SUBJECT: Supplementary Instructions

TO : All Guerrilla Leaders

1. Send your men out to all barrios in your territory and search for a "ham" or amateur radio operator who is capable of constructing a transmitter that will carry 300-400 miles. Try and get him all the spare parts you can to construct the transmitter as well as a power unit and generator. Induct him into the U. S. Army. Place set on highest mountain in your vicinity. You are authorized to sign vouchers for all materials necessary to build this set. Also procure one regular commercial battery radio set in order to receive short wave messages. Make every effort to get this set in operation by April 1st. A special secret messenger will arrive at your Headquarters prior to April 1st giving you the proper call letters, frequency and hour of daily contact.

2. Orders from Gen. MacArthur are definitely to "lay low" and gather information. This is imperative.

3. Send your men out to various places, in all provinces nearby as well as your own; to Manila; to the Pacific (East) Coast; to Lingayen Gulf and the China Sea. If possible send men to the provinces around and South of Manila such as Bulacan, Batan, Zambales, Rizal, Laguna, Batangas, Cavite, Tayabas and the Bicol Peninsula. Have your men question all travellers, peddlers and municipal officers about Japs troops as follows:

- a. Every town or barrio now permanently garrisoned by Japs.
- b. Number of Japs in that town or barrio.
- c. Find out regiment or division that Japs belong to.
- d. Find out name of commanding officer of Japs there.
- e. Do Japs have tanks, artillery pieces, airplanes, ammunition supply or food dumps nearby.
- f. How many trucks do Japs have at that place?
- g. Do the Japs have a radio transmitter there? 222

g. Where are Jap "Military Zones" in Manila?

h. Are there any Japs in Fort Mc-McKinley?

i. General conditions in Manila; food supply, attitude of people, how many have gone pro-Jap, any secret organizations formed, where about of Gen. Roxas, large number of Jap troops entering or leaving Manila Bay when, where, destination and date.

6. The following information is required relative to American and British Civilian Concentration Camps at Camp Holmes Trinidad Benguet and University of Santo Tomas Manila.

a.

a. Number of people concentrated there.

b. Food conditions - where do they receive food - how much.

c. Are they given any money by Japs to buy food?

d. Do they have sufficient clothing - are they warmly dressed?

e. Get names of those who have died and how many.

f. Are people above 60 yrs of age released?

g. (Note) Have agents try and contact people who have been released and question them about conditions in the camp.

h. Are civilian concentrated any other place besides Camp Holmes Trinidad and University of Santo Tomas, Manila?

i. Are camps sanitary, clean and do they have medicine and doctors available?

j. Have any American been taken out of the Philippines?

7. Following information is desired from the following provinces: Zambales, Tarlac, Nueva Ecija, Batasan, Paupanga, Bulacan, Tayabas, Rizal, Cavite, Laguna, Batangas, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, Albay and Sorsogon, relative to guerilla units that are opposing the Japanese.

a. Where is the guerilla unit located?

b. How many men do they have?

c. Who is their leader?

h. Are telephone and telegraph lines working to and from that place.

i. Have Japs dug fox holes or entrenchment at that place.

j. Condition of roads running into that place.

4. The following information is desired from the seacoast (both China Sea and Pacific Ocean) but particularly Lingayen Gulf Subic Bay, Manila Bay and Batangas Bay.

a. What seacoast towns are occupied permanently by Japs the number and CO of Japs there.

b. Amount and kind of Japs shipping that enters and leaves the port. Cargo, transport or war vessels.

c. Have any Jap Troops landed or embarked the past three months? How many? Their destination or where they arrived from.

d. Do Japs have motor boats patrolling the coast line?

e. Any Jap seaplanes or submarines observed and when?

f. Have Japs prepared barricades or fox holes along beach?

g. Any big guns along the beach, the number and where located.

5. The following information is desired from the vicinity of Manila.

a. Number of Japs in and around Manila and the places they are staying.

b. Names of high ranking Japanese officers and their unit number.

c. Number and type of Jap airplanes at Neilson Airport and Nichols Field.

d. Jap activity around Port Area, Cavite and Manila Bay.

e. Number and place of tanks, armored cars or trucks.

f. Where is Jap Headquarters in Manila?

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- d. How many arms and how much ammunition do they have?
- e. Do they have a radio transmitter and where is it located?
- f. Are they part of a larger unit or are they independent?

B. The following information is requested from all Americans, civilian or Army, on the Island of Luzon.

- a. Complete first and last name.
- b. Occupation and where they are located.
- c. If in the Army their Army Serial Number and organization.
- d. Do they belong to any guerilla unit?

9. Information is also desired as to the whereabouts and activities of any of the following listed American Officers last heard of around in the mountain West of Fort Stotsenburg, Pamp.

10. From the foregoing it will be observed that your mission now is:

- a. To construct transmitter 300-400 miles radius
- b. Get enemy information from your and neighboring provinces and seacoast.
- c. Get enemy information from Lingayen Gulf, Manila Bay, and Batangas Bay.
- d. Get enemy information from Manila.
- e. Get information about civilian concentration camps at Camp Holmes and University of Santo Tomas.

f. Get information about other guerilla units in southern provinces of Luzon.

g. Get information about Americans on Island of Luzon.

h. Get information about given list of Americans in Zambales Mts.

You are hereby authorized to induct as Privates in the U. S. Armed Force two (2) civilians of your own selection who are intelligent, smart and have Jap passes. In addition to your men, these men can be sent by bus or train to the Bicol Peninsula or Manila for the purpose of gathering the information listed above.

In addition, it is necessary that you sent your own men, two or three in a group in civilian clothes and without arms, out to get this necessary information even by boat, across mountains or in enemy occupied territory. Each guerilla leader will at once send out to gather information at least three-fourths of his unit. Try and pick out men who are from the Bicol Peninsula, or Batangas, or Cavite, or Manila or at least those who have relatives there. Send patrols to Palawan, Casiguran, Baler, Infanta, Antimonan, Mauban on the East Coast - to Agoa, Aringay, Damortis, Baueng and San Fernando on the West Coast. Send all over the Island of Luzon to get the information listed herein. Make every ~~effort~~ attempt to get this information back to this Headquarters by May 1st. We need information particularly from the Bicol Peninsula, the provinces south of Manila and Manila. Make lists of the information we need from this letter and give it to your patrols. Make sure your arms and ammunition are well hidden. We have direct authority from Australia to act as we think best and without any restraint. All our inductions have been approved by MacArthur.

II. It will only be a ~~short time~~ ^{long time} ~~while~~ ^{we} will be able to ~~do~~ ^{do} really do something. Our stuff is about to come and you'll be surprised (as will the Japs) as to its direction and strength.

1. The above men joined this regiment on 21 Dec 1943 at Solano, Muang Yizocya at 8 AM when they were sent in to escort or being wrested from the Japanese. They performed well in the valley with us helping in its complete liberation. In the month of April, later they served on patrols and on security.

2. Then not on tactical mission but on security duty, 2nd Lt Diaz in keeping the Reconnaissance Troops fire and machine gun up.

3. During the month of Sept 1944, he and his men did intelligence work in breaking up Japanese supply lines and intercepting Japanese equipment for their own use. In addition, they were so important car in this unit as G-2, he helped lay out maps and reports.

4. This unit stands high in the eyes of the Reconnaissance Troop men. Each mission given them whether of a tactical or service nature has been carried out successfully. I command each of you keep him in your hearts.

AGAINST THE UNITED STATES!

Recent events in Burma clearly indicate what is going to happen in the Philippines in the very near future. In Burma, as in the Philippines, the Japs have set up a puppet government that really does everything that its Jap masters tell it to do. In Burma, as in the Philippines, the Japs had promised a grant of so-called "Independence"--an independence that is meaningless because the government takes its orders from the Japs instead of from the people of the Country.

On August 1, Burma was granted her "Independence", and immediately the puppet government of Burma, acting on orders from its Jap masters, declared war upon the United States and Great Britain and concluded an alliance with Japan in which Burma promised full military, political and economic assistance to Japan in the prosecution of the war. This is revealed the crafty policy of Japan. She knows that she cannot force the countries she has occupied to assist her in her living war. Therefore she is seeking to gain the signs and by concealing her true aims behind much talk and propaganda about "Independence."

Therefore in the very near future you may expect to learn that the Philippines has been granted its "Independence" and that the puppet government of the Philippines has declared war upon the United States and Great Britain. When you hear this news, keep calm and realize the U.S. are not at war with the U. S. and Great Britain because you cannot be bound by the acts of a government that you had no part in choosing. Furthermore, this puppet government is not the legal government of the Philippines. The legal government is the Commonwealth Government, which still in existence under President Manuel Quezon.

Above all, do not take any part in this war against the United States. If Vargas, Arzino, Laurel and the other puppets want to fight for their Jap masters, let them do so. They will suffer the same fate as the other war criminals. But if the Filipino people join with these traitors in such a war, they will jeopardize the entire future of their country.

In Sicily, in Russia, in the Volga, in New Guinea, in the Aleutians—on every front—the forces of the Axis are falling back in disorder before the gigantic United Nations offensive. You have endured much during the past months. Endure just a little longer and be comforted by the fact that we are already on the final stretch to VICTORY!

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SERVTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE UNIT OF CAPT. L. U. ROSARIO, ON CIVIL-MILITARY ATTACHE, HELD IN THE HEADQUARTERS, AT LAMAO, DUPAX, MUEVA VIZCAYA, ON JUNE 5, 1944, AT 8:00 O'CLOCK SHARP, ANTEMERIDIAN.

RASSOLUTION

WHEREAS, in compliance with the aims of the surrender, the services of this unit ever since, has been a continuous pacification work as evidenced by the pertinent portions of the points of surrender addressed thereto by Capt. L. U. Rosario and Military Citation awarded thereunto, to wit:

"POINTS OF SURRENDER"

'x x x x x x x x x x x x x x x x x
We surrender, not because we avoid battles
with our enemy, but, because fight is a close
matter in this country, and a period of tran-
quility and reconstruction is imperative in the
hearts of the citizens.

We surrender, not because our spirit is low and our moral lax, but, because we believe that service to our country, at this period, cannot best be rendered in the furtherance of hostilities. x x x x x x x x x x x x x x x

'THEREFORE, brave and loyal men of Combat Company, let this act of surrender be performed with your hearts opened to imbibe the fragrance of peace with the Japanese Imperial Army and to cooperate hand in hand with them in carrying out the immense program of reconstruction.'

'With the advance of the Imperial Japanese Forces into this Cagayan Valley, LEANDRO U. ROSARIO, then Lieutenant of USAFFE, comprehending the great cause of Nippon in this War, surrendered with his men to our troops in July, 1942. Thereafter, with Dupax, as his basis of Operations, he rendered unstinted and effective cooperation with the Japanese Army in the restoration of peace and order in the southern regions of Nueva Vizcaya.

and commenced active pacification program

province. His fervid cooperation with the
Japanese Army is laudable his sacrificial ser-

Provincial Governor, Bayombong, Nueva Vizcaya, Managers of Municipal retailers, this province, the Office of the Military Police, Office of the Provincial Treasurer, Office of the Provincial Auditor, Bayombong, Nueva Vizcaya, and Office of Municipal Mayors, this province.

1. On August 28, '43 a Company with (1) Squad BC commanded by Capt. Saito and Sgt., Benjamen Albano, BC of Nueva Vizcaya arrived on the evening at Kayapa Proper, NV., from Pangasinan bringing with them prisoners. On that night Lt. Horimoto ~~xxxxxxxx~~ contacted Sgt. and Albano received information that people of Kayapa are connivers to the USAFFE, and the undersigned was the first apprehended by (4) Policemen of Aritao in the house where I slept, they were armed with rifles which I knew their name Ruperto Basaig and Antonio with their two companions and brought me in my house where the Japanese station and maltreated the undersigned, ~~xx~~ suspected Guerrilla Lieutenant, keeping arms, giving supplies to USAFFE sending runners, receiving supplies and Agent of USAFFE. Sgt. Maricawa and Ruperto Basaig are the very instrumental who maltreated the undersigned and the civilians on that night compelling us to confess whereabouts USAFFE or Guerrilla or to surrender arms but the investigation were negative, although ~~they~~ were severely tortured by boxing, beating, drinking water women and men.

2. August 29, 1943 the undersigned, brother, and almost population of Kayapa were again taken under the company of Capt. Saito with BC who gathered all civilians in the sitios and conducted investigation on that same date, Captain Saito and Sgt. Benjamen Albano, They condemned the US Government that it will not exist and will never return in the islands, and asked the people to cooperate in irradiating the remaining USAFFE. Sgt., Albano deccleared to the public that they all caught the Americans hiding, one is Lt. Langley with his men were captured by them in Imagan 13th of August '43 and went down to Pangasinan tortured several Civilians.

3. When nobody confessed to them where about USAFFE or GUERRILLA the undersigned was the first tied with the (2) District Presidents ~~and~~ Sgt., Albano showed me the list of Blacklist, stating that the undersigned is No. 1 collaborators to Usaife as enumerated above and when the crimes was not admitted, Albano ordered his men and brought the undersigned in the brook, emerged several time into the water and investigated at interval when they put me out of water by Sgt., Albano with (5) BC and one Japs boxing the undersigned, kicking, compelling me to confess and when I can't reveal anything Sgt. Albano ordered his men to shocked me until death, them I painted twice inside water that I can't confess anything except to ask mercy to "Lord better shot me than to suffer". Later I heard Capt. Saito ordered his men to carry me to impisoned me in the small hut and guarded by BC.

4. The next man emerged in the Water was WAKET GOMOY of Galasac, Pangasinan by Sgt. Albano with others BC and Japs. Gomoy was shouting and crying inside water asking Albano to save his life and he will confess and later I hard him no more. Later Gomoy was brought in the hut where I was imprisoned which the two Japs were trying to revived him but dead, later Albano came to me ^{to see} the dead men laying stating that I will be like that later. Gomoy ^{several} time on their way and revealed some civilians possesing arms in Kayapa due sever maltreatment. Gomoy was burried by his brother eve of Aug. 29 '43.

4. (B) Squad BC with Japs under the leadership of Sgt. Albano and Captain Saito continued maltreatment, atrocities of all civilians taken custoday, which I know most of them maltreated by Albano such as Halolong, Tidang, Pedro Medina, Martinez, Guyangan, Ligayao, Bugnay and others almost the population of Kayapa Proper, Nueva Vizcaya were sev-

CIRCULAR LETTER:
TO ALL MUNICIPAL MAYORS
PROVINCE OF NUEVA VIZCAYA

All Municipal Mayors are hereby directed to carry out in their respective Municipalities the following emergency measures to maintain peace and food materials.

1. All people living in outlying sitios should be required to move to the nearest barrio bringing along with them all their valuables and food materials.

2. All homes must be provided with alarm gong in the form of empty cans, bells, frogs, bamboos or anything that makes noise to be sounded when lawless elements enter a barrio or town. Once a house sound an alarm, other houses must sound their alarms and any house failing to do so shall be reckoned as conniving with the bad elements and shall be subject to investigation.

3. All houses shall be provided with as many spears or bows and arrows as there are males from 18 to 60 years therein. These spears and arrows shall be used against bandits who may disturb the peace and order of the community. They shall also have a bottle containing a mixture of sand and powdered native pepper.

4. All shrubs, bushes, talahibs, etc. which could be used by the hiding elements along the road and rivers or around the vicinity of inhabited places should be cleared.

5. Family heads should report immediately to their Presidents, the presence of people not known to be residents of the barrio. No saifide visitors must also be reported within one hour from their arrival.

6. People are prohibited to roam around from one barrio to another. Persons not belonging to that barrio found in that barrio shall be apprehended for investigation.

7. Buying and selling any commodity or product in any place shall be prohibited except in the Public Market. However, farmers may send their products to the market for sale through their neighbors, but in no case shall it be sold, within the barrio to anybody living outside of the barrio.

8. All people must have their shirts placed under their trousers to avoid the concealing of weapons.

9. People must sell, before June 30, 1944, all their palay (Tagalog or Ilocano) to the CHMI, leaving only for private consumption until the next harvest time, four cavans of Tagalog palay or 220 Kilos of Ilocano palay for each member of the family.

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10. Night guards with bolas, spears or bows and arrows shall be in groups of not less than fifteen persons and shall patrol the entire area of the district. They shall always be moving and whistling to each other. Any crude whistle made of local material could be used.
11. Civilian patrol in big numbers led by armed Constabulary or Police should be organized to scour nearly mountains and forests to locate and catch hiding elements.
12. Residents, leaders, Constabulary and Police patrols shall check from time to time the homes and cedulas of people in all the barrios and districts.
13. People gathered in markets, cockpit or other places (churches exempted) should be searched and scrutinized to capture bad elements and hidden weapons. Such searches should be made as frequently and thoroughly as possible.
14. A vigorous campaign should be conducted against gambling of any kind.
15. Parties of any kind like wedding celebrations, dances, banquets, etc. could not be held in any barrio or district without first securing a permit from the municipal mayor who will keep a complete record of all permits granted to enable the police to check up bad elements who might possibly attend such affairs.
16. The curfew hours must be observed rigidly.
17. Recurrent community assemblies should be held to indoctrinate in the minds of the people the necessity of fighting the lawless elements, as connivance with them will cause necessary suffering and numerous deaths on the part of the civilians. A strong public opinion, even bitter feeling against the subversive elements should be created in the minds of the people so that they can give moral and material support to the fighting elements.
18. Each inhabited house shall have at least one barking dog.
19. Each district shall have always ready fast runners to ride on horseback to notify the nearest constabulary detachment about the presence of bandits.
20. The people should be advised again to surrender firearms or acquisitions they may still have.
21. Whenever somebody calls at night, the occupant of the house shall not get down but instead shall sent their young and able bodied men shall go up the rescue.
22. All forces should be mobilized to prevent and curb the above measures especially the meeting of district residents and aid them to carry out the command upon receipt hereof that each district President to appraise them and organize them for the proper execution of these measures set forth above.
23. A close follow-up should be made to see that all of the provisions of this circular are carried out and complied with accordingly. Every report of the progress of the work done in carrying out this circular should be submitted to the Office Commanding and this circular should be copied to the Office Commanding and every report should count of the different elements.

To: All Mayors, Southern Vizcaya

In accordance with the desire of the Honorable, the Provincial Governor, this province, and, as wished by the Imperial Japanese Authorities, the following information is hereby given confidentially for your guidance and adherence:

An agreement was made to put on as ever was our province in absolute readiness to cope with whatever eventuality this emergency is pregnant of, and, by virtue hereof, the Southern comes under my special civil and police devices. This is but an administrative initiative designed to execute with vigil public policies affecting the lives and properties of the people in time of stress and adversity. The poor facilities and means of communication regarding the much-needed visits and close conferences and, the fact, that before and during the period of emergency, our Governor and I were and still are inseparably shouldering the responsibility of working together for the welfare of the people, have redound to this agreement. The Japanese Authorities found us that day during the period of occupation, and they endorsed the idea throughout our public career.

In view hereof, permit me to hope, with benignity, for your constant consultation, cooperation and adherence to all matters this period so demands of public service. Our spirit should be high in the realization of such ends in view. Policies, so-called leadership and objectives of whims and fancies should be sacrificed to public good. Everybody by now should be conscious of the fact that we are at the stage of tackling our ultimate problem of how to outlive this war. The fact that we have unusually attained our independence during the period of emergency implies our absolute responsibility to maintain our domestic peace and order. The rear-front-line is hanging overhead. Our Constabulary Organization is yet on the stage of attaining the yearn-sought-discipline to be able to outmaneuver effectively the organized banditry and other subversive elements. See unto the civil populace if such have strikes. Justice will be trampled down, and the lives and properties will be but objects of chaos.

It is, therefore, our cardinal duty to unify ourselves, establish and iron administrative relation, and dedicate ourselves to the ultimate proposition to outlive this emergency. With our unity of action, indeed with firm resolution to meet whatever eventuality, will dispel any threat. We should be benefited by the civil determination of our Nation who met calmly His fight and emerged victorious over and above like armed enemies. Our civilian cause has not any cause to surrender, because we are not a party to the armed clash. But, if the deluge finds its way amidst us, we are the greatest losers and sufferers, yet at the termination of the conflict, we are the ones to reconstruct the ravages of war. Hence, the means and ways to survive the perils should spring from our hearts and native genius. The system of our protection and defense should be in readiness before the very-hour comes. Our people expect much from us for their protection. Our courage should count with the needs of the time. Every angle of our preparedness should be beyond question. It is only then that our safety is conclusively established our houses, neighbors and properties enjoy domestic tranquility. The fact that we constitute the southern port of entry into the Campan Valley, the terrains of which and natural defense can

wealth offer a good abode for retracted military hostility. prompt us to prepare differently from the rest of the province. should be absolutely discarded. I say with emphasis that any false step taken will incur fatality. Hence, earnest consultation will guide us to proper, dependable and effective leadership. Southern prepared needs you to be Executives of the Hour.

Sir:

The conditions of peace and order within the jurisdiction of Northern Luzon is progressing day by day with the efforts exerted by every Officer and the reports of continuous surrenders are a cause of congratulation for you.

However, there are still movements of ex-USAFM members and their activities of false propaganda and unfounded rumors may influence the ignorant people to create disorder. These kinds of ex-USAFM members' activities will cause the innocent people to sink into the mire. These kinds of disturbances are hateful activities which hinder the establishment of the New Philippines and are not even punishable by an angel.

These, however, are in extremely small numbers, but some of the leading citizens are disregarding the actual state of affairs, thinkinglessly of the mistaken dreams of the past. Moreover, some communicate with bandits, activities which are most regretful as they throw into the darkness wishes and demands of the general public for the establishment of peace and order.

You must, therefore, render your thoughts into these points to exterminate those who are helping bandits as you have been doing in the past and at the same time, place yourself in the battle front against them so as to render more efforts for the welfare of the people.

It is believed that there are still many arms supposed to be hidden and possessed by certain persons in some places, but they are too few to take the trouble of searching their hiding places or to make them surrender voluntarily.

Therefore, distribute wisely the posters which are being sent and at the same time, I hope that you will direct and keep these important points in mind.

PROCLAMATION NO. 7

CALLING UPON FILIPINOS TO SURRENDER ON OR AFTER JANUARY 23, 1943,
THE FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF THE ORGANIZATION OF THE PHILIPPINE EXECU-
TIVE COMMISSION; ALL FIREARMS, AMMUNITIONS, AND EXPLOSIVES.

Whereas, on February 19, 1942, the Headquarters of the Imperial Japanese Forces called for the surrender of all firearms, ammu-nitions, and explosives, in obedience to which and in the interest of peace and order, many persons surrendered firearms, ammunitions, and explosives;

Whereas, it has come to the notice of the Japanese Military Administration and the Philippine Executive Commission that there are still some persons concealing firearms, ammunitions, and explosives who would like to surrender them now but are afraid to do so for fear that the Japanese Military authorities will punish them for failure to surrender them before;

Whereas, the Imperial Japanese Forces have demonstrated to the Filipinos by the magnanimity of their acts that they are the friends of the Filipino people and that they are exerting every effort to promote the happiness and welfare of the people of the Filipinos;

Whereas, we have pledged complete cooperation with, and loyalty to, Japan in order that the Philippines may be worthy of a place in the Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity Sphere;

Whereas, the act of concealing firearms, ammunitions, and explosives is inconsistent with our pledge of cooperation and loyalty and is an obstacle to the speedy establishment of peace and order in the Philippines since they may fall into the hands of lawless elements who are looking for such firearms, ammunitions, and explosives; and

Whereas, January 23, 1943, marks the first anniversary of the organization of the Philippine Executive Commission and of the beginning of complete and harmonious cooperation between the peoples of Japan and the Philippines;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority conferred upon me as Head of the Central Administrative Organization by Order No. 1 of the Commander-in-Chief of the Imperial Japanese Forces in the Philippines, and in accordance with the instructions contained in

Political Information No. 19, dated January 17, 1943, of the Director General of the Japanese Military Administration, I hereby call upon the Filipinos still concealing or possessing firearms, ammunitions, and explosives to surrender the same on January 23, 1943, or as soon as possible thereafter, to the Imperial Japanese Forces, to the Japanese Military Police, to any Branch Office of the Japanese Military Administration, or to any officer of the Bureau of Constabulary, who upon receipt of such surrendered firearms, ammunitions, and explosives shall immediately turn them over to the Imperial Japanese Forces.

The fear of some people that they may be punished for not having surrendered the said firearms, ammunitions, and explosives, in accordance with the above-mentioned requirement of the Japanese Military Administration of February 19, 1942, is unfounded because the Director General of the Japanese Military Administration has assured the Chairman of the Executive Commission in Political Information No. 19 that such people will not be punished when they surrender their firearms, ammunitions, and explosives in accordance with this Proclamation. By voluntarily surrendering such firearms, ammunitions, and explosives, they would be demonstrating their sincere cooperation towards the establishment of peace and order in the Philippines aside from doing one of their duties as good citizens. The Japanese Military authorities, in devoting all their efforts towards the early establishment of peace and order, desire that all obstacles to the construction of a New Philippines be removed. They have shown to the Filipino people, by their magnanimous acts, that their sincerity is above suspicion and beyond doubt, and the people of the Philippines should fully reciprocate such magnanimity by responding promptly to this appeal.

Done in the City of Manila, Philippines, this 23rd day of January, 1943.

Reports have been received in this office that patrols of the Constabulary and police forces in the different municipalities have been undertaking inspections of houses when lights have long been put out and during unholly hours of the night and when everyone is already at rest or sleeping. In order to avoid undue fear and excitement on the part of the people caused by surprised house inspection during late hours, all Municipal Mayors are requested to avoid as much as possible the inspection of houses during the quiet hours of the night and when lights have already been put out. Inspection should be done when the members of the household are still awake or during the early part of the night. Only in special and emergency cases or when there is strong evidence of the presence of suspicious persons, should patrols during unholly hours be allowed to enter a house for inspection. Aside from this, all members of patrols must be advised to exercise sound judgment and due courtesy while going on inspection.

Strict compliance to this instruction is hereby enjoined.

In view of the reduction of the Municipal Police forces, you are hereby directed to require every District President within your respective jurisdiction to send a messenger to the Municipal Building everyday. The messenger shall bring along with him a wooden badge, sample of which is shown herein below. The daily messenger shall bring all the reports from the District President to the municipality and shall go back to his district bringing along with him all the written orders and verbal instructions of the Mayor and other officials to the District President concerned. Daily reports of district messengers shall be accomplished in accordance with prescribed forms No. 1 and No.2, sent herewith. Form shall be accomplished in duplicate to be on file with the office of the Municipal Mayor and Chief of Police ready for inspection all the time. Form 2 shall be carried by the district messenger along with the wooden badge and should be signed by the Municipal Secretary everyday.

Strict compliance with this circular will enable the Mayor to have a constant contact with District Presidents. Besides the daily messengers, special runners should be sent by District Presidents to render rush reports especially those in connection with any disturbance of peace and order or appearance of subversive elements within the jurisdiction of each District President.

TO : All Inspectors and Operatives of this command.

1. Hereunder is copied Circular No. 1, of the CO for your instructions and guidance in your work from henceforth.

Section I - INSTRUCTIONS

1. All information should be sent by the fastest possible means. When intelligence reports are brought and sent by radio, confirmation copies of the radiograms and detailed reports must also be sent by courier.

2. All reports must be serially numbered.

3. Details of pre-war information need not be collected.

4. Date of information must be stated.

5. Information must be marked with appropriate classification as to reliability of source and information according to the following table (Be conservative in evaluating information)

A a. Classification of source.

b. Usually reliable

c. Fairly reliable

d. Reliability doubtful

e. Reliability cannot be judged.

B Classification of information:

1. Report confirmed by other sources

2. Probably true report

3. Possibly true report

4. Accuracy doubtful

5. Improbable report

6. Truth cannot be judged; Thus, information probably true from a fairly reliable source be marked: "C-2."

7. Show as much information as possible by use of maps, overlays, and sketches.

8. Follow outline in intelligence circulars as near as possible. Additional information may be included at the end of the report.

9. Transmit enemy documents (orders, directives, plans, maps, charts, reports, paybooks, diaries, identification tags, etc.) If information is important sent by radio.

10. Negative information is in some cases important as possible information. For example, the absence of enemy troops in important areas, lack of anti-aircraft, defense to cover installations, etc.

Section II - Maps, Charts, Sketches

1. Every effort must be made to prepare maps, overlays, sketches and charts in the best possible form.

a. The inclusion of prominent mountains, buildings, railroad, roads, rivers, etc., and indicating the distance from the air.

2. The use of military conventional signs and symbols is desired. Lack of knowledge of same will not be allowed to stop preparations.

3. All maps, overlays, sketches and charts are to be submitted to this headquarters in duplicate.

Section III - REPORTS

1. The initial reports will follow the outline contained in intelligence circulars and contain as much information as is available.

2. Subsequent reports will be submitted as soon as additional information is obtained or the information previously reported becomes obsolete due to changes, enemy movements, etc.

3. It is not necessary to submit the same information more than once.

When reports reach this headquarters, receipt of same will be acknowledged.

1. Hereunder is circular No. 3 for your guidance.

Section 1 - OCCUPIED AERODROMES AND SEAPLANE BASES.

The following information, regarding aerodromes and seaplanes bases that are being used by the enemy air forces is to be submitted to this headquarters.

NAME:

1. Japanese Army name and also former name.

2. Location. If at the same location as former Philippine Army, United States Army, or commercial or private aerodromes, then correct name, as used prior to 8 December, 1941, will be sufficient information regarding the location. If it is a newly constructed aerodrome, detailed information as to the location must be submitted. A map which includes nearby towns, roads, railroads, rivers, telegraph lines, telephone lines, electric power lines and prominent mountains as well as the location of the aerodrome is desired.

3. Runways or landing strips:

a. Length and width

b. Direction - North-south, Southeast-Northwest, etc.

c. Type surfacing-Concrete, grass, crushed rock, etc.

d. Approaches-Distances to nearest trees, buildings, etc.,

from end or runways and estimated heights of same.

e. Night lighting facilities-Location and color of lights and whether permanent or temporary installations.

f. Camouflage-Obstructions on runways when not in use, coloring, etc.

g. Can landing strips be extended? How much?

4. Taxiways- Routes by which airplanes are moved to and from the landing strips:

a. Location, type surfacing, etc.

b. Method of moving airplanes on taxiways-By their own power, men pushing them, tugs, tractor, etc.

c. Camouflage or obstructions on taxiways when they are not in use

5. Airplanes servicing facilities:

a. Location and number of refueling points.

b. Method of refueling-By hand with cans, by pumps direct from storage tanks, by special servicing trucks, etc.

c. Location of bomb loading point.

d. Method of loading bombs-by hand, with trucks, special carriers.

e. Place where minor repairs are made to airplanes, runways, in revetments, in hangars, on taxiways, etc.

f. Are plane tanks drained at night?

6. Radio Facilities:

a. Location of Stations, direction finders, etc.

b. Location of antenna or aerial towers, etc.

c. Source of power-Commercial electric, portable auxiliary electric power plants, batteries, etc., and location of same.

7. Installations- Give location, size, type construction etc., of the following:

a. Hangars

b. Fuel and oil dumps-include estimated quantity on hand.

c. Ammunition and bomb dumps-includes estimated quantity on hand.

d. Repair and Machine shops.

e. Supply and replacement depots

f. Barracks and other quarters for officers and men

g. Water supply

h. Anti-Aircraft batteries, searchlights and other such installations may be located at distances as much as 25 to 40 kilometers from the field.

8. Defense Facilities and measures-Give locations, size, type constructions, etc.

a. Trenches

b. Machine gun nests-include number and caliber of guns.

c. Bomb proof shelters

d. Guard posts

e. Anti-aircraft defense-Include number and caliber of guns.

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- f. Searchlights, batteries-Include size of lights.
- g. Barbed wire, etc.
- h. Anti-Aircraft batteries, searchlights and other such installations may be located at distances as much as 25 to 40 kilometers from the field.
9. Airplanes and Enemy Air Activities:
- a. Members and type of plane on the fields or or observed in air.
- b. Japanese airplanes classified the same U.S. Airplanes, however if this system is not understood by the observer, such as formation as number and location of wings; number of engines; number of cockpits; size and location of guns; size and crew carried, etc. should be stated.
- c. Whether or not airplanes is habitually station at the airfield or are considered transient.
- d. activities for which airplanes are used- reconnaissance patrols, trailing flights and tactics used, serial gunnery practice, practice bombing, etc.
- e. Time and direction of arrival and departures.
- f. Air fields approach procedure.
- g. Do flights follow any regular schedule? If no, What are they?
- g. arrival of aircraft not previously based in Philippines: departure of air craft from Philippines- particularly large formation Destination or place from which planes come is important.

- (2). Are airplanes habitually kept in hangars or other buildings? If so give the location and capacity of same.
- (3) Are airplanes kept in flying field or under cover of nearby trees. Give locations of areas, number of planes, type of trees or cover, etc.
- (4) Methods and materials used to camouflage planes on the ground.
- (5) Are there any dummy airplanes on the field? If so give location of same.
- j. Rendezvous location of fighters with bombers.
- k. Visual sighting methods, i.e., air-ground, ground-air and plane to plane (using signals, lamps, rackets, flares, etc.) etc especially practice used in training and for airfield approach.
- l. Report airplanes failing to return from offensive mission.
- m. Are plane for ferrying or freight carrying? Nature of freight of personnel carried.
- n. Report of unusual concentrations of transport planes include location and dates.
10. Air Order of Battle
- a. Air units (4th Air Army, 12th Air Bd. etc. or 76th Ind. Air Regt.)
- (1) Size, type, number of pilots and enlisted men, etc.
- (2) Names, code names, or code numbers of Units. Code name usually appears on board or flag outside HQ.
- (3) Ranks, names duties of air officers (First and last name.)
- (4) Figures, letters or emblems on airplanes.
- (5) Battle participated in and former location of units.
- (6) District or section of Japan troops lived prior to military service.
- (7) Where do troops sleep, eat, etc.,
- (8) Statement of morals.
- (9) Where do pilots and officers live?
- (10) What markings are on staff cars?
11. Personnel
- a. State discipline and morale prevailing in units stationed in P.I. In units arriving from or departing for other stations.
- b. Complaints of or dissatisfaction with military service, with respect to the conditions in Japan.
- c. Matters bearing on state of morale in the Japanese army or in Japan.
- d. What diseases are prevalent among units? What proportions are lost from duty by diseases? For what periods? How many die?
12. Other Personnel.
- a. Are Filipinos or other laborers employed on the ~~expedite~~ and in what capacity are they employed?

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- b. Do such employees live on the aerodrome or in the nearby towns or barrios?
 - c. Names of such employees who are loyal to the United States.
13. Recreational facilities:
- a. What recreational facilities are available to the officers and men in nearby towns or barrios?
 - b. Names of people in the entertainment business that the enemy participate in and whether or not they are loyal to the United States.
14. Transportation facilities other than air:
- a. What transportation facilities, other than air, are used by the troops stationed at the aerodrome for transportation of personnel, supplies, etc. Such as trucks, railroad, etc.
 - b. Give size and names of trucks.
 - c. If the railroad facilities are used give name and location of the railroad and a map or chart shewing routes used to go to and from the railroad.

Section II - DUMMY AERODROMES

1. It is a common practice of most armies to prepare dummy aerodromes for the purpose of confusing and misleading their enemies.
2. In the event any such dummy aerodromes are detected, all information contained in Section I, above, that is applicable and all other available information will be reported.

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Section III - General

1. Every effort will be made to handle these reports with maximum secrecy and to keep same from falling into enemy hands. Only personnel directly concerned with such reports should be given any knowledge of the same.

10. Artillery emplacements. Report location, type, construction, caliber of guns, etc.

Section 11 - ORGANIZATION AND EQUIPMENT

1. Organization.
 - a. Branch of service? (Infantry, Field Artillery, etc.)
 - b. Unit? (Company, Regiment, Detachment, etc.)
 - c. Strength? Give number of officers and enlisted men.
 - d. Japanese Army designation? (3rd Co., 236 regt., etc.)

 - d. Type and quantity of munitions available? In what amount is each type stocked?
 - e. Description of tanks and other mechanized combat vehicles? What type (Light, medium or heavy?) Give weight, armament and whether amphibious or land going.
 - f. Descriptions of chemical equipments: Give quantity and nature of gas, smoke and other munitions.
 - g. Communication equipment: Give description of telegraph, radio and visual signalling equipment in

- troops. What quantities? Does there appear to be shortages?
- h. What types of heavy equipment (Hull Diggers, tractor, grader, power shovels) and what type of building materials are used in construction of roads and military installations by the Japanese. What items are procured or seized locally? (1) Report movement of any of these items out of the Philippines. Give destinations if at all obtainable.
 - i. Detailed description of any new items of military equipment appearing in P.I.7 (Particularly new or improved types of guns, tanks, and Radar equipment. Give qualities of each type observed.
 - j. Report all obtainable information on effectiveness of all Japanese weapons and with Allied weapons.

3. Location and capacity of refineries and fuel tanks? What type of gasoline or oil manufactured or stocked. (Aviation, motor, etc.)
4. Types and amount of supplies procured locally or from other areas in the Philippines? Proportion of supplies from Philippines to that brought from Japan or elsewhere?

Section IV - COMMUNICATION FACILITIES AND LINES OF COMMUNICATIONS

1. What land and water routes are used by the Japanese for supply communications and troops movements?
2. What other land and water routes are not now used, or used infrequently, are available?
 - a. For each land route reported on 1 or 2, above, give type (improved road, track, trail) surface (paved, unimproved,) width, vehicle capacity, and state of maintenance (all weather, dry-weather, etc.) Important defiles (bridges, mountain passes, fills, etc. on land routes.)
 - b. Report number and type of vehicles used in specific movements. Also numbers, types and location of vehicles observed in parking areas, where observed?
 - c. What are local transports used? To what extent? How much available and where?
 - d. Barges: Report number, size and location. Are they used for supply and troop movements? Between what points and areas? Note: This is a new and important development in Japanese army supply movement and should be watched carefully.
 - e. Other types of vessels used for supply and troops movements? Give number and description of each type. Between what points and areas are they used?
 - f. Small craft including barges, etc. What used do the Japanese make of these craft? What cargoes are normally carried? What controls on this traffic are enforced by the Japanese?
 - g. What railroads are used for enemy supply and troops movements? Between what points and areas?
 - h. What railroads are used for supply and troops movements?
 - i. What routes are used to get to and from the railheads?
 - j. What communication facilities are used by the enemy? (Telephone, telegraph and radio.) Where are stations located? Between what points do these facilities operate.

Section V - ENEMY INTENTIONS AND ACTIVITIES

1. Report date of arrival of troops in Philippines. Give strength, branch of service, composition and equipments. From what area (China, SEPA, etc.)? Give character of troops. Replacements, detachments, whole units.)
2. Report date of departure of troops from the Philippines. Give strength, branch of service, composition and equipments. Give destination if at all possible to obtain.
3. Note assembly of troops in embarkation points. Report date and purpose of assembly. Particularly note units previously reported in Philippines.
4. Note assembly of unusual numbers of cargo vessels at any point. Report date of assembly, number and type and size of vessels.
5. Report construction of defensive works. Give general description of work.

6. Are defenses fully manned, lightly held or unoccupied?
7. Note development of strategic points?
8. Report all troops movements. Give strength, composition, organization, origin, destination and transportation used.
9. Patrols: Report strength, mission, origin, destination, date and results.
10. Report all combats with guerrillas, give dates, names of units, place and results.

Section VI - TRAINING AND TACTICS

1. Report types of training, maneuvers and daily drills of units. Pay particular attention to new and unusual methods of training.
2. Obtain and report information on offensive and defensive tactical principles and methods.
3. Has any training been noted in tactical methods not previously used by the Japanese?
4. What proportion of training time is devoted to night operation and daylight operations?
5. What is the character of training given to chemical troops? Is training conducted in using gas? What types of gas?
6. Do service troops (Quartermaster, Signal Corps, etc.) receive training in use of weapons or occupation on defensive positions?
7. Report any training in amphibious warfare. In landing and unloading from sea borne vessels. The strength of units receiving this training is important.
8. To what extent are field exercises and maneuvers conducted by forces composed of different branches of the service?
9. To what extent are ground and naval airforces trained in coordinated action?
10. How do the Japanese use artillery? What missions are assigned each caliber of guns? What methods of fire control are used? How does the Artillery cooperate with the infantry?
11. How does the airforce support ground troops? What methods of coordinations are used? (Flares, panels, smoke, etc.) How do ground troops identify their position to airplanes?

Section VII - MORALE AND DISCIPLINE

1. Statement of discipline and morale of units stations in P. I. In units arriving from or departing for other stations?
2. Complaints of, or dissatisfaction with military service, with respect to conditions in Japan?
3. Report matters bearing on state of morale in Japanese army or in Japan.
4. What diseases are prevalent among Japanese troops? What proportion are lost from duty by disease? For what periods? How many die?

Section VIII - PERSONNELS

1. Are any non-Japanese personnel in Japanese army service? What kind? (Chinese, Filipinos, Koreans, etc.)
2. Do all members of the Japanese army always wear the uniform? What other types of clothing are worn?
3. Civilians: Are any used by the Japanese Army? In what capacity? Japanese, Filipinos or others? Were they residents of the P. I. prior to the war? Give names and past history if obtainable. Give names of Filipinos employed by the Japanese army that are loyal to the United States.
4. Are women used in the Japanese Army? What duties do they perform? Give names; Report names of women employed by the Japanese Army who are loyal to the United States.

Section IX - GENERAL

1. What is the organization of the Takamu "ikan"? Is it completely a part of the Army? What functions does it perform in the Philippines? (The Takamu Kikan is a spy-counter espionage propaganda organization. It may be connected with the Bureau of Constabulary or Police and obtain information on both civilian and military activities.)
2. Detailed maps showing enemy facilities, installations, routes, used buildings occupied, etc. should be prepared whatever possible and submitted to this headquarters in duplicate.
3. Detailed maps of ports, camps and stations should be prepared and submitted to this headquarters in duplicate. Show all installations, barracks, etc.; water supply, mess halls, radio stations, supply dumps, etc.)

Section X - BUREAU OF CONSTABULARY

1. Give detailed location of all Bureau of Constabulary units.
2. Report strength and equipment of such unit.
3. What duties do they perform? (patrols, inspections, etc.)
4. Give names and rank of all Bureau of Constabulary officers and men. Indicate if they are loyal to the United States.
5. Are Japanese Army personnel assigned to U. S. units? Do they accompany U. S. units on patrols, etc.?

- TO: ALL COMMANDERS IN CHARGE. (Make copies and forward to all adjacent Units.)
1. Ref. Par. 1, Policy, dated 10 Feb. and Supp. Instr., dated 20 Mar.
 - (a) All the exceptions as listed herein, the Instr. and order's contained in the 10 Feb. mentioned ref. will continue in force.
 - (b) Until further orders the following information will not be sent from one unit to another.
 1. Par. 7 Upp. Instr. (No information concerning guerrilla units will be given. This information should be collected by unit leaders. Ref. to para 1, Policy, dated 10 Feb. and Supp. Instr. called for.)
 2. Par. 8 Upp. Instr. (No information concerning "aircrews, civilian or Army, will be forwarded until called for.)
 3. Par. 9 Upp. Instr. (same as (1) above)
 2. For the information of all concerned, it is believed that 11 codes used to date have fallen into the hands of the Japs. In this connection, unit leaders should safe guard their records in such a manner they will not fall into the hands of the enemy even through your R. is raided. Many civilians, who were helping our cause, have suffered due to records falling into the hands of the ~~heads~~ of the Japs.
 3. Promotions, enlisted men- In order to comply with Par. (1) above, unit commanders will make promotions within their commands as they deem necessary, stating on each promotion, subject to approval by highest R. Unit commanders are cautioned to use good judgement and discretion in the number of NCOs. They carry in their organizations.
 4. Promotion of Officers- In order to comply with Par. (1) above, unit leaders will inform their officers that although they may be deserving of promotion, it is dangerous to communicate such matters at the present time. The work of those deserving will not be overlooked when the proper time comes, and I will do everything in my power to see that those whom I know are given every opportunity.
 5. Each unit R. will make every effort to exchange information with adjacent units at frequent intervals.
 6. Let us urge each and every officer and man not to be discouraged due to our recent events. These unfortunate happenings should only make us all the more determined to carry out our mission and do our part in securing in the ultimate VICTORY which is sure to be ours in the near future.
 7. Ref. Supp. Instr., dated 20 March 43.
 - (a) Information required by the following par. is still lacking: Par. 4, Par. 5, and par. 3 as pertaining to the area south of Manila.
 - (b) In general more information is desired concerning all enemies.
 - (c) Unit leaders are also cautioned that it is important to report changes in information that they have submitted in previous reports.
 8. Unit commanders are reminded that although gathering information is our main mission at present, plans for active operation against enemy communications, supply dumps, and embushing are not to be neglected. Due to slow communications, commanders will not wait on orders from higher R., but will commence action when he has assured himself that aid has reached the Philippines.
