THE CAMP LIBRARY

WELCOMES THE RETURNED MINDANAO DETAIL.

Membership in the Camp Library is open to anyone. We have over 3000 books and magazines available for circulation; will soon have around 5000. There are reference books, maps, and magazines available for reading in the Library. There is a Game Department with many games which can be played in the Library or drawn out for barrack use. An Author's and Subjects file and a Foster by Title list all books in the Library. Books can be reserved; a messenger will notify you that the book you have requested is being held for you. A Bookbinding Department keeps all books in good condition.

COME DOWN AND GET ACQUAINTED.

HOW TO BECOME A MEMBER:

- (1) If you have no book, bring a note of recommendation from your barrack leader (field officers excepted). You will be given a membership with one reservation privilege.
- (2) If you have a book, turn it in for membership. For the first book turned in, you will be given a membership with two reservation privileges; for each additional membership add one additional reservation privilege. A Japanese order requires all books in camp to be turned in to them for censorship and registration, and all books to be circulated thru the Camp Library.

YOUR BARRACKS HAS A BARRACK LIBRARIAN, whose duties are to handle reservations, due notices, and the magazines made available for your barracks.

LIBRARY REGULATIONS

The following rules and regulations will govern the library for the duty personnel at this hospital:

I. FICITION AND MISCELLANEOUS BOOKS

a. Library will be maintained in Headquarters building where books may be withdrawn and returned each day, as follows:

Officers: 3:30 - 4:00 P.M.
Enl Men : 4:00 - 4:30 P.M.

b. Books may be withdrawn for three (3) days only.

c. Due to the small number of books available at the present time, there must be a lapse of at least four (4) days between date of return of books and withdrawal of another.

d. Failure to return a book when due will cause loss of library privileges for two (2) weeks.

e. An unabridged dictionary is available for reference, as well as a French-English dictionary.

f. Headquarters building will not be used as a reading room during the day or evening.

II. PROFESSIONAL BOOKS

will be issued to officers only.

SUBJECT: Redistribution of Library Books.

TO : The Commanding Officer, American Headquarters, Military
Prisoners Camp No. 1 of the Philippine Islands, Cabanatuan, P.I.

1. The Hospital Librarian reports the following number of books
and magazines available for distribution to patients in the hospital:

- a. Books 174
- b. Magazines 21

In addition there are 185 books in such state of wear that
they cannot be issued for distribution. One man is constantly at work
rebinding these books. There is, in addition, a library of 88 books
maintained at Hospital Headquarters for the 423 Medical Officers and
enlisted men.

2. It is earnestly requested that some consideration be given to
the redistribution of books in the Camp Libraries so as to give hospital
patients greater access to books. This request has been made verbally
a number of times and was also brought to the attention of the Hospital
Board of Investigation some time ago which promised to incorporate
recommendations in its report but no action was taken.

3. There has never been an opportunity to develop a large library
in the Hospital because with the exception of the medical personnel on
duty in the Hospital, all personnel in this area have come to the hos-
pital from Groups where any books they may have brought into camp were
deposited in the Camp Library. The Hospital Library was developed from
a small shipment of books received from the Bilibid Hospital and another
large shipment received from the O'Donnell Hospital.

4. Whereas the majority of prisoners in the Groups are working
most of the day and have no opportunity to read, patients in the hospital
find time hanging heavily and are constantly clamoring for reading mater-
ial. Many of these patients claim to have books on deposit in the Camp
Library to which they do not have access while in the Hospital.

5. From therapeutic and morale stand points it is considered
highly desirable to provide reading material for patients.

6. It is recommended that all books in camp be prorated on group
strength. The argument that books in the camp library belong to individ-
uals and therefore cannot be disposed of without the permission of
those individuals I believe untenable. I believe that if a sound appeal
is made to owners of books to donate them to a library to be used by
sick people, the approval will be spontaneous.

The above request has been disapproved by A.P.H. because they
do not consider the books in the camp library camp property but
individual property. Membership in the library is open to both sides and
many (number is being checked) memberships belong to persons
in the hospital area. These books are being drawn daily from the
library by patients on visiting details. Patients are free to withdraw
these books and some of the do return going to the hospital. There are 100
free books on this side not requiring membership that are not

available to the hospital. To the surface and boats coming to the camp after four individual sources will be divided 2 ways - hospital + camp.

1. The Hospital Librarian reports the following number of books
and magazines available for distribution to patients in the hospital:

- a. Books 174
- b. Magazines 21

In addition there are 185 books in such state of wear that
they cannot be issued for distribution. One man is constantly at work
rebinding these books. There is, in addition, a library of 88 books
maintained at Hospital Headquarters for the 423 Medical Officers and
enlisted men.

2. It is earnestly requested that some consideration be given to
the redistribution of books in the Camp Libraries so as to give hospital
patients greater access to books. This request has been made verbally
a number of times and was also brought to the attention of the Hospital
Board of Investigation some time ago which promised to incorporate
recommendations in its report but no action was taken.

3. There has never been an opportunity to develop a large library
in the Hospital because with the exception of the medical personnel on
duty in the Hospital, all personnel in this area have come to the hos-
pital from Groups where any books they may have brought into camp were
deposited in the Camp Library. The Hospital Library was developed from
