

You will recall that about the middle of 1943 we discussed the military value of intensifying the development of our court valuer system in the Philippines and decided that a speed up in the flash of tempet information was essential to provide the maximum value for this service. We decided at that time that it was necessary to have court watcher information flashed to a control point within the Philippines for conjunties, if moreovery, and immediate relay to the submerize base at Parth, We realized that because of inter-grantilla comflicts it would be difficult to secure the full cooperation of generalla leaders in the routing of such messages through any one generalla area. Hence it was decided that in Himlange a specially equipped generalla redio station would be established which would be known as a Navy Control Station - its location being conscaled from the generalla landers of other areas who would merely be impressed as to the procedure to be followed in the flash of coast watcher information, the call letters, and the frequencies to be used. 2. In the implementation of this decision the Newy disputched to Hindams by submarine special rutio equipment in the month of August and on 8 September 1943 Commander Semuel J. Wilson, USBR (then Montement Commander) was appointed "C.O. of USF advance rutio station in Hindamso." (Recomp 257) dated 8 September 1943 from Colomal Portig to General Heatritur). In his capacity as C.O. of this Easy rudio station Commander Wilson coordinated the development of coart watcher positions and procedure and reporting of information on energy mayal movement throughout Philippine waters. The reports as reconfined by his station was Clambed to the continuous of the station waters. The reports as received by his station were flacked to the submerime base at Perth from where they were relayed on the Reiser schedule to submerimes on patrol in Philippine sections. This duty was professed by Communior Wilson under conditions involving extrems and comptant beauty due to repeated energy efforts to kneck out the station by air boshurdness, structing and ground artises. He remained on this duty until reliased in June 1944 to become Chief of Staff of the 10th Military 3. Commander Wilcost's processe in Mindanes which permitted his energement to this important duty was due to his having been sent from Corregidor 44

in the north of February 1942 on a special Exval intelligence mission to the southern islands. The surrender of our ferces on Hindene found him in that area, He declined to accept the surrender order and immediately engaged in the development of generalla action. - 1. May I suggest that the negotiations with the QM regarding the consuls and the representatives of allied and neutral nationals be handled directly by the General Consulate Office.
- 2. The order for the rations could be made out weekly by the Consul General's office in the same manner as it is now being made out by the Consular Liaison Office. The present system of handling the rations for these nationals is well organized under competent personnel of this office.
- 3. Requests have been made by the consuls of allied and neutral nationals to increase, if possible, the rations, along with other requests which could be more diplomatically handled by the competent personnel of the State Department.
- 4. This suggestion is not to evade work or responsibility but only with the thought that diplomatic complications may arise which may become embarrassing to this Section of Civil Affairs.
- 5. The consuls and representatives of the various nations are very grateful to the Army and to the Civil Affairs Section for the pioneering work which has been done for them.

For the first two months since the liberation of the city of Manila it was necessary to meet the great distress among the Americans or those who even believed they were Americans living on the outside of internment camps. Every assistance was given to these people by LUBSEC and the Civil Affairs Section of which this office comes under, as it is your policy to feed American citizens. For your information I wish to submit the following.

On the 13th of March a message was handed to me thru the office of Civil Affairs Section to be delivered to the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, Messrs. Tai Kuei-Sheng and Tung Rsing-Pai. The original is attached herewith and also my quoted message taken from the original which is signed as received by the Secretary of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce.

At a later date I received a message from the same group of Chinese. This message was taken by me to the office of Civil Affairs, copy of same is attached herewith. However, the heading and signature were not written in my office. I do not know whether this message was ever sent.

A message was received and routed thru Civil Affairs Section which was turned over to me for delivery to the Swiss Consul, Mr. A. Sidler. This message came from Washington Consul General Office. The message was delivered and a receipt for same was signed which I turned over to the American Consul General upon his arrival.

On March 50th I received a message routed thru the Civil Affairs Section and referred to me for action. This message was handed by me to Consul Richardson for his action. The original is herewith, together with a memorandum from Consul General Steintorp addressed to you.

No other messages have been handled by me. There were some letters given to me to be mailed which I did not mail but held until the arrival of the Consul General and turned same over to him for his disposal.

I do believe there have been messages sent, possibly thru the Signal Corps, by allied or neutral consuls of which I know nothing. Also, it is possible that messages have been sent or requested to be sent by commercial radio.

Manila, March 7th, 1945. Dear Mr. Wilson, I just had a conference with the local Swiss Consul regarding the relief work among our colony and there are some questions we would like to take up with the proper authorities. I understand that Brigadier General Courtney Whitney is now taking charge of the PCAU units, but as I do not wish to impose on him personally I thought I would write to you and ask you if you could bring the following to his kind attention. The local Swiss colony, through the Swiss Benevolent Society (of which I am the President), had accumulated a sizeable emergency stock of foodstuff for its members. During the last days of the Japanese occupation it was decided to donate a good part of it to the sick inmates of the Santo Tomas camp to help relieve the desperate situation of our friends in there. This had to be done secretly and was accomplished through a religious Association. Unfortunately all of the rest of our emergency stock, deposited in various Swiss warehouses, was destroyed by fire, which also robbed many of us of our private provisions. All Swiss refugees are being takencare of by the more fortunate members of the colony, but the question of food and other prime commodities is now affecting all of us. Some groups were able to line up directly with their respective PCAU stations, while others were directed to share the rations of the general public. We all appreciate the many courtesies extended by the American officers in charge: we fully realize the difficulties they are up against, and we do not wish to interfer with, or hamper, the relief work in any way. However we feel that some special arrangements - to fit the circumstances- should be made, and ask for the consideration of the following suggestions of help to our colony.

1 - Assignment of prime commodities to a representative of the Swiss colony for distribution among those members who are not served directly by the PCAU, OR 2 - Assignment of prime commodities to a representative of the Swiss colony -against payment- for distribution among all members. In that case all Swiss would withdraw from their respective PCAU alignement and we would guarantee that no commodities received under such arrangement would be re-sold. 3 - There are a number of able business men, -and some professionals- in our colony, who are femiliar with local conditions, who would like to offer their services to the U.S. Armed Forces. I can personally recommend them as to their honesty and reliability, and if there is any demand for such help I till be pleased to forward a call. In conclusion may I ask you to please convey to General Whitney the expression of the deep gratitude I and all of us Smiss feel towards the United Stacs who, true to their promise, came back and liberated the Philippines from the odious Jap nose yoke.
