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# 665. Private Walter Southard -

Fracture, simple, <sup>impacted</sup> distal head of radius, left, caused by patient slipping on wet sidewalk and falling on out-stretched hands, at 1300 hr mine, Fukuoka Japan, on June 7, 1945.

Treatment: Reduction of fracture and application of wooden splints.

# 637. Private Albert Johnson -

Contusion dorsum, left foot, caused by accidentally dropping heavy stone on (left) foot at 1200 hr mine, on May 30, 1945, at 10:10 a.m.

Treatment: Treatment of part. (X-ray negative)

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#667 - Pvt. James Stevenson

① Wound, incised, propinal half, dorsal surface, middle finger, propinal phalanx, ~~right hand~~ left hand, caused by piece of falling coal striking striking hand in the Tōfue Mine at Fukuoka, Japan, on June 9, 1945 at 10:30 P.M.

Treatment: Four dermal sutures to skin edges.

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# 662 - Private Joseph Schaub -  
Fracture, simple, clip-type, medio-  
proximal third, distal phalanx, first  
digit, left foot, caused by a falling  
stone (from ceiling of mine) striking  
patient's foot, at Kofu mine, Yamanashi  
Japan, on June 4, 1942, at 1:30 a.m.  
Treatment: application of plaster splint.

# 661 - Fracture simple, complete, middle  
1/3, right radius, caused by catching  
~~and~~ arm between 2 empty loading  
cars, at the Kofu mine, Yamanashi, Japan  
on April 26, 1945.



# 647. Private first class Frank E. Eba.

① Fracture, simple, transverse, middle 1/3, 3<sup>rd</sup> metacarpal, left, caused by accidentally catching hand between two loaded cans, at the Profue Mine, Fukuoka, Japan, on April 19, 1945.

Treatment: Reduction of fracture and application of wooden splint.

② Optic neuritis, caused by vitamin B deficiency, present for undetermined period.

# 645. Sergeant Eugene A. M. Cuddihy.

① Contusion, dorsum, left hand, between first & second metacarpals, caused by accidentally catching hand between two moving ~~can~~ conveyor cans, at the Profue Mine on April 13, 1945.

Treatment: Rest of part and application of wet dressings.

② Fracture, simple, complete, proximal third, 3<sup>rd</sup> metacarpal, left hand, caused by patient slipping on floor of latrine & falling on outstretched hand, at Camp Fukuoka, ~~at~~ Fukuoka Japan on June 7, 1945.

Treatment: Application of splint.

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# 633 - Private Jack V. Peck  
Fracture, simple, incomplete, distal third  
of the metatarsal, metatarsal, left foot,  
caused by accidentally stepping into  
ditch while running within Camp  
Poa at night, at Fukuoka, Japan on  
April 12, 1945 at 9:15 P.M.  
Treatment: First x-ray negative and only rest  
of part ordered. Second x-ray revealed old fracture  
8-11-45. Complete recovery at this time.

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# 633 - Private Jack V. Peck <sup>(37)</sup>  
Fracture, simple, middle 1/3, comminuted,  
proximal phalanx, first digit, right hand,  
caused by a heavy rock falling from ceiling  
of mine on patient's hand at Poa Mine,  
Fukuoka, Japan, on July 4, 1945 at 10:30  
Treatment: application of splint, wood.

# 637 - Sergeant Everett P. Ray

Fracture, simple, complete, comminuted, spiral, third, first metatarsal, right foot, caused by a heavy sack falling on right foot at the Kofu Mine, on August 22, 1945 at 9:30 P.M.

Treatment: Application of heavy bandage & bed rest.

638 - Private First Class Clifford Helk

(1) Fractures, multiple, simple, middle 1/3, left radius and ulna, caused by patient accidentally falling on outstretched arm, in Camp, at Fukioka Camp, on April 13, 1945.

Treatment: Application of splint

Complications of # 1: radial nerve paralysis left arm, producing paralysis of 4th & 5th digit, occurring a few days after fracture.

(2) ulna, atrophic, ununited, middle & proximal phalanges, 4th & 5th digit left hand.

(2) Pneumonia, lobes, right lower lobe, occurring on April 11, 1945

Treatment: Sulfoxathiazol, graminin stat & graminin qu 4 times for 7 days. No complications.

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# 655 - Sergeant Edward J. Perry  
Fracture, ~~complete~~ simple, longitudinal,  
distal phalanx base, second metacarpal,  
right hand, fracture extending into meta-  
carpal-phalangeal joint, sustained at  
Ryuse mine, Fukuoka Japan, when patient  
accidentally caught right hand between  
two loading conveyors, on April 10, 1945.  
Treatment: Application of splint.

# 656 - Private First Class Donald Dugdale  
① Fracture, simple, complete, middle 1/3, right  
radius, with downward displacement of proximal  
fragment, caused by a piece of rock falling  
from ~~near~~ ceiling of mine & striking patient's  
arm, at the Ryuse mine, Fukuoka Japan,  
on May 21, 1945 at 10 A.M.  
Treatment: Reduction of fragments & applica-  
tion of splint.

② Fracture, simple, incomplete, middle  
1/3, right radius, with slight lateral  
displacement of fragment ends adjacent  
to fracture site, caused by falling  
rock of patient falling backward  
stretched arm, while in removing  
& accidentally stepping into a hole,  
in camp, at Fukuoka Japan on  
July 27, 1945 at 11:30 P.M.  
Treatment: Application of splint  
to fracture sites of (1) & (2) same.

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# 647 - Private First Class Lewis W. Moldenhauer  
W. Contusion, outer surface, lacus #4, left  
leg caused by falling while running to  
abandon shelter, in Camp at Fukutaka  
Japan, on July 17, 1945. (2) Relocation  
trauma with infection, secondary to #1.  
Treatment: Hospitalization for 13 days  
with bed rest & daily dressings.

(3) Pneumonia, lobar, lower lobe, left  
chest, occurring on August 3, 1945.  
Treatment: Bedrest for 14 days (hospital)  
Lev. pathogenic, gut flat and gut g.  
4 hours for 3 days.

# 616 - Corporal George W. Buxton  
W. Acute mania, occurring <sup>1945</sup> ~~1944~~  
definitely known cause, but considered  
a nervous manifestation of harsh  
working conditions. Mania characterized  
by extreme violence & vocal unprovoked  
Treatment: Restraint by straightjacket.

Patient developed epistaxis during attack.  
Treatment: 2/3 grain morphia intramuscularly.  
Restraint by straightjacket. Patient  
became quiet 3 hours after admission.  
Mania occurred suddenly on August  
14, 1945 at 4:45 P.M.

August 15 - Patient in complete coma.  
Blood pressure 60. Pulse 43. Pupils  
16. At 6 P.M. patient partially conscious  
August 16 and took small amount of  
nourishment. Reflexes variable. Patient  
relates about.

August 16 - Took nourishment 7 times  
during day. Eating moderately.  
August 17-45 - At 11 A.M. patient spent  
spoke rationally & recognized surroundings.  
Received hot milk & sugar bed.  
Continued improvement during day.  
Has ecchymosis right orbit.

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# 664 - Corporal Emerette Smith  
Fracture, simple, incomplete, middle 1/3  
left radius, caused by patient falling  
through faulty bathhouse flooring  
& falling on outstretched arm, at  
Camp, on August 1945, at Fukuoka  
Japan.  
Treatment: Application of wooden splint


# 641 - Private First Class Warren H. Lasky  
Admitted to hospital on May 5, 1945 for  
Shed pneumonia. Patient was given sulfa-  
diazine gr. 10 slt & gr. 4 hmc for 7 days  
but course of disease remained unchanged.  
All lobes involved. Patient suffered from  
anorexia, diarrhea and loss of weight.  
Diarrhea gradually subsided but patient  
remained in weakened condition and  
diarrhea persisted. Present weight  
is 95 lbs. Normal weight 125 lbs.  
Patient was discharged from hospital  
on May 24, 1945, and remained on quarters  
for about 2 1/2 weeks. He was then placed  
on "railway" detail, which was regarded  
as a lighter work than the reg-  
ular mine work.

He has received sulfaquinoxaline  
carbasone, bromath powder, etc.  
but the patient continues to have 3-5  
stools per day. The stools are usually  
watery in consistency. No blood or  
mucous has been noted.

It is believed the patient has chronic  
amebic dysentery.

# 613 - Private Edward J. Blount   
Fracture, left anterior tibia, caused when  
patient was caught between the wall of the  
mine and an incoming loaded coal car, at  
the Hoop Mine, Fukutaka Japan, on 4-17-45

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620 - Private First Class Eugene H. Clark

Continued severe right lumbar region and  
2) severe right sacro-iliac region, caused  
by falling rocks at the No. 1 mine, Fukushima  
Japan, on August 1, 1945.

Treatment: Rest and massage. (See X-ray)

#642 - Private Milton Smith

On May 25, 1945, patient reported to sick call  
complaining of chest pain. Temperature 38.1. Exami-  
nation revealed fluid in the left chest. Patient  
hospitalized after exploratory puncture made. (Stew-  
-rained fluid returned). Patient remained  
in hospital until June 23, 1945. During that  
period patient's chest became clear, fluid  
& temperature returned to normal. Discharged  
on 6-23-45. Became again ill & returned  
hospital, where he soon became worse.  
Discharged on July 26, 1945. Patient now  
has temperature at sick call for few days at  
occasional intervals but soon becomes  
afebrile. No temperature to present date.  
Very little mobility of left base but no  
fluid present. Normal condition of rad.

678 - Corporal Floyd W. Montgomery

On or about April 2, 1945, patient reported to sick call and gave following history: He contracted Pneumonia in the Philippines in July, 1944. On recovery he was sent to Japan in August 1944. Immediately upon his arrival in Japan, patient began to cough and expectorate a bloody sputum. He was hospitalized in August 1944, discharged in October 1944, only to re-enter the hospital in December 1944 for "chest trouble". Patient was discharged Dec 15, 1944, reentered the hospital on Dec 23, 1944 with the diagnosis of "lobes pneumonia". Patient remained in the hospital until Feb 2, 1945.

From Feb 2, 1945 until transfer to the general camp on March 14, 1945 the patient continued on a course of antibiotics and continued to expectorate bloody sputum.

On March 14, 1945 patient received x-rays of chest and on the 21st he reported that he could no longer see ground and cracking noise was heard over the left upper back, just lateral to the scapula. Upon patient's arrival in Camp 10 on April 9, 1945 (see detail). Sputum specimen was received on June 1, 1945. No

official report of the sputum findings  reviewed by the capture authorities had patient was placed in the tubercular ward on June 12, 1945, where he has remained at present.

For several weeks preceding the June admission the patient ran considerable fever (35°-39°-C). Considerable cough and sweating was noted. However, fever progressively subsided.

At the present time the patient's condition is considered good, his nutritional appetite good. His weight has remained practically stationary.

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# 623 - Private, First Class Harry Stover  
Patient states that while prisoner in the  
Philippine Islands in March 1943, he was  
accidentally struck on his back by a loaded  
car. The patient was placed in quarters  
for 2 weeks. Soon afterwards the patient  
was sent to Japan. In Japan up to his  
transfer to this camp in March 1944,  
he was given relatively light work.

Shortly after transfer to this camp, in March  
1944, the patient was struck on his back by  
a pack which he was carrying. The  
patient states this "started the pain all over again."  
The patient was seen by me at that time.  
There was marked limitation of motion of the  
back and patient could not assume a con-  
stant erect posture. After a few days "yellow  
fever" broke on camp work.

About 2 weeks ago patient noticed left  
side of one "shooting". The chest pain grad-  
ually increased. Swollen and red, yellow  
was present. On June 20, 1945 was admitted  
to back and found a left pleural effusion  
was noted. Patient was immediately hos-  
pitalized. Patient remembers previous attack

# 608 - Nathan, Allan

In early August 1945, while employed as  
a hospital orderly, the patient complained  
of general lassitude and pain in the left  
thoracic paraspinal area. The findings were  
negative and after a few hours rest, the  
pain felt better and returned to work.

The patient next reported at sick call  
on Aug. 21, 1945, complaining of chest pain.  
Temperature was normal. Examination  
revealed a right pleural effusion.

In May 1946, while attempting to lift  
a 40 gallon "G.I." can, the patient injured  
his back. A diagnosis of spondylitis was  
made and patient was placed in  
a plaster cast for 4 months November  
1946. The cast was removed in Dec. 7  
1946 and patient returned to duty. At  
the present time the patient shows  
definitely tilted pelvis, the hip being  
higher than the -

The patient states he developed first  
developed right pleural effusion  
at Los Alamos P.D. in Feb. 1947. He was  
given 7 days quarters the absorption of
