Part 1. Progress reports in FRIAR and HEAVY cases neither needed nor desired. Instructions contained in SR 40-590-20 and SR 600-400-5 (now being published) remain unchanged. Changes in initial classification from FRIAR to HEAVY to INGOT or LEAST (distinguished from change in condition) or vice versa requires submission of a corrected report (as distinguished from progress report).

Part 2. This office makes every effort to keep requests for further information to a minimum on INGOT, LEAST and GRAVEY and such effort will continue. CEUS cases being rptd by Tripler and ZI hospitals being posted to records of this office and supplemental information will not be requested from your headquarters in such cases. In future contemplate requests received this office for nature of wounds, present condition and prognosis will be consolidated daily in one message requesting the hospitals your command forward special progress reports by airmail to addressees indicated in message or preferably that the patients personally write addressees if physically able. Inquirer will be informed that a special progress report or letter from individual will be forthcoming. Request concurrence.

Part 3. Repeated spot checks indicate that progress letters for seriously injured, wounded or will individuals by hospitals contain full details, are sympathetic and not too long delayed. This helps to reduce requests for further information.

Here is today's "Report from America."

Three statements which originated this week in widely scattered points of the world focused attention upon a major Korean problem--The task of the United Nations to provide continuing relief for the war refugees--and the long-range program for rehabilitating the nation after the Communist aggression is crushed.

From Tokyo, General Douglas MacArthur--in his capacity as the United Nations High Commander--made a report to the United Nations Security Council giving a full account of the progress of the UN crusade. In his report, General MacArthur told of the emergency relief given to the great number of refugees in the area controlled by UN Forces. Much of this aid, he noted, is coming from volunteer organizations, and he cited as one example the Emergency Central Committee of the Korean Red Cross. This committee was organized by the eminent educator, Dr Helen Kim. In addition to distributing food and other relief supplies, this body provides assistance to military casualties by procuring and rolling bandages and surgical dressings, and in some cases aiding in medical treatment.

General MacArthur also cited as an example of the high morale among the Korean people the formation of a patriotic league to give all-out assistance to the United Nations crusade. The volunteer workers in this league help obtain labor and

equipment for use by the UN forces.

The MacArthur report stated that estimates of the amount and kinds of food, clothing, blankets and medical supplies were continually being forwarded to the appropriate agencies. Thus far, he noted, the immediate requirements had been met by emergency measures, but prompt action by member VB nations is needed to provide increased amounts of food, warmth and medical supplies for the refugees during the coming winter months.

By coincidence, on the same day that General MacArthur issued his report to the Security Council, the World Health Organization from its headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland--announced that it had taken steps to aid in the relief work. It announced that it had appointed a special mission to Korea to help set up a civilian relief and medical aid program.

The mission will be headed by Colonel Walter Crichton of Great Britain, who has already left Geneva to assume his new duties in Korea. The staff which will work under his direction is composed of 5 teams of physicians and sanitary engineers from Europe, Latin America and the United States. They will work under the United Nations High Command in Korea.

The World Health Organization, although organized under the auspices of the United Nations, is open to all nations. 74 nations including the Republic of Korea have joined. It has as its objective "the attainment by all peoples of the highest possible level of Health." To this end it applies knowledge and techniques for preventing epidemics and combatting disease developed in any part of the world to other parts of the world having similar problems. In Korea, the Health Mission will deal with immediate medical and health problems resulting from the Communist aggression. At the same time, this mission will help establish facilities which will continue to function after the United Nations forces are victorious.

The third statement pertaining to Korean aid and rehabilitation was made Wednesday on the floor of the United Nations General Assembly by Secretary of State Acheson. He said, in part:

"A great deal is now being done through the United Nations and under the unified command for the relief of the Korean people. This aid needs to be vastly increased. But there is another job which needs to be done, and a greater one. As peace is restored in Korea, a tremendous job of reconstruction will be required.

"The devastation which has overtaken Korea is a consequence of the aggression from the North. It is probably unrealistic to expect that those who might have prevented or recalled this aggression will make available the help needed to repair the damage caused by this invasion.

"The lives lost as the result of this aggression cannot be recalled, but as the people of Korea set about the task of reestablishing a free and Independent Nation, as they begin to rebuild their country, the United Nations must be prepared to marshal its resources and its experience to help them."

Mr Acheson said that all the 53 governments which have pledged their support to the UN Defense of Korea were not able to contribute military personnel or equipment, but he feels sure that all will want to contribute food, transportation and industrial equipment and construction materials technicians to the great task of reconstruction. This aid will consist of help in combatting disease, the building of hospitals, schools and factories, the training of teachers and public administrators, and assistance in making the land fertile.

As a result, Secretary Acheson declared, Korea can serve as a pattern for other nations of the world which are in need of development or rehabilitation.

The statements made by General MacArthur, the World Health Organization and Secretary of State Acheson, once more demonstrate the high purposes of the United Nations. Not only is it determined to guard the peace of the world, but to improve the lot of mankind during peaceful times.

Here is today's "Report from America".

Ever since the Communist invasion of the Republic of Korea, people from America--and, in fact, from all over the world--have been expressing their sympathy and their desire to help the Korean People. This support has been shown especially in the wealth of interest that has been displayed in the American Press, and on the radio, on television and in the motion pictures. Another demonstration of this support is shown in the large no of letters that have been written to ROK Ambassador to the US--Dr John M Chang--in Wash these letters are all the more indicative of how America feels about Korea's problems, because they usually come from ordinary citizens, who do not have the prominence to express their feelings in the press or on the radio, but who are willing to spend the time and trouble to write a word or two to the Korean Diplomatic Representative in America. According to the Embassy Officials, these letters have been arriving at the rate of about 300 a week. It is interesting to note that most of them have come from veterans of the last World War who want to go to the Communists in Korea, but who are barred fr combat duty because they have families or because they have more essential jobs elsewhere. Many of them have tried to enlist in the American Army to go to Korea. Many of them are rejected because wounds they received in the past war make them unusable, or for some other reason. Almost invariably they write to Ambassador Chang asking his help in getting them into the UNs Armed Forces Defending Korea.

Equally expressive of America's concern in Korea are the letters that come from ordinary citizens. Here is a letter

from a farmer in Davenport, Iowa, which says, "Just a not to tell you how deeply I feel about the barbaric invasion of Korea by the Communists. I am sure that everything will turn out all right, particularly since the UNs have come to your assistance."

Here is another from a businessman in Plainville, Illinois. He said, "We realize that the lives on our (American) Soldiers are being spent for reason for which any of us would be willing to die. We are proud that the blood of our Nation has mingled with yours in the struggle for freedom that is the basic right of all men."

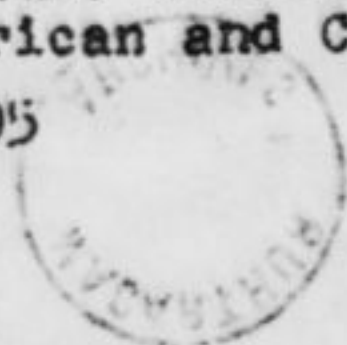
Here is a letter from the son of a Korean who has moved to America. It comes from NVYGIA, in the Southern US. These are his words, "As the son of one who spent 43 yrs in Korea and also having worked myself with the young Men's Christian Association in Korea for the past 15 yrs, and also as my own son flew to Korea a few days ago as a soldier, I am tremendously anxious to be of service. I am 59 yrs old, I speak Korean, and I love Korea. I am anxious to be of help."

Many of the letters come from American civilians who formerly worked in Korea. Here is one fr a man fr Miami, Fla. "I was in Korea w th the Korean Interim Govt. I was one of the Advisors to the Korean Mine and Mill Co. It goes without saying that I hope the hardships which your country is currently undergoing will be short, and that thru the UNs your country will be truly United. I was an (UNs Commission observer in the Elections in Muju Gun of Cholla Pukto)."

Many of the letters to ROK Embassy come fr outside the US. Here is, for instance, a letter fr a newspaperman in Canada, who was a former Squadron Leader with the Royal Canadian Air Force and who fought in Europe and later against the Japanese in the South Pacific. In his letter to Ambassador Chang he says, "I am impelled by the pressure of my conscience regarding the spread of Communism in Asia, and in the World, to place my services at the disposal of the Republic of Korea. I know that if Communism is not stopped now, neither I nor my family will ever be safe fr Red Domination." Ambassador Chang--of course--cannot accept this mans offer. He can only refer him back to his own draft board or recruiting service. This is unfortunate, because literally hundreds of the letters are coming in from American and Canadian Veterans every week.

Of particular interest are the letters from Foreigners resident in the US--some of them are exiles from behind the Iron Curtain.

Here is 1 from the President of the Council of Free Czechoslovakia. He says, in part, "The understanding and common hatred of tyranny which we have suffered under the Communists has induced the Czechoslovakians to notify the UN Secretary and the Security Council of their readiness and desire to join the fight world freedom (in Korea) under the Flag of the UN."

Many of these letters of sympathy and support come from organizations they come from all kinds--Religious, Fraternal, Social, Collegiate, and Political.

Here is one from a Church group in Lynn Haven, Florida, "at the regular meeting of the Bay Country Ministerial Association, it was unanimously endorsed that our organization express to you, and through you to President Syngman Rhee, our deep concern for the continuing situation in Korea and to express our lamentations to you, to President Rhee and to the fellow Christians in your country."

The letters you have heard here are but a few of the many expressions of sympathy and support that are received by the Korean Ambassador to the US every day. Then indicate most forcefully that the people of America and of the world are with Korea and the UN in their fight against Communist aggression.

Here is today's "Report from America."

Two American Congressmen -- Hugh D Scott of Pennsylvania, and Henry J Latham, of New York -- have just completed a tour of active duty with the United States Navy that put them in the midst of the fighting in Korea. Both Congressmen were officers in the American Navy during the 2d World War and each has had previous active duty in the Pacific. Because of the nature of their assignment, now completed, the Congressmen were able to give the American people a first hand report of the operations of United Nations land, sea and Air Forces against the Communist enemy in Korea.

In their estimate of United Nations teamwork in Korea both American officer-Congressmen were high in their praise of ROK fighting ability -- and especially, since the Congressmen were American Naval Officers, of the ROK Navy and Marines. They are now considering a request by Admiral Sohn Wahn Il, ROK Navy Admiral, for them to introduce a bill to the United States Congress to admit some 4 to 6 Koreans to the United States Naval Academy. They will act on the Admiral's request as soon as they return to Washington, the 2 Congressmen said.

The Editors of the United States news and world report, a nationally read American news magazine, interviewed the 2 Officer-Congressmen by overseas telephone at a Pacific Port as they were returning from Korea to Washington to resume their duties in Congress. The substance of this trans-Pacific interview appeared

In a recent issue of the United States news and world report and has received widespread praise and comment.

According to the published interview in the United States news and world report, the 2 Congressmen served their tour of duty with a United Nations carrier task force in and around Korea. They briefed the Navy pilots and flew on a combat mission against the North Korean forces. They reconnoitered with an advanced American Marine party into the Nakdong bulge operation. They flew over most of the Communist front and watched air-support operations. They talked to American enlisted men, top officers, ROK Navy and Army officers and enlisted men, and to members of all the United Nations services. They also had a chat with General MacArthur, saw the United Nations casualties being evacuated, and interviewed Army and Marine casualties.

The Congressmen were especially impressed by the high quality of teamwork between the United Nations ground, sea and air forces, the American news magazine reported in its published interview. They also lavishly praised ROK fighting ability. "We both want to say we've seen the ROK Army, Navy and Marines," the Congressmen said in their trans-Pacific interview, "and they are a remarkable good fighting force."

These ROK Marines move on foot. They've made as much as 80 miles in 3 days. They've killed more North Koreans than the total number of ROK Marines. They've captured a lot of islands, evacuated refugees, interdicted shipping.

"They've sunk a lot of North Korean craft. Nothing moves by sea among the Communist forces now."

"They do need more trained officers to form the core of an effective Naval defense force," the Congressmen admitted. "Admiral Sohn, the Commander of the ROK Navy, asked us to introduce a bill in Congress to admit some 4 to 6 Koreans to the American Naval Academy when we get back and we expect to do it."

The Congressmen were also highly pleased by the remarkable coordination between Navy carrier planes and ground troops. "We went on a strike mission from an aircraft carrier in support of ground troops," the Congressmen said. "We saw how accurate and effective Naval air power is. There are a lot of advantages to it."

"With carriers, the Navy has floating airfields, they can take the planes in close to the strike area and put them over the target. In the target area the planes were supporting ground troops -- particularly Marines, whose fliers are trained right with the troops. As

you know, Marine pilots have to spend 2 years with the ground troops before they see any air service and they operate a completely integrated unit, whether ground or air. Their aviators can call up their ground-support operators by their first names."

Such training, the Congressmen conclude, is a great aid in limiting air-ground strikes to purely military targets and keeps to a minimum all accidental bombing or strafing of non-military targets. Navy and Air Force planes cooperate in the same way with ground troops, they added.

There is excellent cooperation between all the fighting services the Congressmen reported to the American people. "They exchange goods whenever they need them, and there are only the warmest feelings of friendship and respect between the ROK and the other United Nations forces in Korea."

Asked how the United Nations fighting forces felt about the progress of the war, the Congressmen replied--and we quote: "They feel it is a pretty hot, dirty, and indeterminate sort of war. But they are somewhat more hopeful and optimistic now than they were a couple of weeks ago, we think."

"We talked to General MacArthur--we had luncheon with the General and Mrs MacArthur in Tokyo. They kept us 2 hours, there, and the General praised all branches of the United Nations forces and expressed great satisfaction at their performance. He said to us--this is a quote: "The tide is turned--definitely. We will utterly destroy the enemy's forces and we will beat them before they get back to the 38th Parallel." General MacArthur is in excellent health and seems younger than when we had lunch with in 1947. All the services are loud in their praise of him."

In the last century, that British Nobleman, the Duke of Wellington, once made the comment, "The Battle of Waterloo was won on the playing fields of Eton." What he meant, of course, was that the kind of teamwork learned in the game on Cricket--England's favorite sport--proved to be invaluable on the battlefield. In a similar manner, the lessons learned on the field of sport are being put to good use by the UN Forces in driving the communist puppet troops from the Republic of Korea and restoring peace to this troubled land.

In Britain the national game is cricket, which bears a distant relationship to the American national pastime of baseball. In Korea the most popular sport is soccer, which is a distant cousin of football, the most popular American game during the Autumn season when baseball is suspended for the year.

Thus, it is not difficult to understand why, in reporting the heroism of a UN officer this week, the American newspapers and radio placed particular stress upon his former glory as a football star.

The associated press dispatch on the subject was carried on the front page of the New York Times under the headline, "Davidson still Army's star end, blocks pass to trap 3,000 reds." The opening sentence reads: "Gen. H. Davidson, a West Point Football immortal, emerged today as a hero of the Allied Korean Campaign."

While attending West Point, the United States Mil School for the training of officers, Davidson--now a general--won acclaim as a right end on the football team.

General Davidson led a UN Task Force consisting of Americans and Korean Republic Troops in a drive that closed a trap on 3,000 Communist Puppet Troops. They were attempting to storm the Pohang Airfield. The troops he led made a wide left end sweep south of the Port of Pohang--a maneuver that might be duplicated in the game of football--and closed the southern gate of a mountain corridor on communist troops who had rammed deep inside the UN lines. The other end of the trap had been closed by a Korean Republic column, according to the dispatch in the NY Times. The maneuver led by Davidson almost came to defeat on the third hill it approached. However, air support was called for, and UN planes came over with fire bombs and machine gun fire. "They did a magnificent job," General Davidson observed.

He also was lavish in his praise of the part played by the Republic troops. He said that the terrain "Strictly something a billygoat would have trouble climbing." However, the Korean Republic troops, he said, went up with relative ease.

The agility and speed with which the Koreans move in battle is not surprising to Americans who have read of the fine showing made by Korean track stars at contests in the US. In April, 1947, American Newspapers devoted big headlines to the exploits of a Korean athlete, Yun Bok Suh. The NY Herald Tribune sports writer called him "A tireless 115-lb running machine from Korea." He won the Boston Athletic Association Marathon--and, not only that, he broke a 5 yr record in so doing. He beat the previous record for the 26 mile run by 1 minute and 12 seconds, and he led his closest rival by 4 full minutes.

Another Korean in the contest, Seung Yong Nam, finished 22th in field of 69. A third, Ki Chung Sohn, who had won the last previous Olympic games Marathon, withdrew from the contest to give his pupils free reign out of national respect, they would not have beaten their elder. The expense of the trip to the Boston games was paid by contributions made by American troops and Missionaries who were in Korea.

Cil Yoon Song was 2d and Yoo Chul Choi was 3d. Pictures of their smiling faces appeared in the International Newspaper published in Boston, The Christian Science Monitor.

The British, American and Korean Republic Troops--fighting toward the common goal of crushing the Communist aggressors--are better able to understand each other because of their similar love of sports. In this field each nationality has its own favorites: for the British, Cricket--for the Americans, Baseball, and to only slighter degree football--and for the Koreans, soccer, although they created their brightest splash in American by Marathon running.

On the battlefield, too, each has characteristics which distinguish them. The long history of valour among the British is well known. The ingenuity and expert handling of intricate weapons of the Americans likewise is familiar to all, and, more than ever before, the stamina and fighting courage of the Korean republic troops is being broadcast now to the world through the written and spoken word.

Korean land reform was much further advanced in the ROK at the moment of Communist aggression than it was in Communist controlled North Korea, the American public was told by a man who helped form the ROK Land Reform Program. Dr Arthur C Bunce, head of the ECA Mission to Korea, told representatives of the American Press that ROK farmers had gotten a splendid land reform program and were "very well satisfied", in contrast to widespread discontent among farmers in the Communist-ruled north.

Doctor Bunce, who helped shape the ROK Land Reform Program as Economic Adviser to the United States Military Government in Korea, recently returned to Washington to confer with ECA officials.

According to Doctor Bunce, when the Communist-trained and equipped North Korea puppet troops overran the ROK at the outbreak of their aggressive war, it was broadly suggested in some circles that their Communist overseers had divided up the land in the north and given the North Korean more heart for aggressive warfare.

Just the opposite is the truth, Doctor Bunce said. The North Korean farmer does not hold title to the land the Communists said they were giving him. Furthermore, the North Korean farmer is overburdened by taxes and lives under constant police terror.

This is the contrasting picture in the ROK as Doctor Bunce outlined it to the American public:

The first Korean land reform measures were designed to distribute farmlands owned by the Japanese and vested in the United States Military Government after the Japanese surrender

In 1945. By an American Military Government Order of March, 1948, 653,000 acres--15% of all arable land in South Korea--were sold to Korean farmers on a 15 year payment plan at 20% of the crop per year. Despite efforts by Communist dissidents in the south, who campaigned among the farmers, saying, "don't buy. When we come in, we'll give it to you free". All of this land was bought up by Korean farmers within a year. A National Land Administration was set up to transfer titles of ownership to the occupying tenants. Within a year after the American promulgation, 588,000 Korean tenant families had become owners of their own farms. In all, about 55% of all farm families in South Korea benefited from this preliminary program.

Doctor Bunce cited as a further example of this first, American sponsored land reform the fact that 70% of all Korean land was worked by tenants and 30% by owners when the United States Military Government first took over from the Japanese. This ration had been changed by the American Military Government to 55% owners and 45% tenants, when the first Korean Assembly met after the election of 1948.

The ROK, Dr Bunce told the American public, continued this movement towards land reform at an accelerated rate. One of the assembly's first acts was a bill which enabled the ROK to buy land with rice bonds, which were pegged on the price of rice. These rice bonds were then used to buy up the corporate properties to which the ROK fell heir after the Japanese were removed. Among these corporate enterprises were cotton mills, glass works rubber plants, and the like.

The ROK assembly then set even more liberal terms for the farmer than did the United States authorities, Doctor Bunce said. Before the land had been sold to the individual farmers on a 15 year payment plan at 20% of the crop each year. Now payment was reduced to 30% of the crop for 5 years.

In June, 1949, Doctor Bunce told the American public, the ROK Assembly passed an additional land-reform law which was designed to encompass farms held by Korean as well as Japanese absentee-landlords. All Korean-owned land above a certain size was affected, Dr Bunce said.

This program, Doctor Bunce admitted, was not in full operation when the Communists invaded the ROK a year later. The delay was caused by Korean landowners who felt they weren't getting enough for their holdings, and by the arduous job of listing and establishing priorities for their sale. Completion of the new program was also halted by the ferocious and long-prepared act of aggression by the North Korean puppet troops.

Had the Communists not attacked, final redistribution of the land was expected to be complete by Sep of this year, Dr Bunce told the American public. Final implementation of the ROK Land-Redistribution Law would have eliminated Korean absentee-landlordism almost completely. It would have redistributed to ROK tenant farmers an additional 1,350,000 acres, thus reducing the area cultivated by ROK tenant farmers to less than 10% of the total.

But it was precisely two months before the final completion of the ROK Land-Redistribution Program that the Communists forced their North Korean puppets to attack the ROK free-holders.

Why? Under the Communist, so called Land-Reform Program no North Korean farmer owns title to his property. All title is vested in the Communist State, which acts as a totally despotic totally devouring landlord--all of whose tillers are less than tenants. They are slaves.

In contrast, the free-holding ROK farmer--through his democratically elected government--was within two months of completing a land reform program by which 90% of all arable land would be owned by the farmers who worked them. The remaining 10% of absentee-held land was also due for redistribution. That would have made the ROK a nation of free-holding farmers--every one of whom had title to the farm he tilled.

Couldn't that be one of the reasons for the Communist attack on the ROK?

Could the Communists allow the news to seep back to their North Korean puppets that their brothers in the south--under a freely and democratically elected government--were on the point of transferring 90% of all absentee-held land to the Farmers who tilled them? And that within the immediate future every--and that means--every ROK farmer would own title to the land he farmed? But the North Korean farmer owned nothing but his chains.

Could that be among the reasons for the Communist attack on the ROK, American Press representatives asked Dr Bunce. That the Communists couldn't allow the ROK Land-Reform Program to be successful because its success might further disturb the North Korean farmers--none of whom were happy in their chains?

No answer was necessary from Doctor Bunce. The answer was apparent to every free-thinking and freedom-loving person in the world.

Millions of American women, through their organizations, have expressed whole-hearted support of the Republic of Korea and the United Nations in the crusade to crush the Communist invaders of Korea. In their own community meetings, in resolutions appearing in the press, and in radio talks, they have announced their firm approval of the United Nations action opposing the unprovoked aggression launched upon the Republic. They have applauded the American troops who left to take part in the United Nations crusade. The American women also have expressed their appreciation to the women of Korea for providing canteens and similar courtesies for the American troops so far from home. And they have extended to the Korean women their full sympathy for the hardships and suffering they have had to endure as a consequence of the invasion.

Among the leading women's organizations in the United States is the American Association of University Women. It has about 100,000 members. These are the intellectual and professional leaders, most influential in their own communities and in the country as a whole. One of the leading members of the association, Miss Phoebe Morrison, spoke on their behalf in reference to the United Nations' part in the Korean struggle. Miss Morrison pointed out that the American Association of University Women had long supported the principles which the United Nations is upholding in its fight against the aggressors of the Republic. The association has constantly favored an effective world organization to maintain peace.

Miss Morrison went on to say that the association took part in the San Francisco conference which drafted the UN Charter, and since then has supported the United States Government in all programs dedicated to bringing about international cooperation -- the Marshall Plan, the Point Four Program, the International Refugee Organization and many others. The speaker concluded by emphasizing once more that the American Association of University Women is in complete support of the United Nations in the steps it is taking to put down aggression.

Another prominent group of clubwomen are united in the National League of Women Voters, which has nearly 100,000 members. The league is not affiliated with any political party. However, to its members and the public at large the league supplies factual information about the qualifications and records of candidates for public office -- encourages women to vote intelligently -- and in other ways takes an active part in America's system of democratic self-government. The league is the American affiliate of the International Alliance of Women, which represents organizations of thirty-three different countries.

The president of the National League of Women Voters, Mrs. John S. Lee, made a radio address in which she told of the earnest desire of all American women to see the United Nations succeed in its goal of bringing peace to Korea. Mrs. Lee said that naturally the American women are concerned over the safety of their husbands, sons and brothers who are fighting in Korea. "But they are still more concerned," she said, "over the absolute necessity of developing a strong United Nations capable of keeping the peace and stopping aggression." She went on to say: "It is their hope that success in Korea will be a step toward achieving that sort of United Nations. We in this country despise war, but we will fight to preserve self-government and freedom."

Reports that easily 10,000,000 Korean refugees will need help to survive the forthcoming winter focused American public attention on United Nations plans for immediate and long-term relief for the ROK's beleaguered civilian population.

According to John W Chang, ROK Ambassador to Washington, United States and United Nations authorities have already solved the immense problem of coordinating aid for an estimated 10,000,000 Koreans who have been driven from their homes by the brutal Communist aggressors. After talking for 45 minutes with SU assistant Secretary of State Dean Rusk about assistance to the refugees, Mr. Chang told the American press that the only problem that remains to be worked out is the one of transporting to Korea such huge quantities of supplies confidence was expressed, however, that the enormously expanding air and sea-lift across the Pacific would be able to take this in its stride. Dr. Chang disclosed that some American relief supplies such as clothing, foodstuffs and medicines have already arrived in Korea from Japan. Larger quantities will soon be on their way from the United States and elsewhere in the free world. The United Nations is to be the central organization for coordinating and sending this aid to Korean refugees, Dr. Chang said.

Other United Nations and United States authorities were simultaneously concerned with long-term problems of Korean relief and rehabilitation, the American public learned. Trygve Lie, Secretary-General of the United Nations, speaking in Chicago under the sponsorship of the United Nations Association and other nation-wide American groups, asserted that--and we quote-- "The aim of the United Nations is and must be a united and

independent Korea in which all the people of Korea are able freely to elect a government of their own choosing.

"To accomplish this...will certainly require, among other things, an effective United Nations program of relief and reconstruction". Korea will need time and help to recover from the terrible devastation the Communists have forced on it. After the United Nations victory, the Secretary-General concluded, "it must have that time and help from the United Nations".

But this is not the full extent of long-range United Nations planning for aid to Korea and other Communist-threatened or devastated countries. It's not enough to return those countries to the positions they enjoyed before the threat or actuality of Communist aggression.

Financial and technical assistance is also being offered by the United Nations to underdeveloped nations to help them withstand further Communist aggression, citizens of the United Nations were told by other of their leaders last week.

Eugene R Black, President of the United Nations Bank for Reconstruction and Development, speaking in Paris to the annual meeting of the Board of Governors of the World Bank, said that the United Nations must aid poverty stricken areas if it wants to avoid new conflicts like that in Korea. Mr Black observed that citizens of a democracy sometimes wonder how a dictatorial ideology can win adherents. "But for those less fortunate persons", he said, "freedom means little when it is freedom only to live out their lives in misery and want... we can relieve these pressures only if we hold out a real and well founded hope of improvement in the material well being of all men which is essential to their dignity and self-respect", he told the World Bank's Board of Governors.

President Truman's Point 4 Program is a great step in that direction, Mr Black told his distinguished United Nations audience. It represents a vigorous first move in the attempt to close the gap between the standard of living of the less developed countries and of the more developed nations. The American Point 4 Program, as listeners to these broadcasts may remember, was recently allocated \$34,500,000 for its first years work in bringing technical assistance to underdeveloped countries. It was predicted that the United Nations eventually will take over this aid program and develop it--in the words of President Truman--into "a worldwide effort to further the economic and social progress of all peoples".

The World Bank, both by financial aid and technical assistance, can play an increasingly great role in removing the pressures causing social unrest eloped countries and capable of bringing on hostilities, Mr Black told his board of governors in Paris last week. These and other statements being enunciated almost daily by United States and United Nations leaders have assured the American public that much more than immediate military and civilian aid is being offered to the Republic of Korea--and to all freedom-loving countries who stand under the menace of Communist aggression. The object of the United Nations is peace and peace cannot be permanently secured until people everywhere are helped to make full use of their natural and human resources. The leaders of the United Nations are continuously addressing themselves to this task.

Like millions of other families in the United States, Mr and Mrs Bernard Kim--of New City, USA--sat in their pleasant living room and saw and heard the President of the United States. The President, in person, gave his report to the American people on the progress and purposes of the United Nations war against Communist aggression in Korea. Again like millions of other families in America, Mr and Mrs Kim invited some of their friends and neighbors to watch their television set, as President Harry S Truman told the American people of the causes of the Korean invasion, and of the methods and aims by which the United States--under the banner of the United Nations--plans to defeat it. All the Kims' American friends were proud and happy to hear this report but none were prouder and happier than the Kims themselves. Being Koreans by birth and upbringing, they were in a better position than most of their American neighbors to judge the forthrightness and honesty of President Truman's address.

Mr Bernard Kim emigrated to the United States in 1906. Since then he has prospered in the restaurant business in Chicago and in the import-export business in New York. His wife, Mrs Bessie Kim, came to the United States from Seoul in 1928, is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University, a prominent American school of higher learning. The Kims spent the earlier part of the evening preparing to receive their neighbors. After dinner they set up a number of chairs in front of their television set and tidied up their comfortable, New York apartment. In the meantime they played a game. In it Mr Kim tried to tell Mrs Kim--2 hours before the President's televised address--exactly what President Truman would say to them and to the American people. Mr Kim has been a careful

student of American foreign policy--and of Korean American relations--ever since he came to the United States as a young man. A one-time president of the New York-Korean Association, he entertained and still remains a good friend of Dr Syngman Rhee, President of the Korea Republic, when Mr Rhee was chairman of the Korean Commission in Washington during the years of the American-Japanese War. Before that, while Mr Kim was still a prominent restaurateur in Chicago, he entertained many prominent Koreans who visited the Chicago World's Fair of 1933-34. Naturally Korean visitors to Chicago preferred to have Mr Kim as their guide and American counsellor at the World's Fair, rather than the Japanese Consulate which had offered such services.

Because of his general Korean background and his widespread experience of American economic and political affairs, Mr Kim was able to astound his American guests--and even his wife, whose insight into Korean-American relations is only second to those of Mr Kim himself--by his preview and approval of what President Truman had to say. When the United States' President--speaking to them, to his American audience in general, and to the United Nations at large--made his internationally noted proclamation that the Americans--and we quote--"believe the Korean have a right to be free, independent, and united. Under the direction and guidance of the United Nations--the United States has not other aim on Korea"--Mr Kim's American guests were startled. But it wasn't the President's proclamation that surprised them. That was a self-evident proposition to which every American could subscribe. It was only that Mr Kim--from his widespread experience with American attitudes towards Asia--had been able to forecast the President's pronouncement almost 2 hours before.

Mr Kim got the same response from his American guests when the United States' President went on to say--and again we quote--that the Americans "believe in freedom for all the nations of the Far East. That is one of the reasons why we are fighting under the United Nations for the freedom of Korea. We helped the Philippines of other Asian countries. Russia has never voluntarily given up any territory it has acquired in the Far East. It has never given independence to any people who have fallen under its control."

Mr Kim, had just finished reminding his American guests--many of who were too busy sending off their sons to the Korean battle--fronts to worry about American History--that United States policy has always been to liberate and never to enslave its overseas allies. Soviet Russia, Mr Kim had already made plain to his

American neighbors; has always acted under a diametrically opposite policy.

But it was in the final part of President Truman's address that Mr. Kim had his absolute triumph. As the manager of a prominent group of restaurants in Chicago, Mr. Kim has been a life-long fighter for higher wages and better working conditions for the American wage-earner. He has also been an exponent of those policies of social security and economic welfare by which the American wage-earner--under the protection of a popularly-controlled United States Government--has in recent years been protected against the perils of unemployment and old age. Mr. Kim, a Korean who has prospered in the United States, has always been of the opinion that these generous internal policies would be applied to American friends abroad. He had his triumph--and the admiration of his American friends--when the United States' President, concluding his historic broadcast on American policy in Asia, told his world-wide audience that--and for the third time we quote--the Americans "not only want freedom for the peoples of Asia but we also want to help them secure for themselves better health, more food, better clothes and homes, and the chance to live their own lives in peace. The things the American want for the people of Asia are the same things they want for the people of the rest of the world."

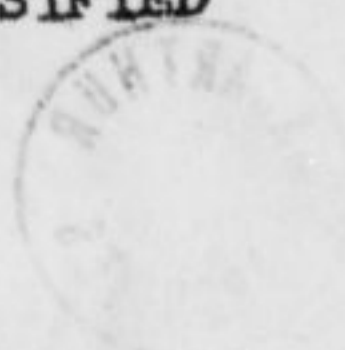
