

Revised casualty figures for this action are 278 Indonesians killed and 16 prisoners. A second attack was made by the Indonesians on August 12th. The largest party encountered was 50 strong and as the attack was expected it achieved little success. In Batavia Army patrols have cleared roads to Tamboen but otherwise this front has been quieted, Randoeng the casualties received by the Indoesians in the battles on 29, 30 July and 1 August were much higher that at first believed. The total killed over the period of three days was 450. In Sourabaya there have been no major clashes but the latest reports indicate increased signs of tension. Sumatra. There has been increased activity at Padang and a curfew was imposed on 5 August. A number of local leaders were arrested on 5 August because of an alleged Nica spy was removed from Padang contrary to orders of the local British Commander. The prisoner was returned and the leaders released on 9 August. On 7 August Dr Gani was appointed Vice Minister of Defence Sumatra, and Lt Gen Scenarajo C-in-C Tri Sumatra. These appointments were made from Java. In general the period of Tramazan is expected to show an increase in activity. 6. Paragraph five has been seen and agreed by the Dutch, and the whole has been sent back approved by the Special Commissioner. All informed.

1. Considerations given in your paras one and three are appreciated. After full examination here it has been considered essential that 104500 JSP shall be retained in SEAC not later than the end of 1947 to assist on repairing the ravages of war. A recommendation to this effect has therefore been submitted to London and is doubtless now under discussion both there and Washington. It will be remembered that permission has already been accorded for the retention of this number till the end of 1946 or early in 1947.

2. All JSP in excess of these 104500 are now being repatriated. Until the decision from London asked for in para one above has been received no action can be taken

towards repatriation of the balance.

Weekly analysis India.

Para 1. Political: In an effort which is viewed in some quarters as a possible concession to the Moslim League Maulana Axad has announced that he will withdraw from the Presidency of the Congress Party in the very near future and has recommended Fardit Javaharlel Nebru as his successor. If and when this occurs, it will place a Hindu at the belt of the Congress and might possibly load to a quicker meeting of the minds between the League and Congress as Jintah has constantly refused to deal with the Congress has based his refusal on, among other things, the fact that he would not deal with a traitor, that is Axad. The Cabinet mission having given the 2 parties an opportunity to voluntarily get together and discuss their positions and attempt a solution Hay Issued invitations for a tri-party meeting in the hopes that some way out of the present deadlock can be found. It is thought that the invitation was issued on the basis of the following principles: (A) Establishment of an Indian Union to deal with defenses, Foreign Affairs and communication, (B) Maximum autonomy for Provincial Units, residuary power vested in Provinces, (C) Creation of 2 groups of Provincial Units, 1 group consisting of predominately Hindu Provinces and 1 of Moslim Provinces. These 2 groups to decide by agreement amongst themselves what subjects other than these mentioned in (A) would be placed under the Indian Ution. (D) Indian States to fit themselves into the plan in a magner to be agreed upon by all parties. If success comes from the tri-party meeting it can be expected then an Interim Gararenera will be shortly set up and functioning. At present the States and other so called Ministries have intimated they will not demand a place in the Interim Govt but will be content to deal with it after it is set up and functioning.

It is thought that any Interim Govt proposed by the Mission would have its membership based on the results of the reasnt Provincial elections. The invitation from the Mission to the 2 parties has somewher planified the situation which had appeared to be deteriorating very rapidly. To further assist in the solution of the present problem the Mission is moving to Tosimla where it is hoped that the cooler temperature will find their counter part in cooler temperated among the personnel involved. Continuation of Indian National Army trials despite recent Cout statements that such would not be the case, has cast a shadow on the Indian Govt which had its reflection in onhemoing the difficulties being encountered by the Cabinet Mission. Hindu and Roslin disturbances on a small scale continue. Charges put forth by both parties against the other claiming that one or the other is arming for large scale communal riots have no basis according to information given this office by Govt of India Security and Intelligence Officials.

Para 2 . Economic: Mr Hoovers whirlwind tour through the drought area has resulted in a rebir h of confidence on the part of the Indian people in what America can and will do to solve Indias food shortages. It is thought that Mr Hoover has convinced Govt and Party Officials of the necessity of India having to solve a good portion of her wn food problem not only this year but in the future and although the rest of the world will help to the extent possible Mr Hoover pointing out of the fact that India was no worst off than certain other portions of the world has had a palative effect on Indias self righteous food attitude. There is a definite food shortage and there will continue to be a food shortage. However the severity of this shortage is dependent to a great degree upon proper government action and reaction to the situation as it develops day by day. In line with the proposed Bombay Railway strike which would have a disastrous effect on the transport ation facilities within the really hard struck areas, Bombay, Madras Bangalore, requires immediate and strong Govt intervention to prevent it. The use of Royal British Navy ships both combat and transport to bring graine and cereals from 'ustralia is a definite sign that at least the British Home Govt is aware of the serious situation with regard to food.

Para 3. Military: Very little activity of a Military nature was evident in Govt circles this past week other than continued insistence by the 2 parties that Indianization of the Indian Army be speeded up and also that demobilization be continued. This last was prompted by the Govt policy or holding personnel eligible for discharge in relocation centers for a short time to carry on a program of reconversion to civil life through courses in cottage industries etc. The personnel held in these relocation centers are presumably volunteers. It is the opinion of this observer that the Govt has the idea in mind of setting up these centers and endeavoring to keep as many people as possible in them during the next several months. One thought is that they can be fed more easily by the Govt and will not become a burden on their native village as far as food rationing is concerned. The second thought is that as long as they are still under some form of Governmental control they would not be available to dissident factions to use in any large scale communal or political cutbreaks.






1. Political: For the past week the Cabinet Mission has conducted talks with leaders of Congress, the Muslim League, the Princes, and independent political authorities. The Muslim League through its leader Mr Jinnah states categorically that Pakistan must be acceded or there can be no solution of the problem. To Jinnah India is not 1 but 2 countries that is, a Muslim country, a Hindu country. In line with this he claims that he is not an Indian but a Muslim. In contrast to this the Congress leaders state that there are no problems between the Muslims and the Hindus that cannot be worked out but this cannot be done until definite and complete independence is 1st granted. Nehru says that it is not a matter of Congress recognizing Pakistan but rather a recognition of the fact that Pakistan is an impossibility from an ethical and moral point of view and incompatible with general Indian thinking. The attitude of the Princes is that they will deal with any new central government on the same basis that they now deal with the British Govt, that is they will have aithonomy within their states in all internal matters and will look to the center only seek regard to national defense, transportation, communication, finance and foreign affairs. Theother minorities concerned, Sikhs, scheduled classes, etc, indicate their favor towards a united India. The smaller minorities maintain that with a united India and a strong central govt their demands can be worked out. This is the Congress point of view also which includes redistribution of provincial boundaries and adequate constitutional safeguard for the minorities. The idea that the constituent assembly should also be the interim governing power is gaining favor in all circles except the Muslim; particularly is this thought being pressed by the Congress. The idea of a separate Sikh state has been repudiated by the Sikh leaders themselves who maintain that they are for a united India and only would press for a separate state were Pakistan to come inte being. Mission with the view points of all interested parties and now the question is-will the Mission project their own proposition to the Indian leaders or will they demand that the Indian leaders submit to them plans for the turnover of control. The concensus of opinion is that the Mission, now that they are in possession of all the facts, wishes to act as an arbitrary body in bringing the various Indian factions together and that they will accede to any reasonable solution as offered by the Indians. Not much action is expected in the forth coming 2 weeks due to the Easter Holiday, etc. No violence of a political nature was reported. No reaction as yet to President Truman's Army Day speech.

- 2. Economic: Although reliable figures are unavailable, persistent reports continued to the effect that the capital ownership is shifting from foreign to Indian hands. The concrete example is the sale of the Daily and Weekly "Times" of India, an influential Bombay paper from English ownership to Indian ownership. If this change of capital ownership is true, it is not believed that fear of actual exappropriation of capital and industry by an Indian Govt is behind the change but rather that the special privileged position now enjoyed by foreign capital would be abrogated entirely or at least reduced. No new figures are available regarding the the prophesied famine but it is interesting to note that rationing has been extended to more and more cities but still not to the villages because of administrative difficulties. With the return to India of Mudaliar and Cis consequent reports on the Indian Food Mission, Indian press indicates a resentful suspicion that the rest of the world does not regard the Indian food situation to be as serious as at 1st recorded. It is this observers belief that with proper control and distribution of available food there will be no undue hardship of a famine nature unless such would be politically expedient for govt or the opposition.
- 3. Military: Pressure on the govt for release of INA prisoners seems to be having effect in that press reports are incresingly frequent regarding the release of large numbers of former INA personnel. No further statements have been made by govt regarding the previously reported trial of 3 INA major generals scheduled to be held in April the trials may be dropped or held in abeyance for use as political bargaining items by govt. No incidents concerning military personnel refusing to do duty have been reported during past week. The discharge of Indiets in both the Army and Navy continues as rapidly as facilities permit. At the same time a concentrated enlistment program is being carried on.

Weekly analysis India.

1. Political: the meetings between the cab net mission and the political leaders this past week reached the point where it was now necessary that Congress and the League get together and agree on the type and form of interim government and constitutional assembly which they wish to form to take over and independent India or it will be necessary that the cabinet mission submit a plan of its own and try to bring about a meeting of the minds of the League and Congress. It is the considered opinion of competent authorities that Mr. Jinnah may be willing to accept certain compromises in his demandfor Pakistan. This might be acceptable to the Congress. In the event his compromises are not acceptable the mission must submit an interim government plan of its own probably based on provincial representation and leave all the matters of detail to this interim government. In event that the mission should back the Congress and ignore the Muslim minority there is a possibility that Mr. Jinnah might become hysterically tempermental and choose to go down with the ship and refuse any and all cooperation and call upon his followers to resort to force. Should this happen the British would be duty bound to back the Congress to restore and maintain law and order and it is quite certain that a period of intense disorders would ensue if this happens. However were Mr. Jinnah to offer to meet the Congress halfway it is felt that an equitable solution can be worked out between the 2 parties. The main paint of conjecture now is will Jinnah be same and reasonable or will he, regardless of the cost to India, elect to become a martyr to the Muslim cause in India and the Middle and NearEast. Rumors continue with increasing prevalency to the effect that individuals of all faiths are storing clubs, bricks etc agains possible communal and/or political outbreaks.

The government of India and CHQ authorities assure us that they have been unable to discover any definite plan for organized outbreaks on the part of either the Congress or the League members. However due to the contagiousness of these rumors and the high state of excitement which is endemic throughout the country today, only a small match is needed to cause a flareup that might have a wide repercussions. Certain regulations have been promulgated and put into effect which prohibit the possession of army, clubs, knives, etc but to date none of the defense of India regulations regarding assemblage, freespeech, of freedom of the press have been called into force. The situation can best be summed up as one of extreme combustibility which requires only a small spark to set it off. This ignition can be the result of

(1) Failure of Congress and League to find a common

meeting ground,

(2) British backing of Congress against the League

ignoring Muslim. minority.

(3) Any little incident in any part of the country which would smack of a communal or political nature.

Swift and strong action by authorities will be needed to prevent any local incidents from becoming widespread

regardless of this origin.

2. Economic: the presscampaign berating American complacency regarding the Indian food situation continues. Comments from Indian government officials and newspapers remarks indicate that much good is expected as a result of Mr. Hoovers visit to India this coming week. It is thought that if the food board has actually made the commitment of roughly 1 and 2 million tons of grain nothing would do as much good to stop the havoc ory of famine as to have definite dates announced for the beginning of shipment of these grains to India. Once such dates have been announced and the food begins to arrive in the country much of the grain that has gone under ground and into the black market would find its way into legitimate channels and ameliorate the present shortage. The food situation is serious and no doubt a great many casualties will occur from famine, however, as stated previcusly, with the addition of the food promised by the food board and with proper handling of transport within India bythe

responsible government the deaths from famine will not be as great as in the Bengal 1943 shortage. Naturally the food situation is closely related with the political condition and one can hardly speak of politics without drawing a corallary reference to food. For that reason it is not wholly improbable to think that any government in power might stoop to use the shortage of food as a weapon in behalf of their own cause.

3. Military: the inquiry commission to investigate the Royal Indian Navy mutinies has been sitting in Delhi the past week. To date 2 main causes brought to light as being mainly responsible have been

(1) an imposition of inexperienced officers and non commissioned officers from the Central and Northern portions of India to command naval other ratings composed primarily of southern Indians. The officers being of different political religious beliefs and unable to converse with their subordiantes in a common tongue aroused suspicion and distrust in the tempermental minds of their subordinates.

(2) the fact that the ratings involved in the mutiny were mostly educated individuals from Madras and south India extemely susceptible to any agitation or dissident

ideas that might have come up.

There have been no reported cases of any disaffection in the army since the last report. In the event troops are required to quell any severe disturbances that arise in the future the loyalty of the army will cause little concern as long as the disturbances can be explained to the MAG as being of a political nature. However should wide spread communal disturbances arise the loyalty of certain units could become questionable were they called upon to attack civilians of their own creed. This statement is a slight change from former observations made here but represents the change in attitude as tension mounts throughout India.

- 5. Burma. Chinese troops are reported to have completed withdrawal across Burma, China frontier. 27 March anniversary of Burma National Army revolt against Japanese was quiet with no indidents. Aung Sen at a meeting in Rangoon stated that if the Auti-Fascist Peoples Freedom League did not win in forthcoming elections AFFFL would set up a parallel government. Nehru met Aung San night of 20-27 March in Rangoon and spoke with Indian Airforce personnel. No demonstrations or incidents. Complete tour of Nehru in Dalaya was noteworthy because of quiet restrained reception given Nehru by Indian residents and by complete absence of distrubances. troops appeared apethetic. Railway strike continues with little change in situation. Increased bandit activity is reported on the Melaya border. Estimated 500 armed guerillas in this area.

A delegation of Viet-Nam from Hanoi visited Phaltrang and agreed with French to dessation of hostilities_there. French have also arranged to occupy Tourand and Hue. Wondover to French in north FIC ES proceeding smoothly except in north Laos where Chinese remain because of the * * * opium crops yet to be harvested. French troops from China in Tokin are waiting to occupy this sector. Majority of Chinese troops remain in Halphong. 1200 Chinese of 60 Army sailed from Haiphong with 22 and 20 Divisions of 93 Army reported still in Lanson. Chinese troops are evacuating Tientiano. In Cochin China Annamites continue to perpetrate incidents using small armed bands. French have refused to treat armed annamites in Goolin as regular troops as had been done in Annam and Tonkin. In scuthern Annam activity is reported on the decline. British and Indian troops in FIC are due to leave 20 April for India by sea leaving behind only a small guard force.

Here is weekly situation summary for IBT for week ending 23 March (Control Symbol GO-00-17)

India: Beginning 21 March, A hunger strike was initiated among the Delhi Provincial Police in support of demands for increase of salarias and allowances and shortening of working days. British Military were called out to maintain order as the cituation deteriorated. On Friday morning a demonstration involving about 100 police took place in old Delhi resulting in the arrest of 86 of the men. On Friday evening, an official police communique stated that police were again functioning normally while an official deputation investigated grievances. On Saturday morning, British Military were still maintaining cordon around part of Old Delhi and refusing passage to Military vehicles. American Military personnel are restricted from zone of disturbances and none involved to date.

Burma: Chinese troops in the Myitkyina area are withdrawing under orders from Generalissimo. Waingmaw area, 4 miles Southeast of Myitkyins, is clear of Chinese, and British Forces are taking over . Odaccitylis is reported increasing in Arakan and minor incidents of dagoity are reported from other areas including Bilin, 60 miles East of Rangoon and Pegu. Famine is reported in the North Yebyu area and general shortage of rice in Tavoy.

Siam: Supreme Alllied Commander expressed some concern over the fall of the Siamese Government which resulted from the Assembly insistence upon passing price control bill to which the government was opposed. Chief British concern with fall of Siamese Tovernment centers around possible repercussions on export of rice and implementation of British treaty demands.

Frenci Indo-China: 9000 French troops have completed disembarkation at Haiphong, and relations with Chinese reported improved. 20 French reported killed in Sino-Franco artillery exchange previous to disembarkation. A Fewanti-French demonstrations have occurred in Hanoi and Haiphong, but it is believed that Chinese are anxious to hand over to the French in an orderly manner. It is believed relief of Chinese by French forces will be finished by 31 March. 1000 French troops attacked Chinese Garrison at Savanneket. Chinese withdrew and requested French to cease attack. Cochin-China rebels continue terrorist activity. Mop-up operations continue in areas 120 miles southwest of Saigon, 40 miles northeast of Saigon and 25 miles Northeast of Saigon. General Le Clerc arrived Hanoi morning of 18 March and French took over Southern French Indo-China from SEAC midnight 4/5 March. Responsibilities of Mountbatten in French Indo-China now concerned solely with Jap repatriation for which he will act as representative for SCAP.

Malaya-Nehru arrived Singapore on 18 March, met Sac at Government house and drove through cheering crowds to Indian Welfare Centers. No incidents of disorders so far reported, and visit believed Nehru addressed large crowds at various points in Elecess. tour around Malhya . However, warmth of reception diminished as he traveled north fr Singapore. Crowds in most cases contained members of Indian National Army in uniform. Communist Party in Malaya has been generally inactive since meeting of all Malaya Congress. Sinc-Malaya friction continues throughout Peninsula and number of minor clashes have occurred. Tension still high as result of Perak massacre, but no new incidents reported. In an inter-racial clash at Perak, 13 miles west of Ipon, 7 Chinese houses were fired on 5 March and in retaliation Chinese killed 57 Malayas the following day. No Chinese casualties were discovered, but it was reported that 100 Malay refugees, the majority wounded, were evacuated to another village. It was reported fr Perak on 8 March that Chinese youths are receiving Military Training fr the Communists, and that night classes for Chinese children are also being sponsored by Communists. versive Indian elements are increasing propaganda in Malaya. Singapore subversive pamphlets have been distributed calling on Indian services to prepare for revolt. Railway strike in Malaya con-

Indonesian activities on the increase in Hemarang and Sourabaya areas. The first formal meeting between the Dutch and the Indonesian presided over by Clark-Kerr took place on 15 March. Second meeting held on 16 March, and formal procedures of future conferences agreed upon. Two TLT-Committees have been set up to study details of proposed agreements. Another meeting was expected after 20 Merch. Recent changes in Sharirs Cabinet not considered significant by British. Eleven members of old Cabinet remain. and only Ministers of Supply and Minister of State are of doubtful loyalty to Sharir. It is indicated he plans to drop these 2 as he gathers strength.

Sumatra-1 clash reported 1 Armedan on 18 March between British Troops and Terrorists. 6 Chinese killed and 8 wounded when Dutch Troops opened fire on Chinese mob which refused to disperse on Bangka Island. Bali-terrorist activity on small scale has increased in most areas.

Here is weekly situation summary for IBT for week ending 16 March (control symbol GO-00-17).

India - No significant developments to report.

Burma - Operations against Chinese guerrillas in WA States continued with area reported clear on 12 March. Incomplete figures on Chinese casualties are 47 killed and 12 wounded. No change in situation reported around Yitkyina. 17 Indian Division is to be only division remaining in Burma and tactical Headquarters has moved to Maymyo with main Headquarters established at Meiktila. 27 March is anniversary of Burma National Army Revolt. Civil sources indicate possible disturbances in Irrawaddy and Henzada Districts during March. Aung San states he intends to visit India to contact Indian leaders.

Siam - No change reported in Intebhal political situation. Kuomintang guerrillas have increased activity in area immediately North of Malay border. Anti-guerrilla measures are being taken by Malayan Command and will extend into Southern Siam.

French Indo-China - Correcting last weeks summary, French are moving 5th Colonial Inf along Mekong River to Pakse instead of Fed Sane. French control now extends over all Southern Fic with exception of few isolated pockets. French administration has been restored in governments of Southern provinces where it is reported Annamites are returning to work. In Northern Fic Franco-Annamite agreement was reported signed on 6 March and Annamite authorities attitude described as friendly. French troops landed at Haiphong on 7 March after incident in which Chinese fired on disembarking French troops, reportedly killing 20. Situation now reported as

developing normally.

Malaya - The 2 alleged American polio cases at Singapore reported in last weeks summary were found not to be polio upon evacuation to and thorough examination at Calcutta. Following All-Malal Congress, United Malay National Organization has been formed at Kuala LQMPUR. 39 associations from all parts of Malaya were represented, and the Malayan Union proposals were unanimously and unconditionally rejected. British Government was invited to inquire into the situation again.

Bandoeng, guarded by 1 Indian Bn with tanks, met heavy opposition about 30 miles from Bandoeng. As of 12 March, convoy still held up and had suffered casualties of 10 killed and 59 wounded. All tanks in convoy had been damaged, mostly by fires. Tactical Hqs of 1st Indian Inf Brigade with 1 Bn has been dispatched from Bandoeng to rescue convoy. Elsewhere in Java, military situation remained unchanged. On 9 March, 1 Dutch Regiment landed at Batavia, 1 Dutch Bn landed Semarang, and 1 Dutch Brigade less 1 Bn landed at Sourabaya. Sharir made formal protest to Allied Commander-in-Chief over Dutch landings, but no other reactions have developed. Talks between Dutch and Indonesians, presided over by Sir Archibald Clark - Kerr began Wednesday night, 13 March, but as of 15 March no knowledge of progress available to US Liaison Section at Hqs SACSEA.

Bali - Occupation continues, and Dutch troops have been generally well received. I case of firing on Dutch troops reported in Western part of island.

Outer islands - Dutch civilians have been evacuated from Manado, and mutineering COPPSN ES there are being relieved by fresh troops. On 13 March, word received that Manado mutiny ended, and Dutch flag rehoisted. Leaders have been arrested and are being held on Dutch Naval vessel.





Reported that withdrawal of Chinese Forces from Tonk'n began 14 Feb with 93 Army withdrawing to Kwangsi. 6th Arm reported waiting in Haiphong for sea transport to Manchuria. Army to remain in Red River Delta Area until relieved b French.

epidemic in Singapore indicated 107 cases and 6 deaths among civilians, 42 cases and 9 deaths among British Service Personne', with increase of 22 cases and 2 deaths during previous 6 daws.

On 1st Mar, 23 cases were reported on Malaya Mainland During past week, 1 convalescent and 1 probable acute case occurred among American Personnel; both cases were evacuated to Calcutta. 

Following is relay of TST 1067: "To WARCOS info COMGENIB from COMGENSPORE. Reurad WX 98964. Mountbatten has proposed to British Chiefs of Staff that Supreme Allied Headquarters terminate first part of May giving way at that time to a Supreme British Headquarters. Beginning at once present SAC Headquarters is being gradually reduced to 20 officers, the strength of proposed British Supreme Headquarters. In general terms the mission of Supreme British Headquarters as planned will be broad strategic planning, interservice coordination, and long range combined training of forces in British territories of South East Asia. In the mean time repatriation of Japs will continue (present estimate based on shipping available gives completion date 3 years hence).

Whather this above new command proposal is accepted or SACSEA is retained a small liaison mission intimately conversant with SCAP problems and policy will be required at Bingapore to assist in coordination of mutual British-US post war obligations. These may include Japanese repatriation, war crimes, and graves registration.

Plans are being constantly revisedor drawn up which will affect the above activity of interest to US after close IBT. Consequently the eventual interest of US Headquarters should have representation here earliest. These responsibilities in final analysis center is SCAP. More over advantage should be taken of present liaison detachments briefing and associations.

After completion of turn over to State Department of India Burma SEAC responsibilities (other than above) and closeout of minor liquidation problems the requirements on such a liaison mission will be light. It can be assumed that commercial or British Command set up will be available for clear EW code messages to SCAP.

Recent Mutiny in Rin is subject of Government investigation. Reurad W 98816, dtd 28 Feb, following is Analysis of Election results desired: In Assem, where total number of seats in assembly is 108, Congress party Won 58 seats, Muslim League 31 (out of 34 Mohammedan seats), Nationalist Muslims 3 (out of 34 Mohammedan seats), Independents 7, and Europeans 9. Of total of 50 seats in Northwest Frontier Province, Congress Party won 30, Muslim League 17, Nationalist Muslims 2 and Sikhsl. "Overwhelming" Congress Majority mentioned Ourad CRA 4546, dtd 24 Feb, referred to Majority Vis A Vis Muslim League in both Provinces. Congress Victory in Northwest Frontier Province is explained principally by support of Pathans (largest amd most influential single group of Provinces Population). Pathans, though Muslims, have Generally supported Congress Party for reason unknown (effort being made to ascertain cause). It should be noted that Pythan support of Congress Party dies not necessarily mean rejection of Pakistan. Jimmah and League have repeatedly stated league not interested in Ministries but only in Pakistan, and various Congress Leaders have held out promise of Plebiscite to determine issue in Areas concerned. Congress Victory over League in Assam generally follws pattern of Populations composition: Of total 10,204,000, people in Province (1941 estimate), 4,500,000 are Hindus and 3,500,000 are Muslims. Other Factors in Congress Majority in Assam are release of large numbers of "Detenus" (Mainly Congress Party Members) in 1945, lifting of Ban on Congress Committess in Province, and Congress Party winning of 15 seats from Hindu Mahasabha, Ahom Sabha, and Communist Party. Muslim League won no-Mohammedan seats and lost 3 Mohammedan seats to Nationalists Muslims.

Anti-Fascist League has Cabled appeal to UNO requesting it take up cause of Burmese Independence. At Meeting between League and Karens on 13 Feb, Aung San Agreed to formation of separate Karen State provided scheme is agreed to by Burma Minority in Shan states and League is consulted. Further information on group of 375 Chinese Troops reported last week as arriving near Myitkyina on 15 Feb states that Commander of Group told British Authorities Group is part of 76th Div with HOS at Pauskan and that his duties are to take over Former Chinese road Engr installations and to arrest Chinese Deserters. Commander refused to withdraw Troops without orders from his HQS which he promised to contact by Radio. Further detachments, probably between 200 and 300 were left at various points along Lex Road on Burmese side of Frontier. Governor of Burma has made Urgent representations to British Government and to Chungking to secure withdrawal of these Troops. On 15 Feb, 3 men of Frontier Constabulary were fired on by Chinese Troops 8 Miles North of Sadon.

Siam-on 19 Feb, British Garrison in Siam reduced to 4 BN. Guard ommitments is reason given by British So no further reduction of Garrison at present. Although care is taken to keep US representatives out of picture, Liaison Staff at HQS Sacsea reports that all is not well in Anglo-Siamese relations,

possibly caused by proposed introduction of Japs from Burma Lito Siam. Arrangements for Siamese Army Officers to attend British Comd College as guests of British Government have been cancelled.

French Indo-China- French continuing to extend hold over Southern French Indo-China and Saigon Fhan Thiet Road Saigon Fhan Thiet Road has been opened. Reentry of French Troops into Laos Officiallyannounced, and serious difficulties in Laos are not anticipated. Revised total Japs in Southern French Indo-China given as 70,000. Question of agreement between France and Indo-Chinese Nationalist Leaders is reported to have been subject of discussions in Paris by Admiral Dargenlieu.

Malaya-Move of 25th Div to India continuing. Inter-Racial tension still strong in Perak and South Pahang. All Malayan Congress being held in Kuala Lumpur 1 to 4 March which may result in combination of various Malaya Nationalist movements in opposition to Malayan Union.,

G-2 estimate of Indian political situation:

Although disturbances ranging from comparatively peaceful processions to those violent enough to warrant suppression by Military have continued to occur, there is still no evidence that major political parties have instigated any of the violence with object of securing definite political ends. Undoubtedly inflammatory utterances by both Congress Party and Muslim League Leaders have built up in minds of easily influenced citizens feeling that violent demonstrations will hasten independence. There is no reason for Congress Party to resort to force as it will gain commanding majority in both Central and Provinicial Legislative elections. Congress party does not desire "revolt" because it is controlled and largely financed by Indian big business. Elections are practically over in 4 Provinces, with Muslim League gaining clear majority only in Punjab. In Sind, League has bare majority but future of Government will be turbulent. In Assamand Northwest frontier, Congress has overwhelming majority. In remaining 7 Provinces, only Brngas shows any possibility of going Muslim League. Congress will force-out of League by purely constitutional means. After completion of elections in April and formation of all the Provincial Ministries, Congress will probably demand that the promised Constitution-making body be formed from panels to be submitted by them. Since there is almost no possibility that Pakistan will have been given as a term of reference to this body, it will be unacceptable to Muslim League. Muslim League still has large amount of influence despite fact that that it wields control in but small proportion of Provincial

Ministries. League has stated repeatedly thattit will not tolerate Hindu rule, and there is strong possibility that it may institute disturbances with definite political motives. There is also possibility that it may proclaim a "Jehad" or Holy War which will affect entire Mushim world. These disturbances may break out in June or July, would undoubtedly be centered in Calcutta area, and could thereby interfere with theaters mission. The possibility of famine will also tend to breed disturbances, but it is not in the interests of the Congress Party to capitalize on this situation. Muslin strength lies in areas which are most likely to be affected by famine. There are suspicions that Communist Party may be involved to some degree in the series of recent disturbances in an effort to regain some of prestige lost when it was virtually thrown out of Congress Party. The policy of "fishing in troubled waters" continues to form part of Communist Party tactics. Communist Party placard posted during recent Calcutta disorders urged demonstration to divide into small groups and "attack posts". Instructions to keep in contact with each other and avoid crowding at road crossings also given. Moscow propaganda broadcasts in Hindustapi and Bengali beamed to India continue, but enti-British tone not now as strong as previously reported. One such broadcast extolled advanced cultural, social and economic state of "Soviet Axervaijan". Reverence in mutiny, authorities believe that Indian Army, particularly combat units, will remain loyal, but there is a possibility of disaffection among service troops. One Mahratta Battalion, called out to round up mutineers in Bombay, carried out orders explicitly, even though firing on Indian Naval personnel was necessary.

India-Royal Indian Navy mutiny broke out in Bombay on 18 February, spreading to other Rinb installations, notably Karachi. Troops were employed in Voxbaye and Karachi to bring situation under control. In Karachi, elements of 2nd Indian Airborne Division opened fire on Hmishindustan after expiration surrender ultimatum. Following 25 minute exchange of artillery, mortar and small arms fire, mutineers surrendered ship, and Rin trouble in Karachi is now ended. Some civilian rioting has broken out in Karachi, however, and situation is

Indian and British troops fired on mutimeers in Bombay during course of disturbance, but no firing of ships guns manned by mutineers reported. On 22 February in Bombay, usual irresponsible elements took advantage of troubled situation to commence rioting, looting, arson and general terrorism on largest scale yet seen in recent series of disturbance, necessitiating drastic action by Military and Police. Estimates of civilian casualties as of morning 23 February were 60 killed and 127 injured. Civilian situation greatly improved as of 1200 hours 23 February as result of curfew enforced night 22-23 February and strong patrols of Military in tanks and armored cars. However, situation grew worse on afternoon 23 February and there has been more firing. Evidences of unrest in Calcutta and other points, but no outbreaks reported.

Burma - Eurus Command concerned over presence of 375 Chinese troops near Myitkyinson 15 February. SACSEA reports that local Chinese Commander, who states he is to take over former Engineer installations and to arrest Chinese deserters, refused to withdraw, but said the Chinese would not enter the Myitkyins or interfere with population. Since all CAM functions must either be Chinese deserters or troops from Yunnan. Effort being made to obtain further information on this. The Government of India with the approval of Secretary of State have decided on the following policy regarding Indian civilian collaborators outside India.

1. As no civilian collaborators already brought to India will be prosecuted unless guilty of atrocities or brutalities, they hope that a similar policy will be followed in the case of Indians outside India by the administrations concerned.

2. They do not wish Indian collaborators and traitors to be repatriated and would prefer that those who the administration concerned does not propose to prosecute should be released.

3. They recognize that they cannot resist the repatriation of such Indian nationals with a domicile in India as other administrations may wish to deport for security and humanitarian reasons however they must insist upon receiving full parentage, home address and a summary of the pro-enemy activities of any person deported and a timely intimation of his impending arrival

in India. They recognize also, that subject to the exception next mentioned, they cannot oppose the voluntary return of Indian nationals with a domicile in India. Here also they would like to have the same details indicated in the immediately preceding clause 3. The exception is that they reserve the right of (refusing?) the return to this country of certain individuals. Important negotiations for a settlement are imminent and it is necessary for some time to keep out person whose presence in India might constitute a disturbing influence in itself or might be utilized to further activities which could obstruct the satisfactory progress of these negotiations. 

Indian Army participation in disturbances on side of Nationalists not believed probable. Some recent Anti-American articles in Sebvonalist press believes to be result of disappointment over United States failure to help Indian freedom movement rather than out right Anti-American feeling. Chinese Correspondence regarded as reliable and Impartial expressed opinion that even threaten famine (Which he considers overemphasfixed by both Congress and British) not likely to cause widespread disorders in as much as congress leaders in assemble disassociated themselves from Covernments a Peal to combined food board for additional rice allocation and British can therefore take credit for Amelioration of situation and cast blame on Congress for not having interest of India Masses at Hearn.



We are performing graves registration duties within boundaries of IBT as delineated in WX 51593 and JCS 388/5. In accordance with WX 68284 also plan to perform graves registration duties in STACARFA, including FIC south of 16 degrees north latitude, west of 127 degrees east long tude. Will continue such activities until IBT is inactivated at which time responsibility will be turned over to American Graves Registration Service, India Burma 1.

Since CINCAFFAC conducted operations in Dutch New Guinea, Hal Ahera and Horotai areas, undoubtedly has information on location of battle casualties in those areas and probably still has personnel stationed therein it is recommended that CINCAFFAC be made responsible for all graves registration duties in Nei cast of 127 degrees east long tude.

- 1. Burma 21 January, riots reported in Myitkyina SDI 1248 between Chinese deserters and local Chinese. Police sided by 1 pl Kachin Rif opened fire. 1 rioters killed, 500 arrested, of whom 51 were deserters. Estimated 500 deserters in this area. 6 RAJPUT now under command 48th Bde. 1 Coy ex PA-AN QL 2846 to Thanbyuyayat.

- 3. Malaya 25 28 January, armed robberies reported from many area. 33 Mtn Regiment to Rambutan VJ 9882. 2 Madras less 1 Coy to Telok Anson VJ 8003. 1 Coy to Bidor VK 1310.

Kampong searches and spasmodic shootings continue. Bandoeng. Increased number of road barricades near railway crossings near South sector. Brit political 10 refused access to Indonesian area for first time. Buitenzorg. Jap camp evacuated from Sockaboemi to Buitenzorg. Batavia. Few armed looters operating at night. Sumatra. Neutral.
