I. Punitive Tactics

Page 7 A. ESSENTIALS

1. In the middle of Mar the AMERICAN forces in the Central and South PACIFIC Areas suddenly intensified their counteroffensive. By the latter part of Apr powerful task forces had attacked several of our strategic positions. Meanwhile, the bandits on the islands are making plans to extend their underground organizations, gradually becoming more active in anticipation of the return of the AMERICANS. The stimulation of banditry through the smuggling in by submarine of arms and AMERICAN personnel, along with radio communication, subversion, propaganda and reconnaissance of our situation have increased in scope.

Page 8

2. To strengthen the defense of the PHILIPPINES, the Army has revised the defense areas for which the various groups (DIVISION) are responsible. The division was made responsible for the defense of the VISAYAN area and the PALAWAN-BUSUANGA Island Group. Its main strength was sent to eastern VISAYA. The 31 Ind Mixed Brig, hitherto in western VISAYA, was placed under the command of the division.

3. During the middle of Apr the division gave over its former defense area on LUZON to 33 Ind Mixed Brig. Gradually the main strength of the division was relocated on SAMAR and LEYTE Islands; 31 Ind Mixed Brig and attached forces were placed under the division for the defense of BUSUANGA and PALAWAN. Defensive strong points were established on SAMAR and LEYTE along with the greater part of the relocated forces and by the latter part of Apr basic defense measures had been carried out.

B. DEFENSE

1. In order to strengthen the defense of LEYTE and SAMAR rapidly in accordance with WATARI (#1) Group (SHUDAN) (TN 14 Army) Opn Order No A969 of 5 Apr, the main strength of the division was relocated on LEYTE and SAMAR. By WATARI Group Opn Order No A972 of 8 Apr the division was assigned to the defense of VISAYA, BUSUANGA and PALAWAN.

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2. In compliance with the order, the force CGs were assembled at DHQ at LOS BANOS, and preparations were ordered for the relocation of the main strength.

3. From 7 Apr on, the division CG investigated the situation of all garrison units (KEIBI) in the LAGUNA, MINDORO Island and BATAAN Sectors. The chief of staff made secret arrangements with Army Hq and the shipping organization concerning transportation of the main strength of the division; he then proceeded to TACLOBAN, LEYTE, assumed control of the forces and undertook the necessary reconnaissance.

4. On 10 Apr at MANILA, in accordance with the Army order, the division ordered the CGs of 31 Ind Mixed Brig, 20 Inf Regt and garrison units of BUSUANGA and PALAWAN Islands to continue their present duties of defense of the VISAYAN area. On 13 Apr, the division CG proceeded to TACLOBAN and established the DHQ.

Page 10 5. On 17 Apr, each force CO and delegates authorized to receive orders assembled at TACLOBAN regarding the establishment of defenses in the VISAYAN area and the BUSUANGA-PALAWAN Island Group. The forces proceeded in order to their new stations. The disposition of forces follows:

- a. SAMAR Island Defense Unit (BOEI): SAMAR and MASBATE Islands - Main strength of 9 Inf Regt.
- b. LEYTE Sector Defense Unit: South central LEYTE - Main strength of 20 Inf Regt.
- c. ORMOG Sector Defense Unit: Northwestern LEYTE - 3 Bn, 9 Inf Regt.
- d. Western VISAYAN Sector Defense Unit: BOHOL, CEBU, NEGROS, PANAY, TABLAS Island Group - 31 Ind Mixed Brig.

Page 11 e. PALAWAN Sector Defense Unit: BUSUANGA-PALAWAN Island Group - 6 Co, 9 Inf Regt; one platoon of 6 Co, 20 Inf Regt.

f. Forces under direct command of the division: LEYTE Island - two batteries of 2 Bn, 22 Fld Arty Regt; 16 Engr Regt; Div Sig Unit; one platoon of 4 Co, 63 Ind Mt Bn; Ord Duty Unit; 4 Fld Hosp; Hygiene and Water Supply Sec. SAMAR Island - 2 Fld Hosp.

Page 12 6. 169 Ind Inf Bn, which heretofore had been engaged in defense duties on SAMAR under the direct command of 31 Ind Mixed Brig, returned to its original unit. It proceeded immediately by naval warship to ILOILO, PANAY, to serve as the nucleus for punitive operations there in accordance with the defense changes mentioned above.

7. 1 Bn, 33 Inf Regt, which was on LUZON, returned to the division and was stationed in the vicinity of PALO in northeastern LEYTE as the division replacement unit. Defense sectors were allotted to it. 16 Engr Regt, which is under direct control of the division, was made responsible for the defense of the southwest coastal area of SAMAR and TACLOBAN and BARATANGON in northeastern LEYTE. The Water Purification Section was assigned to defense and maintenance of order in PALO and vicinity.

Page 13 8. In accordance with the Army order, the division was newly allotted the defense of DINAGAT Island, the important point midway between MINDANAO and LEYTE. The division reported to the Army its opinion about the return to the division of forces under its command left on LUZON. It proceeded with preparations to dispatch one company immediately to LUZON.

9. On the 22d the chief of staff and staff officers, the O/C of the ordnance section and the required personnel from the field artillery unit conducted a reconnaissance of the east coast of LEYTE between ABUYOG, TOLOSA, TANAUAN and PALO.

10. In the middle of Apr powerful enemy task forces, advancing westward, bombed TRUK, SAIPAN and PONAPE Islands. A large convoy effected a landing in force at strategic HOLLANDIA on the north coast of NEW GUINEA. In view of the Army report on the likelihood of more enemy raids and the threat of an attack on the PHILIPPINES, the division ordered the defense units under its command to maintain stricter security and to strengthen air defense. An investigation is to be made regarding the future confiscation and use of civilian small craft. Preparations for their requisition will be made.

11. According to a Navy report, an enemy submarine approached LEYTE east of SAN JOSE Airfield on the night of 30 Apr. At that time the second convoy of the division was en route to TACLOBAN. To protect the convoy strict watch was kept along the LEYTE coast by the division defense units and 2 FA Btry. The area was searched by one element of the force under direct control of the division, but no trace of the submarine was found. The reconnaissance units were withdrawn.

12. The strength of the forces in the group (HEIDAN) at the end of the month is shown in Attached Map No 4.

C. DISCIPLINARY MEASURES AND PUNITIVE OPERATIONS

1. Bandit situation: Enemy bandit activities are generally increasing. The important bandit chiefs in the area have maintained communication by radio with Maj Gen FERTIG on MINDANAO and with UNITED STATES and AUSTRALIA. They are influenced by the propaganda and the supplies of arms and ammunition brought by enemy submarines. They have blind faith that the AMERICAN troops will return in the near future. They are planning to unite all bandit groups and call for an uprising when the AMERICANS attack.

2. The situation in the various areas.

Page
16

a. LUZON (Including MINDORO Island) - Each bandit group has been heretofore working as an underground organization determined to increase its own strength. Friction between bandit groups arising out of difference of opinion in questions of strength and ideology has been increasing. Time after time they do the opposite to what is expected of them in combat. At the same time the activity of the bandit intelligence organizations has shown no appreciable change as each group entices away the agents and infiltrators of other groups. The communist bandits (Anti-JAPANESE Peoples' Army) in central LUZON are gradually becoming completely communistic, a development which must not be underestimated.

b. LEYTE and SAMAR Area - The bandit forces under Col KANGLEON and Lt Col KOHIN* which have united are busily gathering food. They are active everywhere; they plan to attack our small forces and are endeavoring to conciliate the inhabitants. The advance of the main strength of the group (HEIDAN) has lessened their will to fight, but they are moving about in the mountains. Col KANGLEON has communicated secretly with Maj Gen FERTIG on MINDANAO by radio and small craft, and is receiving supplies of arms and ammunition. Such activity is carried on vigorously.

Page 17 c. Western VISAYAN Area - In the middle of Apr bandit groups hiding in the mountains in the central part of the various islands suddenly became more active. Many attacks on our small units are occurring here and there. This may be due to shortage of food, but the recent increase in the number of radio stations indicates that false propaganda from the UNITED STATES and AUSTRALIA has a profound influence.

d. PALAWAN Island - Some bandits and some of the powerless MORO tribespeople are hiding in the central and northern mountainous regions of the island. They are not very active.

3. Punitive operations: In order to establish a firm defense, the group (HEIDAN) is carrying out punitive measures against the guerrilla chiefs, infiltrated spies and enemy radio stations. At opportune times it is conducting organized and systematic punitive operations in an effort to wipe out enemy bases.

Page 18 a. LUCON Island Area - The garrison units (KEIBI) in various sectors have strengthened their respective intelligence organizations. They have united their areas of operation and are endeavoring to uproot the underground activities of the various bandit groups. The undercover organizations in TARIAC Province, BULACAN Province and the southern humid belt of PAMPANGA Province have been wiped out for the most part by continuous punitive action.

The garrison unit (KEIBI) on MINDORO captured an enemy radio set. During the period 1-8 Apr it mopped up southeast BATANGAS, capturing 64 pistols, and striking a heavy blow at the concealed bandit groups.

b. LEYTE-SAMAR Island Area - According to the advance garrison of the main strength of the division, the scattered bandit forces time their actions to take place during the period of rotation of the guards. Nevertheless, bandit groups are being captured by persistent punitive efforts.

Page 19 The division dispatched 1 Intelligence Sqd to northern LEYTE to capture bandit Col BARUNDERIAN* who is active in that area.

The LEYTE defense unit (BOEI) is mopping up a section of southern LEYTE to destroy radio station NEW under KANGLEON.

Troops of the SAMAR defense unit have been disposed in preparation to destroy Station MACA.

c. Western VISAYAN Area - On 8 Apr YAMAGUCHI (#1) Force on NEGROS raided and destroyed wireless stations TBR and PVE (under Capt SOLIVEN) located in the mountains to the north.

Results of operation: Transmitting and receiving sets of Stations TBR and PVE; generator installations and one set of accessories; seven abandoned enemy dead.

Page 20 On 27 and 28 Apr, the KABANKALAN and LA CARLOTA garrison units (KEIBI) were attacked by a powerful group of bandits. However, YAMAGUCHI Force, which was preparing for an organized punitive expedition, immediately attacked them. The bandits, leaving 27 dead, withdrew east into the mountains in disorderly flight.

In order to exterminate bandit chiefs and enemy wireless sets, both PANAY and NEGROS, MUKU Force (#2) (TN 31 Ind Mixed Brig.) Force advanced its command post on 26 Apr to ILOILO and commenced organized punitive action.

4. The situation of enemy bandit activities during this month is shown on Attached Map No 1.

5. The situation of major punitive operations during this month is shown on Attached Chart No 1.

6. The battle results for this month are shown on Attached Chart No 2.

Page 21 D. PROPAGANDA

1. Functions of enemy propaganda and its influence: Recently the bandit propaganda organizations have definitely changed their strategy. They are now carrying out counter-propaganda, inciting the inhabitants section by section. The trend is to create uncertainty in the minds of the people of the important towns and villages by spreading rumors by radio of shortages in food and other daily necessities of life. As a whole the inhabitants are bewildered by bandit propaganda and secretly anticipate a JAPANESE-AMERICAN war in the PHILIPPINES during the last half of this year.

2. Effect of our propaganda: Simultaneously with the landing of the main strength of the division at TACLOBAN in Apr, a poster proclaiming "A great JAPANESE force has landed to carry out punitive operations" was posted in all districts. At the same time, organized verbal propaganda was carried on to overcome and destroy bandit counter-propaganda. "Radio News" was distributed daily to all town and village halls for inhabitants desiring the latest news. Late in the month the name was changed to "LEYTE and SAMAR", and it has been published continuously as a propaganda organ under the auspices of the provinces. By these methods we are endeavoring to destroy all enemy propaganda. Because of our propaganda activities of the bandits, heretofore very apparent, have not been so prevalent recently. The confidence of the inhabitants in the JAPANESE Army gradually grows stronger; at times, in LEYTE and SAMAR, due to the comparatively simple character of the inhabitants, excellent results are apparent.

Page 22 E. MILITARY TOPOGRAPHY

1. 2d Lt ITO (#1) of the staff, who was dispatched to investigate the military topography of PALAWAN Island, accompanied the troops in the relieving of the garrisons (KEIBI) on the island during the first part of last month. He completed his mission maintaining close relations with the new garrison unit (KEIBI) during its punitive expedition.

2. During the organized punitive operation of the division at the end of last year in the LEYTE-SAMAR area, research for various military topographic sketches was carried out, with emphasis on LEYTE. Immediately after the coming relocation, these former investigations are to be consolidated and all other matters pertaining to the force to be compiled; defense preparations are to be perfected.

II. Training, Organization, Replacement and Rotation

A. TRAINING

Page
24

1. Recruit training: Due to epidemic and to changes in the defense area, the new recruits of 20 Inf Regt have been waiting for transportation at MANILA for the greater part of Apr. The majority of the recruits of 9 Inf Regt spent most of Apr in transit and were not able to undergo adequate basic training.

In general, the other forces have progressed satisfactorily. The recruits of 33 Inf Regt, 16 Engr Regt and one element of 9 Inf Regt completed basic training inspection during the latter part of Apr.

The report was dispatched concerning assignment to active duty medical training, which follows recruit basic training.

2. Disbandment of Div Training Unit: The Div Training Unit which was organized in Oct 43 for the purpose of training infantry division staff officers and B (*1) class cadet reserve officers was disbanded on 9 Apr due to the relocation of the main strength of division in the VISAYAN Area. The greater portion of the second training period for B class cadet reserve officers had been completed.

3. Classification of A (*2) and B class cadet reserve officers for ass training: The 15 reserve officer cadets of the first selection for 1944 were classified into A and B groups on 1 Apr. During the first part of Apr, nine A class cadets were detached to the respective forces in charge of their training.

4. Selective examination for candidates for second lieutenant and for volunteer special service officer selectees: A report was dispatched concerning a selective examination for candidates for line branch second lieutenant and for volunteer special service officer selectees for 1944 which was conducted in accordance with Army Military Secret Nos 634 and 635 dated 22 Feb. 47 candidates for second lieutenant and six volunteer special service officer selectees took the test.

B. ORGANIZATION, REPLACEMENTS AND ROTATION

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Page 26 2. Assembly of returning personnel: With the completion of training of medical personnel and motor truck drivers, the returning personnel, Mod Capt YAMANAKA (91) and 189 men who constitute the surplus personnel, were gathered at MANILA on 25 Apr and are waiting there.

III. Rear Echelon Activities

A. TRAFFIC, LIAISON AND TRANSPORTATION

1. Traffic: The maintenance work for the roads running length-wise across CAMARINES NORTE Province which has been carried out since the latter part of Feb was handed over to 33 Ind Mixed Brig at the time of the relocation of the main strength of the division in SAMAR and LEYTE. One element of the engineer regiment which was sent as an advance party and personnel from each defense unit (BCEI) have started maintenance work on the main roads of LEYTE and SAMAR. Local labor is being utilized to continue work determinedly. The main roads at the end of Apr are listed below:

a. SAMAR Island

Page 27 (1) CATBALOGAN-CALBAYOG road.
 (2) CATBALOGAN-TACLOBAN road.
 (3) WRIGHT-TAPT road.

b. LEYTE Island

- (1) TACLOBAN-DULAG-ABUYOG road.
- (2) TANAUAN-DAGAMI-BURAUEN-DULAG road.
- (3) PALO-CARIGARA road.
- (4) CARIGARA-ORMOG-ALBUERA road.
- (5) ABUYOG-BAYBAY road.
- (6) BAYBAY-BATO-MASIN-MALITBOG-SOGOD road.

2. Liaison: For the purpose of protecting liaison after the moving of division Hq, the liaison post of MANILA was strengthened and a liaison post was newly established at IEGASPI to maintain liaison with Army Hq and other forces in LUZON.

Page 28 3. Transportation required by relocation: Transportation required for relocation of the main strength of the division on SAMARA and LEYTE is described on Attached Chart No 3.

In the move of the various forces to their respective sectors, the majority had to depend on small craft in addition to the road network. But as the number of suitable boats was limited, close contact was maintained with related organizations, and the work of unloading and transshipping was done quickly. The completion of the disposition of the relieving forces and forces taking up new stations is expected to be rapid and without hitch.

4. The disposition of the rear organization for this month is indicated on Attached Map No 5.

B. SIGNAL COMMUNICATION

With the advance of the division to SAMAR and LEYTE, the greater portion of the group's wireless network and one portion of the wire signal network on LUZON was removed; the Army and Communication Bureau stations were turned over to 33 Ind Mixed Brig. When division Hq arrived at TACLOBAN, LEYTE, they established a signal network with the defense unit (BCEI) of each sector. The wire signal network is indicated on Attached Map No 2. The wireless signal network is indicated on Attached Map No 3.

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C. ORDNANCE

1. Survey of ordnance: The present supply of important weapons, with losses, is shown on Attached Chart No 4.
2. Summary of ordnance duty: Duties of maintenance and supply of weapons were carried out with particular emphasis directed towards the LEYTE-SAMAR area, in conjunction with the punitive operations of the division.
3. Weapons, ammunition and materials: The increased equipment and ration supply received from the Army on the occasion of the movement of the main strength of the division is shown on Attached Charts No 5 and No 6.

D. INTENDANCE

Page
30

1. Supply: With the relocation of the main strength of the group (HEIDAN) during the first part of the month, the field storehouse at SAN FERNANDO was closed. Field storehouses were newly established in the vicinity of TACLUBAN and CATEBLOGAN, and are maintaining supply in conjunction with the field storehouse at PARMQUE. The PARMQUE field storehouse receives and transports various military supplies for the forces being relocated.
2. Collecting reserve rations and forage: The prompt collection of reserve rations and forage has been attempted. In accordance with the changes of disposition accompanying the relocating of the main strength of the group (HEIDAN) it has been determined to collect rations and forage at warehouses in the vicinity of CARIGARA, ALANGALANG, PALO and ORHOC and at the locations of all other forces, as well as at the warehouses named above. Preparations are now underway; plans call for the collection to be completed generally by the latter part of May. Emphasis will be laid on collection at the location of each force.

3. Self-subsistence: Preparations for self-subsistence are developing steadily in compliance to the group's "Essentials in Self-Subsistence". But with the relocation of the main strength of the group (HEIDAN), the Farm No 1 (MABALCAT in PAMPANGA Province), with an area of 300 CHO (≈1) (TN 1 CHO = 2.45 acres.) was handed over to 14 Army Pld Freight Depot. The remaining self-subsistence equipment of relocating forces was transferred to the relieving forces. Besides directing the preparations of the various units for self-subsistence in their new defense areas (BOEI), the Intendance Department has direct control of ALANGALANG farm (18 CHO) and TANAUAN farms (100 CHO).

4. Countermeasures necessitated by revision of the amount of rations and supplies: Because of the unfavorable food situation in the PHILIPPINES, the Army has revised the amount of supplies issued. The fixed daily ration of polished rice per man after 1 May will be less than 400 g. This will be supplemented with coarse cereal obtained by the group (HEIDAN) or with local products or products from the self-subsistence farms thereby consistently maintaining battle strength.

5. Clothing and military supplies: As the result of a general issue of new clothing and supplementary issues to replace missing items, the standard of uniforms is excellent on the whole. At the time of embarkation at MANILA each force carried supplies for two months and the group (HEIDAN) carried three months' supply of clothing repair material, expendable articles and articles for use on the field. Thus the units are well prepared for battle.

Page 32 6. Supply of lumber for construction: In view of the duties of the group (HEIBAN), it is imperative to accumulate large quantities of lumber. By supervising directly all existing lumber mills on the island and by acquiring timber now, we plan to have the necessary lumber by the middle of May.

7. Acquisition of small craft: The special characteristics of the terrain in the garrison area (KEIBI) make it necessary to control the existing shipyards. This will speed up shipbuilding. During the middle of the month one sailing vessel was purchased. Its sails are being made ready now; the work is expected to be completed shortly.

E. HYGIENE AND MEDICAL SITUATION

1. General summary of medical force (EISEI) activities: With the movement of the main strength of the division, medical facilities were dispersed at important points to collect and evacuate patients. The military sanitation sketch of the operation area was studied, especially in regard to malaria, epidemic diseases, local disease and water supply. Sanitation plans based on this study were devised for the maintenance of offensive battle strength.

Page 33 a. Medical Unit (EISEI), 1 Fld Hosp - Under direct control of the Army; supplies medical materials and collects and evacuates patients of the garrison forces (CHUTON) in south central LUZON. Placed under the command of 33 Ind Mixed Brig during the middle of the month, carrying out duties as before.

Page 34 b. 2 Fld Hosp - At the end of the month the NAGA hospital was relieved by one element of the 12 Southern Army Hosp. The convalescent station at CALAUAN was closed. Its main strength is preparing to move to SAMAR.

c. 4 Fld Hosp - The main strength established a hospital at TACLOBAN, LEYTE. One element took over convalescent stations at ORMOG, ABUYOG and MALITBOG; it established a new convalescent station at CAYBALOGAN, SAMAR.

d. Hygiene and Water Supply Station - One element was dispatched ahead to TACLOBAN for duties of hygiene, water supply and bacterial investigation. The main strength is being sent to LEYTE.

2. Increasing the fighting efficiency of the men:

a. After the relocation, malaria and epidemic prevention was stressed by all forces. Diligent completion of various hygienic facilities was planned, and an effort was made to give proper food and rest. Thus good health on the field of battle was assured.

b. Estimate of battle strength - At the end of Apr the division (excluding forces on LUZON) had 58 patients still attached to their units and 342 hospitalized patients, a total of 400, constituting a decrease of 6.6% in battle strength.

Out of 9299 men subjected to the malaria protozoa test, 36.1% were former malaria cases reexamined, 3.1% reacted positively and 9% required treatment.

c. New patients - Excluding those of forces on LUZON and 3 Bn, 9 Inf Regt, 1 Bn Hq, 20 Inf Regt and 3 Bn, 20 Inf Regt at NEGROS, there were 402 new patients during the month. 44 were killed or wounded in combat and 358 fell ill in line of duty. The number of patients averaged 12.2 daily, a decrease of 3.5 from the previous month.

Page 35 Of the 44 casualties, 24 were killed (including three officers).
The 20 wounded included two officers.

There were 358 cases of illness incurred in line of duty; a total of 377 cases required medical treatment. Main types of illness were nine cases of contagious disease, 59 cases of malaria, 13 cases of beriberi, 48 cases of acute enteritis, 39 cases of skin disease and 36 cases of accidental injury.

d. Prevention of infectious disease - During transport at the time of relocation, prevention of disease was of the greatest importance. Ships were disinfected as an added military precaution. Upon disembarkation, quarantine and bacterial examination was enforced, thus assuring the prevention of disease. The following important contagious diseases occurred during the month: Typhoid, five cases; paratyphoid, two cases; bacillary dysentery, one case; anobic dysentery, one case; total, nine cases.

Page 36 e. Prevention of intermittent fever - In the prevention of intermittent fever emphasis was placed on checking the spread of malaria in the new defense area (BOGI). Fundamental investigations were carried out and an effort was made to construct facilities for prevention of intermittent fever. Anti-mosquito equipment and thick smoke were utilized. Use of internal prophylaxis was strictly enforced. There were a total of 39 malaria patients during the month.

f. New cases of tuberculosis - None.

g. Sanitation training - Emergency sanitation methods were employed as far as knowledge permitted. Thorough training in first aid and chemical warfare protection for medical personnel was carried out.

F. HORSES

Page 37 1. Summary: Horses were trained with the force to which attached as much as possible and were used to the utmost in transporting military supplies and on training marches. It was planned to toughen the horses by this means. Their general health is good. At the time of the relocation in the LEYTE-SAMAR area a small number of personnel were left behind to take charge of the transportation of the horses of the force, and are expected to overtake us. The number and condition of horses attached to the various units is shown on Attached Chart No 7.

2. Disease prevention: Out of 290 local horses purchased recently on LEYTE, 70 became diseased following an outbreak of a horse disease called ZURUPA*. The KAKI 6555 Force (TN 20 Inf Regt, 16 Div.) and all other units possessing horses at TACLOBAN are determinedly trying to prevent the disease. By dividing the horses into small groups, taking temperatures, making microscopic examinations, etc, complete prevention of disease is aimed at. By the end of the month the number of new cases had rapidly declined.

3. Number of horses dead or sick: The number of horses lost at the veterinary depot this month follows:

22 FA Regt - four. One case of DEMHIN (*1); one died of ZURUPA*; two contracted hoof cancer.

inary depot. Except for those with high temperatures or communicable
anemia, they are generally progressing favorably. The majority of
the ill horses either sustained accidental injuries or have eye or
digestive trouble.

G. AWARDS AND PUNISHMENT

The awards and punishment for this month are shown in Attached
Charts No 8 and No 9. Compared to the previous month the number of
offenses decreased. However the frequency of such offenses as
stockade-breaking and various misdemeanors is regrettable. In-
structions regarding the security of code books were received from
higher Hq. In view of the importance of the code book lost at sea
during combat, the persons responsible have been questioned, apart
from the standard procedure.
