If my memory do not fail me, he must be in one of turcks of the Batangas Transportation Company.

I am not sure if these two were with them as I have no records of reference. Carretela Drivers are paid \$.60 a day or $\sqrt{1.20}$ per day. All carretela Drivers were paid up to 31 March 1942 and if subject claimants were absent on that date, I am sure they were not paid. Therefore they are entitle to payment from date of employment up to the time they met their death.

I, QUERUBIN D. BASILIO, Capt., ME, presently assigned at the 100th Station Hospital, Phibcon, first being duly sworn, depose and say:

I was ~~1st~~ Sgt. Major of the 12th Medical Battalion up to March 29, 1942, and from 30 March 1942 up to the surrender of Bataan, I was made Unit Personnel Officer and Assistant Adjutant. The Executive Officer was Major (now Lt. Col.) Raulston, the Bn. commander was Major Peter, and the Luzon Force Surgeon was Col. Harold Glatly. Col. McNeil was the Supply Officer.

After we moved to Bataan on or about 8 December 1941, an order came down to commandeer carretelas and horses to be used by the 12th Medical Battalion. In compliance with this order, parties were sent out to commandeer carretelas and horses together with the cocheros who were inducted ~~into~~ ^{for us} the service ~~of~~ ^{with us} the 12th Medical Battalion. 1. In compliance with basic communication paragraphs 3 and 4, the following information is furnished:

(a) That on or about December 24th 1941, some carretelas were commandeered for use of the 12th Medical Regt(PS) in Pilar, Bataan. These Garretelas with their cocheros were with the 12th Medical Regiment up to the surrender of Bataan April 9th 1942.

(b) As far as I can remember the cocheros were paid in Bataan. The terms under which the cocheros were hired is beyond my knowledge. However, if you can contact Captain Querubin D. Basilio, MAC, who is at 100th Gen Hospital, I believed he can give you more or less accurate information regarding the subject, as he is one of the officers of the 12th Medical Regiment at that time.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

This is to certify that Civilian ALEJANDRO JOSOL was employed as bus driver from 10 December 1941 to 9 April 1942 by Company B, Collecting, 12th Medical Battalion (PS) of which the undersigned was the First Sergeant. Civilian Josol was at all times with the company during the battle of Bataan, PI. He also went with the company when it withdrew to Corregidor, PI. On Corregidor he was assigned as battery aid man and litter bearer at Battery MORRISON. Civ. Josol rendered faithful and loyal service during his attachment to the company, and I had never known him to shirk a duty.

Civilian ALEJANDRO JOSOL was never paid for his services during the period he was with the company. Amount of pay to be paid civilian drivers was not known at the time.

The employment for his services stopped on 7 May 1942 due to the falls of Bataan, and Corregidor, PI.

SUBJECT: Claims of Vicente Mina, Federico Lim and Roberto Vergara.

TO: Headquarters, Claims Service, AFWESPAC, Office of the Chief of Claims.

1. On or about 24 December 1941, carretela drivers and their respective conveyance, horse and calesa, were requisitioned for use in evacuation of the wounded and carrying of supplies to forward medical units during the campaign on Bataan.

2. On about 26 December 1941, twenty-five of these drivers and their vehicles were caught on the Bay Road by Japanese bombers. Two were killed and five or six wounded. Only half of the drivers arrived at their destination. The rest must have deserted as they were never seen again.

3. On 18 January 1942, fifteen drivers and rigs under the supervision of Captain MacNeil, MAC, and two Philippine Scout Non-coms were crossing the Abo Abo River headed for the forward area when they were caught by Japanese bombers. Captain MacNeil was wounded and the two scouts killed. I arrived on the scene as soon as I was notified two hours later, and I found two dead drivers and three horses (dead). The rest of the drivers and vehicles with all the supplies they carried were gone. I believe they deserted into the jungles and hills.

4. Sometime during March 1942, all of the drivers that remained with us (about twenty or so) were paid from a Medical Department fund by Lt. Goldberg, MAC, an officer from the Bataan Medical Supply Depot under the command of Lt. Col. Kemp, MAC. Each driver was paid in full for his services and the use of his horse and calesa. I do not recall what the exact amount was. Possibly Lt. Goldberg, who is somewhere in the U.S.A., could furnish that information.

5. At no time did I tell any driver that he was to receive \$5.00 per day. I merely had authority to requisition them, and the fee was to be determined later.

6. Complete records were maintained on the carretela drivers by M/Sgt (later 1st Lt., MAC) Quembus Basilio of the 12th Med. Bn. (P.S.). I have no idea what became of these records after the fall of Bataan. Possibly Lt. Basilio may have some information on that. He is serving with a scout unit there in the Philippines.

7. I cannot identify the three men mentioned above. Had these men been with the unit until 9 April 1942, they would have been paid along with the others.

8. It is my suggestion that these three carretela drivers be required to give a detailed account of their activities, location of our various units, etc., in the presence of former Philippine scout non-commissioned officers of the Headquarters and Clearing Section of the 12th Med. Bn., especially Lt. Basilio, Sgt. Fajardo and Sgt. Juan Santos. These scouts will readily determine whether the above mentioned drivers were with our unit and for what period of time.

9. Those drivers who served us faithfully, exposing themselves to all the risks, hazards and dangers of regular troops to serve our forces deserve all the compensation and rewards due them. By the same token, those who voluntarily left us or deserted should receive pay only for the period served.

SUBJECT: Claim of Igmidio Ramos

TO: Headquarters, Claims Service, AFWESPAC
Office of the Chief of Claims

1. I was Commanding Officer of a medical collecting company, designated Company "C", 12th Medical Battalion, (PS) during the greater part of the campaign in Bataan in 1942. When the war began, a large number of commercial vehicles and civilian drivers were employed by USAFFE for transportation purposes. Out of this pool of vehicles, a group of about eight small Willys taxicabs and four buses were assigned to my unit, for use as ambulances, only a few hours before we departed from Ft. William McKinley to the field on 10 December 1941. We set out from Ft. William McKinley at night in convoy without lights. Two of the taxicabs either broke down or were lost from the convoy before we got out of the city of Manila on 10 December 1941. In the march one bus overturned in a ditch and had to be abandoned. The balance got to the field with the unit. During the campaign, the taxicabs, one by one, broke down, so we finally ended up with three buses. Some of the drivers, even after their vehicles were broken down, remained with the unit and assisted in the operation of the government vehicles.

2. The claimant, Igmidio Ramos, very likely was one of these drivers. I do not recall their names now. I never did know the terms under which these drivers were employed. To my knowledge none of them ever were paid. No one in my unit was paid. I will say that most of these men were faithful in the performance of their duties and I was often amazed at their ability to make the old "rattle trap" vehicles keep going. Several remained with the unit until the surrender, operating the vehicles. I cannot say for certain, but I have a vague recollection that one of these drivers was named Ramos.

3. My unit departed from Ft. William McKinley on 10 December 1941; was on the Guagua-Porac-Angeles line from 11 December to about 26 December 1941; had a detachment on the road between Dinalupihan and Olan-gapo during that time; then was on the Abucay line from about 27 December 1941 to 26 January 1942; on the west coast, about KP 198, in support of the engagement with Jap forces on Anyasan and other points along the coast from 26 January to about 31 March 1942; then back to the east coast, in the vicinity of Lamao until the Jap breakthrough; then withdrawal to Little Baguio, KP 169. Other officers with the unit were Capt. Imerman, Capt. Van de Velde and Lt. H all. If the claimant can relate this history, he is almost certain to have been with us.

When the war began a large number of commercial vehicles and civilian drivers were employed by USARV for transportation purposes. Out of this group of vehicles, a group of about eight small utility trucks and four buses were assigned to my unit, for use as ambulances. Only a few hours before we departed from Ft. William, Okinawa to the field on 10 December 1941, we set out from Ft. William, Okinawa at night in convoy without lights. Two of the taxicabs either broke down or were lost from the convoy before we got out of the city of Manila on 10 December 1941. In the march one bus overturned in a ditch and had to be abandoned. The balance got to the field with the unit. During the campaign, the taxicabs, one by one, broke down, so we finally ended up with three buses. Some of the drivers, even after their vehicles were broken down, remained with the unit and assisted in the operation of the government vehicles.

2. The claimant, Landis Names, very likely was one of these drivers. I do not recall their names now. I never did know the names under which these drivers were employed. To my knowledge none of them ever were paid. No one in my unit was paid. I will say that most of these men were faithful in the performance of their duties and I was often amazed at their ability to make the old "rat-tie" type vehicles keep going. Several times the unit would be in a jam, operating the vehicles, a vague recollection that on a certain day, but I have as named names.

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3. My unit departed from Ft. William, Okinawa on 10 December 1941; was on the Guam-Angeles line from 11 December to about 20 December 1941; had a detachment on the road between Davao and Olan-gapo during that time; then was on the line from about 20 December 1941 to 28 January 1942; support of the engagement with the Japanese on Luzon and other points along the coast from 28 January 1942; then back to the east coast, in the vicinity of the Jap breakthrough; then withdrawal to little Baguio; were Capt. Lawrence, Capt. Van can relate this history, he is a most reliable officer with the unit. If the claimant has been with us.

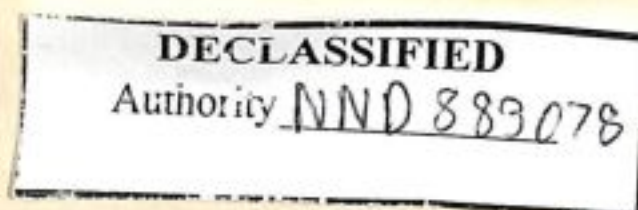



7. I cannot identify the three men mentioned above. Had these men been with the unit until 9 April 1942, they would have been paid along with the others.

This is to certify that Civilian ALEJANDRO JOSOL was employed as bus driver from 10 December 1941 to 9 April 1942 by Company B, Collecting, 12th Medical Battalion (PS) of which the undersigned was the First Sergeant. Civilian Josol was at all times with the company during the battle of Bataan, PI. He also went with the company when it withdrew to Corregidor, PI. On Corregidor he was assigned as battery aid man and litter bearer at Battery MORRISON. Civ. Josol rendered faithful and loyal service during his attachment to the company, and I had never known him to shirk a duty.

Civilian ALEJANDRO JOSOL was never paid for his services during the period he was with the company. Amount of pay to be paid civilian drivers was not known at the time.

The employment for his services stopped on 7 May 1942 due to the falls of Bataan, and Corregidor, PI.





These cocheros were very faithful and they helped us greatly even to the extent of risking their lives in evacuating patients to places directed to them. They were very useful to us up to the last stand in Bataan. I still remember that four of these cocheros were killed when the bivouac wherein Capt. McNeil was directing them what trail to go, was bombed by the Japanese. When the situation was becoming precarious, they were advised to disband and report to a certain place. 




1. In compliance with basic communication paragraphs 3 and 4, the following information is furnished:



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
