### DISTINGUISHID-SERVICE CROSS

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Concress approved 9 July 1918 (Dulletin 43, WD, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded by the Commander-in-Chief, United States irmy Forces, Tacific, to the following-named officers:

Licutement Colonel BETNAND L. ANDERSCN, 0360167, Air Corps, United States Army. For extraor inary heroism in action in the Philippine Islands from 9 April 1943 to 1 April 1945. Following his escape from Jatean, Colonel anderson organized thirty-six guerrilla units of approximately one hundred men each in several provinces in the East Contral Luzon Area. Later, assuming command in this region, he established contact with similar units on Mindanao and Samar and his headquarters served as a discharge point for signal and demolition teams as well as for arms, equipment and supplies which were made available through the submarine service. Early in 1945, after reporting to the Sixth Army Headquarters, he coordinated guerrilla activities in contral and southern . Luzon, while his units continued operations on the east coast of Luzon, contributing to the liberation of several island groups. Colonel Anderson, by his untiring efforts, organizing ability, courage and outstanding loadership, contributed materially to the success of operations in the Philippine Islands. Major JOHN P. BOONE, 02027036, Infantry, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in action in the Thillipine Islands from 10 April 1942 to 3 February 1945. Major Boone, who had been cut off from his organization during an engagement carly in the war, sought out and was assigned to the Dataan Military District as organizer and Commander of Guerrilla Forces in May 1942. Operating in Datsan, Zambales, and Southern Pampanga, he followed a policy of "passive resistance" and eventually built up a "skeleton" division under the Central Luzon Guerrilla Commund. His organization successfully carried on intelligence activities and on 4 January 1945 his guarrilla troops began an all-out effort against the enomy within the Bataca district, Working coasolossly, with intelligence and commondable courago, Major Roome, through his ability, initiative, energy and qualities of leadership, contributed substantially to the success of American operation tions in the Philippine Islands. Captain ALVIN FAREITTA, Luzon Guorrilla Area Forces. For extraordinary horoism in action in the Thilippine Islands from the fall of Jataan in 1942

Cartain RAYMOND C. HUNT, JR., 02027343, Army of the United States. For extraordinary agroism in action in the Philippine Islands from 21 April 1942 to 30 April 1945. Following his oscapo from the enemy early in 1942, Captain Hunt organised two companies of guerrillas and became the Executive Officer for IGAF-US FFE in Tarlac Province. Cathering scattered arms, his mon cloared the area of roving bandit gangs. Accepting the command of Pangasinan Province 20 June 1944, he carried on propaganda work among civilians and instituted intelligence activities. His troops started allout operations against the foe four days prior to the landing of American Forces at Lingayen Gulf. articipating in the attack on an enemy parrison at San Cuintin, Cangasinan, on 5 January 1945, he infiltrated their lines to cain valuable combat intelligence and establish a communication center for G-2 reports from several neighboring provinces. By his ability, initiative, courage and qualities of leadership, while engaged in activities with the Luzon Guerrilla Army Forces, Captain Hunt materially aided American operations in the inilimine Islands. Major ROTERT 7. LITHIF, 0379114, Infantry, Army of the United States. For extraordinary horoism in action in the Thilippine Islands from 3 Decombor 1941 to 7 May 1945. Hajor Lapham, solected to organize guerrillas throughout the Philippine Islands prior to the fall of Bataan, continued his activities during the period of enemy occupation. Breaking up his unit into smaller bands in order to cover more territory, he operated in the provinces of Tarlac, Pangasinan, and Nueva Ecija. Collecting arms and voluntours and climinating outlaw bands, his organisation so offectively rotected the civilian population from the common enemy and roving bandits, that he was able to enlist the aid of thousands of Filipinos for his forces. Establishing radio contact with General Headquarters, Southwest Pacific Area, in June 1944, he regularly submitted intelligence reports covering central Luzon. In the fall of 1944 he was able to enlarge his intelligence activities and increase his combat strength through supplies and equipment which came through the submarine service. Early in 1945, he conducted offensive operations against the enemy, cutting communication lines, ambushing troop convoys, and attacking garrisons and supply dumps. This fighting continued until the imericans had passed through the area occupied by the guerrilla trooms, after which his entire force of approximately 12,000 men was made

available to the Sixth Army. In the face of many hazards and extreme dangers, Major Lapham was able to organize and unify a strong guerrilla force in Luzon and by skilful planning, timely activities, and ceaseless efforts, he contributed in a material way to the success of operations in the Thilippine Islands.

Major HITHY MCKENZIE, Luzon Guerrilla Aroa Forces. For extraordinary heroism in action in the Philippine Islands from the fall of Bataan in 1942 until return to military control early in 1945. Hajor McKensie, in the face of many hazards and extreme dan ers, assisted in the organization and unification of guerrilla forces in the Philippine Islands which proved hi hly effective in protecting the civilian population, harassing the enemy, and furnishin intelli ence reports to General Headquarters, Southwest Pacific Area. Servin: for a time as Executive Officer of the North Central Luzon Guerrilla Forces, he was instrumental in solvin many personnel and administrative problems. Despite a minimum of surplies and equipment, he was instrumental in holping to maintain well trained fighting units which rendered valuable assistance to the American forces after their arrival. Working ceaselessly, with untirin efforts and commondable courage, Major Eckenzie, through his ability, initiative, and qualities of leadership, contributed substantially to the success of operations in the Philippine Islands. Major HTTIN P. R.MSEY, 0368746, Infantry, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in the Philippine Islands from 21 April 1942 to 30 A ril 1945. Major Ramsoy was assigned as adjutant and second in command of the East Control Luzon Guerrilla Area, com risin : seven provinces. He rersonally organized querilla forces in Perpanga, Manila, Tarlac, and Pangasinan and, assuming command with the capture of his superior officers on 21 January 1943, coordinated and completed the organization of Guerrilla units in Contral Luzon. Establishing headquarters on Mount Balabac, north of Montalban, on the outskirts of Manila, Major Ramsey directed intelligence activities, the dissemination of propagenda, and the organization of combat units. By every available courier, intelligence reports were sent to Panay and Hindoro. In October 1944 radio contact was established with General Headquarters, Southwest Tacific Area, which proved invaluable as vital information could now be supplied daily. Commanding 10,000 officers and men, with a reserve of approximately 20,000, Hajor Lamsey moblized units which effectively sabotaged and harassad the enemy in every possible manner. Upon the arrival of the imerican forces in East Central Luzen, he made available to them well or wanised, armed troops, guides, and intelligence personnel and Ramsey, althou he hysically handica god by illness, through his untiring offorts, or enizin ability, commendable cours o and outstanding leadership, materially advanced the success of Allied operations in the Philippine Islands.

Cabanghang will be dispatched to your area by submarism on or about 15 August 1944. TO ALL BARRIO HEADS AND LEADERS

The following information is asked of the civilian population by the Hend or Comminder of this Hendounrters.

In This is to inform you us to what definite actions are to be taken pertuining to evil elements.

(a) Information pertuining to sucrellias.

(b) Date of arrival at your barrio.

(c) Direction headed upon leaving your barrie. Tevarde which direction or to what barries they were headed for.

(d) Strength of the guerrillus.

(e) Firenman (Mumber of revolvers, rifles, michinegums with them). (f) Dress (Whether dressed in civilian, constabulary uniforms or

denim suita).

(g) What the guerrillas say and do (What the guerrillas propagandize in your burrie to the people and what actions do they take in game).

(h) Other valuable information such as their movements; all this

concerning the bad elements.

22. Methods of obtaining information or reports pertaining to these elements (How information is accumulated on these bad elements).

A. DAYPIME

All the barrie civilians, including weren and children should be on smand at all times even if at work in their homes.

B. AT NICHT

All men should be on the witch for bandit elements.

#### 3. PENALTTES

In the event you and the people do not report to the Commanding Officer information pertaining to mevements of guerrillas, we are sure of punishing you; not only the barrie heads but all the barrie people as well, including wencer and children, in the policy making all answer for one. If you have fed guerrillus, it is probable that you will not be penalized in the event you notify this headquarters as soon as pessible.

4. All burrie people should bring their excess 'palay' to town to be stored in threhouses keeping in their homes only a few day's supply that the suerrillas may not force them to sell to same.

#### 2 - THE IMPROVEMENT OF HARVEST

1. Gather all civilians with me visible means of supports Be twice or thrice as industrious in your work before the war broke out.

2. THE PEAK OF PROSPERITY: A. PALAY AND VEGETABLES

The harvest of pulay must be two or three times as much before the armed conflict breaks out.

It is necessary that each person should harvest twice a year. It is also necessary that you improve the vegetable crops, by properly tilling and working on the seil. B. COPRA (a) Each barrie individual should prepare as much cepra as demanded by the Matsubishi Company. (b) It is deemed necessary that all coconut grove owners make it a point to prepure copra at once. (c) Improvement of cocomut groves (all grasses and other plants should be cleared out). (d) Any individual who does not occupy himself in the preparation of copre will be considered an ally of the guerrillas, as well as individuals involved in the sale of oil in towns other than their ewn without a permit from the Mayer. C. OTHER IMPORTANT INDUSTRIES Improve the harvest of plants, the weeden shee industry, the hat industry, burd bags, etc. 3. The coldiers of the Imperial Japanese Army that are here will visit the burries to observe as to whether these orders are being fulfilled or otherwise. Upon these visits, the heads of the barries and the Neighborhood Associations should approach them for a better understanding and present their reports on the standings of their respective barries. SMR-17 UNITED STATES PHILIPPINE ISLAND FORCES Headquarters Kalayaan Command File: V 9 August, 194 Subject: Anti-Axis Organisation in Luson. : Commander in Chief, To Allied Forces in the Southwest Pacific Area. 1. The following generalized information regarding Anti-Axis organizations within the limits of 1st to 5th Military District, inclusive, im the opinion of the undersigned based on information obtained through personal contast, intelligence operatives and communications. This information is furmished for perusal and/or consideration of higher headquarters. 2. The undersigned has endeavored to investigate irregularities and actions of various individuals and organisations that were reported to him, with a view to having the information available at such time as proper authorities direct further investigation and action. S. It is requested that the undersigned be advised as to whether or not information of this nature should be prepared in proper form and forwarded to your headquarters at this time. SECTION I - General Remarks. 1. It is believed that every guerrilla organisation in the lat to 5th Military District, inclusive, is definitely Anti-Japanese. It is further beliswed that some of the organisations are Anti-American. All organisations that the undersigned has been in contact with openly claim to be pro-Filipino. Most of them have expressed or exhibited a pro-American attitude. 2. It is believed that the paramount objective of every organisation at this time is the elimination of the common enemy. Some organisations have definite political programs. Further information on this subject is furnished in the individual report on each organization. 3. The Anti-Axis organisations have definitely accomplished the following a. Kept many people loyal to the allied nations and kept many people from openly cooperating with the enemy. b. These organisations have also been responsible for the elimination of many pro-Japanese citisens of the Philippines. The only question regarding the elimination is the system of proving whether or not suspects more guilty and whether or not the people responsible for same have complied with the provisions of the constitution of their country. c. The guerrillas have definitely harrassed the enemy. In addition to the number of enemy killed, ismediate supplies confiscated end/or destroyed, the enemy has been forced to send patrols into remote areas, maintain garrisons in areas where it would not have been mosessary if there were no guerrillas, and the growy has been forced to propare defensive fortifications in the vicinity of every garrison. d. The guerrilla organisations have kept the enomy from going freely in small numbers in remote areas. e. They have counteracted emmy propaganda.

Page 2 - SNR-17, File V - Anti-Axis Organization in Luzon - 9 Aug. '44. 4. It would not be possible for the undersigned to state whether or not the guerrillas have done more good than harm in this area: a. Guerrilla organisations have definitely interfered with the activities of this Command. b. Guerrilla organisations have harrassed the citizens of the Philippines, especially in the remote areas, more than the common enemy. o. Many units, posing as Anti-Axis guerrilla units have carried out wide-spread robberies and murders for the purpose of personal gain. d. Guerrilla organisations have been indirectly responsible for the loss of life, unwarranted suffering of many citizens and destruction of property by conducting activities and occupying areas they were unable to control and then retreating when the enemy arrived, leaving the civilians to betortured and killed by the enemy. e. Some organizations and some individuals have assumed authority to confiscate and/or commandeer supplies and have, in many cases, used armed force to accomplish such action. f. Guerrilla organizations have, in several instances, forced people to seek protection from the common enemy. g. Most guerrilla organizations have issued receipts and/or purchase orders for supplies and equipment with a motation thereon that same are payable by the United States Army. h. Guerrilla organizations have, in some measure, been indirectly responsible for decreased production of food products. 5. The undersigned has not endeavored to control organizations other than his own. However, he has endeavored to maintain contact with and to advise other organisations as to the proper activities and menner of conducting same. Whenever any organization or individual called on members of this Commend for information or guidance, they have always been given due consideration. 6. It is fully believed that many organizations and individuals have been unjustly accused of having committed orimes and undesirable actions. The reason I say that they have been unjustly accused is because in approximately 90% of the cases reported to the undersigned, the investigation has revealed that the reports originated from a member of a rival organisation and had no just foundation. 7. The undersigned has always taken the attitude that the reason for undesirable acts was due to lack of knowledge and experience has proven that this is true. It is therefore recommended, in the event it is not practicable to consolidate all Anti-Axis organizations under the USPIF, that a Military Adviser be assigned to each organisation. 8. Extreme caution should be exercised in the distribution of arms and ammunition. Many individuals and groups who have been successful in obtaining arms and assumition are not using same properly and are presenting a serious problem at this time. 9. The undersigned has advised all organizations he is in contact with that the U. S. Army will not issue arms and ammunition to any one who is not under their direct control. 10. Many guerrilla organisations have entered into open hostilities with other guerrilla organisations. The paramount reason for this undesirable action is rivalry and/or jealousy. The undersigned has made every effort to

SECTION II - Markings. 1. The organization now known as Markings Guerrillas was originally organised by Marcos Villa Agustin under authority and instructions from Col. Hugh Straugha, USA (retired). Said organization continued under the control of Col. Straughm until about December 1942, at which time, for reasons not known to the undersigned, they separated from his command and have since been acting as an independent unit. 2. It is believed that their only objective is elimination of common enemy and undesirable elements. S. The undersigned has been in contact with the leader of this orgamisation for approximately one year. During this time communications have been exchanged and copies of same are being forwarded. 4. The undersigned had one conference with the leaders of this organization and was accorded due respect as an Army Officer. 5. Several Americans, both Army and civilian, have from time to time been members of this organization. However, it is believed that at the present time, there are no Americans with the organization. 6. The Commanding Officer of Markings Guerrillas has expressed his desire to be consolidated with the USPIF. 7. It is believed that the potential value of this organisation both for intelligence work and combat operations makes it worthy of due comsideration. SECTION III - Hunters 1. This organization was organized by and is still commanded by a man with the assumed name of Major Terry Magtangol. Terry Magtangol is known to have been a student in the Philippine Military Academy at the outbreak of the war. 2. The undersigned has been in contact with the members of this orgamisation for approximately thirteen months and has made repeated efforts to have a conference with the Commanding Officer, but to date it has not been possible to arrange same. 3. Copies of communications between the undersigned and this organisation are being forwarded by separate letter. SECTION IV -- Fil-American Guerrillas 1. There are many organizations using the name "Fil-American Guerrillas". The organisation to which the undersigned makes reference, in this section, is the Fil-American organisation under the command of Col. Poncieno C. Redor. It is believed that Goo Mador holds a commission as first Lieutenant in the Army of the United States.

Hugh Straughm, USA (retired) and it is believed that they remained loyal to and endeavored to follow the instructions of Col. Straughn up until the time he was captured. 5. In December 1943 Col. Redor reported to the undersigned that he had been forced, at the point of a gun, to sign an agreement by which he and his organization came under the command of the Markings Guerrillas. Col. Redor stated that he had prepared proper certificates and affidavits regarding this action and same would be turned over to proper authorities. Col. Redor further stated that he had no desire to come under or work with Markings Guerrillas and asked the undersigned for advice. When the undersigned asked Col. Redor why he had signed the agreement with Markings Guerrillas, he stated that the reason was if he did not sign, there would be open hostilities between his organization and the Markings Guerrillas and he was sure such hostilities would work many hardships on the civilian population in the vicinity of Infanta, Tayahas. The undersigned then advised Col. Redor that it was his opinion that he would soon have proper contact with Gen. McArthur's headquarters and recommended that until such contact was established, he do everything in his power to avoid hostilities between his unit and the Markings Guerrillas. 4. The undersigned has had no direct contact with the Commanding Officer of this organization since December 1943 and does not know the present status of same. - SECTION V - Hukbalahap. 1. The undersigned first had contact with this organisation when he was ordered by Col. C. A. Thorpe to proceed to their headquarters for the purpose of having a conference with a view to taking the Hukbalahap organization under the command of Col. Thorpe. Capt. Joseph R. Barker II CAV. USA and Lieut.Bert E. Pettit, CAC, USA, were also members of this mission. 2. The outcome of the conference with the Hukbalahap organization was that they would not submit to the command of Col. Thorpe. However, they desired that Col. Thorpe assign Military Advisers to them for the purpose of helping them conduct operations against the Japanese. Capt. Barker, being the senior officer of the mission, detailed the undersigned and Lieut. Pettitt to remain in the headquarters of the Bukbalahap organisation and act as their Military Advisers while he returned to Col. Thorpe's headquarters for final decision on the matter. The undersigned and Lieut. Pettitt remained with the Hukbalahap headquarters for approximately forty-five days. At the end of this time, he received instructions to proceed to Bulacan and Musva Ecija and carry on the organisation of guerrillas in accordance with instructions from Col. Thorpe. 3. During the time the undersigned was with the headquarters of the Hukbalshap, he observed the following: a. That political activities with strong communistic leanings appeared to be the main objective of the organisation. b. That this organisation was making plans to take over the government of the Philippines as soon as possible. o. That the Military committee had no control over their separate units. Each unit acted integendently and did not respect orders from the Military committee. d. The undersigned advised this individual that in his opinion, they would not have to worry much or long about what the United States would do. 4. It is believed that the Hukbalahap organization has more arms in their possession at the present time than any other organisation in the 1st to 5th Military District, inclusive. 5. It is believed that the ammunition supply in the possession of this organization is at present very limited. 6. The undersigned has exchanged communications with this organization since the time he first contacted same and copies of these communications are being forwarded. 7. The Southern Luzon Hukbalahap organization known as Regional Command No. 11 is headed by an individual with the assumed name of Carlos Hasim? The undersigned has been in close contact with Carlos Hasim for the past fourteen months and has received good cooperation from him. 8. It is the opinion of the undersigned that this organization should not be furnished with arms and ammunition. However, it is believed that the assigning of a Military Adviser to them is practicable. SECTION VI - Pres. Quezon's Own Guerrillas. 1. This organisation was originally formed under authority from Col. Bugh Straughn, U.S. Army (retired), by Vicente S. Umali, the former Mayor of Tisong, Tayabas, and is still under the control of the same individual. 2. The undersigned has been in contact with the members of this organization since the 24th of August 1943. Copies of communications are being forwarded. 3. It is believed that this organization has but one objective and that is the elimination of the common enemy. 4. Umali sent his official representative to the undersigned in August 1948 for the purpose of consolidating with and coming under this command. The undersigned advised Umali's representative that he had received information to the effect that higher headquarters was in the process of re-organizing within the limits of the 1st to 5th Military District, inclusive, and recommended that he and his organisation remain independent until such time as additional information was received. 5. It is believed that the present Commanding Officer of the Tenth Military District is in contact with Umali and has furnished him instructions, arms and ammunition. 6. The undersigned believes that this organisation has high potential value for combat and intelligence purposes. SECTION VII - Chinese Anti-Japanese Guerrilla Forces. 1. The undersigned first made contact with the Chinese guerrillas in June 1942 and has been in contact with them ever since that time. 2. It is believed that the only objective of the Chinese organizaPage 6 - SNR-17 - File V - Anti-Axis Organization in Luzon - 9 Aug. 44. tion is the elimination of the common enemy and the restoration of peace and order so that they may return to their calling. 3. The leaders of this organization have sent delegations and letters to the undersigned at frequent intervals requesting that they be taken under his command. The undersigned has not taken this unit under his command but has endeavored to guide them to the best of his ability. 4. It is believed that this organization has endeavored to follow the advice and guidance of the undersigned. 5. The leaders of this organization openly state that they wish to be controlled by the U. S. Army. However, they do not desire to become members of the U. S. Army if their so doing will result in their receiving salary for their services as they do not desire to receive salary for their services. 6. It is believed that this organization has high potential value to the common cause. 7. It is believed that this organization is 100% pro-American, pro-Filipino and pro-Chinese Chungking regime. SECTION VIII - Matas Organization. 1. The undersigned has been in contact with the organization since May 1944. Lt. Ricardo R. Reyes, AUS, was sent by the Commanding Officer of this organization to the undersigned for the purpose of submitting to his command. 2. The undersigned advised the representative of Col. Mata of the information he had received regarding the re-organization of the 1st to 5th Military District, inclusive, and advised them to remain independent until such time as further information was received. 3. This organisation has units in Eastern Tayabas, Camerines Norte and Camarines Sur. 4. The undersigned has assigned members of his command to further investigate this organization and will submit detailed reports as soon as possible. SECTION IX - Other Guerrilla Units. 1. The undersigned is in contact with the following guerrilla units in addition to thosementioned above: a. Governor Escudero's guerrillas located in the Bicol provinces. b. Major Lapus' located in the Bicol provinces. o. The Maharlika organisation located in Manila. 2. Copies of communications with the organizations mentioned in paragraph 1 above are being forwarded. 3. The undersigned is not in a position to make further comments regarding these organisations at this time. Major, U. S. Army, Commanding.
