Subject : Compensation of personal money for the
American prisoners of war in Cebu Island.

1. In May, 1942, a certain amount of money in possession of American soldiers, surrendering to the Japanese Force at Cebu Island, were confiscated by the Japanese troops concerned, and they now requested us to return their confiscated money, as the attached documents indicate.
2. The unit, stationing at the said island at that time, was transferred to Guadalcanar Island thereafter, where most of the members were killed in the battle. For the above reason, we regret not to have any method available to inquire into its real condition. Therefore, we ask you a favour to give us more concrete data for it, if possible.
3. We wish to inform you that we are ready to compensate the damage on the basis of more accurate concrete data for it.

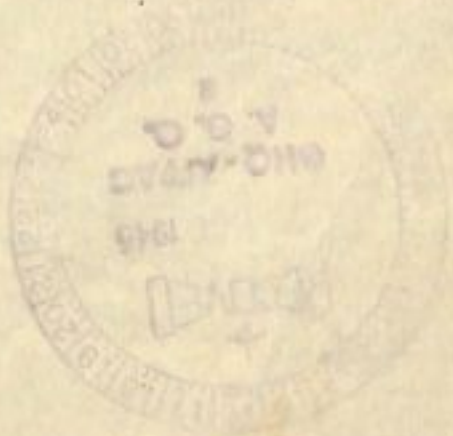

1. On May 19th, 1942, at Cebu, Cebu, P.I., I surrendered to the Imperial Japanese Army carrying out orders received from my senior officer, Brig. Gen. B. G. Chynoweth.

2. At the time of my surrender personal money amounting to Seven hundred and fifty Pesos (P750.00) was confiscated by the Japanese Armed forces in Cebu with the statement that such funds would be held in safe keeping for me and later on returned intact. A receipt was made out for said currency, and over my protest was retained by the Japanese officer in charge. All efforts to collect this currency have been unavailing.

3. I request the immediate return of the currency mentioned in paragraph 2.

AFFIDAVIT OF CAPT DONALD C. GREGG

22 October 1945

1. I was with the Military Police Regiment of the Visayan Forces, USAFFE, (formerly Cebu Brigade) commanded by Brig. Gen. B. G. Chynoweth, which surrendered to the Japanese military forces commanded by Lt. Col. Kawakami at Cebu City, Cebu, Philippines Islands on 17 May 1942.

2. After the surrender approximately 48 Americans, principally Army Officers and some Navy Officers, who had commanded P.T. and supply boats in the area, were taken to the Cebu Provincial Jail and confined there.

3. Shortly after our arrival at the Jail, a lieutenant of the Japanese Military Police set up two tables with three Japanese interpreters in the yard just outside the cell block. He told us "This is orders from higher up" or words to that effect. Each of us was then required to line up and file by the tables. We were required to surrender to the Lieutenant all money, papers, cigarettes, and other property on our person. At the time I had on my person Seven Hundred and Fifty Pesos (₱750.00) (\$375.00), which belonged to me personally. When I turned over this money, the Japanese Lieutenant wrote out and signed a receipt, which he kept himself stating he was doing so for "safekeeping". Neither the money nor the receipt was ever returned to us.

4. I do not know the name of the Japanese M.P. Officer, above mentioned. He was either a second or first Lieutenant, of stocky build, probably 35 to 40 years of age, with a "Kaiser Wilhelm" mustache. He was nicknamed by the prisoners "Dr Fu Manchu". It is my understanding that he was probably implicated with Lt. Col. Kawakami in the subsequent slaying of President Osmena's Son. I saw him again about two month's later, when he came to the jail to interrogate some Filipino Officers. I remember one of the interpreters, above mentioned, as a Japanese civilian, who prior to the war had operated a small store or bazaar on Magellanes street in Cebu City.

5. We were kept in the Jail at Cebu City until 7 October 1942, when we were transferred to Bilibid Prison, Manila. Commander Wilson H. Harrington, U.S. Navy, who was confined with us made numerous requests to the Japanese Authorities for the return of our money but nothing was ever done.

6. I have examined the Affidavit of Lt. Brynojold Baardson, dated 22 October 1945, and saw that Lt. Baardson and the officers listed in Par. 6 and 7, thereof, surrender money and property to the Japanese as therein described.

1. On May 17th, 1942, I surrendered to the Imperial Japanese Forces at Cebu Island, P.I. by order of Brig. Gen. B. G. Chynoweth.
2. At that time my personal money amounting to seven hundred and fifty pesos (P750.00) was confiscated by the Japanese Forces. I was promised the safe return of the above sum, however, I received no receipt. I was told it would be kept in safe keeping by the Japanese. Upon leaving Cebu for Manila I made efforts to have the money returned but I was unsuccessful.
3. I request the immediate return of the amount mentioned.

AFFIDAVIT OF LT BRYNOJOLD BAARDSON

1. On May 15, 1942 at Cebu, Cebu, P.I. I negotiated terms for my surrender in writing with a Lieutenant Colonel Koyakami, Japanese Imperial Army, one condition of which was his assurance in writing that my personal property, food and money would be unmolested.
2. I surrendered to him personally on May 16, 1942 and all terms were punctiliously observed until the following day, May 17, 1942, when I was turned over to the Military Police who confiscated the letter covering the terms of my surrender, certain of my personal property, all my food and all my money totaling P2,079.00(Two thousand and seventy nine pesos) Philippine bills of various denominations. A receipt was made out for the money, and I was told by the Japanese Lieutenant in charge that they were just holding the money in safe keeping for me and that it would be returned intact. He would not, however permit me to retain a copy of the receipt. My protests were unavailing.
3. I waive any claim for the food and the few personal effects confiscated.
4. I request the immediate return of the currency mentioned in paragraph 2.

TO : The Adjutant General, War Department, Washington 25, D. C.

1. Attached are copies of letters of certain American Army and Navy personnel, while prisoners of war, to the Japanese Prisoner of War Bureau relative to the restitution of personal funds confiscated at the time of their capture at Cebu, P. I., May, 1942, and letter of the Liaison Committee (Tokyo) for the Imperial Japanese Army and Navy to the Supreme Commander, 6 October 1945, requesting more concrete information on which to base compensation therefore.

2. Affidavits have been procured from Captain Donald C. Gregg and Lieutenant Brynjolo Beardson (Incls. 3 and 5). This headquarters is informed that Commander Wilson H. Harrington and Lieutenant (JG) Percy M. Cotton, U.S.N.R. who have filed claims, (Incl. 6 and 7), have been returned to the United States. Attention is invited to personnel listed in paragraph 6, Affidavit of Lt. Beardson (Incl. 5), who may be able to furnish information and who may have claims based on this incident.

3. It is requested that available evidence in support of the claims be obtained and forwarded to this headquarters for presentation to the above mentioned Japanese Liaison Committee.

8. Howell, Leon, Capt. 0-2031868 QMC, recovered from Sakata, 13 Sept. 1945. Address: c/o Mrs. Vera Long, 4481 Lemon Street, Riverside California. Claimed to have been appointed Capt. by Gen. Chynoweth on 22 April 1942 at Cebu. No record of having received back pay.
9. Rogers, Rufus H. Lt. Col. Inf. 0-231742, KIA, while POW was being transported aboard a Jap vessel sunk 7 Sept. 1944. Address: Mrs. Grace L. Rogers (wife) 806 Park Drive, Hillsboro, Texas, No record of having received his back pay.
