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# HISTORY OF THE 1ST ABRA CO, PC

# (Dec 1941 - Mar 1943)

A. The following history of the 1st Abra Co PC has been deduced from a special study conducted on thirty (30) Abra Co PC cases:

At the outbreak of the war, the let Abra Co, PC, was stationed at Bengued, Abra. The CO was Capt Abrocole Arce who had gone to Manila to undergo medical treatment on 15 Nov 41, and was not with the Company at the outbreak of hostilities. In his absence, the Co, its Eurebio S. Yiver, became Asting CO until on or about 16 De 41, when Maj Benito Cepayas, Provil Commender, took charge of the unit.

The majority of these esses allege induction by Maj Capaysa on vertous dates during Dec 41 et Bangued; eight ellege induction by lat Lt Wric F. Davis, on or about 1 Sep 41 at Bangued; five allege induction by Capt. W. H. Stephens, et Bangued in Nov and Dec 41 end one in Apr 42; three allege automatic induction and one alleges induction by Col. Jemse A. Green, CO. Hag Bet, Dept of M. P.C.m. 31 Dec 41.

The inductions, if any, by Maj Capayas and Col Green ware unsuthorized because neither of these officers was a member of the USAFFE at the time those inductions were allegedly performed. Maj Capayas did not become a USAFFE until 15 Apr 42 when he was sworn in by Capt. C. S. Stornes at Lubuagan, Ralinga (See attached photoctat copy of his cath). Col Green scoopted induction into the USAFFE only on 10 Mar 42 (See History of Res Det. Dept of NL PC).

It is not probable that Capt. #. H. Stephens performed any inductions in Nov or Dec 41, or at anytime before 22 Jan 42 because, prior to this date, he was a civilian. This officer, together with one Nr. Scholey, contacted Scheren on Jenuary 22d and on that date the two were mustored into the 121st Inf as captains (See p. 7 & 8, Sch Horan's diary, Historical Data, 12st Inf, USBIT-NIL.)

MOTE: It has been determined that the Mr. Stephens mentioned on p. 7, Od Horan's diery, and Capt Stephens on p. 8, zeme diery; Oapt William H. Stephens OO, 53 Bn (Legangilang, Abre) p. 18,121et Inf (Story by Chap. S. J. Magel); and Oapt W. M. Stephens p. 8, "The 121st Inf (USAFZE)", all pertoin to Gapt W. E. Stephens, the alleged inducting officer of five of these cases. (These references are all found in the Historical Data, 121st Inf (USAFZE), "A start of the Start o

It is possible that some members of the Company were induced, as alleged, by Lt. Eric 7. Davis, ASS, on or about 1 Sep 41 if these members were on detached service with the lat Abra NG Gadre on that date.
Exemination of the 201 Files of the CO, let Abra NG Codre to Tienate G. Diana and some lat Abra NG Codre cases revealed that their alleged inducting officer was one the Fiel S. Davis and their alleged induction date, 1 Sep 41. Hence, there is a possibility that some members of the Company, if were detailed as instructors in that codre, were included in the group of alleged inductees by Lt Davis. However, to sub-stantists this induction, these members must establish service with the Cadre and not with the FC.

It is a common allegation among these cases that the Company failed to reach Battan bosumes, before they could do so, all routes to that place fell into enemy hands and because they "did not receive instruction to proceed to Battan," (See Afridavit of Mej Japayas dated 27 Nov 45). On the contrary, it is alleged that on or about 15 Dec 41, instructions were received from the Chief of the PC, thru Col Green, that, in case of invasion, they "should retreat and stay behind enemy lines and maintain passes and order." In compliance with said instructions, the Co retreated to Sallapadam when the Japa counted Banqued on 16 Dec 41.

On 24 Dec 41, Nr. Malter M. Cushing, a co-owner On the Rainbow Mines, near Bany, Abra, wrote Mej depayme that he was "officially taking over the southern section of Ilisos North, Northern section of Ilisos Sur and the Abra Blatrict as temporary Capten of the United States Army," and that he had "been given specific orders from this district." (Original letter in 201 File of Med Campuss).

NOTE: Page 8, Col Horan's diary shows that Mr. Gushing was commissioned captain on 28 Jan 42.

on 26 Dec 41, Maj Capayas received orders from Col Green, hhru Capt. P. M. Sumalong, "to bring all his forces to Jouton immediately," On 28 Dec 41, while Maj Capayas was on his way to Jouton to carry out Col Green's order, he received a letter from Capt Cushing at Legangliang, Abra, ordering him "to return to your post at your most earliest convenience and resetablish peace and order, through the means of the Constabulary," Two days later, (SO Dec 41) Gapt Cushing, having received a telegram for Mad Capeyas again wrote the letter "to report to Borton," Britantly Maj Capeyas only compiled with Caphing's letter of the 26th since nome of the esses exceeded indoret having once to Borton ismediately after 30 loc 41. Furthermore, several efficient in these cases tatte that they returned to Sallepedam. efter having reactived the orders while they were on their may to Bonton.

At Ballagadam, Meg Capayas constantly commanicated with dept Gushing and Col Horau. (See original letters of Horan to Capayas and vice versa and Gushing to Capayas in Capayas' 201 (File.) It could be seen from the correspondence between these officers that Haj Capayas recognized and accepted the authority of Ool Horan thru Capt Cushing. Amile this was so, it could be inferred from Col Horan's letter dated Mar 19th (see attached photostat copy of this letter) that no official induction of Maj Capayas' unit had yet been made and therefore no definite status of the unit was yet known so late as Mar 19, 1942. This fact is further strengthened by Mej Capayas' subsequent induction which took place only on 15 Apr 42.

Although this letter is undated, it NOTE: has been determined that it was issued sometime in the latter part of Mar 42. The following were used to support this determination: (1) Affidavit of Lt. Busebio Vivar. JO. 1st Abra Co. PC dtd 24 Dec 45 (copy attached); (2) Entries for Mar 19 - Apr 12, Col Horan's diary. From these entries could be inferred the fact that Col Horan issued the abovestated instructions during the formal organization of his unit which took place after 20 Mar 42 when he received authority "to enlist all Filipinos who have been with any of our units anytime since Jan 1st;" (3) Col Horan's letter to Maj Capayas on Mar 19th, which indicates that, on that date, Col Horan still did not know "the future of your unit," meaning the status of Capayas' unit.

On 13 Apr 42, Maj Cushing wrote Maj Capayas informing him of the capitulation of Bataan to the Japs and also advising him to "break up your men in small groups and station them in the barrios back towards Bontoc with orders to hold together whenever you may call them." It is believed that Mai Capavas did as advised, because Lt Vivar states that when "Maj Capayas surrendered to the Japs in Bangued with some of our men . . . . . . . our men in the company and myself were then assigned in different barrios and sitios . . . . . . " Although scattered in groups among the different barrios, these men still believed that they were under the control of their CO as shown in their processing papers. The majority allege to have served the unit until on or about Mar 43 when they surrendered with Maj Capayas at Bangued. A few exceptions claim to have been separated from the unit on various dates before the surrender.

Maj Capayas in an affidavit dated 3 Aug 46 attests "that all officers and enlisted men of the lat Abra Co.... were inducted into the USAFFS on 20 Apr 42 by Capt W. H. Stephens, US Army, 121st Inf., Pat at Sallapaden, Abra." Verification of records presently available in this headquarters fails to prove this statement.

The estivities and statements of Maj Japayas and most of the cases studied undoubtedly show that the unit operated as an element of the 121st Inf Regt under Ool invan from the time Maj Japayas received orders from Col Horan. However, only 3 out of the 90 cases studied indicate service with the 121st before 6 May 42. The rest show service with the 121st before 5 May 42. The rest show service with the 1st Abra 50 Pt the whole period from Dec 41 to date of capture, separation or surrender (Mar 45).

The above history does not apply to Capt Ambrecio Aree, 30 of the Company. This officer left the unit on 15 Nov 41 to undergo medical treatment in Manila. While in the city he was with HFC under Gen Francisco. From 15 Dec 41 to 31 Dec 41 he was 30 of the Presidential Quards. From 15 Jec 40 Mpc 42 he was 00, L O<sub>3</sub> 35 Mp. 4th Inf. 28 MD in Bataan and was taken 90% when Bataan fell. - B. A thorough search of all available archives for Abra PC has been made at Records Branch and at Project "J". This revealed that:
  - 1. There are no records of the Company at Archives Section;
    - Some members of the Company appear in some PC records, at Archive Section; however, these records are deted prior to 8 Dec 41;
    - Project "J" records indicate that the following were U S Army officers in the Philippines during the war:
      - (1) Davis, Eric F 1st Lt, Eqs & Hqs 57th Inf (PS) ASN - 0355023, KIA 31 Jan 42.
      - (2) Starnes, Cemeron S Capt, Hqs & Hqs Phil Dept ASM - 0291283. Hecovered upon liberation of the Philippines.
      - (3) Stephens, William H ASN 0890362
      - Lt. Devis is the alleged inducting officer of eight of the cases studied and of several cases of the 1st Abra NG Cadre.
      - Capt. Starnes inducted Maj Benito Capayes at Lubuagan, Kalinga on 15 Apr 42.
      - Capt. Stephens is the alleged inducting officer of 5 of the cases studied. He does not appear in the Alphabetical Casualty Listing of Officers and Emilisted Personnel who were in the Philippine Island Area so of 7 Dec 41, at Troject "0". This indicates that subject officer became a member of the AUS on or after 8 Dec 41.
    - 4. Historical Date, 121st Inf USAFIF-NL, at Mecords Franch, make several reforences on the activities of Maj Fatter N. Guahing under whom Maj Sepays and his unit served. Maj Gushing was designated center officer under Col Boran in the area where Maj Sepayse operated.
- C. From the above facts and findings the following conclusions have been drawn:
  - The let Abra Co PC was stationed in Empued, Abra at the outbreak of the war. Acts CO from 16 Nov 41 to 15 Dec 41 was the JO of the Company, let Lt Luseblo S. Vivar, and from 16 Dec 41 up to the surrender (Mar 45), Provincial Imageotor, Maj. Bemito Capayas.
  - Capt Ambrocio Arce left the unit on 15 Nov 41 to undergo treatment in Manile. At the outbreak of the war he was in

the city until 1 Jan 42 when he joined the USAFFE forces in Betean ss CO, L Co, 3d Bn, 4th Inf, 2d RD. He was taken POW when Betean was surrendered.

- When the Japs occupied Bengued on 18 Dec 41, the Company, in compliance with orders from higher hae, retreated to Sallepaden, Abra.
- At Sallapadan, the Company kept in contect with Col Horan and there recognized and accepted his authority thru Maj Welter M. Gushing.
- Inductions allegedly performed by Col Green and Maj Capayas before their respective induction dates are not velid.
- 6. Induction by Lt Wrig F. Davis, those by Col Green and Med Congayas, after 10 Mer 42 and 18 Apr 42, respectively, and those by Copt William B. Stephens, after 22 Jan 42, maybe considered if they meet the requirements of Sec III, Wets Br Adjudication Policy as changed by Sec I, Branch Memorandum 54, deted 3 Peb 1.
  - 7. Members of the Company who allegedly issined and were inducted into other USAFFE units before 6 Hey 42, mark, in order to be accorded positive USAFFE status, prove such status as members of the unit they joined and not as members of the FC. On the other hand, those who allege induction on 20 Apr 42 by Gpt. 48. It. Stephens as members of the lat Abra Co FC, must prove that they were so inducted on that dete. It is importain that the requirements of Sec III, Yets Br Adjudication that the requirements of Sec III, Yets Br Adjudication assisticted in both scate (see preceding pragraph) be satisfied in both scate (see preceding pragraph)
  - 8. The instructions issued by Cols Horen and Green, determined to have been issued about the latter part of Mar 42, is an authority for the induction of PG perconnel in Northern Luson. However, these instructions must not be misconstrued as a besis for an automatic induction of PG members. Actual induction by an authorized inducting officer is mecosary.
  - The Company failed to reach Bataan because of instructions from higher has not to fight the enemy but to retreat and maintain peace and order behind enemy lines.

That I know personally S/Sgt. Sames Guntang, then Corporal results a regular solisted man, being the Company Clerk of the former Abra Company, FC, statemed at Rangued, Mbra of which I was the Commanding and Disbursing Officer before the outbreak of the war.

That S/Sgt. Samson Gumtang, then Corporal was last paid by me to include from 1-31 October 1941.

That on or about 18 November 1941, I was sortounly ill and I was sent to the Philippine General Hospital for treatment. From that date, I was not able to returned to my stationed at Abra Company, 10, Samgued, Abra due to the outbreak of the war of which I was made to joined the Armad Forces in Batann.

I, Benito Capayas, Lt-Colonel, PA, Filipino citizen of age, merried with Postal address at 813 Lealted, Sampaloc, Menila, after having been duly sworn according to less depose and say.

a. That before and after the outbreak of the war on 8 December 1941, I was the Provincial Inspector, PC, Abra with station at Bangued, same province;

b. That the lst Abra Co, PC with station also at Bangued, Abra to which the late Sgt Felicisno Bides belonged was under my direct supervision, and as such, I had constant contact with its officers and men;

c. That when the 1st Abra Co, PC retreated to the hills on 16 December 1941 to engage in guerrills warfare against the advancing enemy with a unit of the 121st Inf, P A under Major Malter M. Gushing, USA, I personally took charge of said company;

d. That seconding to Lt. Tomes Keringel, a contact man sent from Hamila by the Chief of Constabulary to contact all Constabulary units in Morthern Luson and who estually contacted us in the mountains at Lemmo, Ahra about Journey, 1942, all Constabulary forces have been sutemetically inducted into the USAFFE on or about 17 December 1941;

e. That all officers and enlisted men of the 1st Abra Co. to include the late Sgt. Feliciano Bides were inducted into the USAFFE on 20 April 1942 by Capt W.H. Stephens, US Army, 121st Inf, PA at Sallepadan, Abra;

I, BENITO CAPAYAS, Major, PA, of legal age, married now confined at the lst General Hospital, PA, Camp Murphy, Quezon City, after having been duly sworn in accordance to law do hereby depose and say.

That before and at the outbreak of the war I was the Provincial Inspector of Abra PC. Co, with station at Bangued, Abra.

That at the outbreak of the war I took command of the lat Abra Co FC of which lat Lieut. Eusebic S. Vivar, (now a Major in the Guerrilla) was tien the Junior Officer.

That about 15th day of December 1941 I received instruction from the Chief of Constabulary through Lt. Col. Junes A. Creen, Department Inspector FC, not to resist the Japs, but upon their approach to withdraw behind enemy lines and maintain peace and order and that I did not received distruction to proceed to Batan.

That liest, Buesbio S. Where was always with me while in the nountain and that he was always assuming the responsibility as being my Junior Officer of our NO company in which we used to help Major Walter M. Oushing, an American Officer, in harassing and astucking the enemy whenever he called upon us for help until we were forced to surrender by circumstances beyond our control on March 1943.

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# AFFIDAVIT

- I, Eusebio S. Vivar, 42 years old, married and a resident of Polo, Bulacan, After having been duly sworn in accordance to law do hereby depose and say:
- 1. That I was called to active duty in the Philippine Constbulery on or about the 27th day of July 1941 and assigned to 1st Abra PC Co., as Junior Officer with the rank of 1st Lieutemant.
- 2. That when the war broke out our Commending Officer Ambrooio Arce, was still confined in the Hospital, Camp Murphy, so Major Benito Capaças who was then our Provincial Inspector of Abra took commend of our Company.
- 5. That, about the 15th day of December 1941, Major Capayas received instruction from the Chief of the Constebulary through Lt. Col. Green, Department Inspector FC., that in case the Japa entered Bangued we should retreat and stey behind the enemy lines and maintain peace and order.
- 4. That, on the latter part of Jenuary 1942, Capt. Welter M. Cushing, U. S. A., organized a guerrilla outfit in Abra with the cooperation of some Americans who fled from Ilocos Norte. He contected Mejor Capayas, and our company joinfed the said outfit.
- That, from that time we began harassing and ambusing the Japs around our areas, especially when the enemy attempted for the first time to enter Lubusgan through Bangued.
- 6. That, on or about the 20th day of February 1942 we received instruction from Col. John P. Horen U. S. A., informing Major Capayas that he was in command of all ermed forces of Northern buson, including all the FC companies. He stated further that he was appointed by General Asimuright and was designated to take command of the whole Northern Miltrary District.

- 7. That, on the latter part of Merch 1942, Major Capas was ordered by Col. Horan to proceed to his Headquarters in Lubuagen and there he was given a written instruction stating that the sole duties of the Constabulary is to maintain peace and order in territories not yet occupied by the enemy and to help likewise the US Army and the Philippina Army sening the Jaco.
- 8. That in compliance with this order we continued performing our Constabulary duties in maintaining peace and order in the unoccupied territories of Abra and helped guerrille activities headed by Major Cushing.
- 9. That after the fell of Bataan, Col. Horan surrendered to the Japs in Lubuagan, Major Cushing assumed command of all troops in Northern Luzon. We used to help Major Cushing in ambushing the Japs whenever he called upon us for help.
- 10. That on the earlier part of August 1942 we received order from Major Cushing to lay low in order to stop further killing and destruction of properties of the civilians by the Japs.
- 11. That we still confinued maintaining peace and order in unoccupied manicipal districts. In those places during that time tribes of different sitios were in conflict fighting and killing each other so that head-hunters were prevailing. But we were able to suppress them during our stay.
- 12. That on or about the 20th day of March 1943 I received a reliable information that Major Capayas surrendered to the Japs in Bangued with some of our men thru the intermediary of the Provincial Governor of Abra.
- 13. That our men in the company and myself were then assigned in different barrios and sitios, so that I was separated from Major Capayas with my four men who were under my command.
- . 14. That, I was very much astounded and I could not believed myself that Major Capayas had surrendered. In order to verify the veracity of the news I sent one of my men to contact Major Capayas if possible.

- 15. That four days later, he returned with a message from Major Capyas ordering me and my four men to go to Bengued as he surrendered already with the rest of our men. He further stated that the reason why he was forced to give up was to avoid unecessary killings of civilians and to stop further destruction of their properties by the enemy.
- 16. That I convened my four near who were only left with me to give and to form their opinion regarding the order of our commanding officer to surrender. Considering the critical predicament of the civilians who tries to keep us, we decided to go to Bangued, and on the 26th day of March 1943 we surrendered to the depancee Commander in Ahrs, Capt. Liyuzi,
- 17. That upon surrender we were immediately released by the dspanese Commander, but we were ordered to remain within the vicinity of Eangued and required to report to the Municipal Mayor every morning at 7:00 o'clock.
- 18. That one week later I was confined on bed at the Provincial Hospital because of malaria which I got it while in the mountain.
- 19. That after one and a half month we gained our complete freedom and we were sent back to our respective homes.
- 20. That while at home I was still very weak and it needs me to rest for almost one month, until I had fully recovered my health from my sickness.
- 21. That from this time, I maintained contact with the guerrilla under Lt. Col. Benjamin H. Aquino, by giving them subsistence like palay or rice and noney; and that being a dentist by profession I rendered my services to the members of the guerrilla by treating them free and with my own expenses.
- 22. That on 20 May 1944 I joined the guerrilla and I was inducted into the active service on the same date with the renk of Major under the GST, MMD (now the 61st Infantry Regiment MMD, ECLAA.)



23. That, at present I am in the 2nd Replacement Bn., 7th Replacement Go., Camp Bayambang.


