GENERAL LAWS WITH REGARD TO PRISONERS OF WAR

ARTICLE I

The present laws apply to crime(s) committed by prisoner(s) of war.

ARTICLE II

Section I.

In case violence or threat is committed by any party, company, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period or for not less than one year.

Section II.

Any one preparing, plotting or conspiring for the purpose of committing the crime(s) mentioned in the preceding Section shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a definite period of not less than one year.

ARTICLE III

Section I.

Any one killing or causing the death of any supervisor, guard or escort of prisoners of war shall be liable to capital punishment.

Section II.

Any one preparing or causing any plot or conspiracy to be communicated, for the purpose of committing the crime(s) mentioned in the preceding Section shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a definite period of not less than two years.

ARTICLE IV

Section I.

Any one inflicting injury on the person of any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war, or committing any violence or making any threat against the afore-mentioned person(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for a period of not less than two years.

Section II.

In case any of the afore-mentioned crime(s) are committed by any company, party, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than three years.

Section III.

Any one causing the death of any person(s) resulting from the act(s) mentioned in the preceding two sections shall be liable to capital punishment.

ARTICLE V

Section I.

Any one resisting any order or command of any superior, guard, or escort of prisoners of war or disobeying any order or command of the afore-mentioned person(s) shall be liable to capital punishment or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than one year.

Section II.

In case any party, company, or group of individuals commit any act mentioned in the preceding section, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than two years.

ARTICLE VI

Any one insulting any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war in his or their presence or by any overt manner commit any insult or act of disrespect, shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period not exceeding five years.

ARTICLE VII

In case any escape is made by a party, company, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than ten years.

Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than one year.

1. The Japanese Authorities have issued the attached revised Rules and Regulations, which are hereby published for the information and guidance of the Camp.

2. A copy of these Rules and Regulations, less Annex No. 1, shall be posted on each bulletin board.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING PRISONERS OF WAR IN
BILIRID HOSPITAL FOR MILITARY PRISON CAMPS OF THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

1. The hospital is divided into three departments, namely: Medical, Working and Patients. All the departments are placed under the supervision of the Senior Medical Officer appointed by the Director of the hospital. Each building accommodating any part or whole of any department shall have a leader who is to be appointed by the director of the hospital. About ten (10) men in the same building shall form a group with a leader whose appointment is to be made by the Senior Medical Officer.

2. Each building shall have a board posted at the entrance stating clearly in Japanese and English the number of the building, the name of department, the name and rank of the leader of the building and the number of persons assembled.

3. Services of the hospital shall be as per annexed Appendix #1.

4. The hospital shall have an officer of the day with an assisting non-commissioned officer and two masters of arms who shall endeavor to uphold military discipline and general morality; to enforce the rules and regulations; to prevent fire and theft and to keep the hospital sanitary and tidy. Besides above functions, each building may have one or more night watchmen for the similar duty if necessary.

5. Prisoners of war of the rank of Warrant Officer and up may have an orderly of enlisted man, one for every two field officers and one for every three company officers and/or warrant officers.

6. No Prisoner of War is permitted to communicate or make contact with the outsiders in any form. The only permissible medium of it being a prescribed postcard which may be supplied, not more one each month, by the Imperial Japanese Army.

If any Prisoner of War attempts to escape, the whole group to which such a unruly element belongs may be subjected to punishment for responsibility under some circumstances.

Maximum amounts of currency which may be possessed by each individual Prisoner of War shall be as follows:

Field Officer - - - - -	¥ 50.00
Company & Warrant Officers - - -	40.00
Non-commissioned Officers - - -	20.00
Privates - - - - -	10.00

Any excess amount shall be deposited in the Postal Savings Bank under the supervision of the Headquarters Paymaster.

7. Routines of Prisoner of War shall be in accordance with annexed Appendix No. 2.

8. Prisoner of war shall not approach to a Japanese guard or guard house unless specifically ordered by Japanese Authority. The back yard of Buildings No. 10 and 11 and the front part of Building No. 18 is hereby prescribed as PROHIBITED ZONE during night.

9. Lights after general "lights off", as provided elsewhere may be had as follows:

Whole night - - - - -	One light to each building.
Necessary period - - - - -	Operating room, Pharmacy & General Office.

Approved workers may have lights for an hour after off duty or work.

10. Prisoners of War shall salute to all the Japanese forces, soldiers as well as non-combatant military employees.

11. Prisoners of War excepting bed patients shall not lie down on bed without justifiable reason during the period of reveille to supper time.

Everybody has to stay inside of his quarters after "lights off" except for the purpose of urinating.

12. Reading shall be confined to books and magazines approved by the director. Conversations relating to military or political subjects are forbidden.

13. Borrowing or lending money or transactions of any personal belongs is prohibited.

14. No article is permitted to be taken out from or brought into the hospital unless previously approved by the proper Japanese Authority.

Everybody is cautioned not to approach, by his own accord, any premises used by the Japanese.

Use of fire is confined to galley and ash pits.

Smoking while walking in the compound or at the place where no can for cigarette ends is provided is prohibited.

Everybody is warned against boisterous and disorderly conduct at any emergency such as fire, etc., and must painfully obey to orders issued by the Japanese Army.

Any person who happens to be in proximity of a fire shall try to extinguish it or collaborate with Japanese Army in extinguishing the fire.

9. Lights after general lights off, as provided elsewhere may be had as follows:

Whole night - - - - One light to each building.
 Necessary period - Operating room, Pharmacy & General Office.

Approved workers may have lights for an hour after off duty or work.

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Any person who happens to be in proximity of a fire shall try his best to extinguish it or collaborate with the Japanese Army in extinguishing the fire.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

All personnel of this camp are governed by the rules and regulations issued by:

1. The Headquarters of Military Prison Camps of the Philippine Islands.
2. The Director of Military Prison Camp Hospitals of the Philippine Islands.
3. Imperial Japanese Army Officers and enlisted men assigned to this Camp.
4. The Senior Naval Medical Officer of this Camp and members of his Staff as follows:

- (1) Warden.
- (2) All Officers attached to the Staff
- (3) Hospital Masters-at-arms.
- (4) Hospital Corpsemen on duty.

1. ORDERS: All orders issued by the Japanese shall be rigidly observed by the personnel of this Camp. Punishment of offenders and implicated squad members shall be in accordance with Japanese Military discipline.
2. ESCAPE: Attempting to escape from this Hospital or Camp, or assisting others to do so will be dealt with severely.
3. FIRES: (a) Fires in other than authorized places are forbidden. Fire hazards about the Camp shall be reported to responsible officers. Cigarette butts or matches shall not be thrown out windows, but placed in containers provided for that purpose.
(b) Unauthorized hot plates shall be considered fire hazards and as fires in an unauthorized place.
4. THEFT: Theft is a serious offense against discipline in the United States Armed Forces and is likewise considered a serious offense by the Japanese Army. Personnel guilty of theft will be summarily punished.
5. SELLING AND TRADING: Bartering, buying, selling, trading, or giving away articles of wearing apparel or personal supplies, is strictly forbidden, except upon the authority of the Officer in Charge of respective buildings.
6. MILITARY ETIQUETTE: (a) Proper military etiquette shall be observed among all personnel of the United States Armed Forces.
(b) Proper military courtesies shall be rendered to all Japanese Officers and enlisted men as follows:
 - (1) If wearing a hat, come to attention and give a smart hand salute.

13. **PERSONAL HYGIENE:** The rules of good personal hygiene shall be practiced by the personnel of this Camp.
14. **GARBAGE AND TRASH:** Personnel will assist in keeping the Camp neat and orderly at all times. Garbage, fruit peelings, paper, trash, etc., shall not be thrown about the grounds, but placed in containers provided for that purpose at the entrance of all buildings.
15. **GAMBLING:** Gambling (gaming for stakes) in any form is strictly forbidden.
16. **INSPECTIONS:** This Camp is subject to inspection with or without notice. Personnel shall accordingly keep themselves and surroundings prepared for inspection at all times.

Any one attempting to commit any crime mentioned in Section I, Article III; Section I, Article III; Section I & II, Article IV; and Article VII; shall be liable to punishment.

ARTICLE IX

Section I.

Any one who, released on oath, breaks his oath, shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period or for not less than seven years.

Section II. Any one who, released on oath, takes up arms in order to commit any act of resistance, shall be liable to capital punishment.

ARTICLE X

Any one violating an oath not to escape shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period of not less than one year. Any one violating any other oath(s) shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period not exceeding ten years.

ARTICLE XI

The leader(s) who form any party, company, or group of individuals, for the purpose of committing any act of insubordination, shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period of not less than one year nor more than ten years. Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period of not less than six months nor more than five years.

ARTICLE XII

Provisions given under Article VII shall not apply to any crime committed by any one during his previous captivity, who again is taken as prisoner of war.

SUPPLEMENTARY PROVISIONS

The present laws shall come into force on and after the day of promulgation.

The present laws apply to crime(s) committed by prisoner(s) of war.

ARTICLE II

Section I.

In case violence or threat is committed by any party, company, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period of not less than one year.

Section II.

Any one preparing, plotting or conspiring for the purpose of committing the crime(s) mentioned in the preceding Section shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a definite period of not less than one year.

ARTICLE III

Section I.

Any one killing or causing the death of any supervisor, guard or escort of prisoners of war shall be liable to capital punishment.

Section II.

Any one preparing or causing any plot or conspiracy to be communicated, for the purpose of committing the crime(s) mentioned in the preceding Section shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a definite period of not less than two years.

Section I.

Any one inflicting injury on the person of any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war, or committing any violence or making any threat against the afore-mentioned person(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for a period of not less than two years.

Section II.

In case of any of the afore-mentioned crime(s) are committed by any company, party, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than three years.

Section III.

Any one causing the death of any person(s) resulting from the act(s) mentioned in the preceding two Sections shall be liable to capital punishment.

ARTICLE V

Section I.

Any one resisting any order or command of any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war, or disobeying any order or command of the afore-mentioned person(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than one year.

Section II.

In case any party, company, or group of individuals commit any act mentioned in the preceding Sections, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than two years.

ARTICLE VI

Any one insulting any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war in his or their presence, or by any overt manner commit any insult or act of disrespect, shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period not exceeding five years.

ARTICLE VII

In case any escape is made by a party, company, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than ten years.

Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than one year.

ARTICLE I

The present laws apply to crime(s) committed by prisoner(s) of war.

ARTICLE II

In case violence or threat is committed by any party, company, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period or for not less than one year.

Section II.

Any one preparing, plotting or conspiring for the purpose of committing the crime(s) mentioned in the preceding Section shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a definite period of not less than one year.

ARTICLE III

Section I.

Any one killing or causing the death of any supervisor, guard or escort of prisoners of war shall be liable to capital punishment.

Section II.

Any one preparing or causing any plot or conspiracy to be communicated, for the purpose of committing the crime(s) mentioned in the preceding Section shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a definite period of not less than two years.

ARTICLE IV

Section I.

Any one inflicting injury on the person of any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war, or committing any violence or making any threat against the afore-mentioned person(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for a period of not less than two years.

Section II.

In case any of the afore-mentioned crime(s) are committed by any company, party, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than three years.

Section III.

Any one causing the death of any person(s) resulting from the act(s) mentioned in the preceding two Sections shall be liable to capital punishment.

ARTICLE V

Section I.

Any one resisting any order or command of any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war, or disobeying any order or command of the afore-mentioned person(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than one year.

Section II.

In case any party, company, or group of individuals commit any act mentioned in the preceding Section, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period. Others involved shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than two years.

ARTICLE VI

Any one insulting any supervisor, guard, or escort of prisoners of war in his or their presence, or by any overt manner commit any insult or act of disrespect, shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period not exceeding five years.

ARTICLE VII

In case any damage is made by a party, company, or group of individuals, the leader(s) shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or for not less than ten years.

Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period, or less than one year.

ARTICLE VIII

Any one attempting to commit any crime mentioned in Section I, Article II; section I, Article III; Section I & II, Article IV; and Article VII; shall be liable to punishment.

ARTICLE IX

Section I.

Any one who, released on oath, breaks his oath, shall be liable to capital punishment, or imprisonment or confinement for an indefinite period or for not less than seven years.

Section II. Any one who, released on oath, takes up arms in order to commit any act of resistance, shall be liable to capital punishment.

ARTICLE X

Any one violating an oath not to escape shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period of not less than one year. Any one violating any other oath(s) shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period not exceeding ten years.

ARTICLE XI

The leader(s) who form any party, company, or group of individuals, for the purpose of committing any act of insubordination, shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period of not less than one year nor more than ten years. Others involved shall be liable to imprisonment or confinement for a period of not less than six months nor more than five years.

ARTICLE XII

Provisions given under Article VII shall not apply to any crime committed by any one during his previous captivity, who again is taken as prisoner of war.

SUPPLEMENTARY PROVISIONS

The present laws shall come into force on and after the day of promulgation.

To : All Personnel.

The following memorandum is to be read at evening Tenko, this date, to all personnel and then posted on bulletin boards:

1. Commencing tomorrow morning, February 1, 1945, patients will have a mess representative who will be stationed at the main kitchen each day.
2. The representative will be selected by each ward by election, or their own method of choosing.
3. Ward 10 will have the representative tomorrow, February 1st. Ward 1 will have the representative February 2nd; Ward 2 on February 3rd; and so on in rotation, except Wards 8 and 11.
4. The mess representative must report at 5:00 A.M. on the day assigned, and must remain until the mess is closed in the evening. He will draw his ration at his own ward. The duties of the representative will be to bserve the mess and to watch the food distribution. He will have NO supervisor's duties. Any questions, irregularities, or complaints will be taken up with Captain Nasr, the Mess Officer. He will not bother the mess personnel individually.
5. There will be ONLY one representative at the kitchen each day. Otherwise, the kitchen and the diet kitchen are off limits except to duly assigned personnel.

2. Gambling is defined as the act of playing or gaming for stakes. Gambling is strictly forbidden in the Imperial Japanese Army and Navy, consequently the strict observance of this regulation and the avoidance of all practices which resemble or have the appearance of gambling are essential for the welfare of each individual in this camp.

3. Gambling in our own service is recognized as scandalous conduct and is prohibited in the Articles for the Government of the Navy of the United States (Article 8).

4. Attention is directed to the fact that the above-indicated "RULES AND REGULATIONS" and addenda thereto, constitute lawful orders, and any person in the Army or Navy who is guilty of violation thereof is subject to such punishment as a court-martial may adjudge under the Articles of War and the Articles of the Government of the Navy of the United States, respectively.

5. Officers in Charge of buildings shall post the "RULES AND REGULATIONS" together with this addenda in a conspicuous place, and shall publish them orally to the occupants of the building once each week.

Subject: Public law 490, 77th Congress.

1. The following information is quoted for information of the Camp:

"Public Law 490, 77th Congress, approved March 7th, 1942, as amended provides that officers, warrant officers, enlisted persons, army nurses and civilian employees in active service who are captured by the enemy shall while prisoners of war be entitled to receive or to have credited to their accounts the same pay and allowances including flight pay to which entitled at the time of beginning of absence or to which they may become entitled thereafter and that their allotments and deductions for dependents and maintenance of life insurance shall continue in force.

With respect to promotion of officers, the War Department policy is that action will be completed on a recommendation for temporary promotion in process when the officer is reported missing in action or in the hands of the enemy but no temporary promotions will be initiated after an officer is reported missing in action or a prisoner of war. The question of processing statutory promotions of regular army officers who are missing in action or become prisoners of War and therefore are not available for the required physical examination is being studied by the War Department and you will be further advised when a policy has been approved. No promotions are made of enlisted men who are taken prisoners of war."

- (a) Duty Medical Officer: "HITOHOKU IKAN" (pronounced "E-KAN", pronounce the "A" like the "A" in ANN).
- (b) Night Master at Arms: "HITOHOKU KASHIRAN" (pronounce the "A's" like the "A" in ANN).
- (c) Galley cooks going to work: "SHIJI" (pronounced "SHY-GEH").
- (d) Personnel going to latrine: "HINJI"

3. Inside of buildings, if challenged, the Night Hospital Corporal shall answer: "SHUKUHOKU KASHIRI (S-SH-KA).

1. A stool examination, following the administration of a saline cathartic, shall be performed in the cases of all personnel engaged in the preparation and distribution of food in this camp as follows:

- (a) Main galley personnel.
- (b) Diet kitchen personnel.
- (c) Mess cooks of all buildings.
- (d) Personnel on duty at outside fireplace.

2. Arrangements for the performance of these examinations shall be made with the laboratory.

3. Persons found to harbor pathogenic intestinal parasites shall be placed under treatment and excluded from the preparation of food in the main galley, diet kitchen and the outside fireplace, and from the distribution of food prepared in these places.

4. The officers in charge of buildings, galley, diet kitchen and outside fireplace, shall insure that no person is assigned subsequently as a food handler, without having been shown by stool examination, to be free from pathogenic intestinal parasites.

REGULATIONS FOR LOCK WARD:

1. A minimum of two (2) Hospital Corpsmen shall be on duty and present in the Lock Ward at all times.
2. The Senior Hospital Corpsmen on watch shall carry all keys on his person at all times, and shall be responsible for the care and treatment of the patients during his watch.
3. When a watch is relieved, a joint muster of all patients shall be held by the Senior Hospital Corpsmen on watch and his relief. During the night watch, an hourly bed check shall be made, and the results thereof reported to the Night Master at arms during his rounds.
4. From 7:00 P.M. until after morning tenko, no patient shall be permitted to be in the area east of the ward building. Patients may enter this area from after morning tenko up to 7:00 P.M. One Hospital Corpsman shall be in this area whenever the outside fire is being used or any patient is in the area for any purpose.
5. No patient shall leave the lockward except in the custody of a Hospital Corpsman. The following restrictions shall be observed:
 - (a) When approved by the Senior Medical Officer, patients may be assigned by the Ward Medical Officer for work, within the compound, under the supervision of a Hospital Corpsman of another department. These patients shall be turned over to the Hospital Corpsman supervisor, at the lockward, and shall remain in his custody until returned by him to the Lockward.
 - (b) A Hospital Corpsman may conduct a patient from the Lockward to another building only for purpose of special medical and/or surgical examination and treatment, which can not be performed in the ward and which is specifically authorized by the Ward Medical Officer.
 - (c) Patients shall not be removed from the Lockward for other purposes except as may be specifically authorized by the Senior Medical Officer.
6. Lockward patients are not permitted visitors, either within the ward area or through the fence, except as may be specifically authorized by the Senior Medical Officer.
7. No food, clothing, books, gifts or other material shall be admitted to the Lockward unless specifically authorized by the Ward Medical Officer.
8. No patient shall be permitted the use of any knife, razor or other sharp instrument except under the supervision of a Hospital Corpsman. Except when actually in supervised use, these instruments shall be in the custody of the Ward Medical Officer.

(b) A stool examination following the administration of a saline laxative shall be performed at least once each month, and prior to assignment, in the case of each food handler.

(c) Personnel found to harbor pathogenic parasites shall be excluded from handling food.

(d) The Chief of Preventative Medicine and Sanitation Service shall supervise and record all stool examinations for food handlers.

2. General Sanitation:

(a) Food containers: When not in use, cleanse and return with lids, to the galley. Do not permit them to be stowed on the ground at any time. This, and other activities of the food handlers should be given positive supervision.

(b) Uncooked Foods: All hands should be warned of the dangers in eating raw foods or cooked foods which have been exposed to flies and other contamination, unless properly prepared.

(c) Protection of feet: As a precaution against parasitic infestation, all hands should avoid the practice of going bare footed.



GENERAL ORDER NO. 1

1. This compound is now under martial law and the undersigned hereby assumes command. No one, without exception, will be allowed in or out of this compound, nor will the civilians in the outer compound be permitted in here temporarily. American guards are posted in the compound and at the gates and their orders are to be obeyed.
2. This situation should exist but a few hours when it is anticipated the American forces will be here, and this hospital will be turned over to the surgeon of the expeditionary force.
3. The following message has been received from the Japanese :-

1. The Japanese Army is now going to release all the prisoners of war and internees here on its own accord.
2. We are assigned to another duty and shall be here no more.
3. you are at liberty to act and live as free persons, but you must be aware of probable dangers if you go out.
4. we shall leave here foodstuffs, medicines and other necessities of which you may avail yourselves for the time being.
5. we have arranged to put up sign-board at the front-gate, bearing the following context:-
LAWFULLY RELEASED PRISONERS OF WAR AND INTERNEES ARE QUARTERED HERE.
PLEASE DO NOT HOLD THEM UNLESS THEY MAKE POSITIVE RESISTANCE. "
