June 1st Well, when we got our pay
the 1st of this month, I bought a
pack of A-1-A + (the 2nd in 3 days) drank
up - Then went over to Bldg #25 to a
poker game & dropped 10\$ & got my
longwoodie returned in the bargain.
Now I've got to sell it again as I was
just 24⁹⁵ of being even at the comm
Tessary. Very rough! Borrowed 10\$ -
from Capt. Short down in group #1 &
the same from Roger -- so they gave
my first months pay - 30 days away
& still I've got to eat & smoke!

The summers - about Spain &
Turkey & the Aleutians etc have been
very good lately! If this war &
us as prisoners lasts another year - I
won't & that's a fact!

7/2/43 - I have pellagra but not too bad. My
eyes - lips - etc are affected. Details so keen I
work 2 times in 3 days now. Haven't go in debt for
eggs & fruit or etc now!

7/24/43 - Am surely going blind! It is
a most peculiar sensation. Distant
objects look OK until I try to focus
on a discrete object - then its'
blurred. Am writing in the middle
of a blurred spot now. Seems to be in
both eyes tho slightly more so on
the left. Reading - even with my

glasses is almost impossible.
Has rained for several days now
& every rag I have is wet & mildewed.
See the pup guards are more than ag-
gravated at the "trip." Their equipment is
suffering. A 500 man detail just left
here. Went out at 2 A.M. after about
2 or 3 weeks of physical extreme etc for
malaria - dysentery etc & were issued
new clothing & tooth powder - took 2
rice small hats & no mosquito nets or
blankets with them. Took 5 officers
& many guards (who had been
issued Civilian clothing) but no
rifles. Rumors are put no
facts as to probable destination. I person-
ally, hope they are for exchange. Would
like for a few facts to get out of here
whether they do any good or not. The
acreage of the farm is still on the
increase & has improved by the
corn - have over 60 rice paddies already
planted.

Have some rather startling thoughts
plans for the immediate future -
providing we are released this year.
Think I'll stay here on Luzon if
well enough! Should be lots of
opportunity here for AA & other
officers & men. Most are training

their desire as "getting home" rather than again under "American Control" tho I prefer the latter, I believe, because I believe there is probably very little at home demanding my immediate presence. For instance Nade is probably dead & McC. lost to me irreversably thru one or another means. Sis is probably doing OK regardless of Ralph Sis employment at present.

Am glad in one way that the world does not know there are over $\frac{1}{3}$ of us already dead & that unless we get in food & clothing & our treatment is changed radically for the better lots of medicinized here — they will be another $\frac{1}{3}$ gone by Xmas. By July 1944 there will probably be less than 5000 men & Officers left of the Philippine Force (U.S.P.F.F.E.)!

H. Hamilton & Chamberlain are still here (Bks 27) but H. Charles went over to the hospital with Amoebic the other day. Bk #27 sent a man over 2 days ago with diarrhea. There is some Typhoidal fever & pneumonia breaking out. The team being wet & cold all the time. I am far from well now — but chiefly bothered by

Ringwarm over my face up! It's
a kick of a note! I would appreciate
a good hooker of Gin right now:
Do footin'! Let's sit here & write
with a cup o' Will's coffee alongside. I
am pretty much beat now except my
cold & stiff feet are tingling like going
to sleep (heh heh) & I have the chills
& my pants legs & the arms of this
jacket are wet — go to hell with
noon rice — I'm on my way
to my blanket on th' bering to
get warm!

7-30-43. Am in a hell of a mess due to
over running my commissary account again.
Won't let me place orders for the barracks now
& if they don't pay us soon, the men will want
their deposits back & there will be hell to
pay. I'll have to live without smokes etc. for a
month or so at best — rat worse, I could be
shot I guess. At any rate, am certain to
lose this job if the ones kick whom I expect
will — at the earliest possible moment. There
will certainly be a bunch of doctors around
here when & if I end up disagreed & in jail.
Will go out this AM. But will see
you soon — this PM. perhaps. Hell of
a way to spend the 6th anniversary of
my arrival in the Philippines & the 1st
anniversary of our becoming full

fledged prisoners of war & instead of
hostages. Will soon have byre
writing in this book too. More expected
but when I started I guess - but religious now
that we may be here for year or only for
days. Heard, incidentally, that there's a big
Jap draft in the U.S.A. Will probably leave
here even if Bailely + Italy fall.

8-14-43 - Its rumored here now that Geo. Vargas is
in jail (whatever that means). Seems the mops caught
their dummy mayor in a secret meeting. May
be bad! Didn't hear rumors of the T. H. or refusing
their "no-give" independence. Heard thru the
grapevine that Russia is having some success.
All "sweating out" the opening of Large Scale
Operations in the SW Pacific. Hear the Chinese
are successful in Canton & reaching the coast
south of Hong Kong. The next year here
will be the hardest. Then on both sides
of the road here now would total 5500.
Chow lately has been greatly helped by
the addition of the corn crop. Over now!
Most everyone out of shoes now & all
other clothing going fast! Rep'r & Capt
Davis helped last pay day - saved my
neck - but I owe him next one! So
will continue to go slow awhile. An
extra gasume day yesterday - didn't
go out this AM by the grace of God
but am due this P.M. - O.K.

Sept 1st 45 - Rained in in bks # 24.
Left # 26 the 16th of last mo. had a
trouble & general indolence mostly.
Drew pay yesterday & still owe Uncle
David 11²⁵ & Roger 50^c for putting
me in the best grain group. That's
all ok even after my money at
Group 3 being spent by him &
Andrew ~~for me~~ of course. Oh well!
Hamilton City C. gave me a cup
of coffee this A.M. was surely good
but lacked sugar & cream.
I owe Chancy \$1.00 for a few
loan & some tobacco & the
big treat me fine! I owe to
scull clothes soon - every thing
I own is filthy again. It is
only 2:30 P.M. now so we may be called
out yet if it clears up. Has stopped rain-
ing anyway. Looking over my pay acts
show me I have over \$4000 this date & much \$3000
of that is deer. Makes me mighty itchy to get
out & start spending some! Have spent a lot of time
lately talking to St. Gregory (from Colorado) about
coming to Lawrence & teaching with me & going to
school at K.U. We have heard some weird
rumors here of cars we are to receive as
gifts when we get back - so we have been
pretending we had them there & were going
to sell them & have lots of fun when thought

means a very enjoyable evening. Anything to get our minds (or what is left of them) off the actual existing conditions here!

9-7-43 - Just wrote a note to Carmen Miranda in Manila - She probably won't answer it! Oh well. Had the morning off after picking Beans & planting radishes in the farm yesterday - must get the laundry right away. Sam & Cliff gave me a cup of coffee & a handful of Peanuts - much appreciated this AM. My feet are awfully sore. Roger stated me to the ~~P~~ ^o heart ration for this month. It is a great help - big draft - 873 men + officers to leave this month for Japan! Well make the next one - best month for 1000 are to go! Hell! No news to amount to anything - just rumor of conferences & fiddling around. Russia & China seems to possess the only anti-Axis fighters.

Sept 11-43 - A great deal of value seems to accrue to the rhinoceros which came in last note - of Italy's fall & surrender. Practically everyone believes it & many prophecy Italy's entry on the Anti Axis side in the very near future. Yesterday was a whole gasoline day & our feet are just that much tendered on account of it. Same coming to here Sunday or Td!

I cut my foot this A.M. on a piece of
old broken bottle in the deep mud of
a new plot — making radish beds.
Rained all nite. Assuming to note that
by now I have sent Dad \$3,000⁰⁰
I have about \$1,000⁰⁰ due me on the
books. Yet, I can't buy good cigs — any
eggs — peanuts — or far — milk — coffee
etc. because it's either not available
or too expensive. Native coffee beans are
nearly \$1.00 per lb & the last eggs 30¢ each
were turned down by the comm. officer.
P-nuts are 90¢ per canister cup.

Sunday 19th Sept. 800 odd got out this A.M.
Only 700 odd in 2nd group now. Picked
before this A.M. (in the rain) and am eating
afternoon rice now. Did not sleep to P.M.
Yesterday. Don't hurt my feet too much
to go barefoot now!

9. 20th 43. Yasuma yesterday P.M. Rained out of the fields this A.M.
Brought in 26 litters — heaviest, 307 kilos — of beans, radishes,
carrot tips, cucumbers, & teleium (carrot seed). Left
litters in the field though, so may go out again this P.M.,
especially since it seems to be really clearing up at last! After
a good solid week of rain. Am wearing my
spats. It's cool enough I don't sweat in them
right now. Have one wool undershirt & sweater
skirt & am recharging & warming up to drinking
some hot water. Cost 10¢ & is supposed to have
been boiled over gone very ancient coffee

grounds, but you can't prove that by me.
Speaking of things you can't prove the
rumors are flying thick & fast now.
Mostly having to do with Hitler's talk
of Germany's imminent surrender
(von Neurath) & Roosevelt in London &
Miss Toleda etc. Also, scuttlebutt
has it that the work carabao have
been moved to the slaughter pens &
thus have 25 to eat (at 24 per day).
All bunching up over on this side
the fence. Since the 1600 odd who left
here are to be replaced by 2000 odd from
the hospital leaving about. Then maybe
Camp 3 Filipinos will be moved down
here to help on the farm. Wakanawai!

10-3-43. Have a half-day & assume the AM
Clothes washed day before yesterday are drying
Am taking nicotinic acid now. Paid up
P 30.00 yesterday. Wanted to do some mending.
Comfy, fresh & down near all of
Philippines came up yesterday - Japan
soon!

10-13-43 — Was I surprised! — Came
in the other evening from the movie stand
T Carmen had sent in 30 — & included
aded my name — so I gave & they gave
me P 10 which with the P 20 & 20
from Gregory & the P 30 which I
drew pay day — surely fixed me

up fine. I mean, I have eaten some peanuts & bananas since payday & am not broke yet. My gold crown came out the other day & I got it right back in but have a dental appointment for this P.M. anyway. Hope I make it - I missed last Asin day! Will grind some rice & those things. May go to Batian this week - don't know!

11-5 - Am still at quarters with a bad back; this is the 5th day. Hope to get some more sun on it this P.M. All hands working this P.M. — first day this week. Have $\frac{1}{4}$ of my pay day left (except 500⁰⁰ due for chores) Dang it, had food & shoes the other day — no socks tho. Bean & Cate know this when — fine. Have a couple of meas of cash left too. But a few days after & surely I like my carbo horn holder. Am to play a game of chess if I can find someone to play with. Chess & Checkers to be my lifelong hobbies after this Insane. Have picked up 10 lbs of deer meat in months — pants & houses & beans. Feel stronger tho! Show now!!

11-10 - Twenty-five years ago today we all "things" were different! And how! Went on the "grass" detail & cut with a machete yesterday AM. Not time out

for JCH

since 29th of last month. Spent a very restless & painful night — my back gave me hell! Many days of quietness — when it did me very little good. Scarcely any details, now, to a small family each day — but things have certainly changed! Many more guards per working party & seem to be taking plenty of precautions. Made the first detail yesterday, went down to the interpreter lecture there before coming back inside. Seems guards of I now ordered to 'kill' not 'shoot' anyone who goes thru their line (which borders slot, now). I borrowed \$5⁰⁰ from St. Hamilton payday & bought a used pair of shoes. First time had in a long, long while now. We hope that Lt. Col. Bealer (Camp Comdr) has been notified that Red Cross packages on the way up here. All are "bucked up" amazingly with pipes for food & clothing! Hope we are not too disappointed. Seems a long time since last Xmas & New Years, when we got our first & last (so far) Red Cross pkgs. Wrote another note home just now — don't know where they are to

leave camp. No hope. The folks have gotten at least 1 card from me out of all five written. Wish I could know how all are making out. No word since 2 yrs ago this month. A hell of a long time anyway you look at it!

Chow has fallen off here. No serving of meat over 1/2 oz. each day. Hard to keep in substitute tickled paper men. Clothing rags & dirty - Soap scarce! One don't \$5.00 in Group II with Alyscapeters - \$6.50 in Group IV (Real). I helped bury a foreman of the Canopus last month. Died of P.T.B. Weighed about 80 lbs. Roger is trying to make some longao fritters for brook chow! Coffee is \$5.00 per kilo now. Damn poor stuff at that. If Dad or Uncle is saving my whole allotment we now worth over \$5000 cash alive & \$10000 dead. More than I ever shot. I'd be worth in this world or the next if I'm smoking 18t aigs (30 in the pack) due to the leniency of the Imperial -- who now buy in \$3000 per month. Singer costing \$300-\$500 per carton up when you can get it. Matches too - very scarce!

A few books have come back in to our library - are they getting the push! Name to laugh to see who reads "Poultry Cost Accounting" just to have something to read.

Cocujunctivitis (what ever that is) seems to be troubling a lot of people. Guess there will soon be a few more eyes jerked out around here. They can miss me on that - I hope! Years of malnutrition are going to reap their harvest in old and lives in the future tho - & that ain't hay!! A few puny bananas still come in - they help! A few coconuts too - likewise! Been smoking my 'home-made' pipe this AM with 'white' tobacco, of course. Guess I'll go see if I can get on the list for a place!

4-20-45 Still a week + 4 days till payday & I'm busted" flotter than that! Due plenty now! Am on "quarters" a couple of days with my back again! Am sitting at Wilson's table (Bob's) with the sun on me now & the sweat is just running good! Sunburned took one Red cross pbs but none dir right yet. We had a fire last nite - a howling success. Rice flour pie crust & corn

starch & banana filling with shredded
cocoanut on top. Had an egg in
it too! Boys & hey! (+ cinnamon) Surely
was something & he could soon bite
thru the crust! Can't eat sugarplums
very well with just salt on it so
had only a cup of very burnt tea
(no sugar) for breakfast this A.M. Am
feeling pretty good now. The Group
Commander (Col. Paquet) inspected
this A.M. — no straw! Are putting
up 10 strand barbed wire fences
inside the old ones now & platting
the whole damned farm (so it seems)
in canotes. Rumor has it that the
Constabulary will take over part of the
guard posts Rec post - Octane nai!
Another look I must have when &
if I ever get back to the "Land of
Life & Living" — "Green Lanes" by
Donald Colless Peatree. Right in the
grove

Dec 7th 1943. Right on top of payday this last
week came the Godaw-splgs. They'd got 4 each
in Bilibid. We got, each box (Invaded)
& are supposed to have 3 standards coming.
Owls are much better individually than
last yr but no general or mesh down yet.
They come later - I hope! I swapped
my 8 plgs of eggs + got 5 coffee &

● Add to the 2 we were issued. I have
bought 4 + cans already. Some jazz! The
cheese + Bullion + Chocolate also stands
out when I get a chance to use the grape-
juice (Welches) think it will be swell. The Mills
is said to beat - now quoted at P1 per
(lb) can. Cigs selling 7 for \$10 - + have
been much higher. They are splitting up
pkgs giving us some more stuff tomorrow.
I am going to try to make the proposed
until April 1st. Lots of packing tho so I
don't know. They took 15m of cigs to
start off with - won't wear the clothes
+ shoes! Typhoon last 3 days - 5 in
quarters with cold + back ache - may
have a holiday tomorrow. Paid for the
R5.00 (about 8 pds flour) have a little in
the commissary to go on - P.L. Am
trying to get some meat coffee but may be
no - we all got a roll of 1/4 paper. I bought
1 extra roll for P3.00. Restored something!
Butter + bacon surely help bugs out
Fine chew lately. Here some tobacco added
so as strain now except clothing. Am to
stop now + mend my work shorts. Pay
off Quarters tomorrow. Pay low this
wind can blow! Lots of rain to go
on.

12-17-43 Still quarters - the rest of the
week on account of jacking a

pocket knife in the palm of my left hand - whittling a pipe (which cracked when heated) of Camaguey wood. New shoes issued to most all here - I bought a passable pair (gap) last night - so there!

12-26-43 - What'd whatta!! But I long remember this Xmas. Have just had a hot coffee & have been down the AM & signed the pay-roll. Am way out of the red, this time - but, you know won't buy anything. Nothing coming into the commissary. Mong beans quoted at P²⁰ & black beans at 2⁵ per centena cup. And they aren't even coming in. Few hen eggs available last time at P^{0.40} each. Peas were up to 65 centavos last time. I got no photos from the red cross & really ful typed. One smoking lotso A-1 in my pipe now-a-days & have quite a supply of bad. Thank to selling some American cig. at 1²⁵ & 1⁵⁰ per pack. Bought a can of flour yesterday (milka) - for P¹⁸ ²⁵ Tasty wonderful! Quite a bit of increased air activity here about the last week or so! Guard 12:3 AM tonight - Come off 'quarters' in the A.M. My hand is ok but little finger still partially asleep! Has received 2 mixed boxes to date — and the

Perishables from the other two boxes, will
get the canned stuff Feb & Mar. so
we don't go. The box we got the
24th is to do for Jan 44. Hope it does!
The issue chow is very poor - rice &
grease - few greens - scarcely any meat.
But - the details have been lighter
lately - than e God. See Biblical has
received medical supplies - all gone
here. Not quite hopeless!

1-1-44 - Got a fine night sleep - in spite
of the noise - what there was of it. The
kitchen put out tea + a cup cake at 11:15 P.M.
I got my cup cake - rice, flour + grease - for
my Lagaq + coffee this A.M. The red man
Kip Kafay is still available (75¢ for
4oz can). A doctor won the turkey (Beef
flock of 4200 chickens) + the money went to
welfare, I guess. Assume tomorrow - its
Sunday anyway - then back to work.
At this writing Am 7:13 ahead of the
poker game - but will probably put
that much out today. If I do win tho
would try to buy some more milk - all
out now. G. Hutchinson came back
into camp yesterday from T. M. We believe
they now (G. Stuckey up on the
South road) along with Conley +
Pleasant + Sabine plus their
families! when this is all over.

Futch says Govt ownership of U.S. Pho
now. Goss the B&L T. etc gotta little
too glorified maybe. Will be Ok.
if all Unions get the axe permanent.
Save far outside their usefulness.

So far so good! 1-3-44-
Now reading they most inter-
esting & comprehensive study
in print (I think) of the poli-
tician ideals - "The Social
Gosse in the Modern World" by
Felix M. Keesing - The John Day
Co - 1941. It is certainly the
biggest "must" on my list
as it has a bibliography
to #384 at the end. Very very
good. A McCloud Lee would
love!

11-15-44-Had my last big gold crown
pulled yesterday. Rough! Dr. Ashelle would
have been surprised at its having lasted
22 years tho. Almost out of coffee again
Boys have surely helped the issue chow
nearly zero. Rummor has it Canadian +
Pkg coming - hope so!

11-18-44 - Jaw still pretty sore but when
I can eat on the right side will have 7
lower left pulled & get another day's
quarters. Only worked today yesterday -
not in the AM though to Capt Huff

Aim to relax for an hour now before starting out to the farm again. Cool day & sprinkle of rain this AM & now East & South & so over in & around the hills. Have been reflecting that snow should be worth about \$5000 - or as Curdie would say - Mr. Rightful! Its too bad that this camp has no charged me & my aim in life that the future contains no Curdie - or perhaps its lucky - there may be no Curdie of course. Have decided ultimate plans with Chas Andret to leave this life forever & move ahead a South Sea Bound & spend all our own to live out our appointed span on this green footstool. Have been teaching first to play chess - now have P. Hutchinson when we will away many hours at such. Rolling snakes & talking with my Billie's carved pipe (with camagon dig holder stem very much now).

1-29-44 Well, One year from now I'll rate another foggy (\$520 now pay) — wish to get back if I'd be around to collect it? Mail is in - seven bags of it!! But uncensored, as far as this camp is concerned, so we don't get it yet. The 3pm announcement said 2500 letters. Have been considering my chances of getting

some word from home & have to admit
they are mighty slim - but I can still
hope. Come off quarters & go to the
farm this P.M. (Sat) my jaw where
I'd lower L came out too very sore.
It Broke up a little & bled 6-7 hours.
No grain today, but the B.R.s & 27
meal hasmonds beans for this noon.
Hot help! Have a hole in the
bottom of each foot & we have to
go barefoot this farm didd ~~do~~ —!
Wish we could get the beatings stopped.
We would work much better then
sure. That sort of thing seems to
pyramid come. Tips now on a fly-
killing spree - into!! Worked on ~~Rogers~~
mess table this A.M. — We have a rumor now
that the Russ are within 30 miles of Warsaw &
that we are doing O.K. around Bougainvillea
God knows its time. Have a rumor that
some people have been promoted. Prob-
ably those in Group #4 (Cemetery). Adios!
2-3-44 - Yesterday was a yasmunday - special —
(should have been the day before, Dad's 67th birth-
day — but better late than not at all.) and this
A.M. I got to stay in — earned half-day — but
will hit the farm this P.M. Only two more
days after today that then another rest day;
and one more work slot! A bit of the
thick grass has been raised about 2

or more men escaping from Mindanao, T telling their story where it would do some good. I have some stories too. Wonder if they will ever get told? Roger got excited + broke-out some coffee (+) and made some cookies last night & this A.M. wonderful! Put \$20.00 in the Commissary & gave 10- to Andet this time. That was that. Now have to get \$20.00 to pay Ordby + a little Panesa (pony sugar). Will go play chess with Andet now - after sick call.

2-11-43 - This is a (night out of a cool blue sky) warm day & I'm on quarters because I broke the sole of my left foot open by stubbing it on a red-cave rock a few days ago. Chow very poorly - looks like we will be working on the Airport 30% Kilos from here next week.

Too many men leaving on a couple of details, am figuring up my pay + allotment again this AM - For?

2-27-44 - Airport going along at 500 men daily. Moving plenty of dirt + making E-W runway 300 meters wide with 11' off fall per 700' from center. Watering on the X-ray paddy vegetable farm everyday with 200men. Another 200 clearing, leveling + breaking new land the over 300 acres under land cultivation now. 200 carpenter + Dis left here night before last on detail. 400 some men came up from Bibili + told of receiving individual packages lots of mail. Over 20000 letters in Ng (Dj) here but do not hand a word yet. I have little hopes of an

individual packages have definitely decided to go far away either in So or Antifreeze when I leave Spring. Probably necessary to teach us to go with Credit to South Seas. Have made many tentative plans & dreams for the future if we live them all that's coming. Becoming more doubtful now due to reduced rations. The 4 books + received since Dec 1st have saved many lives but are fast becoming just a memory & a basis for contemplating next Xmas if we are still here.

3-5-44 - Past week have had a super helpers job on a watering detail - lots easier than any yet. Don't know how long it will last tho.

3-12-44 - Birthday a howling success. Roger + Credit gave me a can of Cup Kafay + a new pipe + a pack of A-1 Tobacco & with Kappas et all had a fine cake. Was wonderfully surprised + happy as cake materials & those other things just aren't to be had now. All known again now - the last can today - got \$12.50 taken out in a poker game for one can of Spam. Tried to give it up + got cash out. No luck? No packages delivered here yet but hear there are over 2500 in camp. Also over 23000 letters & still no word from home for one. Letters coming out slower than 100 per day. No good rumors lately. Army

work details & special resume day
far as rested a lot. Since had cold &
cough tho' the wind is starting to
blow which means dirt in & on
everything.

3-18-44 - Was surprised last night!
At 11 o'clock I was "sweating-out" several friends
who were receiving packages when here
came a special messenger looking for me.
Went down & came back with a box from
Dad & Jim from Box 141 East Carolina,
Pasedena Calif. Contained many items of
practical use: pencils - toothbrush & powder
Tooth Soap - 7 lbs. gum - 2 oz. melted
milk tablets - tray or 16 blocks - about
1 lb. coffee & 1 lb. sugar - 6 socks & hats.
Total value about \$1.80 must have cost him
(I received it!) \$6.00 + boxes here went
up to \$75.00. The best thing by far of
course was finding Dad still alive within
the last 6 months & at last getting this
much news from home. First since Nov '41.
Quit a while!

3-26-44 - Well Andie is long gone. Don't know
where to or for how long; but we surely gave
him a royal send off. I stayed up till after
4 AM mostly due to Tillman's coffee. Andie
left with over \$50⁰⁰ and several cans of meat & plenty
of salt - tobacco & clothing. Certainly a
contrast to the way she left like last

time — about a year ago. Hope he has a lot better luck & that we meet for the trip home (when if) if not before. Am now all out of grain to flat hawks. Am smoking papaya leaves. Rotten! This being garrison day I spent the morning on the family of my pants. Shirt patches. It is getting hotter daily now & less & less water. I am still helping on water detail tho. Not nearly as tough as pick & shovel work. Paper has a nice garden out here by our wash back & we had pepper & onion tops & Cura with our moon rice. Am still taking baths.

● 3-29-44 - Many Manila cigs came in at last — over 1 month late — & I'm smokin' them as such in my pipe & after P.M. I got 24. Chow very sukoshi, very hot watering on truck farm. Are harvesting carrots & we'll better get some or there may be serious trouble. No founded & unverifiable good rumors persist so I think someone is getting scared enough to get the morale b.s.d. busy. We eat less than $\frac{1}{3}$ do a meat part of rice — a little soup & a cup of weak tea at noon now.

● Morning sugars mostly water. Spent 27⁰ on chow this month — a little black pepper — salt — penitron & native tobacco — a few bananas & some carrots. A punny box of matches costs 60¢ in

Cabarettes & pants are 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ each (when you can get them). Signed they say I will last nite. Will pay come into the last of the week, no doubt. 500 men per day still on airport. Heard that Pindet went to Nichols. If he did, God Help him! They kill them there for mistakes. A ~~pk~~ from the States came in for Col. Britting. He was shot here over a year ago. Some more mail came in on the up side but we are still getting them at less than 100 per day thru the censors. Must be over 30 000 over there now! A man just sold a 17 jewel Hamilton watch to a Siwan guard for P 800⁰⁰. Things have surely changed since they stole everything we had on the Rock. I killed @ 250 to 300 bed bugs in my mosquito bar last evening so slept lots better last nite. Doc Dannerman who came out with one on the "Codridge" gave me a "lot" of stateside soluble coffee this morn. Was mighty fine. Restrictions on water in camp. Have to wash some Sox tonite regardless.

4-2-44 Sunday & washing to do again. Have some Manila cigarettes & happen you are making a loaf for moon so all we know. One month to go now on my bet with Jack Davis. I give up we didn't bet now the same bet on May next year! Normal as Home 3rd running series on any day & we're off & it's hard to

had symptoms of beri-beri on my legs again. My legs alone go to sleep badly. I'm a victim of insomnia lately. Roger got a Feb '43 letter from his father in Edinboro Pa. yesterday. I've still not had one. Only the flies, & the sox are going fast. Will darn 'em today. Am going to go down up some tea now. Seeed my shirt I'm over \$5.00 now.

4-4-44 - "It was rather like a forced-
on numbness of spirit. The long,
long stress of a gale does it; the
suspense of the interminably cul-
minating catastrophe; and there is
a bodily fatigue in the mere
holding on to existence within
the excessive tumult; of searching
and insidious fatigue that penetrates

4-7-44 Received a radio gram from Dad this noon as I came in from a "bad" morn-
ing on the farm. 30 some men had to
line up & sleep back other cage & wouldn't
get out the one responsible. Godidit
"Birthday Greetings All the Best keep

That's the most recent news any-
one has had from the States &
the only live one had except the 3rd & 3
plg. (4-26-44) Stole today off the farm
and had grammared a loaf (Canaries - the ones
goes salt) and sent it to be baked for soon.
It's sprinkling now & very dark & cloudy. Have
almost finished "Daniel Webster" by John Bach
McMaster & am sweating out "The Citadel"
by Craven. Am still on the list for "Berlin
Daily" want to forward the website book when
in home again. H. Appleton Century Co 1939
got out a lot of fine editions; very compact
& legible. Daley came up with the
last bunch (31) from Biblio — says
Audet is at Clark Field & that I have some
letters on the opposite side. How very sakoshi and
letter than formerly (Cwkoage). Have lots of
running sores on my hands & legs that
weigh between 15.5-16.0 & feel pretty good (when
not working). Blackout when I think over.
Fidrys acting up. Burned & no coffee maybe.
Broke & also naked as usual.

5-3-44 Received a letter from O'handoian & co-
sinc Ruth last night (Address 3226 Nicol Ave, Oakland 2,
Calif.) The first letter since Nov 1941. Pretty
important! Two by John & Wolf R. from Ray.
Off. Note from Audet the other side.
He is at Deets Clark Field — as P.L.
Les Curtis brought up want to see

talk to him very soon. Capt Powers just gave Lopy & me a cup of mighty fine fresh roasted native coffee & only \$18.00 per kilogram - God! I have just enjoyed "The Citadel" by Cronin & "Berlin Diary" by Trill Hearn the Yanks are in New Germany since! Chew is a little improved - I now weigh 135 pounds. Wouldn't Cardinale surprised & why! Lost my \$200 - bet to Capt. Davis May 1st, Damn it! Have sweated that fiddle a year now! But trying to stay off the farm the P.M. to do some laundry! Very windy & plenty hot now. No rain for some time!

5-6-44 - Letter from Olden & Madena of same date Sept 7th. Sent Dad a card on or this date.

5-12-44 - Friday & my day off on the farm. Had a cup of coffee with Sam Ober cliff last winter layawake and after midday. Have decided to sell my first car. Burn & pronounced him when I got back from here. He also decided to grow out a large scale - in some kind of a "one-stop ranch" of my own: probably 1524 R.D. St. All depends on what has happened to my 175+ dollars for the last 2 years. No matter what the, its a couch I have been free from all debt & that since 1941. By all rights should be a capt. out of here & even to mouth the one that pay would give me a little to go on.

5-21-44 - Wonderful letter from Lis 8-25-43 received the 15th most news ever. Has sold out completely in Kan & moved to Calif. permanently. Sixty-four & wife & baby still in Ottawa & all well & happy. Candy working for Red Cross & not teaching. Good boy improving w/
P.T. B.F.E.

All over again right in the midst of this semi-famine. Serves as a food shortage! An post to be finished by June 15th, or else. Are starting to plant & trans-plant on farm now since we have had a few rains. Corn is a dicke sat out of food & smokes & broke - very low grass & blue except for good news from home (over 8 months old) - but Lucy still single? I hope! May finish "The Far East" Political & Diplomatic History by Payson J. Frost (H.D. Revised Ed. 1935-²⁸) 5-29-44 - Some scuttlebutt in here now about a lot of gifts & bonuses etc., which are to be given to us when we get home. Some say "Hoax" to it others think some might be so & of course there are a few who swallow hooks line sinker & pole. Rumors of a new Ford still are believed by some. Ridiculed by most. I think possible but am afraid to hope. One rumor has it that our pay was doubled as of June 1st 43. Some even believe that! I surely don't. I got a pair of old patched (but whole) work shorts. The other leveling (guyed) so am using my rags of shorts for things to paper. Out of smokes & gun all gone. Are all now actually starving on issue chow. Men are sneaking in meals from farm to cook up. They eat seed corn as fast as plant it. Ditto okra seed. Am about 150 now & get "A" Chow for my I.C. job or would be less than that. Have brief & dizzy spells often & it seems

of home & food continuously. If I didn't have my chin up as per last yrs letters or the Radiogram from God - would take the easy way out & just quit eating. We work 7 to 11 & 3 to 5:30 now. Will have to start the water diet tomorrow again if we see quite a bit of here-heri & spellga in again this last month but only 4 deaths - They'll pick up again soon tho. May be a long time to 30-40 a day against tho. Fall rice with lots of water - moon rice a spoonful of cooking (for th workers) - Tonite rice soup w/ 1/2 a rice cookie - thin T three times a day. Had our hominy bread this morn. The oil surely tasted good. Our this group means had mongo beans 8-10 per eaten cup. Most of us are out tho. Could eat 1 qt ice cream 1/2 lb tank & 2 lbs bread right now.

6-1-44 - My Yosume Day - Corn stock many - B claws (which means down near nothing) Got a small but mighty welcome soap issue today. 6-10-44 Can get people who believe anything from 60 days to 60 months now. All know we won't live long on the chow we have been getting. Have been getting old hospital area ready for more men - sort of expected in here next week. Brought in 20 some letters of greens this AM - first in several days. Rice hopefully scarce.

Am on new farm today clearing for canotes. I guess. "Ning-Wang" has my group. Capt. Lapp & I will try to grow says some path by papaya tree tomorrow - with some canote

sprouts & a pepper & a pod of garlic. Will have some papaya seeds on dugout in the A.M.
eat anything now - but weigh less than 150.

Still - hear they are to cut off our rice cooker tea. That will be awful. God knows it had better be soon if ever we are to be saved!
Will now read Sis' & the Old Landborough's first
go to work. Pray for rain! 1 Sunday, June 15, 1944

Am reading "Windward" by Mary Ellen Chase
on a cool, wet, & hungry day. We were
driven in soaking wet yesterday about 3 PM

the census — all from same bunch which
has been across the road months now. Few

our dinner — no tea — no nothing. Had a
bit of 'pig-wad' boiled up the & split our sombo

Am going to try to sleep now. Smoking
nearly gone & must take it easy. Only
good breakfast last week — but had to eat
askew with penitza (pony sugar) syrup. Will
read again when I wake up. Hope I

Don't dream. Have read quite a bit lately - clothing all going to play new fast - damp too. Oh well! 6-22-44 If this isn't the longest day of the year - its close to it & all day to be hungry in. Class "B" chow too because I have the day off. Means no corn meal (?) mush so thin at breakfast could hardly taste it. Have some pig weed or sorrel for noon & a few mango blans for tonite so will try to survive. Didn't rain till we were in yesterday & looks clear today. Has rained for nearly a week tho' wet as every day while killing up corn rows. Will give out of even papaya leaves (smoked) today. Same

strain. Still hear rumors of details to Japan & of food from States but of course no news at all. Plan to try a little guava leaf tea after while. It could be worse - I guess!

7-3-44 - Moon & raining. Walked around hills all AM under "Mr. Bean" & suffered plenty. Whole detail "jogged" all the way & most of all "metabolic" tho he gave me one cigarette at the "journey" time. Last two days last walk of the one we've had to have the detail by trying to steal & we all lost our pursley (hogweed) we were bringing in to "grain" over a very Class "B" Sunday. detail next time tho under belief chow is better. 700 old men in new camp area now from Minotinos & no communication with them as yet. Am very hungry - but am reading S Lewis & tiping & trying to rig

Have dizzy & nauseous spells now &

details. It helps even longer pains some.

Going up for a cup of hot water now -
7-17-44 Has rain all week now & into the
Chow still very bad - not enough to keep us alive. I planned

but was turned down (with 70 other officers) - only taking
12 or 17. Tough! Sending a card home today.

7-20-44 Thurs. Rained out on the Airport detail this
A.M. Worked mud on same all this week - feet 2

going off farm alone now. Some news in from
Politist, rumors of men Japan details soon - 7-21-44 -

Sept 8th Xmas Card last evening from Cindy - under
date of Oct 1st 1943 from her at Box 656 Palacios Texas,

keep same with me from here on out. She will be
28 yrs old the 25th of this Oct. I will soon be 4 yrs

Leaf tobacco P 45.00 per kilo. Bananas P 30 each. Shelled peanuts P 12.50 per c. cup. Coffee P 45.00 per kilo (not cast boy it). Haven't bought matches for 6 months. Farm work very hard now - all are so weak. Only about 2500 in camp now. Lots sick. Farmers good. Still have hope. Like this \$100 "20 at. Cashed a check for \$100.

on Lawrence Natl. Bank the 18th. Got 2 for 1 Payroll Money - won't go far! October 1st 1944. Here seen no planes since 23rd. Morale still high here tho. Prices on everything out of sight & am broke. My 3 pesos coming today will buy a pound of leaf tobacco & 10c of corn (shelled); that's all. Weighed 145^{1/2} this AM. & feel pretty good but lots of sore on hands. 'Ball King' herbivit is a lot of help - will never forget it. Our reading "Mental Hygiene" by Mikell - want it when home (for bibliography if nothing else. Very practical!) "Panchy" Evans & I put up our awning this AM. All sandaled away in this town. (Lots of dirty clothes tho.) Have a cup of rice (P 20.00) & a few cups of corn left. Japanese names have one gender, male, no gender. Adjectives in Japanese, as in English, have no gender or number. Japanese verbs have one person or number.

True adjectives in Japanese end in ai, ii, si or su. Used attributively the adjective is placed, as in English, before the noun. When used as predicate of affirmative sentence in familiar speech there is no need of any verb in Japanese; in less familiar speech de desu or simply desu is added.

The negative construction of adjective is shown in 195; mai is familiar and may be replaced by arimasen in polite speech.

Particles or postpositions are placed after the word to which they refer. Ex 2.

True adjectives when used as predicate in connection with the polite verb gozaru change their terminations as shown in 192.

The negative construction of these sentences is shown in 196. Ex 3.

Certain nouns followed by the particle na or no have the force of adjective, & are called quasi-adjectives.

When used predicatively de takes the place of na or no & is followed by are, arimasu or gozaimasu according to the degree of politeness. Note that de are is generally abbreviated to da, and de arimasu to desu.

In the negative are (or no) is changed to de wa (often abbreviated to ja).

Some true adjectives may be used attributively as quasi-adjectives in na after expressing the final i of the adjective. Thus oki uchi atoki na uchi a big house.

chiisai nise or chiisa na nise a small shop.

Ex 4.

When the verb 'to be' has a noun as a predicate, the noun is followed by de aru, de arimasu or de goraimasu in the negative. Remember the contractions noted in the previous lesson.

'Have (got)' meaning 'possess' is translated by aru, arimasu or goraimasu in the affirmative, & by nakai, tarimasen or goraimasen in the negative; the English subject takes the postposition wa, & the object becomes the Japanese subject and takes the postposition ga.

Ex 5.

In the sense of 'to be (in a place)' there is use the verb aru, arimasu or goraimasu if speaking of living things. The negative forms of these latter verbs are i-nai, imasen, tarimasen.

Ex 6.

Form the present tense of the verbs given below from tables 28 + 29. See 35 + 36; also 38.

The subject is often not expressed in Japanese.

Ex 7.

See how the different forms of the probable present or future tense are formed in tables 28 + 29. The principal idea of this tense is uncertainty.

For the probable present of aru & de aru see 23 + 24.

Ex 8.

Study the formation of the past tense in table: 28 + 29. For aru + de aru see 23 + 24.

Ex 9.

The adverbial form of true adjectives is shown in 192; quasi-adjectives change na (or no) into ni when used as adverbs. See also 190, 4.

Atsui + atsukunatta (lit. has or did become hot) both mean 'is hot'; but when you say atsukunatta you imply that formerly it was not hot. Ex 10.

Study the forms of the imperative in tables 28+29.
Ex 11.

Study the formation of the gerund in tables 28, 29+93; some of the uses of the gerund in 58, 2, 3, 6. Ex 12.

Study some of the uses of the gerund in 58, 9, 10, 11.

Ex 13.

Study the 1st set of numerals in 271; see also 276, 1. Ex 14.

Many nouns are counted by the aid of an auxiliary numeral; see 276, 2. See also 281, -min, -hou, -mai, -hiki, -dai. Ex 15.

Study the 2nd set of numerals in 271. See also 276, 3, 4. The 3rd set of numerals is used to express a person's age. Ex 16.

Study the names of the months, January, February, etc. in 293; the days of the month in 294; and the days of the week in 297. Ex 17.

The negative present conditional follows by ike-nai "that must not" translated by 'must'; (72).

The past conditional is sometimes translated by 'when' or 'after'; (69).

In Japanese true adjectives have a kind of conjugation; see 193, 199.

Study the use of adjectival gerund noted in 200, 1, 3, 4 + 5.

No after an adjective often has the meaning of 'one'; chairo ne the red one.

Ex. 20 Quasi-adjectives in na (kei) have constructions corresponding to the gerundial constructions of true adjectives; 219.

Ordinary nouns followed by de are sometimes used in a way very similar to the gerundial constructions of quasi-adjectives.

No with the meaning of 'one' is placed after quasi-adjectives in na (kei a pretty; kei na a pretty one); after quasi-adjectives in no, another no is not needed to give the meaning of 'one' (murasaki no violet, or a violet one; hōaku no another, or another one).

Ex. 21. See the formations of the desiderative in tables 28 + 29. The desiderative is a real adjective & has all the inflections of one. The object of the desire often takes the postposition ga in.
