Re-Disposition of Com onwealth Treasury funds in Corregider, Dec. 1941 to apr 1942.

- Yeult in Correction. The Commenced the Government had a wealt in Correction, and in December of 1941, part of the Covernment Treasury fundawere kept there.
- 2. Transfer of funds from Manila. When the Commonwealth Government moves its afte to Gerreridor from Amila, it brought alone with it free any Funds in paper and silver, and deposted pame in the wealt on the inland.
- 3. Above information hearsay. I have no direct personal knowledge of above facts. By statement is based on information gathered at Corregidor from flow resent efficiels when a was transferred from the tan to the Office of the Fresident of the Hilippine s on S/D in February of 1942.
- 4. Condension of Currency. Soon after having into Corregidor, President I. A queen foreast the savisability of destroying the paper currency held in the Government vault against the estemblish that it fell into the hands of the energy as a result of the fortures of un. A condension committee was repointed by the Tresident to do this work. On the committee was called in the Court of the Court
- 5. We need reach to Correction. On 19 Feb 1962, Pres dueson and his party being about to be evenuated from Correction, the three nembers maned arms were substituted in the Correction by then Lt. Col. Hennel Hoxes, Col. Hours Seith and Col. N. C. Jonks.

- 7. Receit sired by new Committee. The new Committee made an inventory of the wallt, without checking the contents of each case, however and aigned proper receipte, the original of which was handed to Bes. Sprawm.Osmene.
- 6. Procedure adopted by new Co mittee. The new Committee proceeded with the work of destroying the Treasury funds in the weult, the following procedure being adopted and invariably followed:
 - a. Authority use first issued, in the mase o'the Free, by th, Col, Hennel Rozza, in his capacity as Acting See, to the Pres., to the condensation Committee, to destroy the paper currency contained in a piven number of cases, showing the markings of each and the total ascent and the different decominations of the bills contained the ect.
 - b. Upon receipt of this authority, the three nembers of the Committee then proceeded to thousalt, using their respective separate keys to the sain door of the wallt, opened same and, in the presence of each other,

withdrew the boxes mentioned in the President's paper, checked the contents of each box, emptying same into improvised furcased prepared just outside the tault, set the paper currency on fire and watched it burn to the end.

- c. A certificate of destruction was then prpeared in writing, giving the markings of each case and the totals and denomination of the currency just destroyed. This certificate was signed by all three members, each of whom kept
- d. Later, when frequent enemy raids made it thusafe to burn the paper currency out in the open, proxisions were made to have all condemned bank notes clipped with scissors into small pieces, clippings being collected in empty boxed and later burnt at leisure outside the tunnels. Lateral No. 16, off Palinta tunnel was set aside for this purpose, a number of enlisted men doing the work under direct and constant supervision of a grouppof Finance Officers, one member, at least of the Committee being present at all times.
- 9. Changes in the Committee. When Col Manuel Loxas left Corregidor, on 22 Mar 1942, he was substituted in the Committee by Lt. Col Edwards, Finance Officer Fort Hills, and authority for destruction was issued in the name of the Pres. over my signature by written delegation issued by Col. Noxas before he left. When Col. Smith left Corregidor on 7 April 1942, he was substituted by Lt. Col. Jardeleza.
- 10. Silver currency. By written instructions issued by President Quezon be ore he left, the silver currency, totalling, as I now recollect, seventeen million pesos, was to be handed to Gen. MacArthur, on his call, for destruction. Around the midele of April, upon order of Lt. Gen. J. M. Wainwright, who had succeeded Gen. MacArthur, I turned the silver over Se Major Gen. Moore, Commanding Gen., Fort Mills, who ordered same thrown into the sea off Corregidor.
- 11. Disposal of Treasury Funds. During the period at 19 February to 29 April 1942, the entire contents of the Treasury vault was disposed by other
 - a. Disbursement, duly authorised, cover appretation of bloom
 - (1) Advances to P.A. Finance Officers; (2) Advance to Bataan Provincial Officials; (3) Payment of salaries to Phil. Government
 - personnel stationed at Corregidor.
- b. Cashing of U.S. Treas. Warrants issued by Col. J. R. Vance, Finance Officer, U. S. Army. (all these warrants were destroyed by me in Corregidor after they had been credited to the Treasurer of the Phil. in Washington, D. C.)
 - c. Destruction by Gondennation Committee.
- 12. Balance Left. When I left Corregidor on 29 April 1942, the Government vault had been completely septied, all the currency it had contained having been disposed of as per pars. 10 and 11, above, The only funds left on that date were the sum of \$/17,000,.00 turned over to bt. 13. Funds taken by the President. When Pres Quezon left Corregidor on 19 Feb 1942, he took with him a number of U. S. Army foot lockers containing, as I recollect, seven million pesos, for distribution to the Visavan Provinces. I cannot now definitely recollect whether this sum was turned over to the Pres. by the First Committee, (Pres. Osmena, Sec. Abad Santos, and Maj. Gen. Valdes, or by the Second Committee (Gen. Roxas, Col. Smith and Col. Janks). My recollection of the amount of the Pres. withdrawal is also uncertain.

14. Jewelry found in vault. About the latter part of April, when only a In few more boxed of paper currency were left in the vault, I discovered there one cardboard box with no markings, which was not shown in the inventory. I took this haxxxinxthe box in to the tunnel and opened it in the presence of Lt. contain jewelry which Lt. Vergas identified as belonging to some Manila families who had placed some in the Philippine Mational Bank for safe keeping. I was informed that his box had been turned murn in to High Com. Sayre when he left Manila over to Col. Bowler, Adjutant Gen., ort Mills, who placed the box in the Fort Mills safe located inthe lateral leading into the Hospital tunnel.

15. Daily Record. From the date the Second Committee (Gen.Roxas et al) took over from the First Committee (Pres Osmena and others) I kept a Daily Record showing all business done at the office of the Pres. of the Philippines. This silv Record showed in detail all disbursements and destruction of Government funds and contained proper vouchers and certificated covering same. Daily Records for the earlier period (probably from 19 Feb to 15 Mar. 1942) were mailed to Joaquin M. Elizalde, then Resident Com. for the Phil. at "ashington, D. C. In this first batch of Daily Records there were included the file copies of the receiptmi signed by the Second Committee when it took the Treasury vault over from the first Committee

New With the exception of the group of Daily Records, all other Records up to and including 29 Apr 1942, were taken along by me when I left Corregifor on that date. Prior to surrender, these Daily Records were senreted, on or bbout 5 May 1942, in an earthen wase, cemented close with a china plate, which was embedied embeded in cement five feet underground in Mix Mindanao.

I plan to fly to Mindanao next week to recover this wase to be able to present these Daily Records, which include originals of all Condemnation Certificates and all voucher supporting disbursements made.

16. First Rudit. Before leaving Corregidor, I closed by book as of 28 April 1942, and had all my accounts auditted by the Finance Officer, Philippine Army. The original of this Final Audit is attached to the Daily Record for that date and is among the papers buried in Mindanao.

19. Next report. As soon as I return from Mindanao, I will give you a Supplemental Memarandum. Unless these papers have been tampered with in the three years that have elapsed since that were secreted underground in Mindanao, I expect to give you then a complete detailed report of all transactions, which I have endeavor. ed to review here strictly on recollection of facts, figures and dates.
