DRAFT COMMUNIQUE

Since our landing on LEYTE our Guerrilla forces in the Western VISAYAS and MINDANAO have sustained an agressive offensive against enemy garrisons on the several major Islands and have succeeded in capturing large areas, including strongly held coastal points and airfields. Constant Guerrilla pressure has succeeded in seriously disrupting the enemy's lines of communication and impeding the free movement of his reserves. In these operations our Guerrilla forces have inflicted heavy casualties upon the enemy. Specifically:

On MINDANAO our Guerrilla forces under the command of Colonel
Wendell W. Fertig. Engr Corps, have invested numerous important coastal
points and enemy held airfields and have liberated the entire provinces of
LANAO and MISAMIS Occidental.

On PANAY our Guerrilla forces under command of Colonel Macariaco
Feralta Jr., Infantry, in a series of sharp thrusts have captured the towns
of ZAHRAGA, PALNONGON, SAN MIQUEL and ENSTANCIA, siezed several vital enemy
airfields and are now maintaining heavy pressure on remaining enemy positions
on the Island.

On NEGROS our Guerrilla forces under command of Lt Colonel
Salvador Abcede, Infantry, in a general offensive movement against enemy
occupied areas have cleared the Southern half of the Island with the exception of the DUMAGUETE area where the enemy has been driven into a
pocket and is now under close siege. On the East coast, SIEULAN, SAN CARLOS,
BAIS, ISABELLA and LUZRIGA, together with several sirfields have been captured.



On CHEW our Guerrilla forces under command of Lt Colonel
Charles Gushing, Engr Corps, in a series of direct attacks and violent
harassing movement have eleared the enemy from the major part of Southern
CHEW leaving him confined for the most part to Central CHEW where his lines
of communication are under constant pressure and his freedom of movement
seriously restricted.

In the SULU ARCHIPELAGO our Guerrilla forces under the command of Lt Colonel Alejandro Suares, Infantry, have maintained constant harassing action against enemy positions severely restricting his freedom of movement.

On BOHOL our Guerrilla forces under command of Major Ismael Inginiero, Infantry, are maintaining constant pressure on the enemy in the TAGBILARAN area where his forces are now concentrated.

Lucilla actentes 6 October 1944 Chief of Staff C.W. 1. Herewith is a draft of a special communique which I suggest for issuance by the C in C in compliance with your C/N of 5 October. 2. In this draft I have generalised on meritorious achievements rather than specifying names and psoitions that woulds -(a) Tend to compromise the individual or his family; and render insecure the continuance of our works (b) Hurt and possibly alienate those not so named; (c) Chance the inclusion, particularly in the areas unrecognized and concerning which little reliable information is at hand, of individuals who may later be established as having been renegades or bendits. Note that Parsons' nother-in-law, Kangleon's wife and daughters and Peralta's entire femily, that we know of, are held by the enemy. To flaunt him with their deeds by name might well cause retaliation upon those so held. 3. Something along this line would appear to lay the foundation desired by the C in C for the full story later. In it I have attempted to extend full credit for achievement without chancing a slight to envone. 4. I have endeavored to generalize on the hole set up so that the energy can derive little more information than he now has - nothing specific that would permit him to pin point any particular position, locality or individual. 5. Should you desire it developed further and along more specific lines, despite the risks entailed, I shall submit a revision. I advise against it, however, at this time. Incl Proft

SPECIAL COMMINICUES

As our forces of liberation rell forward the magnificent support we are receiving from guarilla units throughout the immediate objective area and adjacent Islands causes me at this time to pay public tribute to those great Filipino and American patriots who have led and supported the resistance novement in the Philippines since the dark days of 1942.

Following the disaster which, in the face of overwhelming superior energy power, overtook our gallant forces, a deep and impenetrable silence engulfed the Philippines. Through that silence no nows concerning the fate of the Pilipine people reached the outside world until broken by a weak signal from a radio set on the Island of PANAY which was picked up, in the late fall of that same fateful year, by listening posts of the War Department and flashed to my headquarters. That signal, weak and short as it was, lifted that curtain of silence and uncertainty and disclosed the start of a human drama destined to make military history.

In it I recognized the spontaneous novement of the Filipine people to resist the shackles with which the enemy sought to bind them both physically and spiritue ally. I saw a people in one of the most tragic hours of human history, beneft of all reason for hope and without material support, endeavoring, despite the steam realities confronting them, to hold aloft the flaming torch of liberty. I gave this movement all of the spiritual encouragement that the situation and the material support that my limited resources would permit.

Through the understanding assistance of our Navy, I was able to send in by submarine, in dribbets at first, exus, assumition and noticel supplies. How of the first such shipment spread rapidly throughout the Philippines to electricy the people into full returning conscioussess that America had neither abandousd

nor forgotten them,

Since then, as my resources increased, I was enabled, after formalizing the gestilla forces by their recognition and incorporation as units of our army, to send in vitally needed supplies in ever increasing quantities through Philippine coastal contacts by four submarines finally consisted explusively to that purpose.

I would that at this time I might none the gallant heroes of this epic in Philippine-American history, but considerations of security for the individuals, their families and the compe require that I limit myself to a generalization of their work and a statement of their brilliant achievements.

Of the latter I need but point out that for the purposes of this compaign
we are materially mided by strong, buttle tested forces in nearly every Philippine
community, alerted to strike violent blows against the energy's rear as our lines
of buttle move forward and that new are providing countless large areas adjacent
to military objectives into which our sirmen may drop with assurances of immediate
rescue and protection. We are mided by the militant layelty of a whole people - a people who have rallied as one behind the standards of those stalmart patriots
who, reduced to wretched material conditions yet sustained by an unconquerable
spirit, have formed an invincible center to the resolute overall resistance.

We are aided by the fact that for many months my plans of compaign have benefited from the hazardous labors of a wast notwork of agents numbering into the hundreds of thousands providing me with precise, accurate and detailed information on major enemy moves and installations throughout the Philippine Archipelage. We are aided by the fact that through a wast notwork of radio positions extending into every center of enemy activity and concentration throughout the Islands, I have been kept in immediate and constant communication with such widespread sources

of information. We are aided by the fact that on every major Island of the Philippines there are one or more completely equipped and staffed weather observatories which flash to my headquarters full weather date morning, afternoon and night of every day and which in turn provides the basis for reliable weather forecasts to facilitate and secure the implementation of our operational plane. Widely disseminated to our forces throughout the Pacific and in China the imformation from this weather system has materially aided our military operations over a large section of the world's surface.

We are aided by an air warning system affording visual observation of the air over nearly every square foot of Philippine soil established for the purpose of flashing issediate warning of enemy aircraft novement through that same wast network of radio communications. We are aided by prevision on all inland materages and coastal areas of complete observation over enemy naval movement to give immediate target information to our subsarines on patrol in or near Philippine waters. This information has contributed to the sinking of enemy shipping of emornous tomage, and through such some facilities was flashed the murning to our naval forces of the enemy naval concentration off the eastern Philippines during the Mariannas operation.


Finally we are mided by the close interior vigilance that has secured for our military use countless enemy documents of great value, among which name the securet defensive plans and instructions of the Commander in Chief of the Combined Japanese Florts to counter our effensive action in the several Pecific areas and complete information on the strength and dispositions of enemy flort and neval air units. That some Commander in Chief of the Combined Japanese Florts was a prisoner of one of our guerilla units prior to his death from injuries sustained in an air orash.

All of these vital aids to our military operations, and there are many more

still unmentioned, are responsive to the indemitable courage of the military and civil leaders whom I shall in future name and their legal followers both Filipine and American; to gallant Filipines, residents of the United States, who have volunteered to infiltrate into the Islands in success of their countrymen and Americans who have infiltrated with them; and finally to the militant legalty and unconquerable spirit of the masses of the Filipine people.

As COMMANDER IN CHIEF of the forces of liberation I publicly admostledge and pay tribute to the great spiritual power that has made possible these notable and glorious achievements - achievements which find no counterpart in military history. Those great patriots, Filipino and American, both living and deed, upon whose valiant shoulders has rested the leadership and responsibility for this unparalleled novement in the past critical period, shall, when their identities can be made known, find a lasting place on the seroll of heroes of both nations - horoes who have selflessly and defiantly subordinated all to the cause of human liberty. Their names and their deeds shall over be anshrined in the hearts of car two peoples in whose darkest hours they have waged relentless war against the forces of evil that sought, through ruthless brutality, the enclavement of the Filipino people.

To those great patriots to whom I now pay public tribute I say stand to your bettle stations and relax not your vigilance until our forces shall have swept forward to relieve you.

He wants a comprehensive story emphasizing the gradual organization which the CinC was able to bring to bear on the situation; the support by Navy submarine; and the establishment of listening posts. The story should include accounts of each guerilla leader; reference to be made to Tomas Confesor. Other parties which are in the hills should also be included. He wants the story vivid, at such length as to present the background that will open the way for the epic record to be released. Include also the activities of Commander Parsons; the story of the Japanese Naval CinC whose body was found. The General intends to clear the story with a view to its transmission from Hollandia at the proper time. The propriety of issuing some parts of the account as proposed by the CinC is, to my mind, open to serious question. Please, however, prepare the stories along the lines as above indicated and we can then discuss questions as to deletions. RKS action faler

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
