

STAFF STUDY - Subject: Relaxing of Adjudication Policies of Guerrilla Recognition Claims.

PROBLEM: The complications which reasonably could be expected if steps were taken to rectify, through deletion, modification or other roster alteration, i.e., "correct" any errors in recognition of guarrillas which may be represented by the official guarrilla rosters as now constituted and approved.

1. Introduction.

In order to understand fully the tremendous task which was understan by the Army in its Philippine guarrilla recognition program, it is necessary to consider the chaotic conditions which existed during and subsequent to the Aspanese occupation.

Information available in this headquarters indicates that after the landing of serioun troops on lason, many guerrilla units attached theselves to searcian lawy divisions and received recognition as they proved their utility. However, there were samy aread units not under Amy control and these units presented sorious problems. They impeded utilitary operations, terrorised local commutates, locked Rocal food stooks, and pilfered fire arms and samunition.

Guerrilla units in Mindanae and the Vianyas were well organized and had received recognition, but little was known of the units on Lumon, and as a result, none were recognized up to October 19, 19th, Many of the units located in the hills were unable to attach themselves to the American divisions. They claimed to be the real guerrillas and accused the units which had attached themselves to the American divisions of being "State or 1915; guerrillas".

They claimed the fake guerrillas were organised after the landings and that many signed up the day before they subsitted their resters for recognition and that almost everyone on Luten professes to be a guerrilla. It appears that after word had gotten around that

units were being recognised and paid that all individuals suddenly became conscious of their services. This is emphasized by the fact that Guerrilla Affairs Division denied recognition to approximately 1,000,000 alleged guerrillas.

From the foregoing it appears that on Luxon (most of the fake units originated on Luson) thousands of Filipinos fell in behind the advancing American Liberation Armies and followed them until the end of the war. They received pay at the end of each month. However, when it was discovered that backpay would be paid to units which activaly opposed the Japanese, these "band wagon" guarrillas suddenly discovered that they had been organized since 1942 and had actively opposed the Japanese. This headquarters has been informed by former U. S. Army officers on duty with the Guerrilla Affairs Division and by local citisens that guerrilla leaders sold space on guerrilla rosters to individuals without regard to services rendered, and that overnight, unit histories, complete with meritorious deeds, were conceived and presented to the Recovered Personnel Division to substantiate claims for recognition. The Recovered Personnel Division was literally deluged with these claims to such an extent that final recognition rosters were not completed until May, 1918. It is admitted that the Recovered Personnel Division later discovered it had paid fake guerrillas, but the recovery of these payments was not practical because such recovery involved court actions which, even if successful, might prove adverse to good relations between the two nations. In the event that favorable court action could have been obtained, it is extremely doubtful that the individuals concerned would have been financially able to make the refunds.

2. Discussion.

In the opinion of the undersigned, any addition, deletion or other alteration to subject resters would be fraught with serious complications for the following reasons:

a. On previous occasions, and as recent as 9 April 1949, the Gommandia General Major General I. W. - b. It is sentitled that the recognition resters and, to a leaser degree, individual letters of recognition, are susceptible of error, because of the complicated and nonumental task of trying to ancertain the were deserving of recognition, those who were not, and of determining correct and reasonable Tables of Organization and strongths for units under consideration. While it may reasonably be assumed that errors have been made in rester construction, no one is able to show conclusively where the errors lies.
- c. To attempt to alter, modify, i.e., "correct", one single mass on one single roster would have the immediate effect of responding the guerrilla recognition program. One change slone is sufficient assumntion to give heart to the unrecognized (deserving and undeserving) generillas to pleat their eases began and and are from lamila to Tokyo and Washington. Investigation designed to prove or disprove basis of qualification of singulification of a presently recognized or unrecognized querrilla will, inevitably, be used as a precedent to show why such "corrective action" should shallerly be used to prove recognition for those who, through non-recognition, have allegedly been discriminated against. More harm than good would result, without question.
- d. There are presently large numbers of racketeers combing the islands selling claims forms to the uneducated who purchase such forms believing that by so doing they will become recognised guerrillas. This practice, which received stimulation from prominent persons seeking self aggrandisement, has currently reached explosive proportions. No apparent effort has been made by national or local authorities to suppress these racketeers, so they openly set up headquarters in large cities, including Manila, and recruit new members. As rapidly as these "latter day" guerrillas form units, they prepare rosters, histories, etc. (usually based upon the activities of one or two individuals) and create a highly organized confederation of units composed of both recognized and alleged guerrillas. These organizations wield considerable political power. It is estimated that in addition to the individuals who were not granted recognition by Guerrilla Affairs Division, approximately 1,000,000 alleged guerrillas have been recruited subsequent to 30 June 1948. These organisations of recognised and unrecognised guerrillas pay dues into their respective headquarters or secure collections from local citizens for the purpose of sending missions to Mashington to lobby for more recognitions and other benefits for Philippine veterans and alleged veterans (Incl #1).

e. Attached hereto (incl #2) are summaries of the cases of Messra. SUMMARY, EXTORS, TILLMA, TERODICE, CHAVEZ and COTS, which cases are presented and recommended by Colonal Volcionarm. Since the cases are self-emplanetory, little can be accomplished by further discussion. However, attention is invited to the manifest discrepancies, including apparent forgary, which exist in said claims.

Ocional Volcimant's unit received 26,028 guarrilla recognitions from an unknown number recommended. Information aveilable in this headquarters indicates he approved these rowhers in final form. This headquarters has made no additions, deletions, or other alteration to any of the rowhers furnished by Guarrilla Affairs Division. It is noted that in the cases presented, the claimants are from several separate and distinct units. In view of the large musher of recognitions received (26,028) and the langth of time which has clapsed (5 - 8 years) it is entremely doubtful that anyone could remember mames, dates and circumstances relating to individuals and as a result, such secondary evidence cannot be accepted in its entirety. Undoubtedly Colonal Volcimann is not aware of the wide-spread receives ring which has developed in the Fhiliconies as a result of claims estivities.

In his indoreseast to The Adjutant Sparral dated & October 1989 (Incl 2 to best communication) re BANIEL RITCHS, Colone I Volcimam makes direct statements concerning Kitong's recognition periods. To prove induction there is a certified strue copy of the latter of induction wherein he was inducted by Golonel Moses. However, in Kitong's 2O. Lile (for backpay) the certified true copy of the same document shows induction by it bemnis Medicinas "My suthority of" Golonel Moses. Litis Hore, Deputy Governor of Benguet, the certifying officery, is considered unreasonable by this headquarters, having supported many quastionable Claims or generalist professes. It is supported many quastionable claims or general professes by Kitong to support his claim. Thousands of danilar "corrificad true copies" of supposedly original documents have been substitled in support of large and spurious claims. Such documents, when certified to by prescue considered unreliable, are memorphical assignations.

In view of the foregoing, it appears that Colonel Volckmann has made direct statements pertaining to Ritong's recognition after having refreshed his memory from questionable certified documents. Authority NND983078

3. Conclusions.

Relaxing the policies concerning the adjudication of guerrilla claims reasonably could produce the following results:

- a. Reopen the guerrilla recognition program.
- b. Produce between one and two million requests for consideration and reconsideration of backpay claims.
- Produce between two hundred thousand and three hundred thousand procurement and civilian wage claims.
- d. Cause considerable ill-will toward the United States by many thousands of individuals whose claims would be negative as against a few hundreds whose claims might be positive.
- e. Prolong the completion of the present mission of the Adjutant General Records Depository and the United States Veterans Administration for an undetermined number of years.
- Gost the United States Government an additional sum of approximately \$125,000 for each month of operation of AGRD under relaxed policies.
- g. Adversely affect the conditions of peace and order of the Republic of the Philippines by possible "strong arm" or other similar activities by thousands of disgruntled individuals.

4. Recommendations.

a. That all backpay, pronuement and civilian wage claims which are sent directly to United States Government agendes in Mashington or elsewhere in the ZI, be returned without action to this hasdquarters for appropriate disposition. This headquarters will dispose of the claims as prescribed in paragraph c, GSFO, MARK 90588 dated 25 June 1919, to CHROTE.

VETS RACKET OUTFIT BARBO IN QUESON GUTT. - Army and Philippine Constabulary operatives have fanned out over the country to look into the widespread guar-illa recognition racket which is flourishing despite repeated statements by United States officials that no more guarrillas will be recognized and sawarded back pay.

A Philippine Veterans Legion informant said today that the first target of investigation is a guerrilla organisation operating in Queson City with a membership of \$8,000 men. The racketeers charge an ordinary entrance fee of \$\mathbb{F}\$ for every member and graduated special fees for those who desire to be given ranks - and bigger backpay.

The Queson City group has set up headquarters with complete office equipment and personnel and surrounded by army tents where provincials are temporarily billeted pending "recognition". It has printed official forms and is using the name of a prominent person for a front.

Many of those who are victimized were never in the underground movement.

Army intelligence agents have been dispatched to Nueva Ecija and other Lusen provinces to crack the guerrilla racket. Constabulary operatives are now looking into a Cavite organisation which has swindled some 5000 members. Other agents have been sent to the Visayas.

100,000 Guarrillas to Get \$200,000,000 Soon

approximately 100,000 generillas, all affiliated with the lational Volunteers of the Hhillppines, a divio-chitary organization, who served the underground during the occupation have been recognized by Philaircom, since December 23, 1949, and will get backpay for their war service, of nearly #200,000,000 it was learned from Clark.

The recognition of the NVF guarrillas makes it the biggest guarrillas group to get the chay of the United States Army for their role as part of the underground during the war.

The payment of the windfall is expected this month. The money is deposited with an american bank in Manila, and is part of the general outlay for the recognised units.

Most likely, the checks, an informed NVP source declared this morning, will be cashed direct at Clark Field, where the National City Bank of New York has a branch.

Miss Grus and the other personnel of the social welfare commissioner have been helping and will continue helping claiments prepare their claims up to dead line.

Acheson Letter Govers Field - Other Veteran Measures Imperilled

Vashington, March 16-- (AF)- The U.S. told the Philippines today it will not recognise any more Filipines as having been guerrilla operators against the Japanese during the Japanese invasion of the Philippines.

Further, I learned from unimpsechable sources, the U. S. also told the talends that their campaign for educational and burial benefits for island veterans has no chance of congressional approval and that the executive branch of this government has concluded that further efforts to secure action on this proposal would fail.

Fhilippine official circles refused to discuss the natter, but I learn from other authoritative quarters that this seesingly final declaration of the U.S. position on these questions was contained in a lotter from Secretary of State Bean Acheem to Philippine Ambassador Jonquin Elicalde.

The communication was in reply to several letters Elizalde wrote the state department urging American affirmative action on these questions.

In one letter, Hitsalds saked that United States executives press Ougress for approval of educational and burial benefits for island veterans as contained in the Regers bill. Congress approved only that portion providing 389,925,000 for construction of hospitals in the Philippines and for hospitalization of island veterance.

Acheem's letter quickly followed reports that Freedent Middle Quirino's brother, Amtenic Quirino, in a March 12 address in Manila before a convention of the confederation of Flighton veterans accused U.S. Aubassador Hyron Govenn of moddling in island guerrilla veterans affairs and demanded that President Framan recall Ooven.

It was understood that Acheson told Elisalde that President Trumm informed President quiring during President quiring's 1949 visit here that Congress was unlikely to approve veterans legislation which the falands were asking. Another embassy letter to which it is understood acheson replied asked that the U.S. recognise the northwest Panganga military district, which meant unspecified additional numbers of island correllas would be made alietable for U.S. asyments.

It was further learmed that Acheen said the embassy's various efforts to obtain further American appropria for various slaud objectives on behalf of its serricesan involved different matters, but he felt they have to do with a single question of general policy between the U.S. and the Philippines. Acheen said a statement of general policy of the American government with respect to these questions would answer Blizzle's questions.

Acheson than pointed out that Gengress refuses to approve educational and burial benefits and that the defense department consider closed the question of recognition of more generalise. He told Himshed therefore, he was forced to advise the Ambassador that the U. S. sees no possibility of favorable action along lines the embasy requested, and said he believed that in the final best interest of all concerned it is necessary to consider the matter closed.

Whether Antonio Quirino's reported statements in Manila concerning Gowen precipitated the Acheson communication redeived no common here.

It was further learned that Achsen took occasion to point out that on repented occasions the embassy sengint to further these questions with the U.S. He pointed out that the then secretary of the Army, Kenneth Royall, last year officially ruled that the U.S. army was unable to recognize the northwest Paspanga military district as a guerrilla organization and considered the matter closed.

- 1. Reference is made to the attached cases forwarded to this office by Lt Col R. W. Wolckmann, relating to alleged administrative errors in recognition of guerrilla service. These cases appear to be deserving of further consideration. Detailed information is therefore requested as to the policies now in effect at the AG Records Depository governing these types of cases, and the authority for these policies.
- 2. In the event that current policies preclude further consideration of cases such as those inclosed, it may be necessary to amend those policies to provide that the AG Records Depository will adjudicate such cases when:
- a. Positive emidence is produced to indicate that a name was erroneously omitted from the final roster of recognized guerrilla personnel through administrative error.
- b. Positive evidence is produced to indicate that credit for a period of recognized service was erroneously computed.
- 3. The following information is requested in connection with the policy outlined in paragraph 2 above;
- a. The estimated number of cases similar to the attached which have been unfavorably considered due to restrictive policies on guerrilla recognition.
- b. What effect would such a policy have on the overall guerrilla recognition program?
- c. The estimated number of additional cases requiring reconsideration that would be received as a result of such a policy.

Evidenced by these cases and many similar cases that have come to my attention, I am of the opinion that the policies of PHILCON in adjudicating arrears in pay are extremely rigid, faulty, megligent, injust, and are not to the best interest of the Army or the United States Government. The continued pursuit of such a policy denies those individuals who served fithfully during the darkest days (1942-43) of the Japanese Occupation their earned and just arrears in pay.
 - Request that action be initiated to assure that subject individuals receive a complete and just readjudication of their claims for arrears in pay.
