

5th. The whole personnel will remain civilian.

6th. This understanding is an emergency measure and will last only during the emergency period.

7th. The United States Army will see to it that our budget is taken care of.

It might be said in this connection that the plan at this time is to evacuate the hospital personnel with all its mobile equipment to a place of safety somewhere in the interior should the need arise. When this will occur, no one knows. But we have already packed up our belongings and are ready to leave as soon as the order is given. Through all these trying times we would like to ask the friends of this hospital both here and abroad to remember us in their supplications before the Throne of Grace, so that we may have the patience, the courage, and the endurance to carry on our mission of healing to the sick and the needy.

The Nurses' Training School

In March 1941, we graduated 13 nurses who went to Manila for their Board and Civil Service examinations, passing one hundred per cent.

In April, 31 new students were admitted. Three in this class dropped out before the end of the first semester and another one left after the first semester, which left us a total of 59 students in training. Twenty-seven nurses received their caps in November. We had a very nice program which was held at the hospital lobby. Many friends and relatives of the nurses attended.


During the year war clouds have been threatening us but on Dec. 8, 1941 Pearl Harbor was attacked.

The first bombing of Iloilo City on Dec. 18, 1941 stopped all classes. Due to the present war conditions two student nurses of the first class resigned. The rest are going on bravely, showing a great deal of loyalty to their profession and are ready to help the hospital, army, and the community in every way they can.

In spite of the blackout the nurses' W. W. Guild society, the Christian Endeavor, the morning and the evening devotions are being carried on as usual.

This last Christmas morning was the first time that we can remember that we did not go out and sing carols. We marched through the hospital very early in the morning and sang to our patients. After the singing Dr. H. S. Waters gave us a Christmas message.

We wish to thank our friends in the home land for the White Cross supplies and for your thoughts and prayers.

Religious Work

Miss Consuelo Bugante, our Filipina missionary, resigned last January and in her place came Miss Pacita Rome, who with the aid of the whole staff, carried on a full religious and social program. The day begins with prayer at six-thirty for all hospital employees and such ambulatory patients as care to attend. Every morning Miss Rome is busy in the dispensary waiting—room meeting patients and relatives, explaining the hospital's purpose and its procedures, entertaining children, talking with parents, preaching the Gospel, giving out Bible portions and tracts, selling (or giving) New Testaments and Bibles to those really interested. Groups of nurses sing hymns in the wards in the evening, and groups from the Salvation Army, C. E.'s and Sunday Schools come in on Sunday for services and singing. Regular Christian Endeavor and World Wide Guild activities are carried on by the nurses. The work boys have a Thursday evening Bible class that is well attended.

During the year three nurses have been baptized and many others definitely interested, but we count results also in the far wider--spread vitalization of faith and spiritual life among the patients and workers in the hospital. We ask your prayers for this side of our work as well as in the ministry of health and healing.

The War

The long expected break between Japan and United States came when on the morning of December 8 Japan bombed Pearl Harbor. Ten days later, at one o'clock in the afternoon by our daylight---saving time, thirty-six Japanese planes bombed the City of Iloilo. Seventy five injured persons were brought to the hospital, twenty of whom were sent home after treatment. The deaths from that first raid ran up to about fifty. Then on December 30th Iloilo City was raided twice again but this time with no casualty except the destruction of some oil tanks. These air raids have driven the people away from the City and our civilian patients have practically been reduced to nil. It was made clear to us, then, before the air raid that it would be impossible for us to keep the hospital going on a self-supporting basis in spite of our desire to do so. Then the Army authorities through Colonnel Dwight M. Deters. M. C. 61st. Division U. S. A. came along and an understanding was made with him whereby the Iloilo Mission Hospital could continue its work of mercy under the following bases:

- 1st. The same governing body, the same administrative officials, the same personnel.
- 2nd. We are to continue to receive civilian patients charging them the usual rates.
- 3rd. We are to receive Army patients charging them according to our usual rates.
- 4th. The Army, as its representative, created an Advisory Board consisting of Dr. G. I. Cullen, Dr. H. S. Waters, and Dr. Jesus Ortiz of the Army. Its function is advisory to the Director.

ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE HOSPITAL AND TRAINING SCHOOL

The Hospital

The Iloilo Mission Hospital had its humble beginning in March. 1900, when Dr. J. Andrew Hall of the American Presbyterian Mission arrived in Iloilo and opened a dispensary on the ground floor of his residence, taking into his own home those patients needing operation or more intensive treatment. The following year a "nipa" hut was built as a "hospital" to accommodate eighteen patients. Finding this over-crowded, a wooden building was erected in 1905 to accommodate eighteen patients with operating rooms, dispensary and office. The following year a training school for nurses-the first in the Philippines-was opened. In 1907 the name Union Mission Hospital was adopted, as the hospital became the joint project of Presbyterian and Baptist Boards with Dr. Raphael C. Thomas as Baptist representative. Drs. Hall and Thomas continued to be joint administrators of the hospital until 1924, when the Presbyterian Board withdrew and Dr. Thomas was left to carry on the work. In 1931 the hospital moved to its present site in Jaro, Iloilo City, where its plant now consists of the concrete main building (for wards, private rooms, kitchens, operating rooms, offices, classroom, and dispensary, making with the children's pavilion and isolation ward a 125 bed capacity), the Nurses' dormitory, the laundry house with boys' dormitory upstairs, the night nurses' cottage, the night boys' cottage, the garage, workshop, and laundry drying-shed.

The Board of Control

Guiding the policies, making the chief appointments, fixing the budget, planning for the future and extension of the hospital, is the Board of Control. It is composed of ten members, seven of whom, including three missionaries, are elected by the Board of Trustees of the Convention of the Philippine Baptist Churches; these seven elect the remaining three. This is the third full year since the creation of this Board, and it has not only solved the intricate, varied, and most difficult problems presented to it, but it has also solidly and heartily stood behind the administration in the expansion program of the hospital.

The Staff

The whole number of full time hospital employees and staff is 133. There are seven full time doctors: the director; three associate physicians. Dr. Henry S. Waters, former director of this hospital, who returned to the service of this institution on May 28, 1941, after almost a year and a half of furlough in the States, during which he spent a great deal of his time visiting hospitals and finally acquiring for himself a membership in the American College of Surgeons; Dr. Eduardo J. Gonzaga, a graduate of Denison University and Temple University; and

Dr. Dorothy Kinney Chambers, from Assam where she had served two terms as director and surgeon in Gauhati and Jorhat Hospitals and who, during Dr. Waters' absence, greatly strengthened our medical staff by her untiring service even to the sacrifice of her increasing family. Dra. Rosita Jainga joined the staff as Interne January 1, 1940, and remained as resident physician during 1941. The Bacaling brothers served as internes during the year. There have been several changes in the Nursing and Office staff. Miss Loreto Tupaz was appointed Assistant Superintendent of Nurses and Practical Ward Supervisor, Miss Adela Jamayo as Principal of the Training School of Nurses, Miss Isabel Tupaz as pharmacist in place of Miss Beatriz Cochiengco who in the Spring of the year could not contain her fancy and decided to submit herself to Cupid's lure.

The Patients


Our patients come regularly from four provinces (Iloilo, Capiz, Antique, and Occidental Negros) and occasionally from many others; they include Filipinos, Americans, British, Swiss, Germans. Spanish, Norwegians, Danish, Italians, Chinese, and Japanese; and their diseases represent all types and conditions—medical, surgical, childhood, maternity, contagious, and even mental.

Finances

The hospital receives no appropriation except the salaries of the American nurse who is supported by the Women's American Baptist Foreign Mission Society and the American associate physician, who is maintained by the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society. The rest of the operating expenses and salaries are met out of patients' fees and voluntary donations made locally.

Donations

We wish to acknowledge here the many valuable contributions received from "White Cross" work in America and the Philippines in the form of hospital supplies and handiwork-bandages, binders, pajamas, gowns, pins, adhesive, hot water bottles, soap, sheets, blankets, cotton, gauze, towels-a hundred different items worth to us more than their actual cost, due to the difficulty of purchasing them here. Outstanding among the gifts to the hospital this year were the interest, work and money donated by the Woman's Auxillary of Iloilo in refurnishing several of the private rooms, screening of Rooms 5. 9 and 10 and putting rubber matting in all corridors on the second floor as well as on all stairs. The Nurses Alumnae Association donated one adjustable steel bed costing \$269.40. Mr. Anacleto Jardenil and his family donated a valuable strip of land at the back of our campus cansisting of 126 sq. m. in area, more or less, at an approximate value of P500.00. This strip of land has been converted into what is known as the Jardenil drive, thus serving as exit for delivery trucks as well as funeral conveyances.


