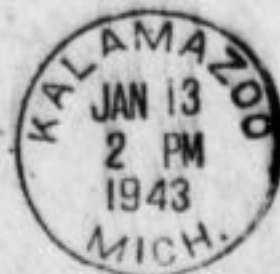

My dear General

Just a word from a relative
who has never had the honor or the
privilege of meeting you.

My father, John R. MacArthur,
died in November 1940 + I am
now in mourning for my mother.
She was Pauline Aronson + the
daughter of Judge William H.
Aronson, who was a partner

of General Stewart L. Woodford,
our Minister to Spain at the
outbreak of the Spanish War.

Both father & mother were with
the General in Spain, & on his
return to America, father became
Special Assistant Secretary of State.

You may be interested to
learn that it was father who
sent the message to Admiral
Dewey at Hongkong, ordering him
to proceed to Manila & destroy the
Spanish fleet. Later, father
became Secretary to the First
Philippine Commission & subsequently
went to Paris with the Commission

that negotiated the treaty of peace.

I have told you something
of my background with the thought
that it might interest you, &
perhaps recall some pleasant
memories, for many years ago
father told me that he was a
cousin of General Arthur Mac-
Arthur's.

My brother William left last
March for the Middle East in order
to work on the road from Iraq
into Russia. I too was engaged
for the work, but due to excessively
high blood pressure, the Engineers
would not accept me. I then tried

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, on the 26th day of January, 1880, a valiant patriot and soldier was born in the person of Douglas McArthur;

AND WHEREAS, since his early childhood this patriot and soldier has ever applied himself, with high courage, self-sacrifice and consummate skill, to the defense of those great principles upon which have stood this great American Union of his and ours, and upon which she will forever stand;

AND WHEREAS, today marks the sixty-second anniversary of the birth of our Comrade, Legionnaire Douglas McArthur, the now valiant defender of the Philippines;


AND WHEREAS, the Post Officers' Conference of the Department of North Carolina of the American Legion, in its 17th annual meeting assembled, mindful of the magnificent and glorious services heretofore performed and at the moment being performed by General Douglas McArthur, whose courage, devotion to duty, and capacities as a soldier and leader of men will forever live in the hearts of his countrymen, desire to extend to the General felicitations on this, his birthday, and to go on record in acknowledgment of its respect and love for such an American as he:

Dear Sir:

Your letter of January 20, 1942, to the President, inclosing a \$100 Defense Savings Bond as a gift for General Douglas MacArthur, has been referred to the War Department for reply.

A Federal statute (act Mar. 3, 1917; 39 Stat. 1106; 5 U.S.C. 68) prohibits private contributions to Government officials for services performed for the Government and Army regulations have, for many years, prohibited members of the Army from accepting private gifts for services rendered. This being the case, the bond may not be accepted on behalf of General MacArthur and it is accordingly returned herewith.
