automatic rifles, at the ricefields of Pamatawan, Castillejos. The boys were surprised by the enemy and was fired at. In spite of the odds, the boys fought gallantly and were able to kill more than thirty (30) Japs. The only advantage of the guerrillas, was the semi-concealment of their bodies by the unlevel rice fields. But the fanatical un-rushing of the Japs cause the guerrillas thirteen (13) casualties. Capts. E.S. Johnson, F. Javaluya, C. Bustamante, Lts. E. Caroline, V. Lara and a squad of boys went to ~~assist~~ succor the boys. The arrival of the re-inforcements attracted the Japs and the firings were directed in their position which gave the other group ^{the chance} to escape. After an hour of exchanging shots, Capt. Johnson and his boys were able to elude the enemy through the mountain fastness. After two (2) hours hiding, the remaining comrades buried the dead at night.

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21 January 1945 - A surprise attack was coordinated by Sector under Squadron "D" at the San Marcos Air Strip used by the Japs as a Military Air Base. This mass attack was led by Major Magsaysay and Capt. E.S. Johnson, starting the fight at midnight of this date. The enemy was taken by surprise completely that security guards of the air strip were all killed, and airplane engines burned including gasoline dumps. Due to the superiority of the Japs in arms, ^{the} guerrillas were forced to withdraw after inflicting this damage. The following day, the American planes bombed and strafed the air-strip causing a big damage in the place, planes were destroyed, hangars were burned and more gasoline dumps were hit by incendiary bombs. At night the guerrillas resume their mass attack in the air-strip again, killing more Japs, and whatever military installations left ^{were} burned, including planes hidden in camouflaged hangars. The following morning, the rest of the Japs evacuated the area, and fled towards Olongapo, where a big force of Japs were being concentrated in the Zig-zag pass. The air-strip was occupied by the guerrillas, raised an American flag and repaired the damage runways to enable American planes to land. The mission being accomplished, this then was reported to higher headquarters by Col. Giles Merrill.

27 January 1945 - This is a memorable date in the hearts of the guerrillas of Olongapo. While American planes were busy strafing the town of Olongapo, the Navy Yard and bombing the entrance to Subic Bay, a platoon led by Lt. S. Savaris sneaked in the island of Fort Wint, ^{to} and hoisted an American flag. When this was done, an American plane swooped down and look at the flag. The Aviator waved his hand ^{at} the guerrillas and the boys did the same.

28 January 1945 - Two companies of Squadron "D", Commando troop and one from Castillejos Sector led by Capts. James and Johnson went to Calapanan to intercept the retreating Japs coming from the north. ^{BURN ALL DUMPS FROM CALAPANAN TO ILLUMIN.} They waited in the nearby mt., but no Japs passed, so they spent the night in the said place. The following morning, as the men were being placed in position, unexpectedly shells of Artillery fire dropped very near their place. They changed their place and position, still shells were getting near them. Just then, a runner arrived and reported that American troops landed in San Antonio and they were already ~~out~~ in Castillejos.

Because of the heavy fires of the American artillery dropping in their direction, they left and proceeded to Castillejos. At Castillejos, Capt. Johnson contacted at once Col. Jennet of the 36th Infantry Division, USA, and was then ordered to report to General Jones of the said Infantry Division which proceeded to Olongapo. Capt. Johnson with four (4) of his Staff officers met Major General Jones at Olongapo, whereby the General asked Capt. Johnson's co-operation in the battle of the Zig-zag pass. Capt. Johnson offered to General Jones the whole Unit of the Olongapo Sector under Capt. R. Lazara, and he at once went back to Castillejos and ordered all the Headquarters personnel and the Comande Troop to move to Olongapo to help in the battle of the Zig-zag pass. Every day contact was made between Col. Jennet and his Aide Capt. Alejandro ^{and} ~~by~~ Capt. Johnson and his staff. Due to the knowledge of Capt. Johnson and his Officers ^{of} the terrain of the Zig-zag pass and the mts. in the whole area, they were of great help in indicating in the map the possible position of the enemy. The whole Unit of the Olongapo Sector and the Comande troop were then fighting side by side with the American troops day and night. Later, General Jones had been relieved by General Chase and the order then was to report to Col. Wilson, Chief of Staff and to General Chase.

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January 28, 1945 - Early in the morning ships were sighted outside Subic Bay. Upon seeing the ships, Capt. M. dela Cruz with a platoon, went to Castillejos to the Headquarters of Capt. J.S. Johnson, to report the sighting of the ships outside the Bay, Japanese movements, emplacements of guns, land mines and the strength of Japanese garrison. On the way to Castillejos, Capt. Cruz met a group of guerrillas from Castillejos, informing that Capt. Johnson, Capt. Jones with two companies of the Squadron (one company of the Commando Troop and the other from Castillejos Sector) went to Calapanan to intercept the retreating Japanese coming from the North. After receiving such information, Capt. Cruz and party decided to contact Capt. J.S. Johnson at the said place. On their way back, they sighted the American troops on the main road and the party approached them, identified themselves as members of the Western Luzon Guerrilla Forces. After greeting them and giving all the answers to the information asked, the party proceeded to Calapanan meeting Capt. Johnson. Capt. Cruz reported all the informations regarding Japanese movement in Olanga and telling them about the American forces being at Masatua. After reporting, Capt. Cruz and party went back to Olanga to inform all the guerrillas that the American forces are coming to Olanga. At about 3:00 p.m. Jan. 29, 1945, one mine sweeper was sighted entering Subic Bay and left at about 7:00 p.m. The following morning another mine sweeper with two destroyers entered the bay and went as far as the beach of Olanga. At about 9:00 a.m., 2nd Lt. Guillermo Redondo, guerrilla officer, with two boys rode in a banca to bring one American survivor saved by the guerrillas during the bombing of a Japanese transport by American planes, which sunk at Subic Bay on December 17, 1944. The Americans were saved that time, George Carl Stritz, Ensign U.S. Navy who was brought to Capt. J.S. Johnson camp on December 6, 1944 and Daniel Adolph, Private, U.S. Army, who was brought to the destroyer No. 445, on Jan. 27, 1945; PERITZ WAS BROUGHT TO THE FLAGSHIP OF COMNAV KINCIRD AT SAN ANTONIO.

January 30, 1945 - In the morning the Japanese were retreating toward the Zig-zag and setting fire on houses in town and barrio. The bridges at Anisan and Bajac-bajac were blasted at about 8:00 a.m. U.S. field artilleries were shelling the town of Olanga. The American soldiers guided by 1st Lt. James Gaguica, U.S. officer of the Olanga Sector, met no resistance until they reached the Olanga cemetery where at that point the enemies are well fortified with trench mortars and machine guns. However the Americans fought their way through and left a company of infantry to engage the enemy, while the rest proceeded to Olanga to exterminate the remnants of Japanese forces left in town, till they reached Bajac-bajac. On entering the town the American soldiers were met by the guerrillas, giving informations as to the strategy, whereabouts and strength of the enemies. A platoon of guerrillas under Capt. M. dela Cruz, helped build the blasted bridge at Anisan. Guerrillas were stationed at different places of Olanga to intercept the retreating enemies. A finalismen, one Japanese Navy officer, was killed by guerrillas stationed in that area.

January 31, 1945 - Capt. Ricardo Otere with two platoons of guerrillas were attached to the combat engineering corp, rebuilding the blasted bridge at Bajac-bajac, to make it passable for infantry troop and motorized units. 1st Lt. Sidra Patarata with a detachment of 17 men were involved in transporting a company of infantry men under 1st Lt. F. Stearn, 3rd Battalion, Headquarters, 34th Infantry, to Maritan Point. In addition to transporting this company, the guerrillas acted as guides for patrol and in other ways helped the company in scouring and holding this ground. Capt. M. dela Cruz with a platoon of guerrillas apprehended Japanese collaborators and turned them over to the American authorities. Capt. M. Masara and 1st Lt. F. Clark, contacted Col. Bennett of the 36th Infantry Division, giving them information as to where the enemies are concentrated and assuring them of the support and cooperation of the guerrillas in the operation. On February 1, 1945, one Japanese civilian was apprehended by 1st Lt. Eladio Pascual with one enlisted man, hiding in the field at Tabayoi. He was turned over to the American authorities. Beginning this date the battle of the Zig-zag Mass commenced. In this operation, the Olanga Sector, Squadron "B", fought side by side with the 36th Infantry Division, losing some of its comrades, until the strongholds of the Japanese forces are completely destroyed. Their participation in this battle is chronologically listed as follows:

The period of recognition for each individual will extend from the date of induction or the date the unit was recognized, whichever is later, to the date the individual died, both dates inclusive.
3. It is requested that the names and ranks of these individuals be inserted on the unit roster of the Olongapo Sector, Squadron D, Magsaysay's Guerrilla Forces, by the issuance of appropriate orders.
4. All data contained herein are furnished on the sworn statement of the recognized guerrilla leader. They are accepted as official data upon which payments of arrears in pay may be adjudicated unless official documents in conflict therewith are later provided this headquarters to prove otherwise.
5. Upon receipt from their legal heirs of a claim for arrears in pay and allowances due their estates, authority for settlement thereof under existing laws and procedures will be furnished your headquarters by the Director, Recovered Personnel Division, this headquarters.
6. This roster will constitute the only official recognized casualty roster, Killed in Action, Killed in Line of Duty and Died in Line of Duty, of the Olongapo Sector, Squadron D, Magsaysay's Guerrilla Forces.

2. The original casualty roster as presented by Capt. E. S. Johnson, CO of the Olongapo Sector, listed a total of 98 casualties, of whom 40 died of various diseases. Inasmuch as available investigator's reports on the Magsaysay Guerrilla Forces indicate that the organization was inactive until the

time of the invasion of the American forces, and also inasmuch as a percentage of casualties amounting to 24.5% of total unit strength is considered excessive even under combat conditions, the roster has been screened by the undersigned, reducing casualties to the number indicated in paragraph 1 above. This reduction was effected by deleting from the submitted roster the names of those individuals who died of sickness prior to the initial recognition dates of the various units, viz.: Hq & Hq Co, 1 Feb 45; A Co, 3 Feb 45; B Co, 2 Feb 45; and Commando Troop, 8 Feb 45. This revision is considered justified in that individuals dying of natural causes before the inception of the military usefulness of the organization cannot be accepted as having died in line of military duty. One other individual, Jose Crucio, Hq & Hq Co, is listed as having died of dementia praecox during the period of recognition; his name is deleted because the nature of the malady is such that the individual would have been incapable of performing military service for a considerable period before his demise. Finally, Henry Johnson, Hq & Hq Co, listed as a 2nd Lt. KILD, 10-4-44, is reduced to the grade of Private. Other records show that this individual, a son of the CO of the organization, was only 17 years of age at the time of his death; he is not considered old enough to have had the qualifications commensurate with the commissioned rank.

2. With the aforementioned emendations, the roster has been reprepared in the form of a true copy and is thus recommended for approval as the official casualty roster of the Olongapo Sector, Squadron "D", Magsaysay's Guerrilla Forces, ZMD.






