Occupied Japan Trade Agreement.

1. New Indonesia -- Occupied Japan Trade Agreement, Financial Agreement and Trade Plan have been approved by SCAP and Indonesian Government.
2. The following press release will be issued upon execution of these documents. Release date will be 30 June.

"General MacArthur announced that new trade and financial agreements between Indonesia and Japan were signed today. This is Japan's first trade agreement with the new Republic of the United States of Indonesia, SCAP officials pointed out.

"These agreements were negotiated at a trade conference in Tokyo, which terminated on 27 May 1950. Representatives of the Government of the Republic of the United States of Indonesia, headed by Dr. Raden Sudjono, Indonesian Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, and SCAP officials participated in the conference.

"As a result of this conference, SCAP officials said, the two-way trade between Indonesia and Japan during the trade year beginning 1 July 1950 may reach a total of approximately \$74,400,000. This represents \$30,000,000 imports by Japan and \$44,400,000 in Japanese exports to Indonesia.

"Under the new agreements, trade between Indonesia and Japan will continue on an open account basis in terms of United States of America dollars. It is expected that Japan's exports to Indonesia will consist principally of textiles, industrial machinery and parts, chemicals and drugs, metals and metal products, pottery and porcelainware, and other miscellaneous consumer goods; while Japan's imports from Indonesia are expected to consist principally of crude rubber, copra, palm oil and other oils and oil-bearing materials, bauxite, salt, gum copal and gum dammar, hides, and other raw materials.

"Members of the Indonesian Trade Delegation who participated in the negotiation of these agreements included Dr. Raden Sudjono, Chief of Department of Foreign Relations in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs; Dr. Saroso Wirodihardjo, Chief of the Bureau of Commerce, Ministry of Welfare; Dr. Ibrahim Bin Pangeran Mohammad Djahier, Chief of Industrial Licensing Section,

Part I. Subj is Tariff-Custom Mission for Japan.

Consider that services of qualified customs and tariff experts would be extremely useful here to assist the headquarters in necessary SCAP review of pres status of Japanese customs procedures and tariff policies. Consideration of specific customs tariff schedules not contemplated since belief here such rates should be decision of Japanese Govt.

Mr. Harold Moss, recently in Wash on TDY, discussed composition of such group informally with representatives of U S Treasury, State, and the Tariff Commission. He has suggested Mr. David Lynch of the U. S. Tariff Commission as possible head of the Tariff Policy Group and Mr. Lester K. Little, formerly of Chinese Customs, as possible head of Customs Procedures Group.

Rqst DA contact U S Tariff Commission re availability of services of Mr. Lynch and Mr. Little. Desire Tariff Policy Group be limited to maximum of three men and Customs Procedures Group to two men with responsibility for selection of appro members placed upon selected group heads. Duration of mission approx 45 days. Arrival desired on or before 15 July.

Tariff-Customs Group recom ended in \$250,000 budgeted FY 51 GARIOA 412 Visiting Experts (WA 3).

Part II. Re WCL 28629 June 50. Concur in O'Leary and Stephen as adjuncts to Shoup party.

REURTEL 3423, 16 May and 4347 19 Jun, advising that SCAP being authorized issue interim non-exclusive licenses permitting Japanese importation goods bearing Ger trademarks in SCAP custody, question arises, in view SCAP Tel C 56592 12 Jun: Does said authorization also apply to vested patents, particularly as affects entry into Japan New Ger technological developments requiring use of such patents? If not, in our view, patent authorizations of equal if not greater importance than trademarks and wld recommend that similar authorization be made for patents.

Re Para 5 SCAP Tel C 56592 question also arises why licenses wld be applied for or issued to Ger suppliers of vested patented goods for export.

Japan. Wld appear only necessary that Japanese importers be licensed to import vested patented products. If licenses to Gers required, however, wld recommend HICOM authorization issue licenses to expedite trade consider clarification and settlement whole question of Ger patents, trademarks, copyrights and licenses regarding trade Japan, important to recovery both countries. Until then Ger manufacturers burdened with uncertainty what goods may or may not be exported Japan. Evaluation of impact present restrictions on such patented, trademarked etc. Ger exports to Japan will follow when completed.

Part 1. Subcommittee of Senate Judiciary Committee (Senator Eastland, Mississippi, Chairman; Senators Withers, Kentucky; Jenner, Indiana) held exec session Investigation 21, 22 Jun to ascertain purposes and results of Anglo American textile trip to Japan in May. Principal purposes Investigation apparently to determine what, if any, steps might have been taken injurious to US cotton farmers.

State, Army, Commerce Representatives, who were present at meetings of American Group prior departure and after return US notified of Senators possible desire learn from them what was said at meetings but these departmental witnesses were not called. Only witnesses were American businessmen on trip, US Cotton Textile and Cotton Trade Associations personnel related to trip, and ECA Cotton Expert, E D White. No request recd for statement from SCAP.

Senator Eastland, from non-government sources, learned of presence in Washington of Mister Bumpel Hori of All-Japan Spinners Association, here on exchange of Persons Project 63 (Industrial Leaders), and proposed issue Subpoena in order obtain Hori's testimony with respect groups visit Japan. Friendly non-committee meeting between Hori and Senator arranged instead.

While session was exec and little known of actual testimony appears Senators satisfied trip did not serve any non-constructive purpose. Will advise of any new info this connection.

Part 2. On 23 Jun, Subcommittee released to press folg interim rept entitled "Investigation Recent Anglo-American Cotton Textile Trade Mission to Japan":

in full exec session, a quorum being present, the motion to investigate the recent Anglo-American Cotton Textile Trade Mission to Japan, having considered the same, acted favorably thereon by establishing a subcommittee of Senator Eastland, Chairman, Senator Withers and Senator Jenner, with full powers to conduct itself as it deems fitting and proper to carry out the intents and purposes of said motion.

"Pursuant to its enabling powers, said subcommittee held hearings on Jun 21st and Jun 22nd, 1950, and after interrogating numerous witnesses, desires at this time to issue this interim rept setting out certain findings and recommendations, namely, the folg, to-wit:

"Whereas, it is apparent that the Japanese textile industry wishes to expand its production of fabricated cotton textiles and in pursuance of that goal desires to increase its spindleage, some div being existent among the Japanese of the quantum of increase but almost all being in agreement that there should be some increase.

"Whereas, it is public knowledge that the textile industry is the backbone of the Japanese economy and that its textile exports produce the fgn exchange to support itself, it otherwise not being self supporting.

"Whereas, the support of the Japanese economy by American tax dollars is a severe strain on the American economy and is a burden of which this country desires to be relieved at the earliest moment consistent with our obligations of fgn relations and defense.

"Whereas, it is obvious that an increase of spindles means an increase in Japanese textile exports, thereby increasing its fgn exchange with consequent diminution of the Japanese money demands on the American tax dollar.

"Also, whereas, info before the subcommittee indicates that increased Japanese textile production will naturally increase its needs for raw cotton and said raw cotton will be purchd from American farmers.

"And, whereas, it is the subcommittees understanding that the Japanese textile people have rqstd of SCAP for an increase of 800,000 spindles, such increase not being unusually large or unwarranted in view of statistical info of the number Japanese spindles now in being as against the prewar number.

"Minister of Foreign Relations of the Republic of Peru, Lima. Reference is made to our cable dated 29 May. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, acting in respect of Occupied Japan, considers it desirable, in the interest of expanded trade, to extend the present Trade and Financial Arrangement Between the Republic of Peru and Occupied Japan, signed in Lima 15 June 1949, by the Minister of Hacienda of the Republic of Peru and the Chief, SCAP Trade Mission, until such time as new trade and financial agreements may be negotiated.

"If the Government of the Republic of Peru is favorably disposed to consider extension of the present Trade and Financial Arrangement, we would appreciate a cable reply to this effect. The present message together with your favorable reply will be considered as an agreement between the High Contracting Parties. 1. Reference is made to the following:

a. Cable msg from SCAPTRADE to the Minister of Foreign Relations, Lima, Peru, dated 26 May 1950 and dispatched by the Tokyo telegraphic service on 29 May 1950.

b. Trade and Financial Arrangement Between the Republic of Peru and Occupied Japan, signed in Lima, Peru, 15 June 1949.

2. The Trade and Financial Arrangement, reference lb above, signed on 15 June 1949, became effective fifteen days after the date of signature. As the Arrangement by the terms thereof covers a period of one year and is due to expire on 30 June 1950, SCAPTRADE directed the cable msg, reference la above, to the Minister of Foreign Relations of Peru on 29 May 1950, requesting the views of the Peruvian Government regarding possible extension of the Arrangement until such time as a new basis for trade could be negotiated. To date no reply has been received from the Peruvian Government.

3. Current political disorders reported in Peru may be a reason for the absence of a reply from the Peruvian Government regarding this matter. In order to prevent the expiration of the Arrangement, reference lb above, it is believed essential to dispatch subject msg to the Minister of Foreign Relations of Peru through the intermediary of the Amemb in Lima, Peru.

4. Subject msg:

a. States that the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, acting in respect of Occupied Japan, considers it desirable, in the interest of expanded trade, to extend the present Arrangement, reference lb above, until such time as new trade and financial agreements may be negotiated.

b. Further states that if the Government of Peru is favorably disposed to consider the extension of the present Trade and Financial Arrangement, a reply to this effect would be appreciated.

c. Advises that subject msg together with the favorable reply by the Peruvian Government will be considered as an agreement between the High Contracting Parties and that a formal exchange of notes confirming this understanding will be made at a later date.

d. Requests a cable reply from the Government of Peru before 30 June 1950.

C-56712 Urmsg W-83311, 24 May 50, and previous correspondence on subject Ex-Japanese Naval Small Craft in Use by Korean Coast Guard. Conclusions stated in reference message are not in accord with facts. Vessels were loaned to CG USAFIK in August and December 1946 upon request of that command in order to assist an urgent occupational requirement of the U. S. Government. Intent to direct return of vessels upon the withdrawal of USAFIK as announced in CX 502701, 24 May 49, was held in abeyance per request joint State-Army msg IX 90411, 22 June 49. Negotiations for sale were initiated on 14 June 49 per proposal by State-ECA-Army msg WX 90525, 28 May 49. Sale not consummated in 1949 due to delay in State answer to AMIK query in TOECA 962, 24 June 49, and to decision by the Bureau of the Budget on the characteristics of these vessels as transmitted by urmsg W 80226, 4 Mar 50. Thus two SCAP proposed actions leading to solution of this problem were nullified by U. S. agencies. Vessels are surrendered war materiel in which equity is held by other nations in addition to the U. S. It is reiterated that authority does not exist for disposition of these vessels by arbitrary unilateral SCAP action. Loan was not made to ROK but to U. S. Government with USAFIK to exercise operational control and responsibility. U. S. agencies in Korea progressively transferred operational responsibility of vessels to ROK apparently without informing latter of their status, thus allowing subsequent inference by ROK that title had also passed. SCAP holds title to vessels currently on loan to the U. S. Government and subject to return by U. S. Government to SCAP control upon request. Final disposition of vessels cannot be considered as a matter for discussion between SCAP and ROK.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: Ex-Japanese Naval Small Craft in use by Korean Coast Guard

1. Para 7, Msg W-83311, from DA to SCAP, briefly reviews actions by U. S. Government agencies which nullify previous efforts to effect sale of ten (10) Ex-Japanese naval vessels used by the Korean Coast Guard, and concludes that settlement for payment appears to be a matter between SCAP and ROK.

2. a. There is no indication of intent by any U.S. agencies to bring the matter of settlement of vessels status before the FEC for discussion;

b. At present resumption of negotiations for the purchase of vessels by a U.S. agency cannot be expected as neither ECA nor GARIOA funds can be used for this purpose.

c. Use of these vessels by Korea assists the U.S. naval policy of aid and guidance for Korea and to a certain extent benefits Japanese economic recovery by partial control of illegal international commerce.

3. Instant msg to DA briefly reviews background on the status of these vessels and states that since these vessels are in effect on loan to the U.S. Government by SCAP authority, U.S. Government is responsible for their custody. Msg reiterates that SCAP does not have authority for arbitrary disposition of surrendered war materials in which other governments beside the United States hold equity, and that in view of this fact, final disposition of vessels cannot be considered as a matter for discussion between SCAP and ROK.

Part 1.

"At the 194th meeting of the FEC on Jun 1, 1950, the Australian representative asked the reasons for the increase in the amt of yen in the secured fund, consisting of the proceeds of liquidation of unidentified looted property, from 1,032,000 yen late in 1949 to 3,389,810 yen as of Apr 1, 1950.

"The Australian representative recalled that the representatives of looted countries had been informed toward the end of last year that it was not anticipated that further unidentified looted property would be liquidated for yen. This opinion, which was expressed informally to the P&R Committee by a member of the US delegation to the FEC, was based on the assumption that all remaining unidentified looted property could be liquidated for dollars. In fact, however, dollar bids were not recd for certain remaining items of unidentified looted property. For example, when bids were opened on Jan 17, 1950, for 357 items of unidentified looted machinery which had been widely offered for sale, it was found that only 1 bid for 1 machine had been recd. The Supreme Comdr infod the Restitution Advisory Committee of this circumstance and stated that it was anticipated that among the

unidentified property still to be offered for sale, including 116 machines, radios and radio equipment, 1 automobile engine, 69 rubber tires and tubes, 4 bedsteads, skins and approx 75 misc items of small intrinsic value, there would be other items for which no bids in dollars would be recd (MI-210/49). At its meeting on Jan 20, 1950, the committee unanimously voted to recommend to the Supreme Comdr that whenever efforts to sell unidentified looted property for dollars were unsuccessful that, with the exception of precious metals and precious stones, a yen sale be arranged and that if such property could not be sold for either dollars or yen, it be released to the Japanese Govt for distr as directed by the Supreme Comdr for the Allied Powers (MI-197/26).

"In accordance with the procedure recommended by the committee, the Supreme Comdr liquidated some additional unidentified looted property for yen, the total net receipts of yen as of Apr 1, 1950, being equivalent to approx \$9,400 at the ofl rate of exchange. Since the secured fund on that date contained \$3,399,440.89 it is apparent that the yen component represents the proceeds from the sale of less than 1/3 of 1% of the unidentified looted property liquidated up to that time."

Part 2.

"Mr Chairman:

"I should like to make some comments on the info supplied by the US delegate on the Chinese inquiry on 18 May 1950 re the news dispatch on Japanese fishing. The info which is embodied in SCAPIN 2097 permits the Japanese fisherman to operate mothership-type tuna fishing expeditions in the area extending south from the authd fishing area to the equator.

"The Philippine delegation observes that the area in which Japanese Nationals are permitted to fish by the Supreme Comdr extends south to the equator such beyond the area specified in Para 2 (A) of the proposed policy paper, FEC-271/33, which was not accepted by all member govts represented in this Com on 20 Oct 1949. I might recall that the Philippines voted against the policy proposal on the ground that it did not contain provs which would insure adherence to conservation measures and safeguard the national security of countries near Japan. It is relevant to point out in this connection that in the past, Japanese vessels under the guise of engaging in fishing oprs had come very close to the neighboring coasts and gathered valuable mil data which, history tells, became inimical to the security of the countries concerned. Concerning this latest authorization by SCAP of permitting the former enemy nationals to fish very near the coasts of allied countries located south and west of Japan

and north of the equator, we believe, is not consistent with the US policy with respect to fishing and aquatic industries in Japan which was dispatched sometime in Nov 1945 to the Supreme Comdr for the Allied Powers for his guidance. Para (B) of Document FEC-035 which embodies the US policy reads:

'The coastal fisheries and fish culture should be utilized as the primary sources for domestic consumption. To the extent that fish culture and coastal fisheries are unable to meet the minimum domestic requirements, deep sea fisheries and other fisheries in water open to Japanese opr may be utilized where security and political considerations permit. Deep sea fishing in areas near United States territory or near United States island responsibilities should not be authd. Japanese fishing should not be permitted near areas under allied jurisdiction without prior permission from the country concerned. These prohibitions should continue until international agreements are negotiated permitting Japanese fishing in these areas.'

"The first part of Para (B) of the US policy specifies that fish culture and coastal fisheries are to be utilized mainly for domestic consumption and that should these be unable to meet the minimum domestic requirements can the Japanese be permitted to fish in the open sea. The last part of the para as we understand, specifically states that prior permission from the country concerned is needed before Japanese fishing should be permitted near areas of direct concern under allied jurisdiction.

"In view of the great concern of the Philippine Govt and some govts represented in this Comm the extended area authd by SCAP to Japanese fisherman, the Philippine delegation will appreciate getting info on the folg ques:

1. Is there any change in the policy of the US Govt re Japanese fishing since the basic statement contained in FEC-035 was dispatched to the Supreme Comdr for his guidance?
2. What is the total catch obtained say from Jan to May 1950 from the coastal fisheries and fish culture? Of this amt, how much is consumed for domestic purposes?

Announcement will be made on June 15, concerning new civil aviation policy for Japan, to Australian, Canadian, Chinese, United Kingdom and Philippine Missions, as well as Pan American World Airways and Northwest Airlines. Following is substance of proposed announcement:

"The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers has authorized the inauguration of a non-Japanese internal air transport service for Japan. The licenses of international airlines now operating into and through Japan will not be amended to authorize each airline the right of internal traffic privileges. The establishment of a separate airline, or the mutual agreement on an established airline, to provide an internal air service for Japan on a nondiscriminatory basis, is considered most feasible.

"All persons, including Japanese nationals, will be authorized to travel by air within Japan, as prescribed by applicable SCAP directives.

"Representatives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will consult with licensed international airlines regarding the organization and operation of an internal airline in the near future. Participation in the internal airline organization will be limited to those licensed airlines which have been operating into Japan prior to 1 January 1950."

- A. Patents including patent application and utility model.
 - 1. All former German-owned patents coming within the meaning of the Vesting Law are owned by France, United Kingdom and United States for whom SCAP is trustee.
 - 2. By SCAP directive all German patents cancelled for non-payment of required annual fees after 13 September 1945 were revalidated and maintenance of the validity continued.
 - 3. Valid license agreement have been continued in full force and effect with SCAP collecting royalties and the Japanese licensee pays the annual fees to maintain validity.

4. On all patents not under valid license agreements SCAP has and will continue to issue revocable non-exclusive royalty free licenses to Japanese applicants and holds the licensee responsible for payment of administrative fee to the Japanese Government in lieu of annual fees.

5. SCAP does not, pending further clarification of policy, issue such licenses to Germans who previously owned the patents nor to their agents nor to other Germans or their agents.

6. SCAP does not allow new agreements between parties to pre-surrender agreements unless the technology subject of the new agreement can be distinguished from and not merely supplement the old technology.

B. Trademarks including tradenames.

1. Marks or names associated with products in Japan and of purely local (i.e. Japanese) significance may be sold together with the associated business. Directives preclude their return to German ownership or control. None disposed of to date.

2. Marks or names associated with products made in Japan but not of purely local significance are not to be sold for the present. Except as otherwise provided in present valid license agreements use of such marks by their present users or their successors may be permitted for the time being but only on the basis of licenses revocable at will at any time. Directives preclude their return to German ownership or control.

3. All other marks or names not associated with manufacturer in Japan should for the present be retained and their use prohibited. Directives preclude their return to German ownership or control.

C. It is recognized that the provisions of the present directives regarding the treatment of patents and trademarks prevents the entry into Japan of goods from Germany bearing marks or tradenames which are now owned in Japan by the Three Powers and further precludes the re-entry into Japan of new German technological developments when such technology requires the use of vested patents whether under valid license agreement or not. This matter presently under consideration between France, United Kingdom and United States on a governmental level who jointly set policy.

Part 2

Reference your request in Paragraph 2 of URMSG W 82934 evaluation follows:

Of estimated German exports to Japan on trade plan 33.8% are machinery and parts and chemicals and drugs, many items of which are trademarked and registered in Japan. Figure of 55.5% for finished products quoted in OURMSG C 56098, 3 May 1950, incorrect. To date purchases from Germany have been largely raw materials which Germans are protesting. Japanese exports to all countries must be increased if goal of self supporting economy by 1953 is to be achieved. Balanced trade required under Japan-German Agreement. Quantity of raw materials which Germany will export to Japan is limited. If finished

products carrying vested trademarks cannot be included on new Trade Agreement plan to be negotiated for period 1 August 1950 through 31 July 1951, volume of trade with Germany may be materially reduced. As SCAP does not check individual imports as to the trademarks applied thereto, there is no means of assessing the quantity of goods bearing vested trademarks which are scheduled for import. Prospective importers of German goods have protested that they cannot import because of the prohibition against the use of marks or tradenames.

Appropriate matter must first be discussed with France, United Kingdom on policy level. Will also discuss with TRIPAC as you suggest.

Part 3

A. German business interests who formerly maintained enterprises in Japan and whose assets including patents, trademarks and license agreements, including technical service have been vested here, are making efforts to re-establish pre-surrender status either by direct representation or by representation through Allied or neutral business interests. Return of the use of their trademarks and patents or the signing of new license agreements including technical service with former or new Japanese licensee is primary objective. They do not seek former business name or other property because, in many cases, liabilities exceed assets. The existence of Japan Germany Trade Agreement of Japan's requirement for advanced foreign technology are used as pressure arguments.



B. Inclosure URLTR, AGAO-S 387.6 (17 Feb 49)CAD, 15 March 1949, subject, "Liquidation of German Assets in Japan," states in "Conclusions" paragraph 4b(2), "Liquidation may be carried out in any manner SCAP considers desirable taking into account the objectives of precluding the return of German external assets to German ownership or control and Japan's need for maintaining maximum industrial efficiency." Desire here is to increase Japan Germany Trade and to introduce new German technical knowledge. However, this desire does not override the requirement of precluding the return of German external assets to German ownership or control when interpreting the present interim policies concerning the vested German property rights and technical agreements. This approach is adopted in order to preclude the regeneration of German economic infiltration into Japan.

"Tokyo, Japan
7 June 1950

"Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

"To the end that representative democracy in Japan might have the opportunity to thrive in the free atmosphere of full knowledge and public discussion, it has been one of the most fundamental of Allied policies governing the Occupation to encourage and assist the development of a truly free and responsible press. In the furtherance of this purpose, censorship was progressively lifted until finally terminated two years ago and the press left free to publish on its own responsibility, subject only to a code embodying a statement of principles and ethics patterned after the Canons of Journalism of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, supplemented by minimum restrictions essential to the safeguard of military security.

"The Japanese press has in general responded admirably to this challenge and developed a degree of responsibility which has evoked most favorable comment from many visiting journalists from abroad. The glaring exception is the Communist organ AKAHATA. This journal has for some time assumed the role of mouthpiece for the most violent of lawless elements within the Communist Party and as such has defiled its news columns and editorial page with licentious, false, inflammatory and seditious appeals to irresponsible sentiment in the effort to provoke defiance of constituted authority, disrupt the progress of economic revival and create social unrest and mass violence. All this calls for prompt corrective action to safeguard the public peace.

"One course such corrective action might take would be to close the journal and destroy for all time its propaganda making power and constant incitation to violence and revolution; another the re-institution of a pre-censorship over all material it proposes to print. Both courses, however, are repugnant to me as violative of the broad philosophy which has

"Tokyo, Japan.
6 June 1950.

"Dear Mr. Prime Minister:

"It has been a fundamental purpose of the Occupation to assist the Japanese people to meet their commitments under the Potsdam Declaration, foremost of which requires the establishment in Japan of a new order of peace, security and justice upon which may firmly stand a peacefully inclined and responsible government. To such end the Japanese Government is specifically enjoined in the Potsdam Declaration to 'remove all obstacles to the strengthening of democratic tendencies among the Japanese people.'

"In the implementation of this requirement, carried forward as one of the basic objectives of Allied policy as determined and prescribed by the Far Eastern Commission, the structure of the Japanese Government has been redesigned, its laws and institutions where undemocratic have been revised, and those persons whose public record gives warning that their continued influence would be inimical to democratic growth have been removed and excluded from Japan's public affairs.

"The guiding philosophy of this phase of the Occupation has been protective, not punitive. Its purpose and effect has been to provide assurance that the aims of Allied policy in the democratization of Japan would not be thwarted by the influence and pressure of anti-democratic elements. The area of its application for the most part has embraced those persons who because of position and influence bear responsibility for Japan's totalitarian policies which led to adventure in conquest and exploitation. Recently, however, a new and no less sinister groupment has injected itself into the Japanese political scene which has sought through perversion of truth and incitation to mass violence

to transform this peaceful and tranquil land into an arena of disorder and strife as the means of stemming Japan's notable progress along the road of representative democracy and to subvert the rapidly growing democratic tendencies among the Japanese people.

"Acting in common accord, they have hurled defiance at constituted authority, shown contempt for the processes of law and order, and contrived by false and inflammatory statements and other subversive means to arouse through resulting public confusion that degree of social unrest which would set the stage for the eventual overthrow of constitutional government in Japan by force. Their coercive methods bear striking parallel to those by which the militaristic leaders of the past deceived and misled the Japanese people, and their aims, if achieved, would surely lead Japan to an even worse disaster. To permit this incitation to lawlessness to continue unchecked, however embryonic it may at present appear, would be to risk ultimate suppression of Japan's democratic institutions in direct negation of the purpose and intent of Allied policy pronouncements, forfeiture of her chance for political independence, and destruction of the Japanese race.

"Accordingly, I direct that your government take the necessary administrative measures to remove and exclude the following named persons, constituting the full membership of the Central Committee of the Japan Communist Party, from public service, and render them subject to the prohibitions, restrictions and liabilities of my directives of January 4, 1946, (SCAPINS 548 and 550) and their implementing ordinances:

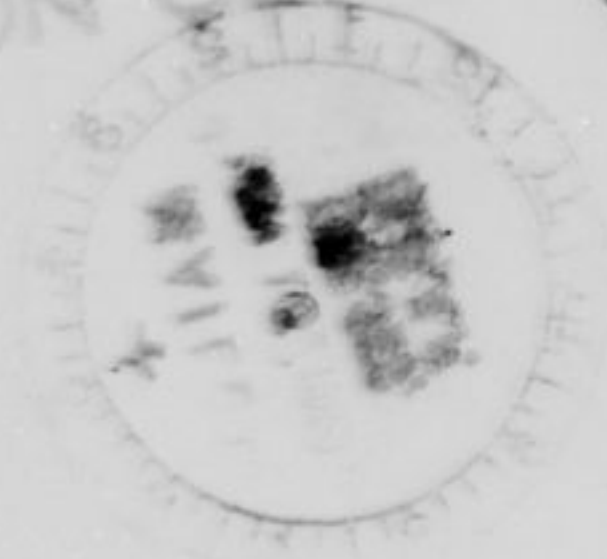

JAPAN: (a) 8 (eight) Japanese being tried for assaulting members of the Occupation during Communist-sponsored rally 30 May (CINCFE WEEKA 22) were sentenced by Provost court 3 June. One (1) received ten (10) years, six (6) received seven (7) years and one (1) five (5) years at hard labor. Sentence is subject to review by higher authority.

C-in-C

(b) With guidance by Public Safety Division, G-2, but on basis of city ordinance, Metropolitan Police prevented or broke up number of rallies, most instigated by Communists, scheduled for 3 June. A show of great force was staged by the police, reinforced by five thousand members of the national rural police, which apparently intimidated the Communist groups. Largest rally, originally called for 35,000, was reduced to 2000 and then dispersed without incident.

(c) In his strongest statement since the occupation, Premier Yoshida said on 4 June that the assault on American personnel 30 May was an outrage to be deplored by the government. He characterized the incident as "disgraceful" and "betraying the guidance we have been given and the good will we have been shown by General MacArthur above all and by the occupation forces and the American Forces". He said "The principal force that brought about this shameful affair were, it goes without saying, members of the communist party and a few students who, instigated by them, acted as their catspaws." He continued "The government, on its part, will take resolute measures against such acts of violence and further might even have to consider outlawing the Communist Party."

G-2 Comment: Noteworthy that Yoshida deferred making this statement until two hours after the polls for the House of Councillors election had been closed.

(d) Following this statement by Yoshida, Attorney-General Ueda said: "The Government already has established a policy of outlawing the Communist Party. The problem of ousting the Communists from the political world is not part of the occupation policy. It should be decided upon independently by the government itself in a Diet session."

(e) Despite rainy weather throughout the country, 72 per cent of the electorate voted in the House of Councillors election 4 June. Rural districts had the highest vote, Tokyo being lowest with only 54 per cent. Incomplete

The election was characterized by a substantial gain by the Liberal Party and a strong political comeback by the Social-Democrats, who now become the second party in the councillors. Since most of the independents presumably will join the green breeze society later, the elections, no doubt influenced by the developments described in the preceding paragraphs, are construed as an important conservative victory.

(f) On the morning of 6 June, Premier Yoshida received a letter from the Supreme Commander ordering him to purge the 24 members of the Central Committee of the Communist party of Japan under the provisions of SCAPINS 548 and 550. The Cabinet, after a long meeting, announced that it would implement the Supreme Commander's directive immediately. One of those purged had just won a councillor seat in the elections of 4 June.

C-56494 For CGIA. The recent turnover of pers in the Soviet Sec of the Allied Council for Japan provides no real indication of Soviet intent to quit the council.

A rept evaluated B-6 from an employee of Soviet Mission in Japan is that sudden recall of Lt Gen Kazuo Iwawake to USSR is probably connected with alleged Soviet plans of acquiring oil fields of Iran, an area with which Iwawake allegedly is familiar. Soviet informant further indicated belief that Iwawake would transfer from trailer on which he departed and which is scheduled to go to USSR, to submarine or other craft, and that Soviet action in Iran would coincide with Chinese Communist invasion of Formosa.

The str of the Soviet Sec fluctuates monthly, but has diminished somewhat in the past year. Comparing average str for the first six months of 1949 and 50, the figures are 197 and 135 respectively. Str as of 29 May 50 is 123, but this is not necessarily an abnormal variation. There was an increase of one in all pers. Of 11 civ members departing, all but two are of minor importance, being domestic servants, clerical pers, and minor consultants. Gromov, the Trade Representative, and senior economic adviser, is departing on temporary duty, and is expected to return shortly. His family remains in Japan. Glinkin, one of several deputy political advisers, will be replaced soon by Hesev. It is normal for some dependents to leave Japan for the summer due to the climate.

Col Polyashenko, has been appointed as Acting Soviet member on the Allied Council, and the top political adviser, Pevlyshev, key man after Iwawake, remains on duty.

Possible implication of Iwawake's departure are (1) recall because of excessive length of service since 1945; (2) recall in criticism of failure of Communist indoctrination PW repatriates; (3) the Soviet leaders plan to replace him (a man of primarily mil background) with an individual of greater political and diplomatic ability, due to the imminence of Japanese Peace Treaty negotiations; (4) to attend a conf on intensified SE Asia aggression requiring expert advice on situation in FIC and Japan, Iwawake having longest record of service of all foreign diplomats attached to this hq.

Distribution of this report includes Army, Chief Naval Op and United States Air Force, Wash. In future will compile reports more nearly to fit specific requirements CX 56426.

Do not understand remark Para 2 quoted msg Dept Army (CSGPO) which begins "in view of deteriorating situation in the Phil". Actually military-dissidents situation through islands is definitely improving. This has been stated in several JUSMAG Weekly Activities Reports during last 6 weeks. Reorganization of Armed Forces Phil taking over constabulary for Sec of Interior and forming of 10 battalion combat teams was begun 1 April. Distribution of these 10 battalion combat teams throughout Luzon has caused dissidents to move north into Cagayanb Valley and southward to Bicol Peninsula. No serious dissident combat activity has taken place in over a month.

Believe that reports reaching Wash implying military situation deteriorating grossly exaggerated, possibly instigated by foreign propaganda. Present Phil Armed Forces are capable controlling dissident activity in Phil until

"At the 193d Meeting of the Far Eastern Com on May 18, 1950, the Philippine representative requested info regarding a memo to the Japanese Govt from the Gen Hq of the Supreme Comdr (SCAPIN 2089 of 21 Mar 1950) which provided for the removal of certain companies from the schedule of restricted concerns:

"By SCAPIN 215 of 31 Oct 1945 and SCAPIN 403 of 8 Dec 1945 the Supreme Comdr directed that with certain minor exceptions, no sale, trade or other trf or adjustment of the capital stocks, bonds, debentures, voting trust or other forms of capital securities of a specified list of firms, nor of their subsidiary or affiliated firms, should be made without the prior approval of Gen Hq, nor should their capital securities be used as collateral for loans, bills, notes, or other borrowings or credit without similar authorization. Through issuance of other memo to the Japanese Govt, including those listed in Para 1 of SCAPIN 2089, the Supreme Comdr later directed that numerous additional firms be added to the schedule of concerns whose activities were restricted in accordance with the provs of SCAPIN 215 and SCAPIN 403. These actions constituted a part of the Supreme Comdrs program for

Firms designated as restricted concerns by the directives referred to above were those in which Zaibatsu Orgns held 10% or more of the stock and the restrictions were designed to prevent dissipation of assets until new stockholders had been acquired.

"The firms so designated were required by the Supreme Comdr to sell the former Zaibatsu owned stocks, reorganize the co structure if called for under established Japanese Laws, protect any interests of UN Nationals in the firms, and separate the firm completely from the former Zaibatsu chain of capital. As indiv firms have completed the steps necessary to meet these requirements, the Supreme Comdr has from time to time notified the Japanese Govt of their removal from the schedule of restricted concerns. In this connection, the Supreme Comdr has issued numerous memoranda to the Japanese Govt, including for example SCAPIN 1918 of 6 Jul 1948, SCAPIN 1991 of 9 Apr 1949, SCAPIN 2045 of 17 Sep 1949; and SCAPIN 2065 of 17 Dec 1949, in addition to SCAPIN 2089. Through such removal of restrictions the Supreme Comdr has permitted the resumption of the normal sale, trade, trf of the capital securities of these firms, and the normal use of their capital securities as collateral for borrowing or credit purposes, subj to such regs of the Supreme Comdr and the Japanese Govt as are applicable to other Japanese firms not on the schedule of restricted concerns. The remaining restricted firms are still in the process of complying with the Supreme Comdr criteria for removal from the schedule of restricted concerns."
