

Before me, the undersigned, authorized to administer oaths in cases of this character appeared one MEDINA D. IACSON, or legal age, single, and resident or Puerto Rivas, Balanga, Bataan, who having been sworn according to law, deposes and says:

- 1. That I know one Alfonso Angeles, a native of Pilar, Bataan;
- 2. That somewhere in the month of February, 1942, he was brought to me by It. Walter I. Ashborn at Cabcaben, Mariveles, Bataan for identification, as I understand he was placed in the guardhouse for passing the front lines in Bataan without the necessary Army pass. Since said Alfonso Angeles had been my classmate in the elementary grades up to the secondary school and have not heard of him since we graduated from High School, I then identified him for being a good man. It. Ashborn was wanting to utilize every man that was capable to bring in supplies from Japanese occupied territories to Bataan to feed our troops, so we agreed with said Alfonso Angeles that he would be released on condition that we would supply him the money and make his purchases for the Army, and in fact I gave him \$500.00, Philippine currency, of my own money. So, he then took his trip from Bataan to Tibagin, Malolos, Bulacan, but never came back to Bataan, until the surrender of Bataan on April 9, 1942.
- 3. I had a chance of running after him (Alfonso Angeles) somewhere in the month of March, 1942 when I took a trip myself with several men to obtain supplies for the Army in Bataan. That time he was living in Tibagin, Malolos, Bulacan. He told me that he would like to come back to Bataan, but he was afraid as Japanese launches were continuously patrolling Manila Bay. But he never came back, nor was he able to send a bit of commodity for the Army in Bataan from the time I have identified him up to the fall of Bataan.
- 4. That after the fall of Bataan, somewhere in the month of June, 1942, I again tried to run after said Alfonso Angeles and saw him still at Tibagin, Malolos, Bulacan and I confiscated some of the commodities I saw in his house amounting to \$213.62.

To the best of my knowledge and belief, Alfonso Angeles does not fall within the category of a QMC employee, because he failed to comply with the work given him to do.

Since said Alfonso Angeles had been my classmate in the elementary grades up to the secondary school and have not heard of him since we graduated from High School, I then identified him for being a good man. It. Ashborn was wanting to utilize every man that was capable to bring in supplies from Japanese occupied territories to Bataan to feed our troops, so we agreed with said Alfonso Angeles that he would be released on condition that we would supply him the money and make his purchases for the Army, and in fact I gave him \$500.00, Philippine currency, of my own money. So, he then took his trip from Bataan to Tibagin, Malolos, Bulacan, but never came back to Bataan, until the surrender of Bataan on April 9, 1942.
- 3. I had achance of running after him (Alfonso Angeles) somewhere in the month of March, 1942 when I took a trip myself with several men to obtain supplies for the Army in Mataan. That time he was living in Tibagin, Malolos, Bulacan. He told me that he would like to come back to Mataan, but he was afraid as Japanese launches were continuously patrolling Manila May. But he never came back, nor was he able to send a bit of commedity for the Army in Mataan from the time I have identified him up to the fall of Mataan.
- 4. That after the fall of Bataan, somewhere in the month of June.
 1942. I again tried to run after said Alfonso Angeles and saw him still at Tibagin, Malolos, Bulacan and I confidented some of the commodities I saw in his house amounting to \$213.62.

To the best of my knowledge and belief, Alfonso Angeles does not fall within the category of a QMC employee, because he failed to comply with the work given him to do.

with the work given him to do.


