



I believe that you should treat it as though it was an anonymous document. 2. I recommend accordingly: a. That the memorandum in reference be not acknowledged by you; b. That the memorandum addressed to President ROOSEVELT through Justice FRANKFURTER be not forwarded; and c. NOW THEREFORE I, Douglas MacArthur, General of the Army, United States Army, as Commander in Chief Southwest Pacific Area, hereby do publish and declare it to be my purpose to remove such persons, when apprehended, from any position of political and economic influence in the Philippines and to hold them in restraint for the duration of the war; whereafter I shall release them to the Commonwealth Government for its judgment upon their respective cases.

I have indicated that the CIC in reaching its determinations should consider the substance of the aid given as well as the position of influence occupied by the individual concerned in the community. This for the reason that an act by a person of little influence might be of little significance, while the same act by one of great influence would be of considerable greater significance - as well as to insure that military prisoners held in custody under your policy be limited to those of the upper bracket of wrong doers. 5. I suggest the advisability of my working out the detailed mechanics involved in the implementation of your policy with the Base Commander and CIC once the proclamation and directives are approved in final form. 



- 1. The formal recognition of guerrilla units operating in LUZON presents a very different problem than that prevailing on major Islands to the South. Such action in the South resulted from an entirely different military situation than has existed under enemy occupation in LUZON. Thus wast areas, never under the physical occupation and control of the enemy in MINIMANAO, FANAY and NECROS, for example, permitted the organization and arming of regularized military forces and their commitment to guerrilla warfare, military intelligence and other interior activity under the direction of this Headquarters.
- 2. This was not possible in LUZCH due to the widespread garrisoning of the area by vastly greater enemy occupying forces. As a consequence the resistance movement in LUZCH has been confined to the classic type of underground operations in which an entire population, with little exception, has participated with patriotic fervor. These operations have extended into every center of enemy activity and have resulted in providing information in most precise and detailed form on enemy dispositions throughout the Island.
- 3. It is anticipated that this great patriotic movement emong the people of LUZCK will reach its maximum atrength and utility after the battle for LUZCK has been joined and it is the desire of the Commander-in-Chief that it be utilized to maximum advantage.
- is the service, past and future, of unsurrendered, escaped or released members of USAFFE, will certainly ultimately be recognized on the merits of each case, as will the service of civilian patriotic secret societies, groups and individuals, but it is desired that for the purpose of the campaign the movement in so far as practicable be treated and directed as a spontaneous patriotic effort on the part of the whole people.





- 1. The delicate touch of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, in swoiding enying basic G/N, is noted and appreciated.
- 2. The authority for the dispatch of \$200,000, Philippine currency, to Colonel Veleimann of 9 November 1944 was forwarded to Lt Col Lewis Brown by your office on nished this office by your office and sems is attached hereto to fill the void apparently existing in your files.
- 3. Instructions to the field recipients of funds for intelligence purposes are contained in general radiographic message as follows: "War Department regulations require that the expanditure of all funds heretofore delivered or hereafter to be delivered to you by this headquarters, be accounted for in such detail as the circumstances will permit. Report covering this matter is desired by every mail dispatched from your area". The above message was agreed to by the Deputy Controller, AIB.
- 4. All of the transactions in basic communication occurred after the Philippine Section of G-3 Operations had moved to the advanced echelon, GHQ at Hellanding thereafter such transactions were handled through Lt Colonel Lewis Brown, III in Brisbane who reciepted for all funds turned over to him on War Department Form #6. Such form included a full statement of the intended purpose and authority covering each disbursement in reference. These funds in each case were delivered to



Hollandia and/or the Subsmrine Base at Mounti Island in scaled time ready for shipment and as a consequence there was no practical manner in which further count could be made thereof prior to actual shipment — they being turned over to the responsible officer and/or officer courier with instructions as to their disposition. This procedure was in accordance with G/N from the Deputy Controller. ALB quoted in part as follows:

"Colonel Brown's certificate stated the amount of peece contained in tin merked RE may be used as your suthority to accept the count as correct."

In view of the foregoing it is believed that the signature of Colonel Brown to the actual messipt of the currency in reference for the specific purposes in each case intended should be adequate. All that could further be added might be a statement from this section that the time were processed Northward for appropriate disposition - a fact which is now again confirmed.



COMMENTS ON EXPENSES SALARIES OF OFFICERS, MIN & CIVILIAN IMPLOYEES - P8, 108, 441.69 This sum does not mean that the above amount is the only sum so far paid for the above item. In reality, a bigger sum than that has already been paid to the Officers and Men of this Command; only, the vouchers covering said payment have not yet reached the District Auditor's Office due to distance of some of the Meadquarters of Combat Teams from this Office, enery activities, transportation, etc. BACK SALARIES OF USAFFE OFFICERS AND MEN HEFORE THE STIRRENDER - PET 460.25 This sum was paid to officers and men from Bataan, Mindanao and other areas who reported for duty to this Command after their organizations surrendered. We paid only their back salaries from the late they claimed not to have been paid up to the date their organizations surrandered. From the latter date to the date they reported for dury to this Command, we have not paid their salaries imasmuch as we think that is subject to a ruling from a higher Headquarters. In case of an Officer, his sworn statement about his non-payment was deemed sufficient; while in case of an Enlisted Man, he had to make a sworm statement backed up by an Officer of his Regiment or Organization to that effect. DEPENDENTS ALLUNATION - P876,164.62 The above amount represents the aggregate sum paid by this District to legal dependents of Officers and Men of this Command. Administrative Order No. 7, series '44 issued by this District provides that: (1) For legal wife of an Officer Plo.00 monthly For each legitimate child below 18 years old (2) For legal wife of BM For each legitimate child below 18 years old To be entitled to the above allowance, the officer or Malisted men alatming must cartify that: (a) his family is residing within the 6th Military District (b) that he is married (c) that he holds himself liable for any mistatement of facts. The reason for the issuance of this Order is to alleviate the financial conditions of Officers and whilsted men whose families are living with them . MESS EXPENSES EXCLUDING CHREALS . 94,228,128,24 The aggregate sun paid so far for mess excluding cereals amounted to the above sum. This is based on the P.20 per Officer and Men per day which amount was later increased to P.30 for the improvement of the mess. Again this was ingreased to P. 60 per Officer and Enlisted Wen per day on January 1, '44, due to the high-pricas f commodities. Even this P. 60 we found to be insufficient at present because of the idea rise of prices of commodities and foodstuffs. As a result the Officers and Men of this command subsists mostly on dried fish and vegetables. INTELLIMENUS EXPENSES - P884, 231.99 This item consists of expenses for lodging, food, transportation, etc. of Officers and Enlisted Men of the District Intelligence Section assigned in Enemy territory; salaries of civilians and agents, financial aid to other guerilla units in other Islands outside the 5th Military District. It includes also expenses for "blow-outs" in energy occupied areas, bribes, and other miscellaneous in nature to obtain information re ememy activities inside and outside Pamay. A great portion of this amount was spent for the acquisition of sailboats, bancas, etc.: for use of the operatives of the District Intelligence Section in connection with their mission. THAVEL AND FOR DIAM EXPENSES - P126,815.37 The above amount represents the aggregate sum spent for travel and per diam of officers - Continued in next page -

and RM who had been sent out on mission inside and outside the 6th Military District. Officers and Enlisted Men when traveling from one unit to another within the District is entitled to P1.00 and P.50, which was later on increased to P2.00 and P1.00 per day respectively. In the case of Officers and Bulisted Men sent on Mission outside the 6th Military District they are entitled to \$10.00 and \$5.00 daily, aside from the actual and necessary expenses which they had incurred. On August 1943, this travel and per diem allowance of \$10.00 and \$5.00 was reduced to P5.00 and P2.50. CONTINGENUY EXPENSES - P442,545,02 The above item consists of expenses of the District Headquarters, Combat Teams, Units and other Sections for burial, and such sundry expenses as scaps, oil, matches and salaries of Town agents in Panay who are loyal to the cause and who have been helping the guerilleros whole-hearteily. During the Japanese mopping operations we had to pay and bribe oven sivilians to keep their loyalty lest we may be sold for a paltry sum. In fact part of this amount should be charged to intelligence expenses. PENSIONS PAID - 975,623.80 This amount represent the aggregate sum paid to the families of officers and enlisted men of this Command who died in line of duty or became incapacitated. Payments were made on applications approved by the Board of Pensioners of the District created under Bulletin No. 8, dated 17 December '42. Pensions paid are based on the monthly salaries of officers and enlisted men concerned. This was later on ammended by Administrative Order No. 15, series '44 dated 15 April '44, to include quarter allowances. RELIEF PAID TO FAMILIES OF CIVILIANS KILLED BY JAPS - P286,960.00 Due to the numerous atrocities committed by the Japs to the Civilian Population of Panay, thousands of families were left orphans. As a morale builder and to help the bereaved families financially, the District Commander had authorized the payment of relief to them under the following conditions and rates effective August '43. (a) For each male from 15 to 80 killed P150.00 (b) For each male killed below 15 or above 60 50.00 (c) For each female killed 50.00 (d) For each wounded (female or male) 50,00 CEREAL EXPENSS (Current) - P1,751,402.81 The total amount paid so far for sereal amounted to the above amount. This does not mean that such is the only amount spent. There are vouchers covering purchases of cereals which have not been submitted yet to this office for pre-audit and liquidation. CHECAL EXPENSES (Reserve) - 7367,474.75 This amount represents the cost of cereals purchased for reserve. It was deemed aivisable to release funds for the purchase of the pareals time harvest time so that future needs will be taken care of. MARKHANUY KKOMKYA AAFMYONO (Mess) - P368,806,28 These are the expenses incurred for mess by District Headquarters, Combat Teams and other units when they were out off from the Supply Line due to enemy activities. ADVANCED FOR SALARLISS OF JUDGES, MAYHOS, 1870, - P304, 450.92 In compliance with the instructions contained in the Radiogram of the late President Quezon to pay the salaries of Loyal Civil Officials of the Philippine Commonwealth, this District had already paid said sum to said officials. STATIONSHY AND SUPPLIES - P522,939.34 The above amount represents so far the expenses of the District for stationery and supplies. -Continued in next pageA great portion of this stationery and supplies was used for printing our Emergency Money, and therefore, a proper charge against the FNB expenses. Necessary adjustment in our book of accounts will be mede. PATTENTS AND PRISONERS ALLOWANCE - P60,816.47 The amount spent so far for the subsistence of patients and prisoners amounted to P60,816.47. This is based on the P1.00 and P.60 for each patient and prisoner per day, respectively. This is for mass improvement only excluding dereals. EXPENSES OF UNIT IN GUIMARAS ISLAND - P6,000.00 This amount was given to the Finance Officer of the unit in Guimaras Island as initial operating expenses thereat. When the Japs hadasmopping operations in that place sometime last year, the Finance Officer was one of those captured by the Japs. In view of this, no itemized statement of expenses could be obtained as to how that amount was spent. It is believed, however, that such amount was fully spent by the said unit. ADVANCES TO CIVIL GOVERNMENT - P1,076,637.92 This account includes the advances made by the Army to the Governors of Iloilo, Capiz, and Antique. The above amount also includes the F2,000.00 Genuine Money given personally Colonel Peralta to Governor Confesor, while the rest of the amount was given to his mouty Governors who are duly authorized by him to receive funds from the District Figures Officer. The above amount does not include the P78,000.00 which was advanced to the Governor of Capiz during November '44. Out of this amount P45,000.00 represents the allotment for loans to farmers of the Province of Capiz, as authorized by the District Commander. PROVINCIAL 25% COLLECTIONS - P62,495.70 This item represents the shares of Thoile and Capiz out of their collections which was paid by this District to said Provinces. MAULING AND MILLING - P155, 332, 94 This sum was spent for hauling and milling the cereals purchased by the District for the use of its Officers and Men. This is not the only excunt spent so far for that purpose, but due to the distance of Headquarters of some of the Combat Teams, units in other sections from the Office of the District Auditor, facilities of transportation, enemy activities, etc, vouchers covering said expenses have not been received yet. The above amount, therefore, represents only those expenses for hauling and milling that have been reported and audited by this Office. MONEY LOST DUE TO ENEMY ACTIVITIES - PSO1, 620.70 This amount includes the \$50,000.00 received from GHQ, SWPA, thru Lt. Irineo Ames, CAC (AUS) who arrived here by submarine sometime in \$43. The \$50,000.00 was included in the P629,798.45 of our Emergency Money, the fd a being all in one Galvanized Iron Box under the custody of Lt. Juanito Maranjo, as. This Officer is now facing charges of cowardice and negligence. A report of this loss is found in other reports submitted to that Headquarters. The rest of the amount are losses by other officers of this Command in various small amounts. Not yet included in this amount of P801,820.70, however, are losses by officers of this Command who were captured by the enemy such as Waj. Cesar Roces, formerly the District Quartermister: Maj. Jose Cruz, formerly the Assistant District Quartermaster and several other Officers. The reason is that we are unable yet to determine the exact amount of their total money and property accountabilities although we have a fair idea. FOUDSTUFES - 9544,551,63 This item represents the purchased of food supplies such as sugar, selt, carabaos, chickens, - Continued in next page -

pigs, cows, etc., which were distributed to the various units in the field. This was done when the mess allowance per Officer and Enlisted Mentwes barely enough to give them two meals a day. CLOTHINGS - P169,416.11 This represent the cost of clothing that had been distributed to the men in the field which are mostly in abaca cloth, MEDICINISS - 247, 615.45 Expenses for medicines for use of Officers and Men in the field which canno' be furnished by the District Quartermaster. Thanks for the medicines being received now from that Headquarters that this item of expenses is being reduced to a very negligible amount. CONSTRUCTION AND REPAIR OF QUARTERS - P8.442.33 To shelter the Officers and Men in the field, quarters were constructed at a very low cost. The above amount represents the cost for constructing said quarters and maintaining same. PURCHASE OF OFFICE EQUIPMENT - P20, 679, 50 The above amount represents the expenses for typrawritters, filing cabinets, etc., for office use of this Command. ORDNANCIS - #9,401.75 The aggregate sum paid so far for materials used in making extractors, ejectors, etc., of the various arms of the men in the field amounted to F9, 401,75. This finished extractors and ejectors are being used to replace the broken extractors and ejectors of the various arms of this Command. PURCHASE OF SIGNAL EQUIPMENT - 728,539.50

The said amount was paid for engines (motor generators) radio receivers and spare parts, soldering lead, batteries, chemicals, etc, which are being used by the Signal Men.

MISCELLANEOUS MACHINERY EQUIPMENT - P69,336.84

Expenses for rice mills, engineering and automotive equipment, etc., for the use of this Command.

QM EXPENSES (LIFFERENT CLMBAT TEAMS) - P1,307,406.83

This item consist of the expenses of the different Combat Teams out of the M allotments that are being released to each Combat in money. These expenses include purchase of food-stuffs, medicine, hauling and milling these construction and repair, stations lies, seep, fuel, etc.

GENERAL COURT MARTIAL EXPENSES - P10,113.00

This item covers mess expenses, purchase of stationeries and travel expenses incident to the travel made by the members of the General Court Martial of the different Count Teams from one place to another, where the Court will hold session. This amount also i cludes the mess expenses of the witnesses who are summoned to appear as witnesses.

PROPAGANDA EXPENSES - P13,700,00

This expense consist mainly of the cost of stationery used by the Propagation Officers of each Combat Team for the publication of pamplets for the purpose of getting the goodwill,

cooperation and faiths of the civilian population in our common cause. HUSPITAL MAPANDED - P7,925.70 This expanses are similar to the patients allowance covers the substatence of patients in the hospitals. AMERICAN AVACUSISS BAPANDAD - 91,994.00 This item includes the subsistence and travel expenses of the American residents in Panay on their way to Hubag and during their stay there while waiting for transportation. PAIMANIS TU SWPA PARSUNNIEL - P1,700.00 This is the total payments to SWPA personnel in the Sixth Military District, reported so far. PAYMENTS OF COMMANDEERED GOODS - 755,342,75 The above amount covers the payment of goods commendeered such as careals, livestock, etc., during the early part of the reorganization and also up to the present. This amount covers only small portion of the total value of goods commandeered by the Army and the unpaid portion could not as yet be definitely ascertained because the prices of those goods will be fixed by the Price Fixing Committee. PUNCHASE OF SUAP - P2,541.50 This amount represents the cost of some purchased that were distributed to the Officers and Men of this Commend.

PURCHASE OF FUEL - P3,352.75

This item covers the cost of petroleum, elcohol, oil, etc., for the use mainly of the Signal Men.

LABOR EXPERES - 92,320,80

This amount represents the wages of laborers employed for the construction of litches at sile, G.T. plates and boxes for the use of the different units of this Command.

MISSION EXPENSES - 91,559.00

This amount covers the expenses of the procurement agents of the District Quarternaster.

CASH LOAN TO TENANTS (OLA) - P591.00

This is the total amount advanced to the tenants by the Office of the Lend Administrator which amount is to be used in purchasing weeks and will be repaid by the benants.

MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES - P157,621,

Expenses which are miscellineous in nature, such as baggage fare, payment to guides and porters, repair of equipment, etc. Prior to the budgeting of expenses of the District, all expenditures which is not fall under the subegory of Salaries, Mess, Stationery, Supplies and Materials are considered misself mesous and charged to that Item.

ATD TO CIVIL GOVERNMENT - P3,700.00

This amount was given personally by Colonel Paralta to Governor Confesor, during the early part of the reorganization.

UNISAFORDE ALLOUDING - 94,952,970.95

This amount represents the balances of the allotments given to the different Minance - Continued in next page -

Officers of the Combat Teams, and District Headquarters, after deducting therefrom their monthly expenses for salaries, Mess, Dependents Allowance, etc. In other words, after their total expenditures for the month have been audited and liquidated.

CASH ADVANCES (UNLIQUIDATED) - 95,570,091.96

This amount represents the balance of the total cash Advances given by the District Finance Officer to various Combat Teams, Units and Sections, to run their respective combat teams and sections and to various finance officers. Said amount is included in the Disbursements for purpose of reconciling the cash balance or cash accountability of the District Finance Officer as of 8 December '44.







- 2. The matter of Edilberto Osmena was the subject of a c/n of 6 December, attached. The matter originated with Cushing's message NR 28, dated 4 December as follows:

"FROM INTERCEPTED LETTER OF TURA VELOSE (Edilberto's brother-in-law) TO EDILBERTO OSMENA RESIDING WITHIN OUR AREA FOLLOWS: DEAR BERTING: IT IS SUGGESTED BY OUR FRIEND CAPT TSURUYAMA THAT IN ORDER THAT YOU AND FAMILY WILL BE SAFE YOU AND FAMILY MOVE TO NAGA BY BANCA. - 1. I have discussed the attached proposed Staff Memorandum at considerable length with Colonel Lahr and Colonel Ryder.
- 2. I have explained to them present plans with respect to the supply of Mindanao and Western Visayas as contained in check note to the Chief of Staff dated 18 December 1944, copy attached. I favor of course all available means for the implimentation of our supply plans, and I think it would be highly desireable to utilize LCI's for the transportation of available surplus desireable to utilize LCI's for the transportation of available surplus equipment from New Guinea to either Tacloban or direct to the areas concerned.
- 3. I pointed out that in the past we have found that the application of too liberal a supply policy tended to weaken rather than strengthen guerilla operations. Meanwhile the supply situation in all areas is such that the transportation from New Guinea bases of several hundred tons by LCI's for direct delivery would be advisable so long as in tapping New Guinea sources, now set aside to meet guerilla requirements, we do not dissipate supplies which may be urgently required for air drops to interior points of Central Luzon if where and when harassing action against the enemy becomes necessary to facilitate our offensive operations.
- 5. It would appear that this matter of supply may be worked out through staff coordination, without the necessity of presenting a Staff Study in view of the fact that it is merely designed to implement existing policy (Colonel Lahr agrees).
- 6. With respect to the proposal to inject into Panay an Air Borne Battery I believe this would be unwise at this time unless it be confined to an isolated operation. Experience has shown a tendency on the part of Filipino guerillas to relax in favor of an American unit once that unit is in the field. Filipino guerillas are trained and experienced in typical guerilla warfare filipino guerillas are trained and experienced in typical guerilla warfare and have proved of little value in frontal assault. Their best operating effeciency rests on supplying them with the essential tools to intensify their past successful method of warfare, with occasional correlated air or sea



bombardment of strongly entrenched enemy positions when the military situation warrants it.

7. For the reasons stated I recommend against the advisability of submitting the attached Staff Study, but strongly urge full support be given to the proposition of supplying adequate arms, ammunition and essential equipment to maintain and intensify the present offensive operations in the several areas concerned.



- 1. In the matter of supply to the Western VISAYAS and MINDANAO in order to sustain the offensive action in those areas we have:
- a. Today dispatched by convoy to SAN JOSE, MINDORO, 25 tons of assorted ammunition. This will establish a reserve with General DUNCKEL for the supply of PANAY by LCM or native craft as available. Matter is being coordinated between General DUNCKEL and Colonel PERALTA;
- b. We are sending 100 tons of ammunition and medical supplies by submarine NARWHAL to discharge in equal quantities at four eastern and southern MINDANAO coastal points. Departure of submarine from TOWNSVILLE is scheduled for 1 January;
- c. Ascertained from navy that the inland seas should be sufficiently secure to start surface shipments to Northern MINDANAO, CEBU, NEGROS and BOHOL within twenty days. For that purpose our supply base is being moved to TACLOBAN as rapidly as possible and effort is being made to secure 6-10 LCM's for surface supply of the several coastal points by regular schedule. If such plan is not likely to materialize due to operational conditions presently unforeseen, arrangements are being made to send loaded LCM's with regular northward bound supply convoys for drop off enroute.
- 2. Few areas south of LUZON will require supply by air drop if the above plan proves workable.
- 3. In the manner indicated definite plans may be communicated to area commanders to permit them now to regulate future military operations to conform to expected supply. It should provide adequate support to permit the mopping by guerilla forces of enemy positions not so strongly entrenched as to require the employment of heavier equipment it should ultimately result in a material decrease in effort required by our main army units to liberate such areas.

- 2. He makes direct charges against Filipino political leaders which involves considerations of both political and military policy. He brings into bold relief the inner activities of our secret agancies and would provoke wholesale massacre by the Japs. The C in C has always confined his disclosure concerning such activity to generalities.
- 3. His expose in the first place would tend to tighten the blockade against the departure of other loyal leaders whom we wall may want to evacuate from Manila or Central Luzon to strengthen the Osmana government.

- 1. G-2 analysis of attached captured enemy documents is of interest. There appears, however, to be no cause for alarm. It has long been apparent that the enemy had general knowledge of both the guerilla movement and our secret operations. The fact, though, that we have been able to proceed with our development in supply, communications, intelligence and weather in accordance with plan with so little interference, despite little effort on our part to conceal the broad picture from him, is convincing proof that he has been able to put such information, as he has received, to little practical use.
- 2. The underlying policy behind our secret operations has been so far as possible to preserve the distinct separation between our several communication and intelligence nets, in order that the compromise of one did not necessarily compromise the other. Thus in Luzon VOLCKMANN, ANDERSON, LAPHAN, RAMSEY and CABANGBANG have had little specific knowledge of the activities and positions of the others. ROWE has been kept in the dark concerning other nets both intelligence and communications, besides his own, operated in Luzon. FERTIG has been informed of no developments by this headquarters in any other area etc., etc. It has been largely through the application of this policy that we have been able to progress with so little reverse.
- 3. In Luson we deal primarily with American officers and one or two Filipines who have proved both their levalty and discretion, but even to them we give no information not absolutely necessary for the execution of their several missions.

- 4. Throughout the Philippines we have installed approximately 200 radio positions and 34 weather stations with but insignificant losses during two years of operations. We have never hesitated to deliver supplies repeatedly to the same coastal contact points and have yet to experience enemy interception. With such background of successful operations, concern over general information such as the enemy possesses is wholly unwarranted. Were operations not sufficiently extensive to render it certain that the enemy would acquire at least such broad information as attached documents indicates he has acquired, we would have failed in our mission.
- 5. Recommend that no attention be paid to the revelations contained in the documents in reference; that the policies under which the interior power of the Philippines has been developed be not changed; and that we procede to complete the job in the same audacious and aggressive spirit that prompted the C in C to issue his recent special release on the resistance movement, from which the enemy got more general information than he has acquired through his secret agencies in the course of the past three years. It has been in the application of just such a strong policy, in disdain of the enemy, that the spirit of the Filipino people has been steeled to provide us with the interior support, without which we would have no radio positions, no weather stations and no information on enemy dispositions.

On page 4 where it is stated that at the time of KUDER's trip to AUSTRALIA there were "from 30,000 to 35,000 men on our guerilla ration rosters in all the PHILIPPINES", I have suggested it be changed to "tens of thousands. There were as many as 30,000 in MINDANAO alone. 2. With respect to the reference to General FORT our best informetion is to the effect that he was killed. He may not be, but the story is properly qualified to such effect. It does disclose the heroic manner in which many of our officers met death during the post surrender period which has in turn done much to steel the resistance movement. 3. In view of the C in C's decision (to-day) to shortly release further information on the movement in MINDANAO I do not see any ad-

vantage to be gained through withholding KUDER's story. I accordingly would recommend to the C in C that he approve its release at any time.

- 1. In accordance with approval by C/S of G-3 request to utilize 10,000 pesos of Philippine currency (dated Dec 7 '44), 9,600 pesos of Philippine currency is available at G-2, GHQ. It is requested that this sum of 9,600 pesos, Philippine Currency be accounted for on WD Form #6, executed by Col Whitney as payer. Preparation of Form #6 should be coordinated with Deputy Controller AIB (Col Myers) who is charged with keping the record of disbursements of G-2 Confidential funds for use re Philippine intelligence activities.

- 1. Authority is requested to utilize \$10,000 Philippine currency and \$23,000 Japanese military currency for an expedition it is contemplated sending to the Batanes Islands just south of Formosa.
- 2. This mission was previously approved by you but all personnel and equipment dispatched in connection therewith were unfortunately lost in the sinking of the USS Seawolf of Morotai.
- 3. The importance of this position in guarding the sea lanes from Japan and Formosa to northern Luzon cannot be overestimated. The leader of the party will be Major Sabarre who for some time prior to the war was stationed on Batan Island in the Constabulary. It is contemplated to establish a net control station with a radio observation position at the extreme east and extreme west.
- 4. This project stands about a fifty-fifty chance of success but the Navy is extremely anxious to have that approach to Luzon under close observation and within communications and I can see great benefit therefrom in connection with future Luzon operations.
- 5. I believe that the funds indicated are ample for the performance of the mission. All equipment and supplies are being set up at Woendi Island from which the submarine will leave on or about 14 December to probably pick up Major Sabarre and a party of ten men on the east coast of Samar.
 - 6. Expeditious action in the procurement of these funds is necessary.

- l. The general influx of Filipinos claiming Guerrilla status into the Tackoban area presents a difficult problem. This section has communicated with all Area Commanders and direct agents directing that the practice of individuals and groups coming to Tackoban for supplies, etc. be discouraged unless specific approval has been previously obtained from General Headquarters.
- 2. With respect to those who do filter in, the question is one which has to be handled on the merits of each individual case. The policy of this section has in all such cases been to deny requests for specific supplies and to exert all possible pressure upon those concerned to immediately return their own areas. Such action has been put up to them as a matter of its settle duty.
- 3. With respect to Major Abia, in reference, this officer is a member of Colonel Smith's command and is at present, as fer as is known, on duty connected with military operations underway in Samar. On his last visit to Taeloban he was informed by this section that he was in a status of Absence Without Leave from his post of duty and was urged to return thereto immediately. As far as is known he departed that day.







Such a warning, while highly desirable from a standpoint of saving the lives of Filipino civilians, might conceivably give the enemy adequate advance notice of the impending operation to muster more air resistance than might otherwise be possible. 2.
