That this said remaining part consists of the crankcase, cylinder blocks, cylinders, cylinder heads, pistons and parts of the engine (incomplete), together with the ROTOR of the generator and the complete assembly of EXCITER. From the manner in which the dynamite charge was placed and from its effect on the generator frame, it is my personal belief that the main shaft has been forced out of alignment. However, this is just an opinion which would have to be checked by careful measurements on the engine itself, once the necessary apparatus are available;
