Ladies and gentlemen, how do you do. This is William Winter speaking from somewhere in the Philippines.

During the last two and a half years of Japanese occupation of these Philippine islands, there have been innumerable instances of the loyalty of Filipino people to their country. Guerrillas have fought daringly and effectively in many places, and the story of the civilian resistance to the Japanese occupation garrisons would fill a good-sized book.

But there are all kinds of people in every country. It is wrong to speak of any people in generalities. While most of the people in the Philippines, are decent, law-abiding, God-fearing, patriotic citizens, there are some who were willing to sell their souls to Japan and turn against the democratic institutions of their own Philippine Commonwealth.

There were such traitors in France and in Italy and in Czechoslovakia and Holland and other countries in Europe. There have been such traitors in some of the areas in the Pacific and in Asia where the Japanese came with glowing promises of their so-called Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity sphere under which they sought to rob the occupied areas of food and clothing and peace and happiness, in order to serve the interests of the military rulers of Japan.

When the Japanese came to the Philippines, they began immediately to spread propaganda. They talked about Asia for the Asiatics, for instance. And they said that that means that the areas in Asia should belong to Asiatics. Actually what they meant was that Asia and Asiatics should come under the domination of Japan.





Now when you get right down to it, Asia has always been Asiatic. China has belonged to the Chinese, Thailand to the people of that country, Japan belongs to the Japanese people, although they are currently enslaved and hoodwinked by unscrupulous leaders, --- and the Philippines are for Filipinos. Certainly Asia is for Asiatics. Just as fish live in the ocean, and birds live in nests, and flowers grow in gardens, so the people in each country live in their country. It's elementary. Asia for the Asiatics means the Philippines for the Filipinos, China for the Chinese, Japan for the Japanese. And it certainly does not mean Filipinos for Japan.

Yet there were, and still are, in these islands people who either believed this sly Japanese propaganda, or else thought that they could live an easier life if they collaborated with the Japanese authorities. The Japanese promised them money and nice homes and food and clothing. These traitors were unwilling to share the suffering and discomforts of their fellow Filipinos, and they became puppets of the Japanese.

Of course, every one of these collaborationists is well known to the allied authorities. In fact, every move of the Japanese in the various communities in the Philippines is well known.

Now, as one community after another is liberated from Japanese clutches, irate Filipinos might be tempted to turn against these traitors, these collaborationists, and destroy them summarily. But that is not the democratic way. That is what the Japanese leaders might do with people they don't like. They cut their heads off or torture them. But we who believe in democracy insist upon fair and lawful treatment of lawbreakers, even if they are traitors. And so, every one of these collaborators is to receive a fair trial.

That is what will be done with the traitors in Europe. Each is as-

sured of a fair, legal trial, in which he may be represented by counsel and present his defense.

Now, what do you suppose these collaborators will say when they are put on trial? Why, it's obvious. They will say that they could not help themselves, that they were forced by the Japanese to collaborate. That is just about the only argument they can present to try to justify their traitorous acts.

Some of these people, occupied official positions under Japanese occupation in various Philippine islands, and as such officials they told guerrillas to come down from their fighting areas and surrender to the Japanese. They told the people of the Philippines to cooperate with Japanese soldiers. They did everything that the Japanese wanted them to do, and when they are caught and put on trial, you can just see them now, beating their breasts in righteous piety and protesting that they could not help themselves, and that the Japanese forced them to do what they did.

Let the people of the Philippines be assured that when the time comes for the trials of these traitors, that the evidence against them will be the best evidence obtainable. And the prosecutors will have full information as to who was a traitor and who was not.

It would seem that these collaborators should be unable to sleep at night, that their own conscience would torment them with the knowledge that they have been unfaithful to their own fellow citizens, and that they doubted for one single instant that Japan would be defeated in this war, and that the United States fighting forces, under the leadership of General MacArthur would return to the Philippines and force the Japanese out. But some of these traitors probably have no conscience. It will remain for

their fellow citizens of the Philippines to try them, and mete out the punishment they deserve.

However, let every man and woman in the Philippines be assured that everything will be done by the Philippine government to see that the guilty are adequately punished. Every effort will be made to see that none of the guilty shall escape punishment.

This is but one of the many activities undertaken by the Philippine government now duly established on the island of Leyte.

Currency has been stabilized, schools have been opened, free schools, free of propaganda, food has been brought in from America, food and clothing are being made available.

But let it be remembered, the collaborators, the traitors will not be allowed to go free. Their day will come.

And now, this is William Winter, speaking from somewhere in the Philippines, saying good afternoon and Mabuhay an Filipinas.

MEMORANDUM OF MY CONFERENCE WITH GENERAL DOUGLAS MACARTHUR
AT HIS HEADQUARTERS, 10:00 A.M., NOVEMBER 16, 1944.

General MacArthur very kindly greeted me with warmth and cordiality, and inquired in brief passing about Colonel Gador.

Sparkling with his characteristic forcefulness and beauty of speech -- far beyond my poor powers to reproduce here with any justice to him -- the General began by recalling that the magnificent courage, the epic resistance and the superb fighting shown and put up by the Filipinos on Bataan and Corregidor and won for them the respect and admiration of the world, and more important still the right to political and social equality in the fraternity of nations.

Before Bataan, the Philippines, he said, was assured of political parity with the rest of the nations: after the baptism of blood and fire on Bataan, however, the Filipinos have now undeniably attained, in the short space of three bitter years, a basis of equality in world opinion with any race or people, a unique and unparalleled achievement in history which might have required a hundred years to attain by normal processes.

The General revealed he intends to recommend to the President of the United States that, upon the re-conquest of Manila, the Philippine Republic be proclaimed as soon as possible.

He went on to disclose that it shall be his guiding policy to remove from power those Filipinos, no matter how great may be their wealth or powerful their influence, who went out of their way in helping or favoring the Japanese during their atrocious stay in the islands, and to turn them over, for trial and punishment, to the Government of the Philippines.

Once the Philippine Republic is launched and established, the General continued, the Filipinos cannot and must not rest on their laurels but must strive and work the harder, with great dignity and poise, to conserve the democratic government and way of life they had so dearly bought in priceless blood and gallant lives. On his part, he emphasized, the Filipinos can very well rest assured that it shall be his constant concern and endeavor to help promote, in every way he can, the interests and welfare of the people and government of the new Republic. At all times, he said, his services and experience shall be available to the Philippine Republic in the task of establishing and maintaining an Army adequate to her defense needs within the limitations of her economy.

The General then asked me to acquaint our people back home or wherever I may happen to be with his foregoing policies and plans.

Standing up to indicate the end of our conference, he concluded by congratulating me personally for what he considered a significant part I had played in the resistance movement against the Japanese in the guerillas.

1. The C in C on 9 September suggested that I unofficially develop for your consideration statements and proclamations that he will be called upon to make and issue upon arrival on Philippine soil.
2. His first statement to the Filipino people will of course have great influence upon the strength of the interior action as offensive operations proceed - will be of great historical significance and interest.
3. I believe that such a statement should embody the following points:
 - (a) That his return to Philippine soil, in redemption of his historic pledge, is fait accompli;
 - (b) That there is great force committed to Philippine liberation;
 - (c) An allusion to American-Filipino sacrifice in defense of Philippine soil;
 - (d) That the seat of Philippine government has been re-established on Philippine soil;
 - (e) Credit to the resistance movement during the period prior to the C in C's return;
 - (f) A call for the supreme effort of the people.
4. Attached is a draft of such a statement designed to embody the above points. I hope that through it a thought, phrase, or word may be contributed to the finished important product.
5. This is submitted direct, rather than through G-3, due to its unofficial character. I shall in like manner submit drafts of proclamations for immediate issuance for your later consideration.

By the grace of Almighty God I stand again on Philippine soil - soil consecrated in the blood of our two peoples who fought and died that freedom might not perish. I here stand with the mightiest array of military power ever concentrated in the Pacific - power dedicated and committed to the task of destroying every vestige of enemy control over your daily lives and restoring, upon a foundation of indestructible strength, the liberties of your people that the sacrifices of the past shall not have been in vain.

At my side is President Sergio Osmena and those of your countrymen who presently compose the membership of his cabinet. The seat of your government is now therefore firmly re-established on Philippine soil.

The hour for the redemption of your liberties is at hand. Your patriots have demonstrated, since the treacherous violation of your peaceful homes, an unswerving and resolute devotion to the principles of individual liberty that challenges the best that is written on the pages of human history -- a devotion that has commanded the admiration of all freedom loving peoples throughout the world. I now call upon your supreme effort that the enemy may know from the temper of an aroused and outraged people within that he has a force there to contend with no less violent than is the force committed from without.

May God strengthen you in this noble purpose.

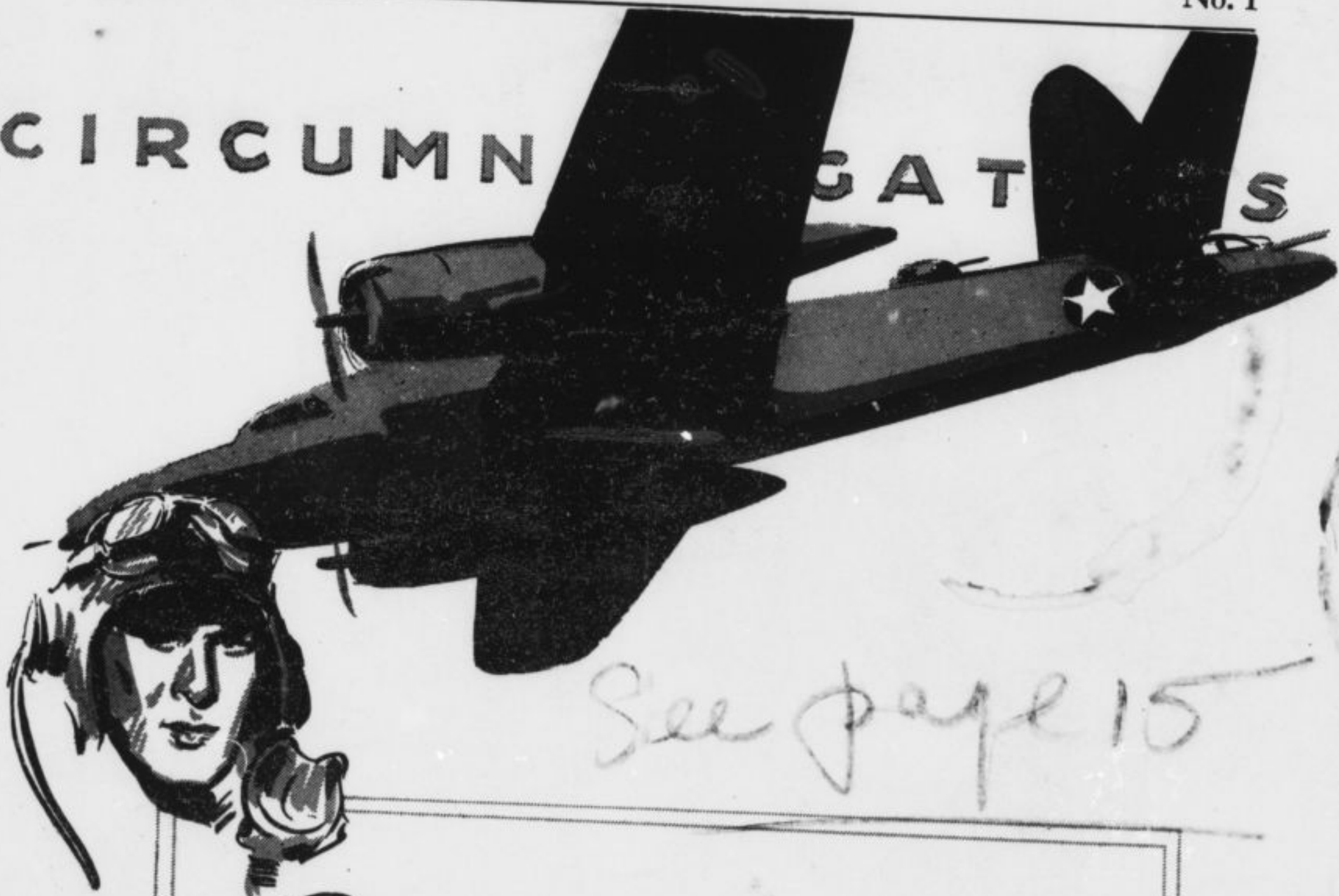

"Martin Johnson" is the name of a new Liberty ship launched on April 12 at the California Shipbuilding Corporation, Wilmington, Cal., under the auspices of the U. S. Maritime Commission.

Osa Johnson, invited to sponsor the launching of the vessel, was unable to appear because of public engagements in the East on that date but sponsored the ship in absentia, sending the following statement read at the ceremony:

"When one has given his entire life to the public, as my husband did, the good he accomplishes is his best reward and a sufficient and satisfying monument. But I know that Martin would be very happy and proud to know that he and his State had been honored by the naming after him of this beautiful ship.

"It seems especially appropriate that the name *Martin Johnson* should be roaming the seven seas in this way. For he was traveling ever since Jack London gave him his first chance on the *Swark* and travel was accomplishment for him.

"Aren't we lucky, he often said, to be able to rove the world over, as we love to do, and at the same time make our livelihood?"

"Perhaps it was the Viking ancestry in him, but I know that nothing would ever have contained him and that travel was his happiness as well as his destiny. And he was never happier than when he was at sea, even though it took years to become a real sailor. As you know, he rose from deckhand

to skipper of the *Swark* and he could always manage a ship like a practiced hand.

"It was not just motion, but curiosity that led Martin around and around the world. He wanted to see and know everything. Every animal and human being and object interested him. And through his cameras he tried to communicate his knowledge and his love of the out-of-doors to the rest of the world. The South Seas always fascinated him and we went back to the Solomons and New Hebrides and Borneo and other spots again and again.

"I hope that something of his stout heart and indomitable will and spirit may be a part of the character and the destiny of this ship that bears his name and that it may, on its every voyage, have the high adventures and the great good luck and the performance of good deeds which marked his every journey."

CIRCUM "BILL" LALLEY RETURNS TO NEW YORK

A member since 1914, but seldom seen at CC functions because, like a good Circumnavigator, he has always been on the go, is Circum Wm. H. (Bill) Lalley who appeared suddenly and without warning at the Aviation Night Dinner and later in the night entertained Brigadier General Caleb V. Haynes and his Aide, Lt. Col. B. L. Baker, Circums George Seybold, Louis Reed and near-Circum Professor James O'Brien at a Reminiscence Party at the Ritz Hotel.

Ever since War broke, Circum Lalley has been connected actively with the executive end of Admiral Land's big maritime operation, but last month relinquished his work to become Vice President of Moore-McCormack Lines and will hereafter make his home in New York.

Circum Lalley's CC Number is 156 and most of the Circums he used to know in the old days are listed in Necrology, but he himself never gets out of his Forties in looks or sprightliness. Luck to you, Circum Bill, in your new work.

MANILA CIRCUM TAKES US TO TASK—AND HOW!!

Charges lack of sympathy for Philippine Members maltreated by Japs—Cannot see from LOG that "you fellows know there's a War on"—The Club, he says, continues to have its "joyous Lunches and Dinners," listening to "things of bygone days." And the LOG editor attempts a reply.

AS usual the editor is wrong. Here he's been pouting around at Board meetings because nobody, he maintains, reads the corny old sheet, and, on account of the paper shortage, urges that it be bottled for the duration.

Then, lo and bedoggoned, if all of a sudden Circum L. D. Lockwood doesn't pop up from out California way to prove that he, for one, not only reads the LOG's articles but the Roster as well. And what is more, and worse, he doesn't like either. And tells us so to our florid faces.

That's what we are here to talk about and not the happy discovery that we've got a Loc reader in our busy membership.

First, then, let us spread before you the resounding bed-slatting that our California critic gives both the publication and the Club.

Dear Circumreed:

I am just sending Circum Stanley Wilson my dues for two years—for last year and this year. My delay in paying last year's dues was not an oversight or neglect. It was done with malice and aforethought. The fact is that I was not sure that I wanted to continue as a member of the Circumnavigators Club.

The reason was that I could not see from THE LOC, at least, that you fellows knew there was a war on. You continued to have your joyous lunches and dinners, and to listen to Burton Holmes and others about things of bygone days. And what rankled most with me was that no one seemed to realize that the Philippine Islands had been captured by the Japanese and that several of our members along with 5,000 other American citizens, including women and children (to say nothing of some 12,000 Americans of the military forces), were prisoners at the hands of

the barbaric enemy. You blithely continued to publish their names and addresses in Manila just as if nothing had happened.

For example, you published in "Who and Where," "Rosenthal, J., Pres., Manila Branch No. 5, P. O. Box 1425, Manila, P. I.," also, "Wing, E. E., Vice Pres., Manila Branch No. 5, care of Marsman Company, Inc., Insular Life Building Manila, P. I."—as if Manila Branch No. 5 still existed! And as if you could write letters to these circumnavigators at the addresses given!

Now, I realize that the Circumnavigators is not a benevolent, fraternal, nor charitable organization. But I did think it was an organization of good fellows. And it seemed to me that when fellow members, without any fault of their own, are found in such a hellish situation as those Manila circums are today, and have been for over two years, there might be—and ought to be—some expression, at least of sympathy, by their fellow members, and through the official organ, THE LOC.

I note in the autumn number of THE LOC that at last there has been recognition of the fact that one circumnavigator is out there—Circum Tommy Wolff. But from your article you would think he is holding down a good job in a "self-governing community" instead of being a prisoner kept behind a high barbed-wire fence and living on a starvation diet, principally of rice.

I shall now tell you what I have been able to learn about the Manila Circums. This information has been gathered bit by bit from repatriates on the *Gripsholm* and is very incomplete, but complete enough to leave something to the imagination.

Circum Joseph N. Wolfson: He died in October, 1942. He was a very old man, nearing 90, and he was ill at the time of the invasion—but lived for nearly 10 months afterwards. It is believed that all of this time he was confined in a hospital. He was a real circumnavigator, having circumnavigated 5 times, and made many other extended trips to different parts of the world. He was an aggressive lawyer, and, a native of New Orleans, he was a great advocate of the white man's supremacy. One can imagine how unhappy his last days must have been with the Japanese in control of the city and country where he had lived for

the last 43 years, and in the building up of which he had taken much pride and interest.

His son, Circum Julian A. Wolfson: He is confined in Santo Tomas Internment Camp. According to last reports, his mother, almost 90 years of age, had not been interned, and his sister, Marguerite, had been allowed to stay with her mother.

Circum Thomas J. Wolf: You have already mentioned him. He and his wife are confined in Santo Tomas. He was head of the Red Cross in Manila, but the Japs did not allow him to function as such.

Circum E. E. (Gene) Wing: If he lives through it, he will have an interesting tale to tell. He owned a neat little cruiser which he used for fishing and pleasure trips. When the Japs came in, he provisioned the little ship, took a couple of friends and put to sea. He could have made Australia, and safety, but he was waiting for the "aid to MacArthur" to come. But it never came, and Gene is supposed to be hiding out in the mountains of one of the southern islands. It is said that the Japs saw his boat anchored and dropped a bomb on it.

Circum Col. Courtney Whitney: He is lucky. He was in the United States when the war broke out, and he immediately re-entered the Army. He had previously been a captain in the regular Army and had resigned to practice law in Manila. He is now a Colonel attached to MacArthur's staff in Australia, and hopes to be in the front line when American troops again set foot on the Philippines.

Circum J. (Jake) Rosenthal: Jake was manager of the Manila Hotel when the Japs came in, and for a time had to play mine host to the Japanese Commanding General and all the ranking Japanese officers. He is now confined in Santo Tomas. His health has not been good.

Circum F. Theo Rogers: He was manager of the *Philippine Free Press*, and of course all newspapermen have been the special victims of the Japanese. He was confined for a considerable time in a dungeon in the old Spanish Fort Santiago. Fort Santiago was used by the American Army as its headquarters, but the dungeons underneath, a terrible place to contemplate even on a bright

day, have never been used during the American regime. He was later released from the dungeon and is now confined in Santo Tomas. It is said that he is very rebellious, but his personality is so likable he gets by, and the Japanese, contrary to the rule, don't know just what to do with him.

Circum Edward A. McCreary: Mac and I qualified for membership in the Circumnavigators at the same time, as we circumnavigated together in 1911 when we were both officials of the Philippine Government. I have no direct news about Mac, but he was in Iloilo at the time of the invasion and was probably interned there. The internees there were first confined in the municipal jail, and then taken to better quarters later on, according to reports. The Iloilo internees were transferred to Manila in May of last year, so he may now be in Santo Tomas.

Circum A. G. (Jerry) Henderson: I have no information about Jerry. Probably he is confined in Santo Tomas.

Just a P. S. so you may understand better how I feel. I lived in the Philippines 38 years, eight years as a government official and thirty years as a practicing attorney. I left there in March, 1941. During the past year, I have been with the Office of Strategic Services on work relating to the Philippines.

Lack to You! AND TO THEM!

THERE is not much to say in way of rebuttal after that robust whamming. And yet, perhaps there is.

For one thing we would point out to good Circum Lockwood that the reason the LOC continues to "blithely" (?) carry the old residence and/or business addresses opposite the names of its cherished Philippines Circums is because it does not recognize for one moment the legal right of the invading Nipponese rascals to those residential or business places. They are the permanent addresses of our members, they belong to our members, and, like the blue birds that will be over the white cliffs of Dover, they too will once again, and we think soon, be taken up by their rightful possessors, D. V.

Circum Lockwood says that we continue to publish these addresses "as if Manila Branch No. 5 still existed, and as if you could still write letters to these Circumnavigators at the addresses given." Well, brother, the Manila Branch does still exist. It exists in the minds and hearts of all of us everywhere. It is a living organism, not a street address. Temporarily it is not functioning. That is the way we prefer to look at it.

At the same time we cannot imagine any Circum anywhere (90% of whom have doubtless visited the Philippines in their world travels) being so sadly uninformed about Jap-held territories as to think that because the permanent addresses of these members appear in the Roster, it follows that the buck-toothed boys would permit mail to be delivered at such addresses. Nor could any Circum be so dumb as to think that by substituting Santo Tomas or any other internment camp as the present address of Manila Circums, it would help any.

Would Circum Lockwood have us insert the concentration camp address of Manila Members? Or not give any address at all? Or delete both names and addresses? Or what? He appears to take us severely to task on this score.

Incidentally, we have members in similar predicament in China, Germany, Holland, Belgium, Norway, France and certain other Axis-held areas. Many are Americans. We still list their permanent addresses. The LOC cannot reach them these days. But soon it will. Meanwhile, the hell with Hitler and Hirohito! We shall not flatter them by conceding that our Manila Branch or any other Branch is dead and gone, and obediently remove our members' names and addresses from the Roster.

CIRCUM Lockwood notes in the Autumn Number of the LOC that "at last there has been recognition of the fact that one Circumnavigator is out there—Circum Tommy Wolff." Is it possible that our friend from California failed to see in the Winter 1941 Number the page and a half article about our Manila members taken from a previous informative letter that he himself wrote? And did he miss Circum Ladd's withering blank verse "Task Force" on page 17 of the Summer '42 Number? And the letter from Circum Donald Cook on page 19 of the Summer '43 Number mentioning Circum Gene Wing and Circum Colonel Courtney Whitney? And Commander Denis Knoll's exposé of Jap treachery and brutality at Bataan and Corregidor at the Pacific Night Dinner (page 11, Winter '43 LOC)?

The news which Circum Lockwood now thoughtfully gives us regarding various Manila members appears to have been made possible by the Government's published account of Jap maltreatment of our soldiers and civilians released for the first time in December 1943 when the *Gripsholm* repatriates arrived. As this is the first issue of the LOC since that date, we could not have published any authentic news sooner. Circum Lockwood has been, as he states, with the Office of Strategic Services. Why then did he himself not give us news about our Manila members before this? Obviously because the Government censorship had not yet been lifted. So why blame the lil ole LOC for not publishing information which it did not possess?

And, by the way, we hardly think the news note we printed about Tommy Wolff et al deserves the stricture Mr. Lockwood hands us when he says that "from your article you would think he (Wolff) is holding down a good job in a self-governing community instead of being a prisoner behind a high barbed wire fence. . . ." That article was not ours at all. Had Circum Lockwood read it carefully he would have noted that it was simply a reprint of an OWI newspaper report as stated in an introductory line. The blame, therefore, is upon the troubled head of Uncle Elmer Davis, not ours.

ALL of which brings us to a point important to us but not often appreciated by Circums not in touch with our work. Neither the Club nor the LOC has a single paid employe. All of us are volunteers who take many precious hours out of our busy lives to attend to the Club's many-sided activities; one of which is the quarterly publication of the LOC. It is all done poorly, no doubt, but it gets done.

The LOC has no reporters, foreign correspondents, photographers, spies, scouts or other agile gentry who jump to an assignment because they get paid to do it. The LOC depends entirely—we said entirely—upon its members to give it news about themselves or their brother Circums. And there are

Pyramid Discussion Evokes Repercussion

IF I may be allowed space I should like to take gentle issue with Circum Howard MacDonald on the origin and history of the pyramids. It would be better to say the Great Pyramid, since he takes no account of the numerous others, not even those near that of Khufu or Cheops at Ghizeh, to say nothing of the other groups at various locations.

It needs only a cursory observation of historical writings to note that from a few ascertainable facts speculation will spin out deductions of the widest variety. The conclusions arrived at will be seen to have been determined by a point of view, and this basic attitude serves to assist in emphasizing such aspects of the ascertainable facts as will support opinions consciously or subconsciously predetermined. In other words our fundamental theories of existence in this particular case lead us to distort the evidence.

With how much bias or distortion I proceed in the following lines is, of course, for the reader to judge. Without going into detail or polemics I should say at once that my attitude toward the eternal verities, the cosmos or whatever, is diametrically opposite to that of my friend Circum Howard MacDonald.

THE case I am volunteering to challenge was put forward in the Summer, 1943, issue of the LOC and I summarize it as follows:

The theory about the "pyramid" generally accepted by what Circum MacDonald would probably call the classical school of Egyptologists is that it was built by direction of Khufu (Greek: Cheops) and that its purpose was that of a tomb.

Circum MacDonald doubts this because:

1. There are no "engraved" hieroglyphics but only the cartouche of "Khufu-Knem" painted on the rock.
2. No mummy has been found in the tomb chambers and none of the usual funerary furniture.
3. The "arrangements" of the tombs "were different from any other in Egypt and the pyramid itself is "unlike the great majority of the royal tombs already found."
4. The Pharaoh was "comparatively insignificant," "very little is actually known" about him and it is not "reasonable nor logical that he could or would be able to erect such a stupendous structure merely on the pretext of making a tomb for himself."
5. "Most of the royal tombs" have been underground completely sealed, full of things and engraved inscriptions on the walls.

NOW all the above are matters of dispute in the realm of ascertainable facts, or facts already established. With them we

shall deal later on. There is another series of statements representing the positive side of Circum MacDonald's case. These assertions which we shall now discuss are supposed to support the theory that the great pyramid was built some 25,000 years ago by people from the continent of Atlantis for the purpose of a temple in which the finishing touches were daubed on to education of a specially selected group of mystics in some esoteric science or other. "And when some candidate had successfully passed the last Initiation he was a super-man, more than human, possessed of infinite knowledge and able to perform all manner of miracles."

We shall now examine the steps by which we jump from a pile of rocks to the utmost heights of fancy as above expressed.

In the search for something miraculous or super-human about the pyramid it has been noted that it seems to "stand exactly in the center of the inhabitable portion of the earth's surface." We might quibble about the "exactly" but we hardly find the fact, if such it is, of any importance. We should say that geologic forces happened to place the drainage channel of several mountain systems at that spot and the inhabitants of that river valley, for reasons which to them were good and sufficient, built a pyramid.

There is a second "fact" supposed to belong to the same category of esoteric phenomena. The weight of the pyramid is "esti-

MEMORANDUM:

TO : Members GHQ Officers' Club.

MEMORANDUM:

TO : Members GHQ Officers' Club.

1. To date I have taken it upon myself to sponsor the GHQ Officers' Club. It has not been practicable to have a meeting of the club members, nor will it be. The Secretary-Treasurer has conferred with me regarding its activities and upon my instigation Major Barrett has made monthly audits which I have reviewed and which are retained in files.
2. The club has accumulated as of 31 October, 1943 through the small discounts that accrued as profits a net worth of £ 865-14-03 with assets of £ 2253-03-09. The amount of money involved will be considerably increased by the new arrangement recently announced for obtaining U.S. whiskies and by the big increase in membership due to expansion of GHQ.
3. A new and separate room for the club will open in the basement of the Perry House within a week or so.
4. It is believed that now there should be a Board of Governors to share with the Secretary-Treasurer responsibility for policies, passing on audits, manner of handling funds, etc, etc.

SPECIAL LETTER

The arrival of the Gripsholm, with all the information we are anxiously waiting for, is the one important news. Therefore, we are making this a short letter containing information pertinent chiefly to the arrival and to the preparations for the Gripsholm.

The M. S. Gripsholm is scheduled to arrive in Jersey City on December 2nd. However, it is highly probable that she may be several days behind time. There will be 1,200 Americans on board and 250 Canadians from Japanese controlled territory in the Far East. The cable reports from Mormagao indicate that the majority of them appear to be in good health and spirits but many were thinner. Good food and freedom will, no doubt, improve this condition. Those who have been ill have already shown improvement. There was an American child born on the S. S. Teia Maru, Gretchen Penelope Whitaker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Whitaker, of Providence, Rhode Island. The father was the American Vice-Consul at Manila.

Most of the reports which have come through so far have dealt mostly with the political situation in the Philippines and the diminishing food situation. The large quantities of bulk supplies and the next of kin parcels, sent on the M. S. Gripsholm and already delivered at Manila by the Teia Maru, should for the time being alleviate this situation, and this Christmas, if not Thanksgiving, should be a better one than last year.

Of the recent Philippine repatriates, which number 131, fifty are residents of the Islands. The rest are transients caught in Manila at the outbreak of the war. Included in these are four families coming from Baguio but there are none from the outlying Islands on this exchange. There have been a few additional names added to the original list issued by the State Department. These are; Mr. Edmund Hoyt; Mrs. John Hayes, son and daughter; Miss Marjorie M. Judson; Miss Florence E. Evans and Mr. Ben Kreiselman.

Owing to a recent ruling made by the Army, Navy, State Department and the F. B. I., no relatives friends, company representatives or unofficial organizations, except the Red Cross, are permitted to go to the pier to meet the Gripsholm when she arrives in New Jersey. Therefore, our Committee is cooperating with the Red Cross and the State Department in all regulations and arrangements for the landing of passengers. The Red Cross was granted permission to be in charge of an Information Desk outside of the Customs Barrier and expert workers will be in charge of mail and messages only, which will be given to the passengers as soon as they have been officially cleared from the steamer. The usual Red Cross Canteen Services will not be permitted and only experts from the Home Service Division will be on hand at the desk. All mail handled by the Red Cross will have to pass through censors hands. Therefore, it is doubtful whether last minute letters will reach the internees. All mail addressed to returning repatriates sent in our care will be handed to them at their hotels or other designated places. Last minute messages, however, which state where relatives and friends will be waiting will not necessitate censorship. There will be Red Cross Motor Corps in attendance at the exit of the

pier and taxi service will also be available. Relatives and friends coming to New York are being advised not to attempt to await at the approaches to the pier. When an individual is ready to leave the pier the Information Desk will telephone to the organizations or companies involved that they are en route to the place previously designated and then in turn these organizations and companies will inform the waiting relatives and friends. This, of course, includes our organization. The State Department has promised to place a notice on the bulletin board of the Gripsholm at Rio de Janeiro telling of these arrangements and also of the names of the organizations cooperating and giving a brief resume of their individual plans and arrangements.

Our rooms at 101 Park Avenue are at the disposal of all those returning from the Philippines and for their use as a temporary headquarters. There will be free stenographic and telephone service as well as shopping services. Many old Manila friends will be on hand to greet them and render all possible assistance. Our office telephone numbers are: Murray Hill, 5-8483; 5-7623; and 5-7624. Arrangements have been made by us with the leading stores in New York whereby special shoppers have been appointed to look after the needs of the returning Americans and to ease the rush and confusion caused by the coming Holiday Season. These special shoppers will be designated by name through our office should the repatriates care to avail themselves of this service.

Last July we took up with the proper authorities in Washington the question of ration books and extra shoe coupons for the returning repatriates. This has been arranged and they will receive the books and coupons automatically upon their arrival in New Jersey.

A partial list of names sent to us for inquiry of relatives and friends still left in the Philippines has been placed on board the steamer at Rio, for the returning Americans to peruse at their leisure. The complete lists will be given to them on their arrival in New York. Our Committee will send this information out as soon as it is physically possible. It must be borne in mind that all those coming home from internment have been under long and severe hardships and that it will take time to obtain specific information about all our people still in the Philippines. Because of this and in order to spare the repatriates the terrific pressure of personally answering the inevitable thousands of letters of inquiry we are undertaking this task for them. This also will take time. Therefore, we would appreciate your patience and understanding and we assure you that all available information will be sent as soon as it is possible to answer the thousands of letters already accumulating here. All returning passengers have been advised not to write letters on the steamer because strict censorship will delay their delivery and often this delay means several months before they reach their destination.

We have been assured that the evacuation of passengers from the steamer will be speedier than on the last exchange and the authorities are now planning to complete this in one day. However, it will be impossible to foretell the hour when individuals will be cleared to go onshore as there is a governmental routine which first must be complied with. Some of the very ill, who are ambulatory cases, will be probably be taken off at Quarantine. However, there will be sufficient ambulances at the pier to take care of the rest. The Canadian repatriates will be taken from the steamer to a waiting bonded train and sent immediately to Montreal.

A few more cables have been received from the Philippines. Among these is one from Cyrus Padgett to his wife stating that he had received her cable and that he was O. K. One from John A. McQuilkin to his mother which is the second cable she has received since his internment. One from Kenneth Day stating that they were all well and still another from John Hicks Jr., to his mother, Mrs. J. T. Hicks which asked her to reply and told of his excellent health.

We regret to report the death of Mrs. Charles M. Magill of Lucena who died of dysentery and also the death of Mr. John Locke who passed away on June 1, 1943.

In regard to internee mail further information has been received that all letters addressed to internment camps in the Far East must be under 25 words, the maximum 24. This applies to CIVILIANS as well as to the military. Civilian mail is being received now in Canada which leads us to believe that it may soon arrive in the United States.

It is quite obvious that all the work involved in connection with the arrival of the Gripsholm, the services to be rendered and the large amount of clerical work needed to send information to the thousands of relatives and friends in this country will add to our expenses. Many people have been more than generous and sent in voluntary contributions for this purpose. However, we will still need more to enable us to render all the necessary service during this emergency. In spite of the fact that we have very many volunteers who will come forward, the task before us is so immense that it requires a large overhead expenditure and all contributions no matter how small will be most welcome.



EQUALIZATION OF CERTAIN DISABILITY BENEFITS FOR ARMY OFFICERS

Section I, War Department Bulletin No. 12, 7 July 1943, (Act of Congress Public Law 101-78th Cong.) is quoted for the information and guidance of all concerned:

"An Act to equalize certain disability benefits of Army officers."

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That any officer of the Army of the United States or of any component thereof, except an officer of the Regular Army, who heretofore or hereafter has been or may be granted retirement pay for physical disability determined or incurred while serving under a temporary appointment in a higher grade shall receive retirement pay computed as otherwise provided by law for officers of such higher grade.

"SEC. 2. Any officer of the Regular Army who heretofore or hereafter has been or may be retired for physical disability determined or incurred while serving under a temporary appointment in a higher grade shall have the rank and receive retired pay computed as otherwise provided by law for officers of such higher grade.

"SEC. 3. Any officer of the Regular Army on the retired list who shall have been placed thereon for reasons other than physical disability shall, if he incurs physical disability while serving under a temporary appointment in a higher grade, be promoted on the retired list to such higher grade and receive retired pay computed as otherwise provided by law for an officer of such higher grade retired on account of physical disability incident to the service.

"SEC. 4. Any officer of the Regular Army on the retired list who shall have been placed thereon by reason of physical disability shall, if he incurs additional physical disability while serving under a temporary appointment in a higher grade, be promoted on the retired list to such higher grade and receive retired pay computed as otherwise provided by law for officers of such higher grade. Provided, That the Secretary of War, or such person or persons as he may designate shall find that the additional physical disability is incident to service while on active duty in the higher grade and not less than 30 per centum permanent.

CW

"SEC. 5. Any officer of the Regular Army on the retired list who shall have been placed thereon for reasons other than physical disability shall, if he incurs physical disability while serving on active duty in the same grade as that held by him on the retired list, receive retired pay computed as otherwise provided by law for officers of such grade retired on account of physical disability incident to the service.

"SEC. 6. The benefits of this Act shall apply to officers of the Army of the United States who were retired or granted retirement pay subsequent to April 6, 1917, or who may hereafter be retired or granted retirement pay for physical disability in line of duty in time of war or any emergency declared by the President, or within six months thereafter, determined or incurred while serving under a temporary appointment in a higher grade, including any officer given a temporary appointment in a higher grade under the Act of June 16, 1936, who has been retired for physical disability in a lower grade.

"SEC. 7. The provisions of this Act shall not apply in any case unless proceedings to obtain the benefits provided herein are initiated within six months from the termination of the temporary appointment held at the time when the disability is incurred or the disabled officer's release from active duty, whichever occurs earlier: Provided, That such proceedings may be initiated within six months from the date of the approval of this Act in any case where such termination of appointment, retirement, or release from active duty occurred prior to such approval. The Secretary of War is authorized to prescribe such regulations as he may deem necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act.

"SEC. 8. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to limit the power of the President under existing law, or to affect the right of any officer of the Regular Army to have the rank and retired pay of a higher grade than herein provided, or of any other officer of the Army of the United States to have the retirement pay of a higher grade than herein provided, if entitled thereto under other provisions of law.


"SEC. 9. No back pay shall accrue by reason of the enactment of this Act. The provisions of this Act shall not otherwise affect the method in which officers are to be retired.
