REPORT OF INVESTIGATION

Unauthorized Action of 1st Lt. Dean K. WOOD, USA (Patient)

1. On the morning of December 27, 1944 shortly after breakfast (7:45 AM), Pfc Shores, Detachment Medical Dept., acting mess sergeant this hospital, reported to Lt. Sarwold, M.C., Mess Officer that a Lt. Wood, (Patient) was conducting an investigation in the kitchen, asking questions, etc. Lt. Sarwold reported this matter to the Commanding Officer, inquiring whether or not Lt. Wood was authorized to conduct an investigation in the Hospital Mess. Lt. Sarwold was informed by the C.O. that Lt. Wood was not authorized to make an investigation.

Lt. Wood was called to the office of the C.O. and after having been questioned in regards to the alleged investigation stated:

"Yes, I made an investigation, because it has come to my attention that the C.O. and staff were being served more food than others in this hospital and something should be done about it.

"I questioned the Mess Sergeant (Pfc Shores) and was informed that the staff were getting four (4) full dippers and 1/3 of a dipper to make up for the food that stuck to the bucket".

Lt. Wood further stated that at the time this matter was brought to his (Lt. Wood) attention he thought there were only three (3) officers eating in the staff quarters instead of four (4) officers."

Lt. Col. John H. Ball, U.S.A., Floor Leader 2nd Floor (quarters of Lt. Wood) was called and questioned. Lt. Col. Ball stated that there had been several rumours to the effect that the staff officers were getting an extra ration and that Lt. Wood had complained to him (Col. Ball) about the alleged extra food etc., but he (Col. Ball) had paid no attention to these rumours.

Capt. Herman M. Archer, U.S.A., Provost Marshall was called. Capt. Archer stated that Lt. Wood had complained to him (Capt Archer) about the staff officers getting more food than the other members of the Hospital and that the matter was reported to the Floor Leader, Lt. Col. Ball.

Lt. Wood was asked by Lt. Col. Ball if he (Lt. Wood) was satisfied with the investigation and he replied, "Yes, there was not enough difference in food to matter. I thought there were three (3) officers eating there".

Lt. Wood pleaded guilty to conducting an investigation without the knowledge of the Commanding Officer.

No further action was taken in this case at the present time.

Before me, a summary court, personally appeared I.F. ENGLISH, Gunner, USN who, having been duly sworn according to law, deposes and says:

While I was lying on my bunk this morning I woke up hearing Sgt. Martin tell Mr. Ferguson, that if he said that he would be lying or would be a 'damn' liar, and Mr. Ferguson told him that he would not be lying. I do not know what they were referring to. Then Mr. Ferguson told Sgt. Martin that he did wish to discuss it further and Sgt. Martin left in company with Mr. Ferguson. A few minutes later Mr. Ferguson returned, followed shortly by Sgt. Martin. Sgt. Martin started to argue again, and Mr. Ferguson insisted that he did not wish to discuss it further, saying that it would be discussed later in the presence of Capt. Shaw. Sgt. Martin then asked Mr. Ferguson if he thought he was too good to discuss it with him, further stating that Mr. Ferguson was 'horse shit' and no good, never was any good either at Cabanatuan or down here. Again Mr. Ferguson insisted he did not wish to discuss it, and Sgt. Martin said that he had plenty to say when he got out of prison camp, which was after Mr. Ferguson reminded him of the fact that they were both in the Marine Corps. That is about all the details I can recall.

Before me, a Summary Court, personally appeared F.V. Ferguson, Cplk, USMC who, having been duly sworn according to law, deposes and says:

This morning Capt. Shaw called me into the office and stated that the dog, "Soochow," would have to be kept tied up, that it was the last warning that would be given. In view of the fact that Sgt. Martin has been interested in taking care of the dog and had only last evening complained to me, because he had heard that the commanding officer of the hospital was going to have the dog shot, I went to Sgt. Martin and explained to him what Capt. Shaw had told me this morning. Sgt. Martin said he would not keep the dog tied up day and night, that he kept the dog tied at night, but would not keep it tied in the daytime. I repeated to him that Capt. Shaw had said the dog must be kept out of the hospital, that this was the last warning, otherwise the dog would be killed. Sgt. Martin said the Capt. cannot kill that dog, or has not the authority to kill that dog, or some such statement. I called his attention to the fact Capt. Shaw could, and probably would kill the dog, if he was not kept out of the hospital. I also advised Sgt. Martin, Capt. Shaw was both his superior and mine, in other words we were both subject to orders from him, Capt. Shaw. Sgt. Martin reiterated he would not keep the dog tied up during the day. I then told him if he were not interested in the dog I would have to tell Capt. Shaw so. Sgt. Martin then said, 'If you tell the Capt. that, you will be telling him a damn lie', or 'you will be a damn liar', words to that effect. I called his attention to the fact I did not care for that kind of language directed toward me, and instead of correcting his language or modifying it, he increased his vituperation and asked me, who the 'hell' I thought I was. I told him I did not care to hear any more language like that, that we would go to the Captain's office as soon as the cards had been signed and the Japanese had left. I told him to report back to me when the office had been cleared. I then returned to my bed space.

Sgt. Martin after a few moments returned to where I was sitting and again tried to start an argument, asking me who the hell I was, that he could not speak to me, was I so much better than others, and so forth. He also made the statement that I was not good and also used the expression 'horse shit' and said that he could and would do plenty of talking when he got out of here. I refused to engage in any discussion with Sgt. Martin, again telling him that I did not care to argue the question with him, that he had orders to report to me after the office had been cleared by the Japanese. He made it clear that he was not going any place and would remain where he was, in other words directly disobeying an order I had given him.

During most of this trouble of unseemly conduct on the part of Sgt. Martin, Gunner I.F. English, U.S. Navy was a witness, and I asked him on a couple of occasions to take particular note of some of the more vicious and insolent remarks made by Sgt. Martin. Eventually Sgt. Martin did leave the vicinity of my bed space.

When the office was cleared Sgt. Martin never reported to me in the proper military manner but merely presented himself at the office. Charge: - ① For having in his possession a soap box (Metallic Soap Box) belonging to a patient. ② LYING TO THE INVESTIGATING OFFICER. ③ INSOLENCE TO A SUPERIOR OFFICER.

Witness against accused: - ROGOWSKI, A. C. - PVT 2/c U.S.N. soap box disappeared between 1830, 29 Nov 44 and 0630, 30 Nov 44. He reported loss to floor leader. Floor leader announced loss of box at evening roll call 29 Nov 44. After roll call Rogowski received information that Durmis might have the soap box. At first Durmis denied having the box but when Rogowski insisted on the box Durmis went to his locker and returned the box to Durmis.

Statement of accused: - Denied by accused. States he found the box outside the barracks about 2030 30 Nov 44 but he realized it was not his box. However, he decided to keep the soap box until somebody called for it or until a cup which he lost about 3 or 4 days after arrival in this camp was returned to him.

Witness: - BARELA, P. F., Sgt. M.S., U.S.A. stated that on the morning of 20 Nov 44 Pfc Durmis asked him to keep a soap box for him (Durmis) until the afternoon. Sgt. Barela refused because of Pfc Durmis' reputation and told Durmis to take the soap box and "get the hell out". Sgt. Barela heard the announcement at evening.

case be told to floor leader of his conversation with Durmin.

Upon being temporarily dismissed Pfc Durmin as he started to leave the office directed the following remarks to the investigating officer: "I hope you find me guilty."

Investigating officers findings:-

Pfc Durmin's equivocal and evasive answers as well as outright false-hood plus the fact that only yesterday (30 Nov 44) he was found to have in his possession property (1 cup) belonging to another patient and in view of the witnesses against him clearly convinces the investigating officer that Pfc Durmin is guilty as charged.

addendum: - When questioned by C.O. of Hospital accused admitted charges against him

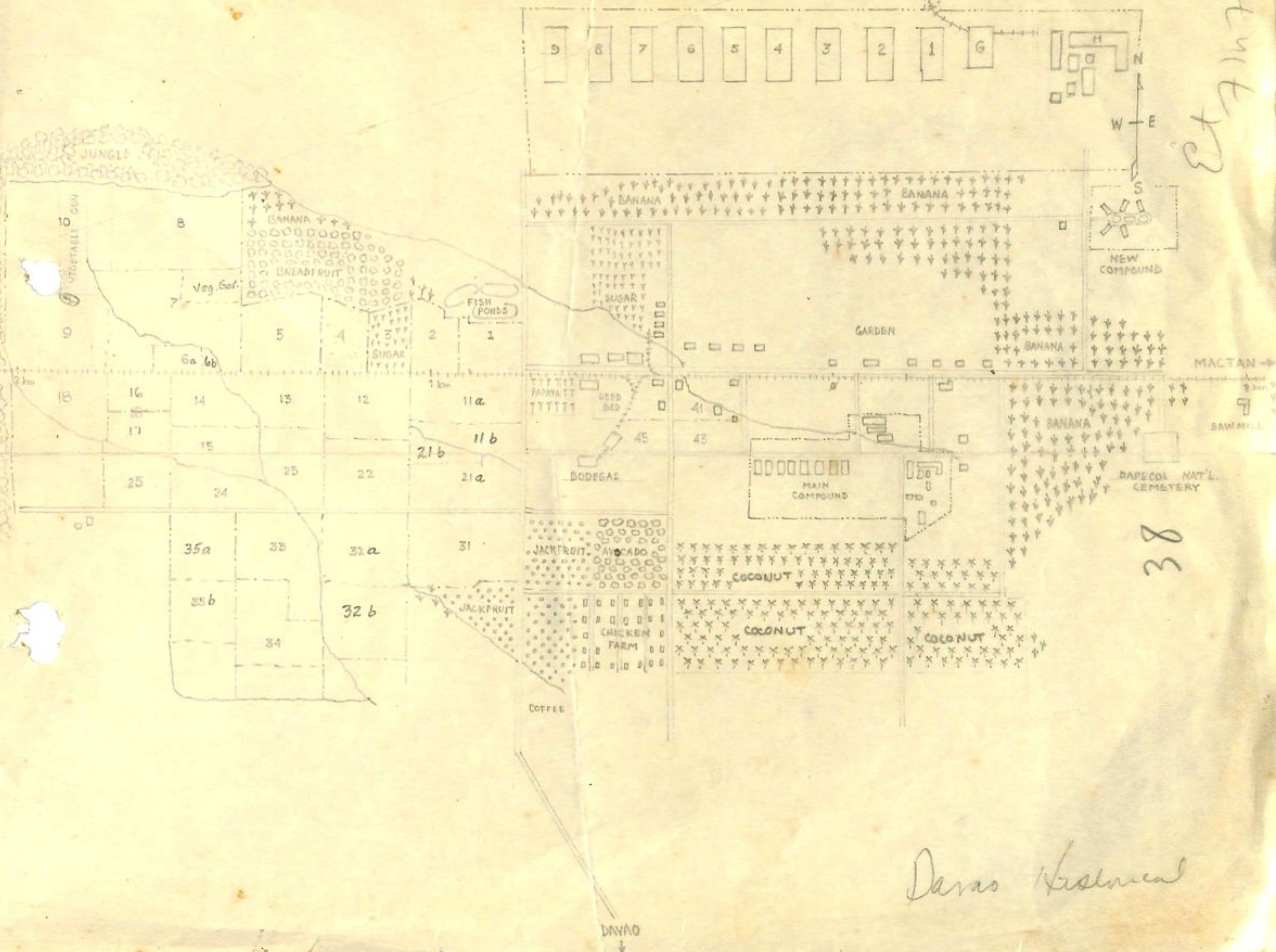
