F. Mare full use of ALL so ross of information. Loyal officials; workers in fer manushinghouses bases, compress, when the should be utilized as sources of information. Lastly, make ise of the Japa themselves as sources of information. Have all persons who have an opportunity to talk to Jap officers and soldiers try. to get the following information: (1) flow long has the Jap been in the Philippines?, (2) Where was he stationed before coming to P.I.
