

- e. Approximately how many civilian employees were used per military individual in your unit?

2. Col. Toloramm has made several statements, on file in Outrilla Affairs Division and in this Organization, in which he state definitely that labor perforsed prior to 9 January 1946 was on a purely voluntary basic. Es further states that he gave instructions to subordinate Comanders to the effect that civilian services were to be procured on a voluntary basic prior to 9 January 1946.

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present a claim for my automobile which was commendered by Captain Mather 18. Cuahing, 1823, at Lagangilang, Abra Province, Morthern Luxon on December 28, 1941. The commandeering receipt which he issued to se was lost together with its registration papers when the Japanese Army Torces immeded our headquarters at the Lagangilang Agricultural High School on Jammary 22, 1942. When I applied for duplicate certificate examinable prevenue that all their previous records have either been lost of destroyed. However, I am enclosing herweith the otherbil mortgage contract in favor of the Manila Motor Company-mherefrom I purchased said our in 1838 - in which yow will find that its description is as follows:

The following is a narrative of the circumstances:

- 1. When war broke out on December 8, 1941, I was Division Superintenant of Schools for the Province of Abre, Northern Lucan. On Dec. 10, the Jupanese landed in great force off Pandam, Figan and Santa, 110008 Sur Province, rapidly capturing the junction leading to Abra Province at Barvacam, All communication lines between Abra and points south (including Banila) were cut, and excepting by radio and by runners passing through unoccupied areas, Abra was unheard froms.
- 2. The Philippine Constabilizing force under imjor Capayas retreated to the mountains, after having left their barracks in Banqued hurriedly. The Philippine Army trainees under Lieut. Ficente Dinam, Pals. evacuated to Lagangilang whatever supplies they could carry with them. They were in disorganized groups.
- S. In view of the proximity of the Japanese forces, they being only So kinesters from Banqued, wy official station, I noved my family to the Lagangilang Agricultural High School on December 12. On December 16, 1941 in the morning, the Japs invaded Jabra in force, freed all prisoners confined in the provincial jail, and lawlessmess broke out, giving robbers and thiswes opportunity to look government and Chinese property. They went as far as the south bank of the Abra Hiver at Lagangilang, turned back to Banqued and left for Vigan on the same day.

- 4. From Doomber 10 to December 15, Captain Walter N. Cushing, operator and co-owner of the Rainbow Mines, Inc. with office and mines at Fattoc, Abra, together with William N. Arthur, his assistant, and four other volunteers crossed the mountain separating Abra and Iloose Sur as patrols and socutes. They tried to observe enemy positions, supplies and movements. When they came back to Lagangilang, they tried to reorganize the disbanded trainees and recruit volunteer fighters against the alps. As a start, they tried to accumulate all the scattered equipment and supplies of the Cadre.
- 5. On or about December 18, 1941, some 50 or more American soldiers, a detail of the Signal Corps (Aircraft Debection Unit) stationed at Euroso, Ilocos Morte under lat Lieut. Robert H. Arnold, U.S.A. arrived at Le Pas, Abra. They ned trekked over the mountains between Dhra and Ilocos Morte Province in retreat from the Japanese who had invaded Ilocos Morte. When they arrived in Legangliang, they were persuaded by Capt. Cushing, Lt. w. N. Arthur, and Mr. Samuel Ordun (co-partner of Cushing in the Bainbow Minos at Pattoc, Abra) to stay in Johr in the meantime to get more organized to resist and fight against the Japa. Lt. Arnold had approximately 50 men, 2 machine guns, sidearns, some greandes, some Salks and over six miles of wire all these painstaingly carried over the mountains, article that had abandomed that the route south had been blocked off by the Japa and that the only way to rejoin the USAFEE forces was through Mountain Province, a mountainous,
- 6. Capt. Qushing and it. armold made Lagangilang Agricultural High School their headquarters, in view of the presence of many student and teacher cottages and the location - it being on the northeast side of the Abra River, which needed to be crossed if the Japs attempted to invade again.
- 7. To these Beadquarters Tlocked Filipino soldiers who had been disbanded from the Abra Cadra; some who retreated from battles along Ilocos Sur and La Union coartline joined them. So with many other volunteers from the different towns of Abra, Captini Lushing and Lieut. Armold called on me to help provide their men with Tood. As Superintendent of Schools, I arranged for food contributions all over the Province through my teachers. All the rice, chickens and food contributed were accumulated by the trucks of Cushing and Armold and brought to Legangilang.
- 8. When they felt themselves sufficiently reorganized, Captain Cushing laid the plant to move to liceos gur to de embush warfare against the Japs. They commandeered all the available trucks of the Northern Luson Transportation company and the Sambrano Transportation, and some automobiles, including his own private 1940 Chevrolet and my car. He gave me a commandeering receipt on December 26, 1945.
- 9. On December 26, he appointed no Lieutenant-Military Covernor for the USAFFE for Abra Frovince in recognition of my humble service and willing, wholehearted cooperation. My job was to maintain peace and order, help take care of the sick soldiers, and to recover as many supplies for the United States Army as I could. Gapt. Cushing dealt with locters and the lawless

elements in a decisive way. As an example to the others, he authorized me to form a jury to decide the guilt of one Filipino who had terrorized civilians in Delores, Abra with his revolver. Having been found guilty, he was shot to death by Captain Cushing and Lt. Arnold's men.

- 10. Capts Cushing and Lieut. Arnold left Lagangilang on or about Dosember 29, 1941 for Candons [loos Sur via Fliar, Abra. They had about 25 inserioans and 200 Filipino soldiers with them. They were to ambush Jap supply trucks and troops which were soving south along the coast to La Union. Capts. Cushing instructed me to take over all the trucks, automobiles, litneys, gasoline, and other supplier recovered; to stress on the maintenance of peace and order to the people; to dimmantle all vehicles and render them useless in case the Japs invade in force. He left me it. Milliam I. Arthur as Executive Officer, 3 other convalescing inserioan soldiers, 3 Filipino officers and approximately 100 Filipino coldiers.
- 11. In accordance with Capte, Cushing's instructions, I also posted ment to keep guard at the approaches to Abra from Ilcoos Sur. I caused the Acting District Engineer of the Province, Mr. Reyes, to fill up the Tangadan Tunnel with rooks and earth. Capte. Cushing Cound it impossible to blast the place with the available explosives. Hills along the road were slid down to blook the road and make the same impassable to motorized vehicles. The wreekage was such that when the Japanese invaded Abra again, they had to do so by ratte along the Abra river.
- 12. Food production among the people was stressed by my teachers and the mayors under me, because Abra province has never been self-sufficient in food. I was greatly helped in this program by the Principal of the Lag-angilang Agricultural High School. I caused all government employees to be paid with P. M. S. checker.
- 15. My soldiers constantly went around the different towns to gather the rifles and ammunition available, as well as Army equipment. Some grenades and ammunition were sent to Captain Cushing and Lieut. Arnold in Candon.
- 14. Of the twelve melaria-stricken inscionae under Lieuta Arnold, four were too weak to join him when he moved with copt, cushing to Cendons by teacher nurses took good care of these four, They were Sgt. Charles moll; Barnhouse; Shorty (?) (Hel name was relating; I don't remember) and Heuser, Sgt. Encil recovered and we motored him to Pilar after two weeks to rejoin Let Arnold's group.
- 16. I kept Capt. Cushing informed of our activities in Abra from day to day using runners. During the period of from January 1 to January 21, 1942, Captain Cushing and his mon accomplished 2 ambuseades at Candon and Baugen, Iloses Sur, respectively. At Candon, he destroyed some ten truckloads of Japa and supplies.
- 16. As Lieuts-Willtary Governor, I caused the re-arrest of the prisoners who were freed from the provincial jail by the Japs. I designated policemen in the different towns and barries to maintain peace and order, and help in

18. When the japs invaded on January 22, 1942, Lieut. Arthur had taken the precention of dumping 100 belts of 50 cal. rilles, which we could not use for lack of exmunition. The Japs seized four (4) trucks, 2 automobiles, including mine. All papers in our headquarters were destroyed, including the commandeering receipt given me by Capt. Cushing, and the registration papers of the car.

19. Capt. Cushing and Lieut. Armold's headquarters in Candon and Baugen were invaded by the Japs in force and their forces scattered. The last news I heard of Capt. Cushing was that he was killed somewhere in Isabela Province in 1943.

 Lieut. Robert Arnold is reported to be alive and is the CO of the 15th Infantry USAFIP, Northern Luzon.

21. Muny of the Americans were later taken prisoners by the Japs, and as far as I can resember; in 1945 I as so one of them in San Formando, In Union province being transferred prison camp. Some of their mames are less sgt. purracoio, lat sgt. quinley, mater sgt. myder, sgt. moll, corporal Barnhouse, pfc. Bouser, Sgt. Eager, and Hr. Ordun. I tried to smuggle them some food. Libewise, Sgt. Enderk Eventite.

22. Communications with Bontoc and Balbalasang, Abra were had by runners and messengers. Lt. Arthur told me that Col. Boran at Bontoc, before it fell to the Japs, had knowledge of our activities. Two American Lieutenants (gold-miners, Baguid) Stevens and Scholey passed Lagangilang first week of January to join some other guerrills groups.

25. The men of Captain Gushing and Lieut. Arnold became the mucleus of the succeeding guerrilla groups which harmassed and wrought have on Japanese supply routes and up to the present are fighting with the Americans in the North.

24. Lieut. Arthur was taken by the Japanese Military Police and killed in 1944.

Memor andum to all Military Mayors:

Each Military Mayor is hereby authorized to appoint a jury of at least 12 bolomen to try cases of treason, espionage, or the aiding and abetting of the enemy. A two thirds decision of the jury declara ing the accused guilty, after same has had an opportunity to explain his actions will be sufficient to condemn the man. In cases involving soldiers or B.C. the accused will be turned over to the nearest officer of the Army actually on duty. In cases involving civil cases the jury shall likewise be authorized to administer justice but the death penalty will not be imposed in these cases except by unanimous opinion. For all other punishments a 2/3 decision of the jury will be considered sufficient.

In the exercise of the above powers, each Military Mayor will be expected to exercise good judgment and to apply the principles of justice and equity in a democratic way in so far as possible always bearing in mind, however, that the Philippine Government is at war and the existence, security, and welfare of the Armed Forces and loyal civilians cannot and will not be compromised by any individual or group of individuals under any circumstances.

Sometime in October, 1944, Capt. Doroteo Summbst, then 498 Officer of the 1814 Inf. H., issued an order declaring as abendened property, products of lends belowing to owners residing in sumicipalities of lends better them those in which the producement by the dray. The resen in support of this order was the impracticability and non-awaliability of transportation.

Today, saids from meharis and infilients, the greatest problem of the civilian population is the procurement of food supplies. In manicipalities affected by the order, the people are starving, esting only rice porriage and stems of benome and papers plents, and whatever foodstuffs they could gather from plents and herbs.

The strict interpretation of the order by the barrio lieutements and municipal sayors charged with its execution worked unfold hardships on the people who depend for food supplies entirely on the produce of their lends outside the numicipalities where they reside.

Today, there is now reason for the existence of the order of the then QMS, 121st Inf, as transportation is already available within most parts of the areas concerned.

 In response to werbal inquiries on 25 March 1947, the understending of the undersigned concerning civilien employment engaged by UBAFIP NL is made a matter of record.

4. Gertain types of civilian employment was sutherised prior to 9 Jenuary, 1955. Bulbornset of send-permanent character numbering approximately 15 per basedquarters down to end including the Bettalion Headquarters was authorized in addition to such personnel as civilian Doctors, Nurses, hospital attendents, technicians, utilities personnel and intolligence agents.

3. Services of bolomen, cargadores, laborers, and outpost guards were considered voluntary by Hgs USAFIP, NL, prior to 9 Japuary 1945. (in. HWY)

4. Cash payments were made for services in some instances as early as March, 1945, but the bulk of the payments were made by payrolls submitted subsequent to that time.

5, Hiltery government officials in North Lumon were appointed by the undersigned to earry on military and civiline functions for the benefit of the Army. The work was carried out by 6-5. Officials were appointed in the same extencions that Full was authorized to appoint Military government officials were appointed in the same capacities and as same rates of pay as civilina government officials holding offices prior to the outbreak of the War. This group performed services for the army under the expectation of receiving later payment.

6. Loans in both Philippine currency and Jap wernotes were made by vericus personnel to USAFIF HL for use in furthering the war effort. A record of all such transactions was kept, and is available for necessary use.

1. In order to clarify the many claims and questions concerning. Bolo Units in North Luzon, I wish to enumerate the following:

a. These units were organized throughout North Luzon primarily for the purpose of labor.

b. They were organized on a voluntary bases without any promise for future remuneration.

c. These units rendered excellent service such as: unloading Submarines, cargadoring supplies and equipment, demolition work, and in some cases actual combat.

d. Many of these units sustained casualties.

I have the honor to bring to your attention that the belomen or laborers who worked during guerrilla days at Solama, Cagayan, are victime of exploitations and of extortion by the following racketeers: (1) Dr. Padro Lasam; (2) Effect Lasam; Secretary to the Municipal Mayor and (3) Abblande Lasam, Municipal Mayor, all of Solama, Orgayan; Number powers as municipal efficiently obtained the recognity of the College of the Coll

When Dr. Fedro Lasem came to Manila to file their claims in the month of March, 1948, he collected two penes (\$72,00) from each claimant of over 2,000 claimants. When he came to Manila in the month of June on the pretext of working for the approval of the claims of the laborers he collected two peace (\$72,00) from each alleging to the claimants that this amount will be given to a certain investigator by the name of "Neyes" and to the "Othef Gesmissioners" he will approve the claims.

I request that the investigator who approved these claims be investigated for sure that he is connected with those racketeers. I am sure that some provincial efficials of Gagayan are involved in this racket business.

Besides all these collections made from the imporant and peer claimants, they will get one-half (1/2) or 50% of the amount to be paid to or received by each claimant when their claims are approved. This amount to be collected from each claimant according to Br. Pedro Lasam, Eliseo Lasam, and Abelardo Lasam will be given to the Chief Commissioner and Mr. Rayes of the Glaim Service who will approve the claims.

I pray that the approval of all claims of the bolomen or laborers of Solana, Cagayan be suspended

and those already suproved should be suspended funt the same for the probestion of the interest of the cladimate until the above-named persons be brought to proper justice.
