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### 192nd Tank Battalion (U.S.) Story of Lt. Holland

Fought up north with 26th Cav. but had little action. On Dear 30, 1941 at Zaragosa Co. A deployed-24 plat. on rt, then 24, let. 3d plat. hit by c 100-300 bicycle troops at night & then tanks destroyed them all. Lt. Reed KIA was in lest tank. Pvt. Underwood, his driver, stayed with him in ditch till he died, was captured & well treated for his gallantry. (Co. C lost 1 tank near Casm D1.

At Mailaban Holland had 1st plat. Co. A with 11th Inf. Co. C was at Baliuag & had 1st tank duel with enemy. Jap tanks lost 9 because they could not stand against U. S. tanks.

Joined 194th at Guagus. Lost 2 tanks at Lubso Pvt...? Reediams, driver of tank dazed when machine hit & tore lef of Hart. He came to & drove out. Hart survived but died in Bilibld of infected tooth. At Lubso Holland said they thought they were behind WLB but learned the PA had w/d 2 miles.

At Lavac Junction deployed but had no contact. Small fight at Hermosa. Then they went to bivous on P-B rd. Thence to beach defense for 2 weeks from Pilar to Limay. Jan 20-to Abucay line. Then covered W/D Jan 24. No action. Went to rest area on lost road c NP 148.

g Jan. 26-to road patrol on west coast. Then Holland, ordered to Tuol with 4 tanks & 2 half tracks. Spent night at 11th div. Of they left half tracks there & proceeded to join 45th. At 3 pm. attacked & rode thur Trail 7 to otherside of poctet. Lost 1 tank but men got out safely. Later lost another on which Blanchi rode but snoked it out. Cpl Satterlac later 2d Lt rode a tank in & operated mg. Got DSC & Ffc. Anderson, the driver got DSC & as expeanity. He was lat draftee to get DSC & received much publicity at home. His town floated bond issue for him, One sgt. of Holland's BYIA in the pocket. Spent rest of war in hosp.

Bo. B relieved Holland. Lt. Winger KIA (Collins said by Filipinos as he left his damage tank). Later Co. C relieved B. Co. C had fought at Agloloma & lost 1 tank & crew. Japs filled it with dirt.

After Agloloma & Tuol Co. A went to Bobo Pt., Co. C to 11th Div. & Co. B to Gen. Weaver & Tank Group Headquarters. Co. C 194th came west on T 8 cut off & defended at Pantingan (relieved 45th at top of hill evening of April 8).

Co. D came to PI with 192d but was transferred to 194th. 192d arrived c Nov. 20, 1941.

The North Lason Force, dispersed throughout the central and northern Luson area, was commanded by Major General Wainwright. It included two units of the Regular Army, the 31st Infantry Regiment and the 192d Tank Battalion, a former National Guard Organization, as well as six units of the Fhilippine Scouts. These were the 15th and the 57th Infantries, (FS); the 26th Cav. (FS) and the 23rd, 21th and 88th F.A. Regiments (FS). General Wainwright also had the following Fhilippine Army Divisions:

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The 21st Reserve Division under Brig. Gen. Mateo M. Capinpin, PA
The 31st Reserve Division under Gol Clifford Bluemel, AUS

The 91st Reserve Division under Brig. Gen Lather Stevens, AUS
The 50uth Luson Force was under the command of Brig. General

George Parker. It consisted of one Regular Army unit, the 19hth Tank Battalion; one Philippine Scout unit, the 86th Field Artillery; the 1st and the 2nd Philippine Constabulary Regiments, and three Philippine Army Divisions:

The 1st Regular Division under Brig. Cen. Fidel Segundo, PA
The blat Reserve Division under Brig. Cen. Vicente Idm, PA
The 51st Reserve Division under Col. Albert M. Jones, AUS
The Visayan-Mindanae force was commanded by Col. William F.
Sharp, with headquarters in Mindanae, and it contained no Regular
Army units. It had one Fhilippine Scout Regiment, the h3rd Infantry;
the 3rd Fhilippine Constabulary Regiment, and three Fhilippine Army
divisions:

The Gist Reserve Division, under Gol. Bradford G. Chynoweth, USA.
The Sist Reserve Division, under Gol. Guy D. Fort, PA
The loist Reserve Division, under Col. Joseph P. Vachon, PA.

There were also elements of other divisions including the 2d Infantry, the 73rd Infantry and the 93rd Infantry.

The Harbor Defense Command, consisting of Corregidor and its satellite islands, was commanded by Brig. Cen. George F. Moore and was composed of two Regular Army Regiments, the 59th and 60th Coast Artillery; two Philippine Scout units, the 91st and the 92nd Coast Artillery Regiments, and the hth U. S. Marine Regiment, which had just been moved in from Subic Bay.

Command headquarters feared that the single blow at Clark Field had virtually decided the course of the war in the Philippines. The 26th Cavalry, bombed out of Fort Stotsenburg, moved into the nearby mountains, prepared to strike at the first enemy beach landing wherever it might come. On December 9, Michols Field, another key army air base at Manila was bombed almost to destruction. The Japs apparently hoped to catch that part of the FFAF which had gone there for refuge. Group installation destruction, however, was all they accomplished — but that was complete.
