I AM NUMB STRANGER, a Lieutenant Colonel of the U. S. Army retirement up the data of September 30, 1935. From the data of my retirement up to the outbreak of the war, I had been meaning my coal mines at the berric of Surdeus, Polilio Island, Tayabas, Philippines, And after the occupation of Benila by the Imperial Japanese Army and the heaty retreat of the UEAFFE to Betaan and Corregidor, I remed in the mountains of Laguna, Tayabas, and Rigal for about 25 months, roving from the mountains east of Jala-Jala to the foothills of Sembrano Rountain.

I organised a guerrilla band, called it the "Filipino-American Irregular Troops," and styled guyeff the commander of the same. I have never had any official connection, nor any communication, with the U.S. Affay outside of the Filipines, and thus did not organise or command my band under the order of suggestions of McArthur's Beadquarters or any other authorized and properly qualified quarters.

The Filipino-American Irregular Troops, therefore, was nothing but a make-believe organization, and materially composed of bandits, outlaws and other disastisfied elements without effective arms or weepons. As a result of that, we have not, and could never have, challenged or attacked the Japanese army.

I think that I moved from place to place about 25 times duving the period of 20 months that I remeined in hiding. We hardly stayed off hunger by esting fruits in the hazardous mountains and the plants ing fields. We ate suything that we could lay our hands on, for example, benames, papeyas, occounts, or other wild fruits. Many nights, without any shelter, we hid and slept in old mine-tumnels, hollow reasong the rocks, or in the swamps. The life which we led was utterly miscreble and comparable only to the besterous lives led by the Actas.

My primitive life in the wilderness was made possible only through the experience which I have gained during my stay in the Philippines for the last 43 years. My weight, however, decreased by over 100 pounds during the time which I spent in hiding.

The guerrilla unit, so called "Marking Guerrilla", was either annihilated by the Jepanese punitive expeditions, or dissolved through voluntary desertions; the group became so small since March 1943, that it has to be formally disharded on May 19th. Thereafter, no Filipino-American Irregular Troops, nor guerrillas, existed under my direction or command.

As we called ourselves "irregular troops," we were taken for pseudo or imitation soldiers, but actually our units consisted mostly of bandits and other outlaws disguised as patriots.

I said before that we bought articles and commodities by querrilla Notes," "I.O.U's." or "Credit Notes," but actually we merety robbed or foreibly confiscated anything that we wanted.

Subject: D-Day Instructions for Civilians and Soldiers All District Commanders, USAFIP, NL.

1. Word has been received from Higher HQ that, in order to reduce to a minimum accidental deaths of soldders and civilians, the following rules MEST be observed by civilians and soldders in the event your area becomes a theater of operations.

(a) NO soldier or civilian should approach within the vicinity of any American position in a combat area unless by specific arrangements. This is necessary, due to the fact that the American troops can not clearly distinguish between a Japanese and a Filipino, and the fact that Japanese often make use of irrigular uniforms and civilian disguise, American troops will without hesita-

tion, fire upon and till any person not observing this rule.

(b) No individual soldier or civilians must approach or wender within the vicinity of American outposts or lines in a combat area at night unless by specific arrangements. If they do, they

will be fired upon. 2. In connection with the above, all Japanese uniforms and equipment (other than arm and ammunition) now in the possession of members of this command will be destroyed and wearing of same will be se-

I have the honor to inform you that Major Manraques, the fellow who surrendered to you last becember, 1943, was captured by the Guerrillas in this Prowince early this month. This information was told to me by an eye-witness who is my friend.

According to the informant, Major Manreques was fought by the guerrillas while he was looking for his solidiers (pagetora) this Province under the unit of Capt. Tomas Acop. The informant said the guerrillas found in the possession of the Major the ammesty papers he subscribed to you, if I recall right it was Special Pelice of your êffice on Pacification drive. The Major was contacting his men to avail themselves of the ammesty preclamation and to surrender. The guerrillas here are killing any suspected person fought without mercy.

I do not know myself the Major, but I heard he was a very good fellow. I have not met or known you personally, but inasmuch as the Major surrendered to you, I am informing you this for whatever action you may take.
