Subject: Attempt to Locate and Spot Artillery Fire on Enemy Gun Positions in the Vicinty of Ternate, P.I.

To: Commanding General, Harbor Defenses of Manila Bay, Fort Mills, P. I. (Through Charmels)

 The following is a narrative report of the attempt made to locate, and spot artillery fire on, enemy gun positions in the vicinity of Ternate, P.T.

On February 7, 1948, the original detail, consisting of the undersigned and two civilians, in: Canfield and in: Bakkins, lett Fort Wills at 7,00 p.m. abourd the ration boat for Fort Frank. Equipment carried included for radio cets ("Mailet Falkie"), maps of the area in question, cipher device, field glasses, poskst compass, and Thompson sub-machine game.

Upon arrival at Fort Frank trips were make to the mainland to contact guides which had been previously used by its familed and Backus on a recomnaissance of the Ternate area. After three trips in the notorbance, guides were finally produced and the detail landed in Cayeono Gove at approximately 4:00 a.m. February 8, 1942.

Although the matires assured us that no enemy had been to berrio.
Cayonno up until that time, the detail passed the day of Pebruary 8th in a cave on Restings Ridge. During the morning several rounds were fired by Fort Frank in the vicinity of Cayoono Cove, some of which landed close enough for us to 6ell a very elight concussion.

Immediately arter dark on February 8th the party proceeded to a ridge socuted by the guides during the day and from which they assured us a view of the Termate area could be had. This position was reached by dawn on February 8th. The position afforded but a limited view of the Termate area, but Sapong point was clearly visible. Activity was observed on Sapong Point, and ammpictous-looking chyects were visible. Fire was requested and adjusted on this point. The enemy fired several rounds during the morning, which rounds clearly case from a point on which we had no observation. Consequently the guides were sent out the maxt day to book for a more favorable location. All day February 10th was spent in more or lessefruitless observation.

After dark on February 10th, the datall started for the new position. In less than two hours a heavy wood was reached through which the guides could not take us in the dark, particularly since there was a very poor moon. Consequently the party waited until dawn of February 11th to proceed to position, reaching sense at approximately 8:00 a.m. This position was found to

afford excellent observation of the Terrate-Maragonden area, except that the bridges across the river were obscured by a small hill just wast of the river bank. Constant observation during the lith disclosed energy activity in the edge of some words which bendered a rice field on the west side of the Maragondon River, and South of Sapong. During the aftername a truck full of men was seen to enter this rice field, drive across it and disappear in the woods. Just before sunset the snewy fired about six rounds from the vicinity of the woods into which the truck disappeared. Fire was requested and adjusted an these woods. It is to be noted that no flash was visible to the observing datail, nor ould smoke or dust be seen drifting us after the rounds were fired,

On February 12th observation was continued and fire was requested and adjusted on Sapong barrie and again on the woods from which the sound of firing the evening before had seemed to come. During the firing on the woods a small detail of enemy, about ten, ran out of the woods and across the rice field toward the Maragendom River.

One of the guides had been back to Cayconn Cove the night of February 11th to get additional rations and another battery for the radios. We ate the last of the initial rations on the morning of February 12th, but expected the guide back with additional rations by 8:00 a.m. At about 11:15 a.m. a native who lived approximately one kilometer from our position came running towards us indicating that an enemy patrol of from twenty to thirty strong was approaching our position. His story was that this patrol had come to his house and caught him by the wrist and insisted that he show them where the Americans were. He had wrenched loose and rum into the woods and come to tell us. Our two guides upon hearing this news disappeared. The detail withdrew into the woods to a spot which could be easily defended and waited for developments. As nothing happened in about an hour, the detail once more took up position where observation could be had. However, it was obvious that unless the guide showed up with the food, we would have to start back to position so the detail of three started back carrying all equipment except blankets and shelter haves, which were hidden in the woods. In as much as we had done most of our traveling at night, we became confused on the trials and finally reached Paniman Cove at about 9:00 p.m. We reached Cayeono Cove at about 11:00 p.m. where we were met bys motor-banco form Fort Frank, which arrangement had been previously made by radio to Fort Mills.

On February 13, 1942, a report of the circumstances was made to 8-2, Barbor Denfences of Munits Bay, and a decision made to return to the field for further observation. The detail this time was to consist of fire volunteer emilsted men, two assricans, three Philippins Scotts, and the undersigned.

The Americans, Staff Sergeant Boyd and Cerperal Norrison, both of the 60th C.A. (AM), arrived at 8:00 pas. February 13, 1082 by special boat. The undersigned found it necessary to go to Cavonno Cove to get one of the guides previously used and considered as reliable as supons excitable. The party, including the three socute, Cerperal Buttiete, Private Diognée, and Private Mennes, all of the 91st C.A. (FC), left Fort Frank at short indispit in the Desire of the County of the

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was pulling three bancos. We arrived at Looc Cove and disembarked at daybrank.

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Forwary 14, 1942, the party hid in the woods while an additional guide and six porters were rounded up for us by one of Captain Encode's sem. At dark the detail started for position via Loo Sarrio. It was the intention of the undersigned to walk Zime all night or reach position before same. However, upon reaching the mountains it was found impossible to advance because there was no moon. The party onesquently slept until daws and continued through the heavily wooded mountains until comparatively open country was reached when another half for the day was adde. On the evening of the lifth the march was continued and the detail came within a few minutes clash of the position. The porters were dismissed and the party entered the position carly in the morning of the 16th. The positions used was the same as before, although it had been intended to change positions. The guides reported after a recommissance made on the 16th that the energy was occupying the position that had been originally intended to use.

The enemy fired heavily during the 16th, but no flashes were visible, nor could senke or dust be seen to arise from the woods from the violating of she has one the sounds. seemed to come. During the afternoon of February left writeness of the fast that the ennew had reconsistered the position the defail was compying were found in the form of empty eigerate packages and a piece of bread evidently from the enemy field ration. Adding this to the fact that no handway had been made in locating enemy positions, it was decided to move to a position closer to the enemy installations, if a suitable position could be found where observation security, and communications could be had similarneously. Express Boyd and Private Dionnes volunteered to reconsistent a hill which everlocked what was apparently the heart of the enemy position. Innamenh as there was no soon, the reconsistence had to be made at dawn. These two soldiers left our position at damn on February 17th.

The runninger of the detail took up position for observation as usual. First Maddoza was assigned to the loft flank, Corporal Bautista to the right flank, Corporal Bourison to the Front, and the two guides to the rear, which was wooded and quite inaccestible. The detail was warned to observe closely for enemy pertrols inasmuch as it was evident the enemy lnew that friendly units had counted this position before. No energy activity was observed in the Tornste area nor did the enemy open fire. At short 10:50 a.m. a message was received from Fort Hills warning that the enemy was in Fetungan, and would likely go to Calumpang. After completing redder transmission, I collapsed the radio equipment and put same back in the edge of the woods. After a few minutes I glances up and observed two soliders coming from behind a bushy tree toward the edge of the woods in which I was sitting.

These soldiers were less than ten yards from me and about three yards from Corporal Mossis n. The Corporal was behind a rock acting as observer to the front and at this moment had his back toward the front. He saw the enemy about the same time as I did. He made no outery, but calmly motioned for me to take cover. Before turning to get my rifle out of a tree directly behind me. I saw four enemy had cleared the tree which obscured my complete vision to the front, and that one of them lunged toward the helpless Corporal Morrison. The Corporal had, unfortunatley, crawled out to the rock, which was less than ten yards from the edge of the wood, without his gun, After produring my gun, I jumped behind the nearest under-growth and opened automatic fire on the spot where the enemy was last seen coming from. I could not see well through the dense under-growth and cannot say what effect. if any, my fire had. However, the enemy immediately opened up a brisk fire. Fire appeared to come from the flanks where Corporal Bautista and Private Mendoza were posted. I fired again with automatic fire and dropped back toward our camp. Because of the nature of the woods I could not see the enemy without unduly exp sing myself, as he had approached to the very edge of the woods before he was observed by us. By that time I reabhed the camp some five minutes later the fire had ceased. Two kake isolated shots were heard off to the left flank from the directimm from which Sergeant Boyd and Corporal Dionnes should be expected to return.

At nightfall we passed around Loos and proceeded to barrio Calayo, reaching this point at about midnight.
