April 12, 1944. Graduation ceremonies for the Commissioned Officers' Class, P.C.A. Bldg No. 1 was held at 10:00 AM in the Academy Hall. Highlight of our graduation was the message of His Excellency the President Jose P. Laurel of the Republic of the Philippines.

We are 382 commissioned officers who graduated on this day. There are only 3 1st Lt., 5 2nd Lt., and 372 3rd Lt.

In the afternoon at 2:00 PM sharp the Assistant to the Executive Off, PG Major A. Martinez have read our respective assignments.

I was temporarily assigned in the Hqtrs, 2nd PG Dist Manila, with the rank of a 3rd Lt. We are 57 assigned in the said constabulary district.

Our Special Orders C. S. #84, dated April 10, 1944, shows all the various assignments in the whole PI. On this SO attached is my official appt as regular 3rd Lt, PG with compensation of \$1,680 per annum duly signed and approved by His Excellency. Our official oath as constab. officers was also given on this date.

About 4:00 PM also Lt Manuel Sancho, DO PCA Bldg #1, gave our total clothing allowance due to NCO from December 31, 1943 up to April 12, 1944. My CAFM for the qtr ending Dec. 31, 1943 was \$65.83. Then from January 1 - April 12, 1944 amounts to \$23.80; this is CADQ a total of \$89.63, plus my salary as Cpl. PG from April 1-12, 1944 equal to \$28.80 giving a total of \$118.43. Aside from this salary & CA due on this date \$64.00; a grand total of \$182.00.

My CAFM (Jan 1-April 12, 1944) will be \$40.80 instead of 23.80 giving a difference of \$17.00 which is still due to me, because I am entitled for \$12.00 CA since I am already 1 yr & 5 months in the service.

We are all "big-shots" on this day. Before leaving the Academy we have secured a clearance certif in order that our responsibilities and accountabilities are extinguished from the Academy. No graduates is allowed to leave the Academy without clearing himself first. This was strictly complied with by the 382 grad.

At 6:00 PM I went home bringing with me my diploma.

My appt took effect on April 13, 1944.

This was the termination of our 92 days rigid and strenuous training.

S.O. No. 84, dated April 10, 1944.

April 13, 1944. Effective on this date I was already receiving my pay as 3rd Lt; \$140.00 per month, plus \$42.00 govt bonus and house allowance of \$20.00.

At 10:00 PM, 382 comd officers took their oath in the presence of the Chief of PG General G. Francisco and Col. I. Buencosejo, Executive Officer, PG, made in triplicate forms. Our official oath written in Tagalog and read by our Bn. Comdr 1st Lt. F. Rivera. I have stayed one day in the hqtrs to accomplish all the requirements.

After taking our official oath we reported to our respective Dist Comdrs. We are 56 assigned in the 2nd PG Dist, under Col Fidal Cruz. The said dist. is ~~saxfshshshsh~~ composed of 7 provinces. They are as follows: Pangasinan, Tarlac, N.N., Bulacan, Bataan, Zambales and Pampanga.

We received our Special Orders from his Adjutant, Lt Jose T. Maso, No. 24, dated April 13, 1944.

I was assigned in Pampanga with 1st Lt R Palarca, my co-NCO from Tarlac. We are only 6 assigned in Pampanga.

Before leaving the Hqtrs, PG, Manila I have signed the Transient Officer's Book, showing date of arrival (9:00 AM) and departed from station (6:00 PM April 14, 1944) in the Office of District Comdr. 2nd PG Dist. I was not able to take the first trip because we have so many things to accomplish in the hqtrs.

Immediately after going to the Hqtrs I arranged all my personal belongings ready for departure for Tarlac.

I was given a Transportation Order from Manila to Pampanga for \$1.25.

F-April 14, 1944. I went to the general Hqtrs, on the morning of to signed again the Transit Officers Book. Date of Dept was 6:00 PM but unluckily there was no train going to Pampanga at this time. The schedule in Supply Div was entirely wrong upon a true verification in Tutuban. Effective April 10, 1944 (Monday) there is only one train going to SF La Union at 8:40 AM. Hence I was delayed again for my departure.

I was given my officers Identification booklet. It was so cute and nice although it was simply made. At 3:00 PM, I went to sleep in the house of Florencio Regala our townmate fr Capas. This was my last stay in Manila for 103 as of April 15, '44 since I have arrived in the city last January 4, 1944. This was also my last good-time in the city.

It was also on this date that my nephew Albert Kellogg transf to M. Natividad 2422 Sta Cruz, Manila.

Up to this date also I have cash on hand of \$165.00. I have tried to make a special budget for my daily expense since our graduation from the Academy, because we are no longer entitled to mess in the Academy. My regular budget per day was \$6.00 and other incidental expenses.

Up to this date I have not received any letter from Ninay since April 3, 1944 coinciding her Birthday.

I know personally that my wife was patiently awaiting for my arrival on this date because in my last letter to her dated April 10, 1944, I have informed her that I shall try my best to arrive on this date. Perhaps she was madly disappointed to me was always in my mind. But I am quite sure that on this date my wife knows where I was assigned because my SO of my co-graduates were assigned in Tarlac thru information. I was thinking pensively how I could explain my delay to her. Perhaps she is getting jealous again because of my last letter to her. But no doubt all her anger will be appease the very moment she meet my beloved wife.

8-April 15, 1944. At 8:40 AM I took the first trip bound to Sn La Union I reached Capas at 12:40. We are riding on a Special car for officers with the Japanese soldiers at Tutuban Station. We were the first one to be given preference. Lt J Bautista, Basilio, Dolo, P. Bautista & Belmonte and Mamunung were with me in the Special car.

Immediately after my arrival at home I have prepared all my personal belongings ready to go to Sn Fernando. To report for duty.

On this date also Ninay was waiting for me in Tarlac but sorry I have failed to fulfill my promise to her. I know she is angry with me at this moment.

In the afternoon of the same date I went to the Station Master to get the New Train Schedule effective April 10, 1944. They are as follows:

Mixed car - 7:23 )  
Freight car - 9:20 ) Arrival in Capas  
Passenger car 2:33 )

All these trains regularly stopped in Capas.

In the afternoon I have visited Priming. We have talked many things about my life in the Academy etc. I was congratulated by her for my graduation in the Commission School.

Sn-April 16, 1944. At 8:00 AM I went to hear mass. This was my first time to hear the mass in our town since I have left last January 4, 1944 for Manila to study in the Commission School PCA Bldg No. 1. During the mass I saw different faces which look unfamiliar to me. But I saw some friends of mine who extend their congratulations to me.

At noon Opl A. Balagtas visited me at home congratulating me in my graduation. I have learned from him that my company commander Lt C Reyes and my co-constabularymen are waiting for me in Concepcion on this date. But I have not gone to that place anymore for obvious reasons. I have learned also from Pitong that Menang was waiting for me because she knows that I graduate last April 12, 1944.

In the afternoon about 6:00 PM I have visited my cousin Juliana Tonglos. I have informed her about our graduation in the Commission School. I have related to her also about our life in the Academy. Oh! she was inquisitive and surprise to know all the hardships and difficulties that I have undergone.

In the same date I went to the municipal building to see my old friends and acquaintances. In the bldg I have met my co-constabularymen in Concepcion: Pvt Masiolat, Sigred Yoleng and the Chief of Police, my former boss when I graduated from the Police Training School about 2 years ago. This reminds when I was still a 1st class patrolman in Capas, serving my town from August 1, 1942 to Nov 30, 1942. A period of 4 months only.

M-April 17, 1944. At 7:23 AM I left at Capas bound to San Fernando, Pamp. Upon reaching San Fernando, I proceeded immediately to the Office of the Senior Inspector, Capt Sam J David to report for duty. I arrived in the Hqtrs, at 11:15 AM date and time of arrival was noted and recorded by the Sgt. On the same date I have received my pay and govt bonus from April 13-15, 1944 amounting to \$18.20 (3 days active duty).

Lt C Dizon reported also on the same date. Lt Antonio, SDO. I dropped in the house of my uncle and leave my personal belongings. Oh! my uncle was very happy that I was assigned temporarily in San Fernando.

At 4:00 PM I went to the Hqts to report for duty again.

At about 4:30 PM Lt Falarca, Mamogun, Legman and I paid a courtesy call to the house of the Senior Inspector. We stayed there for 5 minutes only and later we paid another courtesy call to the Chief of the MP of San Fernando, & Vice Commander.

At about 5:00 PM I was assigned as Incoming Officer-of-the-Day. The outgoing Officer of the day was Lt Mamungun. In this station I have observed that internal discipline of soldiers is not well emphasized unlike in Tarlac. There is somewhat lack in discipline among the members of the command. The internal discipline in Pampanga is like that of in Concepcion where I was a former SDO. However, the soldiers are always alert and active in emergency calls.

2-April 18, 1944. At 9:00 AM I made an inspection of the Guards near the bridge. In my tour of duty I gave pertinent advices to my men to be always on guard and never trust the civilian always. They all listened to my short advices. Pedro Regala, a townsman of mine went to our office today asking for a special pass for his buy & sell business. A verbal order was made to that effect.

Capt B Garcia, asst 3-1 made our permanent assignment on this date. I was assigned as Junior Officer of the 8th Pampanga Company with Lt B Lagman, a mobile unit. But for the time being I was temporarily assigned in San Luis, 2nd Pampanga Co, PG to relieve Lt Simano who is sick on leave. Upon his arrival I shall report for duty to my permanent station as per written order of Capt Garcia.

dated on this date. At 6:00 PM I was relieved as an O.D. The incoming OD is Lt C Dixon.

I have sent a letter to my wife informing her about my present assignment in San Luis, Pamp. Also I have sent a money order of \$35.50 to my father, and informing him about my new station.

In the afternoon I have visited Ester de Jesus, a townmate of mine. And I have learned that she got married recently and her two brothers also. Congratulations Ester!

I have inspected the house of my brother and found the house in poor condition. I have received the rent of his house from Manong amounting to \$14.00 and 4.00 receipt for rent.

W-April 19, 1944. At 11:00 AM I left San Fernando, Pamp bound to Capas. I reached Capas at 12:15 AM taking my lunch at home. I have delivered \$14.00 to brother Ando for his house rent and also the receipt for P4 for land rent.

At about 2:00 PM I left Capas bound for Tarlac. I was riding on the Sinemor's car. Upon arriving at Tarlac I have visited my friend Peter and he was very happy to hear my success. Then I proceeded to the house of my brother Among and his family. Everybody in the house was very happy. At About 5:30 PM I have visited my wife. Oh! she was glad when she saw me for the first time since I left her last January 4, 1944. This was our first meeting then. I have informed her about our hard life in the Academy. And she was very lonely to know my life in the Academy.

I have informed her also about my new assignment in the San Luis for the time being at least 2-weeks of course my wife was willing to go with me at this moment, but I told her that I could not take her with me in my new station because I could find a house for her. I told her and she also consented that I shall take her once I shall be assigned in San Fernando, my permanent station. Perhaps we shall be going together around the month of May. I met her brother, mother, sister, etc.

Th-April 20, 1944. At 8:00 AM I went to meet my wife in full officer's uniform. I have bid her good-bye for my departure to San Fernando. Her father was there also at the time I left her. Everything was alright.

I took a car bound to Capas at about 11:00 AM on my way home I stopped at San Miguel Detach. & my former constabularymen were very happy to learn my splendid success in the PG.

Before I left for Tarlac my brother Among, gave me one leather wallet, one officer's belt, one pr of stockings and one Notebook. These are all my souvenirs from brother Among. He was very happy also for my success.

It was on this date that my former policeman Doro was shot by two unidentified persons in barrio Aranguren at about 3:50 PM. His brother-in-law was fatally wounded also in the same spot while he was walking in the street. The element of treachery was present in the crime of murder. Doro and his brother-in-law were brought to the municipal bldg at about 5:30 PM. The main cause was that there was a personal grudge against him by these two Visayans for a long time ago. At 5:30 PM he was buried and I was at the gate of the municipal bldg while the deceased is passing by. I was then in full uniform. I left Capas at 5:30 PM riding a special car of Don Marcelo of Bacolor, Pamp. I reached San Fdo at 6:00 pm

Fri-April 21, 1944. At 6:00 pm I have ~~xxxxxx~~ prepared all my personal belongings bound to San Fernando. At 5:00 pm I left Capas riding in an automobile owned by Don Marcelo of Bacolor, Pampanga. It was a nice automobile. I reached San Fernando at 6:00 pm sharp.

I was bringing with me a haversack US, boots, tropical helmet, canteen, etc for my personal use as an officer. Before I left Capas my former constabularymen from Concepcion were in Capas at this time because they attended the funeral of the late Waldoro Mendoza, a policeman of Capas.

I have learned from them that Menang (FWS) was anxiously waiting for me in Concepcion on this date. Of course I know she was impatiently waiting for me. But I remained aloof and silent about our love affair while I was in Concepcion. This reminds me when I first fell in love with Menang last Dec 10, 1943. I know she really love and care for me. Even when I was studying in the commissioned school she was writing to me congratulating me about my life & success in the Academy. But no matter what townmates are telling me esp Pitong, Fausting, Peping I don't give a damn to their stories. I use my tact and wise diplomacy in handling the situation with Menang. I don't like her to be given a chance if possible.

Sat-April 22, 1944. At about 8:30 AM I left for San Fernando bound to San Luis. I dropped in Mexico for the time being. I have waited in this place for less one-half hour. While I was waiting for a caretela bound to San Luis I was met by Sgt B. Bansa and with 4 NCOs. I was taken by them until San Fernando & later we left for San Luis at 12:00 sharp.

Sgt Manalang of the 1st Pampanga Co gave me a long range pistol cal. 38 with 4 bullets only.

The 4th Pampanga Co in which I was temporarily assigned under Lt Marino Aquino, c-c was stationed in the church. It was a big & old church built during the Spanish regime.

Sun-April 23, 1944. At 8:00 AM I went to hear mass. The church was a remnant of the old Spanish regime. I have seen many beautiful ladies in this place but sorry I am not acquainted with them.

During the whole day I have read all the general orders, special orders and memorandum from the hqtrs. I have learned many things about the present organization of the PC and its changes. My daily routine in the barracks is that during the afternoon we usually go on swimming in the Pampanga River with my soldiers enjoying swimming wkt together with them.

Mon-April 24, 1944. At 6:00 AM we have a reveille and an hour drill in front of the church. Lt Deveras Jr & I were leading the drill. In the afternoon we were informed that 3 NCOs from our command were kidnapped in Barrio Sto Rosario. So in the evening we prepared a combat patrol of 30 NCOs full pack ready to leave at 6:00 AM bound to the said barrio where these 3 NCOs were supposed to be kidnapped. It was also on this date that there was a reshuffle in the company organization where I am temporarily assigned. I was in charge of the 2nd Platoon of the 4th Pamp Co, PC with 25 NCOs.

Tues-April 25, 1944. At 6:15 AM, 30 NCOs and Lt Deveras Jr & I lead the combat patrol. Our main mission is to gather information about the present whereabouts of the 3 NCOs who were supposed to be kidnapped last April 20, 1944.

Our patrol district was barrio Sto Rosario, Sta Maria, Sta Ana back to San Luis. According to the information gathered by us in Sta Ana, these 3 NCOs were really kidnapped by the guerrillas and supposed to be shot to death already. So far this was my first patrol in the 4th Pamp Co PC since I have reported for duty last April 22, 1944 at 2:00 PM.

It was indeed a happy coincidence that it was on this combat patrol that I have met my old friend Manardo Lansangan in the mpi bldg. of Sta Ana. Oh! what a happy conversation we had after 2 years and half of not seeing each other. That was since the outbreak of the present war, Dec 8, 1941. Lunding took me in his house and introduced me to his wife. Oh! he got one baby already. I have met also my comadre (Foroso Rivera) who was going to Capas, to seal water-melons. During our investigation about the whereabouts of this 3 NCOs from Sta Ana, I have met Miss Ester Aguilar, of barrio San Agustin, San Luis, Pamp. Oh! she is very beautiful and entertaining.

Wed. April 26, 1944. At 7:00 AM I conducted a radio taisho in the company. As I understand from my men they are not conducting a daily radio taisho for a long time.

At about 8:00 AM Lt Deveras & I with 7 NCOs went to San Fernando to get 4 sacks of rice. I stayed in San Fernando until the next morning. In the afternoon I went to boxing stadium. This was my first time to witness a boxing bout in San Fernando. In the evening I slept in Constabulary Hqtrs for security & safety precaution. I have sent a letter to the SGO FGA Bldg I informing him about my balance of P17.00 for GA. I have requisitioned on this date also.

Thurs-April 27, 1944. It was on this date that I have learned from my NCOs that the town of Concepcion was surprisedly attacked during the town fiesta, April 25 and I understand 7 PC men were killed by the guerrillas while they are going out from the church. According to reliable information the town of Concepcion was set on fire by the PC & Jap soldiers.

At 10:00 AM we left for San Fernando bound to San Luis. We were riding on a caretala with full arms. We reached our station safely. Thanks to our Lord that nothing happens on the way.

Fri-April 28, 1944. I have explained to the men about Circular No 2, S-1944, pertaining to routinary duties of company commanders etc at 12:00 AM a combined patrol with the Japanese soldiers, 2nd Company A with my 19 NCOs made reconnaissance patrol in barrio Sta Maria, Mexico. We have arrested 44 suspected persons subject to rigid investigation in the barracks. Lt Mallari was in charge of the 2nd Co PC. At about 4:00 PM all these suspected persons were brought to our barracks. Some of them were found to be culprits and were finally eliminated. In the next morning they were acquitted by our C-Commander.

Sat-April 29, 1944. At 8:00 PM Lt Deveras & I went to San Fernando to get the salary of our men. We were escorted by 20 NCOs riding on a caretala. I have received my pay from April 16-30, 1944 - P91.00 - insurance of P7.00 - P84.00 net pay plus house allowance of P15.00 - Total 99.00. I send sister Memeng P50.00 thru the courtesy of my cousin Patrio Patin. I paid my mess account to my uncle for P15.00 at 3:00 pm we left for San Fernando bound to San Luis. On the way I got acquainted with Mr Gonzales, a former officer of the PC.

Lt F Reyes and P Reyes Agacite of Tarlac were transferred to the Tarlac Province.

Sun-April 30, 1944. I have received my Special Orders No. 31 from the Office of the 2nd CD Hqtrs, Manila in connection with my official assignment in the 8th Pampanga Co, PC.

At 8:00 AM I have attended the mass. This was the second time to hear mass in San Luis. I have informed my company commander, Lt Merlano Dn. Aquino, about my departure and to report for official duty to my permanent station. This was my last stay in San Luis and I have informed my soldiers about my departure. All my soldiers were very sorry for my departure. They told me that I shall stay with them and not to leave them.

Mon-May 1, 1944. At 8:00 AM Lt Davares Jr & I & all with 20 soldiers who escorted us until barrio Sto Domingo. At Sto Domingo we took a caretela until Sn Fdo. I took my lunch in the house of my uncle. And at 2:00 PM I left San Fernando bound to Capas. I ~~was~~ was riding on a truck. It was on this truck that I met Lt Mamungan & his body guard. I have learned they are bound to Tarlac. I have met also the wife of Jenario Lagman (Oding) who was bound to San Miguel. Before I left Sn Fdo I have met my company commander Lt Atutubo, 8th Pamp Co. He told me that I shall report on the 7th of this month; that after the termination of the training period in Masantol. The barrio of Dolores of Sn Fdo was burned by the PC because one PC was shot in the hospital - Pvt Cabrera - the deceased.

May 2, 1944-Tues. At 9:00 AM I went to the market to see Col Balagtas to deliver my personal letter to Lt C Reyes.

At 2:00 PM I left for Capas bound Sn Fdo. I was riding on a train where the Japanese officers and soldiers are with me. I reached San Fdo about 3:45 pm upon reaching Sn Fdo, I proceeded at once to the Hqtrs to see Capt S Garcia. I met him & informed him about my arrival and main purpose in going to the Hqtrs. Pat Coronel type my traveling expense voucher & per diem amounting to P33.00 only that is from April 22 to April 30, 1944 inclusive.

May 3, 1944-Wed. At 9:00 AM I went to the MF to have my breast plate lettered in kangi. I have also changed my new breast plate in Romanized English. In the afternoon, I went to see Capt S P Garcia, informing that I have received my SO #31 from the Hqtrs about my new assignment 8th Pamp Co. He told me to wait for Lt Atutubo my C-C to take me to Masantol where my company is undergoing training. But for the time being I shall stay in Sn Fdo while waiting for Lt Atutubo. It was on this date that Col Angat of Cavite was shot in Calumpit Station while waiting for a train bound to Sn Fdo. He was taken in the Hqtrs by a Jap Lt & constabulary soldiers.

Thurs-May 4, 1944. At 9:00 AM Capt Garcia & I with 5 WCOs escorted us to Masantol where I shall report for my newly assignment under Lt Atutubo as my C-C 8th Pampanga Co.

A simple ceremony of Constabulary Day was held in the Masantol Elem School. This day was officially declared as Constabulary Day in memory of the dead PC and its foundation.

While I was going to the Hqtrs I have met Meding my old girl friend that was 9 yrs ago. I have greeted her as an old acquaintance of mine. This was the first time that I have met her since our last meeting in Sn Fdo.. that last Dec 10, 1941 I still remember. It was a happy coincidence.

Fri-May 5, 1944. At 7:00AM the 8th Pampanga Co PC held a simple Radio Taisho. First coup of exercise. This was followed by close order drill. The company was divided into two platoons. I was assigned in the 2nd Platoon. Our C-C has divided the work between us 3 officers. I was assigned to office work.



Practice Induction ceremonies of the ex-USAFVR was also held in the drill ground. In the afternoon we went to a simple blow-out in the house of Mr Pangan. It was on this date that Lt Atutubo & I are boarding outside in the house of our mess Sgt.

Sat. May 6, 1944. The members of the 8th Pamp Co FC were given distribution for their supplies. In the morning we had a garrison practice on the induction ceremonies of the ex-USafvr. At 11:00 PM the garrison Comdr of Macababe went to see me and my C-G informing us about 300 guerrillas were sighted in barrio Bagang of Masantol. But sorry our men were not able to go out on a general raid because they are not yet inducted and taken their oath.

Sun-May 7, 1944. At 10:00 AM the 8th Pamp Co FC were inducted 75 in all. The induction ceremonies was simple. The governors and party, the S.I. & party delivered inspiring speeches to the newly inducted trainees. Effective on this date, discipline was enforced and a tentative organization of platoons & squad was organized by my command. Lt Jose Atutubo went to Sa Fdo with Capt Garcia & party on official business.

Mon-May 8, 1944. It was fiesta in the town of Masantol on this date. We have a complete rest also on this date. There was no ceremony of the town fiesta because of active activities of the guerrillas. One Gaddu Satus alias "Aguila" a kidnapper of Squadron 24 was prosecuted at 8:00 PM in the cemetery.

Tues-May 9, 1944. On this date we have an internal system of checking all supplies records. I took my lunch in the house of Col Fajardo. At 8:00 PM we went to wedding party in the house of the friend of Col Fajardo. I got acquainted with Miss Epifania Mananala and Maria Paz Yabot, both of them are beautiful!

Wed. May 10, 1944. At about 8:00 AM Lt Laguna & I went on a general patrol in Gons, Hagonoy to envelop & encircle the Kubbos. The distance covered is more than 10 kms. away from Masantol. We reached Masantol at 5:00 PM. I went on patrol in Betas & sleep in the house of Emilio Hernandez.

Thurs-May 11, 1944. I have prepared all the promotions of NCOs & all reports of our company. I have my first ~~mess~~ out in the barracks by my soldier A. Mananala.

Fri-May 12, 1944. All officers & Sgts occupied the officers quarters. We have prepared our officers & its personnel. We were ~~provided~~ provided with beds. Special order for Post No. 1 All were made by me. Strict discipline on interior guard duty started today.

Sat-May 13, 1944. I have prepared all the reports on this date ready to be delivered to the Sgtrs.

Sun-May 14, 1944. I went to hear mass at 7:00 AM I have lectured my soldiers on the importance of Interior Guard Duty. I took my supper in the house of Miss Concordia Fajardo & paid a visit to Faming.

Mon-May 15, 1944. I have met Miss Florentina Bautista (Floring). Yes, she is a beautiful girl that I have ever met in Masantol. On this date I was too busy working in the office.

Tues-May 16, 1944. I went on patrol in Bo. Baco & Maladi at about 8:00 AM

Wed-May 17, 1944. Early in the morning I have lectured on Internal Discipline of the company & discretionary punishments. I have deposited P1,000 in the safe of Mr Bustos.

Thurs-May 18, 1944. I went on patrol in barrio San Pedro, Puti, Gaingin, Masantol.

Fri-May 19, 1944. I have received my salary for May 1-15, 1944 - P91.00. I have recorded & checked all the MPV record of all men. I started boarding.

Sat-May 20, 1944. We have a company close order drill from 7:00 to 8:00 AM I took my lunch in the house of Cpl M Manansala. I was introduced to Mac-lang sisters and Miss Balincit. I paid my casera for P50.00.

Sun-May 21, 1944. I went to hear mass at 8:00 AM. I took my lunch in the house of Cpl Fajardo. I got drunk on this date.

Mon-May 22, 1944. I took my lunch in the house of the Pres. of NA.

Tues-May 23, 1944. I went to Sn Fernando to attend the officers' conference. We have a big blow-out in Sn Fdo sponsored by the Masantol & Pampanga delegation who are applying for direct command. I have received a letter from my wife asking me about my whereabouts.

Wed-May 24, 1944. I left Sn Fdo at 5:00 PM riding on Lt Malaccon. We had a simple affair for the New liaison officer for Pampanga. It was an officers' party. Lt A Santos went with me.

Thurs-May 25, 1944. I have study again how to make a subsistence return Patrol Sheet, Subsistence Voucher, etc.

Fri-May 26, 1944. We have received our supplies for the 8th Pamp & 9th Cos FG. Descriptive record were checked again. I have taken my lunch in the house of Conching.

Sat-May 27, 1944. I was very busy in the office working on this day. I have met Florina and we have a very nice chat. I have received from Sgt Antonio an officers' diary.

Sun-May 28, 1944. I took my lunch in a round table in barrio Talba. I went to Macabebe to attend the show with Lt Santos.

Mon-May 29, 1944. We have finished all communication due to Hqtrs. I went to Sn Fdo with 6 NCOs.

Tues-May 30, 1944. I have sent a letter to my wife, Manang & Lt C Reyes. I left for San Fdo on official business with 6 NCOs. At 10:00 AM I got drunk. I have met Miss Libung.

Wed-May 31, 1944. I have met Miss Marina A. Liliacy, a stenotypist of the Public Recreation Section of the City Hall. She was brought to the office for investigation. I took her in my casera and dine with me to take her lunch.

Thurs-June 1, 1944. I have send a letter to my wife informing her that I shall take her on June 15 or 16 of this month. I went to Sn Fdo on this date at 1:00 PM with Cpl Bautista.

Fri-June 2, 1944. I went to Capas at about 1:00 PM and 5:00 PM I went to Tariat. We sleep in the house of bro. Anong.

Sat. June 3, 1944. I have met my wife at about 9:00 AM at Demalo Boulevard I have introduced my two soldiers to her. My wife was very happy to see me again. She promised me to go with me on 16th of this month to live in Masantol. I left her at about 10:00 AM bound to Masantol again at a distance of 91 kms.

Sun-June 4, 1944. I went to Macabebe to meet Lt A Gonzales. I went to the show - the Green Archer. I have visited Loring for the first time since I have met her in my life.

Mon-June 5, 1944. I have received a letter from my wife dated June 1, 1944. I have visited Loring at about 5:00 PM in her house. This was the second time to pay a visit to her. She was indeed very entertaining.

Tues-June 6, 1944. I have sent a letter to my wife, Lt Reyes, Among & father informing them about our new assignment in Lubac. We have Sra Cruz Te Mayo on this date. We left Masantol at 8:00 PM for Sn Fdo. Loring gave me a sacred Cruz before I left.

Wed-June 7, 1944. We stayed in Sn Fdo Hqtrs; I was in charge with 8 NCOs I was waiting for orders to leave the place.

Thurs-June 8, 1944. I have left Sn Fdo at 10:00 AM bound for Lubac with 16 NCOs. Upon our arrival to Lubac, we stayed in the Lubac Elem School. Every-

thing was OK. This was the first time I have seen Lubao. The place is a big town. I am always reminded of Loring, a beautiful girl from Masantol whom I have met a month ago. She gave me a memorable relic before I left her and it was a metal cross to guide & help me in my hardship & sorrow of life. But sorry Fate was so cruel to me because our meeting was too late already. But honey the future will speak. I have met another girl by the name of Miss in San Fdo.

Fri-June 9, 1944. I have sent a letter to my wife informing her about my present whereabouts in Lubao. Likewise to brother José. The 8th Pampanga Co with 60 men arrived on patrol at 11:30 AM. We received a verbal order from the Senior Inspector that the 5th, 6th & 8th companies will proceed to Bataan to have a general mopping operation.

In my letter to my wife I have explained to her that I cannot go to Tarlac on the 16th of this month because we are on a general patrol.

It was also on this date that I have met my soldiers from San Luis - 4th Pampanga Company.

I got acquainted with Miss Purita Matias (Puring) & Miss Estella Matias (Telang) on the night before our company left for Bataan. Telang invited me to her house and oh! she is very entertaining & beautiful. But Puring, the younger sister is more beautiful than her.

Sat-June 10, 1944. I have sent a letter to Cpl A Balangtas & to Lt Reyes informing them about my new station.

Sun-June 11, 1944. The 5th 6th & 8th Co left Lubao at 5:00 AM bound to Bataan. We pass thru Guagua, Floridablanca & Dinalupihan. We took our lunch in Floridablanca at 12:00 AM. We reached Floridablanca at about 10:30 AM, at 3:00 PM sharp we left Floridablanca bound to Dinalupihan. We took our supper in the house of the municipal mayor. We have traveled all in all 29 Kms (3-10-16 Kms) fr Lubao to Dinalupihan. This was the first time in my life to see Bataan. We are on a general mopping operations & search of firearms in Bataan. We reached Dinalupihan at about 6:00 PM. We are going to travel 11 Km more before we headed Orani.

Mon-June 12, 1944. At 6:00 AM we left Dinalupihan bound to Orani, Bataan; a distance of 12 Kms; passing thru Hermosa, Bataan. The town of Hermosa is a small town but a peaceful one to live in. We took our lunch in the house of the Municipal Mayor- José Rivera. We reached Hermosa at about 9:30 AM and 3:00 PM we left for Orani again, reaching the place at about 5:30 PM. The distance bet. Hermosa & Orani is only 4 kms. The people in Orani are very hospitable & kind. They look the Constabulary officers highly respected. We took our supper in the house of the Municipal Mayor- all officers. The whole strength of our combat patrol are as follows: 5th Pamp Co; 40; 6th Pamp Co. 28; 57 men; 8th Pamp Co 63 men/ Total enlisted men 160; officers: 5th- 2/ 6th-3/ 8th-3/ total 8. Grand total - 168 officers and men. Pacification meeting at Cullia.

Tues-June 13, 1944. I have sent a letter to my wife & to brother Ando informing them about my present whereabouts. On this date, I have made a balance account of all the money. We have a complete rest on this date. & ready for another patrol. The 5th & 6th companies left Orani at about 9:00 AM bound to Lubao.

It was also on this date that I have met my classmate in PWU, Mr. Bongco in the Mpl pldg. He was an old friend of mine.

Wed-June 14, 1944. I got acquainted with Miss Zelcita of Orani, Bataan. I came to know her that she is the first cousin of my comadre, the wife of Br C Pinada. We had a complete rest on this date.

Thurs-June 15, 1944. We are still in Orani, Bataan bound to Balanga for a

general patrol. We went to Balanga at 3:00 PM reaching the town of Balanga at 5:00 PM. Upon our arrival to Balanga we went to the commander of the Japanese Garrison. In our reporting we were scolded by the Garrison Commander because of many words by the PC esp the 5th & 6th companies. We thought we shall be punished for their acts but thanks to God we were not. I have informed my soldiers about this dald and pitiful experience of ours in Bataan. I could hardly forget this sad event in my life as an officer. And this thought is a moral lesson.

Fri-June 16, 1944. We left for Sibacon and Ft Creves to have a general raid. After the raid we left immediately for Orani at 9:00 AM. I got acquainted with Miss Catacutan and Miss Teodora S Ramos of Orani, Bataan. Both of them are registered nurses in the Bureau of Health. We received the order of the S.I Mavor David that we shall proceed to Lubao. All our soldiers are very happy because of our going to Lubao.

Sat-June 17, 1944. I have visited Mijogi Tomura, Japanese MP who was stationed in Orani, Bataan. This was the first time I have met my former teacher in the Tarlac P.T.S.. It was almost for one year since he left Tarlac MP & from that time I have not him. In Orani where I was stationed temporarily, I have learned his name Tomura, and the people say that he was very strict to the PC & civilians of Orani. He took me in the Office of the MP of Orani & we were very happy together to talk our life in the P.T.S. that was two years ago. Mr. Tomura was very happy to meet me and see that I have succeeded in my ambition. He was very happy to know that out of the 34 graduates of the Tarlac Police Training School last July 29, 1942 only I became an officer in the PC. It was indeed a happy coincidence to meet my old teacher during my short stay in Orani, Bataan. This date is so memorable where a teacher and his old pupil meet ex together.

On this date also, I have visited personally Miss Teodora S Ramos, R.N. in the Municipal Bldg of Orani, Bataan. I came to know from her that she graduated from the Chinese General Hospital in Exck Blumentritt, Manila. She is just six months in the B.M. She is very charming and look like my wife.

The 8th Pamp Co left Orani, Bataan at about 3:00 PM. We were riding on a truck with Capt Antonio who took us in our station. We reached Lubao, Pamp at about 7:30 PM. I received my salary.

Sun-June 18, 1944. We have a complete rest on this date. However, there was a complete emergency around 2:30 PM in barrio San Antonio, Lubao. In the afternoon, I have visited the municipal mayor of Lubao, to ask his whole-hearted cooperation to supply us rice for the time being. I understand from the municipal mayor that he is very willing to cooperate with our company.

This date is the most tragic event that ever occurred in the history of the 8th Pamp Co PC since the time of its organization because 7 of my soldiers were ambushed by the Hukbos in Del Carmen, Pamp at about 3:00 PM. Lt Magman was then the officer-in-charge & he was totally blame for the loss of these 7 men and Lt Atutubo and our C-C, arrived on the same night at about 12:00 PM. Among the casualties are as follows:

- 1) Silverio Bautista
- 2) Resegio Bautista D
- 3) Jose Gamboa
- 4) Fabio Soriano
- 5) Agustin Juanito
- 6) Quirico Garcia
- 7) Mariano Perez

The only one who escaped a narrow death Federico Bautista, who related the event to us. This date was so tragic also because one of our Special Agent Menasty

of H.A. was shot in Apalit. This was indeed a moral lesson to the C-0 and everybody. At 11:00 PM 12 Hukks were disposed of.

Mon-June 19, 1944. A general and combat patrol was conducted by the 5th & 8th Company in the place where my 7 soldiers were ambushed. 3 Hukbos women were confined in the barracks. Around 50 sacks of palay were confiscated by our company. I received a letter from Cpl Jose Atencio, Tarlac.

Tues-June 20, 1944. I have sent P150.00 to my father on M.O. for his pension. I have sent a letter to Lt C Reyes, my former C-0, Cpl Jose Atencio, Jacinto Mananala, my casera in Masantol; informing them about my present whereabouts and the untimely death of my 7 brave soldiers. On this date I have received a letter from my wife dated June 3, 6 & 13th asking me that my father will go to Tarlac to make arrangement of our marriage. I have also received a letter from Benang, Concepcion, Tarlac informing me that everything is OK. One letter from Miss Marina Dalisay expressing her thanks to me. I got acquainted with Miss Isabel Tiongco.

Wed-June 21, 1944. Find Investigation of Pvt Federico Bautista was finished on this date. I have visited Miss Isabel Tiongco a N.T.C. graduate and a substitute teacher in the Lubao Elem School. She is beautiful and entertaining. She is very romantic and lovely in the way how she talks.

Thurs-June 22, 1944. I went on a "round table" in the house of Mr Isip with Capt Antonio and other officers. I have visited Miss Lilia Ocampo of Lubao, Pamp. She is engaged in a buy & sell business. Letter to Bro. Norman - P150.00

Fri-June 23, 1944. At 11:00 AM I went on a special patrol on Sto Remedios, Lubao, to get Blascan Calala, a minister of Church of Christ for investigation. Confidential reports were made on this date pertaining to the death of 7 PC soldiers. I got acquainted with Miss Loreto Mendoza of Orion, Bataan, a buy & sell girl. At 7:00 I went to visit Miss Isabel Tiongco (Ibeng) This was the second time to pay visit to her. I have sent a letter to Miss Maria Dalisay.

Sat. June 24, 1944. Miss Rosalind De la Cruz, Garrison Spy of the Map MP Orion, Bataan, came to our office. I understand she is engaged in a buy & sell. I have visited Miss Isabel Tiongco for the first time in her schoolroom. I got acquainted with Miss Macsamana also. I have sent a letter to Miss Teodora S. Ramos of Orani, Bataan. Hukboxxx G. Martin was disposed of.

Sun. June 25, 1944. This is the first time I have went to the Church of Lubao Pamp. It was a big & old relic church of the Spanish regime. At about 11:00 AM we have buried the cadaver of the late Gregorio Martin who was floating in the river early in the morning.

At about 6:00 PM I have visited Ibeng, my new friend and we have told many stories pertaining the present situation.

Mon-June 26, 1944. I received a letter from my wife dated June 19, 1944 and was very happy of my safe arrival in Lubao.

Tues-June 27, 1944. I got acquainted with Miss Leonila Ricafort of Sta. Rita, Pamp. I met her with in the municipal Bldg while I was making the payroll I went to talk Chabing again in her schoolroom. We have a very nice and beautiful conversation. This was the first time that I let her understand that I have a feeling of affection to her. I let Chabing to understand that I really love her ever since I have met her. In the afternoon I came to know Miss Alma Layug, the daughter of Atty Leopoldo Layug on this date.

At about 5:00 PM I have visited Chabing again and let her understand very well that I am in love with her. Up to this time I can understand from Chabing that she really cares for me.

Wed-June 28, 1944. I have Chabing again in her classroom. I gave a simple blow-out to her and she was grateful.

Thurs-June 29, 1944. I have visited Chabeng & I let her understand that I love her; she was silent about my love to her.

Fri-June 30, 1944. I left Lubao at 3:00 PM with Lt Atutubo & 8 NCOs to escort us. I went to the show & the film is Monte Cristo.

Sat-July 1, 1944. I got acquainted with Miss Viting of Guagua, Pamp. She is a third yr in Education USF. We arrived in Lubao at 9:00 PM upon my arrival I gave Chabeng 8 mangoes and 1 dozen thread.

Sun-July 2, 1944. I have Chabeng in the afternoon and explain to her my past & present life as an officer. She was still in doubt of me because I have met her recently. We took our lunch in the house of Mr Tolentino as a sort of round-table.

Mon-July 3, 1944. It was on this date that Chabeng learned I am a married man thru an informer from Tarlac. She was totally discouraged in my love to her. But however, I tried to conceal everything to her. I took my supper in the house of Chabeng. She was sitting on my side. Oh! I never thought that there is doubt. I got her picture when she graduated from U.M. This is my souvenir from her. A patrol was sent to Sexmoan.

Tues-July 4, 1944. I visited Miss Rosa Sapiala, a UM graduate. This was the first time I have visited her. I have learned that her father is a supervising teacher before and at present a principal of Sexmoan.

Wed-July 5, 1944. I received a letter from Menang dated June 25, 1944. I understand from her that our love affair is known her parents. She was very happy of my present whereabouts in Lubao. In the afternoon, I have visited Chabeng again and told her that I love her inspite of all the discouraging signs that she is showing to me. I touched her finger and they were soft & I was thrilled with her soft body. I told her that I shall marry her at anytime the very moment she gave her YES.

Thurs-July 6, 1944. I went to Sn Fdo to attend the officers' conference to be held on July 7. I have sent a letter to Menang & explained to her that I really love her.

Fri-July 7, 1944. We have an officers' conference at 9:00 AM. Col Cruz - D.O. 2nd MB made a short talk in connection with the organization of MOO School in Pangasinan; the work of an NCO; intensive drive against the recalcitrant elements; the withdrawal of sentinels in all stations; that bribery shall be eliminated & that the giver shall be prosecuted by cutting his fingers in order they shall not put down the reputation of the PC; that all C-O are authorized to spend all the mess fund allowance; that C-O shall look into the family welfare of the soldiers; intensive drive within these two months; order not to give a chance for the Sukbos to organize; authority as peace officers shall be firm & strict but with justice; that the Hqtrs will not entertain any complaint from civilians & only extreme cases shall be given due consideration; never file a complaint to the fiscal or court of justice no matter the case will be; that the Hqtrs will back the PC provided you're right. I went home to Capas & I was riding in an automobile with 2 bodyguards. I left Capas at 1:30 PM. I gave my sister P1,700 and sister Caring P65.00. I was still in Sn Fdo at this time.

Sat-July 8, 1944. I left Sn Fdo at 12:00 AM. At 4:30 PM I attended the birthday of Chabeng. She is 22 yrs old. I have her a birthday card. I was introduced by her friend who also attended her birthday.

Sun-July 9, 1944. I have sent a money order to Bro. Ando of P70.00. I went to Chabeng for the last time.

Tues-July 11, 1944. We went home on a general patrol at about 5:00 PM. I have received a letter from my wife and to my brother Roman on this date asking for aid.

Wed-July 12, 1944. We trid fr the Lubao Elem School to the Lubao Mpl Bldg. I sent a letter to Ramon and my wife.

Thurs-July 13, 1944. We have no activity on this date.

Fri-July 14, 1944. It was raining hard on this date and up to this time I have not visited Chabeng.

Sat-July 15, 1944. We went to Guagua to attend the boxing bout. 5 men took lunch.

Sun-July 16, 1944. I went to Capas in the afternoon. Bound to Sn Fdo.

Mon-July 17, 1944. We left Sn Fdo to Lubao.

Tues-July 18, 1944. Round table in Guagua. I got acquainted with Miss Lorenza Dimalanta - Sto. Cristo, Guagua, Pampanga.

Wed-July 19, 1944. There was a dance in the house of Lt Cadell. This was the first time I dance.

There is on file in the case of Masangkay (Masangkay), Antonio, XC-6 208 307 the following:

1. A certified true copy extract (Paragraph 3) Headquarters BC, S.O. 147, dated June 28, 1944, which shows that Juan Agustin, Federico Bautista, Remigo D. Bautista, Silvino Bautista, Quirico Garcia, Antonio D. Masangkay, Marino Perez and Pablo L. Soriano were appointed privates in the Philippine Constabulary under the provisions of Executive Order No. 23 dated November 29, 1943; that the appointments were all effective May 7, 1944, with the exception of Juan (Juanito) Agustin, whose appointment was effective May 27, 1944; and that they were all assigned to the Province of Pampanga at San Fernando.
2. A true copy, constabulary officer's diary of Andres P. Capitulo, B.S.C., 3d Lieut., P.C., Disbursing Officer, covering his tour of duty from April 12, 1944 through July 19, 1944, which included his assignment in the 8th Pampanga PC Company, in which the entry for Sunday, June 18, 1944, is as follows: "We have a complete rest on this date. However, there was a complete emergency around 2:30 PM in Barrio San Antonio Lubao. In the afternoon, I have visited the Municipal Mayor of Lubao, to ask his wholehearted cooperation to supply us rice for the time being. I understand from the Municipal Mayor that he is very willing to cooperate with our company. This date is the most tragic event that ever occurred in the history of the 8th Pamp. Company PC since the time of its organization because 7 of my soldiers were ambushed by the

Federico Bautista, the survivor of the ambush referred to in the diary of Andres P. Capitulo, has submitted affidavits to establish the service and death in the cases of Juan S. Agustin, Pablo L. Soriano and Mariano G. Perez stating that Agustin was a member of the 342nd Infantry Regiment, 38th Division, and was killed on June 10, 1944 in an ambush by Japanese forces; that Soriano was killed by Japanese forces in an ambush in June, 1944 (organization not given); and that Perez, who was inducted by Major Emilio Hernandez, was killed in an ambush by Japanese forces (date of death and organization not given).

A claim or IC-folder relating to Jose Gamboa, who according to the entry in the diary referred to above was killed on June 18, 1944, has not been identified to date.

In view of the fact that the evidence set forth above contains information which apparently pertains to and materially affects the service reports of the individuals named herein you may desire to have a consolidated review of the service of these individuals to ascertain the true facts as to whether the individuals in question actually died in the service of the United States as a result of contact with the Japanese, or whether they met their death while serving in a Japanese controlled organization at the hands of Guerrillas, who may have considered them as collaborators with the enemy.

Payments and claims in those cases in which valid service has been reported are being held in suspense pending receipt of a recertification of service in those cases.

## THE GOVERNMENT OF THE NEW PHILIPPINES

THE CONSTABULARY

## I. Prior to Japanese Occupation

The Philippine Constabulary was organized at the close of the Spanish-American war to suppress guerrilla warfare, riots, insurrection and brigandage rampant in the Islands. In accordance with this mission the Philippine Constabulary was organized, trained, and armed as a military as well as a police force. In the Special Provinces, predominately non-Christian and often turbulent, it somewhat resembled the Royal Candian Mounted Police, acting as uniformed federal police as well as aiding in the administration of isolated or disorderly regions. In the Morô Provinces it occasionally conducted limited military campaigns:

The Philippine Constabulary had officially no jurisdiction in municipalities, cities, and barrios, where a local police force existed. The police in small municipalities, however, was poorly organized until 1938 and it was a function of the Constabulary to keep a paternal eye on these agencies.

Graduation from either the Constabulary Academy or from an accredited ROTC in a Philippine or United States College was required for a commission in the Constabulary. There were no original appointments to rank higher than the 2nd Lieutenant and eligibility for promotion was by competitive examination. Enlisted men with two years service in the Constabulary were as cadets, and could receive a commission after completion of a three year's course.

At the outbreak of war, December 1941, the Philippine Constabulary was mobilized and made a part of USAFFE.

## II. Since the Japanese Occupation

## a. Organization.

The Bureau of Constabulary was established by executive Order No. 29 and approved on May 4, 1942. The BC was set up as the only civilian law enforcement agency in the Islands, incorporating all police forces (including the Manila Police) within the forces of the Constabulary. No important changes were made in the Constabulary organization with the change from the Executive Commission to the Republic.

At the head of the BC is a Director and two assistant directors. These functionaries, as well as all higher ranking officers in the Constabulary are appointed and removed for cause by the President of the Republic. The Director of the BC may fine, suspend, demote or remove from office, any officer or enlisted man guilty of the infraction of regulations.

The following is an outline giving the top-organizational set up of the BC with names of executives as of early 1944, as prepared by fairly reliable sources, and with a brief outline of the responsibilities of each division:

Director - Gen Paulino Santos (Santos replaced Maj. Gen. B.C. Francisco in August 1944)

1st Asst. Director - Col Natividad

2nd Asst. Div. - Gen Ramos

Executive Div - Gen. Ramos; Custodian of records, procurement of personnel, signs correspondence and orders and supervises execution of regulations.

Inspectorate Div. - Maj. Tabuena; Discipline and training, and initiates investigations.

Information Div.-Maj. Hernandez; gathers information on law and order, gathers evidence pertinent to all crimes, and is custodian of records of investigations.

Supply Div. - Maj. R. Ramos; Procurement of supplies, and is custodian of government property and finance.

Medical Div. - Maj. Punsalan; Administration only. Medical work required by the BC is handled by the Bureau of Health.

The inspectorate and Information Divisions combine the duties of the Intelligence Division of the old Philippine Constabulary. At the head of the provincial organization is a senior inspector (usually a colonel) and under him are the district, city and municipalities commanders with their detachments. Thus a complete coverage of the territory is secured.

b. Duties:

An executive order of the Philippine Executive Commission defines the duties of the BC as follows:

1. Maintain peace and order throughout the Islands.
2. Suppress brigandage and robbery.

As the Japanese had branded the guerrilla forces as bandits and robbers, the use of the BC against guerrilla forces was a logical step and duties consist in policing occupied towns, patrolling "quite" (areas not well organized by guerrillas) and in acting as guides and interpreter for the Japanese.

The duties of the Constabulary forces in the cities are mainly those of the pre-war police. The Metropolitan Constabulary is the continuation of the Manila Police of pre-war days, which was famous for its efficiency, voluminous record being kept on criminals, counterfeit, arson, missing persons, secret societies, shipping and firearms.

c. Personnel

Personnel in the Constabulary consists of commissioned and non-commissioned officers. The ranks of the commissioned personnel are similar to our army. The rank of the 3rd lieutenant existed until July 1944, at which time all 3rd lieutenants were automatically promoted to 2nd lieutenants.

Parallel to the military designations of lieutenant colonels down to 2nd lieutenant, the titles to 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th class inspectors are used.

Enlisted personnel consists of 1st sergeants, sergeant, corporals, and patrolmen.

Almost all high ranking officers are former members of USAFFE and more than 50% of officers and men now in the BC were members of USAFFE before the surrender. Maj. Gen. Francisco, only recently replaced as head of the Philippine Constabulary, held the same position in the Constabulary in pre-war days and was a general officer in the USAFFE on Batan. General Paulino Santos was at one time Chief-of-Staff of the Philippine Army in the Commonwealth.

By May 1944, the BC had an actual strength of about 12,000-15,000 officers and men. These were distributed approximately as follows: 5,000 in Mindanao; 5,000 in the Visayas and 2000-5000 in Luzon. The number of BC in Luzon is an estimate only, as information from that area is meager. In general, it seems that their disposition is inversely proportioned to the number of Japanese troops in each area and it varies according to the state of policing is carried out by the BC. In areas where guerrillas are active, the garrisons are composed mostly of Japanese.

In November 1943 appropriation was made for 40 millions pesos to bring the strength of the Constabulary up to 40,000. It is not known whether this figure was ever reached.

d. Training

Qualifications for commission and enlistment were lowered by the Japanese and the training programs shortened. A 12 weeks course for officers and 6 weeks course for NCO's was established. Five schools were opened in Manila, and one each at Baguio, Cebu, and Davao.

Instructors were Filipino officers, Japanese NGO's and military Police. The following subjects were taught:

Law	Japanese drill and tactics
Criminal Investigation	Discipline and behavior
Japanese Indoctrination	Medica-Legal subjects and sanitation
Spiritual Eduaction	Oriental and Philippine History
Nippongo and Tagalog	

The curriculum consisted of 50% practical and 50% academic work. The list of subjects taught is an indication of emphasis placed in "Co-prosperity education". Combat training was taught in the field under Japanese Army supervision until the end of September 1942 when Filipino BC officers took over. The BC units were patterned along military lines.

e. Morale and fighting Strength.

The Japanese, realizing the potential possibilities of the Constabulary Forces have tried their utmost to gain their allegiance to the Jap cause and to keep up their morale. Their propaganda paints an optimistic picture of the progress of the war and payments of "condolence money", to relatives of members who were killed in action, or who died in line of duty was authorized.

The Constabulary, however, has never shown more than lukewarm enthusiasm for the Japanese cause, and indications are that Allied armies will find the Constabulary not only deserting but actually joining our forces. Some of the things that point to the possibilities to this are:

1. 50% of the Constabulary Forces is made up of former USAFFE personnel.
2. The Japanese, although initially arming the BC with rifles, have been careful to distribute automatic weapons only to those individual units the specifically trusted.
3. In many instances, Constabularies, individually, and enmasse, have surrendered and/or joined guerrilla forces.
4. Since August 1944 reports have been received, indicating that the Japanese have started to disarm units, both in Luzon and Mindanao.

SUBJECT: Letter from VA Central Office dated 23 July 1953 requesting a review of seven cases wherein prior service and death certifications are questionable due to evidence acquired by VA Field Investigation which shows that persons having similar names were killed on 18 June 1944 in Del Carmen, Pampanga in an encounter between the Jap PC and Hukbos.

AGUSTIN, Juan S., 10 304 340 (PS): It was determined under the Missing Persons Act that subject was Beleaguered from 8 Dec 41 to 9 Apr 42; Prisoner of War 10 Apr 42 to 11 Apr 42; Missing in Action 12 Apr 42 to 27 Jun 42; No Casualty Status from 28 Jun 42 to 9 May 43 and Missing in Action 10 May 43 to 10 Jun 44, the date of his death. Subject was a resident of Masantol, Pampanga. Evidence in his 201 indicates that he died while serving with the 320th Squadron, LGAF and that he was killed at Lubao, Pampanga during an encounter with the Japanese while enroute to Bataan on a mission to obtain arms.

Evidence submitted by VACO refers to one Juan Agustin who was appointed a Private in the Philippine Constabulary effective 27 May 44 in San Fernando, Pampanga. Constabulary Officer's Diary of Andres P. Capitula for the date 18 Jun 44 refers to one Agustin Juanito who was killed on that date at Del Carmen, Pampanga during an encounter between members of the 8th Pampanga Company, PC and the Hukbos. In each instance there were seven casualties and one person who escaped. The escapee in each instance is one Federico Bautista. Affidavits have been submitted by one Federico Bautista in the cases of Juan S. Agustin; Pablo L. Soriano; Mariano G. Perez, and Quirico B. Garcia, but no file can be identified for a person by that name.

There is no conclusive evidence by which positive identification can be made between the subject PS soldier and the PC soldier.

BAUTISTA, Remigio, 6 736 559 (PS): It was determined under the Missing Persons Act that subject was Beleaguered from 8 Dec 41 to 9 Apr 42; Prisoner of War from 10 Apr 42 to 4 Aug 42; Missing in Action from 5 Aug 42 to 3 Dec 44 and Prisoner of War from 4 Dec 44 to 31 Dec 44, date of death. Subject was a resident of Masantol, Pampanga. It was alleged by his widow that subject was released from O'Donnell Concentration Camp on 5 Aug 42 after which he went to Masantol, Pampanga for four months. She further alleges that after recovering from illness he joined the guerrilla force under Captain Emilio Hernandez, but date of joining was not given. She alleges that subject was one of those persons zonafied at Guadalupe, Makate, Rizal on 4 Dec 44 and later taken to Fort Santiago and that he was never heard of again. She did not clarify however, how he came to be in Guadalupe at the time of the Zonafication. A joint affidavit of Elias Pabalate and Gregorio Ganzon, residents of Guadalupe also supported the widow's allegations. Based on the foregoing testimony subject was determined to have died on 31 Dec 44. There is nothing in the file which can serve as a definite basis of identification between subject and the PC soldier referred to in SO #147 and Constabulary Officer's Diary of Andres P. Capitula.



✓ BAUTISTA, Silvino D, MRO-10 679 and XC-6 397 125: Subjects service was certified to VARO Manila on 19 Sep 49 as follows: Recognized Guerrilla Service from 10 May 43 to 25 Jun 44 and that he was killed in action 25 Jun 44 at Barrio Del Carmen, Lubao, Pampanga. The above certification was based on the appearance of subject's name on the Guerrilla Casualty Roster (KIA) of 320th Squadron, LGAF. Case was redetermined 9 May 51 under the Redetermination Program with no change warranted in the prior determination.

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Evidence submitted by WACO refers to one Silvino Bautista who was appointed a Private in the Philippine Constabulary effective 7 May 44 in San Fernando, Pampanga. Constabulary Officer's Diary of Andres P. Capitulo refers to one Silverio Bautista who was killed at Del Carmen, Pampanga during the encounter between members of the 8th Pampanga Company, PC and the Hukbos on 18 Jun 44. Affidvt of Emilio Hernandez attests to subject's death on 25 Jun 44 at Lubao, Pampanga, killed by Japs. The remains were never recovered. \* Mention is made here of one Federico Bautista as a survivor of the encounter. Affiant Ponciano B. Flores states that subject was killed 25 Jun 44 during an encounter with Jap soldiers in the vicinity of barrio Del Carmen, Lubao, Pampanga. There is no doubt that this is the same encounter referred to by Hernandez and Federico Bautista in their statement submitted in the cases of the other subject's of this investigation. The evidence considered as a whole in this and the other cases points to the fact that subject is identical with Silverio Bautista referred to in Capitulo's diary as having been killed on 18 Jun 44 at Del Carmen, Pampanga in the encounter between the PC and Hukbos.

PEREZ, Mariano G., MRO 8115, XC-16 841 495: A negative certification of service was furnished VARO, Manila on 13 Aug 51 with a statement that although the name PEREZ, Mariano appearing on the recognized casualty roster of the 320th Bn, LGAF pertains to the subject, he had no valid military service. A field investigation was made in subject's case and it was concluded that there was no proof of his service in the guerrillas. This was based on testimony of his immediate family and alleged company mates. The claimant widow made conflicting statements with regard to subjects activities after his alleged return to Masantol, Pampanga in Apr 42. On 30 May 51 she alleged that he joined the guerrillas in Jun 43 and that he was a guerrilla from that time until his death was reported to her about Jun 44. On 21 Jun 51 she made another statement to the effect that her husband did farming as a means of livelihood from 20 May 42 to 20 Jun 44 at which time he left Masantol to join the grias. This bit of information would tend to further indicate that some names were erroneously listed on the rosters of the 320th Sqdn, LGAF.

✓ The evidence submitted by the VA refers to one Marino Perez who was appointed a Private in the Philippine Constabulary effective 7 May 44 at San Fernando, Pampanga and Mariano Perez who was killed on 18 Jun 44 in the encounter between the PC and Hukbos. The foregoing information, taken into consideration with the evidence in the other cases in this investigation points to the fact that subject is identical with the PC soldier killed on 18 Jun 44 in the encounter between the PC and Hukbos.

GARCIA, Quirico B., XC-6 397 931: A positive certification of guerrilla service was furnished VARO, Manila on 23 Feb 50 based on the appearance of his name on the recognized casualty roster of the 320th Bn, LGAF which listed subject as KIA 25 Jun 44. Positive identification was made based on the beneficiary listed on the roster as Hermogenes Garcia, father, of Macabebe, Pampanga. A negative redetermination was made on 19 Sep 50 based on evidence obtained by field investigation in which it was concluded that subject may have had some connection with the guerrillas, but his death was brought about by his status and activities as a PC soldier. Affiants interviewed during the course of the field investigation stated that subject was a member of the PC, that he was actually seen wearing a Constabulary Uniform, and that at the same time he was serving the PC he had an undercover connection with the guerrillas under Emilio Hernandez. The file also contains a statement of Federico S. Bautista to the effect that about a year before the return of American Forces, he and Garcia were ordered by Hernandez to go to Bataan with a group of about nine men to gather arms and that near Tala, Bataan they were ambushed by the Japs, that Garcia fell dead, and that he (Bautista) was the only survivor.

There is one Quirico Garcia listed in the evidence submitted by VACO as having enlisted in the PC effective 7 May 44 and also one of the seven persons killed in the 18 Jun 44 encounter between the PC and Hukbos. Federico S. Bautista made affidavits in the cases of Juan S. Agustin; Pablo L. Soriano and Mariano G. Perez and in each statement he gave different accounts of the incident resulting in the death of his companions. In each statement however he alleges to be the lone survivor and it appears that he tried to cover up the true facts of the deaths of these men by making it appear that they were killed by the Japs while serving with the guerrillas. On the basis of the foregoing it is concluded that subject is identical with PC soldier.

MASANGKAY, Antonio B., XC-6 208 307: Subject's status was certified to VARO, Manila on 16 May 49 as positive for guerrilla service from 10 May 43 to 21 Feb 45 based on the recognized casualty roster of A Co, 320th Sqdn, LGAF. The evidence submitted by VACO contains only a reference to the name Antonio B. Masangkay listed on SO #147 as having been appointed a Private in the PC effective 7 May 44 at San Fernando, Pampanga. His name is not listed as one of those killed in the 18 Jun 44 encounter between the PC and Hukbos. There is on file in subject's 201 file a medical tag which shows that subject was KIA on 23 Feb 45 as a member of 320th Grla. Squadron while attached to E Company, 20th Infantry. This medical tag is compatible with the grla casualty roster except for a difference of two days in date of death. There is nothing of record to definitely identify the subject as the PC soldier referred to in SO #147. *Confidant advised as to recent location*

SORIANO, Pablo L., MRO-17 619 and XC-16 908 987: Status of subject was certified to VARO, Manila on 22 Jan 42 as follows: Besieged from 14 Dec 41 to 9 Apr 42; Missing 10 Apr 42 to 30 Apr 42; No Casualty Status 1 May 42 to 9 May 43; Recognized Guerrilla Service 10 May 43 to 29 Jun 43; POW 30 Jun 43; Missing 1 Jul 43 to 23 Oct 44. USAFFE service of subject was established by NSLI record and

affiants Jose Sunga and Fernando Punla. Guerrilla service was established by subject's name being listed on the recognized casualty roster (KILD) of 320th Bn, LGAF which shows date of casualty as 25 Jun 44. Positive identification was made based on beneficiary listed on the roster as Agapeto Soriano, Father, Masantol, Pampanga. Subject was accorded POW 30 Jun 43 and Missing from 1 Jul 43 to 23 Oct 44 based on testimony of affiant Sunga who alleged that subject was captured by the Japs in Jun 43 and not heard of since. The name Pablo L. Soriano is listed on SO #147 as having been appointed a Private in the PC effective 7 May 44. The name Pablo Soriano is also listed as one of the PC soldiers killed in the 18 Jun 44 encounter between the PC and Hukbos. Subject's file also contains an affidavit by Federico Bautista attesting to subject's death in Jun 44 while on an official mission to Lubao, Pampanga to collect arms for the guerrillas. This is the same Federico Bautista who initiated affidavits in the cases of Quirico B. Garcia, Juan S. Agustin and Mariano G. Perez. Considering the facts of the other cases it is evident that an attempt was made in this case, as well as the other subjects of this investigation, to conceal the true facts surrounding subject's activities with the PC and his death. It is therefore concluded that subject is identical with the PC soldier referred to in SO #147 and the Constabulary Officer's Diary of Andres P. Capitulo.

CONCLUSIONS: (1) That Juan S. Agustin, IO 304 340 and Remigio Bautista, 6 736 559 cannot be identified as being the PC soldiers referred to in the evidence submitted by the VA. ?

(2) That Silvino D. Bautista, MRO-10 679 and XC-6 397 125; Mariano G. Perez, MRO-8115 and XC-16 841 495; Quirico B. Garcia, XC-6 397 931; and Pablo L. Soriano, MRO-17 619 and XC-16 908 987 are identical with the PC soldiers listed in SO #147 and Capitulo's diary. OK

(3) That Antonio B. Masangkay, XC-6 208 307 is not identical with the PC soldier listed on SO #147. ~~at~~ *draft agree*

(4) The Federico Bautista who initiated affidavits in the cases of Quirico B. Garcia, Juan S. Agustin, Pablo L. Soriano and Mariano G. Perez is identical with the Federico Bautista listed on SO #147 as having been appointed a Private in the PC effective 7 May 44 and as the lone survivor of the 18 Jun 44 encounter between the PC and Hukbos referred to in Capitulo's diary.

REPORT OFPRELIMINARY REVIEWCASE NO. 815NAME: MR. Jaime S., 1st Sgt., ASN- NRFACTS DETERMINED FROM FILE INFORMATION:

1. From a perusal of the CIC information on a person bearing the same and identical name as the subject and after a record comparison of the CIC subject's personal circumstances and military activities with that of the subject referred to in this case, it has been inferred that both subjects are identified as one and the same person. Subject was investigated by a CIC agent at Cagayan, Misamis Oriental in August 1945 in relation to his collaboration activities with the enemy. In view of this finding, the Casualty Report issued on 19 March 1947 by Headquarters, Army of the Philippines listing subject as Missing on 6 May 1944 can not be admitted as an evidence inasmuch as subject has been found to be alive in August 1945 at Cagayan, Misamis Oriental.

It is to be noted that in the CIC Report subject left Manila after his graduation from the BC Academy (Japanese sponsored) on 12 April 1944 for Misamis Oriental to assume his assignment as a BC Inspector. Subject while serving in this capacity in Cagayan, Misamis Oriental became very notorious for his solicitous attitude towards the Japanese Military authorities in that area. In spite of having been married in Tanza, Cavite to Soledad G. Asuero (the herein claimant) on 3 January 1931, subject married for the second time while his first wife was subsisting to a resident of Cagayan, Misamis Oriental on 24 March 1945 (see CIC Report).

CIC subject's case was transmitted to HQ, Philippine Army for proper disposition and trial before the Loyalty Status Board, however an inquiry on this matter from HNSF, Camp Murphy proved negative.

A possibility is evident that subject may still be alive. It is suggested that investigation commence in Manila where subject was reported to have last been seen and heard from in June 1944 by the affiants mentioned below. Additional information relative to subject's activities while he was in Manila should also be taken for the purpose of correlating his BC activities and other allied matter in Cagayan, Misamis Oriental.

a. Affiant Francisco Avilla who states that he last saw subject in Manila in June 1944. His 201 File indicates that he was a 1st Sgt, Medical Service, HPA on 8 December 1941. He served in Betan until 9 April 1942. He managed to escape during the Death March. During the time when he last saw subject, he was an AIB Operative. He is presently a 2nd Lt, MAC, ASN- C-46780 on duty as Maint C Med AFPOD, Camp Murphy, Quezon City.

b. Affiants Catalino S. Cruzcoo, residing at #760 Velasquez, Tondo, Manila and Jose P. Areullo, residing at #160 Dandan, Tondo, Manila who state that they were subject's family physicians and that they last saw subject on 6 June 1944. They do not claim military status.

2. There is a probability that subject's claimant is withholding certain information that may be important in the solution of this case. It is suggested that she be contacted for additional information.

3. For the purpose of determining whether subject is still alive or dead, the following persons who according to the CIC Report knew of the existence of subject in August 1945 at Cagayan, Misamis Oriental are taken for possible reference:
- Second wife of subject whom he married in Cagayan, Misamis Oriental on 24 March 1945. Her identity may be known upon an inquiry in that area.
  - 1st Lt Ruben D. Neri, O-37535 who was the AC of S, G-2, 109th Div 10th MD operating in that area during the enemy occupation and who witnessed the investigation conducted by the CIC agent on the subject in August 1945. He is listed in the Revised Reconstructed Roster of the 10thMD. His 201 File shows him to be an Ex-USAFFE officer of "H" Co 101st Inf and substantiates his guerrilla activities. He resides at Cagayan, Misamis Oriental.
  - Vicente A. Neri, a resident of Ikog, Cagayan, Misamis Oriental who was investigated by the CIC agent relative to the collaboration activities of NER while a BG Inspector.
  - Epifanio Villacorta of Cagayan, Misamis Oriental who was arrested by NER during the enemy occupation.
  - Residents of Cagayan, Misamis Oriental may furnish first hand information on this point in view of subject's notoriety during his incumbency as a BG Inspector in that locality.
4. It is suggested that the investigator read the CIC Report on the subject at the CIC Det in order to acquire a better understanding of his activities and of other persons who may be able to furnish information on this case.

NAME: CALO, BenjaminFACTS DETERMINED FROM FILE INFORMATION:

1. No record pertaining to the subject veteran could be found from the following sources of information:

- a - Roster of POWs, Malaybalay Prison Camp
- b - Roster of POWs from Capas
- c - Roster of Capas Deaths
- d - Roster of Casualties in the Field
- e - Persons Seen or Killed at Fort Santiago
- f - Hawaiian Sugar Planters Association List
- g - Miscellaneous Files Maintained by the Review Section (to date)

2. Affiant Gregorio Lual, in his affidavit of 4 February 1949, testifies that he personally knew subject veteran; that the latter was called to active duty and reported to and was inducted at Camp Parang, Cotabato; that he was assigned to the 2nd Infantry; and that veteran was last seen in an encounter in Malaybalay, Bukidnon, where he died in action.

Verification of 201 file of aforesaid affiant reveals that he was inducted into the USAFFE on 1 September 1941 at Aroman, Cotabato, and was assigned to Company K, 101st Infantry to which unit he belonged until 10 May 1942.

It is noteworthy that affiant was inducted at a different place as subject veteran, and both belonged to different organizations. These facts hardly make him a competent witness with respect to the induction, organization assignment, military service, and circumstances surrounding death of the subject veteran. For purposes of clarification, however, it is recommended that he be contacted for amplification of his previous statements and to ascertain their veracity and, if based on hearsay, the actual source of such information.

3. Affiant Mansueto Esquebel, in his affidavit of 21 March 1949, attests substantially to the same allegations as the foregoing statements of Lual. Like the former, he too, was stationed in a different place - Malaybalay, Bukidnon, and belonged to a different organization.

In order to ascertain the veracity of affiant's statements, it is likewise suggested that he, too, be contacted for such amplification and additional information as he may furnish in order to resolve this case. Where no such information is obtained, it is suggested that he be requested to furnish the names of former companions of subject veteran whom he believes might be able to give the information desired.

4. Notes on the USAFFE (on file with the Review Section) reveal that the only unit mobilized at Camp Parang, Cotabato, was the 2nd Infantry, 1st Regular Division. If the allegation is true that subject veteran was inducted thereat, then he must have belonged to that organization. Under the column "persons to be contacted" are former officers of the aforesaid organization, whose names were taken from the reconstructed troop roster of the 2nd Infantry. They are recommended for contact for whatever information they might furnish to help resolve this case. In the event said contacts prove negative, it is suggested that these prospective interviewees be requested to furnish the names of former companions whom they believe might possess the desired data.

1. In the affidavit of Major Antonio G. Garcia, former commanding officer of the 100th Infantry Regiment, IGAF, dated 21 December 1947, he states that subject veteran was under order from the late Captain Vicente Pinon to join the Puppet Bureau of Constabulary for the purpose of spying on the activities of the Japanese. The late Captain Vicente Pinon was the Sual Squadron Commander under the regimental command of Major Antonio G. Garcia. For the purpose of verifying the allegations of Major Garcia in this affidavit, he may be contacted at 1125 Pennsylvania Street, Manila.

2. The present whereabouts of affiant, Dominador Buenaventura who is personally familiar with the facts and circumstances surrounding subject veteran's death maybe known through Buenaventura's uncle, Mr. Adriano Ulpindo, a resident of San Jose, Nueva Ecija. Mr. Ulpindo is mentioned in the affidavit of Buenaventura as the owner of the house in San Jose, Nueva Ecija where his mother evacuated and lived. This was the house where his friends, Jose Custodio and subject veteran stayed during their sojourn in this locality in April 1944. It is noted that Jose Custodio, Dominador Buenaventura and subject veteran were arrested in San Jose, Nueva Ecija by the Japanese during this occasion and were later transferred for confinement to the Muncs Military Police Garrison. (See affidavit of Dominador Buenaventura in this case file).

Mr Ulpindo maybe able to corroborate certain allegations made by Buenaventura. He may also furnish the names of other persons who can possibly know of some information pertinent to the questions at issue.

3. It is believed that all efforts should be exerted to contact Jose Custodio and Dominador Buenaventura. Apparently, they are the only material informants who can answer the data desired in the determination of this case.

There is sufficient lead in the DAC Memorandum to trace the present whereabouts of Jose Custodio. According to the Memo, Custodio is employed in a mine somewhere in Mt. Province.

FACTS DETERMINED FROM FILE INFORMATION:

1. Records of the Baybay National Agricultural School, Baybay, Leyte indicate that subject individual, who was student thereof when war broke out in December 1941, was called to active military duty on 12 December 1941.

Affiant Melocio Napala, Sgt, 002071, who seems to be the only reliable army personnel to attest to subject's military service in this case file, states that he saw subject individual at Camp Bampub, Tacloban, Leyte during the period when was also on active duty in December 1941. It is believed that a further inquiry from this affiant may result in the acquisition of names of prospective informants who may be considered qualified to attest to the data desired in resolving this case.

It appears that all the other supporting papers tending to prove subject's military service cannot be given much credence. The affidavits, after a verification of their respective military records on file at this headquarters, are shown to lack the necessary knowledge to attest to the facts that they purported to have known.

2. Attention is invited to a CE (now OGI, District Office #2) report pertinent to subject individual. This report states that the subject was a member of the Bureau of Constabulary in Leyte during the Japanese occupation. He was at that time residing at Burgos St, Tacloban, Leyte.

For the purpose of determining all the data necessary to the resolution of this case, former members of the Bureau of Constabulary in Leyte who were former USAFFE personnel are listed below for possible reference, to wit:

- (1) Lt Col Antonio A. Martinez, G-1137, Senior Inspector, IC, Tacloban, Leyte as of August 1942.

1. Exhibit #26 of the Miscellaneous Files maintained by the Review Unit contains the following information on a person bearing the same family name as the subject veteran:

 Rank - Private  
 Organisation - 2d La Union Company (BC)  
 Address - Ilocos Norte  
 Remarks - Pro-Jap

2. As per attached check sheet, subject veteran has no derogatory information at the OSI, District Office #2.

3. Information contained in OSEIP (PA) Form 9 submitted by claimant-mother indicates that subject veteran was released from the concentration camp on 26 September 1942 and immediately after which he was employed as a line man in Manila and later at Tagudin, Ilocos Sur. Subject veteran is alleged to have stayed in this job up to May 1944. It is further claimed that subject veteran had no guerrilla service and that he was killed in August 1944 as a result of "personal grudge".

4. Submitted by the claimant-mother in support of her claim as evidence of death of subject veteran are the following documents:

a. Affidavit of Mena S. Lardizabal (18 July 1948) indicating that subject veteran was killed by the Japanese in August 1944 at Ilocos Sur while on a mission for the Hunters ROTC, under which unit he was allegedly inducted on 15 October 1942.

b. Affidavit of Venancio Labiano (2 November 1945) which states that subject veteran, together with an unnamed person, was killed by a group of armed men in the house of Geminiano Lasorena at Barrio Ranget, Tagudin, Ilocos Sur, on 26 August 1944 at about six o'clock in the afternoon.

c. An affidavit of Juan Ramirez (2 November 1945) which information similar to that contained in the affidavit of Labiano.

Labiano and Juan Ramirez, there are also names of Sgt Labiano and Sgt Pakidao as probable veterans.

Lardizabal is a discredited affiant and his affidavit is not carried on any of the files of the Hunters ROTC, it is believed that subject veteran had no guerrilla service. It is more reasonable to believe that subject veteran is identified with the subject of the report and that his death was caused by a booby trap of his connections with the ROTC. In order to fully ascertain whether or not this is the fact, it is recommended that the following be made:

a. Contact Luis Balanon and Simplicio Basa, whose names also appear on Exhibit #26 as having been former members of the 2d La Union Company, for the identity or non-identity of the subject mentioned in Par 1 above with subject veteran. To effect easier identification, it is believed that a photograph of subject should be obtained from claimant.

b. Contact Venancio Labiano and Juan Ramirez for amplification of their previous testimonies to include a more detailed account of the circumstances leading to and surrounding the death of subject veteran. They should also be requested to furnish the names of the assailants of subject veteran for possible subsequent contact, if deemed necessary by the investigator. They should also identify the Sgt Pakidao mentioned in their respective affidavits for possible subsequent contact, as well as the names and addresses of persons whom they believe could furnish the necessary corroborative testimony.

c. Contact Leoncio Andaya and Geminiano Lamorena for verification as to whether or not they were present at the time of subject veteran's death or for whatever information they could offer relative to the circumstances leading to the death of subject veteran.

d. Contact claimant-mother, as well as barrio residents of Ranget, Tagudin, Ilocos Sur, for whatever information they could furnish on the matter. The attention of the claimant-mother should be called to the several discrepancies in her claim, especially with regards to the evidence of death.

NAME: MERCADO, PaulinoFACTS DETERMINED FROM FILES INFORMATION:

1. There is no records of subject veteran in the Miscellaneous Files Maintained by the Review Unit (to date).
2. Death records of the O'Donnell Concentration camp show that one, MERCADO, Paulino, civilian, 32 years of age, and whose nearest of kin is listed as Santiago Mercado, of Panaranda, Nueva Seija, died on 8 May 1942 of Heart Disease.
3. There is on file an unauthenticated copy of Special Order No. 111, Bureau of Constabulary, Manila, dated 13 May 1943, which shows that a person similarly named as subject veteran, was assigned to the 1st Cebu Company, IC, at Cebu, Cebu, effective 26 March 1943, after having completed the prescribed course of training in the Constabulary Academy, Cebu Branch.
4. While it is highly improbable that a man from Nueva Seija, after having died in concentration camp, would pop up in Cebu one year later and train in the Constabulary Academy there, it is nevertheless suggested that for purposes of clarification, contact be made with former companions of the second-named individual to ascertain whether there is identity with the subject veteran. If there is any such identity, it would not be hard for such former companions to determine because the subject veteran was a Tagalog or Ilocano (as the case may be), and his presence among Cebuans and other Visayans would be a fact that could easily be recalled.

2. The Loyalty Status of the subject veteran is not in question with the OSI, as per check sheet attached, dated 3 October 1949. However, in OGRFP (VAB) Form 48 accomplished by the father of the subject veteran on 18 May 1949, it is stated that the subject veteran joined the Puppet Bureau of Constabulary in February 1943 and that he served therewith up to September 1944. He was stationed at Dest. Camarines Norte.

3. Examination of the 201 file of affiants Jacquin L. Narvaes and Pompeyo A. Villaluz shows that both affiants were bona-fide members of the USAFFE. The former was inducted into the service on 2 September 1941 at Daraga, Albay and was subsequently assigned to Company C, Collecting, 51st Medical Battalion, and the latter served with the Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 51st FA, inducted at Camp Del Pilar, Pampanga.

a - Affiant Narvaes saw action at Tayabas and Bataan up to 9 April 1942. From 10 April 1942 to 4 October 1942 he was a prisoner of war concentrated at Camp O'Donnell, Capas, Tarlac, and was released on 5 October 1942.

b - Affiant Villaluz served with the Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 51st FA from 15 November 1941 up to 2 January 1942. On 3 January 1942 his unit was disbanded at Tayabas, and he remained as a civilian until 23 July 1945. On 24 July 1945 he returned to military control.

4. The FA 201 file of affiant Genes A. Gloefe has been charged out to the Adjustment Division of this headquarters. However, upon a check with that division the folder could not be located.

5. Inasmuch as these affiants, in their respective affidavits, alleged that they know the subject veteran personally, and in view of the fact that affiant Gloefe and Villaluz allegedly saw the subject veteran at Camp Del Pilar, Pampanga and was later seen by Narvaes at Bataan, it is suggested that contact be made with them in order to determine the correct organization and the companions of the subject veteran in the outfit. It is also possible that these people can furnish information pertinent to this case other than those previously advanced in their respective affidavits.

6. It is further suggested that Ex-Mayor Manuel Villagracia and Ex-Chief of Police Jose V Martinez, incumbent government officials in 1941, be contacted in order to determine the names of the other soldiers who were also called to active duty at the same day when the subject veteran reported for active military service.

7. In order to determine the circumstances surrounding the subject veteran's death, it is recommended that affiants Lorenzo Faming, Temoteo Obog and Job Barena be contacted. It is believed that upon being personally interviewed these people can furnish the investigator other important facts relative to the information required, which was not previously advanced in their respective affidavits.

8. It is also recommended that the parents of the subject veteran and the barrio folks of Malasugan, Labo, Camarines Norte, be interviewed for any information they can furnish pertinent to the information required.

FACTS DETERMINED FROM FILE INFORMATION:

1. As of this date, there is no information pertaining to the subject veteran in the Miscellaneous Files maintained by the Review Unit.

2. The claimant-widow, in Paragraph 10-d of GARR (PA) Form No. 9, stated that the subject veteran joined the Philippine Constabulary (Jap-Sponsored) on 25 September 1942 and left this organization on 25 September 1943. In Paragraph 4-d thereof, she stated that the subject veteran was a civilian under-ground agent in Manila and Iloilo from 26 September 1943 to March 1945.

3. In a certificate, dated 19 April 1946, Buenaventura T. Villanueva stated that the subject veteran was inducted into the Allied Intelligence Bureau (7th MD Luzon) on 2 November 1942 and, in an affidavit executed on 30 April 1946, he stated that "when Lt HAVA was assigned in Iloilo he kept me posted of the shipping route and facilitated the travel of our operatives until I lost contact with him on or about October 1944." Villanueva further stated that subject veteran was promoted to 1st-Lieutenant by the Allied Intelligence Bureau. A check of the recognized rosters of this organization, however, fails to reveal the inclusion of the name of the subject veteran thereon.

Villanueva if deemed necessary by the Investigator, may be contacted, to determine the veracity of his allegation in his affidavit, dated 30 April 1946, with a view to obtaining the information required in this case.

4. Among the various affiants in the subject veteran's 201 file, the following may be able to furnish the information required in this case:

a. Jose M. Aldeguer, who, in an affidavit, dated 13 May 1945, stated that he employed Lt Oscar Hava as his agent. This affiant has no PA 201 file record in this headquarters.

b. Conchita Garcia, an Intelligence Agent, as shown by records in her PA 201 file, who stated that the subject veteran had been supplying her with information about the enemy until 18 March 1945. (Affidavit dated 18 May 1946)

c. Romeo C. Hironia, Capt O-27299, who, in an affidavit, dated 29 May 1946, stated that the subject veteran furnished him with information pertaining to enemy movements. This affiant was in the service of the 4th Military District (Quezon) from 1 August 1942 to 6 June 1945, as shown by records in his PA 201 file.

d. Robert C. Sullivan Jr., who, in an affidavit executed on 17 September 1946, stated among other things, that the subject veteran supplied him with important information about the enemy.

e. Dominador S. Sustento, 2nd Lt O-23957 and Jose V. Aventino, 1st Lt O-23956, who, in their respective affidavits, dated 12 September 1945, testified that the subject veteran furnished the guerrillas with information regarding enemy movements and activities. These affiants were bona-fide members of the 6th Military District.

5. There is derogatory information pertaining to the subject veteran in the OSI, District Office No. 2. Records pertaining to the subject veteran on file in this office must be examined for leads which may help in the resolution of this case. These records contain information pertaining to the activities of the subject veteran subsequent to his discharge from the Bureau of Constabulary.

6. Records on file indicate that subject veteran perished in an airplane crash which occurred between Cebu and Panay on 5 February 1946.

1st Indorsement of Headquarters, Philippine Air Force, dated 21 July 1950, in reply to a letter from this headquarters, dated 12 June 1950, subject: "Request for records, copies of which are attached herewith, elicited no information which may help in the resolution of this case, other than the fact that the subject veteran was a passenger on board a C-47 plane of the Philippine Army Air Force which crashed on 5 February 1946 between Cebu and Panay.

7. The claimant also stated in Paragraph 4-d of GSRP (A) Form No. 9 that the subject veteran returned to military control from March 1945 to 4 February 1946.
