COMMENT NO. 1

- 1. Mr. Johnston's letter of 14 September 1951 is in reply to Major Baken's letter of 9 August 1951 in which Maj. Baken raised the point that, if VA was determining all Missing Status under Staff Memo #14 as inactive status, there was no point in AGED's continuing to show the reason for such Missing Status.
- 2. The point came up in the case of the above captioned veteran, whose period of missing under Staff Memo #14 was a period of "Unrecognized Guerrilla Service" under a recognized officer, which VA indicated would be considered in active service. Major Baken's letter was apparently for the purpose of getting a definite commitment from VA that we need not any longer take the trouble to give the reasons for Missing status under Staff Memo #14. The case of CARDOS, Agustin C., was used to point up reasons for such certifications and to face them squarely with the problem of deciding whether or not such certifications were desired in the future.
- 3. Mr. Johnston's letter of 14 Sept 51 and the attachments give the VA decision on cases of this nature.
- 4. We change in our policy was involved nor in view of VA's acceptance of this type of service as 'active' service under their criteris is any change required. The matter of "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized officer" is contained in our Veterans' Branch Adjudication SOP and is fully discussed in Appendix B, thereof, on pages 5 to 9. VA Central Office has copies of this policy and should not have needed to write the original radiogram which caused this correspondence.
- 5. The correspondence in this case is in my precedent & policy file. There are information copies in the 201 file of the subject. The same distribution will be made of the current correspondence.

Dear Major Baken:

This has reference to your letter dated July 10, 1951, file AGRD-SC-201- CAFDOS, Agustin C., Cl2 151 500, in which advice was requested as to whether the AGRD should continue to distinguish between "Unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized Commissioned Officer" and "Unrecognized anti-Japanese activity" in certifying service information of former members of the USAFFE.

The Solicitor of the U.S. Veterans Administration has reconsidered its prior determination, with consideration given to the information furnished in your excellent and comprehensive letter of July 10, 1951 and in the opinion dated August 9, 1951, held that: "Unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer" may be accepted as service such as to entitle the claimant to benefits under laws administrated by the Veterans Administration. Paragraph 11 of the Solicitor's opinion referred to, a copy of which is attached, includes the form of certification that would be acceptable for that purpose. A copy of letter dated August 16, 1951, from the Assistant Administrator for Claims covering the same subject matter is also attached and you will note in paragraph 4 of his letter that he has requested that AGND continue to report and distinguish between "Unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized Commissioned Officer" and "Unrecognized anti-Japanese activity" in view of the seid Solicitor's opinion.

1. This has reference to your memorandum of July 27, 1951, transmitting therewith copy of a letter dated July 10, 1951, from P. M. Baken, Major, Infantry, Director, S & C Division, Headquarters 8133D Army Unit, Adjutant General Records Depository, (PHILIPPINE ISLANDS) which was forwarded to you by letter of July 16, 1951, from the Manager, Manila, Philippines.

- 2. The opinion of this Office of January 3, 1951, in the instant case, responsive to your submission of December 18, 1950, recited from the statement of facts -
  - ". that the veteran entered active service on March 18, 1942 as a member of the Philippine Commonwealth Army, and he is not shown to have served as a Philippine Scout or as a member of the Army of the United States. On May 7, 1942 he entered into a missing status, and on October 5, 1942, while engaged in anti-Japanese activities under Major P. B. Osman, a commissioned officer of the Philippine Commonwealth Army recognized by and cooperating with the Armed Forces of the United States, he was wounded in line of duty. . . M
- 3. The submission also quoted from a report of the service department, dated July 28, 1949, that -

""Further investigation revealed that subject veteran's unrecognized anti-Japanese activities included services Under Maj. Perfecto B. Osman for the period 20 Jun 42 to 5 Oct 42 and under Lt. Arturo F. Alcantara for the period 1 Sep 44 to 31 Oct 44; Major Osman and Lt. Alcantara are both recognized officers of the 6th MD. . . """

- 4. Paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 of the opinion read:
  - "2. In A.D. No. 746 dated May 23, 1947, it was held in part that:

'Any member of the Commonwealth Army who was ordered into and served in the armed forces of the United States, or any person who served in such forces, is potentially entitled to benefits under the applicable laws; the fact of such service being shown by the record, or certification of the United States armed forces. It must be shown in any case that at the time injury (disease) or death occurred:



- 1. This is in reply to your letter of July 16, 1951 and in further reference to the communication from this office dated March 15, 1951 relative to the claim for disability compensation filed by the above named veteran.
- 2. The principal claims folder is herewith returned and your attention is invited to the Solicitor's Opinion of August 9, 1951 in which it is stated in substance that the certification of the United States Armed Forces that this former member of the USAFFE rendered unrecognized guerrilla service under a commissioned officer of the U.S. Army, Navy, or Marine Corps or under a commissioned officer of the Commonwealth Army recognized by and cooperating with the United States Forces, meets the requirements of A. D. 746 and entitles the veteran to payments of disability compensation, if otherwise in order.
- 3. In view of this Opinion, this veteran's payments of disability compensation should be restored as of the date of discontinuance. Any other cases, that may have been adjudicated in accordance with paragraph 6 of the letter of March 15, 1951 should be reviewed and similarly adjusted, if certification as in the Cardos case is received showing guerrilla service in USAFFE cases.
- A. In view of the present opinion it is also requested that the extra copy thereof be furnished to Major P. M. Baken, Director, S&C Div., Headquarters \$133D Army Unit, AGRD (Philippine Islands), and that he be requested to continue making certifications to the VA as outlined in his letter in the Cardos case showing guerrilla service under a recognized officer. In other words, it is desired that a distinction be made between "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer" and "unrecognized anti-Japanese activity".

- (b) That he was serving, albeit in an irregular force, under a commissioned officer of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps; or under a commissioned Officer of the Commonwealth Army recognized by, and cooperating with the United States forces. (Emphasis added)
- "3. The memorandum of the Director, Dependents and Beneficiaries Claims Service, addressed to the Vice Chairman, Board of Veterans Appeals, and dated July 31, 1950 (which memorandum was referred to in your submission), after quoting Paragraph 3(b) of TB 8-106 contains the following:

'A careful consideration of the above paragraph would seem to exclude Philippine Army men from consideration except in cases where they are recognized guerrillas or have returned to military control.'

- When the guerrilla service of a person who is a member of the Commonwealth Army has not been recognized by the Armed Forces of the United States (as required in A.D. No. 746), as in this case, such service can not be accepted by the Veterars Administration for the purpose of payment of benefits under the provisions of Public Law 301, 79th Congress, approved February 18, 1946, 60 Stat. 6, 14, 21. The question presented by you is answered accordingly.
- 5. Major Baken's letter of July 10, 1951, discusses the differentiation between "unrecognized" certifications and "one day recognition". In discussing the facts in the instant case Major Baken states that the Veteran Cardos served with the 61st Inf Regt, until disbanding of that unit on May 22, 1942, following surrender of the United States Forces in the Philippines. Cardos did not surrender to the enemy, but joined the 6th Military District (guerrilla) on June 1, 1942. He was an active member of the guerrilla forces until May 7, 1945, on which day he returned to military control; his name, however, is not listed on any reconstructed toop roster, casualty roster or letter of individual recognition of the 6th Military District. He mentions the fact that the certification of service gave the subject veteran the following service:

- 7. The letter then goes on to point out that in the instant case
  - formation was recently found among the organizational records of his unit showing that he rendered guerrilla service under recognized Commonwealth Army officers, not only during the periods shown above, but also from September 1943 up to August 1944. In other words, the above breakdown should show that subject veteran had unrecognized guerrilla service under recognized Commonwealth Army officers from Sep 43 to 31 Aug 44. instead of unrecognized anti-Japanese activities only during the same period as now shown on the latest certification. ... (emphases supplied)
- 8. While not specifically stated as a question, it seems to be apparent from Major Baken's letter that the question is asked whether a change in the present method of certification showing "Unrecognized Guerrilla service under (name, rank and unit of recognized commissioned Officer).", instead of "Unrecognized anti-Japanese activity.", as previously reported in the instant case, would be a sufficient certification of service under Administrator's Decision No. 746 to permit favorable adjudication in cases where the facts warrant.
- 9. As is pointed out in Administrator's Decision No. 746,
  - ordered into and served in the armed forces of the United States, or any person who merved in such forces, is potentially entitled to benefits under the applicable laws; . "



- 10. The Administrator's Decision further states as to proof of such service -
  - ... the fact of such service being shown by the record, or certification of the United States armed forces. It must be shown in any case that at the time injury (disease) or death occurred:
  - b. That he was serving, albeit in an irregular force, under a commissioned officer of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps; or under a commissioned officer of the Commonwealth Army recognized by, and cooperating with the United States forces."
  - 11. The proposed certification,

"Unrecognized Guerrilla service under (name, rank and unit of recognized commissioned officer).",

may be accepted as meeting the requirements of Administrator's Decision No. 746, and favorable adjudication in such cases, if the facts otherwise permit, is authorized.

According to the record of the above-entitled case, subject veteran was a member of the Philippine Commonwealth Army inducted into the service of the Armed Forces of the United States. He was inducted into the USAVVE on 18 March 1942 pursuant to the military order of the President of the United States of 26 July 1941, and served with the 7th Co. Warning Service, 61st Inf Regt up to the disbandment of his unit on 22 May 1942 following the surrender of the US Forces in the Philippines. He did not surrender to the enemy, but joined the 6th Military District (guerrilla) on 1 June 1942. He was an active member of the guerrilla forces until 7 May 1945, on which date he returned to military control. His name, however, is not listed on any reconstructed troop rester, casualty roster or latter of individual recognition of the 6th MD. He was discharged from the service on 15 May 1945.

Our latest certification of service, dated 28 July 1949, subsequently confirmed correct by Hemorandum for Record (Special Review Project) dated 7 August 1950, gave subject veteran the following service:

In fairness to subject veteran, it is herein made of record that additional information was recently found among the organizational records of his unit showing that he rendered guerrilla service under recognized Commonwealth Army officers, not only during the periods shown above, but also from September 1943 up to August 1944. In other words, the above breakdown should show that subject veteran had unrecognized guerrilla service under recognized Commonwealth Army officers from Sap 43 to 31 Aug 44, instead of unrecognized anti-Japanese activities only during the same period as now shown on the latest certification. However, the propriety of effecting the above changes at this time is doubtful in view of the decision of the Solicitor of the Veterans Administration in this case, specifically relating to that type of service.

Unife this case done The 6th Military District, in which veteran rendered guerrilla service from 1 June 1942 to 6 May 1945, was recognized as an overall command as of 20 June 1942. According to organizational records of this Military District, veteran was assigned successively to its different combat components, until on 1 Nov 1944, he was transferred by appropriate orders to "A" Transport Co., 63rd Inf, Combat Team, 6th MD. All the component units of the 6th MD in which veteran served were once recognized by the former Guerrilla Affairs Division (GAD) and subject veteran's name was listed on the approved troop roster of "A" Transport Co, 63rd Inf, Combat Team, submitted by the unit to the Guerrilla Affairs Division. However, when the troop rosters of the different components of the 6th MD were reconstructed by GAD in 1948, the unit on whose troop roster subject veteran's name was listed, "A" Transport Co, 61st Inf, Combat Team, was deleted from the recognized components. als growedly services night had been, that this this handgemeters has From the above, you can see that subject veteran's lack of recognition by GAD was brought about by circumstances beyond his control. He simply had the misfortune of having been transferred from a recognized component to another component whose recognition was subsequently withdrawn three years later. The deletion of his unit and the consequent withdrawal of his recognition as a guerrille did not however nullify the fact that he served in the 6th MD. Had this man been a civilian guerrilla, he would not now enjoy any military status as a member of the Commonwealth Army in the service of the Armed Forces of the United States. But since he had been validly inducted into the service of the US forces back in Merch 1942, this headquarters regards him as having been in a militarized status from the date of such valid induction until his discharge in May 1945. As such, he is qualified to be in a Missing Status and entitled to pay during the period of his guerrilla service, in accordance with the basic authority of this headquarters, the Missing Persons Act, as amended.

those persence! have proviously semifred the statos (which there have The circumstances of this case, it is hoped, will fully explain why subject veteran is not a recognized guerrilla although officers under whom he previously served are recognized. While this case does not fall within the situation outlined in paragraph seven (7) of the Memorandum for Record of the Conference between representatives of the Army and of the VA held at your office on 28 January 1949, that situation is believed to have been actually current during the guerrilla recognition program. The situation referred to was "that names of members of the USAFFE and of the PS who performed valid active guerrilla service do not appear on the reconstructed guerrilla rosters as a result of misinformation circulated by some guerrilla leaders and others that the services of PS and USAFFE personnel would be taken care of under the Missing Persons Act regardless of whether their names were placed on the reconstructed guerrilla rosters." Indeed, as shown in the present case, the guerrills service performed by this former member of the USAFFE has been fully taken care of under the Missing Persons Act, even if he is not recognized by GAD. This fact was known to guerrilla leaders who prepared the guerrilla rosters for submission to and approval by GAD. For purposes of the benefits (arrears in pay) under the Missing Persons Act, recognition by GAD was advantageous to former members of the USAFFE if they held higher grades in the guerrilla, because they were entitled to the pay of the higher recognized grade from date of recognition. Those of them whose names were submitted for recognition held higher guerrilla grades, but those grades were often reduced by GAD.

Today your policies, principally Và AD The reasons why in this case and in similar cases this headquarters employs "unrecognized" cortifications instead of "one-day recognition" are believed well known to you because that term was adopted by this headquarters after your office fully concurred with its use. The "one-day recognition" cannot be employed because this headquarters has no authority to confer guerrilla "recognition" to any person whose guerrilla service was not "recognized" by GAD, no matter how meritorious his guerrille services might had been. But while this headquarters has no authority to "recognize", as was done by the former Guerrilla Affairs Division, this headquarters has authority under the Missing Persons Act to determine whether or not persons entitled to the benefits of said Act rendered guerrilla services. Thus, under the MPA, former members of the USAFFE (persons covered by the Act) are considered in a Missing Status and entitled to pay during periods of active guerrilla service, irrespective of whether or not such service was "recognized" by GAD. It is to be noted, however, that the same consideration cannot be given to civilian guerrillas not "recegnized" by GAD, because such persons do not have any official military standing and are therefore not within the purview of the Missing Persons Act. With respect to civilian guerrillas, recognition granted by GAD conferred on them the status (which they never had before) of persons serving in the Armed Forces of the United States, either individually or as members of a component of the Commonwealth Army ordered into such service. But with respect to former members of the USAFFE, recognition did not have the same effect, because these personnel have previously acquired the status (which they have not lost) of members of a component of the Commonwealth Army ordered into the service of the Armed Forces of the United States by virtue of the Presidential Order of 26 July 1941. owever, so their tenders bood, only the one who was recognised

In discussions with your office on Branch Memorandum No. 1, Vetcrans Branch, AGRD, which in part outlines the use of the descriptive phrase "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer", it is recalled that the same was proposed by representatives of this headquarters in order to solve what amounted to an impasse as a result of VA's rejection of our Missing Status determinations under the MPA as interpreted in Staff Memorandum No. 14, AFWESPAC, 27 Dec 45, and the Army's lack of authority to make determinations of service under VA policies as proposed by your office. VA's main objection to our certification then was that determinations of Missing Status under Army policies (especially Staff Memo No. 14) were too lenient to suit your laws, rules and precedents. For example, the Army determines former members of the USAFFE in a Missing Status (hence on active service) under the MPA and Staff Memo No. 14 for periods, during the enemy occupation and prior to return to military control, when the veterans were ill of service-connected disease or injury, evading capture, in hiding to svoid capture, or performing some guerrilla activity which, according to VA, did not meet the five-point criterion employed by Guerrilla Affairs Division as evidenced solely by the fact that GAD did not grant

them guerrilla recognition. Under your policies, principally VA AD \$746, these periods are considered periods of inactive service. While it was insisted, with respect to guerrilla service, that only such guerrilla service as was recognized by GAD was considered active service under VA AD \$746, it was nevertheless conceded that periods of active guerrilla service of a former member of the USAFFE, though not recognized by GAD, might be considered meritorious (active service) by VA provided that veteran rendered it in a guerrilla unit under the command of a commissioned officer of the Commonwealth Army, Navy or Marine Corps, or under a commissioned officer of the Commonwealth Army recognized by and cooperating with the US forces, and provided further that the same is certified by the Army (AGRD). The merits of the latter situation may be discerned from the following illustration:

Two former members of the USAFFE, i.e., militarized persommel, joined the same guerrilla outfit at the same time, served in the same unit and under the command of the same commissioned officer. These two soldiers participated in a combat operation and both of them sustained injury at the same time and under the same circumstances. The unit was recognized by GAD, and their commanding officer was also recognized as a commissioned officer. The recognition of the unit and of the officer covered the period of service and date of injury of these two men. For some reason or another, only one of them appears on a reconstructed troop roster or casualty roster or letter of individual recognition approved by GAD. Under the MPA and Staff Memo No. 14, both these men are considered in a Missing Status during the period of guerrilla service which culminated in injury to both. Under VA policies, however, as then understood, only the one who was recognized by GAD would be entitled to consideration, while the one who was not recognized by GAD would be considered on inactive service. It is plain that both of them were militarized personnel, both were injured at the same time and under the same circumstances, yet both do not receive the same consideration from VA. However, if the Army certifies that the latter was rendering guerrilla service under the command of a recognized commissioned officer at the time of the injury, he might be given the same consideration as his more fortunate comrade.

The present case of CARDOS, Agustin, who according to the Army's records actually rendered guerrilla service in a recognized unit under recognized Commonwealth Army commissioned officers, and who was injured while in such service, typifies the case of the person who had the misfortune of not being recognized by GAD, but who has been certified by the Army to have rendered guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer.

In other words, Army and VA policies with respect to guerrilla service rendered by a former member of the USAFFE may be compared thus: The Army considers guerrilla service rendered by such a veteran as Missing Status (hence active service) under the MPA and Staff Memo #14, whether or not the guerrille service was recognized by GAD. On the other hand, VA classifies guerrilla service into three categories, namely, first, guerrilla service recognized by GAD as manifested on a reconstructed troop roster, easualty roster or individual letter of recognition; second, guerrilla service not recognized by GAD as above, but certified by the Army as having been rendered by the veteran in a guerrille unit under the command of a commissioned officer of the US Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or under the command of a commissioned officer of the Commonwealth Army recognised by and cooperating with the US forces; and third, guerrilla service not recognized by GAD and not rendered under the command of a commissioned officer, etc. The first category is definitely active serving the second might be considered active service under the provisions of VA AD #746, and the third is definitely inactive service.

Since the term "Missing Status" is indeed applied by the Army to various situations most of which are considered inactive service by VA, but some of which may be considered active service, it is understandable that a certification of plain "Missing Status" was inadequate to enable VA to determine whether a veteran, for any time during a "Missing Status", was on active or inactive service as provided for in your VA AD #746. Accordingly, AGRD representatives suggested in Branch Memorandum No. 1, that all periods of Missing Status of a former member of the USAFFE be broken down by AGRD into the different situations involved, and each situation appropriately described to show veteran's activities. With respect to guerrilla service, the same would be broken down into the following and each described and certified thus:

Period of Guerrilla service recognized by GAD - "Recognized
Guerrilla Service"

period of Guerrilla Service not recognized by GAD but rendered under a commissioned officer. etc. - "Unrecognized Guerrilla service under (name, rank and unit of recognized commissioned officer)."

Period of Guerrilla service not recognized by GAD and not rendered under a commissioned officer. etc. - "Unrecognized anti- Japanese activity."

By that manner, VA will be able to apply its policies. The procedure as outlined in Branch Memorandum No. 1, overcame VA's objections to AGED's Missing Status determinations. It was concurred in by the Veterans Administration and immediately put into effect.

As shown above, the term "Unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer" was adopted, for want of a better term, to describe guerrilla service which was not "recognized" by GAD, in order

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to distinguish it from guerrills service which was "recognized" by GAD. That is to say, the terms "recognized" and "unrecognized", as used in ACRD certifications to describe guerrilla service of former USAFFE personnel, have a restricted meaning. They refer merely to the fact of "recognition" formalized by the former GAD as manifested on approved reconstructed guerrilla troop rosters, casualty rosters, or letters of individual recognition.

It is correct to say that "unrecognised guerrilla service under a commissioned officer" is guerrilla service not recomized by GAD, but it is not accurate to say that such guerrilla service is not recognized by the Army, in the sense that the Army does not give credit for such service, for the plain truth is that full credit is given by the Army for such service under that certification to VA. The foregoing distinction will not of course be valid if VA's requirement that guerrilla service should be "recognized by the armed forces of the United States" is meant guerrilla service recognized by the former GAD only. Although the guerrilla recognition program has already been terminated by the former Guerrille Affairs Division, the only Army agency given the authority to grant guerrilla recognition, available information shows that many individuals rendered active guerrilla service but were not granted recognition by GAD. Many of these individuals were former members of the USAFFE, whose guerrilla activities must of necessity be inquired into by this headquarters, as required by Army policy. As previously stated, the Army no longer has the authority to confer the "recognition" which GAD was formerly authorized to grant, but it has authority to determine whether or not a former member of the USAFFE actually rendered guarrilla service. Consequently, when a former member of the USAFFE is determined by the Army to have rendered active guerrilla service, but the same was not recognized by GAD, the Army employs the term "unrecognized" instead of "recognized", in certifying the information to VA, in order to prevent confusion and any possible misconception by VA that the guerrilla "recognition" program completed by GAD in 1948 is still going on. It is therefore emphasized that an AGRD certification to the effect that a former member of the USAFFE rendered "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer" of the Commonwealth Army should not be taken literally to mean, because of the word "unrecognised", that the guerrilla service rendered was unworthy of consideration, and has been rejected by the Army. On the contrary, the very fact that the Army certified to VA that such a veteran was in a Missing Status for having rendered "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer" is itself proof that it is the Army's determination that the guerrilla service rendered, though not granted "recognition" by GAD, is worthy of consideration, and that the Army officially holds, acknowledges, and makes of record the fact that the veteran rendered active guerrilla service during the period in question. It is also emphasized that this type of service determination is limited to cases of former USAFFE members, and only where the available proof of guerrilla service rendered

UNITED STATES under a commissioned officer is of unquestioned validity.

The same may be said of the phrase "unrecognized anti-Japanese activity." A certification to that effect means that the Army holds the veteran to have performed guerrilla service or anti-Japanese activities, but that the same was not accorded "recognition" by GAD. However, it is understood that the service rendered is considered by VA as "inactive service" because it was not rendered under the command of a commissioned officer of the US Army, Mavy, Marine Corps, or under a commissioned officer of the Commonwealth Army recognized by and cooperating with the US forces, as required, apparently, by VA policies.

PHILLOGA (AF), APO 92 This discussion is given in order to explain the reasons why the Army employs the term "unrecognized", as requested by your Central Office, as well as to clarify the meaning which this headquarters intended to convey by it. This is not designed to influence, in any manner whatsoever, the interpretation and application of VA policies.

The term "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officers may indeed be misconstrued unless its background is fully understood. However, it is believed that its significance was adequately explained to the Veterans Administration prior to the time VA gave its concurrence to its adoption. The current system of breaking down guerrilla service, which has been followed by AGRD for the last two and a half years, has complicated to a certain extent AGRD's procedures. Instead of certifying merely that guerrilla service of a former member of the USAFFE was "recognized" or "not recognized" (by GAD), as the case may be, s further distinction has to be made by AGRD when the guerrilla service was not recognized by GAD into "unrecognized anti-Japanese activity" or "unrecognized guerrille service under a recognized commissioned officer", Considering the importance of the distinction, as AGRD understands it, the determination is not so simple to make.

The opinion of the Solicitor of the Veterans Administration rendered in this case of CARDOS, Agustin on 3 January 1951, would seem to regard "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officers as inactive service. Under this opinion therefore, there is no longer any necessity for AGRD to make a distinction between "unrecognized guerrilla service under a recognized commissioned officer" and "unrecognized anti-Japanese activity" in certifying service information of former members of the USAFFE. If said opinion will be applied by VA on all cases, please advise this headquarters so that AGRD's policies may be adjusted accordingly. 7 May 12 to 22 May 12



One of the questions that arises, is why the name of CARDOS, Agustin C., does not appear in any of the recognized rosters, since the officer that he is alleged to have served under at the time he was injured does appear in a recognized roster. From the foregoing, it appears that Major Osman, his alleged Commanding Officer, was informed of the necessity to apply for recognition with Guerrilla Affairs Division. It also follows, that he must have advised all members of his command of the need to apply for recognition or would have listed his name for inclusion in the Casualty Rosters or in the Troop Rosters.

Related to this subject matter is our MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD dated February 4, 1949, which records the minutes of the conference held in this Office on January 28, 1949. I enclose the only copy I have on file of this conference and I would appreciate your returning it after it has served its purpose. Particular attention is called to paragraphs 7 and 8.

My recollection of conferences had with the Army on this particular subject, is to the effect that Philippine Scouts were definitely informed that their services during the Japanese occupation would be recognized by the Army and considered as a resumption of the former PS service under the maxim: "Once a Scout always a Scout". Therefore, there was no need of their applying for recognition with the Guerrilla Affairs Division. However, the thought is advanced that the same viewpoint may not appear in order with respect to all former Commonwealth Army men who performed service during the Japanese occupation. It might apply to former PA personnel who served in certain Units where there is evidence of record that none of the members of that Unit applied for guerrilla recognition. However, in the instant case, since the Commanding Officer applied for recognition, it appears, as above stated, that the members of his Unit must have known of the required procedure.

In order that I may be in a position to make an intelligent reply to the attached radiogram DF 2888, I would appreciate your giving me



information explaining the policy followed by the Army in cases similar to the instant one, particularly whether such certifications as above referred to are principally made in meritorious combat cases.

To further aid you in studying the subject matter, I enclose copies of affidavits currently of record in the VA casefile of subject individual. Kindly return data when it has served your purpose.

- 2. Based on the foregoing information, this office has checked against copy of the revision roster maintained in this office. This revision roster had not been checked at the time that our letter of January 19, 1951, was written. The revision roster does contain the additions which have been made in original type on the copy maintained here.
- 3. Under existing and established procedures, the revision roster contains the revised recognition dates of the guerrilla units. The names of individuals listed therein may only be accepted as authentic if the names appear on the initial reconstructed troop roster. For this reason, the addition of an alias to the cited names has not been accepted by this office or by ACRD as the valid recordation.







Re your par #3: The "Revision" Roster of Vinzen's Division, Turko's Command (Bicol Brigade) with strength of 695 is the only approved roster of the unit. It is therefore, singularly significant that no separate "original reconstructed roster exists.

The Revision Easter was approved and reconstructed by the Guerrilla Affairs Division on 1 Nov 1948. It is the only officially recognized rester of the entire unit, with a strength of 696, and is explained in the Letter of Recognition of the unit, dated 18 Nov 1949, a copy of which is on file in this headquarters, and, it is believed, in your office, also.

Our copy of the Letter of Recognition (a true copy signed by WOJG H. J. Brown, whose integrity is unquestioned) was copied from a true copy bearing the initials H. M. C., presumably those of Harold M. Cushman, former GAD officer, on whose word your office has placed much credence.

The "Revision" roster in this case should be regarded as the "original reconstructed" roster. Your office had a copy of it at the time the IBM listing was made, yet it was omitted from the listing. It is believed that this omission can be attributed to a misinterpretation of the Letter of Recognition referred to above.

Re your par 4b: It is noted that AGRD and VA, HRO seem to agree, generally, on the number of recognized guerrillas. As to the discrepancy in the number of Rosters, VA and Army apparently have different interpretation of what constitutes a roster. The list of recognized members of

an everall command may be considered as one roster by your office, although it may, in fact, consist of many rosters of its different components, i.e., company and similar unit resters. The experience given, which purports to substantiate your conclusion, cites AGRD's alleged certifications of recognized guerrilla service in the latter part of 1948 and during 1949, wherein hundreds of certifications were allegedly made by AGRD, based on obsolete rosters. I take exception to such a statement as I do not believe that such an allegation is based on facts and can in any way be adequately substantiated.

For one thing, AGRD has never had in its possession an "obsolete" rester. For that matter, no authority exists whereby any rester can be changed in any way, and the resters presently in use will be obsolete only when the present program is successfully completed. This is not considered to be forthcoming in the foreseable future.

are almost microscopic, when viewed in the light of the nearly insurmountable obstacles imposed on the Army's mission; and all can be fully and properly explained, as can any error resulting from human limitations.

The statement contained in your par 4b, last paragraph on page 2 of your draft N - - - it is vital that the resters used by the VA for compiling the IBM alphabetized listings be checked only against the rester reconstructed by GAD or resters determined by it to be valid and acceptable is not quite clear. It leaves doubt as to who will decide authenticity of resters. As guarrilla recognition was an Army function, it is believed the Army should decide which resters are authentic.

He your par 4c: VA may not have been furnished some of the approved reconstructed resters. On the other hand VA might have been, but they could have been lost or mislaid. At any rate, the conclusion that, if a roster on file at AGRD is not on file in VA, such rester is not authentic, it is not based on sound logic.

Concerning Sector \$309 mentioned on page 6 of draft, AGRD requested confirmation of existence of an approved reconstructed rester of the unit from St. Louis, a copy of which is now in VA MRO's custody. Reply of St. Louis stated that they could not locate any such rester. It appears, now, that only VA MRO has such a roster. The sathenticity of this rester bears examination.

In conclusion be assured of this headquarters' willingness to be of whatever assistance it can.

None of the rosters listed as having been omitted are in the possession of the NRO, except the REVISION roster of Vinzon's Div-Turko Command, mentioned in par. 3, s pra. If the rosters omitted from the IBM are authentic, then it shows that the VA was not furnished a copy of all reconstructed and acceptable rosters by GAD. The list follows:

- 5. For your information, all rosters used by the VA for the IBM project were numbered. The folder entitled "NUMERICAL LISTINGS OF RECOGNIZED GUERRILIA ROSTERS TO BE USED WITH IBM ALPHABETICAL LISTINGS AND GUIDE RULE" was furnished with each complete set of IBM rosters.
- 6. By reference to the foregoing, it will be noted that apparently the main reasons for questioning the validity of the IBM listings are the following:
  - a) The fool-proof procedure that was to be used in compiling the reconstructed guerrilla rosters by Ouerrilla Affairs Division was not consummated as planned. (See par. 7 of letter dated Dec. 31, 1949, attached);
  - b) Copies of all reconstructed guerrilla rosters were not furnished to the VA or to AGRD as originally agreed upon;
  - c) The illegibility of recordations, due to much previous handling, of kime many of the rosters used by the VA in compiling the IBM listings, resulted in many errors being made by the key punchers in transferring the information from the rosters to the IBM listings.

- 1. Par 3. The "Revision" roster of Vinzon's Div, Turko's Command (Bicol Brigade), strength- 696 is the only approved roster of the unit. There is therefore no separate "original reconstructed" roster for the unit. If Mr. Palmer is looking for that, he will never find it. The Revision roster was approved and reconstructed by GAD, 1 Nov 48. That it is the only officially recognized roster of the entire unit, with a strength of 696, is explained in the Letter of Recognition of the unit, dated 18 Nov 47, a copy of which is on file in this headquarters, and it is believed, at VA. Our copy of the letter, a true copy signed by WOJG E. J. Brown whose integrity is unquestioned, was copied from a true copy bearing the initials H.M.C., presumably belonging to Harold M. Cushman, the same former GAD officer on whose word VA placed much credence. The "Revision" roster in this case should be regarded as the "original reconstructed" roster. VA had a copy of it at the time the IBM listing was made, yet it was not included on the listing. It is an error attributable to failure to interpret correctly the Letter of Recognition above referred to.
- 2. On Par 4b, it is noted that AGRD & VA, MRO seems to agree generally on the number of recognized guerrillas. On the discrepancy in the number of rosters, VA & Army may have different interpretations of what constitutes a roster. The list of recognized members of an overall command may be considered one roster by VA, although it may in fact consist of many rosters of its different components, i.e., company rosters. The experience given, which purports to substantiate Mr. Palmer's conclusion, cites AGRD's alleged certifications of recognized guerrilla service in latter part of 1948 and during 1949 wherein hundreds of certifications were allegedly made by AGRD, based on obsolete rosters. There is no grain of truth to this, and it is believed that Mr. Palmer cannot substantiate it.
- 3. On Par 4b, last paragraph on p. 3 The statement "- - it is vital that the rosters used by the VA for compiling the IBM alphabetized listings be checked only against the rosters reconstructed by GAD or rosters determined by IT to be valid and acceptable." What is the antecedent of it? VA or GAD? If it is GAD, it no longer exists, unless its former responsible officials are regrouped. If it is VA, are there personnel there qualified to do the job correctly. It is suggested that this point be clarified. Guerrilla recognition and certification of service being army functions, the Army should decide which rosters are authentic.
- 4. On Par. 4c, VA may not had been furnished some of the approved reconstructed rosters. On the other hand, VA might have been, but they got lost or were misplaced. Who knows? At any rate, the conclusion that if a roster on file at AGRD is not on file in VA, such a roster is not authentic, is not based on sound logic. VA's distrust on security measures adopted by the Army (AGRD) is evident.

- 5. On Roster #309 enumerated on page 6 of ltr, AGRD requested St. Louis for confirmation of existence of an approved reconstructed roster of the unit, a copy of which is now in VA MRO's custody. Reply of St. Louis stated that they could not locate any copy of such reconstructed roster (1st Ind of Jul 50, AGO, DA, RAC, signed by John de la Garza Jr., on file at Roster Section). It appears now that only MRO VA has such a roster, for neither AGRD nor St. Louis has it. The authenticity of what MRO VA has bears examination.
- 6. Has Mr. Palmer contacted Mr. Cushman on the matter of the authenticity of those rosters? Mr. Cushman was the one who personally delivered copies of the rosters to RPD & MRO. His competence to give an opinion as to the validity of the rosters in question is apparently satisfactory to VA. Mr. Cushman, as Mr. Palmer stated, was placed in charge of the same rosters when he was under VA's employ.

Dear Mr. Bautista:

Reference is made to your letter of 30 March 1950, in which you request a list of recognized guerrillas who applied for arrears in pay but were not paid due to lack of supporting swidence, or because their claims were submitted after the deadline date.

A list, such as what you have requested, does not exist in this headquarters. It is impracticable at this time to prepare such a list, as it would involve the examination of over 600,000 individual 201 files to determine the status of each case and making a roster check to establish whether or not the veteran is recognized, which would require months to complete. Under present commitments ACRD cannot spare the subject records heldings for screening, and if spared adequate space would not be available.

This headquarters no longer has the personnel for such a screening operation, or the authority to allow examination of the files by
other government agencies, to the extent desired in your letter.

Your letter of February 11, 1950, addressed to the Public Information Office, PHILAIRCOM, has been referred to this headquarters for reply.

Data of record in this command do not readily lend themselves to providing the information you desire. As you know, neither the recruitment for or operations of guerrilla organizations was confined to a particular geographical area, such as Camarines Sur. During the days of guerrilla activity, Camarines Sur was a part of a geographical entity commonly referred to as the "Bicol Provinces." According to the records of this headquarters, a total of sixty-eight (68) guerrilla units operated in the "Bicol Provinces" (Camarines Sur, Camarines Norte, Albay, Sorsogon, and Catanduanes. These 68 units had a total recognized strength of 6,772.

As to Camarines Sur, there are listed below the units whose operations in this province are of record in this headquarters. It is to be noted that in many cases our guerrilla rosters do not reveal the area of operations of the unit. The inference, therefore, is that the following list may be incomplete and that possibly other units operated in Camarines Sur.

- 2. Reconstructed rosters of the 10th MD, prepared and approved by Guerrilla Affairs Division, are on file in this headquarters. They have been and still are being used as the basis of determinations for arrears in pay and for certifications of military service to the U.S. Veterans Administration.
- Your stated object in suggesting a recheck of the reconstructed rosters of the 10th MD, namely, to avoid the possibility of fraud, is very much appreciated, because it is a matter of great concern to us. It is fortunate, however, that the organizational records of the 10th Military District have been preserved, and are now in the possession of this headquarters. These records have been of immeasurable value as an aid in determining the merits of claims of members of the 10th MD. In addition thereto, this headquarters contacts, as the need arises, former members of the 10th MD who are in a position to know vital information concerning the organization. Among such former members is Capt. Filemon S. Lagman whom you mentioned in your letter.
- 4. A recheck of the reconstructed rosters of the 10th Military District in order to identify deserving individuals whose names were omitted from the rosters but which should have been included therein would now serve no useful purpose. This headquarters is not authorized to grant recognition to unrecognized guerrilles, or to make changes, alterations or corrections on any guerrilla rester approved

TO: Commanding General, Philippine Air Command APO 900, c/o Postmaster San Francisco, California

- l. It has been reported to me that reconstructed rosters for the 10th Military District have been placed with your command and that many legitimate names have been omitted from these rosters. In order to check the accuracy of this report it is suggested that you have these rosters checked for my name as commanding officer, 10th Military District, from date of organization 15 September 1942 to my release on or about 24 June 1945. An additional name that is reported as omitted is Lt. Antonio Gozar, who was wounded in action and later retired for total disability from these wounds.
- 2. Immediately following the liberation of the Philippines all records of my command (10th Military District) were delivered to Head-quarters, Army of the Philippines, and thereafter were inaccessible. My departure from the Philippines was delayed until 15 April 1946 in order to act as consultant for the Guerrilla Affairs Section, Missing Persons Division, AFWESPAC. Even at that time unauthorized additions and deletions were suspected but could not be verified as the complete rosters had not been released by Headquarters, Philippine Army.
- 3. To avoid the possibility of fraud and to verify the exactness of the reconstructed rosters it is suggested that they be reviewed by a board of officers who served with my command. Captain Filomen S. Lagman, AGS, HNDF, AFD, Floridablanca, Pampanga, P.I., was the Adjutant, 10th Military District from its inception and could give invaluable assistance in this matter. There are several other officers from the Adjutant General's or G-1 Sections of headquarters, 10th MD, who are reserve officers, Philippine Army, and could be called back to duty for this purpose.



In compliance with your verbal request for an explanation as to the main reasons why there are so many discrepancies in the names of individuals whose names have been manifested on reconstructed Guerrilla rosters from the names that appear on Adjudication Forms 3101, or the names that the individuals may carry in civilian life, where they pertain to one and the same person, you are advised as follows:

The responsibility for the insertion of an individual's name upon a guerrilla roster was placed upon the Guerrilla Commander. Guerrilla Affairs Division was primarily responsible to determine whether the Guerrilla Unit was worthy of recognition. After Guerrilla Affairs Division determined the proper number of individuals to be included within the rosters, investigating officers of the Division were responsible for a cursory review as to what names were placed upon these rosters. In connection with this, most Guerrilla Commanders charged with the responsibility for preparing the rosters were not completely familiar with the individuals who were included within the rester. The Guerrilla Commander received the majority of names to be placed upon a roster from subordinate officers of the organization. Therefore, upon recognition being granted to a number of individuals included on a roster the possibility exists that numerous individuals included therein were erroneously listed in so far as the names were concerned. This is prevalent with regard to individuals' names being misspelled, ranks indicated in error and serial numbers incorrect. This is particularly true with regard to Roop Rosters wherein Guerrilla Affairs Division was responsible for the review of thousands of names included on hundreds of rosters. It was an impossible task for an investigating officer to determine if each individual's name was correctly entered within a roster.

With reference to Casualty Rosters, the over-all Guerrilla Commander was required to submit to Guerrilla Affairs Division the most deserving individuals that he, the Guerrilla Commander, deemed worthy of recognition. Guerrilla Affairs Division proceeded to screen the rosters and ultimately placed a limitation on the number of individuals to be accorded casualty recognition within a specific unit. As in the case of Troop



Rosters the responsibility of who should be placed on the roster and a verification as to the authenticity of the individual's name included therein was the responsibility of the Guerrilla Commander. In many instances the review of a 201 file pertaining to a specific individual when verified against the guerrilla roster reveals a misspelling of the name. In the majority of instances it has been conclusively indicated that the individual's name as revealed by a claimant, affiant, death certificates, orders, etc., is correctly stated within the 201 file whereas the name as listed within the casualty roster is incorrectly spelled.

With respect to aliases, it was the policy of Guerrilla Affairs Division that individuals who utilized an alias would not be included on a roster submitted for recognition with their alias name. Again it was the responsibility of the Guerrilla Commander to determine whether the name as listed on the roster was the individual's given name or the alias name. Numerous instances have arisen wherein aliases were noted on a rester. Guerrilla Affairs Division would remove the individual's name from that recognized roster and in the event the man's true name could be determined it would be placed therein. It can be fairly well established that many individuals are still listed on Guerrilla Rosters with an alias name instead of their given name. This fact has been revealed through the review of thousands of cases within AGRD.

- l. Attached hereto is the reconstructed roster of 10,441 recognized guerrillas of all component units of the Zambales Military District. This roster constitutes the only official roster and is the consolidation of 177 initial and supplementary rosters recognized by Headquarters Sixth Army, Headquarters AFPAC, Headquarters AFWESPAC and Headquarters PHILRYCOM.
- 2. The Zambales Military District was not originally recognized as an overall command. The District Headquarters, Zambales Military District, was recognized 29 January 1945; however, component units were initially recognized independently during the period 29 January 1945 to 15 June 1945. The Zambales Military District was disbanded 31 January 1946 by letter, Headquarters, 86th Infantry Division, dated 28 May 1946, subject, "Disbandment."
- 3. The initial period of recognition of 208 members was revised to 26 September 1945 by letter, Headquarters AF ESPAC, dated 12 August 1946, subject, "Revision of Recognition Date for Aglao Mountain Troops." The initial period of recognition of 1,141 members was revised to 26 September 1945 by letter, Headquarters PHIJRYCOM, dated 27 January 1947, subject, "Revision of Recognition Dates for Magsaysay's Guerrilla Forces, Zambales Military District," which was corrected by letter, Headquarters PHILRYCOM, dated 27 February 1948, subject, "Revised Periods of Recognition of units of the Zambales Military District." Additional periods of recognition were granted to 1,000 members by letter, Headquarters PHIJRYCOM, dated 16 February 1948, subject, "Revision of Recognition Dates for the Zambales Military District."
- 4. The Commanding Officer was the only person granted promotion subsequent to initial recognition; all other promotions indicated on this roster are set forth to establish the recognized rank of individuals as determined by initial recognition; therefore, date of promotion and date of recognition are the same.

- 6. Known duplications have been eliminated in the compilation of the reconstructed roster. Adjudication of claims of individuals whose names may be duplicated will be governed by the initial or earliest recognition authorized.

- 1. This office has now completed the first step in reducing the names of all individuals to an alphabetical listing who are believed to have performed valid recognized guerrilla service with the Armed Forces of the United States in the Philippine Islands during World War II. This list consists of 260,975 names segregated into 38 volumes per set and was made from rosters delivered to the NHO by the Guerrilla Affairs Division, PHILRICON, which include casualty rosters which were not reconstructed as they were deemed acceptable as initially made and rosters of individual recognitions.
- 2. Four individual sets, double spaced, of the 260,975 names have been completed. Two sets were forwarded to you through APO channels via parcel post, registered mail, on December 29, 1949. For the reasons hereinafter set forth, the following recommendation is made:
- a. That one set be immediately forwarded to the Records Administration Center, AGO 4300 Good Fellow Boulevard, St. Louis 20, Missouri, for its permanent custody, with a request that the information contained therein be immediately checked against the original rosters and that a prompt decision be rendered as to the authenticity thereof;
- b. That the second set be retained in Central Office and operational use thereof deferred pending decision as to authenticity from AGO, St. Louis, Missouri.

The other two sets are being retained in this office pending the decision from AGO as to the authenticity of the information contained therein; if deemed acceptable, one of the sets will be delivered to the Adjutant General, Records Depostiroy, PHILCON (AF), for their use in certifying recognised guerrilla service to the Veterans Administration and the second set will be retained for use by the MRO.

3. Current shipment to you is being made in the form of ten (10) packages containing two (2) complete sets of 38 volumes each. Each set comprises five (5) packages so that a total of 10 packages should arrive at your office in approximately seven to nine days. We are including for each set a guide rule to interpret the columnar entries in the rosters.

- h. A second IBM rum of four (h) single spaced sets has already been initiated and the sets should be completed in approximately six weeks. Since you previously stated that Gentral Office required four (h) sets of the rosters, three (3) of these single spaced sets will be forwarded to you unless you notify us that a lesser number will suffice. The fourth set will be referred to ACRD, PHILCOM (AF) so that they may have two sets for their use one double spaced and one single spaced. If upon reconsideration of the needs of Central Office it is determined that two sets of the roster will suffice, then it is contemplated to deliver one set to Headquarters National Defense Forces, Philippine Army, and one set for the use of the Philippine Veterans Board.
- 5. There is a certain reasonable basis for doubting the correctness of all rosters that have been reduced to the alphabetical listing in the bound volumes that are being sent to you and, therefore, it is recommended that before the information contained in the bound volumes is accepted as authentic and used for operational purposes, the information therein should be verified and checked against the original reconstructed rosters compiled by Guerrilla Affairs Division, PHIRYCOM. These original rosters together with all records and data pertaining to the project consummated by the said Guerrilla Affairs Division are now at AGO Records Administration Center, St. Louis, Missouri.
- 6. In explanation of the foregoing recommendation, you are informed that on or about November 1947 the Guerrilla Affairs Division, PHILAYCOM, decided that it was necessary to reconstruct all guerrilla rosters compiled up to that date. This decision was made necessary by the discovery of many irregularities and anomalies which had been committed with the rosters such as the substitution of names and the inclusion of many names of individuals who were not recognised at the time the original rosters were compiled.
- 7. Major Harold Cushman, who was then in charge of one of the sections of the Army's Guerrilla Affairs Division responsible for reconstructing the guerrilla rosters, advised the Adjudication Officer of this station that a reconstruction procedure had been established by Guerrilla Affairs Division which was considered to be fool-proof and which would either prevent the commission of anomalies or would enable an examiner to readily detect any irregularity or anomaly that may be committed with the rosters. The proce-

dure that was planned was as follows: First, all guerrilla rosters and evidence pertaining thereto were to be rechesked and upon a roster being considered as acceptable, the Certifying Officer would place on each sheet of every roster that was reconstructed the following marks of authenticity:

- a. a rectangular rubber stamp mark stating: "Reconstructed by Guerrilla Affairs Division, Hers. PHILEYCON":
- b. a rubber stamp mark showing: "Approved", followed by the date of approval, "Hars. PHILEYCON.";
- c. the initial or signature of the Approving Officer was to be placed on the round rubber stamp mark of "Approved".
- 8. The project of reconstructing the guerrilla rosters was completed on June 30, 1948. Gopies of the reconstructed guerrilla rosters were said to have been distributed as follows: the complete original set was forwarded to the Records Administration Genter, AGO, St. Louis, Missouri, together with all evidence and data used in the compilation of the project; one (1) duplicate set was delivered to Recovered Personnel Division, PHILRICOM, now AGRD, PHILGOM (AF); one (1) duplicate set was sent to Headquarters; Mational Defense Forces, Philippine Army; one (1) duplicate set to Philippine Veterans Board, Manila, P. 1.; two (2) duplicate sets delivered to Manila Regional Office, USVA, one of which was forwarded to Central Office, Atm: Director, Dependents and Beneficiaries Claims Service.
- 9. Upon the consummation of the foregoing project by Guerrilla Affairs Division, Major Harold Cushman was employed by the Manila Regional Office of the Veterans Administration and was placed in charge of the unit responsible for certifying to the correctness of the determinations made by the Army of alleged recognized guerrilla service. Major Cushman's background of experience in the Guerrilla Affairs Division, together with his excellent personal qualifications, made him the ideal person for this work. He had been the limitson officer between Guerrilla Affairs Division, Recovered Personnel Division, Claims Service, Headquarters Philippine Army, Veterans Administration, Philippine Veterans Board and other Government agencies; Special Investigator of Guerrilla Claims and Irregularities. Consequently, this office relied heavily on Major Cushman's determinations in all questions relating to determinations of guerrilla service. Major Cushman remained in the employment of this office until May 6, 1949, when he resigned to accept private employment in Australia.
- 10. This office commenced the project of reducing the names of all individuals in the reconstructed guerrilla rosters/ on May 1, 1949. In October 1949, prior to completion of this operation, the attention of the Adjutication Officer at this station was called to a roster of "Unrecognized Guerrillas" (46th Inf. Regt., 44th ROTG, Runters Div.), referred for inclusion which did not appear to be suthentic. Thereupon, he checked other rosters.

and found what appeared to be serious deviations from the original plan and procedure which was contemplated to make the project fool-proof.

- II. For instance, some of the rosters that contained the rectangular rubber stamp mark "Reconstructed by Guerrilla Affairs Division, Hqs. PHIL-RYCOM" failed to have the round rubber stamp of approval (see Par. 7, (b) above) but in lieu thereof had the word "Approved" typed in an ordinary round rubber date stamp and failed to have the initials of the Approving Officer on the "Approved" stamp; other rosters failed to have the rectangular rubber stamp mark showing: "Reconstructed by Guerrilla Affairs Division, Hqs. PHILRYCOM"; other rosters have an ordinary date stamp with a typewritten notation: "Reconstructed by Guerrilla Affairs Division, PHIL RYCOM"; other rosters merely contained a rubber stamp signature in lieu of the original authentic signature of the officer who was supposed to have certified to the correctness of the rosters.
- 12. In one instance there is a roster dated January 5, 1948, addressed to the Commanding General, AFWESPAC, entitled, "Roster of Enlisted Men, Un-recognized" with the following notation: "Submitted herewith is the roster of unrecognized enlisted men, 46th Inf. Reg't, 44th ROTC or Hunters Division incorporated in the 3d En. Provisional Saber Force". This roster contains on each sheet the round rubber stamp "Approved" and the accepted rectangular stamp mark on the left hand side of the sheet and the name of the Certifying Officer is on the lower right hand corner. (Attached is a letter dated 2 Dec. 1949 from the Chief, Veterans Branch, S & C Div., AGRD, "HILCOM (AF), expressing an opinion that the roster is valid and contains the names of recognized guerrillas.)
- 13. Another rester that appears to be questionable is the rester of the Maculto Bn. with a strength of 512 members, extended recognition from 3-4-45 to 9-26-45 by letter from Hqs. PHILRYCOM, dated 5 January 1945, which rester contains an ordinary rubber date stamp with the word "Approved" typed immediately above the date of 22 Nov. 1947. This would indicate that the rester was approved prior to the letter of authority granting recognition.
- 14. Another roster that appears questionable is the following: Composit Bn., 7th Inf. Regt. 34th Division, Isabela Area (Independent). This roster has only a round rubber date stamp dated 12-2-47 with the word "Approved" typod therein and the signature on the stamp of Marion C. Allbright, lst Lt. FA.
- 15. Another roster that appears questionable is the following: San Jose, Batangas Guerrilla, Company Headquarter, total strength of 193, which fails to show that it was reconstructed and only contains the rubber date stamp dated 11-22-47 with the word "Approved" typed immediately above the date.

16. The Adjudication Officer at this station held a conference with representatives of AGRD, PHILCOM (AF), citing the above specified variations from the original proposed plan that was to be followed by Guerrilla Affairs Division in making the project fool-proof. Since the officers responsible for consummating the project of reconstructing the guerrilla rosters have been transferred from this area, a satisfactory explanation for the above cited variations cannot be made by the Staff currently on duty at PHILCOM (AF). It is believed that if the original plan was actually carried out, then it may have been followed in the reconstruction of the original set of rosters which were forwarded to Records Administration Center, AGO, St. Louis, Mo. It is further believed that due to the urgency for the completion of the project with a target date of June 30, 1948 being set to reconstruct rosters containing several hundred thousand names which were finally reduced to approximately 260,000 names, that the original plan was substituted in making up the duplicate sets, which may account for the use of rubber stamp signatures of alleged certifying officers and the other variations that have been specified.

17. Furthermore, when rosters were first delivered to the MRO, we were informed that they contained the names of 269,000 recognized individuals. Later, additional rosters were forwarded which had inadvertently been omitted in the initial delivery. Since the current project consists of 260,975, it is assumed that there may be some rosters of recognized individuals in AGO, St. Louis, copies of which were not forwarded to the MRO, thereby requiring a supplement to the current sets.

18. The need for prompt checking and verification of the alphabetical listing of recognized guerrillas is obvious. This office will appreciate being
notified of the findings of AGO, St. Louis, at the earliest possible date,
so that if printed alphabetical listing is deemed to be acceptable, it may
be placed into immediate use.

A person's name may be listed on a reconstructed initial troop roster or casualty roster (as distinguished from individual letter of recognition). However, no period of recognized service may be certified to VA in the following cases:

- 1. If the person is listed on the reconstructed initial troop roster and he died prior to the recognition of the unit, he is not considered recognized. Reason: AGRD has no authority to set back the recognition so as to include at least the date of death. This is true even in a case where such a person did not actually die but is missing, whereabouts unknown. VA is notified that although the person is listed on the reconstructed initial troop roster, no recognized guerrilla service may be certified because he died (or became missing, whereabouts unknown) prior to the recognition of his unit and that his casualty status is not officially recognized.


  NOTE: This case should be distinguished from those recognized as casualties (on a Casualty roster), who are entitled to recognition on the date of casualty. GAD's directive specifically recognizes them for that day.
- 2. No recognized guerrilla service may be certified to

  VA on a person whose name is listed on a troop roster or casualty

  roster, when there is positive evidence that he did not have any

  guerrilla service at all. For example: A person is listed as Killed

  In Action in August 1944 on a casualty roster. Positive evidence on



file shows that he died of TB at home on 3 Jan 42. It is clear in this case that the person never performed any guerrilla service which could be recognized by GAD, and that his name must have been erroneously listed on the casualty roster. VA is informed that although the person's name is listed on a casualty roster (or troop roster), positive evidence shows that he did not perform any guerrilla service.

It must be emphasized that here, there is positive evidence of lack of service, and not merely lack of evidence of service.

Every person granted recognition by GAD is presumed to have performed guerrilla service. When evidence of service is lacking, AGRD develops the file by correspondence or Field Investigation. Service is not denied simply because there is lack of evidence of service.

But service is denied when there is positive evidence that the person did not have any guerrilla service at all. Cases falling under this category are very rare.

The Army presumes that GAD accomplished the guerrilla recognition program properly; that GAD recognized those deserving recognition and denied recognition to those who did not deserve. Accordingly, AGRD has been directed to follow, and follows what GAD had determined, except in those rare cases where positive evidence is present showing that a person granted recognition did not have any service. AGRD cannot embark into a program of gathering evidence to disprove the validity of each and every determination made by GAD. This would amount to a review of GAD's accomplishment which this headquarters has no authority (nor is it qualified) to do.
