The value and notivation of their service during the time of need is recognized and it is with regret we inform you that they do not come under the Missing Persons Act.

I have the honor to inform you that on Oct. 21, 1941, the members of the CAPIZ POSTOFFICE force whose names are listed below were automatically placed into the service of the U. S. ARMY WARNING SERVICE by order of A. H. CAMPBELL, Chief of Aircraft Warning Service, Air Force, U. S. Army Forces in the Far East, thru the Director of Posts, Manila. Since then, these employees had been rendering service to the Army by cooperating together in sending and receiving of CONFIDENTIAL FRASH MESSAGES regarding presence, position, number, etc., of enemy planes, ships, troops, etc., to "AWARN, MANILA" which was then the Chief Warning Service outpost of the Philippines. The Chief warning Service outpost then re-flashes the information received to parts of the Islands vitally concerned so that it could take precaution before the enemy could do any harm. In the case of our office, the messages received were immediately recopied for distribution by our messengers to Army Units stationed in our sector. This arrangement was done because then at that time the Army had no extensive communication service to remote parts and most of the telegraph and radio messages were being largely handled by the Bureau or Posts.

posts in this office.

In cognizance of their services to NXXX ARMY, the Chief of Aircraft Warning Service, U. S. Army (A. H. CAMPBELL) issued to each of them a CERTIFICATE as acknowledgement of their membership to the Warning Service and hold them subject to orders from that office. With the exception of Leodegario Alcones, all have lost their certificates during the Japanese Occupation. Will this certification (or letter) (subject if need be to verification with the Director of Posts) serve to establish their right to compensation if any is the QUESTION WE SHOULD LIKE TO KNOW. In this connection we sincerely hope that your good office will not forget the services of these men who are now so much in a pitiful economic set up and only your favorable action will alleviate their sufferings.

SUBJECT:

Special instructions: regarding the proper manner of handling FLASH messages over the Bureau of Posts electrical Communication System. STRICTLY CONFIDENTIAL.

GINERAL INFORMATION

- l. a. Daily press and radio releases contain reports of aircraft warning signals being sounded and "all clear" signals being given in London and other places, and of pursuit planes being sent out to intercept and drive attacking planes away.
- b. The information upon which to base these warnings and "all clear" signals was gathered and disseminated by an aircraft warning service. Similarly, directions to the pursuit planeswhere to find the hostile planes is based on reports from the warning service. A similar warning service is set up in England to warn against the approach of hostile warships and landing operations, so defense forces can quickly get into action.
- c. Such a warning service has been organized by the United States Army which incorporates all units of the U.S. Army and Navy in the Philippine and certain stations of the Philippine Army, the Philippine Constabulary, and the Bureau of Aeronautics, and the Bureau of Posts.
- d. It is now considered necessary to further expand this unit to give more complete coverage and protection to the Philippine Archipelago from surprise attacks by air or water.
- e. It is expected that any airplane flight will be picked up and reported. As successive reports come in, the Warning Service can predict the possible direction, destination and time of arrival at critical areas which need to be warned.

Along the shore lines of the islands, all available observation posts will be used to report any hostile warships or possible landing operations they might see.

DETAILED INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. The stations listed below will, upon receipt, comply with the following instructions:
- a. Transmit over the Bureau of Posts electrical communication net the inclosed prepared flash messages at the time and date indicated.

b. When all the messages as required in (a) have been sent, you will, on the following week prepare, in accordance with instructions on back of the form, one (1) self-prepared "FLASH Message" each week for a period of two (2) weeks and transmit same over the Bureau of Posts electrical communication system.

c. Make out and forward to the Warning Serive "Station Logs" as prescribed in paragraph 6.



- 2. Speed and accuracy in the transmission of flash messages are of the utmost importance and such messages must take priority over all messages except those of emergency nature. Precede your calls with the conventional signal FLASH repeated as often as necessary to indicate preference of communication. Breaking into the circuits actually used for FLASH messages must not be resorted to. Likewise intermediate offices should under no circumstances use ground wire except in the event of interruption of the circuit.
- 3. "A MANILA" is the code name of the Varning Service and is the address to which all flash messages will be sent.
- 4. On the reverse side of the inclosed SAMPLE FLASH MESSAGE FORM are instructions for its preparation and use. In transmitting a FLASH Message, do not repeat any of the words or phrases preceding the colon appearing in each of the eight blocks as they merely indicate the information desired. For example the phrase "Mumber of airplanes seen" under block number one (1) should not be repeated in the text of a FLASH Message, but simply state 1, 2, 3 or many, as the case may be. This applies in a similar manner to the other remaining seven blocks of both the "AIRPLANES" or MARSHIPS OK TROOPS" columns.
- 5. Generally, the first textword of a FLASH Message is the word "FLASH" followed by the word "TEST" which indicates that the message is merely one to test the communication system and for training of personnel and no action need be taken thereon. Only during actual hostilities should the indicator "FLASH ACTION" be used. The third textword is either ATRPLANES, MARSHIPS or TROOPS, depending on which of these is pertinent to the subject matter of the FLASH Message. Then the information as called for in the blocks from one (1) to eight (8) follow. Mever say "NONE" in the message, as at this stage you are required only to transmit messages prepared by AMARN or by yourself in which the existence of airplanes or warships at predetermined hours and dates are presumed. Transmit FLASH Messages immediately after actual "time observed" or "time presumed".
- 6. At the end of each day when FLASH messages are sent to the Marning Service the inclosed log forms will be made out, by the station of origin and also the relaying station, according to instructions on sample copy, and mailed to the Marning Service in the inclosed penalty envelopes. The purpose of these logs is to show the cause of any delays in transmission so that they may be eliminated. He letter of transmittal need be sent with these log forms, unless the originator wishes to send one.
- 7. The usual numinal fee of \$0.20 for each message should be charged to the Signal Officer, U. S. Army, as at present.
- 8. All concerned will receive and transmit all flash messages that may be filed by accredited personnel of the United States Army, Philippine Army, Philippine Constabulary and such other agencies as may be subsequently authorized to file them by proper authorities, as official telegrams of the Unites States Army or Navy and charged for at the usual rate of 10.20 for each message. Suchmessages which should be prepared in duplicate in order to facilitate the rendition of bills should bear the Check Paid Charge U.S. Army and accounted for in accordance with paragraph 2, Section 637 of the Manual of Postal and Telegraph Service.



- 9. Postoffice inspectiors, radio inspectiors, postmasters, chief operators and others concerned should strictly carry out the foregoing instructions, particularly the proper preparation and prompt handling of the FLASH messages. The radio stations and telegraph lines must be kept in good working order at all times. Active cooperation and assistance which can be rendered must not be spared. The postoffice inspectors and radio inspectors should check up and issue from time to time such additional instructions as may be deemed necessary during their inspection tours of offices within their respective districts, furnishing copiesthereof to this office together with such reports and recommendations that they windy wish to submit.
- OR EMPLOYEE OF THIS BUREAU FOUND CILTY OF DIVULGING CONTENTS OR PURPORT OF ANY FLASH RESSAGE, OR CAUSE THE SAME TO BE PUBLISHED IN ANY NEWSPAPER, SHALL BE DISMISSED FROM THE SERVICE AND PROSECUTED.





Dear Sir:

- l. In conjunction with the communication drills now being conducted with certain telegraph and radio stations of the Bureau of Posts, the actual flights of U. S. Army airplanes enumerated in the attached schedules have just been arranged for the period from April 15 to May 15, 1941. To familiarize all concerned more thoroughly with the proper preparation and prompt transmission of FLASH TEST MESSAGES, it will be appreciated if each of the stations mentioned in the schedules may be instructed to be on the alert at the time and date indicated and report by "Flash Test Message" as soon as the airplanes are sighted. In case other actual flights will become available during the same period, dach of the stations concerned will be subsequently notified in advance.
- 2. It is essential that no other airplanes except those chartered for the purpose be reported on the dates given. In order, therefore, to avoid confusion in places where many other airplanes fly daily, the airplanes that will be used in the scheduled flights should be recognized by their special markings or formation indicated in the schedules.
- 3. In addition to the Flash Messages required in connection with the scheduled flights mentioned above, it is requested that each of the stations listed hereunder be instructed to comply with the following:
 - a. On Mondays and Mednesdays between 8:00 AM and 11:00 AM for a period of four weeks, be on the lookout for any flight of three or more planes that may be seen flying in formation and report promptly by Flash Message their appearance over each station. Negative reports are not desired, so that if three or more planes are not sighted on the days indicated, no Flash Message need be sent.
 - b. Make out and mail to AMARN MANILA a log report on the form provided for the purpose at the close of each day on which Flash Messages are sent.

HRIEF HISTORY OF THE BUREAU OF POSTS, ILOILO CITY, FROM DATE FIRST USED BY USAFFE.

As early as April 14, 1941, the Bureau of Posts was incorporated into the warning service organized by the U. S. Army. (Par. 1-c, Circular Unnumbered of the Bureau of Posts, dated April 14, 1941, reproduced below.)

> "Such a warning service has been organized by the United States Army which incorparates all units of the U. S. Army and Navy in the Philippines and certain stations of the Philippine Army, the Philippine Constabulary and the Bureau of Aeronautics, and the Bureau of Posts."

Please see attached copy of the letter of Lt. Col. A. H. Campbell, Chief, Warning Service, dated at Fort Santiago, Manila on April 14, 1941.

Upon receipt of the letter of Lt. Col. Campbell, the Bureau of Posts employees of Iloilo City were instructed to be on the look out for planes as directed in the Test Awarn. All employ yees of the Bureau of Posts, Iloilo City were appointed as Volunteer Air Observer of the U.S. Army and on October 10, 1941, each and every one of them were given a badge and certificate of appointment as such, copy is hereto attached.

When Pearl Harbor was attacked by the Japs on December 8, 1941, the vigilance and observation of the enemy activities, especially air raid and possible enemy landing, conducted by the Bureau of Posts' employees, were intensified and put into action. In fact, when Iloilo City was bombed by 36 enemy planes on December 18, 1941, it was our men who contributed greatly to the dessimination of the flashes which were relayed or transmitted from one strategic point to another and upon receipt in our City Sta-

tion communicated to different offices by telephone.

Immediately after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, the USAFFE put under control the Telegraph and mail communications of the Bureau of Posts, especially Iloilo City Post-Office where Captain Lowe of the USAFFE was in charge of censoring the mail matters and Lt. Lagdameo (Later Major Lagdameo) and assisted by Lt. Grasparil (later Lt. Col. Grasparil) censored the telegraph messages. Captain Lowe specifically instructed us to deliver to him for censorship all mails addressed outside of Panay Island which was strictly and regidly obeyed by the postal men of the Iloilo City Post Office.

In one of our conferences, the War Council under Brig.

Gen. Chynoweth, made me to understand that my office, or the

Bureau of Posts employees of Iloilo City, should forget the Director of Posts, at Manila, and should consult or refer to the

USAFFE thru Lt. Col. Powell, Liason Officer, whatever actions or

cases regarding communication, postal or telegraph that would

arise, especially at that time when communication with Manila

was difficult due to the interruption of the cables and congestion of traffic.

Bureau of Posts employees, and for purposes of coordinating its work, in January 1942, upon order of Brig. Gen. Chynoweth, the Signal Officer of the 61st Division, inducted into the service of the USAFFE, the Bureau of Posts personnel, the induction ranging from January 3 to 7, 1942, as may be seen from their papers, some of which where just reconstituted.

As proofs of USAFFE control, I may mention the transfer of the Iloilo Post Office on December 22, 1941, to La Paz, Municiwal Building, and the radio service to La Paz high School Building and La Granja, and to Santa Barbara, upon the instance of Lt. Col. Powell with the consent of Brig. Gen. Chynoweth, verbal order of which was given me in one of the conferences of the War Council, for military strategic purposes. On January 10, 1942, the Army dismantled the Telegraph apparatus at Jaro, Iloilo, and transferred it to Pavia and the postoffice force were incorporated with the personnel of the Iloilo City Postoffice, the Jaro postmaster was assigned at Matag-ob, Janiuay, one of the message centers of the 61st Signal Company. Our telegraph system of communications were then divided into several places as follows: Iloilo Provincial High School Building, Lapaz, Iloilo City; La Granja, Lapz; Santa Barbara; Matag-ob, Janiuay; Natividad, Lambunao; Misi, Lambunao and Passi; and all these together with the 27 pre-war Telegraph stations of the Bureau of Posts in Panny were used as message centers of the USAFFE to suit Army requirements. The Bureau of Posts personnel of the City of Iloilo were distributed to those stations despite imminent danger of enemy invasion.

Note: Mr. Petronilo Canto is one of the employees of the Bureau of Posts, Iloilo City, and similar passes were issued to all employees of the said bureau.

Also, by order of Lt. Col. Powell, the Philippine National Bank, Iloilo branch paid our salaries up to April 15, 1942. As all our records were destroyed, a copy of a duplicate of our payroll could no longer be produced but in a separate list at-

tached hereto are the names of all employees of the sureau of rosts, Iloilo City, together with their designations and actual monthly salaries.

Then on that fateful day of April 16, 1942, the Japanese forces landed on the shores of Panay, and forced us to dispersed and flee to places of safety in the hills and mountains of Panay to emcape Japanese brutalities. Thereafter, we learned that Gen. Wainwright surrendered Corregidor on May 7, 1942 and Brig. Gen. Christie, then of the Panay Division of the UJAFFA, likewise surrendered to the Japanese on May 25, 1942. Scattered like leaves in Autumn, some of the employees of the Bureau of Posts, Iloilo City, worked with the exiled Civil Government headed by Hon. Tomas Confesor at the mountains; others join/the Guerfilla Forces and still others tried to find means of livelihood in order to survive.

Eureau of Posts employees to the service of the ULAFFE, who, having faith in the promise of Gen. McArthur that he shall return, kept aflame the spirit of resistance to harass the enemy one way or another despite great odds and sacrifices, not to mention those who died either by disease or thru the cruel hands of the enemy, (may their souls rest in peace) until that joyful day of March 18, 1945 when the American Liberators landed on the shores of Panay, thus making good the promise of one if not the greatest strategist of modern times, Gen. McArthur, and instilling our confidence to the assuring pledge of the American High Command and to the untainted American principles of Democracy, for the ultimate triumph of the cause of human justice and the liberation of the Philippines and

her final rehabilitation from the wanton and terrible ravages of war. And such is the narrative of the trials and tribulations and successes if it ever be, undergone by the humble employees of the Bureau of Posts, Iloilo City, who were inducted into the serv vice of the USAFFE, a Department of the Federal Service of the United States of America.

I have the honor to inform you that on Oct. 21, 1941, the members of the CAPIZ POSTOFFICE force whose names are listed below were automatically placed into the service of the U.S. ARMY WARNING SERVICE by order of A. H. CAMPBELL, Chief of Aircraft warning Service, Air Force, U. S. Army Forces in the Far East, thru the Director of Posts, Manila. Since then, these employees had been rendering service to the Army by cooperating together in sending and receiving of CONFIDENTIAL FLASH MESSAGES regarding presence, position number, etc., of enemy planes, ships, troops, etc., to "AWARN, MANILA" which was then the Chief Warning Service outpost of the Philippines. The Chief Warning Service outpost then concerned so that it could take precaution before the enemy could do any harm. 



Dear Sir:

- 1. In conjunction with the communication drills now being conducted with certain telegraph and radio stations of the Bureau of Posts, the actual flights of U. S. Army airplanes enumerated in the attached schedules have just been arranged for the period from April 15 to May 15, 1941. To familiarize all concerned more thoroughly with the proper preparation and prompt transmission of FIASH TEST MESSAGES, it will be appreciated if each of the stations mentioned in the schedules may be instructed to be on the alert at the time and date indicated and report by "Flash Test Messages" as soon as the airplanes are sighted. In case other actual flights will become available during the same period, each of the stations concerned will be subsequently notified in advance.
- 2. It is essential that no other airplanes except these chartered for the purpose be reported on the dates given. In order, therefore, to avoid confusion in places where many other airplanes fly daily, the airplanes that will be used in the scheduled flights should be recognized by their special markings or formation indicated in the schedules.
- 3. In addition to the Flash Messages required in connection with the scheduled flights mentioned above, it is requested that a each of the stations listed hereunder be instructed to comply with the followings
- a. On Mondays and Wednesdays between 8:00 A.m. and 11:00 Am for a period of four weeks, be on the lookout for any flight of three or more planes that may be seen flying in formation and report promptly by Flash Message their appearance over each station. Negative reports are not desired, so that if three or more planes are not sighted on the days indicated, no Flash Messages need be sent.




