

RECORD of EVERTS
Btry. "B" 91st. C. A. (PS)
Nov. 28, 1941 to May 7, 1942

On the afternoon of Nov. 28, 1941, the Harbor Defences of Manila and Cubic Bays were ordered to quietly man all alert positions. This same status was the same date by forces of the U. S. and Great Britan from Hawaii to Singapore. This battery was ordered out effective at noon Saturday Nov. 29, 1941. The movement was carried out under the direction of 1st. Lt. J. H. Davis Jr.; Capt. Owen being on duty as Field O. D. 2nd. Lt. R. D. Mi ogue, and S enlisted men, under Sgt. Cica manned Btry. "James"; 11 enlisted men under Sgt. Lopex continued their alert manning of James Ravine 0. P. and Beach Defences; 1st. Lt. Davis with 12 enlisted men manned Btry. "Hanna"; and the remaining men, available for battery duty, numbering 40 manned Btry. "Rock Point" under Capt. Owen, with 1st. Lt. D. M. Snell as Range Officer. The personnel was bivouaced in the immediate vicinity of the guns which they placed in readiness to fire and then began to dig themselves in. The kitchen was set up on North Shore Road at Grubbs Ravine for Btrys. "Rock Point" and "Hanna" while a secondary kitchen was established in James Ravine for the detail there and at Btry. "James."

On Dec. 3rd Btry. "B" 1st. CA (FA) commanded by 1st.

It. Am dec Carcia was attached to the Battery for supervision of artillery training and administration. They were
assigned quarters in the Battery's barra cks just vacated,
and divided among the four battery positions.

The evening of Dec. 4th., the Btry. received an order stating that "Enemy aircraft had been positively identified over Zambales and the planes of central Luzon. Our interceptors are standing by with orders to shoot", and later another; "The identifying signal for friendly aircraft tonight fis a red light, repeat, red light. All aircraft not showing this signal will be fired upon. " All antiaircraft machineguns of the Btry. were manned continuously beginning that date. At 3:00 AM Dec 8th. the Battery Commander received a message that, "Hostilities between the United States and Japan commenced this morning." All armament was manned. During that day enemy aircraft was fired upon by the antiaircraft of Pt. Mills. On Dec. 12th. Btry. "B" 1st. CA(PA) moved into bivouse at Btry. "James", taking over the manning of that emplacement, Lt. Minogue and his detail going to Btry. "Hanna" to augment Lt. Davis' detail there, while 3 and 22 enlisted men of the P.A. remained at "Rock Point" and "Hanna". 1st. Lt. Davis was promoted to Captain on Dec. 19th. Btry. placed on a rations Dec. 15. H. D. order. Airial activity by the enemy continued daily out of range of the Harbor Defences until 11:55 AM, Dec. 29th. when some 75 planes heavily bombed the island fortresses in a 3 hour raid. Btry Rock Point" and "Hanna" were straffed and in return, engaged low

flying aircraft and dive-bombers with matching gun fire. No damage nor casualities were suffered at the positions; however, the Btry's. barracks sustained a direct hit by a bomb in the supply room, and was completely destroyed in the resulting fire. In spite of heroic efforts by members of the Btry., under the directions of Lts. Snell and Minogue, much property was lost. Capt. Owen, who in addition to his other duties was in command of the North Subsector of the West Sector, was relieved on Dec. 30th. by Lt. Col. Anderson when the 4th Marines took over the beach mi defences. The airial attack of Dec. 29th. was not repeated with the same intensity until Jan. 2nd. It was a regular noon day occurance then until the 8th, when the enemy were obviously driven off by our A. A. Guns, not to return until March 24th., except for a short attack on Jan. 14th. During this period Rock Point suffered 3 attacks by high flying bombers resulting in no casualties and with damages limited to tentage and individual equipment. Personnel of the Battery, as well as members of Btry. "B", 1st. CA(PA) concucted themselves admirably under their baptism of fire, and carned the citation awarded them, with other units of the Harbor Defenses, by the War Dept. for the galant conduct of the defence of Manila and Cubic Bays, during that period.

About Jan. 8th. Manuel Quezon, Pres. of the Commonwealth, accompanied by his staff inspected and greeted Btry. "James" and its personnel. A regular Christmas party was DECLASSIFIED

held at the main Btry. Mess. which was beautifly decorated with palms, flowers and ferns. An excellent chow was provided and a small gift was presented to each member of the Btry. The latter part of Jan. Sgt. Lopez and his detail which had remained at James Ravine, returned for duty at "Rock Point" and "Hanna". On Feb. 7th. Capt. Davis was transferred to "F" Btry. at Ft. Frank, to replace the battery commander who had been seriously wounded, and Capt. A. E. Durie was transferred in from Btry. "G" to replace him at "Hanna". The 19th of the same month Btry. "B", 1st. CA PA), less the details at Btrys. "Rock Point" and "Hanna" was placed under the supervision of Major R. F. Haggerty, 91st. CA[PS), who had just recently returned from Philippine Dept. Engineers. The Battery commander and all our enlisted men enjoyed their association with, and respected the courage of Lt. Carcia and his men; with whom a close and intimate contact was maintained in a personal way until the end of the siege. During the early part of March the Btry. lost 2 men by transfer; Pvt. Mastjo to the 22nd. CA(PS), who hand Pvt. Viray to Btry. "F", 91st. at the request of Capt. Davis. At about the same time 5 men were attached from Hirs. Btry. and assigned to Btry. "Hanna" and 2 men were newly enlisted, Baldandato and Perez.

Corp. Masias, who was on special duty as antiaircraft machine gunner aboard the Harbor Boat "Neptune", was wounded March 8th. when that craft was shelled and sunk at Pt. Prank, by enemy batteries on the Cavite Shore. Capt. Owen



went to Bataan on the 12th of March, visiting the front lines and artillery positions. About the middle of the month Supply Sgt. Hombre was placed on Special Duty with the Harbor Defence Q. N., and Corp. Oriaz, recently promoted, took over his duties. On the 26th, 1st. Lt. Smill went to Bataan with Corp. Ciquijor and a detail to obtain bamboo for improving the fortifications and bivouse area.

The morning of Mar. 24th. the Harbor Defences were furiously attacked by high flying bombers. These attacks continued daily from high altitudes, developing into day long alerts, with a few ineffective night bombings. On the 27th. and again on the 30th., Btry. "Rock Point" was the target of these bombers; but again there were no casualties, and damage was limited to individual equipment. Capt. B. H. Blackstrom, was transferred to the Btry. from Hgrs. Btry. on Mar. 28th. Rataan on April 9th. was preceded by a lessening of airial bombardment on Ft. Mills but signaled the beginning of artillery shelling of great intensity. On the morning of April 9th. Btry. "Hanna", fired several rounds across the bows of 3 friendly torpedo boats, escaping from Bataan, trying to make reported a destroyer, to the westward followed by 8 smaller craft. At 6:00 PM, 8 landing-barges suddenly rounded Hornos Point, attempting to enter Maraveles "arbor. They were taken under fire by "Rock Point" and "Hanna" as well as Btry. "Sunset" . None of the enemy accomplished his mission, and three were probably sunk, of which Btry. "Rock Point" was credited with two. The first enemy shells from Bataan landed on Corregidor at 3:00 PM the 9th of April; and the next morning "Rock Point" was shelled without appreceiable damage. That afternoon however, a heavier bombardment put No. 2 gun out of action, and did some damage to the fortifications and bivouac area. Harbor Defence Hors., on the morning of April 12th. recinded its orders, not to fire on Bataan because of the movements of our surrendered towops, and Btry. "Rock Point" fired 105 rounds with No. 1 gun, in counter battery. The concentration of enemy batteries in the vicinity of Cabcabin made it necessary to use No. 1 gun at "Rock Point" almost exclusively in that it was the only one capable of being traversed to that azimuth. The Battery was taken under fire by the enemy, without appreciable damage, and in the afternoon No. 2 gun section fired 88 rounds from No. 1 gun in counter-battery; to which the enemy replied. The next morning "Rock Point" fired 38 rounds at an enemy battery at Cabcabin, but was immediately subjected to heavy counter-battery and the gun knocked out. It was repaired that night and on the morning of the 14th opened up with 51 rounds in counter-battery, receiving commendation from the Seaward Defence Commander for the results obtained. In the afternoon 27 rounds were also fired. At 5:00 PM the enemy heavily shelled "Rock Point" causing considerable damage to the fortifications of No. 1 gun. As soon as the bombardment ceased all personnell

fell to and cleared up the debris and were in the act of repairing the parapet when, at 8:00 PM the emplacement was suddently engaged by several enemy batteries, which sub-'jected it to a furious shelling; catching many of the men atop the fortifications and exposed all about. Pvt. Dagsa of the Btry. and Pvt. of "B", 1st CA (PA), attached, were killed immediately; while Capt. Owen received shell splinters through the leg, Pfc. Pauli and Pvt. Zabala of the Btry., and Pvt. Nevarha of Hqrs. Btry. attached suffered slighter wounds. Capt. Backstrom assumed command of the Battery, with station at "Rock Point." The next morning No. 1 gun fired some 20 rounds at enemy batteries near Cabcabin, and again received enemy reply. It was decided to remove this gun to a less exposed position; and on the 19th it was emplaced on the Rifle Range. 1st Lt. Karl L. Ek of the 88th F.A. (P.S.) (escaped from Bataan) was assigned to the Btry. from March 15 to 22nd incl. He was in command of the gun at the Rifle Range when on the 21st it was given its first mission. There was heavy shelling in the area when the first round was fired. After the fourth was on the way, it was evident that the position was being adjusted upon. The gun section, however, continued to fire, getting off nine rounds in spite of enemy shells bursting about their gun. They then took cover only a couple of minutes before a direct hit put the gun completely out of action for the remainder of the siege. No. 2 gun was

knocked out for about a week by a direct hit, during a heavy artillery bombardment of the "Rock Point" area, which also destroyed the B.C. Station and Telephone dugout.

Heavy shelling of Ft. Mills continued throughout April until the surrender, "Batteries Rock Foint and Hanna" receiving their proportionate share in the area bemberdment. On three occasions Btry. "Hanna" was the target of enemy batteries, during one of which shellings No. 1 gun was put out of action for 2 days by a direct hit in the gun pit. No further damage, nor appreciable material damage was suffered by the Btry. 1st Lt. C.C. Shupp was transferred into the Battery the latter part of April from Stry. "A" and assigned to Btry. "Hanna."

The kitchen area, though idealy located, so far as circumstances permitted, and well protected was surrounded by important targets and many times daily was subjected to danger from flying shell or bomb splinters, as well as stones and debris from the enemy's shorts and overs. Throughout the entire siege the Etry, prepared and manned local beach defences, and on numerous occasions furnished patrols which searched the beaches for enery agents engaged in signaling by means of lights and flares.

The enemy attack increased in fury the latter days of April, and at about 9:00 PM, May 5th a heavy artillery barrage was directed on Pt. Mills, covering the area from "Bottom "Side" eastward, and maintained until after midnight. This barrage lifted off the beach at about 10:00 PM and the enemy

effected a landing at "North Point." A beach head was established and they slowly advanced, behind their devistating barrage; with very heavy losses. Early next morning a heavy attack was launched by high flying and dive bombers, strafing planes and artillery; while the enemy troops continued their slow but steady advance, now aided by tanks and flame throwers. At 11:00 AM. that memorable 6th of May, Capt. Backstrom received orders from Lt. Col. F.A. Mitchell, Group 1V, Executive and Batallion Comm'dr., to destroy all military equipment of value before noon. This was done, and all firing from the Harbor Defences ceased. The enemy continued sporadic bombing, straffing and shelling throughout the afternoon and night. At 4:00 AM the next morning, May 7th, orders were received to proceed to "Stockade Level", clearing "Top Side" by 7:00 AM. The Btry. was assembled and marched down, being intercepted at "Middle Side" by Nipponese troops, who searched them. They proceeded under escort to "Malinta Tunnel," where no apparent notice was taken of them until well afternoon. At that time the battery was separated when all officers were ordered to go to the east end of the tunnel. The next day all prisoners of war were corraled in the 92nd Garage area, the Americans and Filipones segrigated.
