HISTORY OF THE ARREARS IN PAY BRANCH

1-30 September 1948

1. ORGANIZATION:

Under the provisions of General Orders No. 4, Headquarters Philippines Command, dated 26 August 1948, the Adjustment Section was established as a Special Staff Section of that headquarters.

The Arrears in Pay Division, at that time a Branch of the Recovered Personnel Division, was transferred as a subordinate Branch of the Adjustment Section.

The arrears in Pay Division was subdivided into the following branches:

- a. Director's Office
- b. Administrative Branch
- c. Adjudication Branch
- d. Review Branch C. FISCAL BRANCH

The functions of the Arrears in Pay Branch to reconsider: NED CLAIMS WHOM WRITTEN REQUEST OF CLAIMANTS, Initial requests for determination. ADDITIONAL FUNCTIONS OF THE DIVISION WERE THE

b. Reconsideration requests from dissatisfied claimants. DROCESSING OF

- c. Claims for Confirmation of Rank,
- d. Current Pay claims.
- e. Correction Cases from FS, HNDF.
- f. Conversion of living to deceased claim?
- Responsibilities of each section were as follows:
- a. Director, Arrears in Pay Division Responsible for the proper functioning of the Division. Matters pertaining to policies, personnel and determination were submitted to this office for final consideration. Position of the Director was on a policy making level. It was also his responsibility to administer the

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disbursement of \$10,000,000 protecting the interest of the government as well as the individual claimant.

- b. Chief, Administrative Branch Coordinator between branches, handled administrative latters and exercised direct control over the process and procedures taking place within the Branch.
- c. Chief. Adjudication Branch Responsible for the supervision and operational exercise of officers and employees within the Branch. Prepared policies and determinations with regards to problems and questions expected to arise concerning the application of policies, status of individuals, requirements under Philippine Law, and the application of the arrears in pay program, Supervised the preliminary examination of 201 files, obtained as a result of a letter from claimant with regards to reconsideration. Under the Chief of Branch, wis the executive officer, a 1st Lieutenant, who exercises direct supervisory control over all employees within the section. Advised reviewers and adjudicators in connection with the interpretation of policies, the establishment of status, the examination of cases to determine whether or not granting of the request for reconsideration as warranted as well as advised personnel in connection with the actual adjudication of the claim.
- d. Chief, Review Branch Responsible for the examination, evaluation and review of determinations adjudicated by the Adjudication Branch. A background knowledge of the conditions and facts surrounding the Japanese occuration of the Philippines was necessary. Must, beachle to interpret the War Department Plan for Casualty Administration upon Reoccupation of the Philippines, as well

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as the Missing Persons Act. Ituas advisable that he have at least basic legal knowledge. Other officers assigned to the Review Branch act as associate members of the Board of Review, Hade the same duties, except supervisory control, as the Chief of Branch.

3. SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES

Redetermination policies, superseding those set up by the Recovered Personnel Division, were prepared and set as the guiding factor in redetermining cases. (Tab C for Summery of these Parents)

A series of lectures were given the military, as well as civilian personnel, assigned to the Branch to familiarize them with these new redetermination policies, pertinent to arrears in DBY Cases.

On 28 September 1949, the Arrears in Pay Diwintor commenced determining cases. At this point, the backlog totalled 6,000 cases.

Letters of intent were received by the Administrative Branch who in turn prepared requisitions for 201 files on set forms (Tab. D). These requisitioned files, with letters of intent attached, were transmitted to the Adjudication Branch for appropriate action.

Cases, when received at the Adjudication Branch, were determined and forwarded to the Review Branch for final decision. Review Branch passed final decision as to approval or disapproval of case. In the event a claim was disapproved, letter advising claimant to this effect was dispatched. On the other hand, when a claim was approved, forms for formal requests for redetermination were forwarded to claimant for accomplishment and return (Tab_B). Upon return of these forms, the claim went through the same process a second time. It is also to be noted at this stage that if an individual was entitled to both current and arrears in pay, only his claim for current pay was determined. Claimant had to request again for arrears. So that cases of this nature were actually worked on twice.

The Correction Section, Adjudication Branch, worked on cases window.

Whether the control of the correction due to erroneous entry of names, dates, etc or conversion of a living claim to a decessed claim in instances where the claimant died after his claim had been determined as a living claim.

The Investigation Section, Adjudication Branch, was organized to cross check service of affiants on affidavits, locate duplicate 201 files, procure roster checks and pay data from Finance Service, HNDF or such data pertinent to the case as any one pertinent for the completion of the case.

1. ORGANIZATION:


Just before the deadline, over 1000 cases for correction were received from PS, HNDF. As a result of this, the badiog at the end of the period numbered 752 cases.

BASIS FOR APPLICATION OF THE

MISSING PERSONS ACT TO MEMBERS
OF THE PHILLIPPING ARMY

I INTRODUCTION

The Tydings-McDuffie Act, passed by Congress of the United States in 1935, provided for the establishment of the Commonwealth of the Philippines as a government for the Philippine Islands under certain measures of control until 4 July 1946, on which date the Philippines were to become completely independent. This Act provided that the President of the United States might call into the service of the Armed Forces of the United States in the Philippines all military forces organized by the Commonwealth of the Philippines.

On 21 December 1925, Commonwealth Act No. 1, the first legislative action by the new Commonwealth, known as the "National Defense Act", provided for the establishment of a Fhilippine Army, to consist of a Regular and Reserve Force. "All male citizens were obligated for military training. A system for calling young men for military training at the age of 21 was prescribed.

Organization of the Philippine Army, under the National Defense Act, was immediately begin. Major General Douglas MacArthur, and a staff of United States Army Officers, were detailed as a Military Mission to the Commonwealth. Officers of the Philippine Constabulary, which had been in existence as a military national police force for some 30 years and had now become essentially a branch of the Philippine Army, provided a nucleus for a corps of officers, A small Regular Army was organized and trained, initially largely under the supervision of United States Army instructor personnel. This Regular Army constituted essentially an agency for the training of the Reserve Force. Units were constituted at reduced strengths, with trainees attached for training as reservists. Training codre units, for training reservists, were organized and

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stationed at various camps throughout the Islands.

The Philippine Commonwealth was organized, for military purposes into 10 military districts, of approximately equal population. Functions were comparable to the pre-war corps areas of the continental United States. The general area of the military districts were as follows:

1st MD - Northern Luzon

2nd MD - North Central Luzon

3rd MD - Central Luzon (North of Manila)

4th MD - South Central Luzon, including Manila, Mindoro and Palawan

5th MD - Bicol Area and Masbate

6th MD - Panay and Rombion Is.

7th MD - Negros and Siquijor

8th MD - Cebu and Bohol

9th MD - Leyte and Samar

10th MD - Mindanao and Sulu

A plan for the organization of 30 Infantry Division of the Reserve Force, as well as certain non-divisional units, was adopted, with personnel to be trained, assigned and equipment swallable by 1946.

By January 1937, instructors had been trained and training camps constructed and the first group of about 18,000 trainees was called for a training period of 5½ months. On completion of the 5½ months basic training, approximately 15 percent were selected for an additional 5½ months of training for non-commissions. Upon completion, certain number were allowed admittance into Officers Candidate Schools. Senior ROTC units in colleges and universities were established as an additional source of reserve officers.

Beginning with 1937, approximately 35,000 men annually received trainee instruction and become reservists on completion thereof. By the early part of

1941, personnel had been trained and assigned to the First Infantry Division of each Military District.

On 26 July 1941, the President of the United States, under the provisions of the Tydings-McDuffie Act, issued and Executive Order calling all military forces organized by the Commonwealth into the service of the Armed Forces of the United States in the Philippines, at such times as Gen MacArthur (who was at the time designated as commander of a new command,* United States Armed Forces in the Far East') might direct. Units of the Philippine Army were not made a part of the United States Army, but retained their status as Philippine Army, under the command of the Commanding General, United States Army Forces in the Far East or of commanders designated by him.

Orders were issued by Beadquarters, United States Army Forces in the Far East, from time to time calling other elements of the Philippine Army into the service of the United St tes Army under such calls, Beadquarters Philippine Army issued mobilization orders directing reservists to report to their assigned mobilization stations. Headquarters Philippine Department (U.S.Army) provided officers and enlisted men of the United States Army (including Philippine Scouts) to induct these units and eat as instructors. The general basic was at least two such officers per battalion and one NCO per company.

At the outbreak of the war on 8 December 1941, mobilization was not as yet complete. Therefore, all reservists were ordered to report to the nearest unit or mobilization center. As a result certain units were over-strength and confusion resulted in the assignment of personnel. Artillery personnel were assigned to medical units and vice versa.

The provisions of the Missing Persons Act approved on 7 March 1942 (Fublic Law 490 - 77th Congress (Sec III, Bull 14, WD 1942) as amended by an Act approved 24 December 1942 (Fublic Law 848 - 77th Congress (Sec II, Bull 2, WD 1943), and as further amended by an Act approved rolly resy (Rollic Law 368 - 73th Congress (Sec I Bull 14, uD), 1444), as applicable to members of the Phursphet Army, holdsing recognized civileng greekers.

SUMMARY OF DETERMINATION
PALICIES

The status of an individual under the Missing Persons Act, as andnded, is the state under which he existed in connection with his military standing.

His entitlement to pay for a given period depends on his status for that period.

An individual may have one or more of the following status:

PAY STATUS NO PAY STATUS

Beleaguered No Casualty

Prisoner of War AWOL

Missing Desertion

<u>Relegatored status</u> covers the period between 8 December 19kl, the date war was declared, and 6 May 42, the official date of surrender. The identity of numbers of the USAFFE is establish by one or more of the following types of nroof:

National Service Life Insurance Record (prior to 7 May 1942)

Casualty Record showing that subject individual was killed in action, captured, or died, or was treated at a Field Hospital for battle wounds on sickness prior to 7 May 42.

POW records and death certificate of those concentrated at Camp O'Donnell.

These records must show rank or Serial Number of claimant.

Special Orders calling the individual to active duty supported by evidence that he so reported and was inducted.

Promotion Orders issued after 7 Dec 41 and prior to 7 May 42.

Affidavits by bons-fide returners of the same or higher grade as the claimant and from the same unit.

Civilian guerrillas have no beleaguered status.

<u>Prisoner of war</u> status is that in which an individual was held under physical restraint by reason of his previous military status or suspected anti-Jaconese activities. Missing status covers period of Illness, disability, guerrilla service, spy status, confinement by guerrilla unit and employment by the United States or Philippine Government during the Liberation.

No Casualty status includes that period wherein the claimant's active service in or for the military forces of the United States was terminated as a result of enemy occupation and who returned or could have or was permitted to return home and pursued a normal mode of living. Employment by the Japanese in any capacity, other than POW or spy status, falls within this category.

Desertion and AWOL are self explanatory.

In living cases, casualty status and entitlement to arrears in pay cannot extend beyond the day prior to return to Military Control or 30 June 1946, whichever is earlier, except that pay after date of return to military control (not beyond 30 June 1946) can be swarded when claimant has submitted substantiating evidence and has claimed non-receipt of current pay.

In deceased cases the following will govern the termination of casualty status and entitlement to pay:

Where proof of death is available:

In cases where the individual died after returning to military control, casualty stetus and entitlement to pay will terminate one day prior to return to military control.

In cases where the individual died while in a no casualty status will terminate on the date of death.

In cases where the individual died prior to 23 Oct 44, while in a pay status, casualty status and entitlement to pay will terminate on:

The date next of kin had personal knowledge or official notice of death, or 23 Oct 44, whichever is carlier, where proof of death is conclusive. DECLASSIFIED
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On 23 Oct 44 where proof of death is only reasonably conclusive.

In cases where the individual died on or after 23 October 1944, casualty and entitlement to pay will terminate on the date of death, unless he has returned to military control.

Processing closed on 15 January 1948 for living cases. Therefore, original processing form 23's dated subsequent to that date are not entertained but are retained in suspense file in the event that the acceptance of new claims is authorized. The exception to this is the processing of terminal date guerrillas which continued until 30 June 1948. A terminal date guerrilla is defined as a guerrilla who is recognized for a specific period clearly defined to commonce and terminate on a given date.

Deceased claims were entertained if verbal requests or written requests were received prior to 29 February 1948. Form 9's may be dated subsequent to that date if evidence is one file whichindicates that claimant filed a claim, written or verbal, prior to 29 February 1948. Claims filed after that date are retained in suscesse file.

Current pay claims were adjudicated by the PA prior to 30 June 1948.
Under the agreement of 30 June 1948, this prerogative was removed from the
PA and is now the sole responsibility of the Arrers in Pay Division.

Current pay is that pay individuals received after joining a unit of the Armed Forces of the United States during the liberation and post liberation periods of the Fhilippine Islands but not beyond 30 June 1946.

The determination of the Arrears in Pay Division may not adjust the status of individuals insofar as Guerrilla Affairs Division, as indicated in the records of AGRD is the only basis upon which the redetermination policies of this Division may be administered.

Confirmation of grades or ranks will be considered by the Division on

requests of the individual concerned only if such promotions are authenticated by the records furnished by Guerrilla Affairs Division to AGRD or by orders of a competent USAFFE headquarters. In a few remote instances the rank of a claimant may be confirmed on the basis of affidavits of qualified individuals, such as the Adjutant who prepared the alleged promotion order of a competent headquarters and other such individuals. Such cases, however, are usually authenticated by the Archive records of AGRD.

A civilian guerrilla's name must appear on approved rosters of a recognized guerrilla unit to be entitled to arrears in pay.

A USAFFE guerrilla's name need not appear on a roster to be entitled to arrears in pay provided he has claimed service with a recognized guerrilla unit and the proof necessary to substantiate same is present in his 201 file.

Insamuch as the screening and actual investigation of claims are based entirely on existing records in the custody of AGRD, that agency plays a most important part in the function of the Arrears in Pay Division, therefore the Division operates in the same area to afford rapid accessibility to required records and facilities the most expeditious considerations of claims received.
