



MEMORANDUM: Colonel C. Whitney G-3 Section, GHQ

SUBJECT: Air Ports in Bohol Province



This is compliance with Colonel C. Whitney's verbal instructions - - a report on Bohol airfields.

- (a) Ubay Landing field located 6 kms. west of the municipality of Ubay, Bohol, along the Provincial Road. Size 30m by 1500 m. Runway: Runs from SW to NE. Construction materials: In soft places at least 3 layers of coral rocks paved down by road rollers were spread over. Ditches along the sides were dug to permit drainage. Some bamboo groves along both sides on the northern end. A small forest bordering the southern end, just across the provincial road. I cannot tell if this field can take on our heavy planes. It has never been neither by us nor by the enemy. In August 1943 the enemy ordered the planting of bamboos and trees to render it unserviceable, but the damage done is not serious according to reliable information. It, however, needs repairs before it can be efficiently used. It can be extended to twice its size being located on a reliatively flat ground.
- (b) The landing field at barrio Colonia 12 kms north of the municipality of Carmen is 30 m by about 100 m. The rocks spread over it were taken mostly from river beds. Lt. Col. A. J. Grimes, then CO of Bohol forces told me this Colonia Landing Field was intended for fighter planes only. Like that of Ubay this field has never been used. Direction: SW to NE.
- (c) The landing field of Tagbilaran is about 30 m by about 1100 m. This field is still under the enemy's control and use. The surface is hard and can positively take on any size of plane. Full records of this and the two landing fields above described are with the District Engineer's Office of Bohol Province or with the CO of the guerilla forces of Bohol. I suggest the latter be contacted.
- (d) I have been informed that an airport has been constructed on Panglao Island, south of Bohol, by the Japanese. This field ought to be as strongly consistant as that of Tagbilaran. (see Par. -c-) It is on a rocky foundation. No definite description is available.
- (e) The Ubay and Colonia ports (a) and (b) above. Construction of these ports were started on January 1942 and terminated about the middle of March the same year. The airport at Tagbilaran was already in existence and actually used before the war, but was widened and lengthened during the months were constructing the Ubay and Colonia airports. I was during this time, the Executive Officer of the Bohol Forces with Lt. Col. A. J. Grimes as my CO.



N.B. As of Nov. 7, this year, only the municipality of Tagbilaran, capital of Bohol, was occupied by the enemy where there were between 100 & 150 men and officers. All enemy troops were withdrawn from the rest of the municipalities, including the manganese mines at Guindulman where all installations were destroyed by them before leaving the place.

1. In reply to our query of Major Inginiero as to the availability of the persons named in bais communication the following was received on 19 November:

DALMACIO RAMOS HAS BEEN PROVINCIAL AUDITOR SINCE REESTABLISHMENT CIVIL GOVERNMENT FREE BOHOL, THEN CAPTURED BY ENEMY LAST JUNE DURING MOPPING OPERATIONS, BROUGHT TO TAGBILARAN BUT ABLE TO ESCAPE LAST OCTOBER. HE IS SERVING AGAIN AS OUR PROVINCIAL AUDITOR."

2. Yesterday the following query was received from Major Inginiero:

"WE PLAN TO SEND TO LEYTE TO CONFER WITH PRESIDENT OSMENA ON IMPORTANT MATTERS EX-GOVERNOR CELESTINO GALLARES AND ASSISTANT FISCAL VICTORIANO TIROL. THEY WILL REPRESENT OUR CIVIL GOVERNMENT. REQUEST ADVISE IF IDEA IS FEASIBLE."

3. It is believed that all of the persons named can proceed from Bohol to Baybay by native craft and from there to Tacloban by road. It is advisable, however, that all proceed at the same time. It is accordingly recommended that this matter be again referred to G-5 for determination of the advisability of arranging for the movement of all to this headquarters.

In further reference to my C/N of yesterday concerning the procedure followed by this section in the routing of Philippine radio communications, I strongly recommend against any action to place this activity on the formal basis providing A.G. administrative action on Philippine communications. The work of this Section will be concluded within a relatively short time as the several Philippine areas go under Army commanders in accordance with existing policy. It would take the Adjutant General, on the other hand, some time to sufficiently familiarise himself with the details thereof to take appropriate action thereon a degree of familiarisation hardly obtainable within the time left to complete the job. Meanwhile certain confusion would be inevitable.
- 2. I believe that the desire of the Assistant Chief of Staff of G-5 for formality (of which we fortunately have been burdened with little throughout these developments), can be achieved to his full satisfaction by following the procedure outlined by you the other day, viz, reference of matters pertaining to G-5's interest to the latter by carrier note through you, and I recommend no further change be made. I assure you that such formality will be closely adhered to.

- 1. Request clarification of the relative responsibilities of G-3 Operations and G-5 in the matter of Philippine Civil Affairs. The matter immediately involved deals with the orientation of action for the consideration of the C in C and/or the Commonwealth Government with respect to the printing and appropriation of emergency currencies in the several "free" areas of the Philippines.
- 2. At the time PRS was dissolved by CHQ Staff Memorandum No. 18, and its responsibilities and functions integrated in the several Staff sections of GHQ, it was my understanding from the Chief of Staff that the matter of Civil Affairs would be handled by G-5, Supply by G-4, Intelligence by G-2, Personnel problems by G-1, and Operations by G-3. Following the desires of the Chief of Staff expressed at that time, I have occasionally entered into Civil Affairs but only when I felt my background of experience with the complexities of the Philippine situation would be of value in the orientation of a sound course and then, on matters relating to the Civil Government, I have invariably processed my views through G-5.
- 3. For the most part, however, following my understanding I have merely referred Philippine communications bearing upon Civil Affairs, Supply, Intelligence and Personnel to the appropriate Staff section for any action indicated, being ever ready to give my personal views if desired.
- The foregoing procedure does not appear to conform with the understanding of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5, and clarification is essential to the proper assumption of responsibilities in the premises.
- 5. If it is desired that G-3 assume and carry the responsibility for Civil Affairs in the several Philippine areas concerned it is of course prepared to do so.

2. a. Staff Memorandum No. 40, 28 September 1944, is clear and explicit as to the functions of G-5.

b. General Order No. 9, 28 September 1944, established the G-5 Section charged with Civil Affairs and Psychological Warfare.

c. Standing Operating Procedure No. 26, 9 October 1944, which was superseded by Standing Operating Procedure No. 27, 15 November 1944, deals entirely with Civil Affairs in the liberated areas.

3. All matters pertaining to guerrillas and civilian officials in "free" Philippine areas have been handled in the past I believe by the Commander in Chief, Chief of Staff, PRS and later G-3 Operations. These duties have never been transferred to the G-1 nor the G-5 Sections.

4. The printing and appropriation of emergency currencies in the several Tree areas of the Philippines has always been handled by the Commander in Chief and the President of the Philippines through PRS and later G-3 Operations. This function has never been transferred to the G-5 Section and clearly was not done so by Staff Memorandum No. 40.

5. On June 2, that portion of PRS which was transferred to G-1 consisted of Dr. Hayden's activities which is now called the Files and Study Section. This portion of PRS had no assignment related to emergency currency. Dr. Hayden had no responsibility other than Advisor on Philippine Affairs. Staff Memorandum No. 18 was issued on June 2 and G-5 was created on 28 September following. Obviously the Chief of Staff could not have assigned Civil Affairs in "free" Philippine areas to G-5 before it was created.

6. When PRS was absorbed by the various staff sections 2 June 1944, I requested that G-1 be placed on the distribution list for guerrilla radio messages. This request was turned down by the Chief of Staff.

7. The only messages related to "free" Philippine areas ever sent to G 1 prior to 28 September or to G 5 were for information only and never for action.

8. Reference to cable from Peralda 13 October, the facts are:

District Commanders. On 14 October, after I was en route Leyte, Colonel Whitney informally gave Lieutenant Colonel Rauh a cable from Peralda listing emergency issues. It was an information copy now in our files with no action required from G-5 and there was no discussion by Colonel Whitney as to who would reply to the radio. With Colonel Rauh were Captain Hutchison and Lieutenant Commander Cobb. Prior to this time we had asked G-3 Operations to stop the issue of emergency currencies on A Day. G-3 replied it was obviously impossible because Victory Pesos could not be made available to guerrillas until the period of liberation.

Supply vessel now enroute to contact Major Volckmann (north of Lingayen Gulf area) has on board fourteen complete radio units, complete weather station, two sabotage teams (with 3,000 pounds of demolitions), two American intelligence officers with 35 tons of supplies (mostly arms and ammunition as requisitioned).

Radio Communications

There are now 27 radio positions in operation in Luzon, additional to approximately 40 radio units (including Volckmann's shipment) enroute to strategic positions. With our control here in Tacloban we are infinitely stronger in our ability of direct emergency contact to most all net stations as established. This corrects the threat of loss of any entire net due to the fall or compromise of its local control station.

Under this program we should have fairly satisfactory coverage by "D" day for Luzon operations.

Sabotage Provisions

Upon arrival of Volckmann's Shipment we will have 7 sabotage teams either at or enroute to strategic points in Central Luzon (a sabotage team is composed of six officers and men trained as saboteurs with 1500 pounds of explosives, mostly made up in individual charges).

Teams are now enroute through Central Luzon to Bulacan, Rizal, and southern Tayabas (within striking distance of the roads and railroad to the Bicols and the Mauban and Antimonan Roads).

General instructions have been issued only to take positions on strategic routes - all team commanders having been instructed to await specific direction for any sabotage action.

2. These dispositions will be completed prior to "D" day M-1 operation, and thereafter should provide the Sixth Army with an element of interior strength of considerable value to the main effort.

- 1. Herewith is a file of stories prepared by one "Yay" formerly of the DMHM (General Romulo's newspaper) addressed to General Romulo. I have not as yet referred them to him. As a newspaperman by civilian profession you will recognize in these papers some brilliant writing much of which would be of interest to the C in C because of the conditions therein dramatically portrayed but he of course would not have the time to go over them.
- 2. I thought that it would be of interest to you. While unquestionably written under literary license the basis for the information is probably correct as there is considerable supporting evidence already in the files. Of particular interest are his writings in regard to the enemy methods of torture in Fort Santiago.
- 3. Before any of this is released both censorship and the C in C's policies should be carefully considered then care should be taken not to blow up the activities of any one Central Luzon guerilla group to the inferential discredit of others. From the information available there is much to be said both for and against Marking's particular group. The writer of these papers of course is a member of that group and as can be seen is intensely loyal to Marking, its leader. I would like to discuss the proper disposition of these papers after you have gone over them.

1. LOPEZ called on me yesterday afternoon while you were tied up with Admiral KINCAID.

2. I find:

- (a) That he left CEBU in December 1942 and has never since returned.
- (b) That he came here from BOHOL with Colonel GADOR (the senior Philippine Army officer you endeavored to get to attend a unification conference in Southern NEGROS without success, despite radio messages and a personal directive). LOPEZ appears to be a close supporter of GADOR.
- (c) That he is primarily interested in the collaboration question, concerning which he had had a long conference with President OSMENA yesterday.
- (d) That on this question he feels that the issue is one tightly drawn between the people who went to the hills and those who remained in the cities, rather than just those continuing to occupy public office.
- (e) That he has advised President OSMENA that he should not take a categorical position on the collaboration question for fear of criticism arising from the post-surrender activity of his two sons, Nick and Sergio Jr. (In this he apparently has no idea, as many Filipinos do not, that moral courage is essential to strong leadership).
- 3. That is about the substance of his remarks.

 - former members of Philippine Constabularies should be disposed of in the same manner as former Philippine Army personnel. Further that any civilians who had no former military connection and who were serving or had served with recognized guerrilla units, should be processed and disposed of in the same manner as Philippine Army personnel. You will have to check carefully to make sure that they served with a recognized guerrilla unit and were not simply lone bandits on occasion or members of Vigilante Committees who occasionally harrassed Japanese Forces. Suggest you check with Colonel Whitney, GHQ, in each case to positively determine their status before accepting them."
- 3. I suggest that instances mentioned above be checked through the AG, GHQ, to AG, USAFFE.





1. Our first contact with Assemblyman Lopez was in November 1943 at the time we were endeavoring to get Cushing and Governor Abellana of Cebu to visit Fertig's headquarters for the purpose of working out a plan of assistance to the Cebu forces and civil government. Cushing was unable to attend the projected conference but Assemblyman Lopez went with Governor Abellana. Nothing particularly constructive developed out of this conference. Assemblyman Lopez at about that time endeavored to get Commander Parsons to intercede with you to the end that he, Lopez, might be brought to GHQ for conference. On 15 March 1944 Governor Abellana and Assemblyman Lopez sent you the following message:

"WE SOLICIT EARLY PERSONAL INTERVIEW WITH YOU, PRESIDENT QUEZON ON MATTERS TOO IMPORTANT, DELICATE, DANGEROUS TO BE WIRED BUT BE KNOWN SOONEST TO YOU."

- 2. Your reply to the above message was to the effect that the matters which they wanted to communicate to you and President Quezon should be addressed to you by writing under seal.
- 3. I just recently received a letter addressed to Commander Parsons, under date of 20 April 1944, from Governor Abellana (since reported killed) which apparently was written in compliance with your reply and appears to disclose just what Governor Abellana and Assemblyman Lopez had in mind when they sought evacuation for personal interview. This letter is attached hereto.
- 4. While there is some evidence suggestive that Assemblyman Lopez has been mixed up in factional conflicts both in Cebu and Bohol there is nothing to indicate that he has been disloyal to the cause. To the contrary all evidence appears to support the proposition that he has been intensely loyal throughout and worked according to his private convictions as to the best solution for local problems.



I am writing you this letter desperately hoping that it will reach you.

During the latter part of last February, I sent radio messages to General MacArthur, President Quezon and Vice-Pres. Osmeña soliciting for a personal conference on very important matters of which they must have personal and truthful knowledge.

On the first week of this month, April, General MacArthur answered back requesting me to place in a sealed letter all matters referred to in my radio message.

In compliance with the General's aforementioned request, I will endeavor to put forth herein certain important matters with the request that they be relayed to the General for his information and solution.

- (1) With the march of time, the civilians are more and more accutely feeling the scarecity of food;
- (2)- The HAVES are better off because although the prices are skyhigh, they can manage to buy some; but the middle and lower classes are in a pitiful condition, they are almost staring hunger and starvation in the face.
- (3)- The Bohol Military and Civil authorities have adopted a close door policy on their foodstuffs to the great suffering of civilians in Cebu.
- (4) The general attitude of the Bohol Area Command is hostile to Cebu, and the Cebu Area Command is aware of this.
- (5) There is rift between Cebu and Bohol on intelligence work.
- (6)- There is going on an exodus of evacuation from the City of Cebu; already 50 per cent of the population has evacuated. Cause:

 They believe the coming soon of the Americans. It would be terrible to dissapoint them.
- (7)- Civilians are dying fast from Army actions everywhere; both from Jap and Filipino Armies. The more delayed is the aid, the more civilians will die.
- (8) There are many victims out of the Courts Martial. I do not know whether their existence is legal, but they are the dread of the civilians.
- (9)- The policies in the various Island Commands are not uniformed. So that, civilians travelling from island to island are at a loss as to what to attain.
- (10)- It is very important that there should be established in the Philippines a Centralized Command near the various Islands Commands to control their actions and policies.

(11) - The mental attitude of the Guerrilla is adverse and hostile to the civilians residing in occupied areas. This is so not only in Cebu but in other Islands as well. This is what I fear most. Unless adecuate measures are adopted before hand, I fear that when the aid comes there is going to be a double massacre of civilians both by the Japs and by the Guerrillas. Herewith, I am enclosing some military informations of the enemy in Cebu which may be of interest to SWPA. In order to be able to send other messages with secrecy, I request that I be allowed to use the transmitter of Intelligence Gerardo Sanchez (AIB), who more often operates near my place. The recommendation that loyal effort in Luzon be unified and a definite chain of command established is a recurring one that has originated from many sources. At first bush it appears a wise course, but the practical difficulty lies in the fact that any officer given such command would be immobilized to a restricted area due to the great distances between the several sections and units and intervening enemy dispositions. As a consequence he would be forced to depend upon radio communication for direction and control. Captain Buracher,

I am hoping that this letter will reach you, and in time to do some good. I had planned making the trip in place of writing but realized that my presence would only jeopardize the success of the venture.

Since arriving here, as you can imagine, I have seen much to amaze me. The situation is very favorable to our forces. In a week's time I have travelled throughout much of southern Luzon. Most of that travel was performed during the daytime. I am enclosing a few items you may find of interest. Will you please hold them for me after giving them proper circulation.

You might tell the pilots of the planes who looked for me on the 22nd that I was watching them but was unable to attract their attention.

Here is some information for pilots finding themselves in my position. Most all sailboats here are friendly, 99½%. Even Laguna de Bay has many friendly boats. In the event of a landing in the woods, get clear of the plane in a hurry. If not discovered by nightfall seek a secluded Filipino's house. Stay off of any main road. (There are very few of them). When contact is made (and in south Luzon) ask for General Umali. He is the leader of the PQOG (President Quezon's Own Guerillas).

As I said before the situation here is favorable but could be much more so. The guerillas are for the most part well organized but lack unity. General Umali while a little short at military strategy because of no previous experience along those lines has an organizing genius and has approximately 7,000 men with rifles under his command. The rest of the men are also very desirous of fighting but have no arms. The lack of unity is the product of many factors. The biggest one is lack of proper communications facilities. Another one is the lack of a definite order from HQ's establishing the chain of command.

The problem assumes serious proportions because it hampers much of the work (some of Umali's intelligence data has been intercepted by other organizations and destroyed). There has been blood shed between organizations and in many instances it has been suspected that rival units have actually informed Japs of the others movements.

Umali lacks good radio gear. He is going to try to contact R23 on the next strike on 6900 KCS to give you a little target designation. Were he to have some of the radio gear out of one of our planes he could do better. If possible drop as much of the following gear, by parachute, as you can:

1. Radio and Batteries 2. Target designation maps to simplify his transmissions. 3. Medicine (Atabrine, Sulfa, Bandages and the like). 4. Shoes 5. Ammunition .45 and .30 Cal. 6. Cigarettes. Have them dropped just south of Bayuyungan at the northwest corner of Lake Taal. Respectfully,

- 1. Herewith is a copy of the President's Executive Order, just received, in re the investigation of alleged acts of disloyalty.
- 2. I had previously forwarded, pursuant to your direction, the draft of Letter of Instructions to a commission to be appointed to conduct the investigation, which draft had been requested by the President and which you approved in principle. This does not appear to have been favorably considered.
- 3. By the terms of attached Executive Order the President leaves to the members of the "Board of Inquiry", at best of no great ability, the shaping of a basic policy to govern in the handling of this important matter instead of seizing the opportunity personally to re-state and revitalize fundamental principles deprived the people under enemy occupation. He has thus passed up the opportunity to assume strong and immediate democratic leadership through which he could have gone far to rally and solidify all the people the better to accomplish the war task shead and reconstruction thereafter.
- 4. It is unfortunate that the matter has been approached in the form in which this Executive Order is couched. It is a cold, unimaginative legal rather than an appealing human document. As such it will be of interest to members of the Board of Inquiry and to lawyers seeking legal loopholes for guilty clients but not to the masses of the people. As a State paper its patent weaknesses will insure that it does not live as a document of current and historical importance.

a. MINDANAO as a Whole: The Island of MINDANAO is being divided into a forward and a rear area for purposes of discussion, the forward area comprising all territory N of a line running E and W from LIANGA (SURIGAO) to, but not including, CAGAYAN (MISAMIS ORIENTAL), and the rear area comprising the remainder of the Island. As of 30 October 1944 enemy strength in MINDANAO was estimated as follows:

Garrisons at NASIPIT, BUTUAN, TANDAG and MADRID are at present confined or being attacked by guerrilla troops of the 113th and 114th Regts, of the 110th Division. The enemy garrison at ANAKAN was reported as having moved to CAGAYAN by barge. At present these garrisons are on the defensive as a result of the orders from the Headquarters of the Tenth Military District to confine and eliminate them. These guerrillas can contain the enemy by land, but the sea approaches remain open to him; by the use of

varges and motor launches the Japa car, therefore, freely move their troops. The enemy garrisons are limited in their function to very short patrols. There are four airfields in the forward area: At SURIMAO, BADAS, MAIPOK (near BUTUAN) and ANAKAN (near GINOOG). These are fighter strips, but they are not in use.

c. Enemy Activity in Rear Area: Since the first of September the Japs have been concentrating on a strong defense of the BUKIDNON VALLEY area, including the SAYRE HIGHWAY leading to DAVAO, COTABATO, and CAGAYAN seaports. Indications were that the Japs moved many troops S (7,000 from SURIGAO during the months of August and September) to establish a highly mobile inland reserve straddling the N, S and W approaches to the above named ports. Enemy troops are therefore in a position rapidly to reinforce strategic points as these are threatened except in AGUSAN and SURIGAO. The most recent troop movement was that to the city of KABACAN (COTABATO) of approximately 8,000 troops. This movement may account for the sudden drop of 8,000 troops in the strength estimates for BUKIDNON. Besides the movement of 120 truck loads of troops to the N along the SAYRE HIGHWAY, the enemy continues to move troops to the S. According to a PW from the 41st Regt, 30th Division, captured at CARAGARA (LEYTE) 31 October, the 41st arrived at CAGAYAN 24 October from the S and left CAGAYAN on three unidentified destroyers 26 October, arriving at ORMOC (LEYTE) on 27 October. In DAVAO PROVINCE the tendency has been to bivouac away from the city. from military installations and other bombing targets; such troops are concentrated in areas to the W of DAVAO CITY near MT APO. No explanation can now be given for the increase in troop strength (an increase of 3,600 during the month of October) in ZAMBOANGA, all concentrated in the vicinity of ZAMBOANGA CITY. Guerrillas occupy or control over three-fourths of this province.

d. Installations, Fortifications, Supplies:


- (1) Roads and Trails: See Maps C & D. When still in control of the AGUSAN and SURIGAO areas, the enemy improved the MAYGATASAN TRAIL, thus providing an outlet from BUTUAN via the AGUSAN RIVER to LIANGA, and at the same time providing an outlet from DAVAO by means of the National Highway via the AGUSAN RIVER to the MAYGATASAN TRAIL.
- bridges, most covering culverts and small rivers, are either usable or can be replaced. The enemy recently destroyed the bridge between SURIGAO and IPIL (SURIGAO). The large bridge at MACPAYOS, south of BADAS (AGUSAN), was destroyed by the flood of 20 October. The bridge at SANTIAGO (AGUSAN) is out, one bridge between MADRID and LANUZA. These bridges can be repaired where necessary through the cooperation of the local inhabitants. The small bridges would require little time, the larger much more, for repair, depending upon the available materials.
- barbed wire entanglements, foxholes, and trenches around the garrisoned areas. Each garrison has one or more .30 cal MGs covering the main approaches. The recent reports state that there are barbed wire and entanglements along the shore from the wharf to the river's mouth in SURIGAO CITY. There was also an unconfirmed report that land mines are planted on the

beach at the mouth of the SURIGAO RIVER: Defensive reas have recently been strengthened from Km 1 to Km 3 (immediately S of the city proper).

- (4) Artillery: It has been reported that two 75-mm guns are located within SURIGAO CITY and three at PT BILAA. However, the Japs have recently evacuated PT BILAA and the whereabouts of these guns is not known. A report stated that they had been removed to MADRID but it was not verified. The Japs make constant and effective use of knee mortars and 81-mm mortars in keeping guerrilla units at a distance. There are no known AA guns in the forward area.
- (5) Armor: Reports indicate that three tanks are located at BUGO near CAGAYAN.
- extending from PT BILAA in a northerly direction to a point 100 yards off shore. Boats beyond this point proceeded without escort. Local inhabitants found some floating mines on the E coast shores of SURIGAO. These mines were 1 yard in diameter, with eight acid detonators, were painted black, loaded with citric acid powder, and laid at a depth of from two to three yards. Some mines had red flags to indicate position; they are reported by these inhabitants to break away from their moorings easily.
- (7) Supplies: In SURIGAO PROVINCE only 80% of the Japs are armed, the rest having lost their equipment during large scale bombings of 9 September or being survivors from ships sunk during recent naval battles. In this province the enemy is better equipped with food supplies than in AGUSAN where it has become necessary to rely on local sources, especially on fish from native fishermen.
- 2. GUERRILLA ACTIVITIES: During the month of October, following approval of GHQ, SWPA, aggressive action was taken to contain and, where possible, to eliminate enemy garrisons. In the forward area at present, as suggested above, the garrisons at NASIPIT and BUTUAN (AGUSAN) are, except for the sea approaches, definitely surrounded. In SURIGAO PROVINCE enemy is being engaged at MADRID, but reinforcements have been received here, and consequently, guerrilla activity is limited to harrassing attacks only. No large scale offensive action has been taken against the Headquarters garrison at MABUHUAY, principally because of a lack of sufficient mortars and mortar ammunition.

During the first nine months of 1944, a total of 3916 Japanese were killed by guerrilla forces of the Tenth Military District.

- · From the time of the original organization of guerrilla units in the Tenth District, special emphasis has been placed on the following activities:
 - a. The establishment of coast watcher systems.
- b. The building of intelligence nets for the obtaining of data including facts about troop concentrations and movements, air- and water-borne traffic, and airfield installations. Radio communications were installed for the dissemination of such intelligence whenever the equipment was available. Moreover, the guerrilla units established food projects, and so contributed substantially to the solution of the food problem in a number of areas.



- a. Maintaining a static defense of MINDANAO: Although there does not seem to be any logical reason for the Japs to maintain a static defense of MINDANAO, there have been some indications of recent enemy movement to the S. This would seem to indicate that the Japs intend to continue their policy of keeping a mobile inland reserve for the defense of the Island.
- b. Defending the N and the NE coast: There have been no indications that the enemy intends to defend the N and the NE coast. Troops have been moved N to CAGAYAN but none has been moved to the E from there. Some enemy troops have been landed along the E coast of SURIGAO PROVINCE at TANDAG and MADRID but these were small in number and some may have been survivors from ships that were sunk.
- c. Evacuating troops to BORNEO via ZAMBOANGA: It is possible for the enemy to evacuate his troops to BORNEO via COTABATO and ZAMBOANGA. The constantly fluctuating enemy strength in ZAMBOANGA would suggest that this province has been used as a staging area for troops. The enemy has been known to stage troops through ZAMBOANGA to COTABATO, and thence to BUKIDNON or DAVAO. Obviously this route could also be used in reverse. During the months of September and October enemy strength in COTABATO PROVINCE increased by approximately 10,000 troops. These probably were scheduled to reinforce the mobile inland reserve in BUKIDNON. It may be that since the American landing on LEYTE they are being held until the enemy can decide which course of action to follow.
- d. Moving troops N to CAGAYAN and attempting to reinforce LEYTE: The enemy has already moved the bulk of the 41st Regt., 30th Division, N to CAGAYAN and by boat to LEYTE. During the last week in October a total of 120 truck loads of Japs were seen moving N to CAGAYAN; these probably were the 41st Regt and an additional 600 troops that left CAGAYAN by boat for an unknown destination (probably LEYTE). However, there have been no further indications of any attempts to strengthen CAGAYAN or to send troops there from the S.
- e. The evacuation of troops by the enemy from CAGAYAN to the WESTERN VISAYAS remains a capability of the enemy, but no reports have been received that would indicate such a maneuver.

Le The following Americans heretofore employed in special operations in the Leyte Area Command, having been released from further service by the Sixth Army, have reported to me for instructions:

- 2, All of the above need, and many others in other objective areas, avoided capture by the enemy at the time of the surrender and have since been upon individual aggressiveness, courage and devotion to the cause.
- 3. All of the above named have held guardlls countesions ranging from Lieutement to Hajor. All now revert to their grades held in the regular establishments. All are desirous of being returned to the United States with their families, if any, provided there is no further local requirement for their services.
- he The problem of the disposition of Americans associated with the Philippine resistance movement and our special operations, and awards for especially meritorious service, presents many difficulties if injustice and inequities are to be avoided. Foremest of the considerations present are the following:
- in grade they would have had had their service since 6 May 1942 been outside of been accompanied by infinitely more hardship and peril;
- by the C in C and where communications have been formlised and recognised is considerable more information available for the evaluation of individual



service than in the unorganized areas of Luzon; In the 10th Military District much more has been done to recognize and reward the service of individual Americans under Colonel Fertig by way of authentic commissions and promotions in the AUS, than has been done in other organized commands under Filipino commanders, or in areas where no formal commands have been created. This is responsive to the naturally increased interest and more aggressive approach to the problem of remarding the service of Americans by an American commander than by a Filipino commander and to the degree to which communications have been established in the several areas. 5. In the approach to this problem sight should not be lost of the facts Many of the officers and men involved originally sustained their freedom from motives of self-preservation - some from a patrictic desire to continue the fight after the Army had been forced to capitulate: Subsequent aggressive service in the development of military intelligence and support of the resistance movement has been motivated by devotion to duty and to the causes Many have rejected the opportunity for evacuation by submarine during the past year from a sense of responsibility for completion of the job once started; d. All Americans, at least in the formalized commands, have been the recipients of irregular or guerilla commissions primarily because they were Americans and without regard to the standards prescribed for consissioned grade in the Army of the United States. Many who have rendered meritorious service under guerilla appointment in fact-fall far short of the qualifications for complisation in the AUS; The service of some werrents the conference of a military decorntion - of meny others it does not. 6. The problem is thus a complex one and yet one that justice demands must find its solution in some sound and equitable basis. I feel that I am not personally qualified to chart such a course for your consideration. I suggest

however as a means towards its solution:

Sixth Army, as it takes over in the several objective areas, if they desire, be returned immediately with their families to the United States for re-assignment after rehabilitation and home leave;

b. That upon his relief a letter of commendation be addressed by the Commander in Chief to each officer and man who, regardless of individual achievement, has contributed to the resistance movement and our special operations, couched in language somewhat as follows:

mi desire to express my grateful acknowledgment for the splendid service you have rendered our cause in the Philippines since the surrender of our forces on 6 May 1942.

Through it you have made a major contribution to the sustemance of Philippine resistance, the development of our system of signal communications and the procurement of intelligence on enemy dispositions and movement in furtherence of my plans of reoccupation.

Your service has won the gratitude of the Filipine people as it has merited the pride of all Americans and I am sure that through it you will always derive much personal satisfaction.

Accept my personal wishes for success in the future service you render in the cause of our country."

That a copy of each such letter be forwarded to the War or Navy Department, as the case may be, for inclusion in the individual record of each officer or enlisted man concerned.

c. That a board of officers be appointed in USAFFE, composed of members experienced in personnel matters, to study and develop the means for appropriate action designed to re-adjust grades and ratings of individuals concerned to an equitable basis, by this Headquarters if within its authority or the Mar

Department if not. Such board to hear and consider all available evidence pertaining to the post-surrender service of each officer and enlisted man and the recommendation in the premises of his local commender. Resulting from its study the board should in addition recommend special awards of military decoration for service of an especially meritorious nature.
