STATEMENT OF STAFF SERGEANT WILLARD L. HASKELL, JR., 11011290, GIVEN

On December 8th after war had broken out I was at Nichols Field in Manila and approximately two or three days later we evacuated Nichols Field and went to the surrounding territories around it. From there we were evacuated down to the docks in Manila and some went by boat and some by truck to Bataan. From Bataan at the surrender one of the fellows, Corporal Manasalla of the 57th Philippine Scouts with approximately hine years service, (a radio man,) and myself swam to Corregidor. On arrival at Corregidor we were interviewed by Major George B. Hart, who I believe was from Cincinnati, Ohio, and who was Chief Communications Officer on Corregidor. Then we were assigned to different jobs. I was on beach defense and he (Cpl. Manasalla) was in the radio station. At the surrender of Corregidor there were only 800 men who remained on the island to work, the rest going to different camps near Manila, such as Bilibid Prison and Cabanatuan. There we were used chiefly in cleaning up the island, removing American artillery guns which were out of order and also helping put in new ones for defense. On leaving Corregidor I was sent to Cabanatuan Camp No. 2. There I remained for approximately three months. Then I left with a detail of 2,000 men and went to Davao, Mindanao. There we worked on a plantation which was called Dapicol, which was a Philippine prison formerly. This camp was approximately 60 kilometers from Davao. Approximately nine months later another group of 100 men were taken into Davao and there being put to work on a naval airfield. We worked there approximately eight months when we first heard the American airplanes. Shortly

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after bombing occurred. Consequently, the Japanese figured there might be a landing and moved us off so we could not be taken back. Another group of men were working at another airfield and there were approximately 650 men there. We were all put on the same boat. It was early afternoon when we were put on the boat and American planes came over and bombed. It was the first day raid we had had. Eighteen days later we arrived at Zamboanga and where we were transferred to another ship. Two days later at approximately 4:10 we were torpedoed by an American submarine. From my own calculations I figure approximately 300 men out of the group of 750 reached the top of the water, but due to the fact that the Japanese were firing at them in the water many were killed or drowned. As the sun set my buddy, Charles Johnston, Technical Sergeant, of Headquarters, U.S. A. A. F., and myself arrived at land at approximately 11:00, the rest of my story being known to the War Department.

As Charles Johnston and myself were swimming toward shore at approximately 4:30, jist before sunset, we saw two friends of ours named Percy Smith and Jimmie Smith, both of the Medical Corpe, swimming toward a tanker which was beached. Just as they rounded the boat, trying to approach it, the Japs fired at them with machine guns. Whether or not they were killed or drowned we did not know as it was getting dark.

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Just as soon as I came cut of the hold of the ship I heard the Japanese calling to the Americans to come to the rafts and boats and no harm would come to them. A friend of mine by the name of Mustat approached one of the rafts where he started to climb on when a Japanese Lieutenant, whom we had nicknamed Caesar, struck him with a saber. I saw him go into the water and did not see him come up.

\* \* \* \* \* \*

I had friends in the 17th Pursuit named Koski and John Gillis. I never saw them after the surrender.

Lieutenant Forrester, 409th Signal Company, who was a friend of mine, died on Bataan at Camp O'Donnell, this being told to me by another officer in the same outfit as he, named First Lieutenant John D. Mullaney of the 409th Signal Company located at Nichcls Field. On arriving at Louisville, Kentucky, I only had a few mimutes to stay while the plane was refueling, consequently I did not have time to go over to Lt. Mullaney's home so I called his home and talked to his sister, Helen. They were very pleased to hear from me and hear about Johnnie. That night when we arrived in Mashington I wrote a letter to Mrs. Mullaney, 653 Gecil Avenue, Louisville, Kentucky, explaining that her son, the last time I heard, was in fairly good condition and was at Dapicol in about February 1944.

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The last time I saw the following men was before the surrender of Bataan:

Corporal Walter Becher went A. W. C. L. in Manila before we went to Bataan and the story got around that he was seen with a girl in Manila. Whether he died or not was unknown, but we never saw or heard from him afterwards.

Corporal Ekles, who went to Japan from Manila as orderly for a Colonel.

The full fledged Colonels were allowed to take an orderly with them.

\* \* \* \* \* \* .

While coming down from Manila to Dawao an officer died in the hold of the ship due to the bad air and small amount of food we were receiving from suffocation, I believe. He was wrapped in a U. S. army blanket which was weighted down and as he was lowered down from the boat by ropes the Japanese soldiers stood at attention with Present Arms, as well as the Japanese officers, who saluted with their sabers. I did not know the officer's mame.

\* \* \* \* \* \*

The following was told to me by others: A friend of mine by the name of Herbert Riverg, Frivate First Class in the 28th Materials Squadron, Clark Field, who came over in April 1941, was on the front lines in Bataan with his outfit and received orders to go on duty on the Outpost Line of Resistance. He approached his station and gave the signal which was "to snap down the bolt twice" and the person who was in the station, being nervous and not knowing definitely whether it was an American or Japanese, became excited and fired in the direction the noise came. The bullet punctured his (Rivers) chest and

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came out his neck. He was sent to the No. 1 Hospital in Marwellts where he died two days later. His home address is Common Fence Point, Portsmouth, Rhode Island.

### STATEMENT OF STAFF SERGEANT JOSEPH P. LAMKIN, 20,700,241

I was in Company "A" 194th Tank Battalion. At the outbreak of the war I was at Clark Field. On approximately 15 December 1941 I was transferred to Batangas, South Luson Forrest. I left Batangas about a week later (22 December 1941) and went north to Lyngayan for delaying action down into Bataan. We retreated down to Bataan again until the surrender on 9 April 1942.

I arrived at Camp O'Donnell on 23 April 1942 and stayed there until 31 May 1942, at which time I went to Camp Cabanatuan. I left Camp Cabanatuan on 18 June 1942 for Culumpit, Pampangs, Luson, for work detail. I went back to Camp Cabanatuan on 5 September 1942. I left Cabanatuan on 26 October for the Davao Penal Colony. I stayed at the Davao Penal Colony until 28 February 1943 and then went to Lasang where on 20 August 1944 I boarded a Japanese transport.

Sergeant James F. McCommas, Company "A", 194th Tank Bn. and I kept a very close check of the entire outfit and between the two of us we checked the roster until it was lost on the Jamenese transport.

#### CLEVENCER, Pearlie L., Staff Sergeant

Cabanatuan prior to 18 June 1942. I was checking our roster all the time and was told by several men in the outfit that he had died.

#### VEILLETTE, Byron L., Staff Sergeant

Sergeant Veillette died at Cabanatuan about July 1942 from cerebral malaria. I saw him after he died and identified his body.

I am postive that Sergeant Larson is dead because Frivate First Class Ray E. Mahan told me that he was the only man left in the Maintenance Section of which Sergeant Larson was a member.

Sergeant Saarinen died in September 1942 at Cabanatuan from dysentery, I believe. I saw him and identified his body.

### SROBEL, Herbert F., Sergeant

Sergeant Srobel was killed in action on 26 December 1941 during delaying action from Lingayan to Batsan. I believe that his body is buried at Rosallis. By tank was parked right next to his. I saw him get killed. He was taken by the Filipinos and buried.

# BELL, Gerald J., Corporal and BENDER, August, Private

I told Lieutenant Shapiro about this, but I could not think of Ealey's name. The other men that I could not think of and who were shot because one man tried to escape, and the Japanese shot them because of this were:

ADAMS, Sergeant, stationed at Nichols Field prior to the war.

SMITH - There were twin brothers, Private Ralph L. Smith and Brivate First Class James H. Smit

I was down in the hold and when the torpedo struck it threw me up out of the hold and I found myself floating in the water. While swimming to shore I noticed another man who was behind me about 20 feet and I called to him and he did not answer. He had only a small piece of board. I thought I ould help him and I swam to him from my raft. His head was split deep into the center and his brains were all exposed. This nam's name was MASTELT. He was purple. There was another man along with me who was Sergeant MEUTSON, but neither of us was able to help Masfelt. He was having convulsions and tried to graps on to Neutson and got a strangle hold. He seemed to be on the verge of death and our mattress was sinking because of the extra weight, so we put him off and he went straight down and didn't come up again.

I was in the hold with the 500 men. There were three other Japanese boats there at the time and they too were firing upon the men in the water. These boats were cruising through the water all during the night and they were shooting the men they could find. The waters are infested by sharks and the Japanese were shooting any body they could get hold of.

It is my opinion that if they retook any prisoners they would have shot these too. There is no reason why they would shoot some and let others live,

When Lamkin was at Camp #1, Cabanatuan, he and others were on a work detail at Culumpit, Pampangua, Province of Luron, Cpl Niegram, 31st Inf. escaped. He had a wife in Manila. Before men went on detail each one was given a number. Jage asked if anyone else had a wife in Manila. Smith of C Co, 194th Tk Bn said that he did. One morning Japs called off names of 4 men who had numbers, 2 lower than Niegrem's and two higher than Niegrem's. One of the men called was Sgt Adams, Air Corps, Michols Field; the 5th man was Smith. The five men were loaded in a truck with Capt Day (QMC), and another American officer as witnesses. A short time later Lamkin heard three volleys coming from the direction where the men were taken. Capt Day returned and said that all five were executed. Day added that Smith was still alive after the 3 volleys and that a Jap officer went up to him with a pistol and killed him, MLOWE

Lamkin confirmed canteen story about this man and said he believes his name was James McFee.

Lamkin and S/Sgt James McComas, both from Brana, Minn., and Gere so most of the men in Co A, 194th Tk Bn. The two men kept a record of men who died. This record was lost after prison ship was torpedoed. Following are men who died according to memory of Lamkin:

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
