MEMORANDUM:

TO : Major Telesco, Philippine Section.

1. Reference is made to Lt. Commander G. F. Rowe's report on the "Canary" Intercept Receivers dated 26 October 1944.

2. It is difficult to quite understand how Lt. Commander Rowe has read into the Signal sent him on 22 October that the "Canaries" had been incorrectly used, and it is requested that you advise Lt. Commander Rowe of Section 22's admiration for the work he and his party have done.

3. The widespread briefing and field work carried out reflects the greatest credit on all concerned, and it would be this Section's deepest regret if Lt. Commander Rowe and Lt. Hernandez felt that their work and difficulties were not fully appreciated.

4. The very first requirements of "Canary" were that it must be compact and light, resulting in dry cell batteries of short life performance having to be installed, and it was for this reason that we recommended that the equipment be destroyed rather than burden the party with useless equipment.

5. The best of our equipment in the hands of highly skilled operators frequently gives trouble, causing disappointing results so that this section well knows the effort that can be expended without any result. In addition, the canary was designed for a different purpose but it was decided to send the equipment along in the hope that despite the relative insensitivity of the set, it might be possible to locate radar stations in the immediate vicinity of Manila.

6. Following the conversation between yourself and my officers this morning, the handbook giving details of Enemy Radar is being prepared, and it is felt that when this reaches Lt. Commander Rowe and his field men, that the collection of radar intelligence will be facilitated.

Every body seems to be happy altho things are rather cramped aboard, we are having difficulty in finding those articles that should have been from the supply at Darwin. For example we cannot locate any Carbine 3mo & Jap money earmarked for us. As the other two places seem to be well supplied with what we are short, it will get it from their supplies as what I think happened was that Chick forgot to separate their supplies from mine.

Enclosed you will find a letter to Jurika and some letters from the boys to their friends etc. Also you will find a list of money orders to be sent to various people and \$194/10 to cover cost of same. Four of the money orders will go in the enclosed letters. The others without letters. My boys will appreciate

One thing Chick mentioned causes
me a little concern. He hurriedly stated

favorable to every one concerned in due time.

Dear Col. Whitney:

As we expect to land tomorrow night I knew you would be interested in our final plans as to going ashore.

We have decided to land on north Pandan Island. We will land on the East end of the Island as there is a sandy beach as shown in the attached sketch. My reasons for landing here instead of ^{at} the mouth of the Pandan River as planned are as follows -

1. The Captain would have to surface and unload us one mile from shore if we landed at the mouth of the river. Under this plan he can get within three hundred yards of the Island beach in safety.
2. As the rubber boats will be left with us we can make a recon the next day and if everything is OK reload the boats and take them up the Bagong ^{along} River to the Pandan - then up the Pandan thus we will not have to carry our supplies the distance we thought we would have to.
3. There is less chance of being surprised by a patrol as the island is uninhabited



and we will have time to look around.

The only disadvantage as I see it is the limited area for dispersal in case of a surprise attack. I believe the good features outnumber the bad.

Also on the island we will not have to contend with possible heavy breakers as we are in the lee of the island and the prevailing winds are from the South West.

Every man has been instructed in his job and I believe every thing will go off like clockwork.

We had bad luck yesterday. Sgt. Reyes had an accident and will have to be returned to Australia. He has proved the good man I knew he would be thus I am not releasing him from the party. I would like to have him remain in the hospital in Perth. When cured he can grab the first supply ship or operational sub that might be coming this way. I know you will understand and back me up in this. He has been assigned to my party and I need him therefore count

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on your support in my stand that he belongs to my party and is only on temporary sick leave. He has been supplied with money sufficient for his needs while in the hospital. I have promised both him and the party that he will be back with us in ninety days.

As we are arriving early at the disembarking point I am sending a recon party to the island to look things over before unloading the supplies. I wanted to go myself but the members of my party got together and asked me not to state that if I was lost the party was lost while if some of them were lost the balance could land elsewhere and continue on. As much as I hated to I bowed to their judgment and request. This thing is a hell of a lot bigger than my personal feelings and I am grateful to them for thinking of it.

The crew aboard the ship have nothing but the highest of praise for the men. Two of the men who have served for some time in the Philippines stated



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that they have changed their ideas regarding the people after watching these boys, & they are quiet, well behaved and spend most of their time preparing themselves and equipment for the job to be done.

As we passed Fawi Fawi I arranged with the Capitan to allow one of the party to go on the bridge for a first look at the Islands. This privilege of being the first of the party to see the Philippines was the result of a tournament that lasted the entire day. A good time was had by all. Sgt. Pascual won and was quite a hero for a day.

The crew have been swell to us. They have done every thing possible to make every thing easier for us.

In my other letter I mentioned some trouble we had in locating our cargo. This has all been straightened out. I found that Chick, as usual, did an excellent job considering the time he had to do it. Can't figure out how he is able to keep so many items in his mind. Every thing is



here as he stated it would be.

The recon party will consist of Lt. Hernandez and two radio men of his own choosing. He will take a roll of pictures and I hope to enclose them, as we cannot develop them I will furnish a list describing each picture.

Will close now - you will hear from me next by radio.

SUBJECT: Lepanto Copper Mine

TO : Intelligence Officer,
U.S. Navy, 7th Fleet

1. The following extracts from letters and a report regarding the LEPANTO COPPER MINE, located at MANLISAYAN, Luzon, Philippine Islands, are listed below for your information concerning possible future shipments of copper ore from SAN FERNANDO, La Union, P.I:

"Present annual copper requirements of Japan are estimated at one hundred fifty thousand tons. One hundred two thousand tons is believed available in Japan proper, Korea, Manchuria, Formosa. The present rate of Lepanto production is one fourth of Jap requirements. Successful operations against the mine would be a serious blow to the Jap war effort."

"This office estimates that copper production from the Lepanto mine will not greatly exceed 40,000 tons of metal for 1944 (roughly 25% of Japan's requirement) by reason of the following considerations based on the study of information from reliable sources:"

"Competent mining engineers estimate that as of December, 1943, copper production at Lepanto is about 2000 tons of ore per day averaging 6 per cent metallic copper, or 120 tons of metallic copper daily and 43,000 tons annually. It is further estimated that before the end of 1944, 5,000 tons per day of 6 per cent ore will be mined at Lepanto."

"Mining machinery from the gold mines and at least one thousand trucks have been moved to Manlisan, Dr. Bain reports, and a tram line from the mine to Sudipen, near the west coast, has been constructed. A new railroad from Sudipen south to San Fernando will be used to transport the ore to the shipping point. At San Fernando two piers have been built to handle the ore which is shipped northward apparently to some Formosan port, the boats making a round trip every six to nine days."

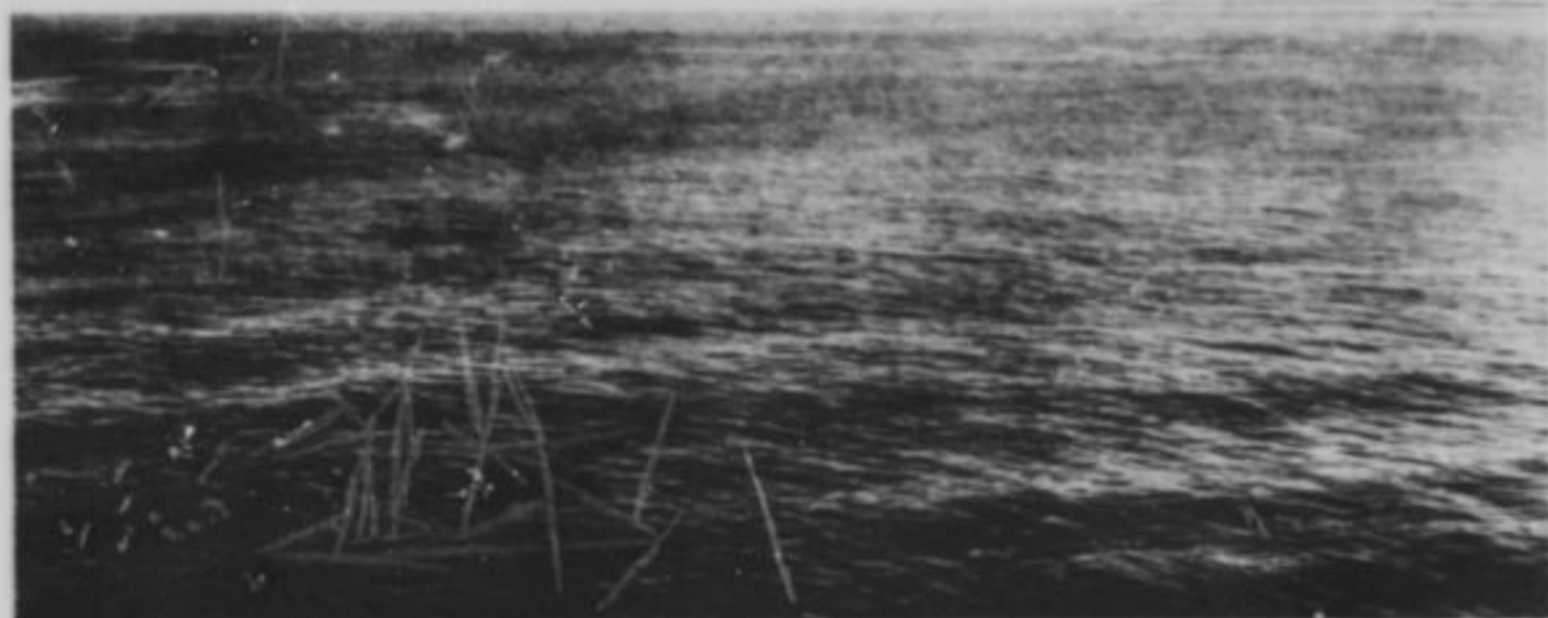
